Constitution of the Atlantic Baptist Association.

1. This Association shall be known as the "Atlantic Baptist Association."

It shall be composed of the pastors and of the delegates elected by the churches connected with it, each church being entitled to three delegates unless the membership shall exceed fifty, and then there shall be an

additional delegate for every twenty-five members. 3. Its object shall be the promotion of the Redeemer's Kingdom, by securing the co-operation of its churches for their own edification and for

the spread of the gospel according to our faith and order.

The "New Hampshire Declaration of Faith" shall be the summary of Divine Truth for determining questions of faith or order in this body; and churches desiring to be received must signify their acceptance of it, in substance, together with the covenant herewith submitted, and this

5. This Association shall not annul the discipline of a church, or exercise authority over it. But it may advise, and it may sever from its connection any church that neglects to preserve gospel order, or that treats

with contempt the objects or advice of the Association.

6. Each church shall send to the Association, at its annual session, a statement of (1) its locality; (2) the name of its pastor, clerk, clerk's post office, delegates and ministers other than the pastor; (3) the Sunday or Sundays of regular service; (4) the church statistics; (5) Sunday School statistics; (6) contributions to pastor's salary; church expenses, Associational Missions, Home Missions, State Missions, Foreign Missions, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Minute Fund, other objects.

7. Whenever a church shall not represent itself at an annual session of the Association, either by delegate or letter, or whenever a church shall not report something contributed for missions, inquiry shall be made for the cause; effort shall be made to revive the church and induce it to do its duty, and this effort shall be continued till the church be recovered or

dropped from this Association.

8. The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Clerk, and a Treasurer, elected annually by ballot from among its members, to serve until their successors shall have been elected, and to perform the duties usual to such officers, the Moderator in presiding, the Clerk in recording and preserving minutes and other papers belonging to the body, and the Treasurer in receiving and disbursing according to its will all funds belonging to or entrusted to the body.

9. The Association shall appoint annually an Executive Board of seven, of whom the Treasurer shall be one, to whom shall be entrusted the proseof whom the Treasurer shall be one, to whom shall be entrusted the prose-cution of Associational Missions, and any other work which this body may refer to them, and who shall, as far as practicable, co-operate with the State Mission Board in supplying the destitution in our territory, and between the meetings of the Association take such action as may seem to

them advisable for the advancements of its objects.

The Board shall present to the Association at its annual meeting a report of all its proceedings, with the Treasurer's report of all receipts and disbursements, and with the names of its missionaries, time of service and

details of their work.

10. The annual session of the Association shall begin on Tuesday after the 2nd Lord's Day in October, at such place as may be chosen, and an Introductory sermon shall be delivered on the first day of the session. Representatives from a majority of the churches shall constitute a quorum. 11. This Constitution may be amended at any Annual Session by a

two-thirds vote of the members present.

BY-LAWS.

1. The daily sessions of the Association shall be opened and closed

Delegates shall be recognized by letters from their churches, designating them as such.

3. The Moderator shall recognize corresponding messengers or the delegates of newly received churches by extending to them his right

4. The Clerk shall record and read the proceedings when called for, superintend the publication and distribution of the minutes, preserve a file of them, and have it present at each annual session, and deliver to his

file of them, and have it present at each annual session, and deliver to his successor all papers belonging to the body.

5. Members desiring to speak, shall first rise and address the Moderator; shall use the term "brother," in speaking to each other; shall not speak on the same subject more than twice without permission, and shall observe the courtesy that becomes Christians.

6. Members shall not absent themselves from the session without per-

7. The roll of members shall be called at least once, and absentees marked.

8. Corresponding messengers and visiting brethren shall be invited to seats, with privilege of speaking, but not of voting.

9. A copy of the minutes shall be sent to the Secretary of the State Mission Board, also one to the Secretary of the Southern Baptist Convention, and one to the American Baptist Publication Society, 1420 Chestnut

Street, Philadelpina.

10. All questions of order not herein provided shall be decided by "Mell's Parliamentary Practice."

11. The Report of the Executive Board, and the Missionary work of the Association, shall take precedence of all other business during the morning session of the second day of the annual session.

12. The General Order of Business shall be:

Reading church letters and enrollment of delegates.

Election of officers. Petitionary letters.

Appointment of committees for this session.

Appointment of standing committees.

Report of committees on churches delinquent at the previous session. Reports of standing committees.

Reports of other committees. Miscellaneous business.

The Association adjourned at 12 o'clock to meet again

at 2 o'clock.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

At 2 o'clock the Moderator called the Association to order. Prayer by C. Durham.

G. F. Smith, Pastor of Methodist Church, being present, was invited by the Moderator to take a seat with the body.

The Report on Sunday Schools was re-read as amended by J. H. Vernon, and after being discussed by C. Durham and others was adopted as follows:

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

The Sunday School work is too well known in our churches for your Committee to speak of its importance. But while our churches recognize the great importance of the Sunday School work, we need unity of design and concert of action. We therefore recommend first: That our schools all use "The Kind Words Series" of S. B. Convention. Second. That we organize a Sunday School Association in our bounds similar to those

already organized in the State, and that a Committee be appointed to desaready organized in the State, and that a Committee be appointed to designate the time and place, and prepare an order of exercises for such meeting.

REPORT ON MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

The work of educating our ministry is emphasized by the prominence it receives in the discussion, and also contributions it is receiving. While grateful to God for the long history of usefulness of many of our brethren who never had an opportunity of obtaining an education, yet we all feel now the imperative demand of fitting and qualifying our ministers by which is located at Wake Forest College, has now under its charge for support 40 young preachers. To each one of these young ministers the Board pays \$8.60 per month. In order that the Board may be able to do this, the churches of the Association must contribute liberally and promptly to J. C. CADDELL, Committee.

Its past work has been such as to make us grateful to God, while its present and future work call for strong faith and enlarged liberality on

This Board has employed the past year 118 Missionaries and expended \$16,500. Notwithstanding this great work, this Board could have greatly enlarged its work if it had had the means. the part of all our churches.

So important is the work of this Board that we consider it the means of helping every other department of our work.

In contributing to State Missions we contribute to every other mission The general claims of this Board are sufficient to call forth our liberal

contributions and earnest prayers; but upon us, as an Association, it has special claims.

2. Because so many of our weak churches are still helped by this Board. While we pay this past year \$1,075 to State Missions the Board.

3. Because this Board, while it failed by \$5,000 to give all the aid asked for by the destitution of the State, was liberal enough towards us to give us all we asked.

There are now 125 orphans in the Thomasville Orphanage, all dependent on the voluntary contributions of the Lord's people in North Carolina. The Orphanage is the property of the Baptist of this State. The children there are our nephews and nieces in the Gospel. The Lord is going to say to those who have helped in caring for these, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of these least, ye have done it unto Me." We suggest that each church in this Association take one collection this year for the orphans, and that the Sunday Schools take monthly collections for this orphans, and that the Sunday Schools take monthly collections for this worthy object.
