

The six SBC seminary presidents have concluded their annual workshop (November 30 - December 5). A large portion of the time was given to negotiating the formula for the allocation/distribution of Cooperative Program funds to the seminaries over the next three years. Dr. Orin Cornett, consultant for the SBC Executive Committee, met with the presidents in order to provide various computations. Cooperative off-campus programs (SEED) were discussed with still more conversation scheduled with the academic officers in January. SEED has received a grant (\$216,000) from the Arthur Vining Davis Foundations for a three-year pilot program of delivering theological education by non-traditional methods throughout the country.
