


E. GLENN BLANTON

E. Glenn Blanton is next to the oldest of eleven children born to Houston and Bessie Bryson Blanton. He was born in Jackson County in 1912. He accepted Christ in 1925 at Black Mountain Baptist Church.

In 1933 he married Annie Bell Shuler Blanton and their marriage was blessed with three daughters, Peggy and twin's, Dessie and Jessie. He has four living

grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

In the early 1930's the family moved to Cotton Mill, South Carolina and he went to work in the cotton mill. He returned to Jackson County in 1932 and worked for Mead Corporation for ten years. He also worked for the Farmer's Federation and worked in construction as a carpenter for the last twenty five years of his secular work.

He served as a bivocational pastor. An active churchman at Ochre Hill Baptist Church, he served as a deacon and was licensed to preach. In 1958 Ochre

Hill ordained him into the Gospel Ministry.

He began a long and distinguished career of ministry in Jackson County first serving as supply pastor at Pine Creek in 1958. From 1959-1963 he served half-time pastor at New Savannah and helped them build a new church building. He was also at Calvary Baptist Church half-time in 1960 -1961. In 1963 he went to Dicks Creek.

He was honored by the call from his home church to serve as Pastor from 1964-1967. He helped them build a new church building during that time. He was asked to return to Dicks Creek in 1970 and remained there for three years.

In 1973 he was called to pastor the Black Mountain Baptist Church where he was saved as a thirteen year old boy. He retired from there in 1991 after eighteen years as pastor being re-elected each year on an annual call. They built a fellowship hall and went through a major renovation project on the church building during his years as pastor. It is impossible to measure the influence he had upon the people of Wayehutta Community and Black Mountain Church during those years.

He is known for his singing talents. He sung lead in the Blanton Quartet

along with his wife Annie Bell, an alto singer; Delos Blanton, a tenor; and Jack Cope, bass singer. He conducted numerous singing schools in Baptist Churches and taught shape note singing for Southwestern Technical College in Swain County.

He was active in the Tuckaseigee Association serving on numerous committees during the years and as Vice-Moderator in 1986-87. He is well known and

respected through his thirty three years in the Association.

As a busy pastor, he learned to balance the time required for funerals, weddings, home and hospital visitation, sermon preparation, leadership in the church and work in the Association and denomination along with the responsibilities of husband, father, and employee.

He is known for his keen sense of humor, a quick wit and a marvelous capacity for story telling. He is known for his advice to pray about matters that require God's guidance and for his dependability and faithfulness. Duty to

God, to his church and to his family distinguish his life of service.

He brought great advancement to the Kingdom of God in Jackson County Churches through a dedicated life to Jesus Christ. His love of people and his keen ability to relate to them is grounded in his own love for the Lord and his spiritual maturity. He believed in churches cooperating together and this vision has challenged and blessed us.

It is with deep gratitude, great joy and profound respect that the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association prayerfully dedicates the 1991 Annual Minutes in

honor of the Reverend Glenn Blanton.

LINCOLN SEULER 1926 - 1992

Lincoln Shuler was the youngest of eleven children born to Milas and Marian Shuler of Jackson County, North Carolina. He accepted Christ at the age of fourteen and joined the Buff Creek Baptist Church.

He joined the Merchant Marines at the age of seventeen and served until the end of WWII. After the war he returned to Jackson County to marry Eloise Fannell Shuler. They have four children: Tony, Beverly, Keith and Tim. They reared a niece, Joyce. Shortly after his marriage he returned to Buff Creek Baptist Church, rededicated himself to the Lord, and served faithfully until his death.

Ee was elected Choir Director at the age of twenty-three and served in that position for forty-four years. The following year he was elected and ordained a Deacon and he served in that position for forty-three years. On several occasions he served as Deacon Chairman. He also served as a Sunday School Teacher for forty-four years. He taught Vacation Bible School each year and took the youth on a camping trip to conclude their VBS.

Lincoln was an active supporter of all church activities. He was a cheerleader for the Church baskethall team. he directed the Christmas Program for the church his last Christmas alive. Buff Creek Pastor, Wayne Sorrells, said of him, "Faithfulness was a trademark with Brother Lincoln. He had little appreciation for those who dropped by the church now and then." Lincoln was always ready with his testimony and sought to encourage others.

Lincoln was active in the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association having served on numerous committees, was the Executive Committee representative from Buff Creek and served a term as President of the Pastor's, Deacons's and Spouse Fellowship Conference of the Association.

Because of his dedication, faithfulness, and deep love for the Lord Jesus Christ as shown through a life of service to the Buff Creek Baptist Church and the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association, Lincoln Shuler is remembered with honor and respect by the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association.

PROCEEDINGS

162nd ANNUAL SESSION

THURSDAY, OCT. 17, 1991

- The Buff Creek Baptist Church was host for the first session of the 162nd annual meeting of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association. A delicious meal was served at 5:00 pm for the 120 messengers and 20 visitors. Pastors represented 34 Churches of the Association.
- 2. The Moderator, Clyde Vance, convened the first session at 6:00 pm.
- Since our Clerk, Annie Hoyle, had died, it was necessary to elect a clerk protem for these two sessions. The Moderator, Clyde Vance, made the motion to elect Ray Houston as Clerk Protem. A second motion followed. The motion was carried.
- 4. Harry Vance, our music director for the Association, lead the congregation in singing "I AM THINE, O LORD."
- 5. Special music was provided by "THE WILLING SERVANTS" consisting of Chuck and Rita Norris, Lois Wilson, and Roy Young.
- 6. Ed Beddingfield, Pastor of First Baptist Church of Sylva, brought the evening message. His Text was taken from different passages including ISAIAH 56:3-8; ACTS 8:26-40; and EPHESIANS 2:19. The message was entitle "BLOOD IS THICKER THAN WATER" based upon the Family of God.
- 7. Adoption of the BOOK OF REPORTS were approved. The Moderator said there were a few changes to be made in the scheduled program. He named the changes. He stated in order to save time, an approval would not be made at the end of each report but at the end of all changes in the BOOK OF REPORTS. A motion was made, a second followed, the motion carried.
- 8. The moderator recognized new pastors and visitors. The pastors included Rondall Brown at Ochre Hill, Scott Courtney at Webster, Barry Almand at Green's Creek and Harry Vance at Little Savannah. The visitors included Bill Morrow for the Baptist Children's Homes, Coy Privette from the Christian Action League, Richard Roberson from Truett Camp, and Bill Stillerman from the North Carolina Retirement Homes along with other visitors.
- 9. John Reid, our Director of Missions, gave his report. He talked about the past, present and future. THE PAST included recognizing Clyde Vance for the fine job He had done for the past two years as Moderator. He presented him with a plaque. A memorial prayer was made in memory of Annie Hoyle who passed away. The past included the fine work done by the volunteers who worked at the Associational office during the sickness and passing away of Annie Hoyle. He commended the fine job of Clyde Vance and the fine team to find a replacement in Annie Hoyle's place. Betty Grant from the Shoal Creek Baptist Church was elected as Secretary. John Reid commented on how good a job she was doing. THE PRESENT- He talked about Mission work first beginning at home with helping Locust Field build their new Church building. He said labor would start soon and would need volunteer labor. Then He talked about Sao' Paulo, Brazil. We need at least 10 people to go in May.

Then He mentioned the new partnership with New York. THE FUTURE - We must see the need of people. We are scratching where people itch. Go where the need is. Need of a Resort Ministry - People who are passing through every day. Reach out more than ever before. Get a burden, knock on doors, feed poor, reach the lost.

- 10. J. D. Grant, SBC Trustee, gave the baptist Sunday School Board report. He said the new material has been well received. Encourage the use of Baptist Sunday School material. They had given 4 million Scriptures to Russia. Then He talked about Fruitland. He encouraged the Churches if they have someone who could not go to college to consider Fruitland.
- ll. Bill Morrow gave the Children's Home report in absence of Luther Osment. He told how Jesus welcomed little children and how the children love Jesus. he talked about the Boys homes, Moody Home. Told how many children would become abused co on narcotics, and would become runaways within the next few days.
- 12. Harry Vance read Scripture taken from Psalms 95. Then He lead the congregation in singing "TO GOD BE THE GLORY."
- 13. Jane Boggs gave the report on the United Christian Ministries. She said that it took food, money, etc. But most of all the Love of God. She said they had claims for 10 -21 clients every day. She stated of the 35 churches that had given 20 of them belong to the Tuckaseigee Association.
- 14. Coy Privette gave the Christian Action League report. He said for the last 10 years, They had fought the gambling industry. He urged people to fight against the issue of a state lottery by writing to their representatives and letting them know that you are against it.
- 15. Jack Hinson gave the C. J. Harris Hospital Chaplaincy report. He gave several accounts of how He ministers to different people. A channel which is used is hospitals, a place more people need ministry. He stated that October 27, 1991 had been designated as Hospital Chaplaincy Day. He thanked the churches for their giving, their support. 2/3 to 1/2 of their support is taken from the Hennessee fund.
- 16. Bill Stillerman, Retirement Home Representative, gave his report. He stated the greatest need in western North Carolina was quality long term care, beds, etc. He said the problem now , in 10 years would be a problem.
- 17. The WILLING SERVANTS gave us some more special music in song.
- 18. Richard Roberson gave the report on Truett Camp. He said 18 came to know the Lord and that attendance was up. He told of their new facilities. He stated they had a problem with advertising. Need more of it. Children tell more stories than the representatives can. He said it was in the best shape it had even been in.
- 19. Virginia Pangle gave her report on her visit to Sao' Paulo, Brazil. They visited jails, homes, school during the day, churches at night. 3,000 people came to know the Lord. Their desire was America could see a great revival like that. She said the church was made up of 80% young people.
- 20. John Reid gave a report of Digest of Letters. This included Baptisms, enrollment,

ect. It was down some from last year.

- 21. Wayne Sorrells gave a report about our New York Partnership. He said it was overlapping the Brazilian Partnership. We were the second Association to make any partnership with New York. The Tuckaseigee Association is linked up with the Davis Association. The Davis Association has 9 churches, 2 missions. 914 total membership, 814 Sunday School enrollment, 91 Baptisms, 800,000 population and covers 9 counties. He stated partnership opportunities as (1) prayer (2) exchange youth groups (3) exchange VBS and Backyard Clubs (4) Revivals (5) Surveys and witnessing (6) Training (7) Campus Ministry (8) Senior Adults Ministry (9) Pen pals (10) Radio Ministry
- 22. The Moderator, Clyde Vance, thanked the Buff Creek Church for the wonderful meal. An applause was given.
- 23. The Moderator, Clyde Vance, appointed the Resolutions Committee. This consisted of Hazen Pangle, Chairman; Kathleen Buchanan, and Mike Deitz.
- 24. Alan Blanton closed in prayer. The meeting was adjourned with a good spirit.

Friday Evening, October 18, 1991 (Second Session)

- 25. The second session of the 162nd Annual Meeting of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association was held at the New Hope Baptist Church. There were 112 messengers and 35 visitors. This represented 32 Churches in the Association. The host church served a delicious meal at 5:00 pm.
- 26. The Moderator, Clyde Vance, called the meeting to order at 6:00 pm. He gave a welcome to each one and thanked the host church for the wonderful meal.
- 27. Mike Moore, Pastor of New Hope, (the host church) read some Scripture taken from John 1:1-18.
- 28. Harry Vance, our Music Director, lead the congregation in "AMAZING GRACE."
- 29. The special singers was a little late so Harry Vance lead the congregation in another song. The song was "VICTORY IN JESUS."
- 30. Joe Yelton, Pastor of Cullowhee Baptist Church, gave the Financial Report. He made the motion that the budget for the coming year be adopted. A second was made. The motion was approved as made.
- 31. Joe Yelton also gave the Treasurers report in the absence of Treasurer, Jesse Flake. One change was made. Mark from the general fund to give to the Building fund as complete. the motion was made and seconded. The report was approved. He stated it had been a very good year financially. He commended them for their giving.
- 32. Roy Burnette, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, gave his report. Two changes were made. Added W. P. Frady to Youth Director and change the Annuity Board

member to Dennis Wilkey. Also cancellation was made. Debbie Martin said she couldn't be Prayer Coordinator. With these changes, Roy Burnette made the motion that the Nominating Committee report be adopted. A second followed. The motion carried.

- 33. Harold Anderson gave the Committee On Committee reports. He stated that a change was made in the Time, Place, and Preacher Committee. He said it would be brought up at the next Executive Meeting. With this a motion was made and seconded. The motion was approved.
- 34. Irene Hooper gave the Missions Development Council report. She said Charity begins at home. She thanked all who had helped Locust Field in raising money to build their Church. She urged people to be praying about going to Brazil on May 1-11, 1992. Next summer will end our partnership. Need people to go down. Need 24 between us and the other Associations that are in with us.

She stated close at home was Camp Truett. She said on April 7, 1992 was Foreign Mission Appointment at Clemson.

The World Mission Conference which was scheduled had to be cancelled. Irene made the motion that the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association reschedule a World Missions Conference for October 30 through November 7, 1993. A second was made. The motion carried. Irene also made a motion of the New York Partnership. Her motion was as a part of the North Carolina Conventions and the New York Partnership that the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association enter into a partnership with the Davis Baptist Association in upper state of New York. A second motion was made. The motion was approved.

35. J. D. Grant, Pastor at Lovedale, gave the report on Evangelism. 20% of churches had no Baptisms. 5% only had 1 Baptism. 12 Churches had no Baptisms. 25% of our Churches didn't win anyone to Christ.

On October 27, 1991, with Pastors and one lay person from each Church, will be a demonstration of soul winning and a message at the Baptist Center. On November 10, 1991, a workshop will be held at the East Sylva Baptist Church.

He wanted people to pray about a simultaneous revival.

Pray about a " C W T Training" or Masterlife training. He stated the Church was not growing but backing up.

36. Jack Hinson gave the Time, Place, and Preacher Report. The time will be on October 15th and 16th, 1992. On Thursday Night the 15th of October, the host Church will be Green's Creek Baptist Church. The Preacher will be Wayne Sorrells with Ricky Campbell being the alternate.

On Friday night, the 16th of October, the host church will be Yellow Mountain Baptist Church. The Preacher will be Larry Nations with Scott Courtney as alternate.

A motion was made, a second followed. The motion was approved.

37. Hazen Pangle gave the Resolutions Committee report. He gave thanks to the host churches, Buff Creek and New Hope . An applause was given.

A resolution was made opposing a state operated lottery. A motion was made that the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association go on record as opposing state run lotteries and notify its members and members of the House of Representatives. A second motion was made. Both resolution was approved.

- 38. Barry Almand, Sunday School Director, gave the Sunday School report. He recognized several churches that had done great things. These included: Cullowhee Baptist greatest enrollment Webster Baptist percentage in enrollment 62% Lovedale Baptist average attendance growth 10% Green's Creek and Dick's Creek tied for greatest percent in attendance A certificate was given to each church.
- 39. Harry Vance, our Music Director, lead the congregation in "THERE IS POWER IN THE BLOOD"
- 40. Shirley Pressley, assistant Discipleship Director gave the Discipleship training report in the absence of Norman Parris, Discipleship Director.
- 41. Harry Vance, Our Music Director, gave the Music report. He was thankful for the cooperative efforts in churches, churches helping each other out. Churches provided for funerals for other churches. He added on increasing the Association's music program. He wanted 40 churches participating before he left or died.
- 42. Ann Hall, our Youth Director, gave the Youth report. She showed a video of the work done by the Youth during the year. This included rest home visits, giving bags to the people, singing to the people. It was from this that a Creative Ministry was formed by BSU. She talked about the Youth Rally which was held recent.
- 43. Haven Ensley, Chairman of the Deacon, Pastors, and Spouse Fellowship, gave his report. He stated there had been 4 meetings held during the year. The first one was held at Balsam a program of special music. The second one at Buff Creek Luther Osment spoke. The third one at Old Savannah Ed and Marj Elzey spoke. The fourth one at Long Branch Dr. Jeffrey Lee spoke. Total was as follows: 212 people, 46 churches represented. He stated the next fellowship would be October 25, 1991 at the East Fork Baptist Church.
- 44. Joe Pressley, Brotherhood Director, gave his report. He emphasized 3 E's of the church. (1) Exalt the Savior (2) Equipping the Saints (3) Evangelize the sinners. He gave the history and purpose of Brotherhood. He challenged the men to equip themselves and equip young men and boys in missions.
- 45. As Mike Moses was not there to give his report on Royal Ambassadors, the Moderator stated it was in the Book of Reports.
- 46. Janice Burnette, WMU Director, gave her report. The Mission Action report and work progress was in the Book of Reports. The WMU put a tree at the Associational Office in memory of Annie Hoyle. A Plaque would be put beside the tree. She also stated that no church was too small to have a WMU. 1 or 2 would have a WMU or GA's. She said 27 Churches have a WMU.

- 47. Tom Crowder, VBS Director, gave his report. He stated 20 Churches had reported with 1352 enrollment. An average attendance of 1133. 16 professions of faith and \$2,094.00 in gifts to the cooperative program. He also recognized Cullowhee Baptist Church who had a Vacation Bible School Summer Explosion.
- 48. Tom Crowder stated that the Gideon report was in the Book of Reports.
- 49. Linda Fisher and Betty Green gave the Memorial Committee report. Linda had John Reid, Janice Burnette, Joe Pressley, Haven Ensley, and Wayne Sorrells to come forward. John Reid lighted the main candle in memory of Annie Hoyle. Janice Burnette lighted a smaller candle in memory of all the women who had died in our Association. Joe Pressley lighted a small candle in memory of all the men who had died in our Association. Haven Ensley lighted a small candle in memory of all the Deacons who have died in our Association. Wayne Sorrells lighted a small candle in memory of our missionaries both home and abroad who have died. Betty Green read the names of the deceased from each church. As the church was called out, the people stood up until all were standing. Linda Fisher read a poem by Helen Rice and then had prayer. On behalf of the Memorial Committee, Linda Fisher recommended that the minutes be dedicated in memory of Lincoln Shuler and Joe Wilkey and in Honor of Rev. Glenn Blanton. This was in a form of a motion. A second followed. The motion was carried.
- 50. The Moderator, Clyde Vance, recognized Jack Buchanan as having 45 years of perfect attendance in Sunday School.
- 51. The Moderator, Clyde Vance, had all the new officers to stand and be recognized. An applause was given.
- 52. Harry Vance, Our Music Director, lead in a congregational song "BLESSED ASSURANCE."
- 53. Special Music was provided by RIVERS EDGE, consisting of Jerri Melton, Pianist, Bobby Hensley, Charles Kilby, and Daniel Fiskeaux.
- 54. Earl Holden, Pastor of Mount Pleasant Baptist Church, brought the message of the evening. He brought a powerful and inspiring message. His text was taken from 1st Samuel 25:13. His message was entitled "Sticking by the Stuff. He spoke of the problems, the power and the promises when sticking by the stuff.
- 55. Wayne Sorrells, Pastor of Buff Creek Baptist Church closed in prayer
- 56. The 162nd session of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association came to a close. It ended on a high note and a wonderful spirit both nights of the meeting.

DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS REPORT

Matt: 25:21 On Friday June 21, Annie Hoyle went home to be with the Lord. I believe she heard these words as she entered heaven.

I could not bring my annual report to the Association without paying tribute to my friend and co-worker. Annie came to the Association in September of 1982. She was paid a part time salary, but she worked full time and overtime. She contributed far more than her annual salary each year back to the association in gifts.

She served the Association for twenty years as Clerk. She prepared refresments for every Executive Committee Meeting and most all other meetings. She spent her own time and money in doing this. The Association was her life. Annie Hoyle will be missed.

The Ad Hoc Committee appointed by Moderator Clyde Vance did an excellent job in recruiting Betty Grant. Betty is an active member of the Shoal Creek Church. She is doing excellent work. She is both a spiritual and a capable woman and I believe she is the Lord's choice for this work.

Thus this has been a year of adjustments. It has been a time of working through grief, making new friendships, and seeing the office take on a new personality. Your remarks have been favorable and I am pleased.

I am deeply grateful to Irene Hooper and the many ladies from across the association who volunteered to work during the time that Mrs. Hoyle was out and Mrs. Grant was hired. THANK YOU!

It has been my joy to serve this association for nine and a half years. One of my greatest joys is to visit the churches. I attend regular services on Sunday morning and evening and Wednesday Prayer services. I try to attend as many homecomings and revivals as possible.

I am called upon to preach, teach, and help ordain preachers and deacons. I especially enjoy singing in the choirs. My family sings at revivals and at singings on request. I am committed to helping a church without a pastor by serving them four to six weeks until they can make provisions. My scheduling is on a basis of need and invitation. My greatest frustration is my inability to get around to all the churches more often. I do have a need to worship with my family at Ochre Hill at least once a month.

Each year there are certain meetings that I attend that have to do with our larger Baptist family. I attended the regional Vacation Bible School Clinic, Key Leadership Conference, the Southern Baptist Convention meeting in Atlanta, and the School of Evangelism and Church Growth sponsored by the Home Mission Board at Ridgecrest.

Also there are numerous Associational meetings that I attend here in the county. I serve on the Board at Truett Camp and for Southwestern Area Resort Ministries.

Our partnership with the North Association in Sao' Paulo, Brazil is doing well.

Three people from this Association, Rev. Robert Christopher, Mrs. Sammy Lee Franks, and Mrs. Virginia Pangle went to Sao' Paulo this past March. Thus far twenty-three people have gone to Sao' Paulo from this association. In August Pastor Silas Melo and Pastor Valter Costa from the Betel Church in Sao' Paulo visited our association and were in several of our churches. The partnership concludes with the final trip in May 1992. We need five to seven people to volunteer to go.

Our local mission project has been to help our sister church, Locust Field, in raising money to replace their church building. Seven Churches have contributed almost four thousand dollars. I still want to encourage other churches to assist our Sister church.

Our State Mission project has been to ask the churches to receive a special offering for Camp Truett. That offering has been modest. The offering is to pay for a Conference Center that was built last fall and winter. The outstanding loan on the building is \$45,000 dollars. I encourage the churches to receive an offering for that work.

Our newest mission project is a potential partnership with the Davis Association in Hartwick, NY. The Davis Association covers nine counties with a population of over 800,000 people. They have ten churches and two missions. In late September, Rev. Joe Pressley, Rev. Wayne Sorrells, and myself went to Hartwick, Rome, Utica, Vernon, and Maryland, New York on a fact finding mission. Rev. Pressley led in a Brotherhood Training session and the three of us preached in various churches. Rev. Sorrells will present a proposal and discuss in more details the potential of this partnership at the Annual Meeting.

I was pleased with the Sunday School Conference jointly sponsored with the Lovedale Church and the Association this past May. We had excellent training and good attendance. Lovedale did an outstanding job in hosting the event.

Much excitement is astir over the Youth Crusade. I commend Ann Hall and all the many volunteers who have helped plan this event. I trust many youth will come to Christ because of this event.

I am grateful to the WMU for their provision for the meal to celebrate the ministry of the pastor and his family during Pastor Appreciation Sunday. I am coordinating that event with Associational Emphasis Week with the hope that each church will recognize both their pastor and his importance as a key leader in the church and the Association.

Some of my most important work is done in confidential relationships with churches that are having problems. I have counseled with leaders and pastors and attended meetings by invitation of the leadership to assist in difficult situations.

I am grateful to all the volunteer people, program leaders, officers, committee members and others who make the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association the positive witness it is in our county.

May God continue to grant us His Blessings as we work together for His Glory.

HISTORY of Brotherhood

On May 16. 1907, 200 Baptist laymen, led by Joshua Levering and W.J. Northen, met to form a recomendation to the Southern Baptist Convention that a missionary movement be organized. Growing out of a meeting the year before to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the famous Haystack Prayer Meeting, the Laymen's Missionary Movement was Southern Baptists' response to the call by Dwight L Moody and other religious leaders for mobilized laymen to evangelize our world in our lifetime.

J.T. Henderson served as the first general secretary, from 1908 till 1938. His emphasis included organization, education, and inspiration. In 1927 the name was changed To <u>Baptist Brotherhood of the South</u> to enlarge the scope of operation and include pastors.

In 1938 Lawson Cooke was elected executive secretary and the office was moved from Nashville to Memphis, Tennessee. The purpose was expanded to include undergirding the whole program of the church, and "A Million Men for Christ' became the goal.

In 1950, the <u>Baptist Brotherhood of the South</u> BECAME A COMMISSION OF THE Southern Baptist Convention, and its work was better related to the work of the convention.

George W. Schroeder became executive secretary in 1951 and Brotherhood began expanding its program and material, and enrollment increased rather dramatically during the '50s and '60s.

At the same time Brotherhood was developing, Women's Missionary Union began a missions program for boys in 19.8. What began as Boy's Missionary Band in the 1880s grew into a national organization—Royal Ambassadors—with far reaching contributions to the convention's missionary development.

In 1954 the Brotherhood accepted the proposal from WMU to transfer Royal Ambassadors to the men's organization. Royal Ambassadors was completely revised in 1961. Response to the new program and new leadership was very good. Enrollment grew from 127,262 in 1954 to 234,304 in 1964.

Gordon McCullough became executive director in 1971 and made missions education the Brotherhood's focus.

James H. Smith became president in 1979 and continues to give the Brotherhood movement inspiring leadership.

PURPOSE of Brotherhood

In 1965, the purpose of Brotherhood work came full circle. What began as the Layman's Missionary Movement with the purpose of "arousing and stimulating dormant forces to proper activity along lines of missions" had changed over the years. Growing out of a missions concern, the purpose expanded to include a "business-like system of giving in every Southern Bap: ist Church." In later years, the focal points of Brotherhood were deacon ministry and the deacon-pastor relationship. The purpose was further expanded to include personal witnessing, Christian stewardship, Royal Ambassadors, and world missions. In 1965, as part of a conventionwide effort to more effectively coordinate the work of programs and agencies, the purpose of Brotherhood became missionary education and promotion. In 1980, the purpose was

more clearly defined as "Helping Churches Involve Men and Bovs In Missions."

CHURCHES:

Brotherhood is a church organization. It exists by action of the church. It is accountable to the church for its actions. It is designed to help the church fulfill its mission in its community and to the uttermost parts of the earth.

MEN AND BOYS:

Brotherhood is responsible for involving boys, young men and men in missions. It includes boys in first through ninth grades and young men in the 10th through 12th grades. It also includes young men ages 18-34 and men 35 and older. It is designed to produce mature, active, and involved Christians.

MISSIONS:

Brotherhood interprets missions as what men, young men, and boys do to extend their witness and ministry beyond themselves to bring persons to Christ and glorify God. Brotherhood is designed to involve men, young men, and boys in missions by leading them to live their faith daily, to personally witness and minister, and give and pray to support people involved in missions.

TASKS:

Brotherhood helps the church bring persons to Jesus Christ through five tasks. These tasks are to;

*Engage in missions activities

*Teach missions

*Pray for and give to missions

*Develop personal ministry

*Interpret and undergird the work of the church and denomination

ORGANIZATIONS:

Brotherhood is organized into four age/grade levels to help the church more effective involve men, young men, and boys in missions.

They are:

Royal Ambassadors for grades 1-9 High School Baptist Young Men for grades 10-12 Baptist Young Men for ages 18-34 --Baptist Men for ages 35 and older

The priesthood of all believers and their ministry gifts are the cornerstones of Brotherhood. The priesthood of all believers refers to the doctrine that all Christians have the same standing before God; a relationship entered into by faith and confirmed by baptism. Every Christian has access to the Word. Every Christian in dedicating himself to God has a service or ministry to perform. And every Christian has a duty to pass on the gospel

Brotherhood helps grow missionary congregations--congregations where all members are on mission.

Jesus told his disciples "Neither hath this man sinned nor his parents; but that the works of God should be made manifest in him." (verse 3) Some

illnesses are the result of sin and God punishes sin, but God is also the healer. Dr. Lee said it is a blessing to work with Christian patients, they always have hope and look for a miracle. He stated that prayer is a way to bring spiritual healing to the family and especially to those who minister to a patient who is terminally ill. There are three groups at the hospital who offer help. They are: HOSPICE, a support group that helps families with terminally ill patients. A CANCER support group; and the CHAPLAINCY PROGRAM: The Chaplains minister to each patient sharing God's love and letting the people know God's grace is available to everyone. There were 49 in attendance with 13 churches represented.

YOUTH REPORT

This year three goals were set in reaching our youth: the first goal was to give the youth an opportunity to witness in their own special way, the second was to become bold in their witness, and the third and most important was to do all that we do for God's glory.

The first witness project was the gift bags given out to residents of Skyland Rest Home, Ensleys Rest Home, Mountain Trace Nursing Home and the Community Care Center. Gift bags consisted of toiletries (tissue, hand lotion, etc). The gifts were made possible by: Kel-Save, Harolds Supermarket, Avon, Mount Pleasant Baptist Church, Cullowhee Valley Baptist Church, Cullowhee Valley W. M. U., and Webster Baptist Church. Music was provided by the youth with accompaniment provided by Rita Norris and the Rev. Scott Courtney. There were 14 churches involved and 62 youth actively involved in presenting the 225 gift bags.

The least attended event, which says something grand about the willingness and eagerness of the youth to do the Lord's work was a Youth Skate held in April. 25 youth attended representing with 5 churches represented.

One of the questions that was asked at the beginning of the year was, "what can we do to get our youth in church?", our sincerest prayer should be to get them involved as witnesses for Christ. On October 6th and 7th the "Momecoming" Youth Rally featuring the Rev. Bill Cox was held at Southwestern Community

ANNUAL WMU REPORT - 1990-1991

The WMU emphasis for 1990-91 was EMPCWERED! Using this theme and the watchword from Ephesians 3:20-21, members participated in activities designed to deepen their faith and enhance their vision and to renew their dependence upon the Boly Spirit. The Associational WMU Council met quarterly to plan and evaluate these activities and projects.

A Mission action project was planned for each quarter of the year. In the fall, we collected and sent \$286 to the Brownill Children's Home in Clyde for the purchase of picnic tables. Members were also involved in writing to service personnel who were involved in the Middle East conflict.

On November 29, Dan Blake, Associate Chaplain at Craggy Prison and the Buncombe Correctional Center, was speaker for a special meeting at the Baptist Center. He reported on his work and told of special needs for his ministry. An offering of over \$200 was taken at this meeting and the WMU collected needed items for their winter project. Over \$569 and several boxes of stationery, books, and stamps were collected.

In April, \$70 was sent to the Women's Correctional Center in Raleigh for the purchase of a choir robe. Several churches also helped provide food and decorations for the Pastors' Appreciation Dinner on May 26, at the Baptist Center.

Most BCH residents come from dysfunctional families where a single parent, most often a mother, simply is unable to care for her children. Her frustration with life leads to limitless freedom for the children, which leads to troubling behavior. Physical abuse, divorce, alcohol, drugs and truancy mark their young lives.

Baptist Children's Homes provides a safe environment where children learn to name their problems and address them to change behavior. At the same time, willing family members also are addressing their problems with the help of BCH social workers. In many cases, children and families are restored.

BCH's "Give a child a chance!" campaign is raising \$11 million over three years to expand Cameron Boys Camp boost general operating income and increase endowment. Gifts and pledges through July totaled \$9.3 million and response across the state has been overwhelming and heart gratifying.

Last year Baptist Men of North Carolina helped construct the new Tommy and

Jeanie Eller Chuchwagon at Cameron Boys Camp that was dedicated May 19.

BCH celebrated this spring the 20th anniversary of the founding of Broyhill Home, our westernmost campus, in Waynesville/Clyde. With the help of J. E. Broyhill and his family, the home was opened in 1971 on 91 hilly acres. It has a capacity for 48 children in group care and for eight girls in emergency care.

In August 1990 BCH began the Gregg Children's Center for before and after school care. The Davidson County program offers security to children of working

couples, who now don't have to go home to empty houses.

Children's hopes the world over have been bolstered by the 1991 return of the Thanksgiving Offering voted by messengers to the 1989 state convention. While suffering through its 13-year absence, BCH lost more than \$2 million in potential gifts. Our goal this year is \$500,000. Because of a partnership established in December with the Baptist Children's Homes of Sao Paul, Brazil, BCH-Worth Carolina will donate 10 % of everything it receives over the \$500,000 goal for work in that desperately needy land.

In August 1990, BCH signed an agreement with Gaston County Department of Social Services to operate two emergency care homes owned by the county. That raises to seven the number of emergency care homes BCH operates. Emergency care, in which a child at risk of abuse or neglect can receive shelter right away, is the service most in demand throughout the state. Children stay a maximum of 60 days

while BCH works with the custodian to determine a long-term plan of care.

The Cooperative Program continues to anchor our budget planning from the churches. We urge renewed commitment to cooperative giving among our North Carolina churches. It is essential, not only for us, but for the entire missions enterprise built painstakingly for a century and a half. Baptist Children's Homes receives \$1.5 million from Cooperative Program receipts a year. This is the stackpole around which we build our other income planning. A decrease in Cooperative Program dollars to Baptist Children's Homes would seriously jeopardize our ability to care for children.

Baptist Children's Homes has a 106-year history. But its history is just the knot that ties it to a boundless, unbroken ribbon of promise that stretches beyond the future to wrap children and families with eternal blessing.

BAPTIST COLLEGE REPORT - 1991

A "new-old" event is about to take place in North Carolina Baptist life; A Special Committee!

From time to time we Baptist feel the need to take a hard look at ourselves. We do that through the time—honored practice of asking trusted people to serve on a committee for a year, sometimes two. In 1956, for example, "The Committee of Twenty—five" began a comprehensive study which eventually embraced all aspects of Baptist State Convention call for that purpose on May 5-6. 1959. Again, "The Committee of Twenty," appointed in 1967, worked for two years before presenting its comprehensive findings and recommendations to the Convention in November of 1969. Both of these committees provided clarity and guidance for North Carolina Baptists which endured for many years.

New times call for a fresh look at ourselves. The "new times" which have taken shape in the Southern Baptist Convention since 1979 have particular relevance for institutions, agencies, their trustees and the Convention. North Carolina Baptist institutions and agencies have rendered distinguished Christian service for a total of 1,108 years! New times call for a new look by a competent special committee.

In May the General Board approved a 17-member "Institutions Relations Committee." Lamar Brooks, Wilmington, is chairman. Other members are: Jean P. Abernethy, Marion; Dot Allred, Gastonia; Curtis Lee Barbery, Bennett; Harold Bennett, Boone; Don Bolden, Burlington; Caralie Brown, Raleigh; Kathryn H. Hamrick, Shelby; John H. Hewett, Asheville; Milton A. Hollifield, Jr., Stanley; John M. Hough, Jr., Salisbury; James H. Johnson, Candler; Robert B. Poole, Elizabeth City; George W. Pullium, Jr., Knightdale; Hobart Smith, Charlotte; A. Eugene Warren, Charlotte; J. L. Wilson, Winston-Salem. Their report is due in November, 1992.

The "new-old" way of study and thought is the North Carolina Baptist, triedand-true way to confront changing times. We thank these 17 good men and women who will help us to shape the future together in harmony. They request and deserve our fervent prayers.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL

The year 1991 is significant in the history of Baptist Hospital - it marks the 50th anniversary of its entering a partnership with the Bowman Gray School of Medicine of Wake Forest University, to form one of the 126 academic medical centers in the nation. Appropriate events have been planned to celebrate this anniversary.

This partnership makes it possible for Baptist Hospital to offer it's patients the most advanced technology for diagnosing and treating their health problems. For example, ours is one of 15 medical centers in the nation involved in clinical trials of a new coronary laser which vaporizes plaque in blocked coronary arteries. We are one of five centers in the U. S. conducting clinical trials in stereotactic radiosurgery, a procedure in which high - energy beams of radiation from a linear accelerator are focused by computers on brain tumors and lesions to destroy them. This procedure can be done on an outpatient basis. We are one of 24 Comprehensive Cancer Centers in the nation. We are the designated organ procurement agency for Northwest North Carolina, and we recently received approval to begin performing pancreatic transplants this year. Early in 1992, we expect to open our new Center for Positron Emission Tomography, one of the radiological services which is capable of measuring the chemical structure of the body. This new diagnostic procedure promises to make possible earlier detection, and hence, earlier treatment of tumors, hopefully, improving the outcome of the treatment.

During the past year, the hospital admitted approximately 22,000 patients, and almost 400,000 persons were treated through the various outpatient services of the Medical Center. These patients came from most counties in North Carolina, from 32 other states, and from several other countries.

During the past year, Baptist Hospital was re - accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Health Care Organizations, and the survey team which visited our institution ranked it in the top 10 percent of hospitals in the nation. Also, according to a recent report from the North Carolina Medical Database Commission, average charges for care at Baptist Hospital are 10 percent below the average charges for similar diagnoses in hospitals statewide, and substantially lower than charges in the other North Carolina academic medical centers.

The Pastoral Care Department, which is funded in part through the Cooperative Program, provided Clinical Pastoral Education to 42 students during the past year. The Pastoral Care staff provided more than 54,000 specific ministries to hospital patients, family members, and staff. And, the counseling division provides over 21,700 counseling sessions. The Professional staff of the Pastoral Care Department continues to respond to request for help from churches in conflict, from pastors and their families across the state.

For the first time since 1978, a Mother's Day Offering exclusively for Baptist Hospital Benevolent Care was received in North Carolina Churches. At the time this report is being written, results of the Mother's Day Offering appear to be very favorable. The staff and patients at Baptist Hospital are profoundly grateful to North Carolina Baptists for this support.

The Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina, Inc. operates four residential facilities for Older Adults around the state - the Albermarle Baptist Home in the Southern Piedmont, the Western North Carolina Baptist Home in Asheville, the Hamilton Baptist Home in Eastern North Carolina, and the Brookridge Retirement Community in Winston-Salem.

In Asheville, 1991 began with a great deal of excitement. After more than five years of trying to receive state approval to build a nursing car bed addition, the Baptist Retirement Homes was awarded a Certificate of Need for 100 medicaid certified nursing care beds for its Western North Carolina Baptist Home on Richmond Hill in Northwest Asheville. Currently the only nursing care provided by the Baptist Retirement Homes is the 85 bed nursing care unit at the Brookridge Retirement Community in Winston-Salem. The addition of 100 medicaid certified beds will mean that quality nursing care can be offered to Western North Carolina Baptists regardless of their ability to pay for the institutional services that they need.

The 39,000 square foot addition will cost approximately \$2.8 million. At the present time, the Baptist Retirement Homes has raised approximately \$2 million of the \$2.8 million needed to make this long hoped for dream a reality. Baptists across Western North Carolina are being urged to help Baptist Retirement Homes meet the financial challenge of building this new unit on Richmond Hill.

In Winston-Salem, the Brookridge Retirement Community completed its second year of operation. Under the leadership of a well-trained and committed Christian staff, the Brookridge Retirement Community's Independent Living area and Health Care Unit are considered among the finest in the state.

In Albemarle and Hamilton, Assisted Living care is provided to Older Adults in residential settings. The Albemarle and Hamilton facilities offer quality care to Older Adults regardless of their ability to pay for the cost of the care they receive...a service unmatched by any other church related long-term care institution in this state.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

Dear Friends,

One of my greatest joys as Director of the Church Relations/Volunteer Activities Department of the American Bible Society is taking inventory of our shared Scripture ministry over the last calendar year. Moreover, it is especially gratifying to share the results with you, our faithful friends and partners in the Bible causes. We want you to fully realize in your heart of hearts that YOU WERE THERE all during 1990, as we sought, through the partnership established between you and us (between your denomination and the ABS) to carry out Jesus' last command on earth: THE GREAT COMMISSION.

The total number of languages into which at least one book of the Bible has now been translate is 1,946. During the course of 1990, there were 18 different languages into which at least one book of the Bible was translated for the very first time. And YOU WERE THERE when it happened. Complete Bibles are now available, also for the first time, in four additional languages —all Bible Society publication. And YOU and your denomination were there, my dear Christian friends.

All of the statistical data, facts, and figures, as astounding as they are, somehow do not touch the heart as much as real accounts of people sharing God's Word with people. What we all want to read about is how the Scriptures are changing lives. Let me share with you one of those special moments as it was related to the Bible Society by a former prisoner from Singapore.

His biological father had died when he was only four, and later he was badly mistreated by his stepfather. After beginning work as a common laborer at 13, he soon began to smoke, gamble and indulge in all sorts of corruption. Years later, he was involved in a clash between rival gangs and ended up in jail.

While he was contemplating suicide, two of his enemies in jail became Christians and began reading Bibles. Their behavior toward him changed radically. He was amazed at their transformation and wanted to know more about this Jesus of theirs. Borrowing a Bible, he began to read. He became more

conscious of his sins as he devoured God's Word.

One night as he was meeting and singing with other Christians, he pictured Jesus shedding His blood to save his life. Lifting up his hands, he prayed to

accept Jesus then and there. Peace and joy flooded through him.

Later released from prison, he now leads a redeemed life as a general contractor, husband and father. He says, "I love the Bible and whenever I have the opportunity to tell others how much it means to me, I am always happy to do so."

When that life was transformed by the strength, the authority, the power, and the love of the Word of God, YOU WERE THERE. You were in that small village in South Africa when the Scriptures were distributed among the village families. You were inside that church in Romania when joyful hands reached out for Bibles. You were on the road in Haiti passing out Scriptures to the fishermen. You were in Saudi Arabia when American men and women serving their country in the armed services received the camouflage-covered Bibles which gave them comfort and hope.

Thank you for being there. Thank you for your partnership in response to God's call for obedient discipleship and worldwide evangelization: "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father , and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world." (Matthew 28: 19-29

ANNUITY BOARD

Protection is an instinct each adult has toward his spouse and children. It hurts to see a child fall or a spouse passed over for a promotion. We want to shield loved ones from the hurts of everyday life.

That kind of protection is impossible, but there is financial protection available to ministers that can provide a life-saving margin for his family in the event of his disability or death. The good news is it costs him nothing if he is an eligible participant in the Church Annuity Plan.

The Protection Section of the Church Annuity Plan is provided by the state convention, and includes several benefits. These benefits can mean receiving:

- up to \$67,500 in special survivor benefits if you die prior to retirement, or while receiving a disability benefit.
 - up to \$300 a month if you become disabled and unable to perform any gainful employment due to physical or mental incapacity.

Additionally, up to \$35 each month can be credited to your retirement income account during your disability and your survivor benefits will remain.

This valuable family protection is funded from Cooperative Program dollars that match dollars contributed to your account by you and your church.

"The Church Annuity Plan offers significant up-front family protection that leaves your dollars free to build your retirement security. It is an important benefit that many ministers overlook in the retirement plan," Frank Schwall, senior vice president of Member Services.

The average annuitant in North Carolina receives \$287.43 per month, up from \$234 last year.

North Carolina has 3,396 members making contributions to Annuity Board retirement plans.

It is exciting to think about what has been done to help ministers retire with dignity and to have protection as they plan for retirement. Strong efforts have been made to make all of our churches (and ministers) aware of the opportunities and the need to act on them.

But there is still much to be done! Consider these facts:

- small contributions make the annuitant's benefits small: In North Carolina

> 185 receive less than \$50 482 receive less than \$100 1041 receive less than \$200 1338 receive less than \$300

There is a <u>great</u> challenge still before us to help ministers prepare for the future and to help churches be responsible employers. NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION, INC. ANNUAL REPORT TO BAPTIST ASSOCIATIONS OF NORTH CAROLINA JUNE 1991

The Board of Directors and the staff of the North Carolina Baptist Foundation are committed to effective leadership in generating increased perpetual financial support of Baptist causes throughout the state, nation and world. With assets approximately \$27 million (market value) at the end of the 1990 fiscal year, the income distribution to Baptist causes is significant each year.

Typically, assets are either held as endowments paying interest income in perpetuity to named Baptist causes, or they are held in trust with current income being paid to individuals and future income being paid to Baptist causes in perpetuity.

Earned income distributed to Baptist institutions and mission causes during fiscal year of 1990:

\$647,180

Earned income distributed to individuals with Baptist causes named as charitable remainderman during fiscal year of 1990:

\$686,124

The staff of the Foundation consists of seven full time employees and two persons who provide part-time service in accounting and legal services. The servicing of individual accounts requires continuous contact with trustors, donors and those designating gifts through Wills. The increased number of requests for assistance in seminars and conferences by churches, associations and individuals has made part-time assistance necessary in regions of the state some distance from the office.

There are continual improvements being made in available charitable estate planning computer software, constant changes in state and federal regulations which affect charitable estate planning and an increased need for technical training and assistance to serve the ever increasing needs of both the development staffs of our institutions and the individuals utilizing the Foundation services. The Foundation continues to provide for these needs to maximize the growth in financial support for Baptist causes.

In 1990, the Foundation moved into a new home. The 6,000 square foot office building was constructed from gifts from individuals and is located on property provided by the Baptist State Convention next to the Baptist Building in Cary. The new facility was occupied in February 1990 and provides much needed space for the work of staff as well as for conferences and meetings. Baptist groups are invited to use the meeting rooms when in the Raleigh/Cary area. We extend an invitation to church groups to call and arrange a visit to the newest building used for the Lord's service by North Carolina Baptists.

CHRISTIAN ACTION LEAGUE OF HORTH CAROLINA, INC.

This has been a most eventful year for the cause of Applied Christianity.

With North Carolina facing a T.I billion dollar shortfall and with news accounts stating that citizens from North Carolina are spending 100 million dollars annually in the Virginia lottery, it appeared almost inevitable that a lottery bill would pass the 1991 legislative session.

In addition to the economic factors, the gambling industry had 13 lobbyists working the halls of the Legislature daily promoting lottery legislation.

Even though lottery legislation passed the Senate, it was quite evident that the lottery lobbyists could not line up enough votes to get the measure through the House of Representatives. Lottery supporters did not push for a vote, for they knew that the legislation would be dead. Therefore, the proposal will be eligible to be considered in the next legislative session when it convenes in June, 1992.

Between now and then, it is of utmost importance that you secure a commitment from your representatives in the North Carolina House to oppose state-sponsored gambling. The Senate will not be voting on the lottery in 1992 because it has already passed that body.

While we were successful in side-tracking lottery legislation, the Legislature refused to enact the following proposals:

- 1. PARENTAL CONSENT... North Carolina remains one of the few states in the nation that allows a minor to receive an abortion without parental consent. Legislation to enact parental consent passed the House, but died in the Senate.
- 2. DRUNK DRIVING...The House passed legislation that would change the alcohol blood level from .1 to .08 as the breathalyzer standard for Driving-While-Impaired. The Senate refused to act on this proposal.
- 3. OPEN CONTAINERS OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES IN MOTOR VEHICLES...It is ironic that an open liquor bottle is prohibited in a motor vehicle, yet there is no limit to the number of open beer containers allowed in a motor vehicle.
- 4. TEEN-AGE PREGNANCIES...In order to address this growing problem, legislation was introduced to require sexual abstinence instruction to be a part of the curriculum of our public schools. (Such instruction has been very successful in reducing teen-age pregnancies in other areas of our country.) However, such a program was opposed by our N.C. Department of Public Instruction.
- 5. ABORTION FUND...North Carolina is the only Southeastern state that used state tax funds for medically unnecessary abortions. Some \$400,000 of state tax funds have been budgeted by the state legislature to pay for these elective abortions. Therefore, we are denying thousands of babies right here in North Carolina their constitutional right of life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.

How can we turn the tide on these important moral issues? It will occur when North Carolina Baptists and other Christians are willing to become actively and publicly involved in upholding our Judeo-Christian moral standards. It is not enough to wring our hands and just talk about the problems. We need to cry out publicly and act against sin. Baptist need to be informed about the stands taken on these issues by those who are running for public office, and then vote for those who reflect our standards.

In addition to a demanding legislative session, the Christian Action League has successfully assisted several counties and municipalities in liquor, beer, and wine referendums.

Good Government Seminars were conducted in the Asheville and Wilmington areas, at which some of the above issues were addressed. Nationally recognized authorities came to share their expertise on the issues of gamboling and family matters. These included Dr. Paul Cameron, Chairman of the Family Research Institute, Washington, D. C.; Austin McGuigan, former State's Attorney for Connecticut, and Bill Swindell, National Field Director, American Family Association, Tupelo, Mississippi.

We praise God for your prayer and financial support as we join in addressing the moral and ethical issues facing our society.

THE GIDEONS INTERNATIONAL JACKSON COUNTY CAMP

The Gideon Organization, known as The Gideons International, is composed of over 108.000 Christian professional and businessmen in 148 countries. The Auxilliary is composed of over 62,000 wome, (wives and widows of Gideons). With the help of the local churches here and throughout the 148 countries, The Gideons are placing an average of one million Scriptures every thirteen days. (1) Local Church love offerings; (2) The Faith Fund (donations by individual Gideon members; and (3) Memorial Bible Contributions. ALL monies donated to the Gideons go to purchase Scriptures; administrative costs of the organization are paid by the individual members.

The Jackson County Camp, one of 5,500 local camps, was started in 1982. The present membership numbers twenty-nine with eighteen in our Auxilliary. It has been the Camp's pleasure to share a Gideon Report in more than 35 churches in Jackson County this past year. A total of 3,300 Scriptures were distributed during the year and Jackson County Camp received \$ 15,750 from the Christians of Jackson County for the purchase of Scriptures.

North Carolina became the first State in Gideon history to receive over \$1,000,000 in Church offerings, \$1,000,154; as well as the first to receive over \$1,000,000 in Faith Fund offerings, \$1.016,518. We praise God for the faithfulness of His Children!!

The World need continues to grow rather than decrease. This past Spring, thirty Gideons from fourteen Camps in the Soviet Union participated in a week-long Scripture distribution at Moscow State University. The reception was phenomenal! Students gathered in the assembly halls one hour in advance of the scheduled starting time. Gideons were given complete liberty to share salvation testimonies, present the gospel of Christ, answer questions and distribute the Word of God. Faculty members, as well as students stayed long after the meeting formally adjourned to speak personally with Gideons regarding spiritual matters. More than 23,000 Testaments were distributed in a five-day period. The current need for Scriptures in the Soviet Union alone is 400,000 per month. There are only 20 camps in Russia. We MUST HELP!

The Gideons International gives God all the glory and praise for His abundant provision!! HALLELEUJAH!!

A Community Responds

United Christian Ministries is Jackson County's interdenominational crisis ministry, designed to provide aid and advocacy for people with urgent physical, economic, social, and spiritual needs, right here in our own community.

UCM was formed out of concern shared by local ministers that the urgent needs of our neighbors could be addressed most effectively only if the Christian community works together, pooling resources, energy, and information. Now UCM provides all sorts of life-sustaining assistance in a dignified, loving, and organized manner, while preventing duplication among churches, cutting abuse of services by recipients, and lightening the burden on pastors and church staff.

UCM is flourishing. In its 2 1/2 years of operation, thousands of clients, perhaps 1/7 of Jackson County's population, have been touched by Christian compassion—love shown in action and in practical support. They are referred to UCM by churches, public agencies, and friends. In the beginning, UCM was busy—with around 60 client contacts per month. Now that monthly number has more than quadrupled. UCM is playing a truly crucial role in our community, keeping people from falling though the cracks in Jackson County's network of assistance, and doing it in a distinctly Christian way.

How does it work? UCM's counselors welcome clients between 10a.m. and 5p.m. each weekday. (Contacts at all other hours are easily made via phone and pager.) Client needs, both obvious and hidden, are assessed through active listening. Referrals are made to many other agencies for help. Suggestions and assignments are given for the client's own action. When necessary, and when all other sources of aid have fallen short, UCM assists with food, shelter, clothing, gas, medication, transportation, utilities, rent, and other basic needs. UCM also gives furniture, linens, dishes, and Bibles to anyone who needs them. Each client is shown acceptance as a person, and is encouraged to grow, personally and spiritually. Troubled people are given hope and many find their way back to church through UCM.

UCM's structure is five-pronged. Our Advisory Council is made up of representatives from all participating churches. It was this council which generated our charter, bylaws, and the momentum to bring UCM into being. Now the Advisory Council oversees the general activity of the ministry and provides a communication link between UCM and its churches.

Our Board of Directors represents a wide variety of denominations and a wealth of professional expertise (doctor, lawyer, teacher, social worker, nutritionist, accountant, clergy, etc.), who make policy decisions, take care of publicity and fundraising, and provide direction for the ministry.

Our Executive Director is responsible for day-to-day operations, networking, and administration. She is in charge of recruitment, training, and supervision of UCM's many volunteers, and is accountable to the Board of Directors.

Our volunteers are very important to the operation of UCM. They talk with clients, assess needs, make referrals, and disburse assistance. They keep records, maintain order, and assist with administrative tasks. New volunteers are always welcome and needed.

Our church-based community of support supplies the hearts and hands of the ministry, and prayers to empower our work, as well as the financial and material resources to keep UCM running. Thirty-five churches, over 225 individuals and families, 21 businesses, and 40 local clubs and organizations have participated by contributing financially.

STEWARDSHIP REPORT

II Corinthians 9:7 says, "Every man according as he purposeth in his heart, so let him give; not grudgingly, or of necessity; for God loveth a cheerful giver."

Every stewardship message and report begins with God being the owner and giver of all we have. We are the managers or stewards. Two things are important: (1) our motives and (2) our record. No one can read motives nor should they assign motives. That is God's business. Only He can really see what is in our hearts and minds.

What about the record? Each of our churches are on record with respect to associational financial support. The following is our Associational record of giving comparing August 1988-1991.

Fourteen (14) churches increased their giving from 90 to 91. Eight (8) churches decreased their giving from 90 to 91. Twenty eight (28) were unchanged in their giving patterns to the Association. Of this number eleven to twelve churches historically do not contribute to the finances of the Association.

Over \$2000 was received for the Youth Rally. Over \$3000 was contributed to Locust Field to help with their new building. Some churches contributed to these specially designated offerings that were not included in the above tables.

At 91.67% of the budget year we are a little ahead of the amount required to meet the budget for the year. We are grateful for the generosity of the churches in making this possible. Also we have been careful not to spend more than we have received.

I am particularly grateful to Jesse Flake for the outstanding job he does as our Associational Treasurer.

At the writing of this report, churches have one month left to make their contribution to Associational work. Every church is challenged to intentionally develop their stewardship responsibility in mission giving and to include the Association in its missions gifts.







CONSTITUTION

With changes through 1988.

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of the body shall be the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II-OBJECTIVES

The purpose of the Association is to be a fellowship of churches on mission in our setting. The specific objectives of the Association are as follows:

- 1. To promote harmony, understanding and spiritual power between the churches.
- 2. To afford and promote a larger fellowship of Christians in the work of Christ.
- 3. To provide such programs, projects and organizations as will strengthen the churches and assist them in achieving their goals and objectives.
- 4. To discover needs which cannot be met effectively by churches individually and to coordinate the use of resources in meeting these needs.
- 5. To encourage support by every church for the mission causes of the Association, the North Carolina Baptist Convention, and the Southern Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE III - AUTHORITY

SECTION 1. The Association shall have the power to elect and install its officers in whatever manner the body may deem expedient.

SECTION 2. The Association shall have power to recommend measures of usefulness and guidance to our churches in matters of organization, ordinations and questions of doctrines and discipline.

SECTION 3. The Association shall have no power to infringe upon the right of local churches as sovereign and independent bodies.

ARTICLE IV-MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. The Association shall be composed of regularly constituted Baptist churches in cooperating fellowship with the Southern Baptist Convention and following the teachings of the New Testament.

SECTION 2. The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership and may receive or reject churches applying for membership therein at its pleasure. Churches applying for membership shall agree to come under the watch care of the Association for one year. It is understood that during this period of watch care the church shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the Association except those of voting.

Applications for membership shall be presented to the Credentials Committee of the Association. The applications will consist of a letter from a Constituted Church stating their desire to affiliate with the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association. The Credentials Committee as a part of the review process may invite the requesting church to a conference to discuss its history, its mission strategy, and any other information that may be pertinent to the application. The Credentials Committee may then approve the application and recommend them to the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee may by a simple majority vote accept the requesting church to come under the watch care of the Association for one year. It is suggested that any church under watch care participate in the missions program of the Association. At the end of the year the church may be voted in as a member of the Association with full privileges by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present and voting at the Annual Meeting of the

Association, provided that the church submits an acceptable letter and at least one messenger be present at the meeting.

SECTION 3. Any church may withdraw from the Association at its pleasure and should notify the Association of this action in writing. Such action will be recognized by the

Association at the next annual meeting.

SECTION 4. It shall be the duty of each church to furnish the Associational clerk, before each annual session, an annual letter, the forms provided by the Associational clerk giving the information requested as is applicable to each church situation. SECTION 5. The Association may withdraw from any church which has become unscriptural in its doctrine or practices by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present and voting at the annual meeting. Such vote is to be taken by written ballot.

ARTICLE V-OFFICERS

SECTION 1. General Officers of the Association shall be: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, Historian, Parliamentarian, and assistant Parliamentarian. Program Leaders shall be Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Music Director, Chairman of Evangelism Committee, Seminary Extension Director, Chairman of Mission Committee, Director of Missions, Trustees, Pastor Conference President, Youth Director, Stewardship Director, Vacation Bible School Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Deacons Chairmen, Senior Adult Director, Singles Ministry Director, and such other officers as the Association may desire to elect.

Associational representatives will be elected for the following institutions and agencies: ((1) Truett Camp, (Baptist Children's Homes, (3) Baptist Hospital, (4) North Carolina Baptist Homes, Inc. (Homes for the Aging), (5) Biblical Recorder, (6) Christian Education, (7) Annuity Board and other representatives as may be deemed appropriate and elected in the Association.

SECTION 2. With the exception of the director of Associational missions and Trustees, the terms of office for all officers of the Association shall be for one year with the privilege of continuing re-election. The Moderator and Vice Moderator shall not be eligible for re-election but one year in succession. (1) The number of Trustees shall be three. (2) The term of service should be for three years, with the term of only one expiring each year. In the first election of Trustees the term of service for one should be three years, another two years, and the other one year. (3) Upon the expiration of term of service the Trustee may or may not be re-elected for another term of three years.

Each term of office shall begin with the close of the annual session. The Associational Financial year will begin at the close of the Annual Meeting.

Concerning termination of employment, the resignation shall be in writing and presented to the Executive Committee at least 30 days before it is to take place. The executive Committee may terminate employment by giving 30 days notice in advance.

The Executive Committee shall give full supervision and guidance to the work of the

Director of Missions in planning, promoting and financing his work.

ARTICLE VII-DUTIES OF OFFICERS

SECTION 1. The Moderator shall preside and maintain the order of all meetings of the Association and Executive Committee. He shall serve as ex officio member of all committees of the Association.

He shall appoint the Committee on Committees and all other committees pertinent to the operation of the body not named by the Committee on Committees in its regular report.

SECTION 2. The Vice Moderator shall assist the Moderator and preside in the absence of, or at the pleasure of the Moderator.

SECTION 3. The Clerk shall keep a complete and accurate record of all transactions;

shall prepare a "Book of Reports" to be distributed to messengers at the beginning of each day's session of the annual meeting; and shall cause to be printed minutes concerning the records made.

The Clerk shall distribute to the clerk of each church in the Association, blanks for the preparation of the church letter as soon as they are received from the State Convention. This form is to be returned to the Clerk of the Association not later than two weeks prior to the meeting of the body.

An Assistant Clerk shall work with the clerk in preparing the "Book of Reports."

SECTION 4. The Treasurer shall receive and dispense by order of the Executive Committee of the Association while in session, the money of the treasury and make a complete report at the Annual Meeting and a current report at each Executive Committee meeting.

An Assistant Treasurer shall be elected to assist the Treasurer by request and to serve in the event the Treasurer resigns or is ill or unable to function.

SECTION 5. The Historian shall keep the records of the Association up-to-date. SECTION 6. The Parliamentarian shall upon the request of the presiding Officer of the body, advise and assist the Association with respect to all matters involving Parliamentary Procedure.

An Assistant Parliamentarian shall be elected. The Parliamentarian and Assistant should always communicate with each other to ensure that this office is filled at each Associational Annual or Executive Committee meeting.

SECTION 7. The Program Leaders and the Institutional Agency Representatives shall perform all duties customary to their titles and shall make a written report to the annual session of the Association.

SECTION 8. The Director of Missions shall work closely with the Associational committees, officers and Churches in such a way as to facilitate the meeting of the objectives of the Association as set forth in Article II.

The Director shall serve as ex-officio member of all committees of the Association. The Director shall communicate with the State and Southern Convention such information as shall be mutually helpful and needful.

The duties of the Director of Missions shall be set forth in Article XIV.

SECTION 9. Trustees have no authority except by direction of the Association, and are not personally bound by signatures but, are to be the legal signees for the Association. Trustees represent the Association in legal matters. Trustees act on behalf of the Association in acquisition

and disposal of Associational property.

They sign all deeds of conveyance, execute all notes, bonds or mortgages, intervene in all suits, by authority of the Association.

All persons dealing with the trustees, as Associational officers, may rely upon any written resolution duly adopted by the Association or Executive Committee, directing and authorizing the Trustees to act in its behalf and certified by the Association Moderator and Clerk.

ARTICLE VIII-RULES OF ORDER

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to Robert's Parliamentary Practice or in a manner not contrary thereto.

ARTICLE IX-QUORUM

The annual Associational quorum $\,$ shall not be less than 25 percent of the member Churches represented.

ARTICLE X-THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

SECTION 1. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the General Officers and Program Leaders elected by the Association and the Pastor and one member from each Church in the Association. No Pastor, by virtue of his being an Associational Officer or Program Leader shall be disqualified as a member of the Executive Committee, from representing the Church or Churches he may be serving in the Association. Twelve of these members shall constitute a quorum.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to act for the Association on matters arising when the Association is not in session and to make a report of all work to the next session of the Association. this body shall meet at a time and place designated by the Moderator on Monday following the first Sunday of each quarter except for the July quarter which shall meet on the second Monday of the month of July. Special meetings of the Executive Committee may be called by the Moderator with a one week notice to the Churches.

SECTION 3. All Vacancies occurring on committees or among elected officers shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

SECTION 4. In the event that a vacancy occurs with the Trustees, the Executive Committee should fill such vacancy for the remainder of the term.

ARTICLE XI-ASSOCIATIONAL STANDING COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. The Association shall have such standing committees as may be deemed necessary to promote efficiently the work of the Master in our midst. The terms of office for all committee members shall be for one year except where specifically stated otherwise.

SECTION 2. COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES. It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate at the general meeting all standing committees as set forth under Article XI.

SECTION 3. The NOMINATING COMMITTEE shall be composed of seven members. To this group the Directors of Sunday School, Discipleship Training, Woman' Missionary Union, Brotherhood and music Ministry will be added.

It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate the Officers, Program Leaders and Institutional agency Representatives. These nominees shall be notified in writing not less than one month prior to presenting of their names at Annual Session.

SECTION 4. THE ORDER OF BUSINESS COMMITTEE, composed of three members, shall plan the annual program of the Association and present it to the Executive Committee at its July meeting.

SECTION 5. THE CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE shall be composed of ? pastors and two laymen. It shall examine applications of Churches seeking admission into the Association in keeping with Article IV, and make recommendations to the Association. It shall counsel with Churches that are out of harmony of fellowship with the Association.

SECTION 6. THE PLACE AND PREACHER COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members. The duties of this committee shall be to recommend the place or places for the following Annual meeting and to recommend the preacher and alternate to deliver the annual sermon for the following year.

SECTION 7. THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members appointed by the Moderator at the October Executive Committee meeting. It shall be the duty of this committee to present suitable resolutions at the Annual Associational Meeting.

SECTION 8. THE MEMORIAL COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members. It shall be the duty of this committee to bring a report to the annual meeting of those listed by the member Churches as deceased since the last Annual Meeting and shall lead a Memorial Service in their memory.

SECTION 9. THE FINANCE COMMITTEE shall be composed of six members including the Treasurer of the Association. This committee shall: (a) present a Budget to the

Association for the following year; (b) devise plans for raising the funds for the Associational Budget; (c) audit the Finances and Financial records of the Association annually and anytime there is a change of Treasurer or at the direction of the Association or the Executive Committee; (d) report all audits to the Annual Association Meeting.

SECTION 10. THE CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members and shall perform all duties specified in Article XV.

SECTION 11. THE ORDINATION COMMITTEE shall be composed of five designated Pastors and all other Pastors who desire to sit with the committee.

- a. The committee serves on an advisory capacity only and serves at the request of the Church from which the member is seeking Ordination.
- b. The committee should examine such candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry and make such recommendations to the Church as they feel led.
- c. The committee should assist in arranging the proper service of Ordination when such assistance is requested.
 - d. The Executive Committee should be informed regularly of the work of the committee.
- e. Each Church desiring to Ordain a candidate is urged to consult with the committee,—and shall give two weeks notice in which the committee is to do its work.

SECTION 12. THE EVANGELISM COMMITTEE. The duties of the committee shall be to direct and propose a perpetual program and spirit of evangelism in the Association. It shall arrange and direct all Associational wide evangelistic activities.

SECTION 13. THE ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL shall be composed of eight(8) members, nominated by the Associational Committee on Committees; and elected by the Association at the annual meeting. The committee shall be: Missions Development Director, Promotion Director, Survey Director, Associational WMU Mission Action Director, and Associational Brotherhood Director, Sunday School Outreach Director, Church Training Director, and Associational Deacons President. The Missions Development Director, Promotion Director, and Survey Director shall be elected for a three—year term, with one member named each year. The other five positions shall be filled by the person who is elected to fill those five Associational Offices.

The duties of the AMDC are to lead the Associational Missions Development in the five mission performance tasks: (1) call churches to be on missions; (2) train, develop, and encourage church and associational workers; (3) provide resources and services to churches and leaders; (4) provide opportunities for working together in missions, ministry and growth; (5) establish and maintain appropriate communications and relationships with the community and the denomination.

SECTION 14. THE BUILDING AND GROUNDS COMMITTEE shall be commrised of three members. The committee shall be responsible for and in charge of the upkeep and repairs of the associational building, grounds, and equipment.

ARTICLE XII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL

THE ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL shall be composed of the Director of Missions, the Vic-Moderator, the program leaders: Sunday School, Church Training, Woman's Missionar Union, The Brotherhood Director, the Chairman of Deacons, the Chairman of the Mission Committee, the Chairman of Evangelism, the Chairman of the Finance Committee, the Vacation Bible School Director, the Youth Director, the Director of the Singles, the Director of the Senior Adults and the Music Director. The Director of Missions is t serve as Chairman and a secretary shall be elected from the group.

The purpose of the council is to coordinate the planning of the various programs of the association, to develop an associational calendar, and to give mutual support to the various organization and program units in carrying out their assignments.

The council shall meet quarterly.

ARTICLE XIII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL PASTORS' CONFERENCE

The Associational Pastors' Conference provides regular meetings for the Baptist ministers of the association. The purpose of the conference is for fellowship and mutual support, for doctrinal and professional discussion and for promotion of church, associational and other denominational programs. The conference is not an administrative or executive body.

ARTICLE XIV - DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS JOB DESCRIPTION

SECTION 1. FUNCTION OF THE DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS. He is too be the chief administrative officer of the association. He is to confirm extra employment in a manner agreed upon with the Executive Committee.

SECTION 2. RELATIONSHIP OF THE DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS.

- 1. He is employed by the Executive Committee of the association.
- 2. General supervision of the personnel and program of the association as they function through the association office.
- 3. Work primarily with (pastors), associational general officers, committees, and organizations.
 - 4. Work closely with auxiliary organizations (such as WMU, Baptist Men, etc.).
- 5. Lead in maintaining relationships with state and SBC agencies and promoting their programs.

SECTION 3. In the churches, extending the local ministries.

To visit churches by invitation of the pastor or other church leaders, in the pastorless churches to provide assistance in the church program and ministry, such as (1) Pulpit supply; (2) Study courses; (3) Missionary address; (4) Deacons' meetings; (5) Assembly programs; (6) Special day addresses; (7) Ordination services; (8) VBS planning and promotion; (9) To interpret phases of associational work; (10) Budget planning; (11) Building planning; (12) Revival meetings; (13) Stewardship emphasis; (14) Study objectives and long range planning; (15) Studying and evaluating procedures, curriculum, constitution and bylaws, etc; (16) Church-community surveys, etc; (17) Promoting a world missions concept; and (18) Publishing of a regular news medium (such as a monthly newsletter); (19) Cooperate with the news media to promote Baptist work.

In the associational office:

- a. Personal correspondence, promotional mail, and telephoning pertinent to his work.
- b. Office conferences, answer to inquiries, etc.
- c. Assist associational officers, committees and heads of organizations to get out promotional mail pertinent to their work.

SECTION 4. Schedule of Benefits

- 1. His salary shall be
- 2. His fringe benefits shall include
- 3. His schedule shall include
 - a. One day a week, chosen at his discretion, shall be reserved for rest that excluded normal associational activities.
 - b. A maximum of four weeks each year outside of the association for special work with local churches or with state and SBC agencies.
 - c. An annual sick leave of 26 days maximum, with a maximum of 42 days to be accumulated. Sick leave may be advanced by the association for one year without Executive Committee action. Sick leave is to be recorded with the financial secretary of the association.
 - d. Two weeks annual vacation with pay.
 - e. Holidays: New Year's Day; Easter Monday; July 4; Labor Day; Thanksgiving, Thursday and Friday; Christmas December 25 and 26.

- 4. All honorarium from churches inside or outside the association and all honorarium from other religious work shall be his personal fair, and shall not be submitted to the association.
- 5. The Director of Missions is afforded the opportunity of an annual evaluation by the Moderator and Missions Committee.

ARTICLE XV - AMENDMENTS

The constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the association by a two-thirds majority of the messengers present and voting, provided the amendment has been presented to the Constitutional Committee at least 10 days prior to the annual meeting and presented to the association in printed form on the first day of the annual meeting to be voted on the second day.
