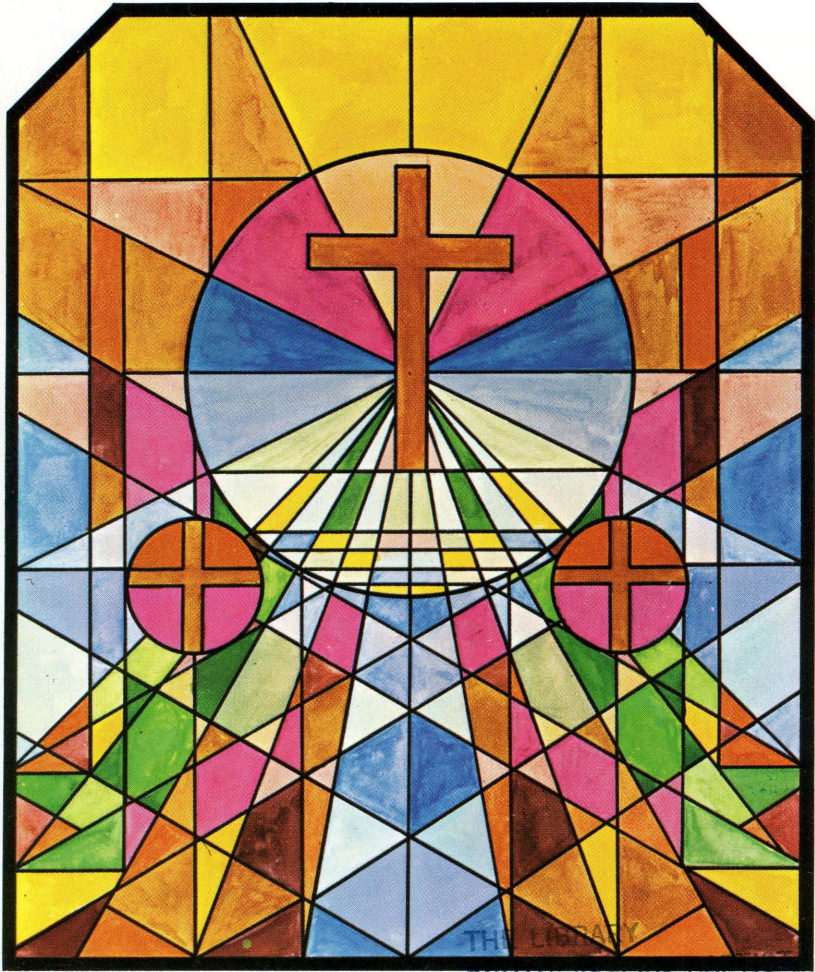

Constitution

(Revisions: August 16, 1957: August 14, 1975)

ARTICLE I

The Name of this body shall be the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II

The purpose of the Association shall be the extension of Christ's kingdom on earth, creation and promotion of harmony, intelligence and spiritual power of the churches.

ARTICLE III

(1) The Association shall have the power to elect and install its officers in whatever manner the body may deem expedient. (2) It shall have power to recommend measures of usefulness and guidance to our churches in matters of organizations, ordinations and questions of doctrines and discipline. (3) The Association shall have no power to infringe upon the right to the local churches as sovereign and independent bodies.

ARTICLE IV

(1) The Association shall be composed of ministers and messengers selected by missionary Baptist churches which have been previously received into the association. (2) The pastor and four members from each one hundred members or fraction thereof shall compose the representation of each church. (3) The Association shall be the sole judge of its members; (4) Any

church applying to the Association for membership by letter and messenger shall come under the watchcare of the Association for one year for observation. It is suggested that any church under watchcare shall make regular financial contributions for missions to the Association as an act of good faith, and that such financial contributions for missions shall continue after the church has been received into the fellowship of the Association. At the expiration of that time, if it is still the will of the church, it may be voted in by majority vote of the Association, provided they have an acceptable letter and at least one messenger present at the time.

ARTICLE V

(1) The Association shall hold its regular session on Thursday and Friday preceding the 3rd Sunday in August. (2) The Association year begins on July 1 and continues through June 30 of the proceeding year. The Associational reports and church letters will be within this period. (3) The Moderator may call a mid-year session at his pleasure. (4) The Association Budget approved in each Annual Meeting will begin October the first of that year and expire September thirty of the following year.

ARTICLE VI

(a) The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Director of Evangelism, Director of Deacons, Brotherhood Director, Director of Education, and a Parliamentarian, and such other officers as the Association may desire to elect.

(b) The term of office for the general officers of the Association shall not exceed two years in succession, with the exception of the Clerk and Treasurer of the Association, who may be re-elected to succeed themselves in office at the pleasure of the Association. The term of office for all members of committees of the Association shall be for not more than two years. No committee member may succeed himself until at least one year has elapsed after his official term has expired. No member of the Association may be permitted to hold membership in more than one committee during one year, except in the case of the members of the Executive Committee.

(c) The term general officers shall apply to the Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk and Treasurer.

ARTICLE VII

(a) The Moderator shall preside and maintain the order of business of all meetings unless he otherwise provides for the Vice Moderator. He shall serve as ex officio member of all committees of the Association.

(b) He shall appoint the committee on committees and all other committees pertinent to the operation of the body not named by the committee on committees in its regular report.

(c) The Vice Moderator shall assist the Moderator and in case of absence or incapacitation of the Moderator, he shall act in his stead until another Moderator is elected.

(d) The Clerk shall keep a complete and accurate record of all transactions; he shall prepare a book of reports to be distributed to messengers and pastors at the beginning of each day's session of the annual meeting; and he shall cause to be printed a minute concerning the records made.

(e) The Clerk shall mail to the Clerk of each church in the Association, blanks for the preparation of the church letter as soon as they are received from the state convention office.

(f) The Treasurer shall receive and disburse by the order of the Executive Committee or the Association while in session, the money of the treasury and make a complete report to the Association at each session.

(g) It shall be the duty of the Historian to keep the records of the Association up to date.

(h) The Director of Missions shall be sought and recommended by the Executive Committee in a manner of its own choosing.

Within 30 days after locating such a person the Executive Committee shall present the name

of the Director nominee to a called meeting of the Association. If the Annual meeting of the Association is scheduled within 60 days, the presentation shall wait until that time.

His call shall be indefinite. His salary, allowances, etc., shall be as provided by the current budget or adjustments recommended in consultation with the Finance Committee.

Two-week vacation may be taken at his discretion.

Concerning termination of employment, his resignations shall be in writing and presented to the Executive Committee at least thirty days before it is to take effect. The Executive Committee may terminate employment by giving thirty days notice in advance.

The Missions Committee shall give full supervision and guidance to the Director of Missions in planning, promoting and financing his work.

The Director of Missions shall work closely with the Associational Committees and Associational Officers in such a way as to help each group determine its opportunities, and objectives based on the need in the churches and procedures, and means of fulfilling these.

Therefore, he shall serve as ex officio member of all committees of the Association. It shall be his duty to administer the policies and instructions of the Executive Committee. He shall communicate with the State and Southern Convention such information as shall be mutually helpful and needful.

ARTICLE VIII

All officers shall be elected annually at the discretion of the body. All officers and committee members will hold office until the next annual Association meeting.

ARTICLE IX

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to Roberts Parliamentary Practice or in a manner not contrary thereto.

ARTICLE X

The Executive Committee shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Director of Sunday School, Director of Evangelism, Director of Deacons, Director of Brotherhood, Director of Education, Director of Missions, Parliamentarian and the pastor and one member from each church in the Association. No pastor, by virtue of his being an Associational officer, shall be disqualified as a member of the Executive Committee, from representing the church or churches he may be serving in the Association. Twelve of these members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE XI

It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to act for the Association on matters arising when the Association is not in session and to make a report of all work to the next session of the Association.

ARTICLE XII

The Associational quorum shall be the number present if the number satisfies the will of the Moderator.

ARTICLE XIII

The Association shall have the right to withdraw by a majority vote fellowship from any church which becomes unorthodox in doctrine especially with reference to Baptism by Immersion by authority of the local church as a prerequisite to membership in that Association, or disorderly in practice, or that fails to present itself either by messenger of letter for two consecutive sessions without sufficient reason, or that ceases to be missionary in practice. The support of the causes fostered by the denomination at large and of this Association in particu-

lar shall be the test of each church as a missionary body. Any church, at its pleasure, may withdraw from the Association.

ARTICLE XIV

The Association shall have such standing committees as may be considered necessary to promote efficiently the work of the Master in our midst. The members of these committees are to be nominated annually by the Committee on Committees unless otherwise determined by the Association.

ARTICLE XV

The Constitution shall be amended through the recommendation of a standing Constitution Committee. Such Committee shall accept all suggested amendments, not later than thirty days prior to the annual session of the Association, which are presented to the Committee in writing. Such amendments shall be printed and then read at the first day of the Annual meeting, and voted on at the session on the second day. The Constitution shall be amended by a majority vote.

By-Laws

1. All vacancies occurring among the elective officers and in the Executive Committee shall be filled by the Executive Committee.
2. The Executive Committee shall meet at a time and place designated by the Moderator on Monday following the first Sunday of each quarter. The Executive Committee shall elect its own chairman.
3. Each church Clerk shall mail to the Clerk of the Association a letter properly filled out on the blank furnished him at least two weeks prior to the meeting of the body.
4. No church shall be received into the Association who does not present a certificate of examination properly endorsed by the committee on organization and reception of new churches.
5. Duties of the committees of the Association.
 - A. ORDER OF BUSINESS COMMITTEE: This committee shall plan the annual program for the Association and present it to the Executive Committee at its July Meeting.
 - B. COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES: The duty of this committee is to bring to the annual associational meeting a nomination of the personnel of the standing committee.
 - C. FINANCE COMMITTEE: This committee shall devise plans for raising the funds for the association budget and prepare for recommendations to the annual session of the association the budget for the disbursement of funds for the coming year. It shall also be the duty of this committee to audit the finances and financial records of this Association twice annually and anytime that there is a change of Treasurer or Financial Secretary, or at the direction of this body or the Executive Committee, and to report all audits to the Annual Association Meeting.
 - D. RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE: This committee is to report suitable resolutions at the annual associational meeting.
 - E. CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE: This committee serves in an advisory capacity only. This committee should examine such candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the Gospel Ministry and make recommendations as they feel led to the church of which one is a member about his being ordained and help plan and arrange the proper services of ordination when such assistance is needed. The Executive Committee should be informed regularly of the work of the committee. Each church desiring to ordain a candidate is urged to consult with the committee.
 - F. NOMINATING COMMITTEE: It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate the officers of the Association and have this report ready for the annual associational meeting.

- G. MISSIONS COMMITTEE: (1) This committee shall be composed of the following Association officers: Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Director of Woman's Missionary Union, Director of Brotherhood, Director of Evangelism, Director of Deacons, Treasurer, Moderator, Chairman of Executive Committee, and four members at large from member churches to be elected by the Association at its annual meeting for 1, 2, 3, and 4 years respectively on a rotating system. After the election one new member shall be elected each year to serve for a period of four years. (2) The Missions Committee shall advise and work with the Director of Missions in promoting the work in the Association, and also lead and assist in organizing new churches, and also shall be responsible for encouraging and guiding the churches in the Association to faithfully cooperate with the Association program emphases. (3) The committee shall meet once a quarter to receive a written report from the Associational Missionary and make helpful suggestions to him concerning his work. (4) If such advice is sought, it shall advise any group seeking to organize a new church, or seek to help any member Church desiring assistance in its problems. (5) The Missions Committee shall perform the duties prescribed in the By-Laws on New Churches, and the By-Laws prescribing the job Description on the Director of Missions.

JOB DESCRIPTION

DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS TUCKASEIGEE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

This Job Description is prepared for the information of the Director of Missions, with the objective of presenting the Director Committees' viewpoints on the major needs of the Association. The Job Description also stipulates the responsibilities of the Association to the Director of Missions.

- I. FUNCTION OF THE DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS. He is to be the chief administrative officer of the Association. He is to confine extra employment in a manner agreed upon with the Executive Committee.
- II. Relationship of the Director of Missions
 1. He is employed by the Executive Committee of the Association. "Concerning termination of employment, his resignation shall be in writing and be presented to the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior to its effectiveness. The Executive Committee may terminate employment by giving thirty days notice in advance." (Tuckaseigee Association Constitution Article VII, paragraph h-5)
 2. General supervision of the personnel and program of the Association as they function through the Associational Office.
 3. Work primarily with Associational General Officers, Committees, and Organizations.
 4. Work closely with auxiliary organizations.
 5. Lead in maintaining relationships with State and SBC Agencies.
- III. Duties of the Director of Missions
 1. Administrative
 - a. Administer policies and instructions committed to him by the Association, its Executive Committee or Board.
 - b. Work closely with the Associational Officers, Committees, and Organizations to help each group determine (1) its opportunities and objectives based on needs in the churches, and (2) its procedures and programs for achieving these objectives.
 - c. Help the Association to develop annual and long-range objectives; set goals, and make plans for their attainment.
 - d. Correlate the work of all organizations and Committees in the Association, and publish a Calendar of Activities.
 - e. All staff to be responsible to the Director's selection and supervision under his responsibilities until informed otherwise by the Executive Committee.
 - f. Serve as ex officio member of all committees.

- g. Have general oversight of purchasing equipment and supplies within the approved budget.
 - h. Inform State and Southern Convention agencies of needs, problems, and potentialities within the Association.
 - i. Interpret to the churches the program resources and other assistance available from the State and Southern Baptist agencies.
2. As Counselor-Shepherd
To counsel with church leaders as requested with reference to (1) Programs and procedures in their churches; (2) Calling a pastor or other staff member; (3) Actual or threatened breach of fellowship; (4) Church objectives; (5) Church policies; (6) Assist pastorless churches; (7) Assist pastors and others in counseling those who are called into church-related vocations.
3. In the Churches, extending the local ministries:
- a. To visit churches by invitation of the pastor or other church leaders in the pastorless churches to provide assistance in the church program and ministry, such as: (1) Pulpit supply; (2) Study course; (3) Missionary address; (4) Deacons' Meetings; (5) Assembly programs; (6) Special day addresses; (7) Ordination services; (8) V.B.S. Planning and Promotion; (9) To interpret phases of Associational work; (10) Budget planning; (11) Building planning; (12) Revival meetings; (13) Stewardship emphasis; (14) Study objectives and long-range planning; (15) Studying and evaluating procedures, curriculum, Constitution and By-Laws, etc.; (16) Church-Community Surveys, etc.; (17) Promoting a world missions concept; and (18) publishing of a regular news medium.
4. In the Associational Office
- a. Personal correspondence, promotional mail, and telephoning pertinent to his work.
 - b. Office conferences, answer to inquiries, etc.
 - c. Assist Associational Officers, Committees, and heads of Organizations to get out promotional mail pertinent to their work.
- IV. The Schedule of Benefits provided by the Association for the Director.
1. His salary shall be _____
 2. His fringe benefits shall include _____
 3. His schedule shall include:
 - a. One day each week, chosen at his discretion, shall be reserved for rest that excludes normal Associational activities.
 - b. A maximum of six weeks each year outside of the Association for special work with local churches or with State and SBC agencies.
 - c. An annual sick leave of 24 days maximum, with a maximum of 42 days to be accumulated. Sick leave may be advanced by the Association for one year, without Executive Committee action. Sick leave is to be recorded with the Financial Secretary of the Association.
 4. All honoraria from churches inside or outside the Association and all honoraria from other religious work shall be his personal fair, and shall not be submitted to the Association.
 5. New Churches in the Association: (1) Any church seeking admission to the membership of the Association shall petition in writing the Executive Committee at least three months before the annual meeting of the Association, which petition shall be referred to the Missions Committee for its study on the petitioning church's covenant, articles of faith, history, practices, cooperative spirit, its relations to other churches of the Association and its willingness to abide by the Constitution and By-Laws of the Association. The Missions Committee shall then report to the Associational Meeting with a copy thereof submitted to the Associational Executive Committee at least thirty days prior to the Annual Meeting of the Association. The Missions Committee shall then report to the Associational Meeting with a copy thereof submitted to the Associational Executive Committee at least thirty days prior to the Annual Meeting of the Association, its findings and recommendations for Associational action at the next annual meeting. (2) Each church applying for membership in the Association, upon approval, shall be received under the watchcare of the Association for a period of one year. Each church

- shall give a written report to the Missions Committee and the Executive Committee each quarter of their work and giving toward associational program and state and southwide participation.
6. The Clerk shall prepare a Book of Reports for distribution at the annual sessions containing the reports of those on the Committee on Reports. The Clerk shall notify each person to give a report and these reports should be in the hands of the Clerk no later than two weeks before the Association meets.

Proceedings

Thursday, August 12, 1976
Hamburg Baptist Church

The one hundred forty-seventh Annual Session of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association meeting was called to order in the Hamburg Baptist Church by the Moderator, Robert Blanton. The Reverend J. D. Grant led the congregation in the singing of two hymns. This was followed by a prayer and scripture by the Reverend Lester Sutton, pastor of the church. Reverend Blanton thanked the members of the Hamburg Church for its hospitality and for the bounteous meal served to 118 messengers representing 27 churches in the Association. A standing vote of thanks and appreciation was expressed by the congregation.

The following business was dispensed:

1. A motion accepting the order of business as shown in the BOOK OF REPORTS was approved.
2. A motion made by Douglas McFadin, that the BOOK OF REPORTS be adopted was amended by Annie Hoyle, Clerk, for the section dealing with the budget and the financial reports not be included in this motion. The amendment and the motion were approved.
3. Reverend C. H. Greene spoke on the Sunday School Report. He told of plans for the coming year, stressing the action program which has been introduced through two clinics held this past year. He urged all churches to consider employing full time pastors.
4. The Reverend Luther Osment spoke on the State Missions Report, calling attention to the State Missions Day of Prayer scheduled for September 19.
5. Woodrow Hill brought the report on Christian Literature, urging churches to include the Biblical Recorder in their budgets so that it would go into every Baptist home. If the veil of ignorance is to be lifted then the people must be informed, they must be involved and exert their influence. When people know they are concerned and when they are concerned they become involved and their influence spreads. The Bold Mission Thrust project has been adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention. If this plan succeeds it means that Baptist people must know what is going on. Reading the Biblical Recorder will help to keep people informed, he affirmed.
6. Reverend J. D. Grant introduced the pastors new to the Association this year. They are: Dr. John Bunn, Sylva First; Reverend John Spencer, Buff Creek; Reverend Douglas McFadin, Shoal Creek; Reverend Charles Shuler, Big Ridge; and Reverend Frank Anderson, Hospital Chaplain. He also reported on the changes within the Association. These are recorded in the Associational Report.
7. Dr. John Bunn spoke on the topic: "The Church and the Association." He emphasized five cardinal principles that have been affirmed by all of the earliest Baptist Associations; 1. That each member church is autonomous; 2. That the association has no authority over the churches; 3. That the association's capacity is advisory not authoritarian; 4. That they can only withdraw fellowship from churches for clearly defined and absolutely incontestable acts of defection in doctrine or practice; and 5. That just as a church is free to decide whether they will or will not be in cooperative relationship with the association, so the association is free to determine what churches it will admit to its fellowship and continue in its fellowship according to its stated constitution. The Tuckaseegee Baptist Association by its constitution is obligated to promote 1. the extension of God's Kingdom on earth, 2. the creation and promotion of harmony, 3. creation and promotion of intelligence in the churches and 4. the creation and promotion of spiritual power in the churches. All of these things in general and in particular constitute the Association's service to the member churches.
8. Under miscellaneous business Douglas McFadin announced the forthcoming Sunday School Clinic to be held on October 4 & 5. C. H. Greene urged the churches to take a look at their constitutions. He stressed the importance of and need for up-dated constitutions. The constitution point out the guidelines for a church.
9. The song "At The Cross" led by J. D. Grant preceded the taking of an offering amounting to \$74.60.
10. The Reverend Luther Osment brought a dynamic message using as his scripture Mark

2:1 and as his title "A Time for Boldness."

The first session of the Annual meeting was closed with a prayer led by Reverend Eddie Stillwell.

Friday, August 13, 1976
Long Branch Church

The second session of the Association Annual Meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Reverend Robert Blanton at the Long Branch Baptist Church at 9:30 AM on Friday, August 13, 1976. Reverend Hazen Pangle, Pastor of the church, brought the devotional using Luke 4:9-10. Rev. John Spencer, Pastor of Buff Creek Church, led the congregation in the song "Blessed Assurance."

The Order of Business as approved at the first session was followed:

1. Rev. Billy Rogers was absent at this time so this item of business was postponed to come up later.
2. Reverend Kenneth Crawford, Director of Truett Camp, brought the report on camp activities and the progress being made at the camp this year. He reported that 510 people were in attendance at the camp during the 9 week session. There was a total of 240 girls in attendance during the three week with 41 decisions for Christ and 155 boys with 39 decisions for Christ. At present the camp has a deficit of \$2700. The North Carolina Baptist State Convention gives \$7,000 per year to assist with the operation. Next year they will probably increase the amount. The swimming pool is badly in need of repair. Next year the Music week and the Youth week will be combined.
- Dr. Bunn reported that some of his young people attending the camp had made decision for Christ as a result of their camp experience. This brings the number of decisions to 82. This was presented as an amendment to the report and approved.
3. Annie Hoyle, Clerk, gave the Associational report pointing out progress and evidences of concern and cooperation in the association.
4. Reverend Frank Anderson spoke to the Chaplaincy report emphasizing the services rendered and the need for more security in financial support. He brought folders on the Chaplaincy work in the C. J. Harris Hospital for distribution.
5. Sue Fitzgerald from Mars Hill College brought the report from the Baptist institutions of Christian Education. She explained her work and its purpose and encouraged the churches to take advantage of these free services.
6. Tom Clayton, Chairman of the Baptist Children's Home Committee, introduced Reverend Clyde Morris who told of the work accomplished in the Baptist Children's Homes and the Home for girls in Asheville. He said that Cottage No. 5 would be dedicated at the Broyhill Home on September 9, 1976. A new project—that of child development under the capable direction and leadership of Mrs. W. R. Wagner is now in operation on the Thomasville campus.
- Rev. Morris left pamphlets for the messengers to pick up and study.
7. Reverend Spencer led the congregation in singing "There's a Melody Within My Heart."
8. Mrs. Ruby Greenlaw gave a report on the work at the Baptist Hospital and told of the many services which it renders. She spoke fervently of the spirit of togetherness which prevailed at the Hospital. She explained how the Mother's Day offering was used to serve a needed and unique mission. She urged the messengers not to condemn or forbid absorption in cases of urgent need, using a vivid illustration to illustrate such a dire need.
9. Reverend J. D. Grant reported on the Cooperative Program. He stressed the need for mutual cooperation of all churches in supporting this good and worthy cause. He called attention to some of the advantages of the work done through the Cooperative Program. It is a program that needs our support.
10. In the absence of Barbara Vance, Treasurer, Annie Hoyle, Clerk, presented the treasurer's report. She called attention to the fact that the Sylva First and Jarrett Memorial churches should be listed with those churches now contributing on a monthly basis to the Associational fund.
11. Lewis Keener, Financial Chairman, presented the budget for 1976-1977. He explained the increase in certain items, calling special attention to the need for office equipment. He

read a list of the urgent needs. The motion was seconded by Douglas McFadin and approved. The budget for the amount of \$19,125.00 was adopted.

12. Sam O'Neal spoke on the Annuity Program and expressed concern for the welfare of the pastors after their retirement. He urged the messengers to look into the matter of pastor retirement and to take action in their respective churches if their pastor was not already covered.

13. After the singing of the song, "Jesus Saves," Rev. J. D. Wyatt brought an inspirational and very informative message using Hebrews 9:22 as the scripture.

Following the message the morning session came to a close and the 103 messengers and visitors enjoyed a bounteous luncheon served by the members of the Long Branch church.

14. The afternoon session was called to order and the 119 Psalm read by a layman of the church followed by the song "Love Lifted Me" under the leadership of J. D. Grant.

15. The Home for the Aging Report was brought with a special plea for help from the Association to support financially the home to be constructed in Asheville. There is an urgent need for this home.

16. Reverend Douglas McFadin expressed the appreciation of the messengers and staff of the Association to the Long Branch Church and its pastor for the warm hospitality as a host church.

17. Rev. Lester Sutton, in the absences of the chairman, presented the Credentials Committee Report.

18. The one hundred forty-eighth annual meeting Time, Place and Preacher Report was presented by Reverend Glenn Blanton. In 1977 on August 18 the meeting will be at the Shoal Creek Church with the Reverend Douglas McFadin bringing the message. On August 19 it will be at the Black Mountain Church with the Reverend Lester Sutton as preacher.

19. The nomination committee chairman, James Ridgeway, was not present. The report was presented by the Moderator and the Secretary. Attention was called to the fact that the report was in violation of the Constitution because some names were listed in more than one position. Reference was made to Article VI b. of the Constitution. A motion made by Bunn and seconded by Hinson that the committee on Committees Report be referred back to the committee and that the moderator appoint a Constitution Committee to study and interpret Article VI b of the Constitution and that this Committee would report its findings to the October Meeting of the Executive Committee. Motion passed.

20. A congregational song—"Trust and Obey"—was led by J. D. Grant. A collection amounting to \$78.44 was taken.

21. The Moderator presented the Calendar of Activities and urged all pastors and churches to refer to this calendar as they made up their church calendars and thus avoid as many conflicts as possible.

22. The Moderator, Robert Blanton, thanked the messengers for permitting him to serve in this office for a two year period.

23. Reverend Lester Sutton closed the 147 Annual Session with a Memorial Service for those members from the several churches who had been called to their rewards. Psalm 116 was read to a musical background. A prayer brought the session to a close at 2:30 P.M.

REPORT OF THE AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY 1975-1976

The Bicentennial of the American Revolution is here, and churches across the country are planning how they will participate in this great celebration.

The American Bible Society can help them. Forty years younger than our country, the ABS (born in 1816) grew up with the new nation and made sure that its citizens always had available copies of God's Word to guide them. Today the goal of the ABS is the same—the translation, publication and distribution of the Scriptures in the language of the people without doctrinal note or comment and without profit. As a vital resource agency to the churches, the ABS works with the United Bible Societies around the world to provide the Scriptures to more people than ever.

Here are highlights of what the ABS and its partners in the Bible cause did in 1975. TRANSLATION AND PUBLICATION UPDATE 1975: A milestone in the development of the common language translation will be reached late in 1976 when "The Good News Bible," the entire Bible in Today's English Version is published.

During 1975, the ABS supported 562 translation projects around the world. Highlights of these projects were the publication of the New Testament in Today's Chinese, and the completion of the New Testament in Today's Arabic.

GOOD NEWS FOR NEW READERS: The dilemma of the new reader unable to improve upon his reading skills for lack of suitable materials is a problem all too familiar to the Bible Societies. The Societies realize that if "bridge materials" such as Good News for New Readers Scripture Literacy Selections are not available, most of these new readers will return to illiteracy and may never again have the opportunity to read God's Word.

BIBLE SOCIETY ACTIVITIES.—Scripture Distribution. Scripture distribution in the United States during 1975 reached a total of 109,469,781 copies.

GOOD NEWS FOR MODERN MAN Nearly ten years ago the new translation of the New Testament called "Good News for Modern Man" was published to be used especially in evangelistic outreach. On the eve of its tenth anniversary, distribution of the New Testament in Today's English Version has passed the fifty million mark, an achievement unmatched in U.S. paperback publishing history.

NEW PUBLICATIONS: The Bible Society expanded its service to the handicapped in 1975, with the production of a Scripture Selections for the deaf. The new Selection, "Jesus Stops A Star," translates Mark 4:35-41 in Signed English. In November, the Bible Society's new publication, "The ABC's of Proverbs," became the most popular addition yet to the series of children's Scriptures that the ABS has published in recent years.

SCRIPTURE IMPRINTS: Imprints produced by the ABS in 1975, 2,259,000 copies were imprinted for Southern Baptist churches and agencies.

BIBLE-A-MONTH CLUB: Members of the Bible-a-Month Club continued their support of Bible Society work in 1975. By year's end, more than 226,000 members were enrolled helping to get the Word into the hands of those who need it.

VOLUNTEER ACTIVITIES: The ranks of ABS Volunteers continue to swell. The number of men and women serving the ABS now stands at 14,367.

ARMED FORCES: The ABS has placed more than 20 million copies of Scripture in the hands of men and women serving in America's Armed Forces since 1817.

We ask your continued prayers, that the Bible Society, in partnership with the Southern Baptist Convention and with all willing Christians may fulfill more effectively its task of bringing the Word of God to all those who ask for it and need it.

ANNUITY BOARD OF THE SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION 1975-1976

Southern Baptist churches depend on the Annuity Board to provide retirement and insurance protection to pastors and others in church-related vocations. The Board holds in trust retirement contributions from nearly 40,000 persons. Their contributions will be converted into annuity benefits when they retire. These contributions, taken together, are considered as funds held in trust by the Annuity Board.

Benefits paid to retirees, widows, and the disabled in 1975 amounted to \$15,734,003. During the Annuity Board's 58 years of existence, it has paid more than \$141 million in retirement and protection benefits.

A 13th check issued in December, 1975 provided 8,221 annuitants with an extra month's income to help them combat the rapidly rising cost of living.

The Annuity Board helps churches and SBC agencies get the best coverage at the most advantageous rates in life, health, and disability insurance.

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES 1975-1976

The variety of services provided by the Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina have been increased greatly in recent years. Western North Carolina has shared in this expansion made possible by the generosity of our Baptist people and other friends of the dependent child.

Western North Carolina has provided many of our finest foster homes since the beginning of this program in the 1930's. This continues to be one of our finest services. We are constantly in need of more good foster homes and will welcome an opportunity to talk with people who would like to work with us in this program.

The Maternity Home in Asheville, opened in 1970, became the first agency owned group facility in Western North Carolina. This has proved to be a much-needed and well-received service. Girls have been served from throughout North Carolina and beyond. It is recognized for its quality of care and Christian concern.

After several years of careful planning, generous giving, and hard work, Broyhill Home became a reality in 1971. People in the western part of the state rose to the challenge and provided funds to purchase land and develop a campus with buildings and facilities for sixty children. This is one of the most modern up-to-date facility of its kind in the nation.

Many children find themselves in emergency situations in which they need help immediately. To serve this child we are developing emergency care homes. The Thermal Belt Youth Shelter at Forest City, now in its second year of operation, is proving beneficial to numbers of children in this area.

The department of Child Development and Family Education is available to assist pastors and churches in planning and presenting wider services to strengthen, enrich, and support Christian family life. Members of the staff are available upon call to provide assistance in planning for day care, family education, and related interests.

We are deeply grateful at the Homes for every expression of interest and means of support provided by our people. Special gifts, income through the Cooperative Program, and the Thanksgiving Offering are vital to our existence. We thank you for every expression of your faith and confidence.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES FOR THE AGING 1975-1976

The North Carolina Baptist Homes completed 25 years of growth and development this past year. These have been good years.

The past year we entered into the Fund-Raising Effort to raise \$1,000,000 for the construction of the Western North Carolina Baptist Home in Asheville. Brother Ralph Cannon, Director of Development and Denominational Relations reports that the response has been most encouraging, and that there is every indication that we will reach the goal.

When completed, the Western North Carolina Home, in Asheville, will accommodate 50 people, and will bring the total capacity of our Baptist Homes and the Nursing Care Unit to 280. We now operate five other Homes, and a nursing Care Unit, in Winston-Salem; the Albermarle Home, the Hamilton Home and the Yanceyville Home.

The love gifts of North Carolina Baptist through the Cooperative Program, and the Special Offering for the Homes received on the third Sunday of February each year make this work possible.

Close at hand is another venture in the development of the Homes—the building of apartments on the site of the Hayes Homes property in Winston-Salem. The first of these units is to be completed by the fall of 1977.

Great things are in store for us in our Homes for the Aging as we look to the future, and we covet the earnest prayer and the continual support of every North Carolina Baptist as we move ahead in this challenging ministry to older people in our midst.

REPORT OF THE HOSPITAL CHAPLAIN

From July 1, 1975 to June 30, 1976, 4153 patients passed through the C. J. Harris Community Hospital. This was an average of 346 patients per month. The vast majority of these were seen and talked with at least once by your Chaplain. Depending upon God, your Chaplain sought to complete the ministry of a live saving team. The doctors and nurses ministered to their bodies and minds. The Chaplain ministered to the spirits of the patients, pointing them to a power beyond themselves.

From July 1, 1975 to June 30, 1976, gifts were received from twenty-four churches and two individuals. The total amount given was \$2,543.04. Five of the churches have given every month for the last five months.

This ministry is a voluntary co-operative effort upon the part of all denominations in Jackson County. A standing committee of the Jackson County Minister's Association supervises the Chaplaincy Program.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL 1975-1976

"Christian stewardship" is a phrase frequently heard in staff meetings at Baptist Hospital. A continuing effort is made to help each employee, whatever his particular job, to realize that he is part of a team involved in a Christian ministry of healing. The difference this makes in the whole atmosphere of the hospital is evident to patients and visitors.

This sense of stewardship demands a continual updating and upgrading of medical pro-

cedures to assure patients the highest quality care. One of the most significant recent developments is the creation of a department of Family Medicine.

Improvement of physical facilities is another expression of the hospital's sense of stewardship. In recent months renovation of the west and south wings of the hospital has been completed; construction has begun on a 4-level parking deck in front of Reynolds Tower; construction has been completed on an addition to the water-chilling facilities.

The Pastoral Care Department continues to make its contributions toward the fulfillment of our stewardship. A chaplain is assigned to each area of the hospital and is responsible for providing a pastoral ministry to patients, staff and visitors in that area.

THE CHRISTIAN LIFE COUNCIL REPORT 1975-1976

The emphasis of the Christian Life Council in 1976 has been twofold: citizenship and family relationships. In January a bicentennial packet was mailed to every North Carolina Baptist pastor. A major concern for the Christian home has prompted the Council to distribute over 150,000 pieces of literature relative to the family. A workshop for Youth Ministers was co-sponsored with the Youth Ministries Section. A Single Adult Conference is scheduled for October 29-31 in Charlotte. The Department of Christian Family Life was created and is headed by W. Douglas Cole. The Christian Life Council's reason for existence centers on the concept of helping those who call Him "Lord, Lord" to know and do His commandments.

CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION 1975-1976

When the Baptist State Convention was formed in 1830, there were two church academies already in existence, as well as the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill. However, Baptist wanted their own school. Wake Forest Institute was begun in 1834. Five years later the Institute became Wake Forest College. Baptist in North Carolina have been closely identified with Christian higher education for 142 years.

Today, the Christian higher education system of Baptists embraces six other colleges in addition to Wake Forest: Campbell, Chowan, Gardner-Webb, Mars Hill, Meredith and Wingate. Since 1944, these schools have been guided in their development by the Council on Christian Higher Education of the Baptist State Convention.

It is not enough that North Carolina Baptists have begun and now support six colleges and one university. The need for colleges and churches to give fresh attention to their partnership and their mutual dependence is always present. Below are some of the ways this partnership finds tangible expression year after year:

1. North Carolina Baptists continue to support their colleges through the Cooperative Program and the Baptist College Day offering on Father's Day.
2. The colleges continue to provide training for most of the pastors and other church staff persons who lead North Carolina Baptist churches.
3. Pastors have helped the colleges in their efforts to recruit Baptist young people.
4. The colleges pledge to North Carolina Baptist youth that financial aid is available to assist them in attending a Baptist college.
5. Churches, pastors' conferences and associations invite the colleges to send students and faculty to speak and lead programs.
6. Baptist colleges are anxious to receive invitations to serve the churches and associations.

In a secular world with its materialistic priorities, Baptist colleges are committed to the guidance of Christian values in the search for truth.

Baptist colleges reaffirm their gratitude for the support given by Baptist through the Cooperative Program. We further reaffirm our faith in and our support of the local church, and the broad programs of our denomination.

THE CHRISTIAN LIFE COMMISSION 1975-1976

In this Bicentennial year of 1976, the attention of the nation has been focused on Christian citizenship in particular and moral issues in general. It is the responsibility to the people of God to strengthen and extend a Christian witness in a morally confused world where Christian morality is desperately needed.

Concern for Christian morality development is growing significantly among Southern Baptists. An increasing number of individuals, pastors, and churches are substantially expanding their commitment to applying the gospel and their involvement in a responsible penetration of the world and permeation of society with the whole gospel of Jesus Christ.

Conferences on applied Christianity have emphasized Christian citizenship, Christian answers to family problems, public education, and moral issues of particular concern in this year of national elections.

The following five areas of Christian social concern have required the special attention of the Christian Life Commission: 1, Family life; 2, Race relations, 3, Christian citizenship; 4, Economics and daily work; and 5, Special moral concerns. In these and many other ways, the Christian Life Commission continues its task of helping changed people to change the world.

1975-1976

The old cliché "Nothing is constant but change" is apropos to the work of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association for the year 1975-76. Change seems to have been the predominant thing in the departments, the general work and among the personnel.

Personnel changes reflect both internal and external movement. Among those changing positions within the Association were Walter Middleton, the Director of Missions, who resigned this position and became pastor of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Church.; Wesley Hooper left Dietz Memorial to locate at Dicks Creek; Cecil Davis moved from Tuckaseegee to Jarrett Memoria; Paul Carden went from Big Ridge to New Hope; Hardin Nicholson changed from New Hope to Rockdale; Hazen Pangle returned to Long Branch; while Jim Cogdill went from Unity to Wilkesdale. New comers to the Association were John Bunn, Sylva First; John Spencer, Buff Creek; Charles Shuler, Big Ridge; and Douglas McFadin, Shoal Creek. Frank Anderson became Chaplain at the C. J. Harris Hospital. Ordained and accepting pastors were Delos Blanton, Jr., Johns Creek and Earl Holden, Moses Creek. Glenn Nations became pastor for Unity, and Virgil Cook moved to Wilmont. While this may present a picture of 49 churches as a checker board with ministers jumping hither and yon, we know God's plan called each to make the move he did and God has blessed. For those who remained stable we think of Gibran when he said, "For even as He loves the arrow that flies, so He loves also the bow that is stable."

Change in the departments has also made for progress. Since most of these will be found in the reports from the various departments this report will make no effort to give detail. Each department was headed by a strong leader or director. Each department functioned and while some did not make as much progress as the leaders wished all departments did push forward.

The Deacons-Pastors have met quarterly under the leadership of Conrad Burrell and have probably eaten more than any other department. They have "eating meetings." The Ministers Fellowship, chaired by Dan Ward has met monthly in various churches. They have had a series of good programs under the direction of J. D. Wyatt and have enjoyed their own fellowship so much that they have finally let their wives join in. Next year they will be known as the "Baptist Ministers-Wives Fellowship" and will meet at the Lovedale Church on a regular basis.

"M" night was held in November under the Leadership of Ray McCall. Ray has some interesting plans for the Church Training Workers this coming year. The Missions Committee met on a regular quarterly schedule with a special called meeting to set some new goals. Read the Mission Report to get these details. C. H. Greene served as Chairperson for this group. The Executive Board has functioned effectively. These fellows have had some hard "nuts" to crack. Most problems either have been or are being solved in a satisfactory manner. The Simultaneous Revival and the Preachers' Revival were the outgrowth of the Evangelism Committee under the direction of Bruce Alexander. The good effects of these two undertakings have left their marks on the life of the Association. While the Brotherhood did not accomplish a great deal on the Associational level it did sponsor the organization of some new groups. Bruce has good plans and ideas for the coming year. The Sunday School work is ready for a big "take off" this year. Brother Greene, director, sponsored two Sunday School clinics in addition to making some definite plans to put action into the upcoming "Action Program."

Dan Ward had great success with the Vacation Bible School. Most of this workers attended the State Clinic in Wingate and returned to put on the clinic in this Association as well as one in Cherokee. "The best yet" is the term still being heard to describe the Tuckaseegee clinic. Rev. and Mrs. Paul Carden worked hard to get the youth work coordinated. Two clinics were held—one for the people who work with the youth and the other an Associational Rally led by the Rhymes with Reasons at Sylva First.

The WMU sponsored successfully the weeks of prayer for Foreign, Home and Association Missions. A WMU organization was started at Little Savannah. The annual meeting was held at Old Savannah Church with Mrs. Corbitt as speaker.

The Finance Committee under the leadership of Lewis Keener has done a good job. They have initiated a two signature check signing procedure as well as a monthly financial report. Churches have been encouraged to give monthly and to give generously. Several have res-

ponded and perhaps more will as the new budget year becomes effective.

Still another change was made and that was in the location of the Associational Office. The office moved from Scotts Creek Church, which has very generously provided space and facilities over several years, to an office above the Nantahala Light and Power Company. If you haven't visited us here please do. This summer we can really extend to you a "warm" welcome.

All leaders and Committee chairmen are to be commended for the excellent way in which they have carried out their responsibilities. They have really been the "spokes" in the Association "wheel" and have kept it moving forward. More reports have been turned in on time than usual. Church clerks, too, deserve a word of special praise for they have been unusually responsive.

It has been a good year in many respects. YOU the people—for you are the Association—have done what has been done and to you goes the credit. We are moving and we want to keep going. As we enter another Associational year let us remember 2 Timothy 2:15—"Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth."

STATE MISSIONS

Through State Missions our Baptist Churches support fifty-one different ministries. Briefly, here are three of them:

STUDENT SUMMER MISSIONS. "I want to sit in your lap." These are the words of a five-year-old girl named Candyce to a student summer missionary.

"When there are a dozen children around you it is difficult to limit yourself to just one five-year-old girl, said this student working at a Baptist Mission center.

The student later learned that Candyce's mother had died of cancer 18 months earlier, and

her actions were not a demand for attention, but a cry for love. Because of the funds you help provide there are more than 400 college young people sharing the love of Jesus across North Carolina this summer.

DEAF MINISTRIES. Charles was so lonely as a young deaf child he tried to teach his puppy sign language. Unhappy and frustrated he withdrew further and further into his silent world. Then Charles accepted Christ as Saviour and Lord while attending a camp for deaf people.

Later Charles Pearson became a deacon of Liberty Grove Baptist Church of North Wilkesboro, and recently he was ordained to the gospel ministry. He works across the state assisting North Carolina Baptists in reaching seven thousand silent friends.

FRUITLAND BAPTIST BIBLE INSTITUTE: Robert would fall into the "typical" category among his 220 fellow students; thirty-six years old, married (three children), a high school graduate, and a pastor for a number of years. He lives near the church he has served for three years, and commutes 88 miles a day to the Institute near Hendersonville. Fruitland is the State Convention's training center for men and women called to Christian service but unable to attend college and seminary. This ministry, too, is supported by State Missions.

TRUETT BAPTIST CAMP REPORT 1975-1976

Monday, June 28, 1976 was a historic day for the Truett Baptist Camp. On that day 102 campers registered for the third girls week of the season. Three years ago one-third of this number would have been considered a very acceptable week.

Furthermore, even a year ago handling a group this size would have been out of the question, but during this past year you helped make it possible to build a new cabin and double the size of another one. God is opening new doors of opportunity for us, and we are grateful for the way you have stood by us as we seek to walk through them.

Although there has been progress, we need you more now and in the years ahead than even in the past. Let me share with you some of our more pressing needs. Except for outdoor meals, the girls are eating in shifts because we do not have tables or serving trays to feed but half of this number. During the worship services a number are sitting on tables or on the floor because we have only 81 chairs. And during this third week more than a dozen slept on the floor since we do not have sufficient beds. Our camp pastor is commuting from home because the guest building is occupied by the missionary and we do not have a place to lodge him. How fine it would be if he could be in camp 24 hours a day.

It would also mean much if we could construct an outdoor worship center and we have pressing needs for repairs to the swimming pool. We know that you love Truett Camp just as we do and that you will be supporting us with your prayers, gifts and young people.

The records available for this past year may not be exactly correct, but the ones I have indicated that the following churches from this association gave financial donations: Greens Creek, Lovedale, Ochre Hill, Shoal Creek, Sylva First, and Webster. I hope that by this report time next year many others will be added to this list. We continue to be very thankful for the way God is blessing us through this avenue of ministry.

PROPOSED BUDGET FOR 1976-1977

As of June 30, 1976 we have a balance of \$2,051.60 in the General Fund and \$76.57 in the Special Designated items. All current bills are paid. Please note the two added budget items.

A total of 35 churches gave gifts to the General Fund with 8 of these giving on a monthly basis—see * items. Sixteen churches contributed directly to the Minute item.
