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

PROGEEDINGS.

Shady Grove Church, Wilkes County, August 20, 1003.

The Brushy Mountain Baptist Association met this day in its thirtieth annual session. At 12 M. the Introductory Sermon was preached by Rev. W. R. Bradshaw of North Wilkesboro. At 1:30 P. M. the delegates assembled in the house, and was called to order by J. L. Hemphill, the Moderator of last year. Prayer by Rev. W. C. Meadows. Second Day.

Friday, August 21, 9:30 A. M.—The association reassembled. Devotional Exercises by Rev. W. C. Meadows. The Moderator being absent, W. C. Meadows acted as Moderator Pro tem. The body was then called to order. Read and approved minutes of previous day. The Moderator then extended an invitation to correspondents and visitors. Rev. J. S. Farmer, representing the Biblical Recorder, reported and was welcomed to a seat in the body. A. T. Pardue read the report on

TEMPERANCE.

This association has for years, without a dissenting vote, recorded its conviction that the liquor business, with all it implies, is an evil. If it is an evil, then the bible condemns it, for it says, "Shun the very appearance of evil." But at this late day, it needs no argument to convince any reasonable man, be he church member or non churchmember, that it is an evil in which no man can enter without bringing shame upon himself and reproach upon the cause of his Master. No church can tolerate such an one without soiling her own fair garments, and thus rendering herself unworthy of fellowship with her fair sisterhood.

In Wilkes county, the Baptists are largely in the majority over all other denominations. To them not only other denominations, but the world outside the church is looking for decisive action on this question. Shall we falter? Shall we fail of the requirements at our hand? How much longer shall we bear the undoubtedly just reproach that we, as a denomination, are in a great measure responsible for the continuance of this permanent evil in our county? This association, prompted not so much by denominational pride, as by a jealous care for the promotion of chsist's kingdom on earth, declares it to be its purpose to withdraw fellowship from any church which retains within its membership persons who hereafter persistently engage in the manufacture, sale or intemperate use of whisky or brandy.

THEREFORE RESOLVED, That we the churches of the Brushy Mountain Association recognize the Watts act and pledge ourselves to do all we can to have the law carried into effect.

The Bible says, 2cor. 6:14-18, "Be ye not unequally yoked together with unbelievers; for what fellowship hath righteousness with unrighteousness? and what communion hath light with darkness? and what concord hath christ with Beliel? or what part hath he that believeth with an infidel? And what agreement hath the temple of God with idols? for ye are the temple of the living God; as God hath said, I will dwell in them, and walk in them; and I will be their god, and they shall be my people, Wherefore come out from among them, and be ye separate, sayeth the Lord, and touch not the unclean thing; and I will recive you, and ye shall be my sons and daughters, saith the Lord Almighty."

EDUCATION.

The educational outlook was never so hopeful as today. The people of North Carolina are begining to realize the importance of the education of the voters that they may rightly discharge the duties of citizenship. For the first time in the history of the state the public schools were kept open four months, which is the required time fixed by the constitution. To do this the Legislature made an appropriation of two hundred thousand dollars. This is a large sum considering the wealth of the state. But even this sum is not sufficient, for the schools should be kept open not four months, but eight if we would remove ignorance from our state. To keep them open a sufficient time, resort must be had to local taxation. The public school law of the state permits any township to hold an election to decide whether an additional tax shall be levied for the support of the public school. We urge the Baptists of this association to join heartily in the movement on foot to better the schools of the state. An efficient school system must have good secondary or preparatory schools. These put education within the reach of a large number of boys and girls. We are glad to note the prosperity of your schools of this grade located at North Wilkesboro and Boomer. All our Baptist Colleges are in prosperous condition. Wake Forest College, the Baptist Female University at Raleigh, the Oxford Seminary for girls, the Chowan Bapt Female Institute, and the prospects of these as of every other college in the state, are bright. The Institutions are striving to place college education within the reach of all our boys and girls. The debt of over \$30,000 on the Female University should be paid by the meeting of the Baptist State convention. It is an incubus upon the denomination and is in the way of our progress. The Education Board at Wake Forest college has for its object the support at the college of young men called of God to the ministry and endorsed and recommended by their churches. This Board has under its care from forty to fifty young men.

MINISTERIAL RELIEF.

This board is located in Durham, and has for its object the care of our aged ministers and their widows. It is a fact that God calls poor boys to preach the gospel. They enter the ministry poor and if they give their lives to the ministry they will die poor. God urges it upon us to care for them when old. We were enabled to do more last year than ever before but only gave about sixty dollars to each. We have a permanent fund of \$3000. The interest on this with two thirds of the amounts collected each year are placed to the disposal of this board. Brethren help us. If the churches don't help the Board, we can't help the old ministers or their widows.

the association. Committee on Devotion reported Rev. S. D. Barnes to conduct religious exercises to-morrow at 9:30 a.m. and Rev. L. Johnson to preach to-morrow at 11 a. m. On motion adjourned to meet to-morrow at 9:30 a. m.

Third Day.

Saturday, August 22nd, 1903. The association met as per adjournment and was called to order by the Moderator. The journal was read and confirmed. Rev. A. T. Pardue read the report on

ORPHANAGE.

We have, located in Thomasville, an institution known as the Thomasville Baptist Orphanage for the earing for indigent orphan children of the white race. This institution was founded in 1884 and has given aid to more than 700 orphans. During the past year we had 260 orphans. We propose to take the needy orphans from 5 to 12 years of age, to give them shelter, food and clothing, and also to teach them to perform such work as will enable them to be useful citizens, as well as to give them a chance to procure good practical education. Furthermore we try to provide for them good moral and religious training. The cost of maintaining these orphans is a little less than five dollars per month for each orphan. The support of the orphans comes entirely from voluntary contributions from the churches and individuals. In order to meet this demand for current expenses it is necessary for our churches and Sunday schools to take regular collections and forward them to the Treasurer of the Orphanage. In order to keep posted in regard to our work and needs, our Orphanage paper, Charity and Children, should be taken and read.

STATE AND HOME MISSIONS.

The State Mission Board has under its care the mission work of the state. While we claim North Carolina as a Baptist State, there are yet many communities in the state where there are few Baptist preachers and fewer churches. Many associations are not able to handle their own destitution, and without the aid of the Mission Board, these sections must remain in destitution. We are endeavoring to raise this year twenty five thousand dollars for state missions. It will take earnest effort to meet this obligation.

The Home Mission Board has the work of supplying the destitution within the Bounds of the Southern Baptist Convention. Many States in the South are not able to meet the destitution in their own bounds. The colored population and the island of Cuba are also under the care of the Home Board. North Carolina contributed last year seven thousand dollars for Home Missions. To do this we must enlarge our contributions thirty per cent.

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Looking at the people of the earth we see there are one and one half billions people, of this number, there are only one hundred and fifty three millions of protestants. We have had nineteen hundred years and have only reached one in ten. God says "Go into all the world," and if we do not do our duty can we expect to be saved?

God is expecting something at our hands. Let us enlarge our work. Our Southern Baptist Convention pledged two hundred and seventy five thousand dollars to Foreign Missions. Of this amount North Carolina is pledged for twenty thousand dollars. Let each man do his full duty. W. R. Bradshaw,

"We earnestly advise the churches that they maintain Paul's order on collections as given in Cor. 16, 1-2. And that all church expenses be gathered from these collections. And that each church treasurer make a true report to the church each month. And also that each church treasurer make a true report to the Association Treasurer at the end of every three months, beginning Aug. 15,1903, and that any church treating this divine order with wilful neglect or contempt shall not be held in good and regular standing with this associa-

The following letter from the sisters of the Wilkesboro church was handed in and read to the sisters of this Association with the request that it be spread upon the face of the minutes.

To the Women of the Brushy Mountain Association:

Having begun a new work in our churches, or rather having taken up an old work in a new way, we thought we would write to our Sisters of other churches and perhaps our plan of work would help them to renewed efforts and greater zeal for the Master's work.

Since beginning the building of our church more than a year ago. The women of our church have been working to help meet the expenses of building and furnishing a new church, but not till May 18, 1903, did we erganize ourselves into a Society.

Then we organized ourselves into The Woman's Aid Society of the Wilkesboro Baptist Church. Our main object at present is to earn money by our own efforts to help our new church. But we give one-sixth or all we make to missions. After our church is furnished we expect to turn all our attention to Foreign Home and State Missions and then help to carry out the great command, "Preach the gospel to every creature."

During the year before the Society was organized the women of our church made about \$80 00 during the three months our Society has been organized, we have made something like \$37.00 and our contributions to Missions this quarter is one eighth of this, or \$6.00. We want to do just twice as much next quarter.

So you see we women have given into the church treasury over \$100.00 during this last year, aside from what is usually given into the church.

Can't some of our sisters present at this Association go home and organize an Aid Society, or a mission Society? Have a Missionary hen and give the worth of her eggs and chicks to your woman's society. There is no telling what women can do when they try and you know all wise men say: When a women wills she will and when she wont she wont. Let all our sisters here say. "I will," and do more for the Masters cause this year than you've ever done before.

Pardew to preach Introductory sermon. George Hamby, Alternate. Treasurer turned over to Clerk minute fund to the amount of \$17.35. Last year, Treasurer turned over to Clerk \$16.24, Last year paid for printing minutes \$10.00, postage and stationery \$1.24, Clerks fee \$5.00, total expended for minutes \$16.24. On motion of W. R. Bradshaw the Clerk was allowed \$5.00 for his services, the remainder of minute funds to be expended for printing and distributing minutes. Treasurer's report was read and adopted. S. J. Ginnings was re-elected Treasurer. The following resolutions were adopted: Resolved, That the thanks of this association be tendered the brethren of Shady Grove church and the citizens generally of the community for their hospitality in entertaining this session of the association. Committee on Religious exercises reported a Sunday School mass meeting at 10:15 tomorrow morning and Lev. L. Johnson to preach tomorrow at 11 A. M. On motion adjourned to meet tomorrow at 10:15. A. M.



Report on Education.

We most heartily commend to your support our Baptist colleges of the state—Wake Forest, Meredith and Chowan, and also the thirteen high schools in our system.

The educational object which especially claims our attention at this time, is a loan fund for the benefit of boys and girls who wish to go to Dell School, but cannot without help.

We recommend that the Dell School Loan Fund be made one of the regular objects of benevolence in this Association.

Rev A. H. Porter was appointed director of this loan fund for this association.

Report on State Missions.

At the first session of the Convention, eighty years ago, a Board of Managers was appointed, which is now known as the Board of Missions. They began at once to plan for the evangelization of all North Carolina, and during the eighty years, since the first organized effort was made to evangelize North Carolina, until this time, this object has ever been before the Baptists of the state—our fathers planned wisely. They laid the foundations broad and deep for a mighty structure. It remains for us to build upon their foundation. Will we measure up to our obligations and opportunities?

We believe that State Missions is just the means to a larger end, not simply the saving of North Carolina, but the evangelization of the whole world, for we are getting out of State Missions a great deal more than we are putting into it. The mission churches put back into the denominational treasury last year \$27,444.93 more than

we put into State Missions.

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This great work lies before us. The past, with its noble achievement, is not sufficient for the future, but for us, the problems and perils of the future are large and threatening. What North Carolina has accomplished in industrialism is hardly a prophecy of what the future holds in store for her. We have just come out of the trials and shadows of the past and the future is bright with promise. We should begin here today in humility and consecration of our lives and services to God, to do the mighty work whereunto we are called.

A Resolution.

Whereas, Baptists are guardians of the spiritual foundations of Democracy, and whereas the modern Republic cannot long endure in ignorance of the religious essentials of Democracy, it behooves North Carolina Baptists to make Baptist principres felt in every educational centre of our state.

Therefore be it resolved

First—That our State Mission Board be encouraged to maintain an efficient Baptist Sunday School hard by every day school and college in North Carolina; that this Association assert its approval of the State Mission Board's desire to support the strongest possible preacher in every educational centre of our state; that this Association go on record as favoring a denominational policy that will ultimately put an adequate house of worship in all our principal educational centers of North Carolina.

Second—That it is the sense of this Association that the way be cleared for working out this policy, by the denomination's coming to the help of the local church at Wake Forest in supplying our own Wake Forest college with a house of worship ample for taking care of all the students that may go to Wake Forest to study.

Third—That some denominational agency be empowered to push this matter so that at least every three years a new ample church building shall be erected in one of our educational centers until all of them are supplied with churches.

THIRD DAY.

W. B. Hester, of the Bladen Association being present, was recognized and welcomed to a seat by the moderator.

Report on Temperance.

The term temperance is more comprehensive in its meaning than the one we usually give it. It includes in its meaning, of course, moderation in the use of strong drink. But we are exhorted to be temperate in all things. Many who are temperate in the use of intoxicating drinks are very intemperate in other things. In speech, in temper, in the quest of pleasure and in the gratification of the various appetites, moderation is lost sight of, and intemperate habits are formed, which very seriously interfere with the formation of strong character.

Temperance, then, is moderation in the use of things which used

moderately are not injurious.

When and how is this moderation to be acquired? We answer that the foundation is to be laid in childhood and the root idea is to be that of self-control. We should lend all encouragement possible to the enforcement of prohibition laws and other such measures to restrain men from drink, but this is necessarily an attempt, as it serves to purify the stream while the fountain remains corrupt. If the parent would see that the child grows up into manhood with temperate habits firmly fixed in his character, he must also see that he early learns the habit of self-control. Many a father, who has loved his boy more than his own life, has ruined him by over-indulgence. He has allowed him to have whatever he wanted simply because he wanted it, without regard to the wisdom of the course, and when the hour of strong temptation came he was not able to withstand it. Well developed, strong and rugged character, and not knowledge alone, is what equips one for the battles of life. A knowledge of physiology and of the toxic proportions of alcohol is very desirable. Yet a young man may be thoroughly versed in these and be none the stronger in the hour of temptation.

Do we as parents, as teachers, as leaders of the young rightly appreciate the possibilities and the responsibilities that are ours.

The young are impressible. They are as clay in the hands of wise and loving authority. Shall vessels of honor or dishonor be the product of our hands?

The next two or three generations will see a wiser, a stronger, a more temperate people, if we measure up to the responsibilities of training the youth. If we do not, we may expect to see intemperance run riot, and the noble race of the harvest, the richest, the freest

people in the world degenerate in the qualities that have made them great.

No greater reproach rests upon the Baptists of the state than that their old ministers are so poorly cared for in their old age.

The state has fallen off in its collection for these men very much for the past two years. Our own association has not been giving to this cause as it should.

We recommend that a committee be appointed in each church to solicit from each member a contribution to this cause.
