SECOND DAY.

MORNING SESSION, Oct. 4, 1882.

In the absence of the Moderator, Elder W. M. Kennedy called the Association to order.

Minutes of yesterday read and approved.

On motion of Elder J. B. Taylor, a committee was ap-

pointed on the work of the Homè Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. Committee: Elders C. C. Newton and F. H. Ivey.

On motion, the order of business was suspended, and the report on Foreign Missions was read. After remarks by Elders Mitchell and Taylor, the report was adopted.

REPORT ON FOREIGN' MISSIONS.

The Board of Foreign Missions of the Southern Baptist Convention have now 61 missionaries. Of these, there are in China 16 American missionaries, and 19 native assistant pastors and Bible women. In Africa, 5 missionaries and 3 native assistants. In Italy, 4 American and 10 Italian missionaries. In Brazil, 3 missionaries. In Mexico, 2 missionaries. The membership in Italy is 175; in Africa, 92; in China, 472; in Mexico, 200; in Brazil, 42. Total, 981. When we remember our Lord's last command, and the debt of love we owe to

him, and when we contemplate the spiritual condition of millions of our race; when we remember how God has smiled upon the Foreign missionary enterprise, and how He has blessed the churches which have engaged in it, we shall surely feel that Southern Baptists ought to do much more than they are doing. Let us of the Eastern Association see that we are faithful to the obligations resting upon us. Let onr pastors keep before their churches the duty and privilege of sending the Gospel to the heathen. Let our churches encourage the monthly concert of prayer for missions; the circulation of the Foreign Mission *Journal*, and the mite box system of collecting funds. Boxes can be had by applying to Brother H. A. Tupper, Richmond, Va.

Elder J. L. Stewart then preached the Missionary Sermon, from Mat. 28: 19, 20.

The Association was called to order by the Moderator at 2 o'clock. Singing.

The report of the Executive Committee was again taken up, and further discussed by L. R. Carroll, and J. B. Taylor.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Shortly after the last session of your body, Bro. E. F. Cox tendered his resignation as a member of the committee; so that we have had only six members in active service during the year.

Missionaries employed by the committee during the year. Elders T. J. Leary, W. B. Knight, and C. S. Cashwell.

THE WORK DONE.

Bro. Leary has labored at Woodville, Enon, Rose Hill, and Piney Grove, Jones. He reports ten baptisms and accessions by letter. He has made many visits, and attended Prayer Meetings and Sunday School lectures, and in various ways served the Master's cause, with great satisfaction to his brethren, and with good results to the cause of Christ.

Elder W. B. Knight has been sustained by the joint efforts of the State Mission Board and the Executive Committee of our Association. He has labored at points within the bounds of the Old Pamlico Association. His labors have been greatly blessed. He reports 7 baptisms, one new house of worship built, and the prospects are bright for a glorious harvest.

Elder Cashwell has been laboring as general missionary of the Board. He has preached principally in the counties of Duplin, Onslow, Lenoir, Craven, Jones, and Carteret, and has baptized 39 persons, and assisted in meetings where 37 others have been baptized. He has organized one church, and has three new houses of worship in course of erection; has preached 175 sermons, and attended many prayer meetings, and visited many families; has secured 13 subscribers for the Recorder, and collected from his field \$217.87.

Bro. Cashwell has done a great work for Christ during the year, and reports the fields as wide and ripening for the harvest.

Dear brethren in Christ, the past year has been one of great joy to your committee. Our humble labors have been crowned with success, and God has blessed our efforts beyond our expectations. A greater work has been done this year within our bounds than at any other period during our missionary operations.

There is a demand for at least two missionaries in the field during the coming year. With profound gratitude to God for His blessings upon our humble labors, we submit our report for your consideration. W. M. KENNEDY, Chairman.

The report of the Sunday School Board was read. Remarks on the subject were made by J. B. Taylor and L. R. Carroll; and the report was adopted.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

Nothing has been accomplished during the year. The chairman made several ineffectual efforts to get the members of the Board together. Two of the members failed to attend at any meeting. The other members attended, but not together; so that no regular meeting was held. As a special committee has been raised by the Association on the subject of Sunday Schools, we do not feel that it is expected for us to make any report upon the general subject. We submit that it is deemed advisable to continue a Sunday School Board, and that it be composed of brethren who can and will give a part of their time to the work.

REPORT ON PERIODICALS.

At this day, it is useless to argue the utility and necessity of religious publications. It is an admitted fact that we cannot do without them.

We recommend to our people the Biblical Recorder, our State paper, which is eminently sound in doctrine, and is managed with ability and discretion. Also, Kind Words, our Sunday School paper, published at Macon, Ga., and the Foreign Mission Journal, published at Richmond, Va., both of which are exactly what are needed by our members upon these subjects. We recommend that our ministers, and the delegates to this Association, use their best efforts to put a copy of these publications, especially the Recorder, in every Baptist family in our bounds. We further recommend that each church be requested to send up in its statistics the number of copies of the Recorder taken by its members, and that the same be incorporated in our Minutes. I. N. A letter accompanying the Newbern church letter was referred to the Executive Committee.

The report on Ministerial Education was read, and remarks were made by Elder Mitchell. After which the report was adopted.

REPORT ON MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

Brethren: Your Committee are glad to report, that of the 145 students now at Wake Forest College, 27 are preparing themselves for the gospel ministry. Those dear brethren should have our sympathy and substantial aid. Under the increasing educational facilities of the age, our churches are growing

in intelligence and efficiency, as well as in numbers. The pulpit must at least keep pace with the pew in intellectual culture. The demand for an Educated Ministry is becoming more and more urgent among us every year.

While we would not forget the great good accomplished by our uneducated ministers in the past, but rather thank God that we owe much of our present properity and usefulness to their consecrated lives and labors, yet we feel that we should not only pray for more young men to preach the gospel, but also provide for them the highest degree of intellectual training practicable.

God has been pleased to call to the work of the ministry but few rich men. Those called to this work are generally the sons of poverty, who, for want of means, are unable to qualify themselves for their life-work. Hence the imperative necessity of helping, with our money as well as our sympathy, such young brethrea to prepare themselves for their calling.

Brethren, a great responsibility is laid upon us by the head of the church. The indications of Providence, the struggles of our young men in trying to prepare themselves for their work, the rapid growth of our denomination throughout the State, and the increasing prevalence of every form of error and infidelity, all call loudly upon us to bestir ourselves to greater activity in the cause of ministerial education. THIRD DAY.

MORNING SESSION, Oct. 5, 1882.

The Association met at 10 o'clock, Moderator in the Chair. The roll was called, and list of delegates corrected.

The Minutes of vesterday were read, corrected, and passed. Moved to reconsider the motion to adopt the report on Ministerial Education. Carried.

The report on Ministerial Education was then adopted.

The report on the work of the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention was presented, After remarks by C. C. Newton and J. B. Taylor, the report was adopted.

REPORT ON THE HOME MISSION BOARD.

The Home Mission Board, formely located at Marion, Ala., was, at the last Southern Baptist Convention, moved to Atlanta, Ga. From this change of place, and the appointment of a new Corresponding Secretary, Dr. I. T. Tichenor, whose entire time will be given to this work, we may expect the Board to start out on a career of usefulness that will excel even the grand work already done.

The field of operations of the Home Board is very extensive, embracing the South, West, Indian Territory, California, and the great South West.

This Board does not supplant, or do the work of State Boards, but appoints missionaries in States where the destitution is greatest. The Board now has 38 missionaries in the field: 5 in Ala., 2 in Ark., 2 in Cal.,

13 in Fla., 2 in La., 1 in N. C., 1 in Ten., 2 in Tex., 1 in Va., and 6 in the Indian Territory.

The three most important points of the Home Mission work are:

1st, New Orleans. Dr. Landrum is laboring in that city. His church, Coliseum Place, has been burdened, and his work hindered, by a \$5,000 debt, which will soon be paid.

2d, among the Chinese in California, where Dr. Hartwell is meeting with encouraging success. It is a fact well known that the Chinese will never settle permanently in this country. Let us give them the gospel, and set their hearts on fire with love to Jesus, so that when they return they will spread the leaven of truth among the 400,000,000 of their countrymen.

3d, among the Indians in the Indian Territory. It was once thought that the Indian could not be civilized; but now this thought is forever exploded. There is no minister among us whose labors have been so abundantly blessed as those of Dr. Buckner among the Indians. The Levering mission school is also doing a grand work.

Here are the heathen at our own door. We can preach the gospel to all nations, and stay at home. God has given the people of this land a grand opportunity of doing something for his glory. Will we improve it? F. H. IVEY.

The committee on Sunday Schools reported; and the report was discussed by L. R. Carroll, Dr. Mitchell, and S. E. Loftin.

It was moved to amend the report, by providing for the appointment of a Sunday School Board, who shall have supervision of all matters pertaining to Sunday Schools, and shall report in full to the Association. The amendment was adopted.

The report as amended was passed.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

The committee on Sunday Schools, regret that they have not had time to examine the church letters, so as to enable them to make a correct report of the work now being done by our churches. We rejoice to state, however, that the outlook is very hopeful, and that this most important christian enterprise is gaining a firmer hold upon our people from year to year. We carnestly recommend that a Sunday School be organized in every church

within our bounds, where one does not already exist.

CHURCH COVENANT.

Having been led, as we believe by the Spirit of God, to receive the Lord Jesus Christ as our Saviour, and on the profession of our faith, having been baptized in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, we do now, in the presence of God, angels and this assembly, most solemnly and joyfully enter into covenant with one another, as one body in Christ.

We engage, therefore, by the aid of the Holy Ghost, to walk together in Christian love; to strive for the advancement of this church in knowledge, holiness and comfort; to promote its prosperity and spirituality; to sustain its worship, ordinances, discipline and doctrines; to contribute cheerfully and regularly to the support of the ministry, the expenses of the church, the relief of the poor, and the spread of the Gospel through all nations.

We also engage to maintain family and secret devotion ; to religiously educate our children ; to seek the salvation of our kindred and acquaintances ; to walk circumspectly in the world ; to be just in our dealings, faithful in our engagements, and exemplary in our deportment ; to avoid all tattling, back-biting and excessive anger ; to abstain from the sale and use of intoxicating drinks as a beverage; and to be zealous in our efforts to advance the Kingdom of our Saviour.

We further engage to watch over one another in brotherly love; to remember each other in prayer; to aid each other in sickness and distress; to cultivate Christain sympathy in feeling and courtesy in speech; to be slow to take offense, but always ready for reconciliation, and mindful of the rules of our Saviour, to secute it without delay.

We moreover engage that when we remove from this place we will as soon as possible unite with some other church, where we can carry out the spirit of this Covenant, and the principles of God's word.

RULES OF ORDER.

I. On the meeting of the Association, the Moderator of the preceding session shall preside until his successor is known. In case of his absence a chairman *pro* tem. shall be elected.

2. Each session of the Association shall be opened with religious exercises, to be conducted by whomsoever the presiding officer may name.

3. At each daily session, and previous to proceeding to business, the names of the delegates shall be called, and the proceedings of the previous daily session read.

4. The members shall observe toward the officers and each other that courtesy which becomes Christians.

5. Any member wishing to speak shall rise and address the presiding officer. He shall confine himself strictly to the question under consideration, and avoid personalities.

6. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without permission.

7. All motions seconded shall be definitely stated by the presiding officer before discussion.

8. No motion shall be withdrawn after discussion.

9. When a question is under discussion, no motion or proposition shall be received except to adjourn, to amend, to commit, or postpone to a definite time,

which several motions shall have preference in the order in which they are stated. IO. After a motion has been decided, any member having voted in the majority may move a reconsideration.

11. No member shall absent himself during the session of the Association without permission of the presiding officer, and no one shall take final leave of absence without the permission of the Association; and if any shall do so, their absence shall be noted in the minutes. 12. All questions, except such as relate to the Constitution, shall be decided by a majority of votes.

13. The Association shall have the right to decide what subjects shall be admitted to consideration.

14. The Rules of Order may be altered or amended at any session of the Association by a majority of votes.

CONSTITUTION OF THE EASTERN ASSOCIATION.

ARTICLE 1. This Association shall be denominated and known as the Eastern Association.

ART. 2. The object of this Association shall be the promotion of Christ's Kingdom among men; and the means of accomplishing this shall be in strict conformity to the New Testament.

ART. 3. This Association shall be composed of delegates chosen by the churches connected with it, each church being entitled to three delegates, who shall be members of that church.

ART. 4. The delegates from each church shall bear a letter certifying their appointment and communicating information relative to the state of the church; *Provided, however*, That when any church has prepared a letter and through inadvertence the letter fails to be presented, her delegates may be received without its presentation.

ART. 5. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer, who shall be chosen annually from among its members by ballot, by a majority of the members voting, and continue in office until their successors are elected.

ART. 6. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to enforce an observance of the Constitution, preserve order, appoint committees, decide all questions of order, give his opinion on any question under discussion after others have spoken, and give the casting vote in case of a tie.

ART. 7. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to record the proceedings of each aunual session and superintend their printing and distribution among the churches.

ART. 8. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all funds sent up by the churches, or collected during the session of this body, and disburse the same as ordered by the Association. He shall also make to the Association an annual report of the condition of the Treasury.

ART. 9. The Association shall appoint an Executive Committee of seven members, which committee shall have the superintendence of Associational Missions and Colportage. They shall have power to disburse all sums paid by the Treasurer of the Association for the objects under their charge, and during intervals between the meetings of this body to receive and disburse funds for those objects and to take such steps for their advancement as they shall deem advisable, and shall make an annual report to the Association of their doings.

ART. 10. The Association shall not maintain fellowship with any of the churches which neglect to preserve gospel order.

ART. 11. The Association may invite visiting and corresponding brethren to seats, and extend to them all the privileges of the body except that of voting.

ART. 12. The annual session of this Association shall commence on Tuesday after the first Lord's day in October, at such place as may be chosen.

ART. 13. By appointment of the Association there shall be an Introductory Sermon of a denominational character, and a Missionary Sermon.

ART. 14. This Constitution may be amended at any annual session by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.
