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PROCEEDINGS.

MACEDONIA CHURCH,
ALEXANDER COUNTY, N. C., August 24th, 1882. }

The introductory sermon was preached by Elder W. J. Fulford from 2d Thessalonians, 3d chapter and 5th verse, Elders Privett and Meadows not being present.

Intermission for one hour. Then assembled in the church. Called to order by the Moderator of last year. Prayer, Elder W. R. Gwaltney leading.

Letters were then read from thirty-three churches forming this Association.

Proceeded to elect officers, which resulted as follows: R. A. Spainhour, Moderator, and J. B. Pool, Clerk, W. R. Gwaltney and W. J. Fulford being tellers.

Opened door for admission of new churches.

Invited correspondents, when Bro. E. H. Irvin and Elder W. J. Fulford from South Yadkin, Elder J. P. Gwaltney from Brier Creek, and Elder W. R. Gwaltney from the Raleigh Association, accepted. Bro. W. R. Gwaltney acted as agent for the RECORDER.

Met as per adjournment, read and corrected minutes of yesterday, called roll and marked absentees.

Read Constitution, By-Laws and Abstract of Principles.

Called on correspondents and delegates to Baptist State Convention.

R. A. Spainhour attended the Yadkin Association, G. W. Greene the South Yadkin and Brier Creek, I. W. Thomas the Three Forks, were cordially received and highly pleased. Received and Correspondents discharged.

On motion, any member of this Association attending the Yadkin, South Yadkin, Brier Creek, Elkin, Three Forks, New River, Roan Mountain, Catawba and South Fork Associations are requested to act as correspondents. Also any member attending the Baptist State Convention to represent as a delegate.

Called on committees to report.

Committee on Foreign Missions reported:

In the early spread of Christianity the apostles, following the direction of their Divine Master, began at Jerusalem and from there they went out east and west, north and south, to Judea and Samaria, Galilee and Syria, Damascus and Egypt, Cilicia and Asia Minor, Macedonia and Greece, Italy and Spain until within a few years the Gospel had penetrated to the farthest corner of the Roman Empire. No less wonderful

has been the success of the modern missionary enterprise. Against opposition as great as that met by the Apostles, the servants of the Lord have gone at the command of their Master, and they have seen the work of the Lord prospering in their hands. Less than one hundred years ago William Carey was told by one of his brethren, "Sit down, young man! when the Lord wants the heathen converted he will do it without you or me." But "the consecrated cobbler" persisted and inaugurated the modern missionary movement, and only eternity will show the blessed result. At the birth of men now in the prime of life the Sandwich Islanders were naked savages, feeding upon each other, in the very lowest position of the scale of humanity. To-day they are civilized, Christianized, and sending missionaries to other lands. Seventy-five years ago, Judson and Rice, converted to Baptist principles on their voyage to India, driven by the East India Company from Hindoostan, landed in Rangoon. We are familiar with the story of their early struggles. To-day besides hundreds of Burmese there are thousands of Karens gathered into churches and Associations, and by their contributions to the cause are shaming us in this gospel land. A few years ago the mission to the Telooongs was on the point of being abandoned. In ten years this "Lone Star Mission" was blessed with the baptism of ten thousand converts in twelve months. These are but specimens of the gracious fruits the Lord has granted his laborers. Our own missionaries have toiled a few years in China, Africa, Italy, Mexico and South America. Great inroads have been made upon heathenism and Popery; churches have been organized and associations formed. But our missionaries need re-inforcement. Some have toiled long and are nearly worn out. The men can be found to join them in this work if the churches will furnish the means. Have we done our part?

We rejoice to see an increase in the missionary spirit in some of our churches. Last year \$30 were reported for this object. This year the letters report \$50, besides nearly \$100 for other objects. But more than half of the churches report nothing. We urge it upon the pastors and delegates to see to it that all have an opportunity of contributing for the spread of the Gospel in foreign lands.

The importance of a sound religious literature was never at any time of greater moment to the country than the present. This is true from the fact that people of all classes are in search of something to read, and as the desire for something to read increases so will the demand for readable matter increase. It is evident that if we do not furnish a good

paper for our children to read, that with the large increase of newspapers that are pernicious in their character and that are brought to them at a premium, they will form a habit of reading such matter as will be extremely dangerous to their best interests. Hence we would recommend that every Baptist parent see to it that the RECORDER, the organ of the denomination in the State, a well conducted and a true, bold and fearless exponent of truth, be put within the reach of their children, yea, it should be in the hands of every Baptist in the State, and read with careful attention. We must confess that we can't understand how a Baptist can afford to be without the RECORDER. We also recommend *Kind Words* to all Sunday schools as the best Sunday school paper in the South.

Committee on State Missions reported:

There are now thirty-six missionaries under the supervision of the State Mission Board, ten more than ever were employed before in the history of our Convention. These faithful men are accomplishing, by the help of the Lord, great things in the destitute portions of our State. In town and in country, churches are being organized and houses of worship are being built, and the pure word of life is being rapidly carried into every nook and corner of North Carolina. But the destitution is still great. We can count a dozen counties in Eastern North Carolina in neither of which is to be found more than one Missionary Baptist church. Large portions of Stanly, Rowan, Davidson, Iredell, Mecklenburg, Cabarrus, Gaston, Lincoln and Catawba counties are without the Gospel as we hold it. The State Mission Board is looking after this destitution as well as other portions equally as destitute, and is laboring to supply them with the Gospel. Our Board is not only sharing with many of the Associations the expenses of the mission work in their bounds

but is supplementing the salaries of the pastors of many of our weak town churches. Will not all of the Associations and churches come up to the help of the Lord in this work? We feel called upon as a denomination to send the Gospel, as we hold it, into every part of the State and of the world.

Invited correspondents. L. P. Gwaltney, from Brier Creek Association, accepted.

Committee on Education reported.

The cause of education among us is still hopeful, and the interest increasing. We rejoice to find many parents who have it in their hearts to educate their children. Our schools of high grade are prospering beyond our most sanguine expectations. We are glad to report that our churches are beginning to take an interest in the education of the ministry, a number of them having contributed to the fund of Ministerial Education the past year. We would entreat parents to make every reasonable effort in their power to give their children at least a good English education. And for this purpose we heartily recommend Moravian Falls Academy, under the able management of Bro. G. W. Greene, as a suitable school for our boys and girls. Board and tuition are to be had in this school at the most reasonable rates. It affords your committee great pleasure to recommend Wake Forest College as a school for our young men who desire a finished education, and especially for young ministers, as the College gives them tuition free. We would entreat our young brethren who have the ministry in view to make every effort to spend a while in this excellent institution of learning. We would also entreat the churches to make large contributions to our Board of Education, that our young ministers may obtain a liberal education, and thus be better enabled to preach the blessed Gospel of Christ.

REPORT ON OBITUARIES.

MCALPIN WALSH

Was born in Wilkes county, near Elk Creek church, April 30th, 1801, and died July 1st, 1882, aged 81 years, 2 months and 1 day. He professed religion when about 33 years old, and united with Lewis Fork church. He was soon afterwards elected deacon, and filled the office to his death with honor to himself and the church. He was a standing delegate to the Association for many years, and was always faithful to the trust. His last attendance upon the Association was in 1878, when it met at his own church. A short time before his death he said to the writer that he had no desire to get well. With a bright hope of heaven, he passed away as one falling asleep. "For they that say such things declare plainly that they seek a country, that is an heavenly."

ELDER JOHN B. POWELL

Was born on Lower Creek, in Caldwell county, about the year 1826. He professed religion in early life, and united with the Lower Creek church. Soon afterwards he was ordained to the work of the ministry, and for more than 30 years was pastor of Lower Creek church. He was a man of remarkable natural gifts, and preached much with great acceptance, and with large results. But withal he was a very timid and retiring man, rarely preaching when others were present to preach.

Saturday, April 8th, 1882, he was in his pulpit as usual, but in the midst of his sermon his voice failed, he tottered, and was caught by his brethren. He survived only long enough to reach home, and then passed away at the age of 56. According to his desire, he died in the harness.

ELDER LINVILLE LAND

Was born in what is now Watauga county, about 1822, and died in November, 1881, being nearly 60 years old. He lived most of his life in Wilkes county. He joined the church when about 20 years old, and commenced preaching about eight years later. As a teacher and preacher he exerted an influence for good over a large section of country. For a number of years he had been a member of Mt. Pleasant church, and also was long the pastor of Mt. Zion, Lewis Fork and other churches in

this and other Associations. When the summons came it found him ready. "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord."

Bro. MELVILLE CAMPBELL died in Ashe county, N. C., November, 1881, aged 48 years. He was born in Iredell county in 1833. Bro. Campbell professed religion and joined Buffalo Baptist church in 1870, and soon thereafter was chosen Deacon, which office he filled with honor to himself and the church. Bro. Campbell in his every day life exemplified the power of the christian religion. He was a warm friend to Missions and Sunday Schools. He bore a large part of the expenses of the building of Buffalo church, for the interest of which it was his greatest pleasure to labor. Bro. Campbell was a good neighbor, an affectionate husband and father, and a devoted christian. He is sensibly missed by his church and this Association. But the Lord help us to be resigned to His will and make us all faithful servants of His as was our beloved brother Campbell.

I began to travel 1st of February, 1882, and have continued up to the present. Have traveled 500 miles, have preached 33 sermons, visited and held family prayer with 67 families, and have made several Sunday School talks. Have preached monthly at two out stations, and at various other points in passing, and expect to hold protracted meetings at these two points soon. I have received as a remuneration for my labors \$47.93, \$27.75 of which I received from the State Board, \$4.15 from Mt. Olive church, \$14.28 from J. C. Bell, Treasurer of Association, and the remainder from the little Sunday School at one of my points.

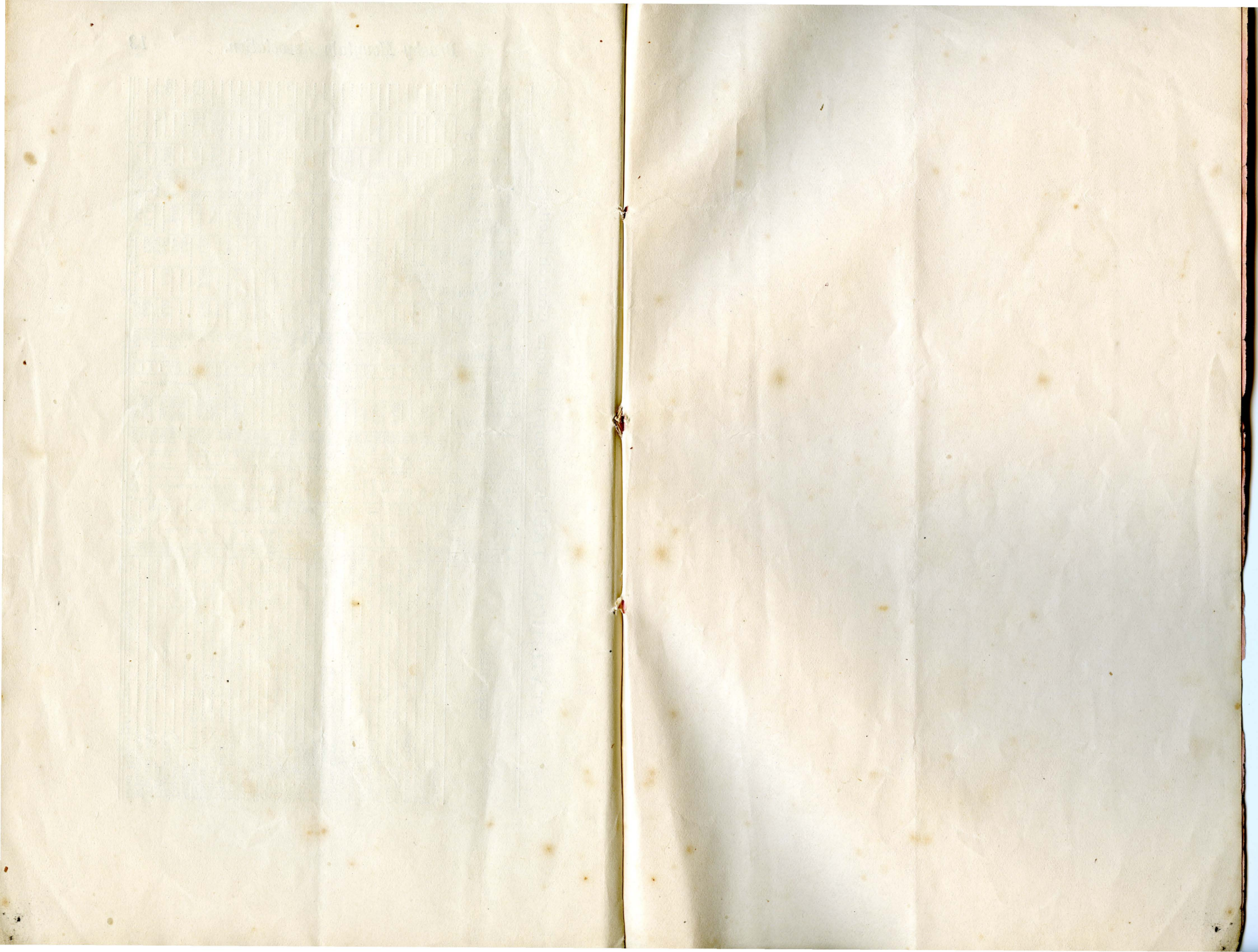

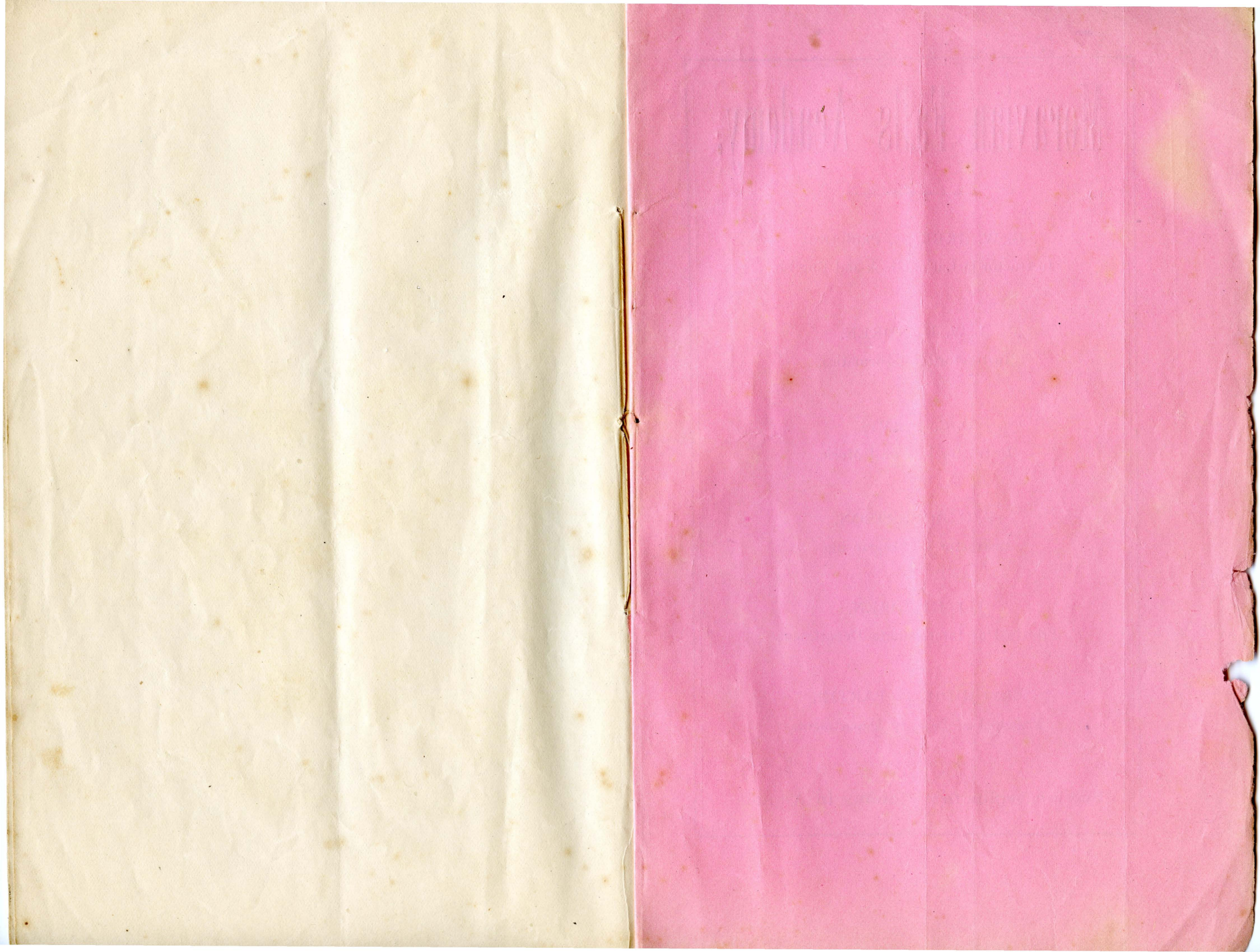
