

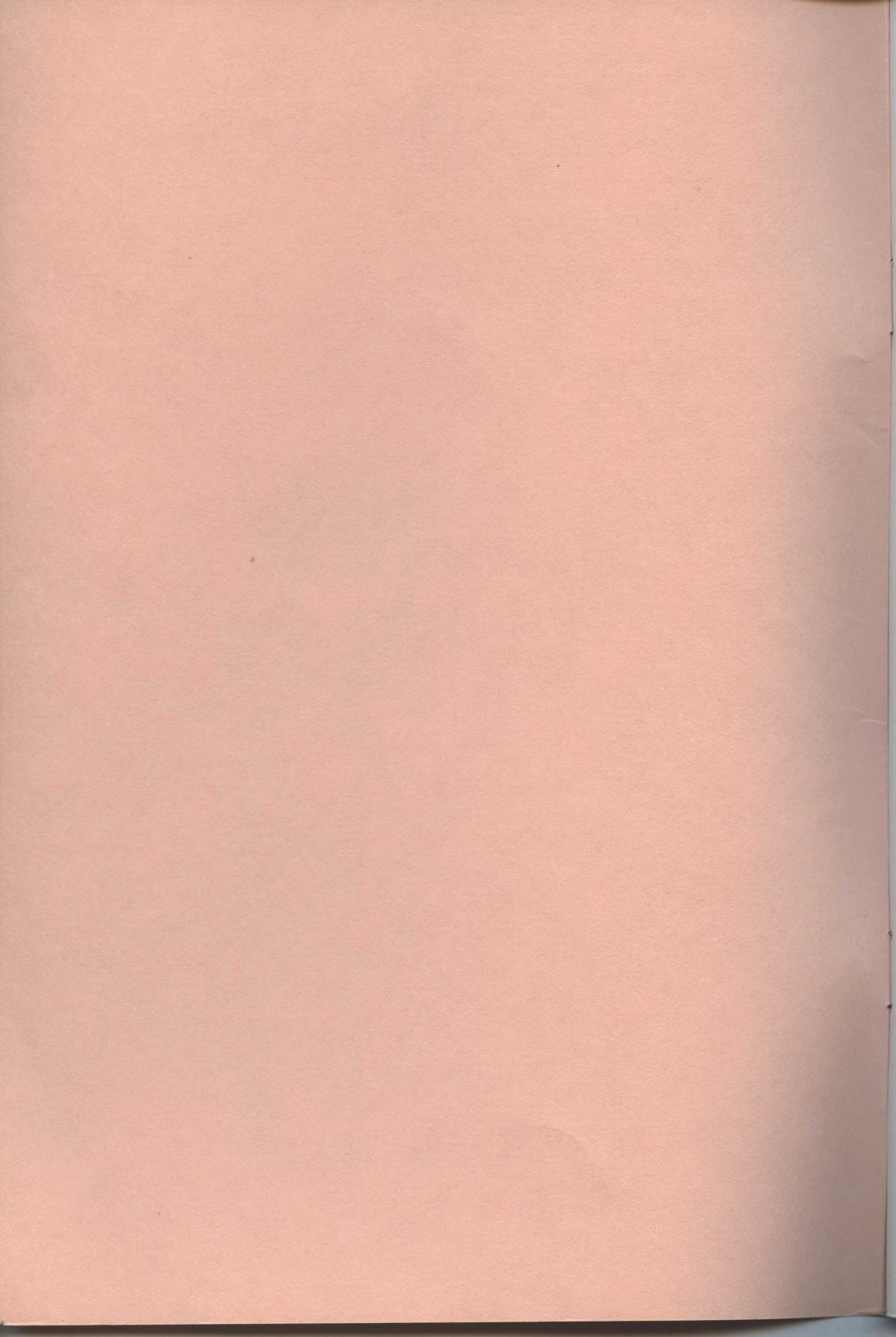

Chapel, Asheboro First Church

The meeting opened at 7:30 P. M. with responsive reading lead by the moderator, Bobby Blanton. Minutes and Treasurer's report were approved. Organizational and Committee reports were presented by Chairman and Directors.

Gave challenge: Dare to do different things, keeping in mind that the objectives are still basic, and reaffirm our Mission for Christ. August 19 marked Judson Rotan's 13th year as Director of Missions for Randolph Baptist Association.

Meeting adjourned: 28 present, representing 19 churches.

PROPOSED CHANGES
Constitution and By-Laws
Randolph Baptist Association
Revised: October, 1990

ARTICLE I - NAME

Section 1. The name of this body shall be known as the Randolph Baptist Association. It may hereafter be referred to as the Association.

ARTICLE II - PURPOSE

Section 1. This Association is a self-determining Baptist body, created and sustained by the churches affiliated with her and responsible to them through their messengers.

Section 2. The purpose of the Randolph Baptist Association is to enable member churches, individually and together, as they endeavor to enlarge, strengthen, and enrich the fellowship of God's kingdom at home and around the world through evangelism and missions; and to foster cooperation in the programs and ministries of this Association, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and the Southern Baptist Convention, thereby fulfilling the Commission of Jesus Christ as stated in Matthew 28:19-20.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The Association shall be composed of cooperating Baptist churches within the area of the Association. A cooperating church shall be defined as one which sends an annual report to the Association, elects messengers to attend the Associational meetings, and contributes to financial program of the Association.

Section 2. The Association shall be sole judge of its membership and may receive churches, according to the constitution and by-laws. Member churches may withdraw from the Association as they desire.

Section 3. Any church in the Association which fails to cooperate with the Association over a period of two years shall be contacted by the credentials committee of the Association to determine the intentions of the church regarding its desire to remain in the Association. In the event the church does not respond to the efforts of the credentials committee, the church will be considered as having chosen to withdraw from the Association.

Section 4. Any church that has departed from Baptist faith and practices and has failed to abide by the provision of the constitution and by-laws of the Association, will be contacted by the Credentials Committee. Such church upon recommendation of the Credentials Committee and a vote of the Association shall be placed on probation until the conditions prompting such actions have been corrected. Messengers from any church on probation shall not be allowed to vote in the meetings of the Association.

Section 5 Churches desiring to affiliate with the Association shall make a written request to the credentials committee of the Association at least three months prior to the Fall meeting (October), for examination and recommendation to the Association. A church (or mission) is first received into the watchcare of the Association. Upon completion of one year in watchcare relationship, a church may be received into full membership of the Association by a recommendation of the credentials committee. There must be a vote of two-thirds majority of the messengers present at the Association meeting for petitioning church (or mission) to become a regularly affiliated member church of the Association.

Section 6. It is understood that each church in this Association is independent and sovereign in its own affairs, and the Association has no authority over the churches, except in an advisory nature, and this by invitation only.

ARTICLE IV - MEETINGS

Section 1. The Association meetings shall be composed of messengers elected by the affiliated churches according to the plan. Each church shall be entitled to three (3) messengers, including the pastor, and one additional messenger for each fifty (50) members or fraction thereof, above one hundred in its resident membership, but not to exceed ten (10) such messengers. The Director of Missions and General Officers shall be messengers in all Associational meetings.

Section 2. The Associational meetings will be held as follows:

- (1) The Fall meeting shall meet on two days the week following the third Sunday in October.

- (2) The Winter meeting shall meet in January. All Mission Performance Directors shall be presented by the Nominating Committee for vote by the messengers at this meeting. In order for the messengers to have adequate time to consider the nominees for Program Directors, the Nominating Committee will mail a copy to the messengers two weeks before the January meeting. They shall be Director-Elect until October 1 when their tenure of service begins.
- (3) The Spring meeting shall meet in April. All General Officers, Committee members, and Program Council members shall be presented by the Nominating Committee for a vote by the messengers at this April meeting. This will give each person selected the privilege to plan and train for the upcoming year. In order to give messengers adequate time to consider the nominees, a copy will be mailed to them two weeks before the Spring meeting.
- (4) The Summer meeting shall meet in late July or early August. The Associational Budget for the new year, beginning on October 1 and ending on September 30 of the following year shall be presented by the Finance Committee for approval by the messengers of the Association. In order to give the messengers adequate time to study the budget, the Finance Committee shall mail copies to the messengers two weeks before this Summer meeting.

Section 3. Other meetings of the Association shall be held when called by the Moderator and/or the Director of Missions. Before calling a special meeting, a notice of at least two weeks shall be given to the messengers, with a clear explanation as to the purpose of the meeting. No other business can be considered. A quorum of fifty (50) messengers must be present to conduct a special meeting.

ARTICLE V - OFFICERS AND THEIR DUTIES

Section 1. The officers of this Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, and three (3) trustees.

Section 2. These officers shall be elected in the Spring meeting in April by the messengers of the Association. The Nominating Committee will present nominees to the messengers with the privilege of other nominees from the body. Prior approval and consent to serve shall have been received from a prospective nominee before placing his name in nomination before the body.

Section 3. The officers of this Association shall serve from October 1 through September 30 of the following year. Any officer may be re-elected with the exception of the Moderator, who shall serve no more than two years in succession.

Section 4. Duties of the Officers:

- (1) The Moderator shall preside over all meetings of the Association, and fulfill such duties as required upon the presiding officer of this Associational body.
- (2) The Vice-Moderator shall perform the duties of the Moderator in the absence of, or at the request of the Moderator.
- (3) The Clerk-Treasurer shall fulfill the following duties:
 - a. The clerk shall record and preserve the proceedings of all the Association meetings. The clerk shall distribute the Uniform Church Letter forms to the clerks of the churches affiliated with the Association. The clerk shall compile the reports and statistics of the churches and issue a book of minutes as soon as is practical after the Fall meeting.
 - b. The Treasurer shall preserve all money paid into the treasury, pay the same to the order of the Association, and make a full and complete report of all receipts and disbursements at each quarterly meeting, plus a year end report at the Fall Meeting.
- (4) The trustees shall have the authority to transfer or hold title to any properties for the Association. All transactions of the elected trustees shall be authorized by the Association in its meetings.
- (5) In the event the Office of the Moderator of the Association shall become vacant, the Vice-Moderator shall immediately become the Moderator for the unexpired term of office without any further action by the Association.
- (6) The vacancies occurring in the office of Vice-Moderator and other General Officers, except Moderator, will be nominated by the Nominating Committee at the next Association meeting.

ARTICLE VI - MISSION PERFORMANCE ORGANIZATION

Section 1. The Association endorses the continued operation of organizations among the churches for the promotion and training of the various phases of their work.

- section 2. The Directors of these organizations shall be: Sunday School Director, Discipleship Training Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Music Director, Evangelism Director, Missions Development Director, Stewardship Director, Family Ministries Director, Christian Life Director, Pastoral Ministries Director and Seminary Extension Director.
- section 3. These Organizational Directors shall be elected at the Winter meeting, (January), or no later than the Spring meeting (April), for a term of three years. The Directors shall be contacted and nominated by the Nominating Committee.
- Section 4. The Directors shall assume their duties on October 1, and serve through September 30, or until their successors are elected. They will be Directors-Elect in the Winter meeting and will have the privilege of training, planning and enlistment of their Council members until October 1.

ARTICLE VII-ADMINISTRATIVE COMMITTEE

- Section 1. The Administrative Committee is composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk/Treasurer, Chairman of Finance, Chairman of Properties, Chairman of Communications, and the Director of Missions.
- Section 2. If there are major decisions to be made between the Quarterly Associational meetings, the Administrative Committee will act in behalf of the Association, and will report the actions to the next quarterly meeting.
- Section 3. The Administrative Committee will meet as needs arise between the Quarterly meetings.

ARTICLE VIII - ASSOCIATION COUNCIL

- Section 1. The Associational Council shall be composed of the General Directors of all Mission Performance Programs, the Associational Officers, the Associational Staff, and the Chairman of Finance, Strategy and Communication, and others deemed necessary to attend the council in planning the work of the Association.
- Section 2. The Director of Missions will serve as the Chairman of the Council. Other officers will be elected in their meetings, such as Vice-Chairman and Secretary.

- Section 3. The Associational Council will conduct at least six meetings per year, at least once every other month. The time and place for the meetings will be set.
- Section 4. The purpose of the Council is to coordinate the overall program and calendar of the Association, and evaluate the progress toward fulfilling the plan. Also, the Council gives guidance to the work of the Director of Missions.

ARTICLE IX - COMMITTEES

- Section 1. The Association shall have the following committees with terms of office extending three years from the time duties of the office are assumed on October 1 of each year. To be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected at the April meeting:

- Section 2. Each committee nominated by the Nominating Committee will begin serving on October 1, and will serve for three years with the terms rotating, so that only 1/3 of the members are elected each year.
- Section 3. Each committee should have a fair representation of both ministers and lay-persons from every area of the Association.
- Section 4. Each committee should meet once each quarter to fulfill its duties.

ARTICLE X - AMENDMENTS

The Constitution may be amended at the Fall Meeting of the Association, (October), by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present, provided the proposed amendment shall have been presented in written form on the first day of the Fall Meeting and voted upon on the second day, unless requested by two-thirds vote of the messengers present.

ARTICLE XI

The Constitution and By-Laws shall take effect immediately upon its adoption by a two-thirds majority of the messengers present and shall supercede any and all constitutions, by-laws and amendments previously adopted.

BY-LAWS

BY-LAW I; PARLIAMENTARY RULES

ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER, Latest, revised edition, shall be followed as the Association's rules for conducting the business and assemblies, except as the Association prescribes otherwise.

BY-LAW II- ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational Year shall begin October 1, and close September 30.

BY-LAW III- NEW CHURCHES

Section 1. Any church or mission seeking membership in the Association shall petition the Credentials Committee at least three months prior to the Fall Meeting (October) of the Association. The church shall be studied for its Church Covenant, intentions, relations to other member churches of the Association, and its willingness to abide by the Constitution and By-laws of the Association. The Credentials Committee shall report to the Association at the Fall Meeting its findings and recommendations for Associational action.

Section 2. Each church or mission applying for membership in the Association, upon approval, shall be received under the watchcare of the Association for a period of one year. Each church received under a watchcare relationship, shall submit a quarterly report to the Credentials Committee of the Association, and also submit the Annual Association letter at the end of the year.

BY-LAW IV - ORDINATION OF NEW MINISTERS

Section 1. When a church desires to ordain a candidate for the Gospel Ministry, it may petition the Credentials Committee of the Association for an examination and approval for ordination. The Credentials Committee shall work with the requesting church concerning

date, time, and other persons forming the Examining Committee.

Section 2. After the examination of the candidate has been conducted by the Examining Council, a report of its findings shall be given the requesting church.

Section 3. Guidelines for Ordination:

- (1) The Credentials Committee requests that it receive a copy of the minutes, signed by the Clerk, of the church conference at which the requesting church voted to request examination of the candidate.
- (2) The Committee requires that the candidate be called by a church for ministry before requesting examination.
- (3) The Committee requests that the candidate be examined at least two weeks prior to his ordination.
- (4) The Committee shall examine the candidate about his conversion, his call, his priorities, his doctrine, personal and family life. The Committee may also counsel the candidate.
- (5) The candidate should feel free to seek advice from the Committee regarding any area of the Gospel Ministry.
- (6) In every instance, the committee shall be guided by the Scripture, especially I Timothy 3:1-7, and Titus 1:5-9.

Section 4. The Credentials Committee shall provide a written report of the examination of candidates to the Gospel Ministry to the Annual Meeting of the Association.

BY-LAW V - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The Moderator will preside over the quarterly and called meetings of the Association. As the presiding officer, the Moderator will open the meetings punctually, at the appointed time, enforce the rules, preserve the order, and exercise all the prerogatives of a presiding officer, according the principles of established parliamentary usage. Roberts Rules of Order will be followed. The Moderator, if desired, appoints a parliamentarian to serve at any or all meetings of the Association during his term of office. This person must be approved by the messengers-in-session. Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook.

Section 2. It would be the duty of the Vice-Moderator to discharge the duties of the Moderator in the absence

of, or at the request of the Moderator. Details are outlined in the Associational Handbook.

Section 3. The Clerk will record and keep in permanent form all transactions of the Association and make this information available upon request. Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook. The Administrative Assistant of the Association will serve as Clerk.

Section 4. The Treasurer will receive all the funds contributed to the Association and disburse them in accordance with the budget of the Association, or for which the funds were contributed. Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook. The Administrative Assistant will serve as Treasurer of the Association.

BY-LAW VI - DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

Section 1. ASSOCIATIONAL MEETINGS COMMITTEE

- (1) This committee will be responsible for planning and conducting the regular and called meetings of the Association. They will propose an order of business and enlist all program personnel, and publicize the program to the churches in advance of the meetings. Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook.
- (2) This Associational Meetings Committee will consist of six members, each elected for a three-year term, with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year.

Section 2. COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE

- (1) This committee will be responsible for communicating the programs, ministries, resolutions, and services of the Association to the churches and to the general public. Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook.
- (2) The Communications Committee will consist of six members, each elected for a three year term, with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year.

Section 3. CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE

- (1) This committee will assist the Association in counselling churches who fail to cooperate with the Association, help churches to meet the qualifications for being properly accepted in the

- Associational fellowship, and assist in examination of the candidates for the Gospel Ministry upon the request of the member churches. Detailed duties are outlined in the ASSOCIATIONAL HANDBOOK. Procedure for ordination is located in BY-LAW IV.
- (2) The Credentials Committee will consist of six members, each elected for a three-year term, with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year. It is suggested that three pastors and three deacons serve on this committee.

Section 4. EXTERNAL RELATIONS COMMITTEE

- (1) This committee will be responsible for establishing and maintaining proper relationships with groups outside the Association, such as the various agencies, boards, foundations, and other groups affiliated with the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention. Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook.
- (2) The External Relations Committee will consist of three members, each elected for a three year term, with the terms rotating, so that only one member is elected each year.
- (3) Membership will also include the Associational representatives of the various agencies, boards, foundations, and Baptist related groups. These would be eligible for re-election at the end of the three years for another term.

Section 5. FINANCE COMMITTEE

- (1) This committee assists the Association in securing, administering and reporting its finances. They shall study the Association's financial needs for an adequate program, prepare and present a budget to the Association and report to the quarterly Associational meetings and a final report to the Annual Fall Meeting. Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook.
- (2) The budget will be prepared and copies mailed to the messengers of the Association two weeks before the Summer Meeting.(July or August). The messengers will vote on the proposed budget during the Summer Meeting of the Association. The fiscal year of the Association will be from October 1 through September 30.
- (3) The Finance Committee will consist of six members, each elected for a three year term, with terms rotating so that only two members are elected each year. The Treasurer serves as an ex-officio member of the committee.

- (4) The Finance Committee chairman will serve on the Associational Council.

Section 6. HISTORY COMMITTEE

- (1) The History Committee will gather, preserve, and interpret historical records of the Association's life and work. The Committee will make a report at the Fall Meeting of the Association. Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook.
- (2) The History Committee will consist of three members, each elected for a three year term, with the terms rotating, so that only one member is elected each year.

Section 7. NOMINATING COMMITTEE

- (1) The Nominating Committee leads in coordinating the selection of all Association-elected leaders except paid personnel. They shall nominate a complete slate of General Officers, Mission Performance Directors, and Council members, and Committee persons. Equal representation should be given from all pastors, staff members, men and women. Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook.
- (2) The first report of the nominations will be in the January meeting of the Association, in which Mission Performance Directors are elected for training, planning and enlistment of their council members.
- (3) The second report of nominations will be in the April meeting of the Association, in which the General Officers, Program Council members and committee members are elected.
- (4) The Nominating Committee will consist of six members, representing all areas of the Association, each elected for a three year term, with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year.

Section 8. PROPERTIES COMMITTEE

- (1) The Properties Committee shall have general oversight over all property owned or leased by the Association. It will make recommendations to the Associational meetings concerning upkeep and improvements of the property. Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook.
- (2) The Properties Committee shall consist of three members, each elected for a three year term, with the term rotating so that only one member is elected each year.

- (3) The committee shall give a written report to the Fall Meeting of the Association.

Section 9. SEARCH COMMITTEE

- (1) The Search Committee will serve only as needed to secure a Director of Missions.
- (2) The committee will consist of one pastor, one layman, one woman, all named by the Nominating Committee, plus the Moderator, and the Chairman of Finance Committee.
- (3) The committee will use the guidelines and duties found in the Associational Handbook for calling a Director of Missions.

Section 10. STRATEGY COMMITTEE

- (1) The Strategy Committee will assist the Association in determining its Strategic Objectives and in staying on course in achieving them. The committee also shall be available to study change or revisions in the constitution, and make recommendations as needed. Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook.
- (2) This committee will work very closely with the Associational Council. The Strategy Committee Chairman will be an active member of the Associational Council.
- (3) The Strategy Committee will consist of six members, each elected for a three year term, with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year. Also, two members from the Associational Council should serve with the committee in determining Annual Planning objectives.

Section 11. PERSONNEL COMMITTEE

- (1) The personnel committee will consist of three members, each elected for a three year term, with the terms rotating, so that only one member is elected each year.
- (2) The committee will prepare and update as necessary, position descriptions of all associational staff personnel, except the Director of Missions, whose responsibilities are described in BY-LAW VIII, Section 1.
- (3) The committee will survey the need for additional staff positions, recruit, interview, and recommend to the association new personnel with the guidance and approval of the Director of Missions; and when necessary, recommend to the association the termination of employment of staff personnel.

- (4) Annual review will be conducted by the Director of Missions to the employees, and employees' differences and grievances may be appealed to Personnel Committee by the individual.
- (5) The committee will review annually, salaries, benefits, and make recommendations to the budget committee.
- (6) Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook.

BY-LAW VII - TRUSTEES

The Trustees will act as the legal agent of the Association. The duties will be to hold title to the property for the Association and to handle the legal matters of the Association, with the Association's foreknowledge and approval; and to comply with the Constitution and Bylaws of the body, and with state laws as they affect the Association. Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook.

BY-LAW VIII - EMPLOYED PERSONNEL

Section 1. DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS

- (1) The Director of Missions shall be an officer of the Association. As an officer and general leader of the Association, the Director of Missions shall be an ex-officio member of all committees, councils, and groups of the Association.
- (2) The Director of Missions shall be elected to this office upon a recommendation of the Search Committee, and by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present at a regular meeting by the Moderator for that particular purpose. Letters of information concerning the prospective Director of Missions shall be sent out to all messengers of the Association two weeks before the meeting.
- (3) The time of service shall continue until terminated by the request of the Director of Missions to the Association, or at the request of the Association, which would require a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers to the Association meeting. Proper notice and explanation of termination shall be provided to or by the Director of Missions and/or the Association.
- (4) The Director of Missions shall promote the work and ministry of the Association and denomination, cooperating with the churches, their pastors and officers, and Associational Committees and organizations.

- a. He shall be responsible for planning, promoting and executing the ministry of the Association in cooperation with the Associational Council.
- b. He shall serve as Chairman of the Associational Council, and make an annual report to the Association at the October meeting.
- c. He shall seek to visit each church in the Association in order to:
 - (1) Enrich Christian fellowship among the churches.
 - (2) Encourage and strengthen the ministry of the churches.
 - (3) Enhance the cooperative relationship between the churches and the Association.
- d. He shall have full responsibility for supervising all personnel employed by the Association.
- e. Detailed duties and benefits are outlined in the Associational Handbook.

Section 2. OTHER EMPLOYED PERSONNEL

Other personnel shall be employed as needed by the Association with a two-thirds majority of the votes from the messengers in a regular meeting of the Association. All personnel must come as a joint recommendation of the budget and personnel committees.

(1) ADMINISTRATIVE ASSISTANT

- a. The Administrative Assistant shall serve primarily in a secretarial role, assisting the Director of Missions with the daily administrative matters of the Association.
- b. The Administrative Assistant shall be responsible for the media and resource center, making available materials, pamphlets, video tapes, and other equipment for individuals and churches in the Association.
- c. This person shall also serve as the Associational Clerk/Treasurer, unless personnel committee deems otherwise.
- d. This person shall supervise the work of office help, along with Director of Missions.
- e. Personnel Committee shall recommend to the budget committee salary and benefits annually.
- f. Detailed duties and benefits are outlined in the Associational Handbook.

(2) OFFICE HELP

- a. Office help shall be provided by one or more persons as needed.

- b. This individual(s) shall fill in for the Administrative Assistant during leave times, such as vacations, sickness, conferences, etc.
- c. Personnel Committee shall recommend to the budget committee, salaries and benefits.
- d. Detailed duties are outlined in Associational Handbook.

(3) CUSTODIAL SERVICES

- a. Custodial services shall be provided by one or more persons in order to keep the associational properties in clean and acceptable condition.
- b. This person(s) shall be recommended by the properties committee to the personnel committee who shall consider the selection, and upon approval, shall present the person(s) to the association for final approval.
- c. The properties and personnel committees will recommend to the budget committee salaries and benefits for service rendered.
- d. The properties committee and the Director of Missions shall jointly supervise the custodial services personnel.
- e. Detailed duties are outlined in Associational Handbook.

BY-LAW IX - ANNUAL REPORTS

Persons preparing reports for the Annual Meeting of the Association in October, shall present the same in writing for inclusion in the printed Book of Reports two weeks before the Fall Meeting. These reports are to be limited to 300 words each.

BY-LAW X - AMENDMENTS

Amendments to the bylaws may be made at any session of the October Meeting of the Association when presented in writing and approved by a majority of the messengers present and voting.

April 23, 1990
Russell's Grove Baptist Church

1. Meeting called to order by Johnny Henderson, Pastor of Victory Baptist Church, in the absence of the Moderator, Bob Blanton.

8. Hymn: "Amazing Grace": Solo by Jeff Barrett: "I Was the Reason." Sermon preached by Wayne Vuncannon, Pastor, Huldah Baptist Church. Topic: "Impact of the Churches." 85 present, representing 24 churches.

PROCEEDINGS
Tuesday, October 23, 1990
Macedonia Baptist Church

The 56th Annual Session of the Randolph Baptist Association was called to order on Tuesday evening, October 23, 1990 at 7:00 P. M. at Macedonia Baptist Church, Liberty, N. C. The meeting began with the hymn, "Showers of Blessings", directed by David Thomas, Associational Music Director.

1. The welcome was given by Mark Sink, Pastor of Macedonia.
2. The theme of the meetings was "Share Heritage and Hope", and the interpretation was given by R. L. Hughes, retired Pastor of Randolph Association, and member of Seagrove

First.

3. Judson Rotan, Director of Missions introduced new pastors and staff: Stephen Hensley, Cross Road, Ronald Blakely, Deep River, William Rice, Shady Grove, and David Luther, Minister of Music, Oakhurst.
4. Reginald Dawkins, Chairman of Budget/Finance, recognized the ten leading churches in giving, encouraged all other churches to increase their giving to missions.
5. Phillips McRae, speaking for Sunday School stressed "Breakthrough", the theme for Sunday School growth, and encouraged churches to begin forming Reachout Groups, such as Backyard Bible Clubs, Vacation Bible Schools and Bible Study groups.
6. Mike Eller, Discipleship Training Director, encouraged us to be willing to train for the leadership positions in our churches. Commended Asheboro First Church for the excellent Bible Drills for children and youth, and pointed out other areas of training for leadership.
7. Renea Henderson, Acteen director for 1989-90 shared slides of the work in Kentucky accomplished by the Acteen Activators, and informed us that the Activators did 50 hours of training with Backyard Bible Clubs in two housing developments and two mobile home parks before they could be qualified. Twenty children were led to Christ as a result of this trip.
8. Bobby Poole, Brotherhood Director, called attention to the importance of getting involved in missions, Mens' prayer groups, Ladies' prayer groups, Lay-led revivals, etc.
9. David Thomas, Music Director, announced a new birth in the Association: An Associational Choir; introduced the Music Council for 1990-91: Boyd Ammerman, Charles Garner, and Martha Raye.
10. Ron Chaney, Director of Evangelism, expressed thanks to Steering Committee of the Here's Hope Revivals. Thirty-one churches participated, 683 copies of New Testaments distributed, 131 professions of faith. Introduced the Evangelism Council for 1990-91: Jerry Glenn, Johnny Henderson, Stan Haywood, Mike Auman.
11. The Director of Missions, Judson Rotan, challenged us to be joined in unity, be challenged to new work, and strive together to share faith.
12. Richard Crider, Pastor, Oakhurst, before leading in prayer, read from Genesis 28:10, (Jacob met his heritage and carried it with him.) Until we meet the Lord, we have no heritage, no hope.

The new Associational Choir (first ever), gave beautiful renditions of "Neath The Banner of the Cross", "Come Thou Fount", "Nearer, Still Nearer", and "Shelter in the Time of Storm", under the direction of David Thomas, accompanied by Martha Raye, pianist, and Charles Garner, Organist.

Grady Blakely, Pastor, Union Grove brought the Annual Sermon, using scriptures from Psalm 11, 119, Acts 2, and John 15: 15-17. There were 212 registered for this first meeting.

WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 24, 1990, MORNING SESSION
Union Grove Baptist Church, Seagrove, N. C.
9:00 A. M.

1. The meeting was called to order at 9:00am by the Moderator Bobby Blanton.
2. Grady Blakely, Pastor of Union Grove gave the welcome and introduced the new Minister of Music at Union Grove, John Garner.
3. A hymn was directed by David Thomas, Associational Music

- Director, "To God Be The Glory".
4. Prayer requests were made for Ron Chaney's father, Judson Rotan's mother, Richard Fisher, Pastor of Center Cross, having surgery, and a young girl with an inoperable tumor on the brain.
 5. Richard Crider, in the absence of Richard Fisher, gave the theme interpretation. When Jesus left, His Spirit was poured out and the church was born. Taking scripture from Ephesians 4:11, the work of the church is a work of ministry, a building up of the saints, and edifying the spirit. Hope for the future is the church.
 6. The revised constitution/bylaws, explained by Vernon McDaniel, Pastor, Asheboro First, and chairman of Constitution Committee. Motion: Vernon McDaniel that the amended constitution be approved, there was a second, and the messengers voted unanimously to accept it, by standing vote.
 7. New officers were introduced by the Moderator: Moderator, Reginald Dawkins, Pastor, Liberty First; Vice-Moderator, Richard Crider, Pastor, Oakhurst; Clerk-Treasurer, Dorothy G. Cross, Member, Randleman First. Motion: Dennis Ball that these be appointed, 2nd and these were approved.
 8. The Associational Meetings Committee, given by R. L. was approved with meetings scheduled for: January 21, 1991, April 22, 1991, August 19, 1991, and October 22 and 23.
 9. Judson Rotan recognized Phillips McRae, and presented a certificate of leadership upon his completion of a General Leadership, and Associational Sunday School Leadership Training Course. Barbara Dawkins was recognized for completion of a WMU Associational Leadership Course.
 10. Judson Rotan, in the absence of Wendell Holland, Missions Committee Chairman, introduced Robert Erwin, Missionary to Sao Paulo, Brazil, as the speaker for Missions. Mr. Erwin expressed his appreciation to North Carolina Baptists for the partnership in Brazil, with information that Brazil is a first world country, and that Sao Paulo is the size of New York. Partnership has opened new doors. Goal is for 100 new Churches by September, 1991.
 11. Doug Stover reported for the Baptist Children's Homes of N. C. Informed the messengers that one of four births will be to unwed mothers and that most of the ministry done now in our children's homes is done for children of broken families.
 12. Calvin Knight reported for Baptist Hospital and Mrs. Burchette represented Retirement Homes.
 13. The Fruitland Bible Institute report was given by Curtis Barbery, Pastor of Beulah Church.
 14. The Baptist Foundation was represented by Ed Coates. All reports were approved.
- Justus McKeel, Pastor of Ramseur First Church presented the Memorials assisted by Mrs. Helen Steele and Bill Hogan.

Judson Rotan, Director of Missions, presented the Strategy Planning Course of Action, sharing that it had been a privilege for him to share in the planning and looking to have the greatest days in the Association

The 56th Annual Session of Randolph Baptist Association ended with a total of 392 registered, representing 37 churches.

BRIEF HISTORY OF MACEDONIA BAPTIST CHURCH

Liberty, N. C.

A Presbytery of ordained ministers met at Macedonia Meeting House on August 30, 1880, in the County of Randolph and State Of North Carolina, and constituted a regular (Missionary) Baptist Church known as the Baptist Church of Christ at Macedonia.

Seeing the need for a planned program to study the Word of God, a Sunday School was organized in May, 1902. With the growth of the church, the need for a new house of worship was realized and a committee was elected in 1929 to raise funds for the new church. On June 19, 1932 the first service was held in the new church. An addition of Sunday School rooms was added in 1945. In 1954 a porch was added to the front of the church. Thoughts turned to providing a home for our pastor and on March 13, 1957, land was purchased on U. S. Highway 421 for the future building site for the parsonage. On May 22, 1960, a dedication service was held for the completed parsonage. A long range building plan was adopted which included relocating the church. On February 21, 1865, property was purchased adjacent to the parsonage for future development. The dream became a reality and on October 4, 1969, the first worship service was held in the new church. Dedication of the new church was held on November 2, 1969.

BRIEF HISTORY OF UNION GROVE BAPTIST CHURCH
Seagrove, N. C.

The church was organized in 1885 and rebuilt in 1946. Elder J. L. Smith and T. M. Baldwin met as a presbytery on Monday following the third Sunday in September 1887, at the Union Grove meeting house, and proceeded to examine members who had been dismissed from the Baptist Church at Fork Creek, with a view of organizing a separate independent Baptist Church. Having found them to be sound in the faith of doctrine and principles of the gospel, constituted them as a regular church of the Baptist faith, and as such they were vested with full authority to maintain discipline and all necessary business independent of the control of any and all churches. J. L. Smith served as first pastor. A new church was begun in 1948 with an educational building followed by a parsonage. In 1960 a fellowship hall was added, the parsonage re-decorated, and air conditioning was installed. Rev Clarence Jenkins was the pastor at this time and served the church for seven years. Under the leadership of Rev. E. A. Lunsford, a new sanctuary was constructed. Pastors serving since Rev. Lunsford were W. A. "Bud" Gillett, David McLaurin, and the present pastor, Grady Blakely. Rev. Blakely began his ministry with Union Grove in April of 1984.

MISSIONS COMMITTEE

This year has been filled with a lot of activity and excitement. We say good bye to the "old" Missions Committee and hello to the "new" Associational Missions Development Program. It has been an exciting time working with everyone on the Missions Committee. We look to the future and the challenges it holds. Some of the noteworthy projects are listed below.

1. *Brazil Partnership* - Our first team of eleven (11) people representing the Randolph, Sandhills, and Sandy Creek Associations, returned in November, 1989 from a two week Evangelistic Visitation to the city of Presidente Epitacio. Hope continues for other teams to go back to Brazil while this partnership continues.
2. *MAP* - At the November, 1989 Executive Committee meeting, it was recommended that the MAP (Mission Action Project) be reactivated. The Missions Committee is seeking to enlist 100 persons and groups to give \$50.00 per year toward a fund to assist three (3) to five (5) people each year to help meet the needs of evangelism and discipleship in the Sao Paulo, Brazil partnership that extends through 1992.
3. *US-2er - HOME MISSIONARY*- The Missions Committee recommended that the Association apply for a US-2er, a Home Missionary who would be appointed to our area for two years, beginning in August, 1991 through August, 1993. This person would work in the area of Church and Community ministries. The cost for us to support a US-2er for one year would be around \$6,000. This is a college graduate who has committed their life to missions for at least two years.
4. *Missions Development Program* - This is the last year of our Missions Committee as we now know it. The Missions Development Program is designed to replace the Associational Missions Committee with an Associational Missions Development Council.

-to improve, update and increase the mailing list of Randolph Baptist to 1,000 persons. The Communication Committee will help in this endeavor.

-to print a quarterly bulletin insert for church members, emphasizing the major associational events and programs. The Communication Committee will assist in this project.

Objective 3. Win the lost

-to enlist churches to increase their baptisms by 10% during the year.

-to enlist 4 churches to conduct one day soul-winning workshops during this year.

-to conduct an Associational Wide Witnessing training clinic during this year.

-to enlist 5 churches this year to do evangelism through Church and Community ministries and marketplace evangelism.

-to assist 5 churches during the year in organizing an Evangelism Council.

Objective 4. Start New Works

-to enlist 15 pastors to share in the PROBE during the week of March 18-20, 1991, to discover new areas of work.

-to establish 5 new work units (Mission Sunday Schools, Backyard Bible Study Fellowships, Mobile Home Park Bible Study, Mission VBS, etc) by 9/30/91.

-to enlist one or two sponsoring churches for new work by 9/30/91

-to support and provide resources for a Summer New Work Student Worker for 10 weeks.

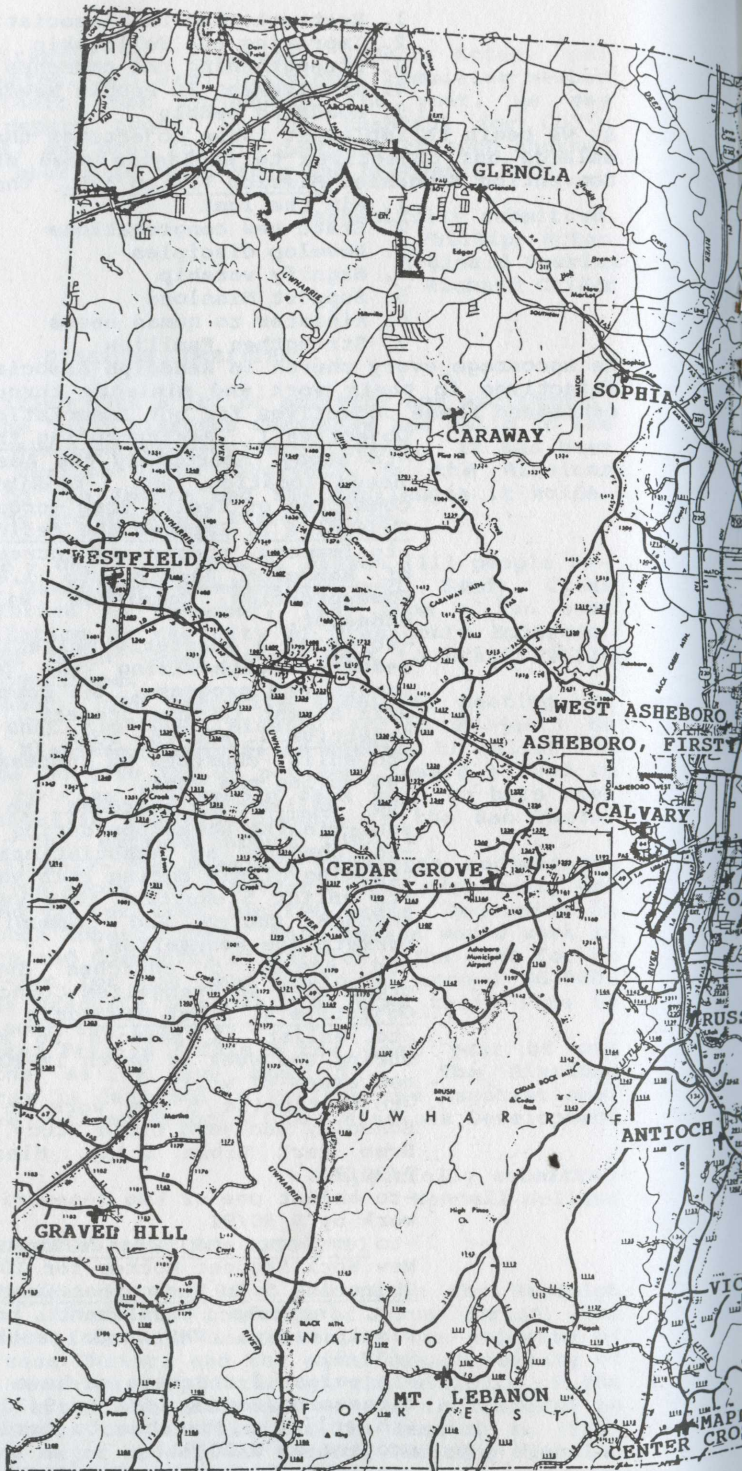
Objective 5 To Strengthen Churches

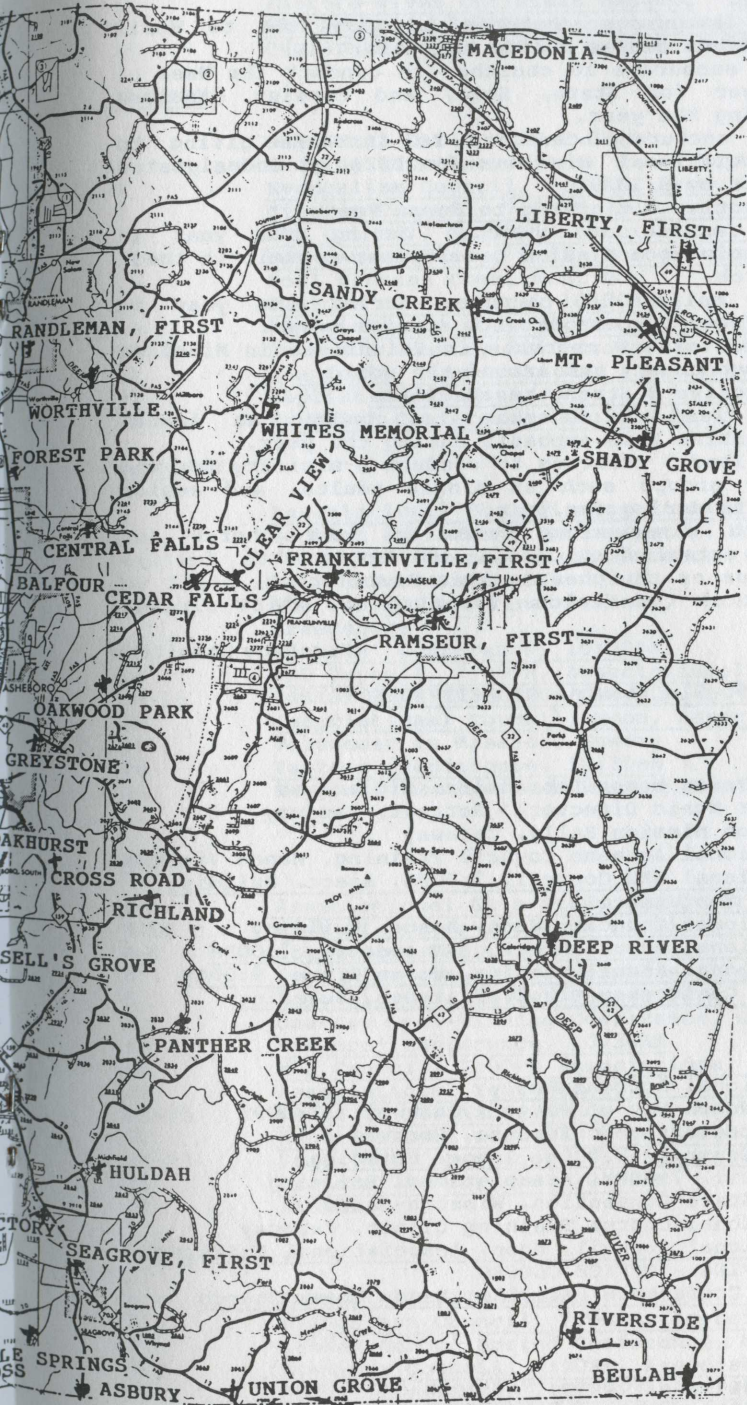
-to increase enrollment in Sunday Schools, Discipleship, WMU and Brotherhood by 3% by 9/30/91.

CHRISTIAN ACTION LEAGUE

The last twelve months have been eventful ones in the Ministry of Applied Christianity.

LEGISLATIVE ISSUES: All three lottery bills died in committee because the pro-gambling forces did not have the votes. The gambling industry launched a major campaign this year because of the \$500 million budget short-fall. The State Government

Employees Association made the lottery its number one legislative objective. Yet, all of this was not enough because the Christian community spoke up. DRUNK DRIVING - Proposals from Governor Martin and a Legislative Study Committee that really would have toughened our drunk driving laws did not materialize. Some "sham" compromise offers were made in the House-Senate Conference Committee, but the House conferees rejected the offers. In many ways, the Senate compromise would have weakened the current laws. The House Bill provided for:(a) The lowering of the Breathalyzer blood alcohol level from .10 to .08; (b) The banning of open containers of all alcoholic beverages in motor vehicles;(c) Increasing fines for being convicted of drunk driving (in 1947 the minimum fine was \$100, and it is still the same 43 years later.) In the past year, the Christian Action League has successfully assisted in alcoholic beverage campaigns in places such as Hertford County, Pamlico County, Concord, Lumberton, Manteo, Morganton, Archdale, Waynesville, etc., in their efforts to defeat various referenda such as liquor-by-the-drink and beer-wine sales.

1990 REPORT OF BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES OF N. C., INC.

For 105 years Baptist Children's Homes of N. C. has been giving children a chance at life. This year we formalized that phrase into our first state-wide fund-raising campaign.

The "Give a child a chance!" Campaign seeks to raise \$11 million over three years to expand Cameron Boys Camp, boost general operating income and increase endowment.

We will also be able to begin a before and after school care program in Davidson County, to give security to children of working couples, who won't have to go home to empty houses anymore.

Baptist Men of N. C. have agreed to build the new Tommy and Jeanie Eller Chuckwagon at Cameron, saving approximately \$75,000 in construction costs.

Children's hopes also were bolstered by the return of the Thanksgiving Offering voted by messengers to the 1989 state convention. While suffering through its 12-year absence, BCH lost more than \$1 million in revenue.

In the change from Homes and Hospital Offering to the Thanksgiving Offering, BCH will go 18 months without a special collection, a period that encompasses more than an entire fiscal year. For the past five years that special collection has meant \$400,000 to the ministry, a sum that will be difficult to make up in the 1990-91 budget. Some churches, aware of the difficulty, have promised to begin receiving the Thanksgiving Offering in 1990.

We urge renewed commitment to cooperative giving among our N. C. churches. It is essential, not only for us, but for the entire missions enterprise built painstakingly for a century and a half. Baptist Children's Homes receives \$1.5 million from Cooperative Program receipts each year. A decrease in Cooperative Program dollars to Baptist Children's Homes would seriously jeopardize our ability to care for children.

In August, BCH signed an agreement with Gaston County Department of Social Services to operate two emergency care homes owned by the county. That raises to 11 the number of emergency care homes BCH operates. That service, in which a child of abuse or neglect can receive shelter right away, is the service most in demand throughout the state. Children stay a maximum of 60 days while BCH works with the custodian to determine a long-term plan of care.

In 1991 BCH will celebrate the 20th anniversary of the founding of Broyhill Home, our westernmost campus, in Waynesville/Clyde. With the help of J. E. Broyhill and his family, the home was opened in 1971 on 91 hilly acres. It has capacity for 48 children in group care and for eight girls in emergency care.

Baptist Children's Homes has a 105 year history. But its history is just the knot that ties it to a boundless, unbroken ribbon of promise that stretches beyond the future to wrap children and families with eternal blessings.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION

The historical records of the North Carolina Baptist Foundation will reveal 1989 and 1990 to be significant in its 70 year history. Organized in 1919 and chartered by the State of North Carolina in 1920 as a charitable corporation, the Trustee agency of the Convention has only in recent years begun to have an impact on providing financial support for Baptist institutions and mission causes.

The growth of the Foundation, in terms of assets managed, has been significant during the past few years. Since January 1, 1988, the assets placed under management of the Foundation has been increased by over \$13 million through May, 1990.

Gifts of appreciated assets, such as stock and real estate, can be placed in trust to generate income for individuals and then pay income to Christian causes beyond their lifetime. As a result of this unique opportunity to give, older adults are realizing the joy of establishing life income trusts. This plan often provides a significant increase in personal income, by-pass of capital gain taxes, creation of a charitable deduction for income tax and estate taxes, and assures an eventual gift to Christian endeavors.

The new facility of Baptist Foundation was occupied in February, 1990, and provides much needed space for the work of staff as well as for conferences and meetings. We extend an invitation to church groups to call and arrange a visit to the newest building for the Lord's service by North Carolina Baptists.

The Foundation employs seven full time employees and operates under the direction of a 20 member Board of Directors elected by the Baptist State Convention.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL

"The largest health-science building program ever in North Carolina has changed the landscape on Hawthorne Hill, and the changes continue in rapid succession. One thing that hasn't changed is the institution's tradition for delivery of compassionate health care. That will never change." This statement, from Dr. Charles F. Nicholson, Jr., Baptist Hospital Trustee and Chairman of the Medical Center Board of Directors, is both a report and a commitment. Another building in this \$190 million expansion program has recently been completed and occupied. The Clinical Sciences Building will house most of the Medical Center's ambulatory services, and has been termed a "medical supermarket," where patients may do "one-stop shopping." The building will also accommodate an Ambulatory Surgery Unit, Medical Center Administrative Offices, and other functions. Under construction, is an addition to the MRI (Magnetic Resonance Imaging) Building, and a significant addition to the Patient/Visitor Parking Deck. Construction on the Center on Aging Building is scheduled to begin in early 1991 with the completion date for the spring of 1991. The purpose of all these new facilities is to enable us to respond to patient needs better than ever before. The Organ Transplant Program added a new dimension when it performed the first single-lung transplant in North Carolina. Bone marrow transplants are now being performed. A Cranio-facial Clinic, to correct major deformities of the skull and upper face during the first year of life, opened recently. New laser technology provides an improved method for clearing out atherosclerotic deposits in the carotid arteries of the neck. New surgical techniques make possible better treatment of complicated retinal detachment. Orthopedic Surgeons began use of the Illzarov Technique for the repair and lengthening of broken bones. New approaches are being used in the treatment of children with Cerebral Palsy. Bowman Gray/Baptist Hospital is the only medical center in the nation using and evaluating Clinodean, a non-narcotic pain killer which has proven effective in controlling pain following surgery and for cancer patients. We provided 210,456 days of care for 22,607 patient admissions last year. There were approximately 388,000 ambulatory patient visits in the various clinics, the Emergency Department, the Day Hospital, and in Ambulatory Surgery. These patients came from North Carolina and thirty-four other states. Foreign patients continue to increase. The Department of Pastoral Care continues to strengthen its reputation both as a service agency and as a teaching facility. Last year, the department provided more than 29,000 ministries to hospital patients, almost 19,000 services to families, and more than 14,000 services for hospital and church staff members and their families. The Minister's Care Plan, a joint program with the BSC, had 1,446 sessions with more than 200 different clergy families last

year. The new Missionary Counseling and Support Services Program saw 48 individuals in its first six months. The Division of Clinical Pastoral Education/Chaplaincy had 53 students enrolled. During the fiscal year ending June 30, 1990, the hospital received \$692,946.24 through the Cooperative Program and \$271,361.24 through the Homes and Hospitals Offering and direct gifts. Cooperative Program Funds are used for the Department of Pastoral Care, and other church gifts help to provide Benevolent Care for financially needy patients. The hospital staff and patients are most grateful for this continuing financial support.

The average annuitant in North Carolina receives \$276.39 per month.

North Carolina has 3,436 members making contributions to Annuity Board retirement plans.

There are 1,889 annuitants receiving benefits each month in North Carolina - \$522,109.84 each month!

It is exciting to think about what has been done to help ministers retire with dignity. Strong efforts have been made to make all of our churches (and ministers) aware of the opportunities and the need to act on them.

But there is still so much to be done! Consider these facts:

Only 64% of our churches are participating in our retirement plans even after all these years of opportunity.

Of this 64%, many do not actually make contributions. The minister does this on his own.

Small contributions make the annuitant's benefits small: In North Carolina -

175 receive less than \$50.00
463 receive less than \$100.00
1007 receive less than \$200.00
1295 receive less than \$300.00

We have 151 churches that have signed the Cooperative Agreement, but still make no contribution.

We have 457 churches that are making contributions, but still have not signed the Cooperative Agreement.

Suffice it to say that there is a great challenge still before us to help ministers prepare for the future and help the churches be responsible employers.

DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS

Three major events that claimed our attention in the 1989-90 Associational year were the Brazil trip in October and November, 1989, the "Here's Hope" revivals in April with 35 churches participating, and the implementing of the new organizational structure and Strategy Planning throughout the year.

With our emphasis on improvement, missions and evangelism, we have experienced a very productive year.

Five volunteers from across our Association joined with seven other volunteers from Sandhills and Sandy Creek Associations, was on evangelistic meetings in several cities in Sao Paulo State, Brazil.

Three teams of four shared in personal witnessing in six churches around Presidente Prudente, a city of 200 thousand people, around 400 miles west of the city of Sao Paulo. Around 200 personal decisions were made in the homes and churches during the eight days in these towns. The people were very open and hungry to hear the gospel of Jesus Christ. Many seeds were sown for future experience, which we hope to have during 1991.

It was thrilling to see 35 of our 43 churches participating in the "Here's Hope, Jesus Cares for You" revivals. Much preparation was involved in preparing the churches for a good week. Many decisions were made and a greater concern for the lost in our communities was developed. Twenty five hundred New Testaments were distributed through our churches in visitation, and three soul-winning clinics were conducted with 45 persons present. God's spirit was felt in our midst. We thank God for the many victories that were won in individual lives during this special emphasis.

In the kind of ministry that is carried out on a regular basis, I have been in 36 of our 43 churches for at least one meeting during the Associational year. In addition to regular preaching services, I have taught the book of Second Corinthians in several churches. I have taught the Foreign Mission and Home Mission study in five churches. I have worked with two search committees in our churches, spoken at Brotherhood breakfasts and meetings, attended committee meetings for all of our committees in the Association. I have conducted two deacon retreats and participated in several WMU functions.

9. Home Mission Week, Ridgecrest

Much of the year has been involved in Committee planning and reorganization of the Association to meet Strategy Planning recommendations approved last year at the Annual Meeting. There have been meetings upon meetings for preparing for the new Associational Year, beginning in October, 1990.

One of the largest changes that has occupied much of our time is the re-writing of the constitution. The constitution committee has studied many constitutions, and have updated our constitution to meet the needs of our new organizational structure.

Again, in many ways, this has been another great year in our ministry and work among Randolph Baptists. The wonderful

thing about the Association is that it is a fellowship of churches, working together in missions in their setting. Each church, regardless of size or location, has a significant role in the total response. We believe the Lord is doing "great things" for us. This has been a good, full, busy, and significant year in the life of Randolph Baptists. We trust and hope the reports from the churches will show some growth in Baptisms, Mission gifts, and Church development. We continue to pray for a stronger feeling of togetherness than we have experienced in the past.

We rejoice in what has been accomplished this Associational year, however, we should strive to grow toward a greater faithfulness, effectiveness and efficiency in fulfilling our ministry of developing believers, reaching people for Christ, strengthening the families and the Christian witness in every church. Your church has a vital role in meeting this challenge. May God give us knowledge and direction to fulfill His will and purpose in our Association.

My deepest thanks goes to the wonderful people in our churches who have helped to make my ministry among you worthwhile. I am grateful for the prayers, support, and cooperation that each pastor and church member has given me throughout this year. I believe some of our greatest days are ahead of us in this decade of the 90's. May God bless Randolph Baptist Association.

INCORPORATION COMMITTEE

One significant outgrowth of strategy planning was a heightened awareness of the importance of organizational structure as it relates to the ability of the Randolph Baptist Association to carry out its mission and to meet the needs of member churches and individuals. In that regard, one important objective of preparation for the nineties was to insure a strong and viable organizational pattern which would be free from excessive concerns over litigation. To address these concerns, a committee was formed with the responsibility of evaluating the legal implications of remaining an association as opposed to pursuing the possibility of becoming an incorporated entity. More particularly, the committee was asked to determine if, in fact, there was a compelling reason to incorporate the Randolph Baptist Association as a means of protecting both those involved in decision making and the organizational structure itself.

A review of exciting literature and extensive conversation with authorities on the matter suggests reasons to incorporate are generally as follows:

- (1) Limited resources, land, buildings, equity, capitalization, etc.
- (2) Protection for those involved in decision making and those carrying out organizational activities, and
- (3) inadequate insurance coverage

While there is, perhaps, some limited benefit to incorporated status, such benefit doesn't appear to be substantial enough to warrant a change at this time. Therefore, the recommendation of the committee is that we remain an association with unincorporated status unless and until a more compelling reason to incorporate is forth coming.

Over the years, our leadership has been far sighted enough to provide excellent insurance coverage. Moreover, litigation in North Carolina of a nature affecting this issue has to date been virtually non-existent. Equally significant, although a somewhat intangible point is the question of voluntary submission to the State. If unnecessary, would we want to do so?

Based on careful review of available resource material, the Committee on Incorporation recommends against incorporation at this time. Should new information become evident, further investigation is encouraged.
