J. Kelley and J. D. Franks.

The Moderator invited Prof. W. A. Curtis to come forward and read a resolution, adopted in mass meeting by the members of the Baptist and Methodist churches, also by the citizens of this community, tending to the suppression of intemperance in this country.

In this age of progress, it behooves us, as Baptists, to be informed of the efforts that are being made, also the success attending those efforts.

That we may be thus informed we would recommend the *Biblical Recorder*, edited by Elder C. T. Bailey, Raleigh, N. C., and Elder J. E. Carter, as Western editor, as a paper every way worthy of your patronage; also the *Foreign Mission Journal*, published in Richmond, Va.

Dear brethren, we the Committee on Home Missions, are glad to say that there has been so much done for the evangelization of our people at home. There has been many professions, accessions and baptisms during the past year through the instrumentality of the earnest missionary. Many poor, weak Christians, as well as the strong Christian's heart has been cheered and comforted by the pleasant visits of the missionary with his prayers and songs. But while so many are flocking to this great gospel feast, there are many who will not adhere to the preaching of pastors, nor the light their neighbor reflects.

So we believe, that if they are reached at all with the gospel of peace, it must be done by the labors of some earnest missionary. Let us, therefore, obey the divine injunction, "Go out into the highways and hedges and compel them to come in, that the Lord's house may be filled." And to this we should each one feel ourselves committed to the cause of Home Missions.

We therefore recommend the churches of this Association to take quarterly collections for Home Missions.

The Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention has donated \$500.00 to help the Western North Carolina Convention pay her

nine missionaries in the field. These brethren are giving the whole or part of their time, and we are informed that they have been paid up to this time. There has been some mission work done by the different pastors in our bounds. May the Lord bless the Home Mission cause.

#### REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

It is an admitted fact that the making, sale and improper use of intoxicating drinks, is one of the greatest evils and curses to the human family in the land, and we hail with inexpressible joy and gratitude the spirit of prohibition that is now pervading the land and nation.

It is now a great question and doubtless the time is not far distant when it will be the great question and issue of the day.

There is now a candidate for the presidency of the United States, who stands square on the prohibition question, and also a prohibition candidate for governor of North Carolina. These may not be successful this campaign, but it shows the direction which the great current is taking, and we believe that the day is not far distant when prohibition will be the prominent plank in the political platform that will sweep the States and the nation. The fountain head of the great evil will, at least, be in a large measure dried up. The saloon will be closed and peace, happiness and prosperity will crown the land, and thousands of happy homes. It behooves every member of this Association, and every lover of virtue and morality, religion and the truth, to use all their influence to bring about this glorious end.

We give the following well authenticated statistics to show the growth of prohibition sentiment at the ballot box in the past few years.

In the following States: Dakota, Florida, Iowa, Kansas, Maine, Massachusetts, Michigan, North Carolina, Ohio, Rhode Island, Vermont and Wisconsin, there has been a majority of votes cast for Prohibition of 110,776, and it believed there will be 4,000,000 votes cast for Prohibition in the year 1888.

We recommend the use of *Kind Words* and the literature published by the American Baptist Publication Society.

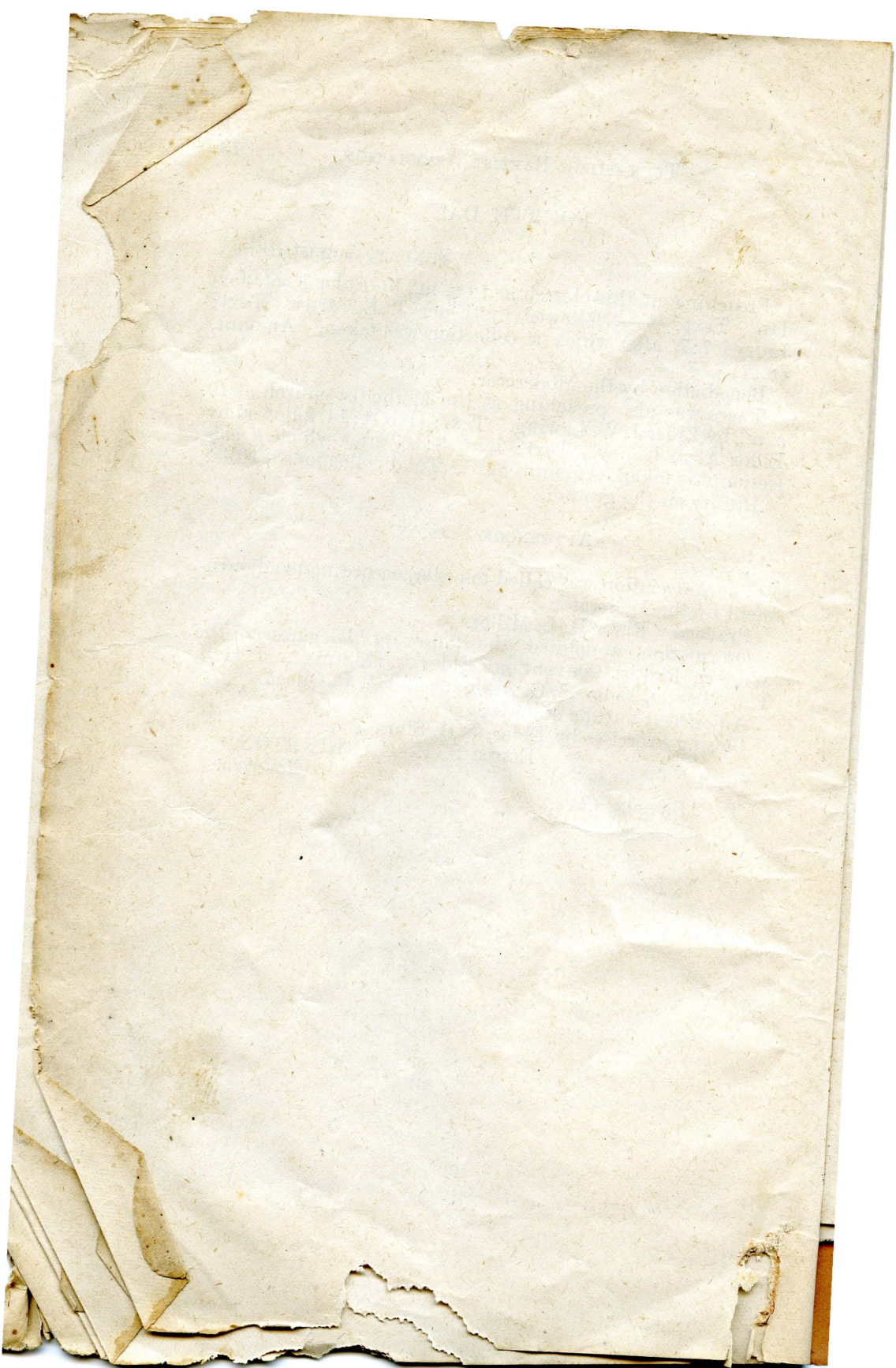
