The spirit of missions is the spirit of Jesus. He went about doing good, ever dispensing his gifts and his blessings. He is our pattern and our example. Saved by him, we must be like him, and made partakers of the divine nature, are to be merciful as he is merciful. Our strongest evidence of regeneration is the spirit of obedience. "If ye love me keep my commandments." "He that loveth me will keep my sayings." His command is, "Go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature." The world is the field. And now the whole world is open to the gospel. From every quarter of the globe comes the Macedonian cry, "Come over and help us." Our foreign missionaries, wherever they have gone, are rejoicing in seeing the pleasure of the Lord prospering in their hands. STATE MISSIONS.

There are scores of square miles in our own State that are without the gospel as we hold it, and many portions that are destitute of preaching by any evangelical denomination.

We have in the employment of the State Mission Board this year 26 missionaries. Four more than ever engaged at any time before in the history of the State. The reports of our missionaries were never so encouraging as they are this year. The great destitution is being rapidly occupied by those faithful men. Several hundred dollars are needed to pay the salaries of those self-denying men. The Board asks a collection from all. Let us all come up to the help of the Lord against the mighty-

The Sunday School is only secondary to the gospel as a system of evangelization. It is the Bible school, where the little ones are trained for the service of the Master, and educated in the great things of salvation. We have carefully examined the reports sent to this Association for the present year, and are obliged to say that they are meagre. According to the figures on the reports, only 241 precious little immortals were registered. However, we have noticed one encouraging feature, a desire on the part of the churches to make the Sunday School a flourishing ever-green. The education of the immortal mind is the next thing to salvation, the religious training of our children the hope of the Baptists of North Carolina. It is with us as a denomination a desideratum. Brethren, one and all, let us rally for this children's home; let us make it for the little folks the most attractive place they can find, then shall it be what God designed, a heaven on earth begun. Let us hoist our banners on every church steeple within our bounds, and gather the dear little innocents from the coves and valleys of these mountains, and make the welkin ring with the praise and glory of God.

Rev. W. F. Gray was appointed to aid Brother Gwyn in the Sanday School work. He also accepted the appointment.

J. H. Foot, W. Goforth and E. B. Hendren were appointed a Sunday School Board, to aid Brother Gwyn in his work.

The committee on Temperance reported as follows:

We find tempérance is one of the christian graces commended in the word of God, and an inspired apostle, while addressing a heathen governor, reasoned of righteousness, temperance and judgment to come; and whereas, we consider the making, vending and using of alcoholic liquors for the purpose of common beverages, as constituting one of the greatest evils that has ever blighted any nation.

Resolved, therefore, That we advise the churches composing this body to use all lawful and scriptural means within their power to induce their members to desist from the practices above indicated, as being deroga-

Fifty years ago education in North Carolina was at a very low ebb. It is true there were academies and what were termed "old field" school houses scattered here and there over the State, seated in the corner of which was the school-master, with his ferule and bunch of roasted hickories, which ever and anon were applied to the backs of mischievous urchins, who were sent to school to keep them out of mischief at home. It was rare then to see a young man who aspired to anything in books beyond Webster's spelling book and old Pike's arithmetic. It was then that the general idea prevailed "where ignorance is bliss, tis folly to be wise." Now survey the situation. The fifty years have rolled away and with them those old fossil ileas, and in their stead new views and grand emotions have actuated the humane heart to great enterprises and noble deeds. Colleges and high schools have sprung up from the mountains to the sea, from whose doors annually issued great moral lights, men whose minds, trained and educated, shine out with splendor and illumine this beautiful world of ours. The discoveries in science have surpassed the most unreasonable imaginations of our fathers, and the physical world revolutionized.

The moral as well as the physical world has shared in this great victory. The religious press, handled by educated men, is sending forth the Bible and good books and papers all over the world to keep pace with the movements of the age, that the gospel may be carried to every corner of the earth. Your committee would, therefore, exhort the brethren of this Association to do all in their power to push on this glorious cause, by encouraging the young to be educated so as to take the places in the ranks of those who will soon be called away to their final reward. Religion and science harmonized and united will bless any nation of people, and happiness and prosperity follow in their train.

CONSTITUTION;

ARTICLE 1. This Association shall be composed of the ministers belonging to the Association, and the delegates sent up by the churches producing letters certifying their appointment, and each church shall be entitled to four delegates.

2. The delegates thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage, nor shall they have any ecclesiastical power over the churches, nor shall they infringe any of the internal rights of

3. Every gospel church is, according to the glorious gospel, to believe any church in our Union. and act according to that Divine rule of faith and practice.

4. The Association, when convened, shall be governed by a regular 5. The Association shall have a Moderator and Clerk, chosen by the and proper decorum.

suffrages of the delegates present.

6. New churches may be admitted into our Union, which shall petition by letter and delegates, and upon examination, if found orthodox and orderly, shall be received by the Association, and manifested by the Moderator giving the delegates the right hand of fellowship.

7. We will not receive any person as a member of this Association whose bad conduct is notorious, believing it to be our duty to withdraw

from every brother that walketh disorderly.

8. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with minutes of the Association as may seem best to the Association.

9. The Clerk shall record the proceedings of the Association, superintend printing the Minutes, file a Minute each year, be Treasurer, and be allowed a reasonable compensation for his services.

10. This Constitution may be altered or amended by any future Association, if it deems it necessary, by concurrence of two-thirds of the

11. The Association shall have power to withdraw from any church in this Union, that may become heretical in principle or corrupt in practice

or that may violate this Constitution, and continue to do so. 12. The Association shall have power to adjourn to any future time or

place it may think most convenient.

13. The Association shall have power to inquire into the cause, when the churches do not at any time of its sittings represent themselves.

14. A majority of the churches being represented, shall form a quorum let the transaction of any business belonging to the Association. 15. If a quorum fails to meet, the Moderator shall have power to con-

vene the body at any time and place he may deem necessary.

16. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside and enforce a due observance of the Constitution and Rules of Decorum; on failure, to be reproved by any member, and dealt with as the Association may think proper.

RULES OF DECORUM.

1. The Association.shall be opened and closed by prayer.

2. The letters from the churches shall be read, and the names of the

3. A Moderator and Clerk shall be chosen by the suffrages of the members present.

4. Only one member shall speak at a time, who shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator; and while speaking, shall not be interrupted by any member, except the Moderator.

5. The member speaking shall strictly adhere to the subject, and use no words calculated to irritate,

6. No member shall abruptly break off, or absent himself, without leave of the Association

7. No member shall speak more than three times upon one subject, without leave of the Association.

8. No member shall have the liberty of laughing during the sitting of

the Association, nor whispering in time of public speech.

9. No member of the Association shall address another by any other appellation than that of brother.

10. The Moderator shall not interrupt any member or prohibit him from speaking till he gives his light on the subject, unless he breaks this

11. The names of the several members of the Association shall be called by the Clerk as often as the Association requires.

12. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privileges as another member, provided his seat be filled; and he shall have no vote, unless the Association be equally divided.

13. Queries presented by the churches shall be attended to by the Association.

14. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association, except it be withdrawn by the member who

15 Any member who shall willingly and knowingly break any of these rules, shall be reproved by the Association as it shall think proper.
