## PROCEEDINGS.

Benson, N. C., November 9th, 1905.

The third annual session of the Johnston County Baptist Association convened this morning at eleven o'clock with Benson Baptist church.

The services opened with the singing of "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name." Prayer by Bro. A. A. Pippin. Hymn "Close to Thee." Prayer by Bro. B. G. Early. Hymn "Revive Us Again."

The Introductory Sermon was preached by Bro. C. W. Blanchard. Text: Luke 24:48. Subject: "The Church of Christ with Power."

In a few words the Association was welcomed to Benson by the pastor, Bro. J. W. Suttle. Announcements were made and the benediction was pronounced by Bro. S. F. Conrad.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Association was opened with prayer by Bro. A. A. Pippin.
The body was called to order by the Moderator, Bro. R. H. Gower.

Upon motion the following Committee on Credentials and Enrollment was appointed: Brethren N. W. Smith, C. W. Blanchard and C. H. Holland.

Upon motion, the rules were suspended and the following officers re-elected for the ensuing year, by acclamation:

The election of Treasurer was postponed for the present.

Upon motion, section 10 of the Constitution was amended by striking out the words "a Historian" in second line, and all the words in the last clause of the same section.

#### REPORT ON AGED MINISTERS' RELIEF.

When Christ called the Apostles to preach the Gospel He called them from their boats and nets—their only means of obtaining a temporal support. He sent them out without purse or scrip, saying to them: The laborer is worthy of his hire. Paul tells us that they who preach the Gospel should live of the Gospel. By the teaching of many scriptures God makes it the duty of the people to support the gospel preacher. But what of the men who have worn themselves out in the ministry and are unable to render further services? We can't fatten and beef them as we would an ox. Should we treat them as the negro does his mule when his strength has failed, the winds cold and the grass dry and tough, turn him out to graze for his living or starve and die? No, we can not and will not fail to care for the men who have given their lives for our good and God's glory.

Twenty-four of our aged preachers or their widows are now being helped. They receive from twenty-four to sixty-five dollars per year, according to their needs. We raised last year for this object a little over two thousand dollars. We ask that the churches enlarge their pledges to this object, as the demand grows greater each year.

We therefore recommend the Biblical Recorder, the recognized organ of North Carolina Baptists, to the brethren, and request them to aid in widening its circulation and enlarging its usefulness.

We also recommend the North Carolina Baptist, which is doing a great work along its line. We most heartily recommend Charity and Children, the representative of our Orphanage, to all the friends of benevolence. We also recommend that we support the Foreign Mission Journal and the Home Field. They are good journals and worthily represent the objects for which they stand.

We also want our churches to see to it that our Church Messenger be

most earnestly supported by all the churches in the Association.

We, above all, recommend that our brethren do not allow their families to read the cheap, trashy literature that is sent all over the country to support advertising interests. It does much harm and no good.

#### REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

The field of the Home Mission Board is divided into a number of distinct departments, and its work is largely co-operative. Nearly all the States. find that the resources of the State Mission Boards are insufficient to adequately supply the destitution within their own borders, and so the Home Board supplements the work done by the State Boards.

Among the special departments: Cities, The Negro, Mountain Missions

and Schools, Cuba and Frontier Missions.

This has been a year of enlargement with the Home Mission Board. "Enlargement" has been the keynote of the year's work. Every department has been vibrant with the expanding idea. At Nashville, in 1904, the Convention said to the Home Board: "Through you and by the help of God, we shall take this Southland, for the Baptists go forward." It was enough. At

once the Board increased its appropriations fifty per cent. over any

God's favor in a very marked degree has been upon the working forces in the fields. Many have been led to Christ and a deepening spirit of consecration to our Lord has been reported from many directions.

In Cuba baptisms have been frequent. In the territories there have been many notable revivals. Baltimore, Memphis and New Orleans have been greatly stirred by the generous help of the Home Board, to say nothing of St. Louis, Kansas City, Galveston and other cities.

We quote a few figures from the report of 1905: Missionaries, 718; Baptisms, 10,551; additions by letter, 10,019; total additions, 20,570. Increase:

Missionaries, 102; baptisms, 3,025; by letter, 749; total, 3,773.

The receipts of the Home Board were \$145,705.31, an increase of \$12,147.31. Church Building Loan Fund-Church buildings are an essential force to successful work. Our Secretary, Dr. Gray, says the Home Board needs a great loan fund of not less than \$500,000. He further says that in many districts—especially in Texas, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Louisiana and Indian Territory—our cause is well-nigh paralyzed for lack of suitable houses.

Work Among the Negroes-Dr. A. J. Barton is Field Secretary and Superintendent of Negro Work. The wisdom of Dr. Barton's appointment has been abundantly justified by the zeal and tact with which he has labored, both in connection with the negro work and advancing the general interests

of the Board.

Rev. M. P. Hunt, who was Field Secretary for the Western territory, says: "The rapid growth along material lines in Oklahoma and Indian Territory calls for hard work to keep the destitution from growing. For every new

town we enter two more spring up, calling loudly for help.

Mountain Missions and Schools—Rev. A. E. Brown, the splendid superintendent of this department, says that he finds the mountain people awakening to their conditions and ready to co-operate in efforts to help them. Eighteen schools in North Carolina, Tennessee and Kentucky are now directly connected with the Home Board, having an enrollment of about 4,000 pupils and employing 75 teachers. Two schools in Georgia and one in Alabama are being assisted, and South Carolina has asked the Board to take charge of its mountain school work.

Immigration—A great many influences are now on foot to turn the stream of immigrants southward. One of the highest tests ever put upon Southern Baptists will come with the tide of immigration. We must meet them with

the Gospel of Christ.

Cuba—The Home Board has work at eleven places in Cuba, but Havana is the stronghold. Havana contains one-sixth of the population of the whole island, and everything unites to encourage more aggressive work on the part of our people.

New Fields-Isle of Pines and Panama. The former is to become another link in the chain of our missions, extending from Tampa, Key West and Havana on to Panama, and from it adjacent islands may be reached.

Your committee begs leave to recommend that we increase our pledges

at least fifteen per cent. over what we gave this year.

We also recommend that all our pastors be asked to urge their members to subscribe for and read Our Home Field. Respectfully submitted, J. W. SUTTLE, for Committee.

### Bro. M. L. Kesler, of the Thomasville Orphanage, read the

#### REPORT ON ORPHANAGE.

As a denomination we have had twenty years' experience in Orphanage work. Our Orphanage at Thomasville during this time has cared for 890 helpless children. From nothing the work has grown until we now have near 400 acres of land, nine dormitories for the children, an infirmary for the sick, a central school building, a central dining hall (known also as the Faircloth Building), printing office, workshops, homes for the general manager and treasurer. The force of the Orphanage is composed of about twenty-five people. These and the children share in the work. One-half the Orphanage goes to school in the morning, the other half in the afternoon. Feeding and clothing the children is a very important part of the work; but the training of the children we regard as the main work of the institution. The task of the Orphanage is to take children deprived of their natural protectors, lift them from their helpless and hopeless condition and put them on their feet, so that they may take their proper stand among men. We have 280 now and will soon have over 300. The expense grows heavier every year as the number of children increases. The large debt upon the institution was brought about mainly through the water works and sewerage systems, which are now in full operation.

That the increased daily expenses may be met and this debt be paid your committee recommends that a Thanksgiving or Orphanage service be held in every church, and that the churches, if possible, double their pledges and contributions for the next year. M. L. KESLER,

#### REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

The Lord has greatly blessed us this year, and we report the most prosperous year in the history of our work. There have been 164 additions to the

Bro. A. A. Pippin has served White Oak and Corinth. At White Oak there have been twenty-one additions, and at Corinth ten. White Oak has become self-sustaining and the work is prospering at each of these churches.

Bro. D. F. Putnam has preached at Pisgah, Johnson's School House, Hood's Grove, Pauline, Blackman's Grove, Trinity and Four Oaks. Fifty additions have been made to the churches on his field. Blackman's Grove will no longer ask the Association for help. Repairs have been made at Trinity Church; a good house of worship has been built at Hood's Grove, and a building is in course of construction at Pauline.

Bro. R. W. Horrell has been preaching at Parrish Memorial, Carter's Chapel, Micro, Kenly, Princeton, Woodard School House, Nobles' Chapel and Bethel. There have been fifty-seven additions on this field. Parrish Memorial church has been enlarged. At Carter's Chapel the house has been plastered and otherwise improved. Princeton church has been remodeled and greatly improved. Micro Church is in course of construction and most of the lumber has been hauled for Bethel Church.

Bro. B. G. Early has for the past few months had charge of Live Oak, Oliver's Grove, Pine Level, Sardis and a school house near Sardis. Bro. J. W. Smith supplied a part of this field and did good work before Bro. Early

came and took charge. At Live Oak there have been six additions and at Pine Level twenty have been added. We need more money and at least one more preacher to do the work as it should be done.

#### REPORT ON THE CHURCH MESSENGER.

We, your Committee on The Church Messenger, ask leave to report as follows: We find by consulting the business manager that the paper is not as yet on a paying basis and that there is a debt, which the report of the business manager will show, which report we recommend to be read before

the Association. Your committee realizes the need of some medium of communication, and believe it will be unwise to discontinue the paper, as it promises soon to be self-supporting. After consulting some of the leading brethen, we most earnestly recommend that a joint stock company be formed, or that individuals become responsible for the financial support of the paper, and that the Mission Board be relieved of the present responsibility.

#### REPORT ON TEMPERANCE

It has been very popular to pass resolutions and to memorialize legislative bodies against the accursed liquor traffic in our beloved State. Our resolutions and memorials have been enacted into law and we stand to-day on trial. Yes, prohibition will stand or fall according to our faithfulness in executing the temperance laws upon our statute books.

Those who have wrought in the battle of putting Johnston county in the prohibition column deserve great honor. We all have great reason to rejoice, but we must not slacken our pace. The liquor dealers are organized and are fighting most bitterly our every progress. The day of resolutions is passed. We must execute.

We most urgently insist that the time has come for all church members to desist from the use of alcoholic drinks as a beverage, and thereby lending their influence to this, the greatest enemy of the home, church, State and industry.

Bro. C. W. Blanchard offered the following resolutions:

"Resolved, That we, the delegates and members of the Johnston County Baptist Association, do hereby express our universal condemnation of the liquor traffic and desire that our next Legislature assembled submit to the qualified voters of the State an amendment to our State Constitution totally abolishing the manufacture and sale of liquor from the State.

"Resolved, second, That we demand of Congress the passage of the bill known as the Hepburn-Dolliver Bill, prohibiting the nullification of the laws of one State by the brewers and distillers of another by the shipment from those outside States of liquors intended for sale in violation of local or the State laws of another. And that until such time as the entire internal revenue system of partnership with the traffic has been abolished we favor the passage of the International Reform Bureau's measure, known as the Humphreys Bill, to prohibit the issuing of Federal liquor tax receipt in no-license territory."

After being discussed by Brethren D. F. Putnam and C. W. Blanchard, the report, together with the resolution, was unanimously adopted.

#### REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

The State Mission Board began its work seventy-five years ago. The results amply justify the wisdom of our fathers in this great undertaking. Accurate statistics were not given by the missionaries until 1882, just twenty-two years ago. From these statistics were gathered the following interesting figures:

Number baptized by our missionaries, 27,605. Churches organized on mission fields, 754. Houses of worship built on mission fields, 746.

Amount paid for building houses of worship, \$114,061.74. Number of Sunday schools organized by the missionaries, 742.

There are in the State 1,792 Missionary Baptist churches. Seven hundred and fifty-four—nearly three-sevenths of these—were organized by the missionaries of the Board within the last twenty-two years. It would be safe to say that at least half the churches in North Carolina were organized by the missionaries of the Board. It is no exaggeration to claim that three out of every four dollars which go into the Lord's treasury for carrying on His work are contributed by churches that were organized by beneficiaries of our Board.

As much as has been done, much still remains to be done. A large area

As much as has been done, much still remains to be done. A large area of rich, virgin soil remains untouched. There are five counties in the State with only one preacher to the county, and that one would not be there were the not supported in large part by the Board. There are four county-seats in

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no one of which there is a Baptist church or a Baptist preacher. Many new towns are yet unoccupied, and are making urgent appeals to the Board for help. Many of the towns which the Board aided in establishing the first church are now asking for help for one or more mission points. This is due to the rapid growth of many of our towns. "Let us go up and possess the land, for we are abundantly able to take it."

The fields are white unto harvest. Everywhere in pagan and papal lands the doors are wide open to us, and the cry for help is urgent. The labors of our missionaries are abundantly blessed. Hundreds and thousands are hearing the gospel and heeding its call to repentence for sins and faith in Jesus Christ. Evidenced from the urgent calls of the hour from all the fields for laborers, and the signal blesssing attendant upon the service of our missionaries, this is indeed God's set time to bless the nations of the earth. Surely this is the day of our great opportunity to answer the call of duty. Shall we of the Johnston County Baptist Association not rise up in this God's day of willingness and do valiant service for the triumph of the truth everywhere? Let us here and now answer this call by enlarged liberality to the Foreign Mission Board for the prosecution of its work. Let us study the Word and the work until we have a quickened intelligence of better demands upon us Let us pray for the success of the workers on the field and make hearty offering of some of our own sons and daughters to go far hence to tell the sweet story of the Christ we love.

#### REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

The condition of the Sunday school work in our Association is very encouraging. From the letters sent up to this Association we find that there are 26 Sunday schools in our bounds, with a total enrollment of 2,340, a gain of 581 over last report, or a gain of 33 per cent. in enrollment. All the churches in the Association have Sunday schools except nine.

The contributions for Sunday school work show a gratifying increase

over last year—an increase of 32 per cent.

We recommend that during the coming year each church make a determined effort to organize a Sunday school; that all strive to incease the attendance; that the work be made more efficient on the part of the superintendents and teachers, and thus more useful to the community.

As churches, God calls upon us and expects us to do our duty in this respect. The duty of teaching, and especially teaching the young, stands out distinctly in the original constitution of the Church of God. Moses, acting under divine sanction, rehearsed the laws of Sinai, and with equal authority he said: "These words which I command you this day shall be in thine heart and thou shall teach them diligently to thy children."

Your committee desires to express its gratification in the splendid work being done by our State Sunday School Secretary, Bro. Hight C. Moore, and through the Association to invite him to come into our midst as often as may be consistent with his duty to other sections, and to assure him of our readiness to co-operate most heartily with him.

#### REPORT ON EDUCATION.

The success of a free government rests upon the intelligence of the people, hence the subject of education is always paramount. It is declared in our State Constitution that, "Religion, morality and knowledge, being necessary to good government, schools and the means of education shall forever be encouraged."

"To live completely" is doubtless the object of man's creation, and the true mission of life, the performance of duty to self, to fellow-man and to God. Therefore, the highest conception of the parent and the State is to give every boy and girl a liberal Christian education. To accomplish the great purposes of the State, power to control environments must be given the individual man and woman.

We recognize with pride that our public schools have been greatly improved. The funds for the four-months term given by the State and counties in many places have been supplemented by special taxes. The result is more beautiful and comfortable school buildings have been erected; longer school terms and a higher grade of teachers have inaugurated a higher grade of public education. With the advent of these high grade public schools, rural libraries and rural mail deliveries, brighter days will soon dawn in our State.

To aid the public schools in universal education, Christian schools in the State are flourishing as never before. It is the pride of the Baptists that more than thirty denominational academies and high schools serve to feed the Baptist male and female colleges. Wake Forest has become one of the greatest powers in North Carolina, not only in the educational and religious life, but in the political, scientific and social life. Each year this great institution grows stronger and its Christian influences more strengthened upon the Commonwealth. Especially the young men who are there preparing for the ministry should be liberally aided by all Baptists.

The female colleges are more largely attended than ever before. The Baptist University for Women has surpassed the expectations of its founders, and the Chowan Baptist Female Institute at Murfreesboro and the Female Seminary at Oxford are the pride of North Carolina Baptists. They should have the patronage of the denomination.

Your committee again recommends the establishment of a Baptist denomi-

national preparatory school in the bounds of the Johnston County Baptist Association as early as practicable.

Resolved, That we hereby recommend the formation of a church building association within our territory, whose executive committee shall be the Executive Committee of the Association, and whose members shall be those persons or churches who shall agree to forward to the call of the Executive Committee the sum of one dollar each at any and all times when in the judgment of said committee such help is needed in the continuation of or to finish church houses in destitute places on our territory.

Upon motion, the Clerk was instructed to have one thousand copies of the Minutes printed and distributed as per the amounts sent up for this purpose by the several churches, and that he be allowed ten dollars for his services.

The Association then adjourned till 7 o'clock. Benediction by Bro. Townsend.

#### SATURDAY—NIGHT SESSION.

Session opened with prayer by Bro. H. L. Hall.

Bro. B. Townsend preached from text, Hebrews 2:3. Subject: "A Great Salvation."

The report of the Finance Committee was read and accepted.

Fearing that there was not a sufficient amount sent up for Minutes and Clerk a collection of \$3.26 was taken to supplement this fund.

Upon motion of Bro. C. W. Blanchard, the Treasurer's report was referred to the Executive Committee, with the request that they go over the Treasurer's books with him and that they have report printed in the Minutes.

Upon motion, the Constitution was amended by adding the word

"Auditor" after the word "Treasurer" in line 2, section 10, and

further amended same section by defining his duty.

He was followed by Brethren M. H. Jones, J. W. Suttle and J. P. Canaday, who made short talks on the different phases of the Sunday School work.

At eleven o'clock Bro. C. W. Blanchard preached a very able sermon, using as a subject, "Daniel, the Hero of Babylon." There was an overflow meeting and Bro. D. F. Putnam preached to a good congregation at the Methodist church. A collection of \$10.19

was taken for State Missions.

Note.—Other Pledges for State Missions 1904-'05, \$100.50. Other Pledges for State Missions 1905-'06, \$417. Three churches fell below their Pledges in contributions \$32.84. Thirteen churches contributed just what they pledged. Seventeen churches exceeded their Pledges in contributions \$431.02. Three churches pledged \$45.30 less than a year ago. ## CONSTITUTION

OF THE

#### JOHNSTON COUNTY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

1. The Association shall be known as the Johnston County Baptist Association.

2. Its object shall be to extend the privileges of the Gospel and liberal culture to all the people within its bounds, and by hearty co-operation with the Baptist State Convention to help offer these privileges to all mankind in and out of its bounds, by the cordial co-operation of all the churches constituting this body.

3. It shall be composed of the pastors in active service in the Association and such delegates as shall be annually elected by the churches connected with it, each church being entitled to three delegates, unless the membership shall exceed fifty, and then an additional delegate for every twenty-five members, provided no church shall have more than eight delegates.

4. The New Hampshire Declaration of Faith shall be the summary of Divine Truth for determining questions of faith and order in this body, and the churches desiring membership in it must commit themselves to the substance of it, together with the covenant therewith submitted, and this Constitution.

5. This Association shall not have power to annul the discipline or exercise authority over any church connected with it, but it may advise with and sever its connection with any church that neglects to preserve Gospel order, or that treats with contempt the objects or advice of the Asociation.

6. Each church shall send to the annual meetings of the Association a letter (the blanks to be furnished by the clerk of the Association), carefully filled as per blank suggestions, stating the full work of the church for the year ending with the close of the month previous to the one in which the Association is held.

7. The Association shall foster State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Christian Education, the Aged Ministers' Relief Board, the Thomasville Orphanage and the Sunday School Board, and each church shall be requested to contribute to the support of these objects annually.

8. Missions and education shall have precedence in their claims upon the consideration of this body in its regular sessions.

9 Whenever a church shall fail to be represented by delegates or letter at the annual sessions of the Association inquiry shall be made for the cause and efforts shall be made to induce such church to do its duty, and the effort shall be continued till the church is recovered or dropped from the roll.

16. The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Vice-Moderator, a Clerk, a Treasurer and an Auditor, elected annually by ballot from among its members, to serve until their successors shall have been elected, and to perform the duties usual to such officers, namely, the Moderator, in presiding over the meetings, or the Vice-Moderator in his absence; the Clerk in recording and preserving minutes and other papers belonging to the body; the Treasurer in receiving and disbursing funds belonging to or entrusted to the body according to its will; the Auditor to examine the Treasurer's books at each meeting of the Association and report the same before adjournment.

11. The Association shall appoint annually an Executive Committee of five (5) from its members, who shall be entrusted with the prosecution of Missions in the Association and any other work for the interest of the Master's Kingdom which may be referred to them. This committee shall, as far as possible, co-operate with the State Mission Board in supplying the destitution in our territory, and between the meetings of the Association

take such actions as may seem to them advisable for the advancement of its interest. The committee shall present to the Association at its annual meeting a report of its proceedings, with the names of the missionaries supported on the field, time of service and details of their work, together with such recommendations as in the judgment of the committee the Association should follow in planning its subsequent work.

12. The annual sessions of the Association shall begin on Thursday after the first Lord's Day in November at such place as may be chosen, and an introductory sermon shall be delivered on the first day of the session. Representatives from a majority of the churches constituting the Association shall be a quorum.

13. This Constitution may be amended at any annual session by a two-

thirds vote of all the members present.

14. Provision shall be made at each annual Association for a session of the Woman's Central Committee, and all other necessary encouragement offered for the enlargement of the organized work of the Woman's Missionary Societies in the local churches. The proceedings of the Woman's Central Committee shall be recorded as a part of the Minutes of the Association.

#### BY-LAWS.

1. The daily sessions of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. Delegates shall be recognized by letters from their churhces designating them as such.

3. The Moderator shall recognize corresponding messengers or the delegates of newly-received churches by extending to them his right hand.

4. The report of the Executive Board and the Missionary Work of the Association shall take precedence of all other business during the morning session of the second day of the annual session.

5. The Clerk shall record and read the proceedings when called for, superintend the publication and distribution of the Minutes, preserve a file of them, and have it present at each annual session, and deliver to his successor all papers belonging to the body.

6. Members desiring to speak shall first rise and address the Moderator; shall use the term "brother" in speaking to each other; shall not speak on the same subject more than twice without permission, and shall observe the courtesy that becomes Christians.

7. Members shall not absent themselves from the session without permission.

8. The roll of members shall be called at least once and absentees marked.
9. Corresponding messengers and visiting brethren shall be invited to

seats, with privilege of speaking, but not of voting.

10. A copy of the Minutes shall be sent to the Secretary of the State Mission Board, the Secretary of the Southern Baptist Convention, the American Baptist Publication Society, 1420 Chestnut street, Philadelphia; the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention and the Thomasville Orphanage.

11. All questions of order not herein provided shall be decided by Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law.

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
