CONSTITUTION

(Revised August 16, 1957)

ARTICLE I

The Name of this body shall be the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II

The purpose of the Association shall be the extension of Christ's kingdom on earth, creation and promotion of harmony, intelligence and spiritual power of the churches.

ARTICLE III

 (1) The Association shall have the power to elect and install its officers in whatever manner the body may deem expedient.
 (2) It shall have power to recommend measures of usefulness and guidance to our churches in matters of organizations, ordinations and questions of doctrines and discipline.
 (3) The Association shall have no power to infringe upon the right to the local churches as sovereign and independent bodies.

ARTICLE IV

(1) The Association shall be composed of ministers and messengers selected by missionary Baptist churches which have been previously received into the association. (2) The pastor and four members from each one hundred members or fraction thereof shall compose the representation of each church. (3) The association shall be the sole judge of its members. (4) Any church applying to the association for membership by letter and messenger shall come under the watchcare of the association for one year for observation. At the expiration of that time, if it is still the will of the church, it may be voted in by majority vote of the association, provided they have an acceptable letter and at least one messenger present at the time.

ARTICLE V

(1) The association shall hold its regular session on Thursday and Friday preceding the 3rd Sunday in August. (2) The moderator may call a mid-year session at his pleasure.

ARTICLE VI

(a) The officers of the association shall be a moderator, vice moderator, clerk, assistant clerk, treasurer, historian, Sunday School superintendent, Training Union Director, Woman's Missionary Union superintendent, Superintendent of Evangelism, president of Deacon's organization, Brotherhood President, Superintendent of Education, and a parliamentarian, and such other officers as the association may desire to elect. (b) The term of office for the general officers of the Association shall not exceed two years in succession, with the exception of the clerk and treasurer of the association, who may be re-elected to succeed themselves in office at the pleasure of the Association. The term of office for all members of committees of the Association shall be for not more than two years. No committee member may succeed himself until at least one year has elapsed after his official term has expired. No member of the Association may be permitted to hold membership in more than one committee during one year, except in the case of the members of the

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Executive Committee. (c) The term general officers shall apply to the moderator, vice moderator, clerk, assistant clerk and treasurer.

ARTICLE VII

(a) The moderator shall preside and maintain the order of business of all meetings unless he otherwise provides for the vice moderator. He shall serve as ex-officio member of all committees of the Association. (b) He shall appoint the committee on committees and all other committees pertinent to the operation of the body not named by the committee on committees in its regular report. (c) The vice moderator shall assist the moderator and in case of absence or incapacitation of the moderator, he shall act in his stead until another moderator is elected. (d) The clerk shall keep a complete and accurate record of all transactions; he shall prepare a book of reports to be distributed to messengers and pastors at the beginning of each day's session of the annual meeting; and he shall cause to be printed a minute concerning the records made. (e) The clerk shall mail to the clerk of each church in the association, blanks for the preparation of the church letter as soon as they are received from the state convention office. (f) The treasurer shall receive and disburse by the order of the executive committee or the association while in session, the money of the treasury and make a complete report to the association at each session. (g) It shall be the duty of the historian to keep the records of the association up to date (h) The Associational Missionary shall be sought and recommended by the Promotions Committee in a manner of its own choosing.

His call shall be indefinite. His salary, allowances, etc., shall be as provided by the current budget or adjustments recommended in consultation with the Finance Committee.

Two week vacation may be taken at his discretion.

Concerning termination of employment, his resignations shall be in writing and presented to the Promotion Committee at least thirty days before it is to take effect. The Promotion Committee may terminate employment by giving thirty days notice in advance. The Promotions Committee shall give full supervision and guidance.

The Promotions Committee shall give full supervision and guidance to the Missionary in planning, promoting and financing his work, - (full The Missionary shall work closely with the associational committees

The Missionary shall work closely with the associational committees and associational officers in such a way as to help each group determine its opportunities, and objectives based on the need in the churches and procedures, and means of fulfilling these.

Therefore, he shall serve as ex-officio member of all committees of the Association. It shall be his duty to administer the policies and instructions of the Promotions Committee. He shall communicate with the State and Southern Convention such information as shall be mutually helpful and needful.

ARTICLE VIII

All officers shall be elected annually at the discretion of the body.

ARTICLE IX

The business of the association shall be conducted according to Roberts Parliamentary Practice or in a manner not contrary thereto.

ARTICLE X

The Promotion Committee shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Sunday School Superintendent, Superintendent of Evangelism, President of the Deacon's Organization, President of the Brotherhood, Superintendent of Education, Associational

The M.C. shall be responseble to assimilasive. 6. Ex. C. Concerning it work.

Missionary, Parliamentarian and the pastor and one member from each church in the association. No pastor, by virtue of his being an Associational officer, shall be disqualified as a member of the Promotion Committee, from representing the church or churches he may be serving in the Association. Twelve of these members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE XI

It shall be the duty of the promotion committee to act for the association on matters arising when the association is not in session and to make a report of all work to the next session of the association.

ARTICLE XII

The associational quorum shall be the number present if the number satisfies the will of the moderator.

ARTICLE XIII

The association shall have the right to withdraw by a majority vote fellowship from any church which becomes unorthodox in doctrine, or disorderly in practice, or that fails to present itself either by messenger or letter for two consecutive sessions without sufficient reason, or that ceases to be missionary in practice. The support of the causes fostered by the denomination at large and of this association in particular shall be the test of each church as a missionary body. Any church, at its pleasure, may withdraw from the association.

ARTICLE XIV

The association shall have such standing committees as may be considered necessary to promote efficiently the work of the Master in our midst, the members of these committees are to be nominated annually by the committee on committees unless otherwise determined by the association.

ARTICLE XV

This constitution shall be amended by a majority vote, providing the amendment was read on the previous day of the association. Otherwise twothirds majority of the votes cast must be in favor of the amendment.

BY-LAWS

1. All vacancies occuring among the elective officers and in the Promotion Committee shall be filled by the Promotion Committee.

2. The Promotion Committee shall meet at a time and place designated by the moderator on Monday following the first Sunday of each quarter. The Promotion Committee shall elect its own chairman.

3. Each church clerk shall mail to the clerk of the association a letter properly filled out on the blank furnished him at least two weeks prior to the meeting of the body.

4. No church shall be received into the association who does not present a certificate of examination properly endorsed by the committee on organization and reception of new churches.

5. Duties of the committees of the association.

 $F_{\rm el}$. Order of Business Committee: This committee shall plan the annual program for the association and present it to the Executive Committee at its July meeting. - 7 - \mathcal{B}_{i} 2. Committee on Committees: The duty of this committee is to bring to the annual associational meeting a nomination of the personnel of the standing committees.

C.3. Finance Committee. This committee shall devise plans for raising the funds for the association budget and prepare for recommendations to the annual session of the association the budget for the disbursement of funds for the coming year.

\$\overline{2}\$4. Resolutions Committee: This committee is to report suitable resolutions at the annual associational meeting.

5. Credentials Committee: This committee serves in an advisory capacity only. This committee should examine such candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the Gospel Ministry and make recommendations as they feel led to the church of which one is a member about his being ordained and help plan and arrange the proper services of ordination when such assistance is needed. The Executive Committee should be informed regularly of the work of the committee. Each church desiring to ordain a candidate is urged to consult with the committee.

F6. Nominating Committee: It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate the officers of the Association and have this report ready for the annual associational meeting.

67. Committee on Organization and Reception of New Churches: This committee shall have the responsibility of advising with groups proposing the organization of new churches and offer such suggestions as are deemed advisable, and submit a written report of same to the association or Executive committee and grant to the proposed church a certificate of commendation which must be presented with the first letter of the church to the association. This committee shall be composed of the Baptist Pastors of the Churches of the Tuckaseigee Association. Seven members shall constitute a quorum. The chairman of the committee shall be named by the committee on committees.

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6. The Clerk shall prepare a Book of Reports for distribution at the annual sessions containing the reports of those on the Committee on Reports. The Clerk shall notify each person to give a report, and these reports should be in the hands of the Clerk no later than two weeks before the Association meets.

TUCKASEIGEE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION OCHRE HILL BAPTIST CHURCH, SYLVA Thursday, August 17, 1967

SUPERINTENDENT OF MISSIONS August 17, 1967

Jesus' command to us is "Go ye therefore and teach all people, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and of the Holy Ghost". However, He emphasized in a very forceful manner the importance of teaching obedience when He included the phrase "teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you".

Here, Jesus summed up God's purpose in the world and the objective towards which His followers must ever move in full committment if they are to be true followers of Him.

One of the great thoughts to ponder is that God used His people in the greatest task. To quote a young lady in Nurses' training, she said, "One of the greatest thoughts is that God loved me enough to save me, and that he trusted me enough to use me".

When He said "Make desciples of all nations", that commandment was great, but it is not complete within itself, and it can only be fullfilled when the EVANGELIZED has been taught sufficiently that he becomes an EVANGELIST. So, we see Jesus gave equal importance to the training of Christians to be faithful in their Christian responses as winning them by including teaching and winning as NOT separate duties for His followers, but including them together.

Whether we are blessed with one talent or many, the question confronting Christians of all faiths is ---ARE WE USING THAT WHICH HAS BEEN GIVEN US?? Only as we permit the Spirit of Christ to dominate our actions are we His disciples.

The Master's greatest claim was that the "Son of man came not to be ministered unto, but to minister". After Jesus had given that heart stirring story of what is commonly called the "good neighbor", His commandment to his listeners was, "Go thou and do likewise". When the Master placed so great importance on teaching obedience in everything that He commanded, this was a dark and cruel world. It still is a dark and cruel world, and the need has increased to include a larger concept than could have been imagined by the first disciples. However, the power is the same Power that Jesus promised to be present with them, and it is available to each church that has members who respond in full commitment to His commandment to "GO" to peoples everywhere and make them His disciples. And, the promise is the same, "I will be with you always, to the end of the ages".

We wish to express our appreciation to each of you for your faithfulness and loving concern for others that makes this Associational report possible. To the churches, pastors and each Associational officer, along with each individual who has contributed to the work in any way, I express my appreciation to you and to Almighty God for the blessings that have been ours during the past years.

And, because of your faithfulness with your support, we have been permitted to serve among you and with you.

HOME MISSIONS

"GO YE INTO ALL THE WORLD...." this familiar scripture phrase includes our United States. We can be proud to be a part of the Baptist group which, according to Executive Secretary Arthur B. Rutledge, is grouping its resources for "a creative approach to meet the near revolutionary changes which dominate life in the United States".

The urbanization and industrialization of the nation, the population growth, the search for civil justice, and a revolution in morals are among the social changes which are affecting missions today. The Home Mission Board is seeking to discover the individual's, the church's, and the denomination's mission in such a changing society.

Changes have been made in the organizational setup of the Home Mission Board to help meet these social changes. Included in the changes which have been made are: the addition of a Division of Administration Services, a Department of Work Related to Non-Evangelicals, a Department of Christian Social Ministries, a department of Special Mission Ministries, Art Services, Mission Property Services, and emphasis on metropolitan and academies evangelism, an Associate Director in the Division of Ministries and the Division of Education and Promotion was re-named Division of Communication.

"In supporting missions in the United States, Cuba, Puerto Rico and Panama, Southern Baptists channeled more than \$7,900,000 through the Home Mission Board. The Cooperative Program provided \$4,365,353, including the largest Advance Section in history, \$911,753; and the Annie Armstrong Offering promoted by W.M.U. provided a record \$3,573.146."

"Disaster relief became a permanent ministry of the agency in the Department of Social Ministries, and \$50,000 was allocated from the Advance Section for aid to hurricane-stricken areas in Louisiana." As to personnel, the missionary force for Home Missions of over 2,000 is mostly employed under the cooperative agreements with Baptist State Conventions. In addition, 656 students are employed for ten weeks for the summer of 1966, and the first group of US-2ers (college graduates for two-year terms), and the first of the Christian Service Corps (mature lay persons for short terms of voluntary services) were appointed.

The Home Mission Board continues to study in depth the areas of metropolitan missions, resort missions, rural-urban missions, and other points of change. The chaplaincy is a growing Home Mission force. Some fifty Southern Baptist chaplains were ordered to active military duty during the past year. In addition there are 781 chaplains commissioned in the reserve, student program, or National Guards with the military. Another 233 chaplains serve full-time with the Veterans Administration, hospitals and other institutions and industry, plus forty-one part-time chaplains in the categories.

There is a need of 186 Home Missionaries and a need of more dedicated support of each individual and each church to our present work in Home Misions. Indeed, we need to pray for the Home Mission Board and its ministries. May God help us to continue to seek to meet the needs of the people.

FOREIGN MISSIONS

The time has come for Southern Baptists to fix their eyes upon a new horizon in the world missions. Since 1845 the Foreign Missions Board has served as a channel through which churches cooperating with the Southern Baptist Convention extending their missionary outreach to others lands. Many of the principles which guided foreign mission work in the past find fresh expression in the new program of advance set before Southern Baptists.

The Foreign Mission Board issued a call for 5,000 missionaries to be placed across the world at the earliest possible time. As of May 1, 1967, the Foreign Mission Board's overseas staff is 2,280 (including those serving in programs of short-term service) under appointment to 65 political and geographical entities.

The missionary in other lands faces an expanding opportunity. He can rest assured that he is greatly needed and that there is work to be done which will command his maximum ability. In sending missionaries we express the deep conviction that communicating the gospel calls for dedicated people who have a vital Christian experience and are prepared to share it with others.

The missionary expansion includes all phases of the Christian Gospel and Service in every Christian manner. When we think in terms of the vastness of the need we are reminded of another great need.

A larger missionary undertaking calls for vastly increased sums of money. In recent years financial strength and missionary personnel have grown in parallel lines. Southern Baptists have demonstrated their determination to enlarge a worldwide missionary witness. Support of missions through the Cooperative Program and Lottie Moon Christmas Offering can bring the desired resources. Funds are necessary to provide for the support of the many advances in Foreign Missions and may we as churches of the Southern Baptist Convention gladly accept the challenge.

COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

Despite the fact that Southern Baptists have been sharing the gospel through the Cooperative Program since 1925 many do not know what this plan is. The question--what is the Cooperative Program?--is often heard.

The answer is simple. What the budget is to the local church the Cooperative Program is to the Denomination. It is support for all missionary causes at home and abroad--it's preaching the gospel--it's healing in the name of Jesus through hospitals and clinics everywhere--it is teaching and training Christian leaders for all the great tasks of Kingdom endeavor.

As our people worship with tithes and offerings Sunday by Sunday and as the local church channels a part of its income through the Cooperative Program we enter into partnership with God and one another in obedience to the command, "Go...preach...teach...!"

Let us resolve to pray earnestly for all Kingdom work and support our prayers with sacrificial giving of self and substance.

Last year North Carolina Baptists gave \$5,787,311 through the Cooperative Program. Supplementing this with Special Offerings amounting to 2,897,63 we had a total of 8,684,950 for all mission causes! Two associations (Anson and Yates) had 100% of their churches giving through the Cooperative Program.

According to records available our association gave 15, 795.47 during the last year for World Missions through the Cooperative Program.

We recommend:

(1) That each church plan, vigorously promote, and subscribe a worthy budget.

(2) That special emphasis be given to prayer for Cooperative Program causes during October.

(3) That each church give: regularly through the Cooperative Program.

(4) That in response to the special call of the General Board of the Baptist State Convention we increase our Cooperative Program giving by at least 10% during the coming year.

Let us be obedient to the command of our Lord, "Go--witness." Our lives will thrill with the joy of living up to another challenge of our Lord, "Be thou faithfull--," if we fulfill the command of the great commission which He gave us.

SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION

The Southern Baptist Convention met in Miami Beach, Florida, from May 30 to June 2, 1967. The meeting was attended by 15,000 messengers in the spacious Convention Hall of Miami Beach. The convention was the first for this pastor and his wife, and it proved to be a most informing and inspiring experience. We were regretful that we were unable to attend the W.M.U. Convention and Pastor's Conference being held two days prior to the Convention.

The Convention was led under the capable leadership of the President H. Franklin Paschall, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Nashville, Tenn. This was a convention that was void of tensions, but filled with concern for the needs of the world. The Theme of the Convention "Mandate to Minister" was more than just a theme but the major concern of all present.

Major attention was centered upon social action and evangelism. The emphasis of our speakers was concerned with personal regeneration, involvement in the social needs of mankind through personal committment and the action of the local churches. Highlighting this theme in particular was the Convention sermon delivered by Landrum P. Leavell, pastor First Baptist Church, Wichita Falls, Texas, who spoke of the need of changed and righteous men to change the society in which we live. The president's address was a stimulating message on the local church and the challenge of meeting the needs of man through the redemptive Gospel of Christ.

There were many moments of inspiring personal testimonies given by such outstanding Christians as Anita Bryant and Jim Vaus. Home Mission night and the appointment of missionaries was one of the fine moments of the Convention. An outstanding morning was on Thursday and the address by Senator Mark Hatfield from Oregon. Our "Mandate To Minister" was brought into sharper focus as we felt his rebukes of the church's failures in the past, and the present need of ministering to the whole man. Certainly of important consequence to this ministry of the whole man by Baptists was the Convention's approval and endorsement of the Christian Life Commission.

We should also call attention to the manner in which Southern Baptists conducted themselves in Miami. Comments were frequently made to the thoughtfulness, friendliness, and considerateness of the messengers. This is a tribute to our Christian witness in example as well as in speech. For us this was a great privilege and wonderful experience to share in such a harmonious Christian atmosphere of the work of Southern Baptists in seeking to meet the needs of our world today.

As another example of service to its readers, the RECORDER is continuing to run both Sunday School lessons--the uniform lesson and the life and work curriculum lessons. Outstanding writer have been secured to do these lessons.

In addition to the weekly ministry in nearly 89,000 homes, the RECORDER editor now writes a weekly religious newscast which is heard on more than 75 stations throughout the state. The radio-television Commission produces and distributes the program. This is another opportunity to spread the good news of the Gospel.

Nothing else can take the place of the BIBLICAL RECORDER in Baptist life. If you doubt this, try it in your church.

During the past year much progress has been made by the Baptist Foundation. We really feel that our name is now recognized by many who just a year ago might not have known us. This is largely due to the gracious people in our state who have helped promote our work - pastors, associational missionaries, attorneys, our Foundation Representatives in the churches and numerous Baptist agencies - to name a few. We are most grateful for every opportunity offered us.

Many new funds have been established with the net returns to go to the particular cause closest to the individual's heart. Whether large or small amounts - we are happy to accept any sum. Our assets are now over a million dollars.

We still encourage each individual to make his or her will and to consult with their lawyer in order that every detail is just as they want it. We also encourage each individual to remember some Baptist agency or cause in their will.

One of the highlights of 1967 has been the building of a new Home for the Aging in Yanceyville. Money and property were left to the Foundation several years ago through wills of a brother and sister for this purpose. More information will be given by the Homes for the Aging but we are most proud to have had a part in the building of this particular Home.

The Baptist Foundation has had a year of tragedy of leadership as well. For many months the Chairman of our Board of Directors, Dr. Ike Greer, has been critically ill at his home in Chapel Hill and July 5th our Executive Secretary, C. Gordon Maddrey, suffered a coronary occlusion. Since that time he has had a series of attacks and is critically ill at this time.

Brochures are in the back for anyone desiring detailed information. The Foundation office is open to everyone and we invite you come by or call if we can be of any help.

CHILDREN'S HOMES

Helping children and young people to grow and develop toward Christian maturity is one of the greatest privileges in life. No task is more important than helping a child to grow into healthy, well-adjusted, responsible citizenship. At the Children's Homes we seek to provide the proper atmosphere, encouragement and supervision to assure the development of inborn. God given talents of our children.

This agency offers a variety of quality services to the children of families who have not been able to continue a satisfactory pattern of living together.

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A total of 33 cottages on five campuses provide group care of different kinds. There are two residences for emotionally disturbed children, convenient to a great medical center where psychiatric services are available. This fall. for the first time, a single cottage at Wallburg is being opened for the rehabilitation of boys.

In addition to group homes, the needs of many children are met through the use of Foster Homes. A growing interest in this phase of our work is encouraging. Many families are finding happiness and opportunity for service in caring for foster children. Thus, many boys and girls, who otherwise would not have this opportunity, are privileged to grow up in Christian homes. Should you have an "extra measure of love" to share in this way the Homes would like to know of your interest.

Regional case work centers, staffed by trained social workers, are located in six prominent areas of the State and add to the ability of the Homes to offer counseling services to distressed families and to those for whom family rehabilitation has been achieved.

In June of 1967 the first of the new family living cottages was completed and is being used by brothers and sisters who can profit by sharing the same home. This building was provided by Mr. and Mrs. William M. York of Greensboro, and is named the York Cottage. It is a model for the family living approach in group child care. A similar cottage is already under construction at Mills Home and two buildings of this type are now being built on the Kennedy Home Campus.

The Child Development Center on the Mills Home Campus was established to serve the local community as a means of strengthening family life and to provide a demonstration and informational program which can offer assistance to churches in beginning any phase of weekday care and education for preschool children. During the 1967-68 session the Center will serve 70 children and their families in two kindergarten groups and nursery school programs with about 35 children in full day care. The staff is providing consultation services upon request to churches interested in the program.

Members of the Board of Trustees and the Staff of the Children's Homes are committed to the task of maintaining a Christian Program, of Child Carea program that will merit the undivided support and loyalty of our people and that will bring favor to our Lord. To that end it is our purpose to meet, as effectively as possible, the challenges of our day.

BAPTIST HOSPITALS

Since the establishment of our Baptist Hospital at Winston-Salem in 1923, it has served Baptists over the state on N.C. furnishing the opportunity of serving persons created in the image of God.

Because it is a large medical center with a staff of specialists and provides the newest and best equipment for their use, North Carolina Baptists depend upon the hospital when they need treatment and care beyond that available in their home communities.

The kind of medical care provided by our hospital is very expensive. The hospital has been spending in free care for our people far more than has been received from our Mother's Day offering and all other welfare agencies combined. This coupled with the rising costs in labor and material needed for the operation of our hospital has caused the hospital to run into debt over a period of time.

This year the hospital made a special appeal for baptist to increase their Mother's Day offering to the extent that this indebtedness could be cleared away. So far the response has been satisfactory and there is great hope that it will continue to this end.

From the last report that was received the figures indicate that the Tuckaseigee Association of churches has made an increase to date of \$511.13 over the amount given during the entire year last year. There is hope that again the time runs out for the final tabulation of the gifts for this worthy cause that our association will have reached the suggested goal.

The heart of the hospital's healing ministry is its service for those that are sick and in need. Your response to the Mother's Day Offering makes it possible for many to receive this healing ministry. We sincerly hope that you will ever make this offering close to your heart.

BAPTIST HOMES FOR THE AGING

Your North Carolina Baptist Homes for the Aging have been on the move during the past year. In fact, we will be ready to move into our new Home at Yanceyville in September and will be able to receive 30 more dear old people into the family of our Homes. When the Yanceyville Home, our fifth, is occupied, we will have a total of 200 deserving older men and women in our care in all of the Homes.

As you know, we now have four Homes and an Infirmary in operation. Resthaven and the Hayes Home in Winston-Salem; the Albemarle Home at Albemarle; the Hamilton Home at Hamilton.

In these Homes you have an eternal investment and can rejoice in the loving care which you are making possible for our older people. The majority are financially needy persons, and are supplemented through the love gifts of North Carolina Baptists. Two sources of income from the churches are increasingly vital in the support of our residents - the Special Day Offering, received on the 3rd Sunday of February each year, and our share in the Cooperative Program.

The Special Day Offering for 1967 is at an all-time high and has increased by 10% over last year. This is most commendable, but when we face the reality of costs, which have advanced by 20%, and the maintenance of a new home and the care of 30 additional residents at Yanceyville, we could face a real crisis during the next year, unless the gifts from our Baptist people continue to increase in proportion to our needs.

We wish to thank all of our Baptist people across the State who are enabling us to minister to the aging in Christ's Name, and we want all of you to know that each of your 5 Homes exists for the people from all over our great State. We could not operate without your love, your prayers, your concern, and your financial support.

In the midst of our joys have been our sorrows. Our oldest resident, Aunt Fannie Drumwright, passed away in June, just short of her 106th birthday. She came to live with us at the age of 93, and the 13 years of her presence with us have been a shining example of the special significance of a Christian ministry to older people. The compassionate nursing care alone which this little lady received is reason enought to thank God for the people called Baptists, whose vision and concern for manking have included the aging in answering the Master's call in the service of the Lord. The Sunday Schools task in each of these areas is to involve all church members as individuals. These are some of the tasks of the Sunday School of the local church.

A good mechanic has been trained to the point where he can tear down an automobile engine and then put the parts back where they belong. Church members must have training to do their jobs. Every officer of the church must be trained in certain skills.

The tasks of Training Union are:

1. Teach systematic theology, Christian ethics, Christian History, Church policy and organization.

Systematic theology is simply a systematic study of Bible doctrines. It is important for every Christian to know what he believes.

2. Christian ethics is studying the "oughtness" of the Christian life. This has to do with the development of the Spiritual life and the life of the Christian in the world.

3. Christian History is a study of God's dealing with men throughout all history. It is difficult for us to understand who we are today and where we are going tomorrow unless we know what has gone on before us. History teaches us how to live in the present and future.

4. Church policy and organization is the study of how the church conducts its affairs in order to accomplish the purposes of Christ.

Training Union's job is to train church members to perform the functions of their church as recorded by (Matthew 28:20). Every church has potential leaders. Every church should plan to train these leaders.

ANNUITY BOARD

The new Southern Baptist Protection Program

Response to the new program of family and retirement protection during the first quarter of 1967 indicates enthusiastic acceptance by ministers and denominational employees. During the first three months of 1967 more than 1,000 persons joined some part of the three-plan program as compared with only 685 during the first quarter of 1966.

The new program, called the Southern Baptist Protection Program, provides additional benefits for disibility, new benefits for children, education of children and dependent parent. These extra benefits are in Plan A. The new Protection Program incorporates the three plans into one certificate, which formerly required separate certificates for each plan. The three plans are: Southern Baptist Protection Plan, which is now plan A; Age Security plan, now called plan B; and variable Benefit Plan, now Plan C.

Annuitants Receive Dividend Check

Because of action taken by the trustees of the Annuity Board in February each person receiving a guaranteed benefit from the Board was mailed a "dividend check". This year each check was for an amount equal to onetwelfth of the person's annual benefit. These checks were made possible because of excess interest charges. Approval was given to mail these dividend checks annually, providing the Board realizes an excess interest earnings.

Benefits Paid Out

In 1966, more than \$4,256,244 was paid in age retirement, disability or widow benefits to persons who had participated in the program. The checks vary in amounts, depending on the length of service and the amount of dues paid into the Program by the member.

Ten Per Cent Total Salary Encouraged

The cost of living continues to climb. A retirement program based on \$4,000 salary is no longer adequate to meet the needs of a minister when he retires. There seems to be no hope of a leveling off of the inflationary trends. Because of this, the new protection program was started so churches could help their pastors increase their retirement protection. Now a church may participate on the total salary of its pastor or other employees. Ten percent dues on total salary are recommended as minimum.

Members in Annuity Board Plans

As of December 31, 1966, some 1, 492 persons had joined plan A of the program. a total of 18, 328 churches were providing the protection program for their ministers and staff members. Almost 12, 600 of these churches were paying both members and church dues.

Rev. Guy Cain promotes the protection program in North Carolina. He is jointly employed by the Annuity Board and North Carolina Baptist Convention.

HISTORIAN'S REPORT

In 1900 Bishop Edward Rondthaler of the Morovean Church wrote "The 20th Century will be an age of dispute of nations on a gigantic scale. It will be an age in which the church of Jesus Christ will have to contend with iniquity without and with coldness within".

However accurate this prophecy may be, the Tuckaseigee Association and the churches comprising its membership seem to have withstood the stormy winds of the times and have made much progress both spiritually and materially.

Nine churches in the association have a history of well over a Century. They are Cullowhee 1821, Shoal Creek 1828, Scotts Creek 1830, Tuckaseigee 1835, Old Savannah 1835, Hamburg 1849, Mt. Pleasant 1852, Webster 1854, and John's Creek 1860.

Another group were founded in the later half of the 19th century. They are: Sol's Creek 1869, Balsam Grove 1875, Yellow Mountain 1878, Sylva First 1888, Jarrett Memorial 1888, Ochre Hill 1890, Wilmont 1893, Locust Field 1896. These churches all have a history of at least 70 years.

Many churches were founded in the early part of this century: Big Ridge 1902, Speedwell 1902, Dick's Creek 1903, New Savannah 1905, Hyatt's Chapel 1916, Lumberton 1929, Lovedale 1919, Moses Creek 1919, Oak Ridge 1919, East Sylva 1921, Green's Creek 1921, Cashiers 1930, Wilkesdale 1934 and Long Branch in 1936.

Some churches founded more recently are: Pine Creek 1945, Rockdale 1948, Calvary 1949, Trout Creek 1951, Laurel Branch 1954, New Hope 1955, and Deitz Memorial 1956.

Having such a continuous history as this shows that in our association the theme "A Church Fulfilling Its Mission Through Ministry" is being observed. Respectfully submitted, Kate P. Bryson

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

As our young people today face a world of confusion, and are seeking answers to their questions concerning a New Morality, sex, science and faith, and are trying to understand why even some of our theologians are saying, "God is dead", the role of our Christian Colleges becomes more important than ever before. Yet our Christian Colleges are faced with some of the greatest problems of all time.

Our Southern Baptist Education Commission has tried to cope with some of these problems by establishing the Baptist Education Study Task known as BEST. The twenty-four regional seminars have met for six study sessions over a two year period, involving about 500 persons.

There remains a critical shortage of dedicated teachers as well as a need for presidents, deans and business managers.

Southern Baptist now operate 39 senior colleges, 15 junior colleges, 7 academies, 4 Bible Schools, 6 seminaries and the American Baptist Theological Seminary supported by our S.B.C. jointly with the National Baptist Convention.

Reports from the seminaries, colleges and schools show that ministerial students declined by 235 for the year. There was a loss of 130 home and foreign mission volunteers, a loss of 101 in ministers of education and a gain of 32 in Church Music. -26 -

In North Carolina, the Council on Christian Education has taken steps to make the people more aware of the needs of our Christian Colleges by:

1. Christian Education Day in June has been renamed, "Baptist College Day". The attempt is to enlist the 300 Baptist Churches to study the relationship of the colleges to the Baptist State Convention.

2. Churches will be encouraged to study the colleges and their contributions to Baptist life.

3. The council also recommended the establishment of a lecture series, bring outstanding Baptist leaders to the campuses for speaking engagements.

4. Seminars will be sponsored on each of the campuses next March or April to review the findings of the BEST survey.

It is hoped some of the financial problems of the colleges will be solved by a better communication between colleges and churches.

Our own colleges in North Carolina have problems:

<u>Campbell College</u>, A continued growth brought a recommendation from the board to increase the number of trustees from 28 to 36.

Chowan, Loans were recommended for a men's dormitory.

Gardner Webb, has launched a much-needed program of construction. Over 1,000 boarding students were turned away last year.

Mars Hill, Dr. Fred Blake Bentley succeeds Dr. Hoyt Blackwell on his retirement, as President of the college. Building is proceeding on the campus of the Mars Hill College also.

Meridith College, also has a new president, Dr. Bruce Heliman. The General Board approved the building of a library, a student center and a dormitory.

Wake Forest, Dr. James Ralph Scales is the new president. Construction of a recreation and education center and a stadium has been approved.

Wingate, the largest privately owned and operated college in the Southern Association of Junior Colleges has its own president, Dr. Budd Smith serving as vice-president of the Southern Association of Junior Colleges. Construction of two new dormitories has been approved.

Our Baptist Colleges need our support through the Cooperative Program to be a major influence and force in our state and nation.
