SECOND DAY-MORNING SESSION.

WEDNESDAY, October 9th, 1889.

Devotional exercises conducted by Elder H. M. Croom. Roll called, Proceedings of yesterday read and approved. Letter from Warsaw presented and read. Ten o'clock—special order. Report on State Missions was read by Elder C, Durham. Report of Executive Committee was read by Bro. L. R. Highsmith, Pending motion to adopt report on State Missions, remarks were made by Elder C. Durham. On motion, a collection was taken for State Missions.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

All that has been done, all that is now being done, and all that will be done to give the gospel to the destitute of our State, has been, is now, and will properly be called State Missions. This is true whether the work has been done under the appointment of our State Board, an Association, a local church, or undertaken independently without appointment by any human action. For more than one hundred years the Baptists have been engaged in State Missions, and we are glad to report that never in all these years has this work been so large, so hopeful, or so satisfactory in its results as now. This year we have ninety-one Missionaries and fifteen Colporters at work in the destitute section of our State. These self sacrificing men are located in the destitute villages and country neighborhoods from the sea to beyond the mountains.

We recommend:

I. That the pastors keep their people well informed about the growth, the needs, and the prospects of State Missions.

2. That pastors and people be requested to pray the Lord to bless this work even more in the future than in the past.

3. That the churches be urged to give more largely to the support of State Missions than ever before in the history of our denominational work.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

God has been pleased to call, for the most part, poor men to the work of the ministry. The blessed Jesus did this, while on earth, and then prepared them for the work to which he had called them. His people have, in some measure, followed his example in this work. During the last session thirtysix poor young ministers were aided by the Board of Education at Wake Forest College.

The number received this session is thirty-one. We hope to be able to receive others later. There are two from the Eastern Association, Brethren A. A. Butler and C D. Peterson. These seem to be worthy young brethren, and give promise of usefulnes. The Board has been compelled to decline, for lack of funds, a number of applications for aid.

Would that the means furnished, might enable the Board to receive all the worthy young ministers who apply for help. Brethren, for Christ's sake, let us help the Lord's poor ministers who are struggling to prepare themselves for the work to which He has called them.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

The Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention is located at Atlanta, Ga., with Dr. I. T. Tichenor as Corresponding Secretary. Rev. A. G. McManaway, Charlotte, N. C., is Vice-President for North Carolina. The Board is occupied with mission work in and adjacent to the Southern States. It has work in Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, Maryland, Missouri, Western North Carolina, Texas, Tennessee, West Virginia, and Virginia, and also in the Indian Territory and Cuba,

They have employed 328 missionaries and received from the churches \$69,000 during the last year.

The work has received signal proofs of divine favor. There have been organized during the past year 328 Baptist Churches and by baptism and letter have received in connection with their work 8,402 members.

The work in Cuba continues with increased power, and there is no field under the care of the Southern Baptists so full of promise and so marked with divine approval.

.The Home Board publishes in Atlanta, Ga., the *Home Field*, as its organ, to set forth its special work, and also furnishes a full line of Sunday-school literature, and these we can commend to the churches.

In view of the growing magnitude of this great work and its increasing needs, your committee recommends:

I. That this work be more earnestly pressed upon the attention of the churches by the pastors.

2. That, in accordance with the resolution passed at our last State Convention, we call upon the churches of this Association to make pledges for this work as for other denominational enterprises.

THIRD DAY-MORNING SESSION.

Moderator called the Association to order. Prayer by Elder H. M. Croom. Roll called. Minutes of yesterday read and approved. Special order—Report of Executive Committee read. Pending motion to adopt the report remarks were made by Brethren J. T. Bland, J. H. Mills and Dr. Pritchard.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

In the hope of better supplying the vast destitution within our borders, this body, in 1886, turned over the principal part of the work formerly done by this Committee to the State Mission Board. But the wants of the destitution are still great and pressing, and all along our eastern border the cry for the Gospel comes up and your Committee has been unable to supply this great need.

We feel that the work within the bounds of our own Association needs and requires for its successful prosecution, the expenditure of more money even, than is contributed by the churches of the body. While in fact and in truth, the amount actually expended in supplying said destitution, is much less than the amount contributed by the churches for this object. Upon our recommendation aid has been extended by the State Mission Board as follows:

The latter alone having made report to us.

We would urge upon the churches the importance and great necessity of more enlarged efforts in this department of Christian work.

Report on Foreign Missions was read by Elder J. T. Albritton. Pending motion to adopt, remarks were made by Elders O. P. Meeks and T. H. Pritchard.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Our duty with regard to the evangelization of the world lies in concentric circles. The command of the Savior is to preach the Gospel of repentance and remission of sin among all nations, beginning at home. With home

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as a centre, we are to work outwardly in every direction, where can be found heathen darkness or corrupt Christianity.

The mission fields of the Southern Baptist Convention lie in Europe, Asia, Africa, North and South America.

The Italian Missions are under the supervision of Brethren Geo. B. Taylor and J. H. Eager, who have as co-workers twelve Italian pastors and evangelists, besides a number of colporters.

The North China Mission reports two churches, which are self-sustaining, two Main Stations, at which churches will probably be organized in the near future, and twenty-two Out Stations.

The Central China Mission reports four churches, whose contributions last year amounted to \$276.60. This mission has twelve missionaries—six males and six females—beside four ordained and unpaid native preachers.

The South China Mission has seven American missionaries—two males and five females—to which number there will soon be added three others. Twenty natives assist in the work. This mission contributed last year \$563.97—over \$1.00 per member.

Japan is one of the most promising mission fields of the Convention. Brethren McCullom, of Alabama, and Brunson, of South Carolina, with their wives, are expected to sail for Japan in the early Fall.

Brethren David, Eubank and Smith and their wives have been working in Africa several years. Brother C. C. Newton, wife and daughter, from this State, and Brother W. T. Lumbley and wife, of Mississippi, have gone to reinforce the mission force of Africa.

Our work in Brazil is progressing under the labors of our missionaries. We have there five churches and several Out Stations. The death of Sister Maggie Rice is a sad loss to us, but her work will be taken up by Sister Emma Morton, of Missouri,

Brother W. D. Powell and his co-workers are moving grandly forward in Mexico. Our work in this country extend into four States and is rapidly enlarging under the labors of our twenty missionaries, aided by more than this number of native assistants. At the last Convention, this mission reported nineteen churches, and a large number of Out Stations. The Female Institute is full to overflowing, and the Male School is rapidly filling up.

The opening and enlarging fields call for more laborers and more funds. We should esteem it a privilege to respond to this call.

God in his providence emphatically calls upon the Baptists of North Carolina to go far in advance of all past efforts in promoting the Foreign Missionary enterprise, inasmuch as he has been pleased to send in the foreign fields thirty representatives of our beloved State.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Your Committee on Sunday Schools beg leave to report: That in order to awaken a deeper interest in the Sunday School work among our churches and promote Sunday School Missions in the destitute sections of our bounds, we recommend that we call a delegation from our Sunday Schools to meet Friday before third Sunday in April next, to organize an Eastern Baptist Sunday School Association, to convene annually. We further recommend that the Colporteur and Orphanage work be also considered by said Association. We recommend that your body now designate a committee to issue a call and locate place of said meeting.

Committee to issue a call and locate place of Sunday School Association —Elders O. P. Meeks, C. E. Gower and S. M. Carlton.

We recommend that Article 2 be so amended as to read—This Association shall be composed of all ordained ministers, who are members or pastors of churches of this body, and three delegates from each church, chosen from her membership assembled, in conference.

2nd. We recommend that Article 5th remain as it is.

3rd. Believing it to be the desire of this body to co-operate with the State Convention, and at the same time to control the Mission work in her bounds, we recommend lastly, that Article 9th be so amended as to read —The Association shall appoint an Executive Committee of nine members, three from each of the Union Meetings, who shall co-operate with the State Board, so far as is practicable, in the mission work within our bounds, and during the intervals between the sessions of this body, take such steps as they may deem advisable for the advancement of the same, making annual reports of their work to the Association, which report, together with that on State Missions, shall be the first business of the second day of the session.

Further, that our missionaries shall report their work quarterly to the Executive Committee, in order that said Committee shall be prepared to make full report of their work to this body.

On motion report on Orphanage was taken from the table. Pending motion to adopt the Association repaired to the stand in order that all might hear Brother J. H. Mills upon the subject of Baptist Orphanage.

REPORT ON BAPTIST ORPHANAGE.

The Committee on the Orphanage at Thomasville beg leave to state that the institution is prospering and seems to increase in favor of God and man. It now has buildings sufficient to accommodate four families of twenty-four children each, though there are actually present one hundred and thirteen. A nursery for children under eight years of age is now in process of construction, which will meet the demands of the situation for the immediate future. There are built a chapel for church and Sunday school services, and a printing office, where the organ of the institution, *Charity and Children*, is published. No money is needed just now for buildings, but contributions of money, food and clothing are always acceptable, as the children are entirely dependent for their daily food and rainent upon the liberality of the churches. It can be readily seen that as these demands are constant and must be met without delay there should be a continuous supply coming in from all parts of the State, and your committee would therefore earnestly recommend that each church of the Association be requested to take up a collection for the Orphanage once a year and each Sunday School a collection once a month.

The amounts of none of the collections were reported to the clerk. The Trustees of Warsaw High School reported as follows : At a meeting of the Trustees of the School on the 20th day of July, 1889, the following

resolution was unanimously adopted : WHEREAS, The Trustees of the Warsaw High School believe that it was the intention and expectation of the Baptist of the Eastern Association in the founding of this school to establish an institution of high grade for the education of their children, to be controlled and managed in the interest and under the auspices of said Association, and

Whereas, Owing to the loss of the house by fire and other causes not essential to be enumerated, the said Trustees find themselves without the means of supplying suitable teachers and carrying on said school in conformity to said original plan and policy, and whereas we believe that said original object, purposes and expectations can now be more nearly attained and carried out by giving to our brother, L. R. Carroll, sole control and management of said school and its property, now therefore, be it

Resolved, By the said Board of Trustees, that in consideration of the premises, that the entire control and management of said School and all its said property be turned over to and the same is hereby committed into the hards of the said L. R. Carroll, to be held, used and controlled by him, the said L. R. Carroll, during and so long as the said L. R. Carroll shall maintain a school on said premises of high grade, and of such character as shall conform to the original purposes and design as herein before indicated and satisfactory to the Association, said Carroll to keep the house on said premises insured against fire and up to its present state of repair, but have no right to sell or convey to any third party any interest in said property.

Brother Carroll has secured the services of Prof. F. L. Merritt, a recent A. M. graduate of Wake Forrest College, as principal of the school. He is a young man of fine attainments, indomitable energy and unyielding perseverance, and with a faithful and thoroughly competent corps of assistant teachers, we feel assured that the school will fully maintain its former standard of efficiency and usefulness. Brother Carroll invites criticism and respectfully solicits your patronage, not because of denominational relations simply, but upon the principles of economy, efficiency and merit.

definite time, which several motions shall have preference in the order in which they are stated.

Io. After a motion has been decided, any member having voted in the majority may move a reconsideration.

II. No member shall absent himself during the session of the Association without permission of the presiding officer, and no one shall take final leave of absence without the permission of the Association; and if any shall do so, their absence shall be noted in the minutes

12. All questions, except such as relate to the Constitution, shall be decided by a majority of votes.

13. The Association shall have the right to decide what subjects shall be admitted to consideration.

14. The Rules of Order may be altered or amended at any session of the Association by a majority vote.

CONSTITUTION OF THE EASTERN ASSOCIATION.

ARTICLE I. This Association shall be denominated and known as the Eastern Association.

ART. 2. The object of this Association shall be the promotion of Christ's Kingdom among men; and the means of accomplishing this shall be in strict conformity to the New Testament.

ART. 3. This Association shall be composed of all ordained ministers, who are members or pastors of churches of this body, and three delegates from each church chosen from her membership assembled in conference.

ART. 4. The delegates from each church shall bear a letter certifying their appointment, communicating information relative to the state of the church: *Provided, however*, That when any church has prepared a letter, and through inadvertance the letter fails to be presented, her delegates may be received without its presentation.

ART. 5. The officers of this Association shall be, a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be chosen annually from among its members, by ballot, by a majority of the members voting, and continue in office until their successors are elected.

ART. 6. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to enforce an observance of the Constitution, preserve order, appoint committees, decide all questions of order, give his opinion on any question under discussion, after others have spoken, and give the casting vote in case of a tie.

ART. 7. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to record the proceedings of each annual session, and superintend their printing and distribution among the churches.

ART. 8. It shall be the duty of the treasurer to receive all funds sent up by the churches, or collected during the session of the body, and disburse the same, as ordered by the Association. He shall also make to the Association an annual report of the condition of the treasury.

ART. 9. The Association shall appoint an executive committee of nine members, three from each of the Union Meetings, who shall co-operate with the State Board, so far as is practicable in the mission work within our bounds, and, during the intervals between the sessions of this body, take such steps as they may deem advisable for the advancement of the same, making annual reports of their work to the Association, which report, together with that on State Missions, shall be the first business of the second day of the session. Further, that our missionaries shall report their work quarterly to the Executive Committee, in order that said committee shall be prepared to make full report of their work to this body. ART, 10. The Association shall not maintain fellowship with any of the

churches which neglect to preserve Gospel order. ART. 11. The Association may invite visiting and corresponding brethren to seats, and extend to them the privileges of the body, except that of voting.

ART. 12. The annual session of this Association shall commence on Tuesday after the first Lord's Day in October, at such place as may be chosen.

ART. 13. By appointment of the Association there shall be an Introduct-ory Sermon of a denominational character, and a Missionary Sermon.

ART. This Constitution may be amended at any annual session by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.
