# PROCEEDINGS

Wilkesdale Baptist Church, Sylva, N. C. August 14, 1947

#### MORNING SESSION

The one hundred and eighteenth session of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association met with Wilkesdale Baptist church, Sylva, N. C.

Song: "How Firm A Foundation."

The moderator read the 95th Psalm and made suitable comments.

Prayer by Rev. W. C. Reed, of the Kennedy Home.

The enrollment of messengers, Rev. J. E. Brown and W. T. Rogers acted as tellers. Ninety messengers and fourteen visitors were present.

The moderator recognized the following visitors: Rev. S. L. Lamm of Bryson City, Lee Crawford, of Macon county, W. C. Reed, of the Kennedy Home, Dr. W. K. McKee, from the Baptist hospital, Winston-Salem, and Rev. J. F. Gaddy, Raleigh.

On motion the program was changed, so that the report of the Sunday Schools was considered at this hour. The report, prepared by Edwin Allison, was read by C. O. Vance, who also made the report on Daily Vacation Bible Schools.

#### SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

The report of the Sunday School work in the Tuckaseigee Association, while showing good work in some instances and in some churches, it is never-the-less made with a feeling of regret that more has not been accomplished during the past year.

With our Sunday School Convention, which meets on the 2nd Sunday of each month, we have been into twelve churches during the year. Our attendance at these meetings has only been fair with an average of ten churches being represented. Our secretary sends a report card to each Sunday School for a monthly report and we have only been having a report from about half of our churches; and it is from these reports that we are able to tell the effectiveness of the work. Those churches where we have been able to carry our convention have received us most graciously. During the summer months we have tried to go into the rural churches where the roads might not be so good during the winter.

During the past year our Association cooperated with the Southern and State Boards in "Presenting Our Program to Every Church." While we have not been able to reach each church of our association we have been able to contact most of them. This program is planned during the winter months, which is the hardest time of the year for many of our people to attend or for our churches to cooperate.

TUCKASEIGEE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

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The brightest part of our Sunday School work has been in our Daily Vacation Bible Schools. Mr. Clarence Vance, our Associational Missionary, with Miss Doris Green, a special worker who has been in our association during the past two summers, have made it possible to have these Bible Schools for our children in many churches where it would have been almost impossible except for their help. Other churches have held their Bible Schools with their own teachers and leaders. From the reports, which your Sunday School Convention president has received, a great work has been done and many of our boys and girls have found Christ as their personal Savior during these schools.

There is still a great need for trained workers in all of our Sunday Schools, and during the year before us may this be first in our hearts and minds, that we may Glorify Christ and His work in our Associa-

#### AFTERNOON SESSION

Rev. J. E. Brown presiding.

Song: There Is A Fountain. Prayer, Rev. S. L. Lamm. The report on the North Carolina Baptist Hospital was read by D. J. Bryson; and, on motion was adopted.

Remarks by D. G. Bryson and Dr. W. K. McKee, who spoke on the hospital.

#### REPORT ON NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL

The true value of any Institution is determined not so much by its structural achievement but rather by the program it offers and the services it renders. Our Baptist Hospital has the distinction of having achieved unparallel success in structural growth, a ministering program and excellent services rendered.

Founded in May 1923 with a bed capacity of 100, the Hospital had expanded to 247 beds and 55 bassinets in 1947. An Out-Patient

Building was opened on July 1, 1946.

The underlying purpose of the Hospital has always been the medical care of the poor. Since the day it received its first patient on May 28, 1923, it has offered a high type of hospital care on a statewide basis. When the Wake Forest Medical School became a fouryear school in 1941 and was located adjacent to the Baptist Hospital, it then attained its twofold mission—teaching and healing—the twin endeavors of Christ.

Thru the facilities offered by the Out-Patient Diagnostic Clinics, 18,000 patients were given diagnostic examinations at an average cost of \$5.00 per patient unless some patients required special X-ray and laboratory work. After these examinations have been completed and a true diagnosis has been established, these patients are sent back to their home communities and their cases are turned over to the local doctors. This is one of the many distinctive Christian services that the hospital is rendering. On July 1, 1946, a \$250,000 out-patient building was opened to accommodate the increased demand for these services.

Each year the hospital is able to admit approximately 8,000 patients as in-patients, or bed patients, 20,000 are given out-patient diagnostic examinations and 20,000 were given private examinations, making a total of 48,000 people throughout the state who were relieved of pain by our Baptist Hospital.

Included in the above number of bed patients, 4,000 were service patients and paid no medical fees and none or only a part of the hospital cost. The cost to the hospital for free services for the year 1946

was \$159,115.47. Mother's Day offerings and Baptist contributions together with other contributions made possible the huge amount of charity work. The North Carolina Baptist Hospital was the largest dispenser of charity medical care of any denominationally controlled hospital in the south during 1946.

The Board of Trustees has passed a rule giving full hospitalization free to ministers, missionaries and qualified ministerial students. This is not considered as charity but is a contribution to our ministers and missionaries. 50% discount is given to all work done for dependents

The hospital maintains a School of Nursing which has an enrollof ministers and missionaries. ment of 120 young ladies who receive the highest type of training under Christian auspices. All enrollees are selected under the highest standards and represent the highest type of womanhood—mentally, physically and morally—in North Carolina. Also, the hospital operates a School of Graduate Dietetics and a School of Laboratory Technology, and a School of X-ray Technology.

# REPORT ON CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

In making a report on Christian Literature, it is necessary for us to realize that nitelligent understanding is based on knowledge. Knowledge comes through reading and study. We have at our finger tips the material that makes us world citizens, though we live in a remote cove, far removed from our neighbors.

We hope that all our churches use the splendid literature published by our Sunday School Board, at Nashville, Tenn. Some of the finest men and women in our denomination spend their lives in study and writing, that we may have the benefit of that study.

Then, we have our own papers, the Biblical Recorder and Charity

and Children. Well may we be proud of them.

The Recorder has had a marvelous growth in the last few years. The circulation has now reached forty five thousand. The Recorder has three subscription plans: \$2.00 per year for a single subscription; \$1.50 a year in clubs of three or more; or \$1.20 for every family in the church. We suggest that every pastor, or leaders in every church, encourage this club plan in the churches. A good Baptist is an in-

formed Baptist. It goes free to every pastor.
Then, we have Charity and Children, which should come to every Sunday School in our Association. This paper keeps us abreast of the happenings at our Orphanage, in which we are all vitally concerned.

We would speak a word in behalf of our church libraries. The

public news stands are filled with all kinds of literature, that is leading our young people away from all that is good. We need to sacrifice if need be, that our people may have the best reading material possible. Our Sunday School Board has set up a library department, and has a full time worker, who is ready to give assistance to any church that is willing to cooperate.

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There has been a new magazine added to the list, The Home Life. This magazine is destined to meet a long-felt need of the people in our churches, who are shut in. We sincerely recommend all these periodicals, and the many others that are published and sold in our Association. Our people are in grave danger of being misinformed. Our young people who have served their country in the far away places will never be satisfied to live in the confines of their own communities. They have seen the peoples of the world, and all their needs. Let us "Lift up our eyes and look," through all the splendid literature that is ours.

#### REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

It is in these schools that our Baptist boys and girls will receive Christian instruction and go out into the world into the respective places of leadership and become the leaders of tomorrow. If they are Christian at heart and have received Christian instruction, then they will instill Christian principles in their homes, churches, schools, and daily environment.

Baptists in North Carolina must NOW awake, as never before, and realize our opportunity through our church-supported and church-controlled schools. Our church schools are older and have the precedent over our state schools, and from them our state educational system was born. Education without Christ Jesus is not Christian. Boys and girls are going to get an education somewhere. Baptists of N. C. have a challenge as never before, and must support our schools in order that our boys and girls who will be the leaders of tomorrow may

receive the right kind of education.

If our thinking and actions are right, they must come from hearts that are Christian who have been instructed in the principles of the New Testament. This must be done through church-supported and church-controlled schools. Baptists of the Tuckaseigee Association have a duty, and an obligation, under God, to support with our cooperation, our money, and our backing in every respect, our Baptist schools. . . We further urge that the people of our county stand together and fight to the last for a complete control of the liquor business. That means that we will not allow a drop to be sold, legally, in our county. We pray that God will give us the grace to go all the way with Him.
