The six SBC seminary presidents have concluded their annual workshop (November 30 - PRESIDENTS' December 5). A large portion of the time was given to negotiating the formula for the allocation/

the formula for the allocation/
distribution of Cooperative Program funds to the seminaries
over the next three years. Dr. Orin Cornett, consultant
for the SBC Executive Committee, met with the presidents
in order to provide various computations. Cooperative
off-campus programs (SEED) were discussed with still more
conversation scheduled with the academic officers in January.
SEED has received a grant (\$216,000) from the Arthur Vining
Davis Foundations for a three-year pilot program of delivering
theological education by non-traditional methods throughout
the country.

Southeastern Seminary was represented in twenty state conventions this fall.

STATE CONVENTIONS Jerry Niswonger reports that ALUMNI MEETINGS all alumni chapters met and

reported on a variety of activities including enthusiastic response to the "Coleman Challenge."

The visits by the president to each trustee made possible by a grant from the Lilly Endowment are well underway. In fact, all but two out of state trustees have been visited. These two will be visited

before the end of January.

The classroom projects in Appleby Hall and Binkley Chapel are underway and on schedule. The CLASSROOM Appleby project will be completed PROJECTS (except perhaps the furnishings) by the start of the spring semester.
