#### ACCREDITATION

Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary is fully accredited by the American Association of Theological Schools.

#### REGISTRATION

FIRST TERM—Monday, June 6, 1960. Classes will meet four days each week, Tuesday through Friday, beginning Tuesday, June 7. Two courses may be taken. Four semester hours credit may be earned in four weeks. *Matriculation and schedule changing closes June 8*, 4:30 p.m.

SECOND TERM—Monday, July 4, 1960. Classes will meet four days each week, Tuesday through Friday, beginning Tuesday, July 5. Two courses may be taken. Four semester hours credit may be earned in four weeks. *Matriculation and schedule changing closes July 6, 4:30 p.m.* 

#### COSTS

Fees \$20.00 per term. Room \$12.50 per term. Meals, approximately \$2.20 per day may be secured in the town of Wake Forest. The cost of books and supplies will vary, depending upon the courses taken.

#### **FACILITIES**

A completely renovated campus. A new air-conditioned library. Modern dormitory facilities recently equipped with new furniture. Rooms available for single men, single women, and couples.

#### RECREATION

Golf, Tennis, Swimming, Gymnasium. The town of Wake Forest operates a modern swimming pool. A private nine-hole golf course within walking distance of the campus will be available for a modest fee. The Seminary gymnasium will be open. Excellent tennis courts are also available.

#### CURRICULUM

#### FIRST TERM, JUNE 6-JULY 1:

A course in elementary Greek, designed for beginners in the Greek New Testament, will meet three hours each day throughout the two terms and will enable the student to earn six semester hours in Greek.

The student who does not take the course in Greek may enroll in two courses and earn four semester hours each term.

In order to maintain a reasonable student-teacher ratio, the Seminary reserves the right to control the size of elective classes offered in the summer session.

#### CW 301s Biblical Preaching

A study of the effective use of the Bible in preaching.

IC 211s Comparative Religion

Miss Lansdell

A study of the origin and development of religion, contemporary "primitive" religions, ancient national religions, and the religions of India. These faiths are critically appraised in the light of the Christian revelation.

IB 151 Elementary Greek

Mr. Oliver

The elements of Koine Greek. For beginners in the Greek New Testament.

LT 223s Christian Ethics and Alcohol Education

A study of problems related to the use of alcohol in the perspective of Christian principles and scientific studies with attention to the responsibilities of pastors and churches in contemporary American society.

IB 305s Archaeology and the Religion of Israel Mr. Lovelace A study of Israel's faith and its relationships to other ancient Near Eastern religions, with attention to the positive and growing aspects of the religion of Israel as reflected in the beliefs, institutions, and cultic practices associated with the origin and development of Monotheism.

IB 243s The Exposition of Great Texts in the New Testament

A biblical and historical study of the Christian concept of revelation. Careful consideration will be given to the definition of revelation, its media, authority, uniqueness and communication. The study will be concluded by relating the Christian claim to other contemporary claims to truth.

## SPECIAL PROGRAM FOR B.S.U. PRESIDENTS

# MR. HAROLD COLE, Director

In co-operation with the Department of Student Work of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention, a program of study is provided for B.S.U. presidents July 4-29, 1960. This program offers an opportunity for B.S.U. presidents to gain a deeper knowledge of the Christian faith and its relevance to the educational enterprise in which they are engaged.

Participants in this program will register through the Seminary's regular registration procedure as special students and not as candidates

for a degree.

\* Participants in this program will enroll for LT 115s, Introduction to Christian Thought. Enrollment in LT 115s is limited to this group. In addition to enrollment in LT 115s, the B.S.U. presidents may en-

roll in LT 205s or CW 159s.

Each Monday definite study in the field of student leadership will be provided. The first Monday, July 4: religious perspectives in higher education; the second Monday, July 11: the history, philosophy, objectives, and organization of B.S.U.; the third Monday, July 18: the meaning, challenge, and resources of Christian leadership; and the fourth Monday, July 25: the context and content of the Christian program on the campus.

#### APPLICATIONS

A student entering Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary for the first time must file application for admission at least *fifteen days* prior to the opening of the term.
