# Dedication



#### 1900 - 1980 The Reverend Dillard Thaddius Wood

On March 28, 1980 the "Master of all Good Workmen" called Dillard Thaddius Wood to his eternal home. His going draws closer the end of an era in which the pioneer preachers of the mountains roamed the hills and valleys carrying the gospel to everyone with whom they came in contact. Dillard Wood was one of the strong, staunch, sturdy members of that "great" group. He walked humbly among his followers working shoulder to shoulder with them daily thus making his life an open book. It was he who fed them spiritually. He secured his own strength from the God he loved and served.

Dillard Wood was ordained June 6, 1940 in the same country church, nestled deep' within the mountains in which his funeral was preached. He had served the Balsam Grove Baptist Church both as a pastor and as a loyal, dedicated member.

His heritage goes deep into the wooded hills and on beyond. Thus, it is with deep appreciation and gratefulness for his leadership that the minutes of the 1980 Tuckaseigee Baptist Association are lovingly dedicated. Dillard Wood played a strong part in the building of this association.

Following is the tribute, written by a grandson, and delivered by him at his grandfather's funeral.



#### "In Memory of My Granddaddy"

The family and friends of Dillard Wood are brought together in our grief to celebrate his life and to return him to the soil where three generations of Woods have gone before.

My Granddaddy had a life-long interest in the lives of great men--presidents, military heroes, and statesmen. But those who knew him recognized that he was far greater than the men he liked to read about. He was greater than Winston Churchill because he had further to go.

No man was ever born further back in the mountains than Granddaddy was when he was born nearly 80 years ago in Chestnut Ridge Old Fields. It was no misfortune to be born in the wilderness. He knew that the luckiest thing imaginable had happened to him. The active life of the mountains nourished him in his younger days, and when he could no longer roam with his former energy, tales of bear hunting and fishing in the virgin streams of Deep Creek took its place.

He passed this love of wilderness on to me and to others. It is inconceivable to me to think that when I next return from the head-waters of Piney Mountain that old, grey-haired man won't be sitting by the house wanting to know how I had done and telling me again how the mountains had been in his youth. How many times have I heard him say that not even the Rockefellers had enough money to entice him to leave these mountains. And now he is forever a part of them, having left his imprint.

Granddaddy was a man of simple pleasures, but he was not a simple man. He was a philosopher, minister, dedicated public servant, and above all a devoted family man.

He had the courage to seek the truth, to live by what he believed in. He made no compromises wiht himself, and taught all of us to live by the same creed. He was an extraordinary student throughout his days, and seemed to possess the wisdom of an Old Testament judge.

His faith was unshakable. And in his years of fervent ministry, he strengthened the faith of others. Death held no surprises for him. He had been at peace with himself and with his Master for many years. He had done everything he wanted to do. He died with the same dignity with which he had done everything else. His physical ministry is over, his eternal ministry has begun.

He brought out dignity in other people. He had the most extraordinary ability to make people feel that they had a special relationship with him. He had more best friends than I have acquaintances. He shared his love with friends, but saved the best part of himself for his family.

No man ever made a finer choice of a wife than he did. And no one could have put up with his strong will better than she. He loved his 10 children, 30 grandchildren, and 10 great-grandchildren with an equal and enormous love. There was no jealousy for his affection, yet every one of us family members thinks we knew him best. When marriage ties enlarged the central family, he was the one that made everyone feel the bonds, the tightness of kinship. He wanted all of us grandchildren to know him so that we could know more about ourselves. The closeness of this family is more important to me than anything I have ever known. And the credit is his.

The great project of his final years was to complete his study into the history of his own family: from the shores of Scotland and Ireland, to Virginia, Mississippi, Tennessee, to the mountains of Caney Fork, and then from Oregon to New York. This is a legacy that will be treasured.

I can think of no greater honor than to be here today to celebrate a man who devoted himself to others. I can think of nothing more difficult than to lay to rest the man who has been the center of our lives. The only man who would know what to say is mute.

# Proceedings

#### Thursday, August 14, 1980

#### East Sylva Baptist Church

The 151st annual session of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association convened with the East Sylva Baptist Church as host on August 14, 1980. Approximately 200 messengers and visitors enjoyed fellowship and delicious food at 5:30 p.m.

The Reverend J.C. Robinson, moderator, called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. The Reverend Charles Dean, pastor of the East Sylva Church brought the devotional.

The following business was transacted:

1. A motion that the Book of Reports be adopted and changed as needed. Motion was passed.

2. The moderator gave a brief report of the work of the executive committee for the past year. A report is included in the minutes. He suggested that anyone wanting further details read the minutes of the associational clerk for information.

The Reverend Robinson urged that the members and the church representatives become more conscientious about attending the quarterly meetings of the Executive Committee.

3. The new pastors and the pastors making changes in the association were recognized. The following changes and additions have been made: Patrick Correll new at Ochre Hill; Delvin Richey, new at Buff Creek; pastors making changes within the association were: Ernest Ammons moved to Trout Creek, Robert Blanton to Deitz Memorial; Charles Ginn went to New Savannah; Paul Carden went to Hyatts Chapel; Carl Smith to Johns Creek and Hubert Nations moved to Wilmont.

4. Rcy Burnett presented the report for the associational Sunday school work. He shared the ideas and the work of the Sunday School Task Force during the past year. The plans for the coming year were revealed with special stress being placed upon Preparation Week and a special drive to increase Sunday school attendance.

5. The Vacation Bible School Report was presented by Linda Turrentine. See report in the minutes for details.

6. Nelda Reid gave an enthusiastic report on the work of the church training growth during the year and told of some of the plans for the coming year. See the full report in these minutes.

7. Mary Bennett gave the W.M.U. Report which is recorded in the minutes.

8. Robert Blanton presented the slate of officers for the 1980-81 year. He moved the adoption of the report. It was accepted as read with a correction of one office.

9. Wesley Hooper presented the Committee on Committees Report and moved its adoption. The motion was seconded and passed.

10. Jack Hinson presented the proposed changes in the constitution. The report will be voted on at the second session of the annual meeting.

11. Mike Moore, chairman of the finance committee, presented and explained the budget proposed for the 1980-81 year. He moved the acception of the budget. The motion was seconded and passed. Mike then called on Harry Vance, treasurer, to present and explain the Financial Report for the year. The report was accepted as presented.

Harry Vance recognized the gift of the Lovedale Baptist Church for a space on which to locate an associational office building. The land has been leased to the association for 99 years with the option to renew at the expiration of that time. The financial part is revealed in the Treasurer's Report found in these minutes.

Vance also explained why some churches did not receive credit for their donations to the association the same month in which they sent the contribution. All checks or financial transactions have to be deposited by two o'clock on the last day of the month. Monies received after that time do not show on the report until the following month.

11. John Reid presented the report for continuing education. He presented a detailed report of the seminary extension program and awarded certificates to those members who completed the course.

Plans for the ensuing year were revealed. There will be a Pastor's Workshop at the East Sylva Baptist Church on September 9-11; seminary extension classes will be offered in two cycles at four sites this year. The fall locations have been selected for the fall cycle: Old Savannah Church with the Reverend Delvin Richey as teacher; Hamburg with the Reverend Kenneth Fugate as teacher; Ochre Hill with the Reverend Patrick Correll as teacher and Long Branch with the Reverend Charles Ginn as teacher. The first three sites are for lay members wishing to become more Bible oriented; while the one at Long Branch is designed for the pastors and ministers. Locations have not yet been selected for the spring cycle but will be announced at a later date.

Plans also revealed that the rest homes in the association would be included, with classes being held in the rest homes. Further announcement concerning these will be made later.

12. The Reverend Alvin Loiry, Jr., director of missions, reported on the status of the evangelism committee. Plans are being made but will be revealed at a later date.

He also reported that he felt that the association would soon have a director for the brotherhood.

He expressed appreciation to Moderator J.C. Robinson for the good work he had accomplished as leader over the past two years.

Attention was called to the beginning time and place for the second annual session on August 15 (Sylva First 9:15 a.m.).

13. The Reverend Peter Ambrose was introduced. He presented the associational choir which rendered several beautiful numbers.

14. The Reverend Jerry Laughter delivered the sermon. The scripture from Phillipines 4:19 was used as his text. His ideas centered around the "Promise Box" of God's promises.

At the close of the sermon the meeting was adjourned until Friday morning.

#### August 15, 1980

#### Sylva First Baptist Church

15. The second session of the annual meeting opened with a devotional by the host church and the congregation singing of a hymn.

16. Alvin Loiry, Jr. told the forthcoming event of the Tuckaseigee Association doing some planned mission work in West Virginia.

17. The Time, Place and Preacher Report was presented and passed. See report.

18. Reverend Fred Lumford, director of missions in Cherokee County, spoke on the Christian Action League work and announced a meeting to be held in Bryson City on October 13, 1980 on this work.

19. After a hymn led by the Reverend Peter Ambrose the state convention video presentation with institutional and program representatives was presented. The following members made comments on the several institutions portrayed in the tape:

Conrad Burrell, Hugh Starnes, Tom Roberts, and Calvin Knight.

John Hyatt is a member of the North Carolina General Board for Region 10. Hyatt also serves on the Truett Camp Committee.

The goal now is to reach every person in North Carolina by 1982. This is a large but not an impossible task. More Bible study is needed.

20. Dr. John Bunn introduced some of the "formers" who were visiting with us today: The Reverend Bob Abrams, from Gardner Webb; the Reverend Sue Fitzgerald from Mars Hill; Dr. Henry Stokes from Wake Forest and the Reverend Joe David Fore, a "Now" from the Baptist Student Union of the Western Carolina University Campus.

The needs in each area that should be met were put forth in a challenging manner.

21. The moderator announced the attendance of 67 messengers, 12 visitors, and 17 pastors with 30 churches represented. Total present 95.

22. The Reverend Jack Hinson, chairman of the constitution committee moved the adoption of the proposed changes in the constitution. The motion was seconded and carried.

23. The following members were elected to the board of trustees: David Stillwell, 3-year term; R.O. Vance, 2-year term; and Kelly Bradley for a one year term.

24. David Blackney presented the resolutions for the association. The resolutions dealt with the work of the Christian Action League. Handouts on the issues were passed out. Ray Houston expressed THANKS to the East Sylva Baptist Church and to the First Baptist Church of Sylva for the use of their facilities and for the warm hospitality and fellowship demonstrated in each.

The resolutions committee appointed yesterday consisted of David Blackney, Dan Ward and Hardin Nicholson.

The resolutions as presented were accepted by the messengers as read.

25. The associational youth choir under the direction of the Reverend Peter Ambrose sang a number of selections. This is a newly organized choir that really did a "great" job.

26. The message was brought by the Reverend Dr. John Bunn, pastor of the Sylva First Church. He spoke on the need of the church to become TRUTH.

27. Following the message a memorial service was conducted in memory of those who had passed away since the last annual meeting.

28. Davis Hooper closed the 151st annual session with a blessing and prayer. The group assembled in the church dining hall where everyone enjoyed a delicious meal prepared by the members of the Sylva First Baptist Church.



#### **Director of Missions Report**

Our association was included in the number in the state that reported growth in several areas. Total baptisms were up over the previous year, more brotherhoods and W.M.U. organizations were reported and an increase in financial support, both to the association and to denominational causes and missions.

The association has accepted a long term lease option, having minimal expense involved, from Lovedale Baptist Church for a site for an association office building. We are grateful to this church for this generous provision. A building fund for the office facility was established through a transfer of an existing savings account in the amount of a little more than \$2,000. Designated gifts are now requested from the churches of the association.

The director of missions continues to represent the association on the state Sunday School Task Force, Truett Camp Committee and the State Director of Missions Conference. These organizations meet several times each year and are responsible for assisting in program and mission planning.

There were many opportunities to meet with association committees and officers. Many churches invited me to speak as supply or visiting preacher and to teach Bible studies. On occasion I have been asked to counsel with pulpit committees and deacons concerning church matters.

The years ahead look promising. There is a spirit of anticipation for greater outreach in missions and ministry. I believe that the Lord has much more for us as we allow Him to work through our lives in the churches.

I wish to express my thanks, and also that of my wife, for your continued support and love in a year that brought personal joy, but also sadness.

#### **Evangelism Committee Report**

The evangelism committee met four times to discuss possible emphases for the association. There was a decision not to have a central tent crusade such as was conducted the past two years. The committee recognized a need for better planning for revival in the association. Suggestions were considered concerning helping pastors and lay persons to plan local revivals, make proper preparation and to interest the lost and unenlisted to attend the revival. Such matters as personal soul winning and witnessing were areas of need in the churches.

A Fellowship Revival is being suggested for the churches of the association to be held in late September. There are geographical groupings to which the churches can align themselves. An afternoon meeting at the Tuckaseigee Church on July 6, provided time for discussion and planning for this September Fellowship Revival. Group coordinators were selected from among the pastors.

The committee strongly encourages all pastors to attend the state evangelism conference. Churches are encouraged to make financial provisions for the pastors to receive the help of this conference.

The whole state of North Carolina is being challenged to a simultaneous crusade effort in 1982. Details of this crusade will be discussed at the state Baptist Convention and at the evangelism conference.

#### **Truett Camp Report**

#### 1979 - 1980

This report is from June 1, 1979 to June 1, 1980. The past year was an exceptionally good one in that we had 1,058 people to use the camp. The G.A. weeks were well attended as well as the boys weeks. There was a total of 39 saved - 22 girls and 17 girls. We did not have a preacher's camp this summer.

A new building has been erected and will be ready for camp this year. The cost of the new building will be approximately \$18,000. There were 135 one man days of free labor on the new building and all associations in Region 10 were involved in the free labor.

I want to thank all the churches and all other people that gave time and money to make Truett Camp what it is today.

An annuity workshop reaching Region 10 was sponsored by the Baptist State Convention and held on June 7. Sam O'Neil explained the insurance and retirement programs offered through the annuity board of the S.B.C. Emphasis was placed on the "Route 10" plan of financial security for retirement. We would encourage each church to check and see if their pastor is adequately making plans for retirement and if not, seek to adopt the "Route 10" program. More information is available through the associational office. Twelve ministers and laymen attended from our association. Currently 17 churches and 18 staff members are participating in the annuity boards programs. I believe this reflects the spirit of love and appreciation Tuckaseigee Baptist have for their pastors and ministers. God bless you!

The association sponsored the 150th celebration of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, May 20. The leaders were Talmage Williams, Stewardship Division of B.S.C.; Dr. Charles W. Bryan, vice-president of the foreign mission board, S.B.C.; and Bob Wainwright, director of missions, Flat River Association. They led us in a day and evening session studying how Baptists work together for the glory of God. About 15 churches were represented with about 40 in attendance.

Total budget offerings of the churches our last reporting year (78-79) was \$838,603. This was a decrease of \$7,937 or about one percent (.94) decrease under the previous reporting year 77-78. The churches contributed \$13,968 for the support of associational missions this past associational year (July 79-June 80). This is an increase of \$294 or a two percent increase over last year. The Baptist State Convention contributed \$3,380 to our association or about one fifth (19.5%) of our budget. In the year ending December '79 the churches gave \$51,239 for the support of missions through the Cooperative Program. This is an increase of \$12,574 or approximately a 32.5 percent increase over the previous year.

Plans for this year in the way of stewardship emphasis include the pastors Bold Missions Stewardship Conference in the spring of 1981 and a plan to interpret and promote the associational missions budget in the churches for next year. Goals for this year include increasing the number of churches participating in Cooperative Program and associational missions giving and increase the percentage of giving of those churches contributing. Currently there is an average of about 20 of our 48 churches contributing per month. The suggested giving goals are three percent or undesignated receipts to associational missions and 10 percent of undesignated receipts to the Cooperative Program. Some could do more, but even small increases across the association from each church would go a long way.

While we can be very proud of the increase in Cooperative Program giving we should be concerned with the narrow increase in associational ministry support. When we figure inflation into the picture we are loosing ground as the buying power of the dollar shrinks year by year. We have a great challenge before us as churches and association to keep abreast of inflation and then expand add new ministries, while building an associational building. The greatness of the challenge lies in the fact that while our gifts to God's work seek to keep ahead of inflation, the incomes from which those gifts are drawn are many times not keeping up with the inflation rates. It will call for a change of lifestyle, a shifting of priorities, and a sacrificial spirit to maintain the successes we have had. In Nehemiah's day the city was rebuilt in spite of all odds and discouragement because the people had a "mind to work." The heart beat of God is evangelism and missions, bringing the Gospel to bear in individual lives, churches, and communities. God grant us a "mind to work"!

Esther let nothing stand in her way in helping her people and Paul seemed not to let opportunity go by without telling those he came in contact with about his experience with God on the Damascus road.

In Genesis 4:9 "And the Lord said to Cain, 'Where is Abel thy Brother.' " And he said, "I know not, Am I my brothers keeper?"

Yes - there is and will be a need for home missions somewhere by someone as long as there is one unsaved person in the world. Let us do our part!

North Carolina Baptist Hospital 1979-1980

During the past year, our hospital has again received accreditation for the maximum period, two years, by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals.

Our hospital is constantly upgrading its staff, facilities and equipment. A carbon dioxide surgical laser has been added. It has great potential for surgery.

New ultrasound equipment provides improved accuracy in determining location and degree of blocked arteries. The department of dentistry is being expanded to meet an increasing need for specialty dental services. An occupational therapist has been added to help patients recover functional skills lost through accident or disease. A new instrument has been acquired for testing infants with suspected hearing loss.

The financial counseling section is now better prepared to assist those who need its services.

The staff and trustees continue to make every effort to keep operating costs as low as possible. Our hospital recently became a charter member of the Sun Alliance, an organization of 22 large hospitals in nine southeastern states.

The Department of Pastoral Care continues to provide a pastoral ministry to hospital patients and their families. During the past year, the department has begun a Minister's Care Plan, in which the Baptist State Convention provides financial assistance for ministers and/or their families who seek pastoral counseling. Also the position of Chaplain to Medical Students has been elevated to a staff/faculty position.

Construction on the Focus Building is almost complete. Several departments of the Medical Center will be occupying this building.

The hospital staff is grateful to the Baptists of North Carolina for continuing financial support. During 1979, the hospital received \$400,500 through the Cooperative Program, and \$357, 517 through the North Carolina Missions Offering and designated gifts.

#### North Carolina Baptist Homes

The ministry to older persons through our Baptist homes is the youngest of all our social service ministries. We have just completed our 29th year of ministry. God has blessed us through all of these years in marvelous ways and has given to us the privilege of moving into five areas of our state with this special ministry - Resthaven, the Hayes Home, the Apartment Complex, and the nursing unit all in Winston-Salem, and homes in Albemarle, Hamilton, Yanceyville, and Asheville!

We are excited over the possibility of starting the construction of additional nursing beds in Winston-Salem to care for residents in the new Western North Carolina Home and the Apartment Complex, when nursing care is needed for them. Hopefully, construction of these beds can be underway within this year, along with the construction of an urgently needed enlargement and renovation of the Hayes Home, and the building of a new administration building.

Each of our residents would have me thank you as North Carolina Baptist for all that you are, and for all that you do for them.

#### Vacation Bible School

What an exciting and busy year this has been for our V.B.S.! Indeed, the Holy Spirit was present, felt, and working as the associational V.B.S. team was enlisted; received state training; planned and offered a "Sneak Preview" for pastors and V.B.S. directors; planned and presented the associational V.B.S. workshop for all ages including Backyard Bible Club/Mission V.B.S. and Special Education; arranged and conducted the book store transactions; and evaluated their efforts. #### **Church Training**

Nelda Reid attended the Key Leadership Conference at Ridgecrest in May 1979 and helped conduct the association Key Leadership held at Lovedale, September 17, 1979. Several churches were represented at this conference. The church training director also spoke with the Wilkesdale Church in October regarding their interest in beginning the church training program again at their church, and within a short time they had the program organized and in operation again.

The major highlight of the church training year was "M" Night held at East Sylva Baptist Church on November 26, 1979. There were 287 people attending, representing 15 churches across the association. East Sylva choir led the congregation in worship through song and provided special music selections. An interesting and amusing skit emphasizing some new church training material was presented by Mrs. J.D. Wyatt and the Reverend Robert Blanton. The Reverend Ken Varner, Southern Baptist Missionary to Taiwan, delivered the message for the evening. He spoke of the challenges that face Baptists as they enter the decade of the 1980's and as they plan to present the gospel through the end of this century. Special certificates of recognition were presented to the Wilkesdale Baptist Church for having been the church to most recently organize a church training program and to the Long Branch Baptist Church for having the highest percentage of their enrollment present. The Attendance Banner was awarded to Old Savannah Baptist Church with 65 people present, the largest number of members present from an individual church at "M" Night. The enthusiasm shown at "M" Night is proof that many people in our association agree that "Church is the Sunday Night Place."

#### Report of the Hospital Chaplain C.J. Harris Community Hospital July 1979 - June 1980

The Chaplaincy Ministry in the C.J. Harris Community Hospital is made possible by the voluntary cooperative effort upon the part of the majority of the Christian denominations in Jackson County. A standing committee, elected by the Jackson County Minister's Association, supervises the Chaplaincy Program. Committee members are: Jack Hinson, chairman; Mrs. John Parris, Mrs. Tom Murray, Dan Ward, Bob Reese, Don Morgan.

During the past year 33 churches, several individuals and a community service gave \$3,952.84 for the Chaplaincy Fund. This s \$559.66 more than the preceding year, for which we are most grateful. Churches are uged to place the chaplaincy in their budget, making their donations monthly.

In addition to the voluntary gifts from the churches and individuals, a Chaplaincy Foundation has been established to further secure the ongoing ministry of the chaplaincy. A goal of \$30,000.00 has been set for the foundation. To date \$6,039.37 has been given to the Chaplaincy Foundation. The monies so contributed by persons, firms, corporations, memorials, are to remain in said foundation and the interest and/or dividends earned on the monies contributed to be used by the Jackson County Minister's Association for the current Chaplaincy Program. The hospital board of trustees has the responsibility of investing the funds of the foundation.

Four thousand, four hundred, forty-five (4,445) in-patients passed through the hospital July 1, 1979 through June 30, 1980. This is an average of 370 patients a month. Here were 4,445 opportunities to mediate the compassion of our loving Heavenly Father. What a challenge! What a privilege! What a stewardship to give an account for! More time and more service is needed to adequately meet the spiritual needs of these patients.

#### Historian's Report

The historical committee has worked toward the completion of a 150-year history of the association. The goal was to have this manuscript in print in time for distribution at the 1980 annual session. Because of interruptions and problems beyond our control the publication date has been postponed.

The interesting facts which are recorded herein were reported on the church letters to the association. No doubt there are many more things of historical interest that have gone unrecorded because most clerks do not feel the importance of completing this part of the letter. Churches getting "New" pastors during this past year were as follows: Buff Creek - the Reverend Delvin Richey; Ochre Hill - the Reverend Patrick Correll; Ernest Ammons moved to Trout Creek; Robert Blanton went to Deitz Memorial; Charles Ginn went to New Savannah; Paul Carden moved to Hyatts Chapel; Carl Smith moved to Johns Creek and Hubert Nations went to Wilmont. The churches remaining without pastors are: Big Ridge, Unity, Tilley Creek, Jarrett Memorial, Dicks Creek and Yellow Mountain.

Several churches have added improvements to their building as well as to their ministry. Those reporting were: Balsam built a handicap ramp; Cashiers organized a Royal Ambassadors organization; Jarrett Memorial paid off the indebtedness on their fellowship hall; Johns Creek remodeled their pulpit and installed a new water system; Lumberton built new rest rooms, recarpeted their sanctuary; Moses Creek began a youth ministry; New Hope celebrated its 25th anniversary; Old Savannah organized a brotherhood and Pioneers group; Pine Creek expanded the fence area around their cemetery; and Speedwell built Sunday school rooms in the basement of the church.

The pastors of the Cullowhee, Sylva First and the director of missions now have homes of their own and have become "real" members of the communities in which they live. All are full time employees of their respective churches.

The Cullowhee Baptist Church established a "first" by having a mother-son serve on the diaconate - Maxie Freeman and her son, Joel. They also had a woman chairperson serving on the diaconate - Annie Hoyle. This church also organized a hand bell choir, in addition to the strengthening of their ministry by reorganizing special organizations for the university students - P.S.A.L.T. and continuing the children's church program as well as providing directors for both the children and the youth of the church.

So much of the real history of our association goes unrecorded and in time is lost to the historians because many church clerks are unaware of the importance of making such information available on the church letter. The history of this association is unusually rich in the many interesting facts and happenings that make history real and worth reading and recording. All church clerks are asked to keep the history of their church in mind and to record it for the future generations.

### Constitution

(Revisions: August 16, 1957; August 16, 1975; August 19, 1978; August 17, 1979; August 15, 1980)

#### ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of the body shall be the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association.

#### **ARTICLE II – OBJECTIVES**

The purpose of the association is to be a fellowship of churches on mission in our setting. The specific objectives of the association are as follows:

1. To promote harmony, understanding and spiritual power between the churches.

2. To afford and promote a larger fellowship of Christians in the work of Christ.

3. To provide such programs, projects and organizations as will strengthen the churches and assist them in achieving their goals and objectives.

4. To discover needs which cannot be met effectively by churches individually, and to coordinate the use of resources in meeting these needs.

5. To encourage support by every church for the mission causes of the association, the North Carolina Baptist Convention, and the Southern Baptist Convention.

#### **ARTICLE III — AUTHORITY**

SECTION 1. The association shall have the power to elect and install its officers in whatever manner the body may deem expedient.

SECTION 2. The association shall have power to recommend measures of usefulness and guidance to our churches in matters of organization, ordinations and questions of doctrines and discipline.

SECTION 3. The association shall have no power to infringe upon the right of local churches as sovereign and independent bodies.

#### **ARTICLE IV — MEMBERSHIP**

SECTION 1. The association shall be composed of regularly constituted Baptist churches in cooperating fellowship with the Southern Baptist Convention and following the teachings of the New Testament.

SECTION 2. The association shall be the sole judge of its membership and may receive or reject churches applying for membership therein at its pleasure. Churches applying for membership shall agree to come under the watch care of the association for one year. It is understood that during this period of watch care the church shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the association except those of voting.

Applications for membership should be presented to the credentials committee of the association. Upon the recommendation of the credentials committee the church will automatically come under the watch care of the association for one year. During that year, the church shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the association except that of voting. It is suggested that any church under watch care participate in the missions program of the association. At the end of the year the church may be voted in as a member of the association with full privileges by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present and voting at the regular meeting of the association, provided that the church submit an acceptable letter and at least one messenger be present at the meeting.

SECTION 3. The association may withdraw from any church which has become unscriptural in its doctrine or practices by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present and voting at the annual meeting. Such vote is to be taken by written ballot. SECTION 4. Any church may withdraw from the association at its pleasure. Such action will be recognized by the association at the next annual meeting.

SECTION 5. It shall be the duty of each church to furnish the associational clerk, before each annual session, and annual letter, the forms provided by the associational clerk giving the information requested as is applicable to each church situation.

#### ARTICLE V - MEETINGS

SECTION 1. The association should hold its annual sessions on Thursday and Friday preceding the third Sunday in August. Special meetings of the association may be called by the Executive Board provided two weeks written notice is given to the member churches.

SECTION 2. Each church shall be entitled to be represented at the annual meeting by four messengers. Churches with more than 100 members shall be entitled to an additional messenger for each additional 50 members or fraction thereof and not to exceed 10 messengers from any one church.

SECTION 3. In case of internal dissension in a church and two parties coming to the association, each claiming to represent the church, neither party shall be seated until the question is decided as to which party is in union with the association. The decision is to be made by a majority of the messengers present and voting.

#### **ARTICLE VI - OFFICERS**

SECTION 1. General officers of the association shall be: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Parliamentarian. Program leaders shall be Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Church Music Director, Director of Deacons, Chairman of Evangelism Committee, Director of Continuing Education, Chairman of the Missions Committee, Director of Associational Missions, Trustees and such other officers as the association may desire to elect.

Associational representatives will be elected for the following institutions and agencies: (1) Truett Camp, (2) Baptist Children's Homes, (3) Baptist Hospital, (4) Homes for the Aging, (5) Baptist Literature, (*Biblical Recorder*) (6) Cooperative Program, other representatives (such as the American Bible Society, Annuity Board, Baptist Foundation, etc.) may be added as deemed appropriate and properly elected.

SECTION 2. With the exception of the director of associational missions and trustees, the terms of office for all officers of the association shall be for one year with with the privilege of continuing re-election. The moderator and vice-moderator shall not be eligible for re-election but one year in succession. (1) The number of trustees shall be three. (2) The term of service should be for three years, with the term of only one expiring each year. In the first election of trustees the term of service for one should be three years, another two years, and the other one year. (3) Upon the expiration of term of service the trustee may or may not be re-elected for another term of three years.

Each term of office shall begin with the close of the annual session with the exception of the treasurer who will serve from October 1, through September 30 (the financial year).

SECTION 3. The director of associational missions shall be sought and recommended by the Executive Committee in a manner of its own choosing. Within 10 days after locating a nominee, the Executive Committee shall present the name of the director nominee to a called meeting of the association. If the annual meeting of the association is scheduled within 60 days, the presentation shall wait until that time.

The call shall be indefinite. The salary, allowance, vacation, etc. shall be as provided by the current budget or adjustments recommended by the Executive Commit-

#### tee in consultation with the finance committee.

Concerning termination of employment, the resignation shall be in writing and presented to the Executive Committee at least 30 days before it is to take place. The Executive Committee may terminate employment by giving 30 days notice in advance.

The Executive Committee shall give full supervision and guidance to the work of the director of missions in planning, promoting and financing his work.

#### **ARTICLE VII — DUTIES OF OFFICERS**

SECTION 1. The MODERATOR shall preside and maintain the order of all meetings of the association and Executive Committee. He shall serve as ex-officio member of all committees of the association.

He shall appoint the committee on committees and all other committees pertinent to the operation of the body not named by the committee on committees in its regular report.

SECTION 2. The VICE-MODERATOR shall assist the moderator and shall preside in the absence of, or at the pleasure of the moderator.

SECTION 3. The CLERK shall keep a complete and accurate record of all transactions; shall prepare a Book of Reports to be distributed to messengers at the beginning of each day's session of the annual meeting; and shall cause to be printed minutes concerning the records made.

The clerk shall mail to the clerk of each church in the association, blanks for the preparation of the church letter as soon as they are received from the state convention. This form is to be returned to the clerk of the association not later than two weeks prior to the meeting of the body.

SECTION 4. The TREASURER shall receive and dispense by the order of the Executive Committee or the association while in session, the money of the treasury and make a complete report to the association at each session.

SECTION 5. The HISTORIAN shall keep the records of the association up to date.

SECTION 6. The PARLIAMENTARIAN shall upon the request of the presiding officer of the body advise and assist the association with respect to all matters involving parliamentary procedure.

SECTION 7. The PROGRAM LEADERS AND THE INSTITUTIONAL AGENCY REPRESENTATIVES shall perform all duties customary to their titles and shall make a written report to the annual session of the association.

SECTION 8. THE DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS shall work closely with the associational committees, officers, and churches in such a way as to facilitate the meeting of the objectives of the association as set forth in Article II.

The director shall serve as ex-officio member of all committees of the association. The director shall communicate with the state and Southern Convention such information as shall be mutually helpful and needful.

SECTION 9. TRUSTEES have no authority except by direction of the association, and not personally bound by their signatures but, are to be the legal signees for the association.

Trustees represent the association in legal matters.

Trustees act on behalf of the association in acquisition and disposal of associational property.

They sign all deeds of conveyance, execute all notes, bonds or mortgages, intervene in all suits, by authority of the association.

All persons dealing with the trustees, as associational officers, may rely upon any written resolution duly adopted by the association or Executive Committee, directing and authorizing the trustees to act in its behalf and certified by the association moderator and clerk.

#### **ARTICLE VIII - RULES OF ORDER**

The business of the association shall be conducted according to Robert's Parliamentary Practice or in a manner not contrary thereto.

#### ARTICLE IX - QUORUM

The annual associational quorum shall be not less than 25 percent of the member churches represented.

#### **ARTICLE X — THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE**

SECTION 1. The EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE shall be composed of the general officers and program leaders elected by the association and the pastor and one member from each church in the association. No pastor, by virtue of his being an associational officer or program leader shall be disqualified as a member of the Executive Committee, from representing the church or churches he may be serving in the association. Twelve of these members shall constitute a quorum.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committeeto act for the association on matters arising when the association is not in session and to make a report of all work to the next session of the association. This body shall meet at a time and place designated by the moderator on Monday following the first Sunday of each quarter except for the July quarter which shall meet on the last Monday of the month of July. Special meetings of the Executive Committee may be called by the moderator with a one week notice to the churches.

SECTION 3. All vacancies occurring on committees or among elected officers shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

SECTION 4. In the event that a vacancy occurs with the trustees, the Executive Committeeshould fill such a vacancy for the remainder of the term.

#### **ARTICLE XI — ASSOCIATIONAL COMMITTEES**

SECTION 1. The association shall have such standing committees as may be deemed necessary to promote efficiently the work of the Master in our midst. The term of office for all committee members shall be for one year except where specifically stated otherwise.

SECTION 2. THE COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES shall be appointed by the moderator at the first Executive Board meeting of the associational year. There shall be three members.

It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate at the annual meeting the following committees: Nominating, Credentials, Place and Preacher, Memorials, Finance, Constitution, Ordination, Evangelism, Missions.

SECTION 3. The NOMINATING COMMITTEE shall be composed of five members. To this group the directors of Sunday School, Church Training, Women's Missionary Union, Brotherhood and Music Ministry will be added.

It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate the officers, program leaders and institutional/agency representatives. These nominees shall be notified in writing not less than one month prior to presenting of their names at the annual session.

SECTION 4. THE ORDER OF BUSINESS COMMITTEE, composed of three members, shall plan the annual program of the association and present it to the Executive Committee at its July meeting.

SECTION 5. THE CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three pastors and two laymen. It shall examine applications of churches seeking admission into the association in keeping with Article IV, and make recommendations to the association.

It shall counsel with churches that are out of harmony or fellowship with the association.

SECTION 6. THE PLACE AND PREACHER COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members. The duties of this committee shall be to recommend the place or places for the following annual meeting and to recommend the preacher and alternate to deliver the annual sermon for the following year.

SECTION 7. THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members appointed by the moderator at the first session of the annual session. It shall be the duty of the committee to present suitable resolutions at the annual associational meeting.

SECTION 8. THE MEMORIAL COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members. It shall be the duty of this committee to bring a report to the annual meeting of those listed by the member churches as deceased since the last annual meeting and shall lead in a memorial service in their memory.

SECTION 9. THE FINANCE COMMITTEE shall be composed of six members including the treasurer of the association. This committee shall: (a) Present a budget to the association for the following year; (b) Devise plans for raising the funds for the association budget; (c) Audit the finances and financial records of the association twice annually and anytime there is a change of treasurer or at the direction of the association or the Executive Committee; (d) Report all audits to the annual association meeting.

SECTION 10. THE CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members and shall perform all duties specified in Article XIV.

SECTION 11. THE ORDINATION COMMITTEE shall be composed of five designated pastors and all other pactors who desire to sit with the committee.

a. The committee serves in an advisory capacity only and serves at the request of the church from which one of the members is seeking ordination.

b. The committee should examine such candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry and make such recommendations to the church as they feel led.

c. The committee should assist in arranging the proper service of ordination when such assistance is requested.

d. The Executive Committee should be informed regularly of the work of the committee.

e. Each church desiring to ordain a candidate is urged to consult with the committee, and shall give two weeks notice in which the committee is to do its work.

SECTION 12. THE EVANGELISM COMMITTEE. The duties of the committee shall be to direct and promote a perpetual program and spirit of evangelism in the association. It shall arrange and direct all associational wide evangelistic activities.

SECTION 13. THE MISSIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of six members, two named each year and each serving for a three-year term. Committee members are eligible to be re-elected for one additional term of office in succession. The associational brotherhood director and Woman's Missionary Union director are to serve as ex-officio members along with the director of missions and the moderator.

The duties of the missions committee shall be: to plan, conduct and evaluate the mission program of the association through: (a) Helping churches commit themselves to being ON MISSION in their setting; (b) Provide and interpret information on mission needs to the churches of the association; (c) To survey the mission needs to be found within the association; (d) Assist churches in doing mission work; (e) Conduct the kinds of mission work that individual churches cannot successfully conduct.

#### **ARTICLE XII — THE ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL**

The ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL shall be composed of the director of missions, the moderator, the vice-moderator, the program leaders: Sunday school, church training, Woman's Missionary Union, brotherhood, the chairman of deacons, the chairman of the evangelism committee, the chairman of the missions committee, the chairman of the finance committee. The director of missions is to serve as chairman and a secretary shall be elected from the group.

The purpose of the council is to coordinate the planning of the various programs of the association, to develop an associational calendar, and to give mutual support to the various organizations and program units in carrying out their assignments.


The council shall meet quarterly.

#### ARTICLE XIII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL PASTOR'S CONFERENCE

The associational Pastor's Conference provides regular meetings for the Baptist ministers of the association. The purpose of the conference is for fellowship and mutual support, for doctrinal and professional discussion and for promotion of church, associational and other denominational programs. The conference is not an administrative or executive body.

#### **ARTICLE XIV — AMENDMENTS**

The constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the association by a two-thirds majority of the messengers present and voting, provided the amendment has been presented to the constitutional committee at least 10 days prior to the annual meeting and presented to the association in printed form on the first day of the annual meeting to be voted on the second day.


