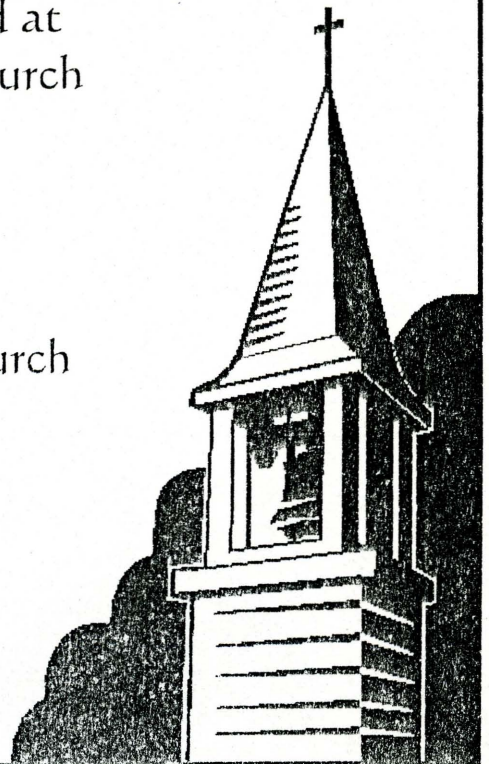


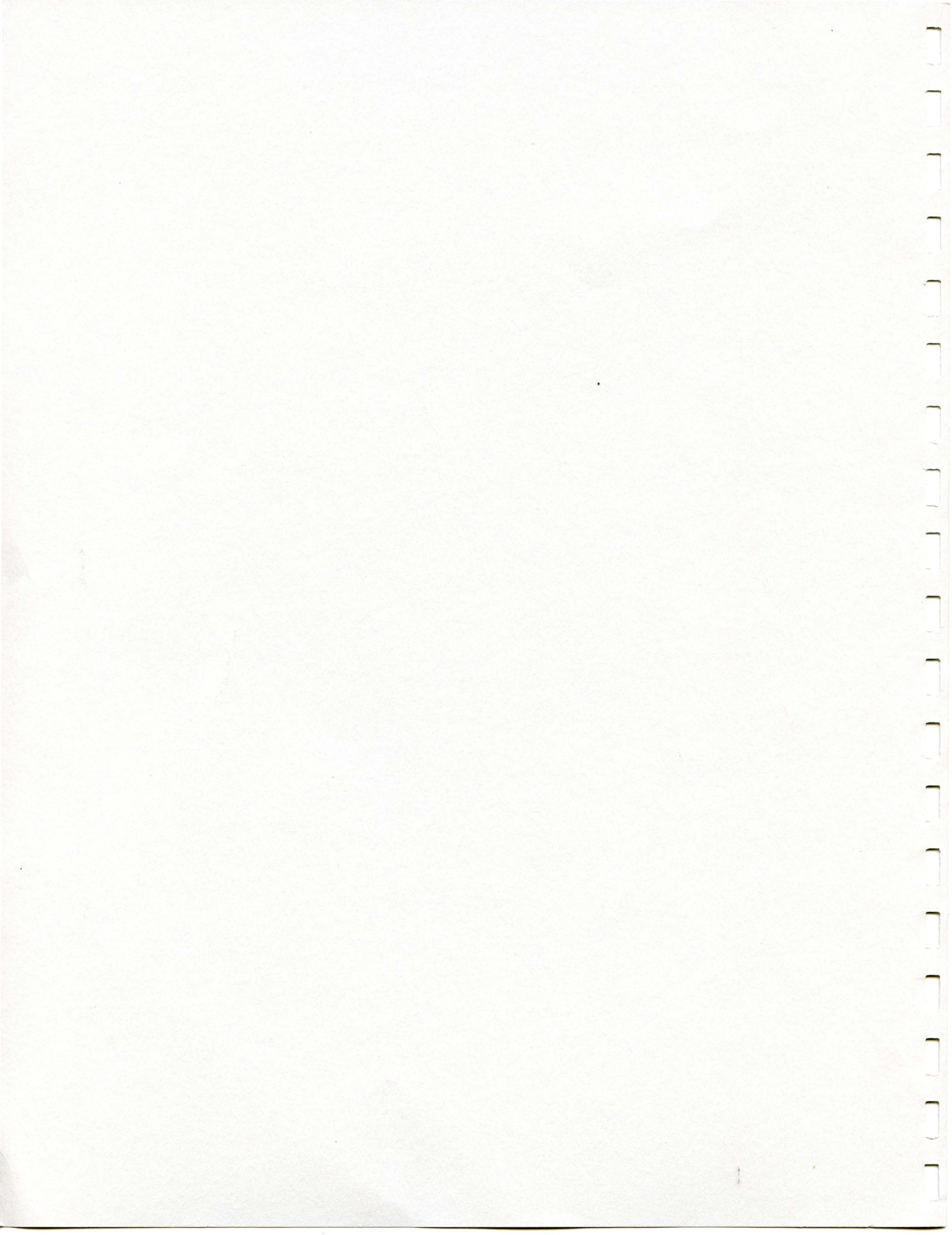

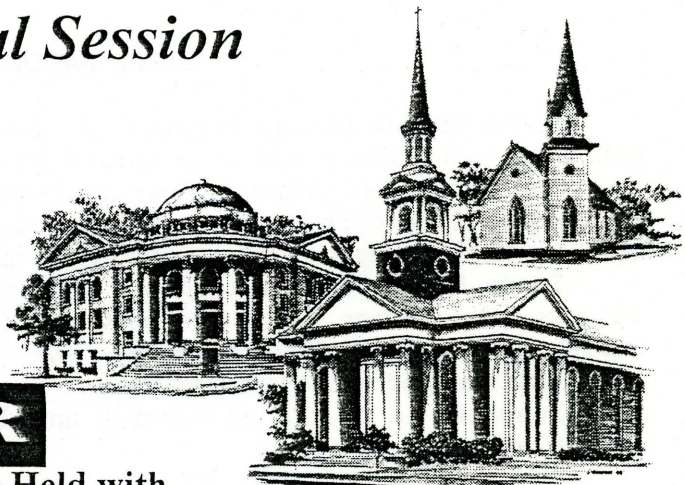

IRENE MARIAH BISHOP HOOPER

Irene Mariah Bishop Hooper is one of eight children born to Grover and Mattie Morgan Bishop and is a native of Jackson County.

She married D. Elmer Hooper in 1941 and they reared two children, E. Carl Hooper and Sandra Irene Brinson (now deceased). They have four grandchildren and one great grandchild. Last year they celebrated their 55th Wedding Anniversary.

Irene became a Christian at the tender age of 10 and has been a faithful follower ever since. She was baptized in the Tuckaseigee River and joined the Cullowhee Baptist Church where she was nurtured and disciplined. A caring congregation and a loving Christian family greatly influenced her life and this has resulted in a life of service and dedication to Jesus Christ through her church and community.

She is a graduate of Cullowhee High School and has studied at various colleges and universities near where she lived including; University of Virginia, University of Richmond, Strayers Business College, and Southwestern Community College.

For many years her family lived in Northern Virginia where she retired as staff supervisor from Chesapeake & Potomac Telephone Co. of Washington, DC. after thirty years of service. She has also been a Receptionist at Columbia Baptist Church, Falls Church, Va; Real Estate Associate; the Manhattan Project, Oak Ridge, TN. and was a movie extra for two films, The Fugitive and Paradise Lost.

She has done extensive community volunteer service including: Red Cross Board of Directors; past President and Secretary for the Jackson County Historical Association; Secretary for Habitat for Humanity Board of Directors; past President and Secretary of the Senior Center; and is Coordinator of the Golden Age Creative Writing Class which recently published their second book. She serves as one of two Tarheel Legislative Representatives from Jackson County.

Also she has served as Secretary for the Old courthouse Commission of Jackson County, and President of Jackson County AARP.

She has been recognized as 1994 WNC Volunteer of the Year; was named Marshal for the 1992 Jackson County Christmas Parade, and was selected as the 1994 North Carolina Mother of the Year.

Irene has been heavily involved in her church and in the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association. After retirement and returning to Cullowhee to live, they joined the Cullowhee Baptist Church where she began her spiritual pilgrimage as a young girl.

Currently she serves her church as Deacon, Outreach Director and Sunday School teacher, History Committee Chairman, and Coordinator of Meals to Homebound. In the past she has served as Sunday School Director, Vacation Bible School Director, Missions Development, and Assistant WMU Development Director.

She has served on the Executive Committee of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association and as Vacation Bible School Director, sings in the Senior Adult Choir and has served on a number of Association committees.

Her Hobbies are: painting, genealogy, doll collecting, drama, reading and writing. She has won state and national awards for her writing skills.

Her love for the Lord as expressed in her commitment and service to the local church, the association, the denomination, and the community is exemplary. It is with deep appreciation for the many lives she has blessed and for the service she has done that the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association gratefully dedicates the 1997 Annual Minutes of Irene Bishop Hooper.

IN MEMORY



E. Glenn Blanton went home to be with the Lord on June 29, 1996. He was the next to the oldest of eleven children born to Houston and Bessie Bryson Blanton. He was born in Jackson County in 1912. He accepted Christ in 1925 at Black Mountain Baptist Church.

In 1933 he married Annie Bell Shuler Blanton and their marriage was blessed with three daughters, Peggy, and twins, Dessie and Jessie. He had four living grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

He served as a bivocational pastor and a carpenter. An active churchman at Ochre Hill Baptist church, he served as a deacon and was licensed to preach. They ordained him in 1958.

He began a long and distinguished career of ministry in Jackson County first serving as supply pastor at Pine Creek Baptist Church in 1958. From 1959 thru 1963 he served as half-time pastor at New Savannah Baptist Church and helped them build a new church building. He was also at Calvary Baptist Church half time in 1960-1961. In 1963 he went to Dicks Creek Baptist Church.

He was honored by the call from his home church, Ochre Hill, and served there as Pastor from 1964-1967. He helped them build a new church building during that time. He was asked to return to Dicks Creek Baptist Church in 1970 and remained there for three years.

In 1973 he was called to pastor the Black Mountain Baptist Church where he was saved as a thirteen year old boy. He retired from there in 1991 after eighteen years as pastor, being re-elected each year on an annual call. They built a fellowship hall and went through a major renovation project on the church building during his years as pastor. It is impossible to measure the influence he had upon the people of Wayehutta Community and Black Mountain Church during those years.

He was also known for his singing talents. He sang the lead part in the Blanton Quartet along with his wife Annie Bell, an alto singer; Delos Blanton, a tenor; and Jack Cope, bass singer. He conducted numerous singing schools in Baptist Churches and taught shape note singing for Southwestern Community College in Swain county.

He was active in the Tuckaseegee Association serving on numerous committees during these years and as Vice-Moderator in 1986-1987. He was well known and respected through his thirty three years in the Association.

As a busy pastor, he learned to balance the time required for funerals, weddings, home and hospital visitation, sermon preparation, leadership in the church and work in the Association and denomination along with responsibilities of husband, father, and employee.

He was known for his keen sense of humor, quick wit and a marvelous capacity for story telling. He was known for his advice to pray about matters that require God's guidance and for his dependability and faithfulness. Duty to God, to his church and to his family distinguish his life of service.

He brought great advancement to the Kingdom of God in Jackson County Churches through a dedicated life to Jesus Christ. His love of people and his keen ability to relate to them was grounded in his own love for the Church and his spiritual maturity. He believed in churches cooperating together and this vision challenged and blessed us.

It is with deep gratitude, great joy and profound respect that the Tuckasegee Baptist Association dedicates the 1996 Annual Minutes in memory of Reverend Glenn Blanton.

PROCEEDINGS

The Tuckaseegee Baptist Association held its One Hundred Sixty-Seventh Annual Session with the Cullowhee Baptist Church on Thursday evening, October 18, 1997. The Cullowhee Church was recognized as being organized in November 1821 and is observing their 175th Anniversary this year. The Cullowhee Church was the first church to be organized in the present territory of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association. The church hosted a delicious meal.

The business session was convened by Mr. Dennis Ensley, Moderator. Reverend Harry Vance, Pastor of Rockdale Baptist Church and Associational Music Director, led in the opening hymn. Special music by the Senior Adult Choir of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association was presented. The Annual Sermon was preached by Dr. Harold Anderson, Pastor, Tuckaseegee Church.

The Moderator led in the adoption of the order of business and the book of reports. He also recognized new pastors and visitors.

Rev. Barry Almand presented the Discipleship report and announced the "M" Night will be held at Greens Creek Baptist Church this year.

Rev. Harry Vance led in a congregational song.

Mrs. Eloise Shuler presented the Senior Adult Report.

Rev. John Reid, Director of Missions, presented his annual report.

Rev. Joe Yelton, Pastor of Cullowhee Baptist Church presented a special report on the 175th Anniversary celebration of the Cullowhee Church.

In the absence of Richard Roberson, Rev. John Reid presented the Truett Camp and Conference report.

Rev. Tom Lolley, Area Missionary for the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina presented a report about the work of the State Convention.

Rev. Harry Vance led in congregational singing.

Rev. Charles Wyatt of Franklin gave the Nantahala Christian Counseling Center report. Rev. Wyatt is the Director and pastoral counselor for the center.

Paula Lumb, Executive Director of United Christian Ministries thanked Baptist Churches for financial support to this ministry and for volunteers who serve in various capacities.

Jackson County Sheriff Jim Cruzan and Patrolman Kim Hooper presented a special program on safety and security around church buildings. They also informed messengers of their availability for special safety checks if the churches requested it.

Mr. Tom Collins presented a report for the Gideon's organization.

Several Committee's presented their reports including the Nominating Committee, the Committee on Committee, the Preacher and Place Committee, the Resolutions Committee and the Memorials Committee. It was recommended and adopted that the Annual Minutes be dedicated to Mrs. Irene Hooper and the late Rev. Glenn Blanton.

The Second session of the Annual Meeting was hosted by the Zion Hill Baptist Church. The church hosted a delicious meal. Moderator, Dennis Ensley called the second session to order.

Rev. Ernie Jamison, Pastor of Zion Hill Baptist Church, led in a devotion.

Rev. Harry Vance led in a congregational song. The East Sylva Quartet provided the special music.

Mr. Gearld Stephenson, Board Chairman for Southwestern Area Resort Ministries gave a report for the ministry.

Mrs. Linda Fisher, a lay person from the Ochre Hill Baptist Church, reported on a mission trip she had taken to the Ukraine. She was part of a medical team. She also reported that Baptist Men are bringing the child of a Ukraine Pastor to the United States for medical treatment. This was her second consecutive summer trip to the Ukraine.

Rev. John Reid presented a report on his trip to the South Africa. Rev. Reid went with a group of North Carolina Baptist leaders to South Africa in February of 1996 to establish a partnership relationship between North Carolina Baptist and South African Baptist. Rev. Reid went to Bloemfontein, a regional capitol, and to Lesotho. Rev. Reid visited various churches and fields of work. He reported that the Scotts Creek Baptist Church of the Tuckaseegee Association had adopted the raising of the money to build a church in Lesotho. He challenged members of churches to go to South Africa on a mission trip.

Mr. Lyman Fisher gave a report on Disaster relief work. Several members of the Tuckaseegee Association went to Wilmington to volunteer for disaster relief after Hurricane Fran. He also reported several improvements to the Disaster Van.

Miss Junetta Pell reported on various successful activities of the Woman's Missionary Union this past year and outlined an ambitious program for the coming year. Rev. John Reid acknowledged and gave thanks to the WMU for their hosting the Pastor's Appreciation Banquet each May.

Rev. Roy Burnette, Pastor of the Jarrett Memorial Baptist Church and a member of the Finance Committee presented the Committee's report. The budget was adopted without opposition.

Mr. Jesse Flake, Associational Treasurer, gave the Financial report.

Rev. John Reid gave the Appalachian Center report. This is a satellite school of New Orleans Theological Seminary located in Murphy that offers Associate degree in religious studies.

Rev. Luther Osment presented a report on the work of the Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina.

Rev. Jack Hinson, Chaplain at Harris Regional Hospital, presented a report on behalf of the Chaplaincy Committee and the chaplaincy work at the hospital.

Mrs. Wanda Kidd presented a report of the work of the Baptist Student Union on the campus of Western Carolina University. She is the BSU Director.

Mr. Reggie Gilmore presented a report on behalf of Broyhill Children's Home.

Rev. Harry Vance led in a congregational song and then Rev. Robert Blanton, Pastor of Deitz Memorial Baptist Church, brought the Friday Annual Message.

There being no further business, Moderator Dennis Ensley, declared the meeting adjourned.

PROGRAM REPORTS

DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS REPORT

As I celebrate my fourteenth year as your Director of Missions, I am grateful to God and to you, the people of the churches of the Tuckaseegee Association, for the prayers, support, cooperation and encouragement you have given me during these years. I am grateful for the many opportunities to preach, to teach and to serve in various ways in the life of the local church.

At last year's annual meeting our Association voted to participate in the North Carolina/South African/Lesotho and Swaziland partnership. You will remember we had successful partnerships with Brazil and the Ukraine. In February of 1996 I went with a group of other Director of Missions and other Associational representatives across our state to visit South Africa and help plan the partnership.

We spent two days in Johnnasburg and seven days in Bloemfontein, RSA visiting churches and leaders to establish the partnership. We are assigned to the Central Baptist Association that is comparable in size to 1/3 of North Carolina with about 8 cities and perhaps 40 churches. Also I visited Lesotho flying into the interior of the country. There I visited a mission point and a place where we want to assist in the building of a church building.

Volunteers are needed to go to South Africa to work in the churches doing various church leadership projects. Different kinds of work is available: Sunday School, Deacon's, Youth, Music, Christian Recreation, Evangelism, Discipleship, Mission, are just some examples.

The handyman project is an ongoing project in the Association. This past year we helped an elderly Black lady by replacing a water heater in her mobile home. We also have a request to replace a door for a family with handicapped children and expect to complete this project before winter.

We also participated in a wood cutting in cooperation with the Golden Age Club this past winter and delivered several loads of firewood to Jackson County families.

Three major local mission fund drives were initiated this past year to assist families with catastrophic financial needs. Two sick children, Nick Nations and Chelsea Cowan, were assisted by special offerings received from several churches. Also over \$11,000 was raised to assist the Spurgeon Brown family to purchase a mobile home after they lost their home in a fire. The Brown family have five children, ages 3 to 11.

In May of this year, I took a group of Senior Adults to Caswell Baptist Assembly on a retreat. We are grateful to the Lovedale Church for the use of their church van.

The Christian Counseling Center we began with the Truett and Macon Associations is located in Franklin. See their report in the book of reports. We are at the place to where we must decide to financially support this ministry or lose it.

In cooperation with Harris Regional Hospital we hosted a Domestic Violence Workshop here at the Baptist Center this spring. Several pastors attended and the conference was well received.

As you know, Baptist are strong and influential in this area. It is my privilege to be called upon from time to time by various groups because of my office as Director of Missions for this Association. Currently I am serving as a Chaplain Associate with Jack Hinson and as President, of the Board of Directors for United Christian Ministries. Last year, UCM made great strides as it purchased property for its offices and opened up a new unit of work in the south end of the county.

Also I serve on the board for Camp Truett and Conference Center, SouthWestern Area Resort Ministry, and for the Nantahala Counseling Center. These are Baptist ministries.

Each year there are certain meetings that I attend that have to do with our larger Baptist family. I attended the Key leadership Conference at Ridgecrest, the DOM Conference at Wingate, a Sunday School Board Update Conference in Nashville, TN., and the annual state convention/DOM meeting in Cary.

The Annual Gardner-Webb University ministry day went well here this year. Seven churches participated by giving young men of God who are called and are spending time studying in preparation for a life of service to have the opportunity to preach in our churches.

We held a Unity service with area Black Churches in the Waynesville Baptist Association at Southwestern Community College. This was a service of racial reconciliation and an opportunity to take a public stand against hate crimes. Although it was not as well attended as I would have liked, I do consider it a great success. Plans are underway to do another service next year at the Liberty Baptist Church. The meeting got widespread coverage in the Biblical Recorder.

We sponsored an Annuity Meeting here in June for this region. The Annuity Board is making significant changes and I invited Talmadge Williams, with our state convention, to come to this area and orient us to these changes. The meeting was well attended.

Nelda and I are grateful for the prayers and financial support of the many listeners of the radio program. Although the Tuckaseigee Baptist Half-hour is not officially

linked to the Association, I do believe it is an excellent means of Bible teaching and promotion of events in the churches of the Association.

Betty Grant observed her fifth anniversary this past May 1. She does an excellent job and I appreciate all that she does.

I am grateful to the WMU for their provision for the meal to celebrate the ministry of the pastor and his family during Pastor Appreciation Sunday. I coordinated that event with Associational Emphasis Week with the hope that each church will recognize both their pastor and his importance as a key leader in the church and the Association.

I attended the Pastor, Deacon and Spouse Fellowship Conference each fourth Friday night of the quarter and enjoy those meetings of inspiration and fellowship.

Some of my most important work is done in confidential relationships with churches that are having problems. I have counseled with leaders and pastors and attended meetings by invitation of the leadership to assist in delicate situations.

I am very grateful and commend to you the officers, program leaders, committee members and others who volunteer their services and talents. The Association, like the local church is totally dependent upon volunteers to accomplish its tasks. Volunteers have contributed many hours and all of us owe them a debt of gratitude.

Churches continue to be generous in their support of Associational Missions. As is sometimes the case in the local church, special offerings impacted our receipts this past year. Churches responded generously to special needs. Yet the Association this year fell behind budget. Another factor was the rough winter and cancellations caused local church budgets and giving to fall behind. Please consider the financial needs of the Association as we seek to serve. We are happy to promote special offerings that help people in need. Be aware that we receive no money from these offerings and that they go exactly where they are designated, as they should.

There is both an understanding and an appreciation among many of the churches that our call is to minister first here in Jackson County and then to reach out beyond.

While our fellowship and cooperation is strong, there is an aspect to our church life that needs challenging. Our county population continues to grow while church attendance remains constant or slightly declining. We must never cease to reach out to win our own people to the Gospel. May God continue to bless us as we work together.

PASTOR, DEACON, SPOUSE FELLOWSHIP CONFERENCE

The Pastor, Deacon and Spouse Fellowship Conference met four times in 1995-1996.

In October, 1995 we met at the Associational office building during a severe rain storm. The meeting had been changed from East Fork Baptist Church due to sickness in their church family. One of the East Sylva Baptist Church quartets sang: Mark Haskett, Randy Bryson, Kathy McConnell, and Kitty Moore. They gave a wonderful song program. Twenty people from seven churches attended, the smallest group ever to attend.

In January, 1996 First Baptist of Sylva hosted us. Tammy Jackson of Cherokee Ministries gave the program and shared her testimony. Everyone enjoyed her remarks. Eight churches and sixty-five people were present.

Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina - 1996

Primered for excitement after three hours waiting under a bright summer sky, hundreds of spectators craned their necks and peered toward downtown Asheville June 26 when Michael Owen jogged into view - carrying the Olympic Torch on outstretched arm. Michael, one of 1,422 children Baptist Children's Homes served in 1995-96, lives at Broyhill Home in Clyde, one of 12 facilities BCH operates in North Carolina.

Smiling and waving to the crowds holding aloft tiny flags and cameras, Michael lifted the symbol of international unity and pointed to friends among those who lined the parade route.

The entire Broyhill Home campus showed up, cheering wildly. They ate picnics at the end of Michael's route, and swarmed him when he passed the flame to the next carrier - a bicycle rider.

It could have been a family reunion, or a school scene, or a re-creation for a movie on family support. But Michael, and most of his supporters, are children who have suffered unspeakable abuses at the hands of adults they trusted to care for them.

And the adults who waded into that mob scene of joy at the end of Michael's run are called of God to help young people like Michael and those who surrounded him deal with those issues, and to overcome them.

As a boy, Michael was so ashamed of his clothes he ran home from school, never stopping to make friends. Worse, he endured almost nightly beatings from his father. He was 11 years old before he realized other boys weren't beaten every night. Four years later he found the courage to tell his father he was leaving.

"Go ahead, call someone," he yelled. "Leave."

Michael left. After six months in emergency care at Mills Home in Thomasville, he established a more permanent residence at Broyhill Home. Slowly, quietly his emotions mounted within him until one night he erupted and spilled forth his story, the years of secrets and lies, to his child care worker, Betty Porter. "She stayed up with me and we talked a long time," Michael said. That was his first lesson

in trust and unconditional love.

"Broyhill has changed my life so much," Michael said. "For almost a year I didn't trust anybody, but finally I felt a calmness I know was the Lord. Here I found the Lord and now I try to live every day for Him."

Michael's story is repeated hundreds of times each year at Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina. Not all are as dramatic as a boy who grew from a punching bag to a torch bearer.

But at four residential campuses, six emergency care cottages, two homes for behaviorally troubled girls, a maternity home, a home for teenage mothers and their babies, therapeutic camping and model day care, more than 1,400 children and their families find help in a troubled time.

During the past year BCH received almost \$1.5 million through the Cooperative Program, and \$663,00 through the Thanksgiving Offering. Total church gifts of almost \$3 million comprised 26.2 percent of BCH operating revenue.

BCH is in the midst of a \$10.1 "Light Their Way" Campaign to raise money for operations, capital needs and endowment. At the halfway point in June, more than \$5.4 million had been committed to BCH through the campaign.

Although Michael carries many fond memories of Baptist Children's Homes with him as he heads for college this Fall, his earliest amaze-ments were the secure sleep he got when he laid his head down, and of receiving his first pair of Nikes so he didn't have to be embarrassed by his appearance.

Since 1834 North Carolina Baptist Colleges and Universities have been privileged to have many splendid presidents. The current presidents are listed on this page. They were elected to take the lead in dreaming, shaping and managing Baptist higher education in North Carolina.

Two colleges, Mars Hill and Chowan, have new presidents. Let us introduce them to you.

Dr. A. Max Lennon was named president of Mars Hill College, effective March 1. Both he and Mrs. Lennon (Ruth Ann) are graduates of Mars Hill. Dr. Lennon brings a rich background in business and higher education to his new task. After earning the B.S. and Ph.D. degrees at North Carolina State University, he served in the administration of Texas Tech University, the University of Missouri, Ohio State University and Clemson University, where he was the president. He comes to Mars Hill from the presidency of Eastern Foods, Inc. in Atlanta, Georgia. Dr. Lennon, an active Baptist churchman, has been a member of the National Fellowship of Baptist Men. In Atlanta they were members of the First Baptist Church in Peachtree City, where he taught Sunday School and was a member of the strategic planning committee. He is on the board of directors of numerous corporations and foundations, among them First Union Corporation and Duke Power. In accepting the presidency of Mars Hill he said, "This is a wonderful opportunity to provide leadership for this college and boldly proclaim our faith in Jesus Christ."

Dr. Stanley G. Lott moved to North Carolina in July to become president of Chowan College. He comes from Louisiana College, a Baptist school, where he was vice president for academic affairs for 15 years. Earlier he has been a faculty member at Tift College in Georgia. 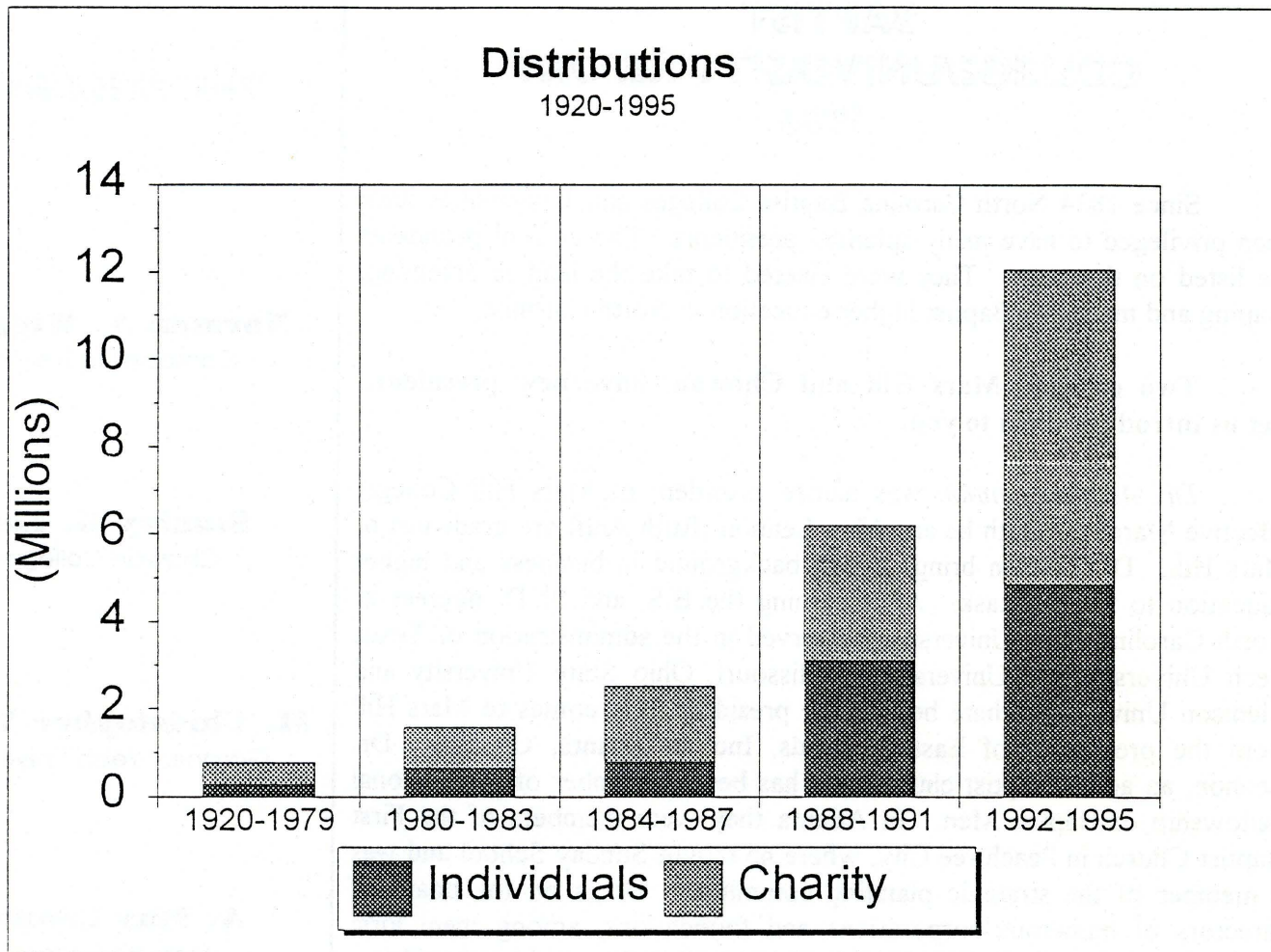

The mission of the North Carolina Baptist Foundation since its inception in 1920 has been to assist the Convention and its institutions and agencies in generating endowment to enhance their permanent financial support. The uniqueness of the ministries and services provided by the institutions and General Board staff merits increased individual collective financial support. The Baptist Foundation is committed to assisting individual church members through creative stewardship methods to provide permanent financial undergirding of these ministries.

As of December 31, 1995, the Foundation held \$55,608,452 under management. In 1995, \$3,144,471 was distributed to Baptist work and \$1,125,383 was distributed to individuals for a total distribution of \$4,269,854.

The income distributions for the entire 76 year history of the N. C. Baptist Foundation totals: \$9,673,682 income paid to individuals and \$13,458,579 to Baptist churches, institutions and mission causes for a grand historical total of \$23,132,261.

HOSPITAL HIGHLIGHTS FOR 1996

DIVISION OF PASTORAL CARE

During this year the 18 to 40 Chaplains present at various times at the Hospital made over 55,000 pastoral contacts. As of July 1, 1996, the counseling centers will be called CareNet, Inc., of The North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Inc. Over 26,000 hours of counseling were provided through the eleven centers across the state of North Carolina. Two additional centers will open in the fall of this year.

The Center for Congregational Health has, since inception in 1992, provided ministry at some level to over 225 North Carolina Baptist Churches.

Mission dollars from the Cooperative Program enabled the above ministries to be carried out and to touch thousands of lives.

BAPTIST BENEVOLENT CARE FUND

North Carolina Baptists joined us in a mutual mission through the Mother's Day Offering. We channeled every penny of the MDO, which amounted to \$461,647, to help patients who had no health-care insurance and no financial means to pay their hospital bills. We are grateful to everyone who made this ministry possible.

POINTS OF EMPHASIS AND PROGRESS

Financial Stewardship - The Medical Center is constantly seeking ways to lighten the financial burden of those who are ill. Recently the room rates were reduced by \$50 per day.

Aegis - This is an alliance of primary-care clinicians who serve patients regardless of their medical plans or HMO/PPO affiliated. "Aegis" means protection or sponsorship: Aegis Family Health Centers is a network of primary care physicians affiliated with The Medical Center. It now has 33 providers in 10 practice sites.

QualChoice of North Carolina - QualChoice is The Medical Center's managed care company. Eighteen months old, it serves approximately 30,500 enrollees, giving quality health-care and patient/physician choice.

Regional Integrated Information Network - RIDS is a regional computer network now in the pilot phases. The network allows providers in the region to exchange patient information electronically, saving time and money. RIDS is a plan which assists communities in our service area to develop a coordinated continuum of care. In this plan, primary care physicians, community hospitals, nursing homes and other patient care providers link their services with those of The Medical Center. The desired outcome is improved patient care and cost-effective services.

The J. Paul Sticht Center on Aging - The Center devotes itself to the special problems of older adults. When the center moves to its new home in 1996, its services will not only provide specialized health care but will also include a day care program for the elderly that will serve as a link between hospital and home, helping to reduce rates of rehospitalization and premature placement in nursing homes.

A CLOSING WORD

Since its founding in 1922, the Hospital has taken pride in our ministry of service. In doing so, we seek to make tomorrow's patient care and tomorrow's workplace constantly better. That has been our mission historically, and it continues to this day. I firmly believe that our best lies yet ahead, and I am committed to that reality.

REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATION--1996

The headlines each day--Bosnia, Belfast, Saudi Arabia, taxes, school funding, presidential elections, etc.--often include Southern Baptists. The secular media show special interest in our conflicts but all too often do not tell the whole story of the good things Baptists are doing.

The Biblical Recorder attempts to tell the whole story--the many positive things people are doing in their churches along with the negative issues which cannot be concealed and ignored if we honor our heritage from yesterday and fulfill our mission for tomorrow.

There is no way to address these issues without correct and reliable information. The Biblical Recorder was born and continues to serve for that purpose. In the 163 years of state Baptist papers in North Carolina, never was the Recorder more needed than now for people to have the truth. We live in an electronic media age where many think they have the answers to the issues but they do not because they do not read, only look and listen!

An informed Baptist is a better Baptist; an uninformed Baptist may be an uninvolved or disruptive Baptist. No democracy, including our local churches, can survive long without an informed, involved constituency which makes decisions based upon accurate information from reliable sources.

The Biblical Recorder should be in every Baptist home in North Carolina. Your support as a subscriber and reader, coupled with your encouragement to others, will enable the paper to better serve the constituency with accurate and helpful information.

In order to save churches large amounts of money and to increase the readership of the Recorder, Church News Service (CNS) was launched in 1990. This system lets any congregation have their church news incorporated into the Biblical Recorder which saves staff time, postage and printing costs. Usually, for less than what it costs to produce the church newsletter, CNS gives the entire Baptist communication package to each family in the congregation. Recent and anticipated increases in mailing costs make CNS a greater value in 1996-97 than when it was started in 1990.

The paper focuses more and more attention on North Carolina Baptists with news, features and inspirational articles which will encourage individuals and churches in their witness and ministry. One sure way to conquer problems and overcome the barriers to effective witness and ministry is to have the facts, know the issues and be adequately informed.

The Gideon Organization, known as the Gideons International, is composed of over **136,000** Christian professional and business men in **172** countries. The Auxiliary is numbered at over **76,000** women, (wives and widows of Gideons). With the help of the local churches here and throughout the 172 countries, The Gideons are placing an average of **one million Scriptures every nine days in 77 different languages**. Funding to purchase the Scriptures comes from three main sources: 1) Local church love offerings; 2) Memorial Bible donations; 3) The Faith Fund, (donations by individual Gideon members). All monies donated to the Gideons go to purchase Scriptures; administrative costs of the organization are paid by the individual members in the form of annual dues.

North Carolina has **4,498** Gideons and **2,399** Auxiliary members. The Jackson County Camp, one of **149** local camps in North Carolina, was started in 1982. The present membership numbers **23** Gideons and **16** Auxiliary. It has been the Camp's pleasure to share a Gideon report in numerous churches in Jackson County this past year. A total of **2,151** Scriptures were distributed during the year and Jackson County Camp received **\$13,609** from Christians of Jackson County for the purchase of Scriptures.

Nehemiah 4:6 tell us, "...the people had a willingness to work."

Mrs. Richard Bruck of Hood River, Oregon, has worked as a nurse, both in hospitals and offices, and has had numerous opportunities to use the Testament given to her by the Auxiliary. Tragedy and difficulties are often bridges of opportunity to share **God's Word**.

She vividly remembers one challenge of a very difficult, angry and even hostile patient who was dying with cancer. At any mention of Jesus, he would swear at her and tell her to take her Jesus and leave the room.

She and another nurse coveted to pray that the Lord would not let him die until he had made his peace with God and received Jesus as his Saviour. As the days went by, other hospital personnel were amazed that he continued to linger - growing weaker, thinner and less angry.

One night while she was giving him his pain medication, he looked up at her and whispered, "I wonder what Jesus will do with me." She told him, "you won't have to worry if you open your heart to receive Jesus and His forgiveness." Instead of cursing, he said "tell me more."

She was able to share the verses of salvation with him from her Nurses Testament and then asked him if he was willing to accept Jesus. He feebly nodded his head and she bent close so that she could speak directly into his ear. She asked him to pray with her, and he did. He was so weak he could barely speak, but he whispered every word of the prayer, with tears falling down his bony cheeks. As he prayed, the bitterness melted away in the presense of God's forgiveness, love, and mercy. As she hugged him she told him to look for her in heaven. In less than **48** hours, the Lord took him home.

Mrs. Bruck says, "God's Word is the key that unlocks the door of opportunity. His ways are unique and he deserves the glory. Please continue to place Scriptures."

This "**fruit of another soul**" was made possible only because faithful church members gave to purchase the Testament. A faithful Auxiliary placed the Testament and a faithful nurse witnessed. The Holy Spirit worked through God's Holy Word. All had a part in one coming to Christ. God' Word tells us in **Isalah 55:11 "So shall my word be that goeth forth out of my mouth; it shall not return unto me void, but it shall accomplish that which I please, and it shall prosper in the thing whereto I sent it"**.

CHAPLAINCY REPORT
HARRIS REGIONAL HOSPITAL & MOUNTAIN TRACE NURSING CENTER

In my ten years as Chaplain, I can't remember a time when we have had to face so much sadness in such a short period of time:

- * The unbelievably, horrible death of a five-year old boy and an elderly woman, plus a severely injured young woman.
- * Abrupt death of 32-year old hospital employee.
- * 42-year old man on vacation with his family died suddenly with a heart attack.
- * Local 56-year old man died suddenly while attending a meeting at the beginning of his work day.

I was involved in all four cases, over a period of about six weeks, driving families to Asheville and their homes, notifying loved ones with news of death, staying with families to help process the shock, praying with friends and loved ones, helping staff cope with crisis. One can easily become overwhelmed by a mountain of grief. I had to take some time off to recover and replenish my own spirit. "Jesus went off to the mountain to be alone with the Lord." If the Son of God needed time to renew his spirit, then I had better follow the same model.

Having caught a fresh vision of the Lord's love for me as his son, I was ready to plunge back into the battle. A card was on my desk from one of the nurses in the emergency room saying "You are a very special chosen person. We appreciate you very much and all your help to our patients and their families." How grateful I am for the opportunity of being in the hospital to help people face the grim realities of living.

A recent editorial in the Asheville Citizen-Times entitled "Spirituality has a place in medical care" stated some interesting facts:

- 1) In a survey, 70% of patients believed that faith and prayer can aid in recovery from illness.
- 2) 64% believed that physicians should address spiritual issues as part of their care.

Of course, we know this is true from the reading of the scripture. Jesus had a threefold ministry: Teaching, Preaching and Healing. An incident in the life of our Lord reveals the connection between the body and the soul. A paralyzed man was brought to Jesus and lowered from the roof by four friends. Jesus looked at the crippled man and said, "Your sins are forgiven." Jesus knew that guilt and shame resulting from sin are powerful enough to literally paralyze the body. He went directly to the man's problem: HIS NEED FOR FORGIVENESS. The man responded and was healed.

In January, Chaplain Hinson was privileged to attend the Outpatient Ministry Conference in Houston, Texas. Chaplains from across the United States were present to discuss ways to minister to people away from the hospital. Reaching out into the community and helping people where they are is part of a two-year project called Reengineering.

The Hospital Chaplaincy Ministry has come from the community at large since its beginning. It is a mission of the churches in the area to patients and staff and serves as a link between the hospital and the community. For more than thirty years, it has provided spiritual counsel and direction.

We are appalled and disgusted at the rising menace in our society called by various names: spouse abuse, battered children, family violence. Victims often feel abandoned and afraid, not knowing where to turn for help. Pastors and wives are at a strategic place to be helpful to people who are abused. The Hospital Chaplaincy along with REACH and the Jackson County Medical Alliance sponsored a program for pastors and wives to give them assistance in handling the problem of domestic violence. Held at the Tuckaseegee Baptist Center, forty people attended the supper meeting. Sheryl Rudd from REACH; Dr. Bill Haggard, Dean of Student Development at Western Carolina University; and Chaplain Jack Hinson presented the program. They also took the same program to Highlands-Cashiers Hospital and Angel Community Hospital in Franklin. More than 100 pastors and wives attended the two meetings. Plans include taking the program to Bryson City, Andrews, and Murphy this fall.

Dr. Hilton Seals, Chairman of the Hospital Chaplaincy Committee, appointed a Meditation Guide Committee composed of Bob Perz (Chairman), Elizabeth Graves, and Joyce Crowder. Six months and six meetings later, they produced a meditation guide with twelve articles written by pastors in the area entitled INSPIRATION. These booklets are available to patients at the hospital and at Mountain Trace Nursing Center.

The last year has been a fruitful one for the work of the chaplain at Mountain Trace. Residents have been visited on a regular basis, the monthly family support group has continued to grow, and the staff members are relying more and more on the chaplain.

In addition to the regular work, the chaplain has been called in on several occasions to minister to family and staff during the times of the deaths of residents. Many memorial services have been held at the facility, and other funeral services have been attended.

Two different series of support groups were held at the nursing home for staff. One group introduces the Hospice organization, and the other deals with grief.

The Dolphin group continues to grow. It provides a vital ministry to residents that have little contact with people in the "real world".


One of the most exciting developments is the establishing of a chapel. It is diagonally across from the 300 nursing station. It is a place for quiet reflection for residents, family members, and staff. The stained glass from the old chapel at the hospital has been placed there in front of the altar table. Also, Care Notes on various concerns are there for any needing them.

Rev. Aud Brown led the boys camp for two weeks. Ninety-seven boys attended and there were nine rededications. We thank God for the spiritual accomplishments of the summer camp. Bible study and physical activities are a very important part of the camp experience.

More physical improvements have been made at the camp this year. The roads have been paved eliminating the dust and enhancing both the appearance and comfort of the camp.

APPLACHIAN CENTER

This fall the Applachian Center located at Brasstown Baptist Church in Murphy began its third year of religious studies. This is a combined effort of the Associations in Region 10, New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary and Tri-County Community College to work together in providing formal theological education for local ministers and laymen throughout the region.

Although the school is small numerically, we are able to offer fully accredited courses leading to an associate degree in Christian Studies from a Baptist Theological Seminary.

Our center provides an excellent opportunity for pastoral education. Bi-vocational pastors may now receive valued studies at home, continue their jobs and pastor a church without extensive travel or uprooting their families in order to move to campus.

Courses cost \$200 each. This is an excellent cost compared to other college courses. The cost is greatly reduced by Cooperative Program contributions of the churches. Local churches may help offset this expenditure for your pastor by providing scholarship funds. Half scholarships are suggested, thus enabling the student to invest in his own education.

Enrollment is critical at this stage. More students must show an interest or we will not be able to keep the school here in Western North Carolina. Either Pastor or Layman is encouraged to inquire about enrollment at the Associational office.

ANNUAL REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATIONS
1996

In a recent survey released by the Family Research Council, 66% of those polled said that our country was headed down "the wrong track". When asked whether the nation's wrong direction could be attributed to the lack of jobs and economic health or a decline in moral values and family breakdown, over 60% indicated the latter. We at the Christian Action League agree that our state and nation need a restoration of biblical, moral and family values. In 1996 we were honored to assist communities in their battles for civic and moral righteousness and to promote laws in the General Assembly that have helped to restore family values to the State of North Carolina.

A. Christian Values

The Christian Action League joined with other Christian organizations to promote Christian Heritage Week in North Carolina, March 17-23. We experienced a wonderful week as presentations and commemorations were held in many churches, schools and communities across our state. The week culminated with an awards ceremony and reception for the winners of the state-wide essay contest and their families. The League provided decorations and programs for the event and hosted the reception at the State Archives and History Building in Raleigh..

The League undertook a project in association with the American Rights Coalition to distribute thousands of copies of the Ten Commandments throughout North Carolina. To date, over 5,000 copies of the 11 X 14 prints have been distributed throughout the state to individuals and churches.

B. Lottery

We saw renewed efforts to push a lottery bill through the General Assembly for a state-wide referendum. Representative Fitch introduced two lottery bills: HB 6060 (Rules Committee) and HB 838 (JII Committee). The League actively lobbied against these bills and both bills died in their respective committees. North Carolina continues to be the largest state in the nation and the only state in the Bible belt with no state-sponsored gambling. Please keep us in prayer as the League faces this battle each year.

C. Sex Education

CAL actively lobbied for HB 834, Abstinence Until Marriage, a law that mandated that abstinence until marriage be the focus in sex education in North Carolina schools and was passed in the 1995 session.. CAL and other pro-family, Christian organizations have been working with the Dept. of Public Instruction and State Board of Education in 1996 encouraging them to implement the law through abstinence-based curricula. We have also assisted communities in seeing that this law is properly implemented at the local level.

D. Homosexuality

CAL participated in efforts to get SB 1487 (No Same-Sex Marriage) passed during the short session of the General Assembly. The bill passed both houses and became law.

Alerted our members in the Winston-Salem area about the Family March on June 30 and encouraged them to notify their churches to participate. This march was in response to the homosexual community march held in that city. The Family March attendance was estimated at 8,000.


E. Abortion

The League actively supported Representative Decker's HB 624, a Woman's Right to Know. This bill would have required the doctor to share vital information with the patient about the risks of abortion and would require a 24-hour waiting period. We were disappointed that the bill did not pass this session; however, we will work for its passage again next session.

F. Alcohol


CAL assisted several communities in setting up an organization to combat liquor referendums.

Highlights

from the **FOREIGN MISSION BOARD**

We will lead Southern Baptists to be on mission with God to bring all the peoples of the world to saving faith in Jesus Christ.

As in all past years, our Lord has abundantly blessed the work of the Foreign Mission Board through countless ways. We wish to thank all Southern Baptists for their roles which undergird the FMB. Without the concerted, cooperative effort of all Southern Baptist churches, the work and mission of the FMB would be only a shadow of its present position.

We are distinctly privileged to follow our Lord's command found in the Great Commission. Each year brings us closer to taking the gospel to all nations (best rendered as ethno-linguistic people groups).

The following annual growth levels reflect the combined reports from all foreign mission points as of the start of this year:

- A record number of newly constituted churches: 2,612
- Total number of countries where missionaries reside: 131
- Total number of baptisms overseas: 287,806
- Number of new people groups touched by the gospel: 41
- Baptisms among least-reached peoples: 6,548
- Total number of missionaries: 4,129
- Total number of short-term volunteers: Over 15,000
- Total number of newly appointed missionaries: 544
- Record amount of Lottie Moon Offering: \$89.9 million
- Increase in enrollment in discipleship programs: 74%
- Number of new cities opened to the gospel: 528

Southern Baptists support the Foreign Mission Board in multiple ways.

Daily prayer assistance tops the list. Likewise, sacrificial giving through the Cooperative Program and the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering have provided innumerable opportunities to spread the gospel. As missionaries preached, taught, healed and counseled, you were there. The Foreign Mission Board counts it an honor to partner with you to spread the Good News of Jesus Christ to every shore.

HOME MISSIONS REPORT

The more we understand missions, the more likely we are to participate through prayer, volunteer work and financial support.

Last year, 82,000 calls were placed to the Home Missions intercessory prayerline to list prayer requests and to pray for home missions. 70,391 volunteers served on the home missions field. \$38,908,339 was given through the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering, a 4.7 percent increase over 1994.

\$42,000,000 was set for this year Annie's goal, with every penny going to the home missionaries on the field. 4,913 missionaries serve in all 50 states as well as all U.S. territories. Not all of these are paid employees. For example, our own Rev. Jack Hinson is certified by the Home Mission Board and is considered one their Home Missionaries.

One of the endeavors of Southern Baptist is "Celebrate Jesus 2,000", a major evangelistic thrust to share Jesus with everyone in America by the year 2000 AD.

During July, 3 million visitors were expected in Atlanta to watch 14,000 athletes compete in the Olympic Games. Teaming up together, the Home Missions Board, WMU, Brotherhood, Sunday School Board and others will witness and minister to the athletes, their families and spectators.

It is said that Annier Armstrong, during one 3 year period, wrote 4,500 letters in support of home missions. Although we all can't go as home missionaries, we can all be involved in home missions. Look around you and reach out in the name of Jesus. Jesus said, "Whosoever will come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me." Mark 8:34

NANTAHALA COUNSELING CENTER

The Nantahala Counseling Center is a cooperative counseling ministry of the Pastoral Counseling Department of NC Baptist Hospital and area churches of Region 10. The center was opened this past March and is located at 149 lotla Street in Franklin. This was the half way point between Murphy and Sylva.

Rev. Charles L. Wyatt, M.Div., is the Center's Director and Pastoral Counselor. Dr. T. Glen Snyder, M.D., is the Center's Medical Director. Deborah Gore is the office manager/secretary and presently works 30 hours a week.

Although the NCC did not open officially until March 1996, Rev. Wyatt has been seeing persons for counseling through a cooperative arrangement since July of 1995. In this one year period, Rev. Wyatt has seen 82 different individuals, couples or families for counseling. Dr. Snyder has seen fifteen (15) different individuals for psychiatric care since this past March.

Referrals and hours of counseling have steadily increased with people from all sponsoring associations utilizing the services for the center.

Keeping the counseling center operational for fiscal year 1996-97 will require over \$50,000 in local funding. This money is used to pay the salary of the office manager, to lease office space, cover all administrative costs, and provide client assistance funds for those unable to pay the standard fee. Salaries for the Center's Director and Medical Director are paid through NC Baptist Hospital and fees generated.

It is urgent that the churches of the Tuckaseigee Association support this ministry if we are to continue to operate. Two years ago leaders from various churches across this association and others listed a Christian Counseling Center as a high priority need. With the assistance of Dr. Roy J. Smith and the Baptist State Convention we were able to open our doors and to help hurting families. Will your church please consider either budget support or an annual special offering? If each church in the Association would contribute only \$300 on the average, then we would do our part in helping the other associations support this ministry.

Thank God for a ministry to help hurting families. Let's not loose the opportunity.

* Many teens and children made professions of faith at a street festival after having the plan of salvation presented using the salvation bracelet, face painting, balloons and Scripture knowledge board.

SWARM is financially supported by the Baptist Associations of Region 10 and individual member churches. Rev. John Reid and Mrs. Sandra James are board members from this area.

Nell and Hart Watson, Home Missions Board Service Corps Volunteers are the directors of the program and do a great job. Many thanks to the volunteers who made the summer work possible.

CONSTITUTION

With changes through 1992

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of the body shall be the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II-OBJECTIVES

The purpose of the Association is to be a fellowship of churches on mission in our setting. The specific objectives of the Association are as follows:

1. To promote harmony, understanding and spiritual power between the churches.
2. To afford and promote a larger fellowship of Christians in the work of Christ.
3. To provide such programs, projects and organizations as will strengthen the churches and assist them in achieving their goals and objectives.
4. To discover needs which cannot be met effectively by churches individually and to coordinate the use of resources in meeting these needs.
5. To encourage support by every church for the mission causes of the Association, the North Carolina Baptist Convention, and the Southern Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE III - AUTHORITY

SECTION 1. The Association shall have the power to elect and install its officers in whatever manner the body may deem expedient.

SECTION 2. The Association shall have power to recommend measures of usefulness and guidance to our churches in matters of organization, ordinations and questions of doctrines and discipline.

SECTION 3. The Association shall have no power to infringe upon the right of local churches as sovereign and independent bodies.

ARTICLE IV-MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. The Association shall be composed of regularly constituted Baptist churches in cooperating fellowship with the Southern Baptist Convention and following the teachings of the New Testament.

SECTION 2. The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership and may receive or reject churches applying for membership therein at its pleasure. Churches applying for membership shall agree to come under the watch care of the Association for one year. It is understood that during this period of watch care the church shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the Association except those of voting.

Applications for membership shall be presented to the Credentials Committee of the Association. The applications will consist of a letter from a Constituted Church stating their desire to affiliate with the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association. The Credentials Committee as a part of the review process may invite the requesting church to a conference to discuss its history, its mission strategy, and any other information that may be pertinent to the application. The Credentials Committee may then approve the application and recommend them to the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee may by a simple majority vote accept the requesting church to come under the watch care of the Association for

one year. It is suggested that any church under watch care participate in the missions program of the Association. At the end of the year the church may be voted in as a member of the Association with full privileges by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present and voting at the Annual Meeting of the Association, provided that the church submits an acceptable letter and at least one messenger be present at the meeting.

SECTION 3. Any church may withdraw from the Association at its pleasure and should notify the Association of this action in writing. Such action will be recognized by the Association at the next annual meeting.

SECTION 4. It shall be the duty of each church to furnish the Associational clerk, before each annual session, an annual letter, the forms provided by the Associational Clerk giving the information requested as is applicable to each church situation.

SECTION 5. The Association may withdraw from any church which has become unscriptural in its doctrine or practices by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present and voting at the annual meeting. Such vote is to be taken by written ballot.

ARTICLE V - MEETINGS

SECTION 1. The Association shall hold its annual meeting on Thursday and Friday preceding the third Sunday in October. Special meetings of the Association may be called by the Executive Committee provided two weeks written notice is given to the member churches.

SECTION 2. Each church shall be entitled to be represented at the annual meeting by four messengers. Churches with more than 100 resident members shall be entitled to an additional messenger for each additional 50 resident members as determined by the church or fraction thereof and not to exceed 10 messengers from any one church.

SECTION 3. Churches are requested to elect their messengers and alternates in conference to attend the annual meeting.

SECTION 4. In case of internal dissension in a church and two parties coming to the association, each claiming to represent the church, neither party shall be seated until the question is decided as to which party is in union with the association. The decision is to be made by a majority of the messengers present and voting.

ARTICLE VI - OFFICERS

SECTION 1. General Officers of the Association shall be: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, Historian, Parliamentarian, and assistant Parliamentarian. Program Leaders shall be Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Music Director, Chairman of Evangelism Committee, Seminary Extension Director, Chairman of Mission Committee, Director of Missions, Trustees, Pastor Conference President, Youth Director, Stewardship Director, Vacation Bible School Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Deacons Chairmen, Senior Adult Director, Singles Ministry Director, and such other officers as the Association may desire to elect.

Associational representatives will be elected for the following institutions and agencies: (1) Truett Camp, (2) Baptist Children's Homes, (3) Baptist Hospital, (4) North Carolina Baptist Homes, Inc. (Homes for the Aging), (5)

Biblical Recorder, (6) Christian Education, (7) Annuity Board and other representatives as may be deemed appropriate and elected in the Association.

SECTION 2. With the exception of the Director of Missions and Trustees, the terms of office for all officers of the Association shall be for one year with the privilege of continuing re-election. The Moderator and Vice Moderator shall not be eligible for re-election but one year in succession. (1) The number of Trustees shall be three. (2) The term of service should be for three years, with the term of only one expiring each year. In the first election of Trustees the term of service for one should be three years, another two years, and the other one year. (3) Upon the expiration of term of service the Trustee may or may not be re-elected for another term of three years.

Each term of office shall begin with the close of the annual session. The Associational Financial year will run from January 1 through December 31.

SECTION 3. The Director of Missions shall be sought and recommended by the Executive Committee in a manner of its own choosing. Within ten days after locating a nominee, the Executive Committee shall present the name of the director nominee to a called meeting of the Association. If the annual meeting of the association is scheduled within 60 days, the presentation shall wait until that time.

The called shall be indefinite. The salary, allowance, vacation, etc. shall be provided by the current budget or adjustments recommended by the Executive Committee in consultation with the Finance Committee.

Concerning termination of employment, the resignation shall be in writing and presented to the Executive Committee at least 30 days before it is to take place. The executive Committee may terminate employment by giving 30 days notice in advance.

The Executive Committee shall give full supervision and guidance to the work of the Director of Missions in planning, promoting and financing his work.

ARTICLE VII-DUTIES OF OFFICERS

SECTION 1. The Moderator shall preside and maintain the order of all meetings of the Association and Executive Committee. He shall serve as ex officio member of all committees of the Association.

He shall appoint the Committee on Committees and all other committees pertinent to the operation of the body not named by the Committee on Committees in its regular report.

SECTION 2. The Vice Moderator shall assist the Moderator and preside in the absence of, or at the pleasure of the Moderator.

SECTION 3. The Clerk shall keep a complete and accurate record of all transactions; shall prepare a "Book of Reports" to be distributed to messengers at the beginning of each day's session of the annual meeting; and shall cause to be printed minutes concerning the records made.

The Clerk shall distribute to the clerk of each church in the Association, blanks for the preparation of the church letter as soon as they are received from the State Convention. This form is to be returned to the Clerk of the Association not later than two weeks prior to the meeting of the body.

An Assistant Clerk shall work with the clerk in preparing the "Book of Reports."

SECTION 4. The Treasurer shall receive and dispense by order of the Executive Committee of the Association while in session, the money of the treasury and make

a complete report at the Annual Meeting and a current report at each Executive Committee meeting.

An Assistant Treasurer shall be elected to assist the Treasurer by request and to serve in the event the Treasurer resigns or is ill or unable to function.

SECTION 5. The Historian shall keep the records of the Association up-to-date.

SECTION 6. The Parliamentarian shall upon the request of the presiding Officer of the body, advise and assist the Association with respect to all matters involving Parliamentary Procedure.

An Assistant Parliamentarian shall be elected. The Parliamentarian and Assistant should always communicate with each other to ensure that this office is filled at each Associational Annual or Executive Committee meeting.

SECTION 7. The Program Leaders and the Institutional Agency Representatives shall perform all duties customary to their titles and shall make a written report to the annual session of the Association.

SECTION 8. The Director of Missions shall work closely with the Associational committees, officers and Churches in such a way as to facilitate the meeting of the objectives of the Association as set forth in Article II.

The Director shall serve as ex-officio member of all committees of the Association. The Director shall communicate with the State and Southern Convention such information as shall be mutually helpful and needful.

The duties of the Director of Missions shall be set forth in Article XIV.

SECTION 9. Trustees have no authority except by direction of the Association, and are not personally bound by signatures but, are to be the legal signees for the Association. Trustees represent the Association in legal matters. Trustees act on behalf of the Association in acquisition and disposal of Associational property.

They sign all deeds of conveyance, execute all notes, bonds or mortgages, intervene in all suits, by authority of the Association.

All persons dealing with the trustees, as Associational officers, may rely upon any written resolution duly adopted by the Association or Executive Committee, directing and authorizing the Trustees to act in its behalf and certified by the Association Moderator and Clerk.

ARTICLE VIII-RULES OF ORDER

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to Robert's Parliamentary Practice or in a manner not contrary thereto.

ARTICLE IX-QUORUM

The quorum for the Annual Associational meeting or any special called meeting of the Association shall not be less than 25 percent of the member Churches.

ARTICLE X-THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

SECTION 1. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the General Officers and Program Leaders elected by the Association and the Pastor and one member from each Church in the Association. No Pastor, by virtue of his being an Associational Officer or Program Leader shall be disqualified as a member of the

Executive Committee, from representing the Church or Churches he may be serving in the Association. Twelve of these members shall constitute a quorum.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to act for the Association on matters arising when the Association is not in session and to make a report of all work to the next session of the Association. This body shall meet at a time and place designated by the Moderator on Monday following the first Sunday of each quarter except for the July quarter which shall meet on the second Monday of the month of July. Special meetings of the Executive Committee may be called by the Moderator with a one week notice to the Churches.

SECTION 3. All Vacancies occurring on committees or among elected officers shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

SECTION 4. In the event that a vacancy occurs with the Trustees, the Executive Committee should fill such vacancy for the remainder of the term.

ARTICLE XI-ASSOCIATIONAL STANDING COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. The Association shall have such standing committees as may be deemed necessary to promote efficiently the work of the Master in our midst. The terms of office for all committee members shall be for one year except where specifically stated otherwise.

SECTION 2. COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES. It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate at the general meeting all standing committees as set forth under Article XI.

SECTION 3. The NOMINATING COMMITTEE shall be composed of seven members. To this group the Directors of Sunday School, Discipleship Training, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood and Music Ministry will be added.

It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate the Officers, Program Leaders and Institutional Agency Representatives. These nominees shall be notified in writing not less than one month prior to presenting of their names at Annual Session.

SECTION 4. THE ORDER OF BUSINESS COMMITTEE, composed of three members, shall plan the annual program of the Association and present it to the Executive Committee at its October meeting.

SECTION 5. THE CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three pastors and two laymen. It shall examine applications of Churches seeking admission into the Association in keeping with Article IV, and make recommendations to the Association. It shall counsel with Churches that are out of harmony of fellowship with the Association.

SECTION 6. THE PLACE AND PREACHER COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members. The duties of this committee shall be to recommend the place or places for the following Annual meeting and to recommend the preacher and alternate to deliver the annual sermon for the following year.

SECTION 7. THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members. It appointed by the Moderator at the October Executive Committee meeting. It shall be the duty of this committee to present suitable resolutions at the Annual Associational Meeting.

SECTION 8. THE MEMORIAL COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members. It shall be the duty of this committee to bring a report to the Annual Meeting of those listed by the member churches as deceased since the last Annual Meeting and shall lead a Memorial Service in their memory.

SECTION 9. THE FINANCE COMMITTEE shall be composed of six members including the Treasurer of the Association. This committee shall: (a) present a Budget to the Association for the following year; (b) devise plans for raising the funds for the Associational Budget; (c) audit the Finances and Financial records of the Association annually and anytime there is a change of Treasurer or at the

direction of the Association or the Executive Committee; (d) report all audits to the Annual Association Meeting.

SECTION 10. THE CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members and shall perform all duties specified in Article XV.

SECTION 11. THE ORDINATION COMMITTEE shall be composed of five designated Pastors and all other Pastors who desire to sit with the committee.

a. The committee serves on an advisory capacity only and serves at the request of the Church from which the member is seeking Ordination.

b. The committee should examine such candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry and make such recommendations to the Church as they feel led.

c. The committee should assist in arranging the proper service of Ordination when such assistance is requested.

d. The Executive Committee should be informed regularly of the work of the committee.

e. Each Church desiring to ordain a candidate is urged to consult with the committee, and shall give two weeks notice in which the committee is to do its work.

SECTION 12. THE EVANGELISM COMMITTEE. The duties of the committee shall be to direct and propose a perpetual program and spirit of evangelism in the Association. It shall arrange and direct all Associational wide evangelistic activities.

SECTION 13. THE ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL shall be composed of eight(8) members, nominated by the Associational Committee on Committees; and elected by the Association at the annual meeting. The committee shall be: Missions Development Director, Promotion Director, Survey Director, Associational WMU Mission Action Director, and Associational Brotherhood Director, Sunday School Outreach Director, Church Training Director, and Associational Deacons President. The Missions Development Director, Promotion Director, and Survey Director shall be elected for a three-year term, with one member named each year. The other five positions shall be filled by the person who is elected to fill those five Associational Offices.

The duties of the AMDC are to lead the Associational Missions Development in the five mission performance tasks: (1) call churches to be on missions; (2) train, develop, and encourage church and associational workers; (3) provide resources and services to churches and leaders; (4) provide opportunities for working together in missions, ministry and growth; (5) establish and maintain appropriate communications and relationships with the community and the denomination.

SECTION 14. THE BUILDING AND GROUNDS COMMITTEE shall be comprised of three members. The committee shall be responsible for and in charge of the upkeep and repairs of the associational building, grounds, and equipment.

SECTION 15. THE PERSONNEL COMMITTEE

a. The Committee shall be composed of 7 members of which 3 are pastors.

b. They shall recommend policies and procedures for the selection, supervision and termination of associational staff personnel. Those policies and procedures shall be approved by the association.

c. Prepare and maintain an organizational manual relation to the association's staff personnel.

d. Develop and recommend to the association policies and procedures for paid and volunteer staff personnel.

e. Develop policies and procedures regarding continuing education and development for the Director of Missions and other associational staff.

f. When a staff vacancy occurs, they shall serve as the search committee.

The Director of Missions shall be called by a special called meeting of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association provided the Association is not scheduled to meet within 30 days. In that event the Association shall consider the calling of a Director of Missions at its regularly scheduled Associational Meeting.

g. The initial committee shall be recommended at the January 4, 1993 Executive Committee meeting and present items b through e by the April 1993 Executive Committee and no later than the July 1993 Executive Committee meeting.

ARTICLE XII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL

THE ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL shall be composed of the Director of Missions, the Moderator, the Vice Moderator, the program leaders: Sunday School, Discipleship Director, Woman's Missionary Union, The Brotherhood Director, the Chairman of Deacons, the Missions Development Director, the Chairman of Evangelism, the Chairman of the Finance Committee, the Vacation Bible School Director, the Youth Director, the Director of the Singles, the Director of the Senior Adults and the Music Director. The Director of Missions is to serve as Chairman and a secretary shall be elected from the group.

The purpose of the council is to coordinate the planning of the various programs of the association, to develop an associational calendar, and to give mutual support to the various organization and program units in carrying out their assignments.

The council shall meet quarterly.

ARTICLE XIII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL PASTORS' CONFERENCE

The Associational Pastors' Conference provides regular meetings for the Baptist ministers of the association. The purpose of the conference is for fellowship and mutual support, for doctrinal and professional discussion and for promotion of church, associational and other denominational programs. The conference is not an administrative or executive body.

ARTICLE XIV - DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS JOB DESCRIPTION

SECTION 1. FUNCTION OF THE DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS. He is to be the chief administrative officer of the association. He is to confirm extra employment in a manner agreed upon with the Executive Committee.

SECTION 2. RELATIONSHIP OF THE DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS.

1. He is employed by the Executive Committee of the association.
2. General supervision of the personnel and program of the association as they function through the association office.
3. Work primarily with (pastors), associational general officers, committees, and organizations.
4. Work closely with auxiliary organizations (such as WMU, Baptist Men, etc.).
5. Lead in maintaining relationships with state and SBC agencies and promoting their programs.

SECTION 3. In the churches, extending the local ministries. To visit churches by invitation of the pastor or other church leaders, in the pastorless churches to provide assistance in the church program and ministry, such as (1) Pulpit supply; (2) Study courses; (3) Missionary address; (4) Deacons' meetings; (5) Assembly programs; (6) Special day addresses; (7) Ordination services; (8) VBS planning and promotion; (9) To interpret phases of associational work; (10)

Budget planning; (11) Building planning; (12) Revival meetings; (13) Stewardship emphasis; (14) Study objectives and long range planning; (15) Studying and evaluating procedures, curriculum, constitution and bylaws, etc; (16) Church-community surveys, etc; (17) Promoting a world missions concept; and (18) Publishing of a regular news medium (such as a monthly newsletter); (19) Cooperate with the news media to promote Baptist work. In the associational office: a. Personal correspondence, promotional mail, and telephoning pertinent to his work. b. Office conferences, answer to inquiries, etc. c. Assist associational officers, committees and heads of organizations to get out promotional mail pertinent to their work.

SECTION 4. Schedule of Benefits

1. His salary shall be
2. His fringe benefits shall include
3. His schedule shall include
 - a. One day a week, chosen at his discretion, shall be reserved for rest that excluded normal associational activities.
 - b. A maximum of four weeks each year outside of the association for special work with local churches or with state and SBC agencies.
 - c. An annual sick leave of 26 days maximum, with a maximum of 42 days to be accumulated. Sick leave may be advanced by the association for one year without Executive Committee action. Sick leave is to be recorded with the financial secretary of the association.
 - d. Two weeks annual vacation with pay.
 - e. Holidays: New Year's Day; Easter Monday; July 4; Labor Day; Thanksgiving, Thursday and Friday; Christmas December 25 and 26.
4. All honorarium from churches inside or outside the association and all honorarium from other religious work shall be his personal fair, and shall not be submitted to the association.
5. The Director of Missions is afforded the opportunity of an annual evaluation by the Moderator and Missions Committee.

ARTICLE XV - AMENDMENTS

The constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the association by a two-thirds majority of the messengers present and voting, provided the amendment has been presented to the Constitutional Committee at least 10 days prior to the annual meeting and presented to the association in printed form on the first day of the annual meeting to be voted on the second day.
