BETHEL BAPTIST CHURCH, WATAUGA CO., N. G., Tuesday, August 27, 1901.

The Three Forks Baptist Association met this day in its Sixty-first Annual Session with Bethel Church.

### WEDNESDAY, August 28.

---Morning Session.

By request L. H. Greene of Mitchell Co. Association, conducted devotional exercises. After reading and commenting on the 23rd. Psalm led in prayer.

After spending half an hour in devotional exercise, the Mod. called the Association to order at 9 o'clock A. M.

Minutes of yesterday read and approved.

Roll of messengers called and absentees stricken out.

J. W. Richardson announces himself as Correspondent from Watauga Association also I. C Miller from Stony Fork Association.

The following Brethren report having done the Associational Missionary work in the past year indicated: - C. S. Farthing supplied for Clark's Creek church during the year. J. F. Eiler ten days at Meadows school house in Tennesee. J. H. Farthing some work here and there. D. C. Harmon some work.

C.S. Farthing requests the Ministers of the Association to give Clark's Creek church one appointment during the year.

R. M. Farthing read the following

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

We your committee are pleased to report considerable progress in our public schools. We had thought that the demand for a higher grade of scholarship and lowering the saleries of the teachers would force our best teachers to enter other callings more rapidly than they used to do. We find, however, that the people in the several districts are taking the matter up and are supplementing the saleries of their teachers and taking more interest than ever before, so that the next year's work bids fair to be the best we have ever done.

In the matter of high schools, we are pleased to inform our young people that while we have no distinctively Baptist schools, we have a goodly number of teachers at work in the high schools in our midst. We heartily recomend you to their care believing that both you and they will work faithfully for your preparation for the work to which God is calling you.

We note that in the history of all our States they think it necessary to have a safe-guard in the shape of Universities. We believe that our denominational institutions serve a better purpose in the advancement of Christ's Cause and for checking se pticism and higher Criticism and cordially recomend them to our people. We cordially recomend Wake Forest to young men seeking an education and urge them to go as soon as they are prepared.

We are also glad that we can recomend The Baptist Female University to young women seeking an education. We urge that our people give their daughters equal advantages with their sons.

E. F. Jones. Committee. Lewis W. Farthing moved to adopt the report.

E. F. Jones spoke with objection to present plans of higher education contrasted with the education of the masses. R. M. Farthing follows with reference to the report of general education. Report adopted.

The committee on Religious Exercises report that David Greene of Mitchell Co. Association will preach in the grove at 10 o'clock A. M.

R. M. Farthing read for the committee the following

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

The chief point of note in the work of Home Missions now is that the responsibility of the work rests on the churches. The weight of the work was too much for one man, and F. H. Curfoot who had labored acceptedly in other departments of our work, and had been chosen to carry on this work fell just after the Convention, the life almost literally crushed by the great work he had undertaken.

We think our churches ought to work with increased energy for the great Work. The reports of some churches seem to indicate that they only believe in Foreign Missions. It is supposed that they look upon the U.S. as a Christian Nation.

What Baptist ever acknowledged there was ever a Christian Nation?

To those who study the work carefully the need of some Western States for Mission work is as great if not greater than that of the heathen themselves.

For statistics and plans of work we refer you to the report of the Home Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, Respectfully Submitted,

### REPORT ON PERIODICALS.

In these days of general education the greatest per cent of our young people can read. And there being so much cheap literature flooding the country that is not fit for mental food, it behooves us to look well to what our people read.

What a person reads becomes food for the mind and goes to form the character to a great extent. For the mind like the body grows by what it feeds upon, with the differance that the mind, more than the body, partakes of the nature of that upon which it feeds. It becomes very important, therefore, that a person read good literature.

It should be of a good sound uplifting character.

Baptist, we believe, have the purest and the noblest literature in the world, because they have the purest and noblest principles, which principles are founded on the New Testament. We think every Baptist especially should read Baptist literature so as to be posted in our principles, and thus be enabled to impart them to others.

We recommend the various publications of our Baptist people, and for information on our general work, the following; On Home Missions and state Missions,-Biblical Recorder; Foreign Missions, Foreign Mission Journal & Helper; Orphanage, Charity and Children; Temperance,- North Carolina Baptist.

### REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Our Lord's mission in this world was one of labor and suffering. He came not to condemn a sinner but to help him and save him. He finished his work on earth and went home. Just as He was going back to His Father He gave the last loving command to his few chosen ones, then around him and through them to all his loved ones who were yet to be brought into his fold. This command spoken by our risen Lord, so full of tenderness, love, and power, was so plain we cannot fail to understand it.

How careful He was in uttering it that we should understand the extent of it. First-"Go into all the world;" Then for fear there might be some dispute over the matter He says, "Teach all nations"- Then to make it more specific and binding if possible, He says in his own loving and tender way- "Preach the gospel to every creature." Brethren, how hard His few children who heard that command tried to carry it out.

They did the work well in their day and for their generation, so much so that Paul asked the question;- Have they not heard yes verely their sound went into all the earth and their words unto the ends of the world."

Shall we love His command less than they did? Shall we be less dutiful, less faithful to His last words, and to our generation than they were to theirs? The command has gone out; The nations are here without hope and without God.

Brethren, what shall we do? We can't help but fear that we have been looking too much to Boards, Conventions and all such like and have failed to see and feel that personal responsibility of every one who loves Him, to do all he or she can, just as though it all depends upon that one to carry out the Saviour's command or bring the Nations

Oh for a more face to face and hand to hand work in our Zion.

Then, and not till then shall we feel and know the sweetness of that blessed promise, "Lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world."

### EVENING SESSION. August 26th.

After an intermission of one hour the Association reassembled. Prayer by A. Roten. J. J. T. Reese read the following-REPORT ON BAPTIST ORPHANAGE.

For 200 years many of the indigent, fatherless and motherless children of our State had no permanent home. They were driven from place to place, naked and hungry and having no ability to provide for themselves, they naturally would fall in to all kinds of crime, and often thought necessity.

Sixteen years ago the Baptist- the promoters of all great and noble undertakings for God and humanity, being loyal to that injunction which says "Blessed is he that considereth the poor,"- conceived the idea of building an Orphanage of Thomasville.

About 200 children are annually being fed and clothed by these noble men and women. The Lord puts it in to the hearts of his servants, one after another whom he has bountifully blessed to make large donations to the Orphanage besides thousands of Baptist all over the State with smaller means are regularly dividing their liberality with their children.

As the existence of this institution depends upon the charity of the people there should be, as we hope has ever been the case, the strictest econemy used, both in the salary of officers and teachers and in the food and clothing of these children, ever remembering that a great portion of these gifts come from the poorest of our brethren, and a reversal of this econemy may lead God's spirit away from this charity. We would insist that every church in the Association take regular collections for this noble work and that the pastors keep it before their people.

J. J. T. Reese, Committee.

J. J. T. Reese spoke with reference to the report. E. F. Jones states that the average expense of feeding, clothing and educating the children at the Orphanage is about \$4.50.each per month. J. H. Farthing added further remarks.

We your committee on Pastoral Support beg leave to submit the following; From the best information that we can obtain, we think that the churches are far below what they should be in supporting their pastors.




