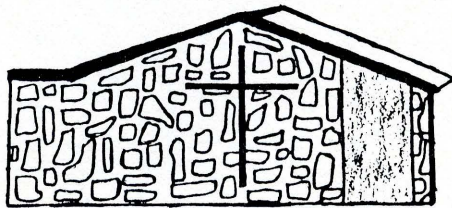

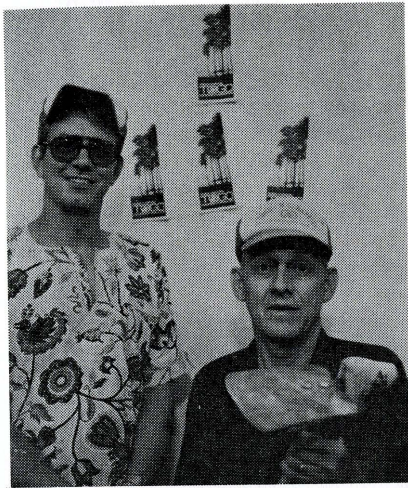

ROBERT C. BLANTON

Missions is both the command and the work of Christ. For Robert C. Blanton missions has never been an option. Because God's word teaches missions, missions has been a vital part of Robert's life. As a young man serving in the U.S. Army, Robert was a part of two mission churches, in Alaska and in Texas.

When the opportunity came to go to Togo, West Africa, there was no question in Robert's mind. He had been preaching missions for 25 years in the Tuckaseegee Association. Ordained in 1960 at Mt. Pleasant, he has pastored Sequoah Baptist Church in Cherokee, Little Savannah, Mt. Pleasant, Speedwell, and Deitz Memorial Churches. He has served interim ministries at Ochre Hill, Greens Creek and Lovedale.

Robert has served on various committees of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association and has served as Training Union Director, Treasurer, Parliamentarian, Vice Moderator and on two different occasions as Moderator. He has served as a member of the General Board of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

Robert is the son of T. Posey Blanton and Julia Cope Blanton. He married Edith Fisher and they have three children, Katrinka Mathis, Rhonda Jo Franks and Linda June at home. He is a bivocational minister, having worked for the Jackson County School Bus Garage 27 years. While in Togo, Robert helped baptize over 200 converts who had been saved and disciplined during the past year. Robert served as a mechanic and as a preacher in the partnership effort between Togo and the Baptist State Convention.

Robert returned to the Association with an even deeper commitment and love for Christ and for missions. He has shown a slide projector presentation on his trip in many churches. He uses these occasions to inspire and to encourage others to volunteer for mission work. In this way he can continue to teach and preach missions.

HAROLD MESSER

William Harold Messer of Webster, North Carolina recently had the opportunity to serve as a missionary in the country of Togo, West Africa.

Harold was a graduate of Sylva Webster High School in 1969, and a 1983 graduate from STC majoring in Advanced Carpentry. Upon completing his contractors exam he is presently the owner and operator of H. Messer Construction Company Incorporated of Webster, North Carolina.

Harold is the husband of Gwendolyn A. Messer and the father of two daughters, Mabelle Dawn, who is a Senior at Sylva Webster High and Chimene Melissa, who is a seventh grader at Fairview Elementary School.

Harold's opportunity to go to Togo came about when his church, First Baptist of Sylva, prayed that someone from their congregation would volunteer to go to Togo, West Africa. The project is a group endeavor by the Foreign Mission Board of Richmond, Virginia, and the North Carolina Baptist Convention.

He spent one month in Togo with several other volunteers helping to construct a bridge and to drill wells. He also assisted the career missionaries in bringing Christ to the people of the bush.

The experience has greatly changed Messer's attitude and his Christian feelings toward other people of God's world. He says he has added one more commandment to the Holy Ten. He calls it the eleventh commandment - "The Great Commission - To go unto all the world even to the utter ends of the earth and inform others about Jesus and God the Father."

Harold has been to several churches in the Association and throughout the state showing slides and telling of what he calls, "The Togo Experience" and trying to encourage others to catch "The Fire" and go and serve God.

He has given to date around 75 such presentations. Upon ending each presentation, he challenges every congregation "To ask not what God can do for you, but ask what you can do for God!"

The Minutes of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association for 1986 are jointly dedicated to two men, Harold Messer and Robert Blanton, who have left the comfort of home to travel overseas and serve Christ. May many others of us follow their example.

Proceedings

THURSDAY, AUGUST 21, 1986

1. The Tuckasegee Baptist Association held the first session of the 157th Annual Meeting at the Balsam Baptist Church on Thursday, August 21, 1986. The Balsam Church, as host, provided an excellent meal for the 163 messengers and 40 visitors.

2. Mike Moore, Moderator, called the session to order at 6:00 p.m.

3. John Reid, Director of Missions, presented the following motion: "I make a motion that the Association suspend Article V, Section I of the Constitution that reads "The Association shall hold its annual sessions on Thursday and Friday preceding the third Sunday in August . . ." and that we proceed with this meeting as the legitimate meeting of the Tuckasegee Baptist Association."

When I get a second to the motion I want to speak to the motion and explain why I am doing this.

At the July Executive Committee Meeting in 1985 the *Book of Reports* was distributed. In these *Books of Reports* the incorrect dates were listed for the 1986 Annual Meeting. When the Association adopted the *Book of Reports* at the 1985 session, no one noticed that the dates were incorrect for the 1986 Annual Meeting. When the Annuals were printed, the incorrect dates from the *Book of Reports* were used. In all the planning for this year's Annual Meeting the incorrect dates were used.

I was made aware of this early this month. I went to Mike Moore, the Moderator, and discussed it with him. He and I agreed that the Association should proceed with the announced dates and take this action to make our meeting legal.

The motion CARRIED.

4. The Reverend Hardin Nicholson, pastor of the Balsam Church, gave the Devotional.

5. Harry Vance directed the singing of a hymn.

6. The *Book of Reports* was presented for adoption for information. John Reid requested a correction to paragraph 15 of his report. He read the corrected version to the assembly. (See Report)

The *Book of Reports* was adopted with this correction.

7. The Moderator recognized pastors new to the Association this year: Ray Barnhill, Buff Creek; Charles Brown, Rockdale; Joe Yelton, Cullowhee; Lewis Smith, Cashiers; David Mull, Lumberton; Alexander Pasetti, New Savannah; Billy Stiles, Long Branch; and Carrol Ensley, Big Ridge.

8. John Reid, Director of Missions, recognized all past Moderators present: Robert Blanton and John Hyatt. He expressed THANKS to both the Moderators and to the messengers and the Clerk for their work and support.

He then gave his message to the Association.

9. In the absence of the Chairman of the Constitution Committee, Mike Farmer distributed copies of the proposed Constitutional Amendments, requesting that the messengers study them and be ready to vote at the next session.

10. J. D. Griffin, pastor of Ochre Hill Church, reported on the work of the General Board. (See Report)

11. Harry Vance led in the singing of a hymn.

12. Winston Hardman, Director of the B.S.U. on the W.C.U. Campus, reported on the Campus Ministry.

13. Luther Osment, Western Area Director of Family Services, reported on the work and needs of the Children's Homes and allied ministries.

14. Calvin Knight, Church and Community Relations from the Baptist Hospital, brought the report on that institution.

15. Richard Robertson reported on the progress of work at Truett Camp and on the new dining hall. He commended the W.M.U. for their support.

14. Jack Hinson, Chaplain at the C. J. Harris Hospital, reported on the need for and work being done there.

15. Arthur Stephens brought a report from the Gideons and announced a Pastors and Wives' Appreciation Day on September 20 at 6:30 p.m. at the Holiday Inn in Cherokee.

16. "Leaning On The Everlasting Arms" was directed by Harry Vance.

17. Bobby Stafford gave the report on the Baptist State Convention.

18. Annie Hoyle presented the Digest of Letters.

19. A note burning ceremony was presented, led by the Moderator, commemorating the removal of the debt on the Baptist Center.

Participants were: Mike Moore, Moderator; Dean Coward, Treasurer; Kenneth Crawford, General Overseer; Harry Vance, Treasurer at the time the Baptist Center was started; John Reid, Director of Missions; and Conrad Burrell, Chairman of the Building Committee.

20. The Reverend Abe Brooks, pastor of the Balsam Grove Baptist Church, delivered the message for the session. He used scripture from Proverbs 29:18 and Isaiah 6:78.

FRIDAY, AUGUST 22, 1986

21. The second session of the Annual Meeting was hosted by the Rockdale Baptist Church which served a delicious supper at 5:00 p.m. which was enjoyed by over 200 messengers and visitors.

22. The session convened at 6:00 p.m. with Mike Moore as Moderator.

23. Devotions were brought by the Reverend Charles Brown, pastor of the church.

24. Harry Vance led the group in the singing of "Victory in Jesus."

25. In the absence of the Sunday School Director, Frankie Harris presented the Sunday School Report.

26. John Reid, in the absence of the Church Training Director, presented the report and announced the "M" Night program is to be held on November 24 with Dr. Roy Edgemon from Southern Baptist Convention as the speaker.

27. Mildred Cowan gave the W.M.U. Report. She announced the Workshop for September 7 at the Lovedale Baptist Church.

28. Johnny Watson reported two new Brotherhood organizations.

29. Haven Ensley reviewed the meetings of the Deacons, Pastors, Wives' Fellowship Meetings for the year and announced the October meeting to be held at the New Hope Baptist Church.

30. Nancy Sherrill, reporting for the V.B.S., stated that 18 churches were represented by 64 people at the Associational clinic.

31. Harry Vance reviewed the work of the Music Committee and shared some of the events planned for the coming year; namely, a music school where Seminary Extension credit could be earned in the areas of piano, organ and auto harp.

32. Joe Medford presented and explained changes in the proposed Budget for 1986-1987. She made a motion that the budget as presented be adopted. The motion CARRIED. She urged each church to give \$125 more next year in order that the budget might be met.

33. The Time, Place and Preacher Committee, chaired by Hardin Nicholson, announced that the Association would meet at the Zion Hill Church with Scott Bortz as preacher and at the Lovedale Baptist Church for the second session with Lewis Smith as preacher. (Dates were withheld pending a change in the Constitution.)

34. The Nominating Committee Report, presented by Roy Burnett, was adopted with the addition of Frankie Harris as V.B.S. Director; Tony McCall as Baptist Children's Homes Representative and Linda Turrentine as Christian Education Representative.

35. The Committee on Committees added the following before adoption of their report: Glenn Blanton, Building Committee; Ronnie Henderson, Constitution Committee; Kent Lowdermilk, Evangelism; Lewis Smith, Chairman of Evangelism Committee; Joe Pressley, Chairman of Finance Committee; Ray McCall, Finance Committee; Billy Ray Bryson, Nominating Committee; and Harold McMahan, Time, Place and Preacher Committee. A music committee is to be added.

36. Constitutional changes made are indicated with an * in the Constitution.

37. Scott Bortz reported on the work of the Missions Committee. Plans are for a Resort Ministry; ministry to the B.S.U. and a booth at a flea market for Christian Literature distribution. He reported a rating of GOOD for the Director of Missions from the churches in the Association.

38. The Memorial was presented by Audrey Greene and Eloise Shuler. Seventy-six deceased members of the Association were recognized and honored.

39. John Reid made a motion that "The Tuckaseegee Baptist Association establish a committee to draft a statement providing a definition of the infallibility of the Word of God and to discuss other issues that affect us. I further move that this committee bring its report to the Executive Committee in January 1987 and also to the Annual Session in 1987.

40. John Bunn requested that a session of the Annual Meeting be held at the Sylva First Baptist Church in 1988.

41. Earl Holden presented three resolutions from the Resolutions Committee. (See Report)

42. Dennis Burrell, Chairman of the Evangelism Committee, urged unity and soul winning for Christ. He reported the Watchcare status of the Cullowhee Valley Church.

42. Dennis Burrell, pastor of the Johns Creek Baptist Church, brought the message using as a text 2 Chronicles 7:14.

1986 Director of Missions Report

It is my privilege to serve the churches of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association as Director of Missions. I have enjoyed my visits to the churches. I am grateful for the opportunities to preach, to teach, and to serve in other ways in the life of the local church. I serve you with a sense of God's call in my life.

As your Associational Missionary, my tasks are many and varied. Foremost among my op-

portunities to serve you is the preaching ministry. Often I am called upon to serve in a supply capacity. The thrust of my preaching is to encourage and challenge the local church to be an evangelistic and mission-minded church. Often I am called upon to teach the Sunday School Lesson since I also do this weekly on the radio program.

One great challenge of mine is in the planning and coordinating of associational programs. With so many churches and people involved, it is a challenge to maintain the necessary communication for associational action, activities and working relationships.

Overall some very positive things happened last year. In September of 1985, 22 churches participated in a World Missions' Conference. This was the most successful event since I have been in the association. Enthusiasm was high as churches learned from a very practical standpoint from missionaries serving on the field about the values of Baptist Cooperation. We had missionaries from Thailand, Africa, Europe, South America, Texas, Georgia, and North Carolina.

We had ten churches to participate in the "Good News America" Campaign. While all did not schedule their revivals during the suggested week, the reports from revivals were good.

I was pleased with the Youth Week concert by Kay DeKalb Smith. Three churches took their youth to the Evangelism Rally in Greensboro and then on to Carrowinds for a day. This is the most participation in this event for us and I look for more churches to get involved.

The Key Leadership Conference was not as well attended last year as in years past. I hope that local leaders will see the need and the values of training so they can be more effective in their local church.

God continues to bless the radio program. Even though at one point I stopped using budget funds to help pay for the radio program, I was still able to finance the program. Please pray for God's leadership and provision in this area of my work. I am grateful to you for the support and prayers I received.

I helped in two World Mission Conferences this past year, in the Liberty Association and in the Theron Rankin Association. I preached in a "Good News America" revival in Oconnee County, South Carolina in the spring. I taught the January Bible Study in our association.

Our association won second place in the religious division of the Sylva Christmas Parade. Several churches entered in the parade and I commend you for this.

It was my joy to help with the installation of officers at the Annual W.M.U. meeting. I commend the women of our association for the fine work they do and the leadership they give us. Thus far they have led our association to give over \$2,000 to build a dining room for Truett Camp.

On several occasions I have served as a consultant with churches and pastors. I have worked with pulpit committees, counseled with pastors and churches in crisis situations, offered advice concerning programs and procedures, and answered questions about denominational programs and emphases.

I have attended the General Board meetings and the Convention Staff and Director of Missions meetings. I have attended several area and State Director of Missions meetings. I was elected Second Vice President of our State Directors of Missions Conference and currently am serving as First Vice President due to the resignation of our State President. I attended the annual meeting of our National Director of Missions Conference and the Southern Baptist Convention meeting in Atlanta.

In March of this year the Finance Committee sent out a letter requesting both immediate and long-term financial assistance. I commend many of you for your response to our immediate financial woes. Also, I am grateful to the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina for significant assistance. All churches are being asked to increase giving next year by \$125 to meet our budget.

It is a concern to all of us when we do not receive enough financial support to meet our budget needs. Individual churches can certainly identify with this problem as they experience similar problems themselves. A spirit of cooperation is encouraged on the part of all of the churches in the total work of the association in order to minister effectively. When churches work together and support the association, all of them feel a vital part of the ministry. In fact,

it is only by working together that each church can feel that they play an important role in the ministry of the association.

Our future lies in our ability to solve our problems in a way that is pleasing to God and that is mutually satisfactory. We must recognize that partisanship has no place in the family of God.

Our witness has been hurt because of the problems in the Southern Baptist Convention and their local expressions here in our own association. It is my prayer that we will accept each other with the understanding that there always has been and always will be differences in the interpretation of the Bible. In the past we have always agreed to work cooperatively to reach the world for Christ. Cooperation has enabled Southern Baptists to sponsor children's homes, homes for the aging, perform a variety of ministries in our state and send missionaries to 106 countries and to all 50 states. Lack of cooperation will cause this work to be destroyed. One of the most damaging is being judgmental.

We must be determined to reach every lost person in Jackson County with the message of Jesus Christ. We must be credible in our witness. We must grow strong churches who shape the lives of the people for the Glory of God. May God, Himself, help us to do this.

Credentials Committee Report

The Credentials Committee received a request from the Executive Board at the October 1985 meeting to meet with the Balsam Baptist Church at the church's invitation to attempt to solve the existing problem.

The Balsam Church was withholding financial support from the association. This intent had been previously published in the *Sylva Herald*, a local newspaper. The reason for withholding financial support was that an amendment prepared by the Balsam Church was voted down at the annual meeting of the association in August 1985. The second amendment had been prepared by S. J. Waters. The amendments dealt with issues: 1. the infallibility of the Bible and 2. the number of messengers that should be allowed from each church. The Balsam Church requested that no person be permitted to hold an office in the association unless they established his/her belief concerning the Bible and that no church should be permitted to have more than five messengers to represent the church at the annual meeting. When this report was presented to the Executive Committee on January 6, 1986, the chairman, Ben Cabe, made a motion that the request of the Balsam Baptist Church be placed on the agenda at the annual meeting in August 1986. The motion was seconded and PASSED.

This was the only activity of the Credentials Committee for the year 1985-1986.

Stewardship Report

My *Bible* tells me that as Christians we are to teach the Word to non-Christians in all nations. (St. Matthew 28:19-20) This includes all the world and our associational area here in North Carolina. It further tells me that this work should be funded through the giving of offerings by Christians and therefore the churches of our association. (Leviticus 27:30 and Luke 20:22-25) Christ came to fulfill the covenant, not to ignore it.

A recent statistical study based on the giving record of the churches in our association discloses that as Christians we are not living up to our commitment. A summary of the study findings is reflected below:

The record of our churches over the past two and one-half years shows the following pattern:

- (21) Twenty-one churches increased their giving.
- (7) Seven churches remained at the same level of giving.
- (13) Thirteen churches recorded a slight decrease in giving.
- (8) Eight churches gave no financial support to the association during this period.

The *Bible* as the inspired Word of God lays this task clearly at our feet. While reasonable men might at time differ on some interpretation, our responsibility is clear. There is no justification for not supporting God's work. The *Bible*, in *Acts* 5:1-10, reveals the fate of those who would withhold funds from God for any reason. While the penalty may not always be as severe as that levied on Ananias and Sapphira, the message from God is imperative - you pay him now or you may have to pay later in unexpected ways!!

Baptist Children's Homes Report

The centennial year for the Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina was concluded with an exciting, informative and inspiring day on November 11, 1985. The exciting words of Dr. Blackwell, in behalf of our staff, children and trustees, renewed the commitment to continue fulfilling the mission and broad purpose of this child care ministry. Those words still ring in the ears of those present for this occasion.

The mission is to care for dependent, neglected, homeless and troubled children; unwed mothers and their children; and the rendering of related services to the relatives. Services are directed toward the preservation, conservation and rehabilitation of families to avoid, wherever possible, the placement of the child away from home.

In our one hundred and first year of child care, more than 1,500 children were served. From this group of children youth had no religious affiliation when admitted to our care. Our pastors baptized more than 25 youth into the fellowship of the local church.

The New Homes and Hospital offering, approved by the convention last November, claimed the attention of our staff during the first five months of 1986. The offering was received in May with 50 percent of that received going to the Children's Homes, 25 percent to the Hospital and 25 percent to the Retirement Homes. The goal was \$1.6 million. We encourage you to help promote the new offering in your church during May 1987.

UPDATE WESTERN AREA:

The happy news from the west is that construction has begun on the Moody Farm cottage located in the Iotla Valley of Macon County.

Mary Lewis and Gary Bruin, experienced child care workers on the Mills Home staff for nine years, have accepted the responsibility of giving leadership as directors of the Moody Farm Ministries.

Special appreciation is expressed to our western area child care and social workers who serve so faithfully at our Maternity Home in Asheville, the Thermal Belt Youth Shelter in Forest City and the Broyhill Home in Clyde/Waynesville.

These facilities have operated at near capacity throughout the year. The children served have mostly been those who call for extra measures of strength, wisdom and love. The words "Care Finds a Way" truly apply to these wonderful servants of our Lord.

North Carolina is a recognized leader in Christian higher education. Baptists have established and supported seven colleges for a cumulative total of 786 years. Leaders who formed the Baptist State Convention in 1830 did so with founding a college in mind. Baptists and their colleges have grown up together in North Carolina. The histories of the convention, the churches and the colleges are inseparably intertwined.

The "roll call" of colleges, and a brief mention of current items of interest and concern, are listed for the benefit of the associations:

Campbell - During 1986 there is a special observance of the centennial year, using as a theme "A Century of Vision and Service." The new School of Pharmacy will open in the fall, and a School of Education has been established for graduate studies. Programs are offered in Golds-

boro, Rocky Mount, Raleigh, Fort Bragg, Sanford, and in Wales and Malaysia.

Chowan - Enjoys a national reputation as a two year institution of high quality. President Bruce E. Whitaker was recently named as one of the 17 most effective chief college administrators in the nation. Chowan is engaged in a four million dollar campaign for additional student aid, scholarship assistance and program support.

Gardner-Webb - On May 31, 1986, Dr. Craven E. Williams completed his tenure as president begun in July 1976. On June 1 Dr. M. Christopher White, vice president of Elon College, became the 10th president of Gardner-Webb. Included in its many educational programs are assistance for deaf and blind students who wish to earn a college degree.

Mars Hill - A comprehensive revision of the General Studies curriculum, to be implemented in the fall of 1987, includes statements of convictions by the faculty. Included in these are the centrality of Christian faith, morals and purposeful life, responsible citizenship and the value of work. Scholarships to attract superior students continue to be a major emphasis.

Meredith - "Thorough instruction" and "culture made perfect through the religion of Jesus Christ" are central to the college mission. Extensive studies during 1986 resulted in a reaffirmation of Meredith's commitment to education for women in both undergraduate and graduate programs. Construction of the Gaddy-Hamrick Art Center was begun in June.

Wake Forest - Conversations continue between convention leaders and university trustees to clarify the basis for a continuing relationship. Founded in 1834 by North Carolina Baptists, Wake Forest is acknowledged as a superior university among church-related schools in the nation.

Wingate - Looking toward its 100th anniversary in 1995, the college has entered a 10-year, 30 million dollar "Second Century: Vision for Excellence" campaign. Numerous building, renovation and beautification projects are planned, in addition to library expansion, faculty support and student financial aid.

BAPTIST STUDENTS AND BAPTIST COLLEGES BELONG TOGETHER

North Carolina Baptist Foundation, Inc. Report

The purpose and objective of the Baptist Foundation has been, from the date of its incorporation and by the terms of its charter, to assist individual Baptists to find ways of continuing their support of all Baptist causes - institutions, agencies, mission causes - with estate and deferred gifts. As a result, trust funds are now administered which benefit local churches, associations, specific mission objectives and offerings, and every agency, school, and institution supported by Baptists.

In 1985 North Carolina Baptists placed over one million dollars in new trust agreements with the Foundation, making provision for the perpetual support of practically every Baptist cause. Endowment of the Cooperative Program was a primary trust designation.

It is now possible through the Foundation for each Baptist to "Give it Twice," once to family, then to Kingdom causes. Through properly constructed trusts and wills, family members and friends can receive from one's estate, over a period of years, an amount exactly equal to, or even greater than the estate portion they would normally receive through an ordinary estate distribution. With the "Give it Twice" plan, after the family receives their portion, the entire estate principal is still intact, with the income from the entire estate available for Christian causes - forever. If giving is exciting for the Christian, giving it twice is surely twice as exciting!

An indirect but profound benefit of Foundation services to the local church has been the enhancement of individual stewardship growth and commitment. In nearly every instance, those who elect to commit to Kingdom use a portion of their estate assets are during their

lifetime more committed stewards. They *enjoy* their giving, and this happy, conscious stewardship dedication must be a profit for the church.

The Foundation seeks to inform Baptist people of:

1. Their responsibility as stewards to make provision for the future use of their resources.
2. The critical need experienced by all Baptist causes for endowment support - the ongoing, assured support of those who support them now.
3. Ways by which these realities may be met and accomplished.
4. Counsel in wise decisions for endowing *any* Baptist cause - for instance, the Foundation may discourage a trust for a cemetery fund if the church already receives more funds than are needed to maintain that cemetery.

Baptist Retirement Homes Report

In recognition of the increased proportion of adults now 65 or older, the Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina, Inc. has sought to create a broader awareness of its services across the state. Implementing state-of-the-art communication techniques through use of the *Biblical Recorder*, local newspapers and direct contacts, the Homes is effectively making itself known to greater numbers of senior adults and to a concerned and responsive denominational community.

The leadership of the Baptist Retirement Homes is addressing major changes which suggest a need for an adjustment of services. The sheer size of the senior adult population in the next decade is expected to require a significant expansion of existing services. Already consideration is being given to the construction of Continuing Care Communities in Asheville and Charlotte and to the renovation of the campus in Winston-Salem.

With extended longevity, the Baptist Retirement Homes anticipate ministering to senior adults who will live longer and healthier lives. More choices need to be available to these individuals as they experience added years of activity. Planning has begun to move beyond the standard services now available to consider additional possibilities such as home delivery of health services.

While the past year has brought a forward look at the direction of retirement care, attention has also been directed toward improvement of existing services. The following facts and figures highlight the achievements of the Baptist Retirement Homes from August 1985 through June 1986:

- Sound financial management again eliminated the need to increase residential fees.
- Over \$900,000 of benevolent care was provided to residents.
- Of a projected 3.4 million dollar budget, the Cooperative Program and Homes and Hospital Offering provided \$785,000.
- Over 40 new residents were admitted to the Homes and Nursing Care.
- Construction and renovation of seven new housing units were completed in Willow Cove on the Winston-Salem campus.
- Bill Stillerman became the new President of the Homes.
- Jack Hoyle was appointed Vice President in Charge of Administration.
- Carolyn Bunting was appointed Assistant to the President for Admissions.
- Jim Saul was appointed Assistant to the President for Personnel.
- Don Peiffer was appointed Assistant to the President for Business Affairs.
- A video tape, "Not An Ordinary Person," produced by the Homes in 1985, won the M. E. Dodd Award for Video and Film Productions.
- Residential and apartment living remain available. Requests should be made through the Assistant to the President for Admissions.

Under the focused and energetic leadership of Bill Stillerman, president of the Homes since November 1985, the fine tradition initiated by past presidents will continue. Yet, the trustees and administrative staff of the Baptist Retirement Homes believe the participation of North Carolina Baptists to be critical for the successful growth of the Homes. By remaining sensitive to retirement care issues and by staying informed and supportive of services offered by the

Retirement Homes, North Carolina Baptists can help assure a system of services adequate to the growing demand.

In a year that has been marked by tragedy, stress and disappointment, the people of God who call themselves North Carolina Baptists continue to witness and minister to our ever growing and changing state. The *Biblical Recorder* is a vital part of the Baptist family and as the official newsjournal of the denomination, it has enjoyed a stable and wholesome year of ministry at the side of hundreds of thousands of our people.

Readership of the paper is high. Comments, letters and other communications with the *Recorder* indicate Baptists read the paper and depend upon it for correct and vital information about the work we do together. That was the purpose of the paper when it was founded in 1833 and it remains a more important ministry now than even then.

Tar Heel Baptists are on the threshold of the greatest opportunity we have ever been given by God for witness and ministry in our state. That does not mean it will be easy. The minority status of Christians—fewer persons in North Carolina are members of any church than are not—and the rising spirit of secularism make our task more difficult, but at the same time much more imperative than ever. We must not fail.

Well-informed Baptists are more effective Baptists. The *Recorder* welcomes its assignment in the task of sharing the Good News of Christ. This year, we had a tremendous opportunity through the "Good News America, God Loves You" revivals and the paper was on the job, promoting and reporting on the crusades. As always, the *Recorder* will seek to inform, indoctrinate, enlist, inspire and provide a forum for Baptist thought and action as we work together to achieve God's purpose for us.

Despite a tremendous increase (\$96,000) in the cost of second-class postage during 1986, *subscription rates will not be raised for the fifth consecutive year*. Many of the other major state Baptist papers such as the *Recorder* have already found it necessary to raise their rates, but the directors of our paper have been working with the editor to find a way to avoid any increase so that our churches and individuals can continue to get the paper at the lowest possible cost.

The rates are: Church Budget Plan, \$5.00 per subscription for every resident family; Club Plan (four or more), \$6.00; and Individuals, \$7.00. If your church does not have the Every Family Plan, special introductory offers are available. Please contact:

During the 1985 school year students in Baptist Student Unions and on Baptist campuses

pledged and raised nearly \$50,000 for missions and ministries all around the world. A total of 150 students are working in the state this summer as summer missionaries; six students from Western are working in this state or with the Home Mission Board.

Special conferences for international students, campus evangelism training, high school seniors, Caraway leadership events and a fall Baptist Student Convention involved over a thousand young people in Christian growth and challenge to stewardship of life.

Teams of students from B.S.U.'s all across the state led worship, youth revivals, sang or ministered in hundreds of North Carolina churches. Students under the leadership of ministers employed by your Cooperative Program dollars are growing and sharing their faith because you care enough to provide Baptist Campus Ministry!

1986 Christian Action League Report

If Christianity is authentic, then it must be reflected in the daily walk of the followers of Jesus Christ.

Helping Christians to apply the moral demands of the Good News of Jesus Christ remains the top priority of the Christian Action League.

There is much to rejoice about what has occurred in the last 12 months, but it is also a time to renew our efforts for new battles on the horizon.

I. OBSCENITY: The state's new Comprehensive Obscenity and Child Protection Act has been met with unusual success. Some 12 months ago, law enforcement officials stated that North Carolina had some 750 hard core porno outlets making our state the nation's "smut" capital. Today, only about 150 remain in operation, and most of these are facing porno charges with court cases pending.

For all practical purposes, convenience stores and other retail establishments have removed sexually oriented publications such as PLAYBOY, HUSTLER, PENTHOUSE, ETC. Others have placed the material behind the counter or behind "blinder" racks where they are not accessible to minors.

Video stores have cleaned their shelves of sexual explicit materials rather than face prosecution.

Cable porno programs like the Playboy Channel have been discontinued in communities such as Hickory, Raleigh, Chapel Hill, Durham, etc.

Indictments have been brought against ADAM & EVE - the largest porno distributor in the Southeast, located in Orange County.

The battle is not over for the cause of decency. The pornography industry and its sympathizers are already raising funds and seeking to build support to get our state's new obscenity law "watered down" in the 1987 legislature.

II. ALCOHOL (Liquor-Beer-Wine): The League remains the only organization in North Carolina providing assistance to communities involved in citing our number one addicting drug. Referendums have been defeated in the following areas:

1. Scotland County defeated liquor-by-the-drink;
2. Black Mountain defeated liquor-by-the-drink;
3. Concord defeated liquor-by-the-drink;
4. Manteo defeated liquor-by-the-drink;
5. Rowan County defeated liquor-by-the-drink;
6. Wayne County defeated liquor-by-the-drink;
7. Pasquotank County defeated liquor-by-the-drink;
8. Old Fort defeated beer-wine sales; and
9. King defeated an ABC liquor store vote.

These victories were the result of strong, aggressive leadership on the part of caring people.

III. GAMBLING: In 1987 the church will probably face its strongest challenge yet from the gambling industry.

Pro-lottery forces have already stated that they will be back before the 1987 legislature with an all-out effort to secure a statewide lottery.

Pari-mutuel gambling forces have now come on the scene. A statewide organization operating under the name CAROLINA SPORTS ASSOCIATION, with offices in High Point, are pushing this cause. Rufus Edmisten, the state's former Attorney-General, has been employed by the gambling forces to assist in their drive for pari-mutuel gambling. This group is publishing a newspaper, *Sporting Journal*, that is being sent to key business and industrial leaders throughout North Carolina to enlist supporters. Fundraising efforts are also underway. A speaker's bureau has been formed providing programs for civic and community groups on behalf of the gambling cause.

Christian Life Commission Report

The Christian Life Commission is grateful for another year marked by significant gains in several areas of its ministry on behalf of Southern Baptists. A wide range of program activities have helped Baptists practice Christian ethics in family life, race relations, citizenship, daily work, and numerous moral concerns. The agency has had many opportunities to work with other Southern Baptist agencies, thereby increasing its usefulness to Southern Baptist churches and people.

A close and effective working relationship has been maintained with Christian Life Committees in associations and in local churches. Christian Life Committees in churches now number a record 1,525. Working relationships with state Baptist conventions have been strengthened. This includes state conventions with full-time workers with state Christian Life Commissions (or the equivalent) and others with active Christian Life Committees without full-time workers.

The Commission has provided support materials for special emphasis days related to ethics on the Southern Baptist calendar. Bible-based themes, articles and artwork accompany the copy related to sanctity of human life, race relations, Christian citizenship, peace with justice, and world hunger.

A national seminar dealt with "Applying the Gospel in the Local Church" in 1985 and on "Recovering Moral Values" in 1986. Other conferences related to applied Christianity dealt with topics such as moral problems and youth, gambling, hunger, apartheid, and peace with justice while still other conferences focused on training and strategy.

The cause of applied Christianity was expanded through the production and distribution of literature, study guides, audio and videotapes, and other resources. A new "Help for Families" series included four new videotapes and 15 new or updated pamphlets. The new videotapes deal with pornography, divorce, television, and changing roles in marriage.

The Christian Life Commission has the primary responsibility for education and action related to hunger. Wide distribution of the 1985-1986 *Hunger Awareness/Action Guide* helped Southern Baptists to reach a new high in their gifts for hunger relief. Hunger gifts for 1985 totaled \$11,830,146. The Foreign Mission Board received \$10,625,897 for hunger ministries abroad and \$1,204,249 went to the Home Mission Board for domestic hunger.

The Commission's primary publication in support of applied Christianity is *Light*. During the past year circulation topped 18,000 and there has been exceptionally good response and support from a wide cross section of *Light* readers.

In reviewing the past year, the Christian Life Commission is encouraged and faces the future with faith, hope, and renewed commitment.

General Board Report

I was elected to the General Board at its January meeting, which was held at the Caraway Conference Center, to fill the unexpired term of Brother Everett Wilson, who moved away.

My first meeting with the General Board was at Wake Forest University in May. My committee assignment is that of "Christian Life and Public Affairs," which is the committee that attempts to lead us in the implementation of the Christian faith in the all important task of Christian citizenship.

There were two very important considerations to come before our committee, and which were passed by the General Board and I believe are of interest to our churches. They are 1. nuclear dump sites; 2. involvement of churches in political campaigns.

Just a few words concerning recommendation number one - nuclear dump sites - "Therefore the Council on Christian Life and Public Affairs meeting at Wake Forest University on May 27, 1986, expresses its opposition to the placement of a high level repository in North Carolina and, in more general terms, to the use of burial as a solution to the problem of high level nuclear waste, etc."

Recommendation number two - regarding the involvement of churches in political campaigns - churches should not advocate endorsing political parties or candidates, Those who do jeopardize their tax exempt status. I thought that the information would be of value to our churches.

I stand on the shoulders of my friend, the Reverend Frank Anderson, who retired last fall after 10 years as Hospital Chaplain. The Jackson County Ministerial Association made him Chaplain Emeritus. They also honored Brother Dan Ward for his insight, interest, and support of the Chaplaincy Committee. Sincere appreciation is expressed to Brother Charles Ginn who served as interim Chaplain from October to December 1985.

We have a new chapel, and a Chaplain's office located on the first floor, across the hall from the former chapel. Thanks to the trustees, administration, and everyone who had a part in making the decision to expand our facilities. They are being used effectively to help people communicate with the Lord in time of crisis and stress.

A grant from Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Hennessee provides two-thirds of the budget. The other one-third comes from churches and individuals throughout Jackson County.

This means we can offer training to pastors on visiting the sick, dealing with death and a host of other related topics. The first training course will begin in September 1986. The class is limited to 10 participants, but we will allow the 11 persons who have requested participation to remain.

The first class will form the basis of our Chaplain associate program and will provide 24 hour chaplaincy coverage for our hospital. Thanks to Charlie and Bess Steward for their gifts to cover expenses of our beginning course in pastoral care.

Call on me to share the chaplaincy story at your church, Bible School, Wednesday evening, W.M.U., Baptist Men's, or whatever occasion you choose.

Thank you for the opportunity to serve. Please continue to undergird the Lord's mission work at our own local hospital with your prayers, good wishes and finances. We need your help.

Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary Report

In its 78th year, Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary is preparing 5,070 men and women for ministry, while planning for the needs of the 1990s.

Southwestern, the largest seminary in the world, is this year training 4,071 men and 999 women in schools of theology, religious education and church music. While 4,427 of those students study on the main campus, another 643 train at Southwestern's three off-campus centers and Spanish-language component.

Currently, students study under 202 faculty members, including 102 full-time teachers and 100 supplementary instructors. New faculty additions include Dan Clement, instructor of psychology and counseling; Dan Crawford, assistant professor of evangelism and missions/director of evangelism and missions practica; Douglas Dickens, assistant professor of pastoral ministry; James Heflin, associate professor of preaching; David Robinson, assistant professor of voice; James Walter, associate professor of adult education.

This year, the Cooperative Program provided \$7 million of Southwestern's \$16.9 million budget. The cooperative Program and donors who gave above the tithe continued to make quality theological education available for a fraction of the cost non-Southern Baptist schools charge.

Needs of the future are being met through Upward 90, Southwestern's five-year strategic plan for ministry in the 1990s. Goals currently being met include extensive computerization of

faculty and staff offices, renovation of classroom space, energy conservation installations, increasing endowment, curriculum evaluation and expansion of the public affairs and student affairs divisions.

Upward 90, a \$50 million project, calls for enhancing every area of seminary life. By 1990 four buildings will have been renovated and a conference center constructed, academic programs will be better related to current needs of churches, and personal student development will be heightened.

Additional accomplishments of the past year include:

- beginning the Chair of Prayer and Spiritual Formation;
- adding a doctoral major in evangelism;
- designing 28 new courses;
- conducting 47 continuing education courses;
- expanding the Southwestern Journal of Theology to three issues per year;
- naming James Bensen dean of academic affairs at Hispanic Baptist Seminary;
- welcoming more than 3,000 alumni and guests to the seminary's second-ever homecoming;
- sponsoring eight missions awareness events with more than 1,000 participants;
- involving 240 students in Operation Penetration, a week-long evangelistic effort during spring break.

Truett Camp Report

Our Music Week will be led by J. Gilbert this year and we are looking forward to a successful week as we had last year. This is a good week for our boys and girls throughout the region.

Our R.A. Camp will be led by Johnny Forrister and we are hoping for better attendance this year than last.

Pray with us in the matter of interest rising in the region for our R.A. weeks ahead.

We wish to thank this association and all the churches in Region 10 for their continued prayers and support for Truett Baptist Camp.

This is your camp and our prayer is that we will continue to minister to the needs of all our people in the days ahead.
