#### IN MEMORIUM.

Jonathan Williams departed this life May 24th 1911 at the age of sixty-five years. Henderson county thus losses one of its most useful and beloved citizens and the Carolina Association one of its most faithful and loyal members. Born and reared in Henderson county, he spent all the years of his active manhood laboring to promote every enterprise which would develop the interests of his native county and increase the knowledge and enlarge the hearts of his fellow men.

Public confidence in him was manifested from his early manhood until the day of his death, most of the years of his active life having bee nspent in positions of public trust. For ten years he was sheriff of the county, served as representative in the State Legislature, and was several times mayor of Hendersonville.

He was especially interested in the cause of education and when Fruitland Institute was founded he was among the first to be suggested as a member of the Board of Trustees. In this position he remained until the day of his death one of the most interested supporters of the Institution and one of its wisest advisers during the days of its early struggles.

Brother Williams was first of all a Christian man and his many public duties were never allowed to conflict with his obligations and duties to his church. One of his first steps on coming to Hendersonville was to affiliate himself with the Baptist Church and he was ever loyal to all its interests. For thirty years he was one of its deacons and was for a number of years superintendent of the Sunday school. Truly a good man has fallen. His body sleeps in Oak

Dale cemetery awaiting the resurrection at the last day.

#### REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

Eighty years ago in the town of Greensboro, N. C., the Baptist State Convention was organized. At its first session a Board of Missions was appointed to look after the evangelization of the state. At that time we had only 15,000 Baptists white and colored, about 500 churches, no denominational paper, no colleges or schools. Now we have about 225,000 white Baptist and about 175,000 colored, 1918 churches, colleges the equal of any in our state and fourteen High Schools which are doing a great work in preparing students for our colleges, and in training hundreds who will not get to college, but be active Christian workers in our State. Still there is great need for our work.

In Eastern North Carolina there are 20 counties with a population of 200,000 whites and 175,000 colored with an average of only one church to 80 square miles. Survey, this condition calls for vigorous State mission work-

In Piedmont North Carolina two conditions on roat us. First to seize the mill centers where the people are flocking by the hundreds and thousands. Second to hold the country churches weakened by this exclus to the mills.

The west is largely evangelized and only a few sections today are destitute of Baptist churches. These churches, however, are largely undeveloped, hence the task in Western North Carolina is to build up the weak churches into strength and the dormant churches into efficiency.

Money spent today in State mission work is counting far more than ever before for the advancement of our Master's Kingdom both at home and the uttermost part of the earth.

We, therefore recommend:

1st. That a committee be appointed to arrange for mission rallies i nall of our churches this year.

2nd. That a man be placed in the field whose duty it shall be to co-operate with the pastors in holding these rallies and also to perform any other duties assigned him by the Executive Board.

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#### REPORT ON EDUCATION.

In the day of the Prophet Hosea the Lord said "My people are destroyed for lack of knowledge,, and in New Testament times, Paul wrote Timothy, "Study to show thyself approved unto God a workman that needeth not to be asnamed."

Both these texts need to be emphasized in the Carolina Association, because there is a lamentable lack of knowledge on the part of our people, and very few workers in our churches. We must educate. Our interest and self-respect demand it. If we fail to provide for the training of our boys and girls, other denominations will take them from us. Without trained workers for our chuch work we cannot hope to succeed. So the interests of the kingdom of God are demanding urgently that we provide every means possible for the education of our people.

Fruitland Institute, the school of the Association is doing a great work. Its present enrollment is larger than ever before at this time of the year, and a higher grade of work is being done. It has five ministerial students and some others who are being trained for Mission work. As a rule students from Fruitland become christian workers wherever they go Several necessary improvements have been added in the past two years, but there is now a pressing need of a new school building, and the Home Mission Board stands ready to help in its construction. We believe that money invested in Christion education at Fruitland will yield large returns for the kingdom of Christ. Also we would urge that our churches take part in raising \$150,000 endowment fund for Meredith College. To those who have finished the high school we would recommend Wake Forest and Meredith Colleges.

## REPORT ON WOMAN'S WORK,

Last year in the South our women through their societies raised \$250,000 for benevolent objects and sent to missionaries boxes valued at \$13,000. In North Carolina they raised \$31,000 and are planning to raise \$35,000 this year. In the Carolina Association there was only one society last year. Now there are nine and the five of these that have reported contributed \$213.93.

Their greatest work, however, lies not in finance but the training and spiritual development of our churches. They have distributed tracts, conducted mission study classes stim ulating the spiritual life of each member, but in the young women's auxiliary the Sunbeams and Royal Ambassadors by their careful training they are doing a work which eternity alone can reward. Through well rendered programmes and the deepened spiritual lines of their members these good women have stimulated our churches to larger things. Not only do they contribute to missions, but care for children of missionaries in the Margaret Home and contribute to the training school for women at our Seminary.

We would commend, in the highest terms, the great work done in their association the past year in establishing and developing societies and pledge to their own aid in establishing their societies in all our churches. We recommend the following resolution:

#### FOREIGN MISSIONS REPORT.

The Foreign Mission Board is in the glorious work of world evangelization. It is appointed by Southern Baptists for this stupendous task. Splendid opportunities are before us. China, with 440,000,000 of people, is passing through a marvelous transformation. Now is the time to give these millions the gospel. Japan is leading the Orient. Shall we lead Japan to Christ? Mohammedanism threatens to submerge Africa. Shall we turn back the tide by the power of the gospel? South America, Mexico and Italy are sick and tired of Romanism; they are ready to receive the message which we have to give. Vast open doors which we have not yet been able to enter lie before us.

We have sent out 273 missionaaries—thirty of them sent out last year—and they have gathered around them 531 native helpers, and are training hundreds of others. The Missionaies reported 3,618 baptisms last year and will soon report tens of thousands of converts each year, if the present rapid growth continues. There are seven Women's Training Schools with 140 students and nine Theological Training Schools with 212 students. There are fifteen medical missionaries treating many thousands of patients and opening the way to the hearts and the homes of millions of people. We have seven hospitals and twelve dispensaries in which the missionaries assisted by five missionary nurses and many native helpers treated 40,716 patients. The printing plants are sending out the Bible and millions of pages of reilgious literature in the languages of the people.

The work has grown so rapidly that it cost last year far more than our people were willing to give. If we meet the actual necessities of the missions now, we must greatly enlarge our offering. The total receipts for last year were \$510.008.97, a small gain over the year before. An accumulated debt of \$98,600 now rests upon the work. This shoul? be paid off this year. To do so and maintain the work as it now is, will require \$600,000. Will the churches give it. It is a condition that calls for greatly enlarged giving but it is absolutely imperative unless our people are willing to let this great cause suffer. Let us raise this amount and even more that we may make an advance in the work.

We recommend:—1. That all our people help; by sympathy and prayer; by subscribing for and reading the Foreign Mission Jounal; by distributing tracts which can be had for the asking; by self-denying sacrifice by all, and by liberal gifts from the wealthy; by sending in their gifts now and not waiting for the season of pressure in March and April. 2. That we solemnly pledge ourselves to do all in

our power to raise the amount of \$..... which has been asked of our association this year.

We are sorry to note that some churches report no baptisms during the year, the church is in a sad condition that does not win a soul for Christ during the year. Let every church be a soul winning body during the coming year.

This Association passed a resolution at its last session, asking Bro. E. T. Middleton, our Sunday school secretary in this state, to come and conduct a Sunday school worker's institute, which was to be held at Fruitland. As the time approached for the institute your committee did all it could to advertise the meeting, and to emphasize its importance, by sending a letter to each superintendent and to most of the ministers, and by announcing it in the county papers. Five churches delegated; the residue did not, to their own great loss.

# SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT TO CAROLINA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

There are no words at our command with which we may express the needs of our association in regard to the great Sunday school work. This work stands close to the work of the ministry in importance, and we must appeal to the ministers for greater help on their part, in our efforts to put it before our people in its magnitude.

The greatest barrier that stands in the way of your committee in its efforts to unite our people in a forward movement in our Sunday schools is lack of co-operation on the part of our people—our leaders. Until this is overcome, our labors will be comparatively fruitless.

The next important hindrance is the ignorance of our people in the Sunday school work. We are content to drag along in the same old rut, year after year. We do not seem to realize that we ought to have many conversions as a direct result of each Sunday's work.

Let us forget this old way and prepare ourselves to teach God's word in the most powerful manner possible; and to conduct the Sunday school so that it will attract the aged as well as the children, and the business man as well as the youth. O, what a need right here.

We can get any kind of help we need from the Sunday School Board, at Nashville, '1 enn., and certainly every Sunday school teacher ought to be familiar with the Convention Normal Manual, published and sold by the Board. It will make you a larger channel through which the Holy Spirit may work.

Last year the average attendance in this association was 1240, a gain of 13 over the previous year. The total enrollment was 2101, a loss of 52. The Church membership exceeded the Sunday school enrollment by 1638, and the average attendance by 2499.

Does it seem to the association that something must be done to get our church members to attend to the Master's business on Sunday, or shall we continue "at ease in Zion."

If the Sunday school work were better in hand, would it not help solve the mission problems?

Let us suggest that each church require its Sunday school to make a report to the church in session once every year, and that this report be recorded in the minute book of the church. Also that the church in conference elect the officers of its school, and the teachers of all un-organized classes. This will help fill in the gulf that seems to exist between church and school.

Let us pray and work that our next year's report may be more encouraging.

#### HOME MISSION REPORT

Home Missions is the philosophy of making real a Christian civilization in America. To accomplish its purposes is a matter of surpassing importance in any wisely conceived mission policy.

The Old Testament prophets, whose eyes kindled with a vision of the world turning to God, in furthering this divine purpose gave their whole lives to Home Missions. In the Great Commission our Lord gave commands that extend to the utmost limits of the earth, but for all time they also include for each disciple the limits of his own community. They radiate out from that and take in every place between it and the place furthest away.

The Home Mission Board conducts many departments of activity for saving the people and preparing them for lives of service. It has about forty-five workers among the foreigners, twenty-eight mountain mission schools with 127 teachers and 4,500 students, eighteen trained evangelists who last year baptized about 3,000 converts, thirty-five negro missionary evangelists working effectively among the Southern negroes, thirty-four missionaries who supply fiftysix churches and mission stations in Cuba, five missionaries and four helpers doing a successful work in the Canal Zone, a church building department which aided in building 289 churches last year, and twenty missionaries among the Indians in Oklahoma.

Besides the above, the Home Board participates co-operatively (principally with State Mission Boards) in a number of States in maintaining about 1,100 missionary pastors. This co-operative mission work is in line with the Convention's instructions to the Board to form the closest possible relationship with the existing agencies of the denomination in the various States.

To the end that our Board may enlarge its activities and do for the denomination a work worthy of so great a Christian body and commensurate with the present urgent needs, your committee pleads for regular and large collections for Home Missions in the churches. Our Board could wisely expend a million dollars a year for it. It ought to do it, if we can only bring our churches to make a liberal response to its needs. Surely Southern Baptists must raise the \$400,-000 asked and our own State its proportional part.

Your committee recommends:

1. That prayer be made in the churches for Home Missions, that God may open our eyes to see and our purses to use the rich opportunities to establish our country on the everlasting Rock of Ages.

2. That regular collections throughout the year be insisted on, instead of waiting, as so many do, to the end of the year to give to this cause.

3. That our pastors be requested to make an earnest effort at least once during the year to preach a special sermon on Home Missions, and the magnitude and importance of the problem involved.

4. That a club of subscribers be raised in each church for The Home Field, the unusually attractive and illuminating monthly magazine of the Home Board.

5. That churches and pastors be encouraged to make a large list of the Home Board's informing tracts and sample cories of The Home Field, both of which are free for the asking.

#### CONSTITUTION.

Article 1. This Association shall be known as the Carolina Baptist Association and shall be composed of such representatives as the churches constituting this body, may select and send as delegates to its meetings, together with all ordained ministers who are members of said churches, and each church shall report by letter to each annual session the number of its membership, additions, and losses from whatever causes, with statistics, contributions, finances, etc.

. Each church shall be entitled to three delegates and one additional delegate for each fifty members in excess of one hundred, and the name of no delegate shall appear in the minutes except such as are in actual attendance during the session of the body.

Art. 2. The organization of the body shall be preceded by the preaching of an introductory sermon and shall then be organized by the moderator of the former session, calling the body to order, and the enrolling of delegates from the various churches, who shall compose the body and proceed, by ballot, to the election of a Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and Historian, who shall hold their offices until their successors shall be elected at the opening of the next annual session.

Art. 3. The Association shall adopt such rules of order as may from time to time be deemed advisable.

Art 4. Any church holding the principles of the doctrines of Christ and the ordinances of his house as accepted by missionary Baptist churches, may become a member by application at any regular session of the Association, and acceptance by a majority vote of the same.

Art. 5. A majority vote shall be sufficient to pass any motion, resolution or other action of the body, except to amend the Constitution, which shall only be done by a vote of two-thirds of the members for such amendment.

Art. 6. The Association may at any meeting withdraw from any church that abandons the principles of this organization.

Art. 7. This Association regards each Baptist church as an independent body and this organization as a co-operative body having for its object the furtherance of the cause of Christ, the betterment of humanity and the enlightenment of mankind the world over, by the preaching of the gospel and the furtherance of Christian education.

Art. 8. Any church in good standing in this association, may upon its own request be dismissed by letter from membership.

Art. 9. The Moderator shall appoint such committees as may be necessary for the transaction of the business and these shall report at such times as may be directed by the body. Art 10. The minutes of the previous day shall be read and approved at the opening of each day and corrected if necessary, and approved, an the minutes of the entire session shall read and approved previous to final adjournment.

Art. II. No member shall absent himself fro many session of the body, without leave of the same.

Art. 12. The Association shall, before its final adjournment, fix a time and place for the next annual meeting and election of one of the ministers of the body to preach the introductory sermon.

Art. 13. This body shall at each annual session appoint an executive board of three efficient and active brethren, whose duty it shall be to advise and co-operate with the Board of State Mission in regard to supply or aiding any fields within our bounds, in preaching the gospel or other work as may be necessary.

Art. 14. That this Association shall at the present session appoint a Board of Trustees consisting of fifteen members, five of whom shall hold their office for twelve months, five for two years and five of them for three years. Terms of office of the first five members on said committee shall expire at the end of 1 year from this session, and their places shall be filled by appointment of this body, and each session of this body shall fill the vacancies occurring by expiring terms, or from death, resignation or otherwise, at its regular annual meeting.

That said Board of Trustees shall constitute the Board of Education of the Carolina Association and shall be empowered to receive donations and hold property, both real and personal for educational purposes, to procue the necessary charters for educational institutions and that any legal atcion necessary for advancement and interest of education in the bounds of this Association.


Said Board shall also take control, possession and the general supervision of all school property belonging to the Association, shall establish and direct the management of schools and report their proceedings and recommendations to each annual session of this body for ratification. Said body shall have no power to purchase property or contract debts, but by the authority of a two-thirds vote of the association at its annual meeting. The officers of said Board shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer and Executive Board, whose duties shall be those usually performed by such officers and such further duties as the Board may designate. The said Board may fix time and place for meeting and adjournment, provided, nevertheless, that the President and three other members of the Board may call a meeting at such times, and places as the business of the same may require, and seven members present at any meeting shall be a quorum, for the transaction of business.

Art. 15. This body shall be governed by the rules of Mell's Parliamentary Practice.

Art. 16. This Constitution shall be printed in the minutes of the Association performed by such officers and such further duties as the Board each annual session of the Association.
