## REPORTS.

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#### STATE AND ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS.

Your Committee report progress. The work grows in interest and importance. We have more than one hundred men in the field, which extends from the Mountains to the Seashore, and encouraging report come up from their fields of labor. But, with all that has been done, a great harvest remains to be reaped. We need to strengthen our stakes where we have planted, and to plant the vast territory yet unoccupied. To delay now is disastrous. Your Committee recommend: 1st, More laborers; 2nd, Increased contribution; 3rd, That we pray to that end.

#### COMMITTEE.

#### EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

A year ago the Association adopted the recommendation that the churches begin the collection for State Missions, immediately after the last Session, and send the same to the Treasurer of the Excutive Committee to meet the necessities of missions and destitute fields with little other means of support. The churches, few exceptions, failed to observe this recommendation, and this failure has rendered your Committeee unable to pay the Missionaries as they did the work, or as they needed the money. We would repeat and emphasize the recommendation, and earnestly ask the Pastors and delegates to enter upon this branch of our work, and forward the collections immediately to F. A. Fennell, Harrell's Store, N. C. (Treasurer of the Executive Committee.) There has been, is, and always will be, many difficulties in the prosecution of this work, but amid the general stringency of the times and many other drawbacks, we are glad to be able to report progress. At all of our mission points, the interest seems to be growing; services are well attended and gratifying results accompany the faithful preaching of the Word.

Additions by baptism are reported as follows: Jacksonville 9, Salem 21, Sharon 2.

Rev. R. E. Peele was employed on the Ouslaw field, and had appointments at Richlands, Tar Landing, Catherine Lake, Jacksonville and and Burgaw, and we agreed to pay him \$460.

Rev. S. D. Swaim was at Salem, and we agreed to pay him \$100, and Rev. W. L. Bilbro, at Hallsville and Sharon, and we agreed to pay him \$50, and Rev. J. T. Jenkins, at Brooklyn under the care and to be paid by the First Baptist Church, Wilmington.

Houses of worship have been completed at Catharine Lake and Salem. At Jacksonville a new and comfortable house is nearing completion, and a large part af the cash of same has been raised by Bro. Peele. At Burgaw they have begun to build, and at Brooklyn a house is much needed and they hope to begin soon. These indications of Providence and the willingness of the brethren to work are encouraging, and should stimulate our sympathies and active co-operation.

The one great need of the work is that this cause be pressed home upon the hearts and consciences of the individual members of our churches, and we recommend that for the next year we endeavor to raise for State Missions an average of not less than 10 cents per member in all our churches.

#### MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

We can never cease to thank God for the noble men, who. without the advantages of liberal training, have fought a good fight aud gained great reward; but the axe of the pioneer yields to the implements of the farm ready for tillage Education in the people, calls for education in their teachers, and he has simply recognized the great responsibility of his calling, who best equips himself. God has made us co-laborers with himself in all departments of His earhly kingdom, and among our duties is this, to furnish the preachers whom he has found, a duty that comes to us as a sweet privilege. How may we perform it? Wake Forest and the Seminary answer for us: "Send your young men here and we will prepare them for their work."

The men are anxious to get at their work, the College and the Seminary are anxious to help them to and in their work, and it only remains for the people of God to be anxious for them too. Young men called of God to preach His Gospel and teach His saints, are in no sense subjects of charity, when they cast themselves upon the churches, and ask the human weapons of their warfare.

They lay themselves upon our hearts, and He will hold us responsible for our treatment of them. Let every church and every member invest largely in these men of God.

COMMITTEE.

#### GENERAL EDUCATION.

Surely the seal of God's approval is not more manifest in any work in which the Baptist people have engaged than in the education of our sons and daughters. Beginning at the public school, and extending through the academies and colleges, this work has steadily grown until now we have the largest number of Christian men and women teaching, and the largest number of pupils in attendance at any time in our history.

Your Committee urge greater sympathy between the patrons and teachers in training the young mind and heart, and that a larger patronage be given the academies within your bounds---Warsaw High School, and not only within the bounds of this Association, but all over the State we would encourage the establishment and more hearty patronage of these preparatory schools. For the higher education of our young men we commend Wake Forest College worthy in every way of your confidence and support.

For the higher education of our girls, we commend Chowan, Baptist Female Institute and Oxford Female Seminary, as second to no institutton in the State for that class of work. From the report of United States Commissioner of Education, for 1889-'90, we learn that the first efforts for higher education in this country were made by Ghristian people, and that at the date of that report seventy-six per cent. of the leading institutions for higher education in the United States were under the control of the religious denominations, and have their fostering care. It is with ple sure we announce that very epthusiastic efforts are being put forth for the establishment of the Baptist Female University, and the Executive Committee confidently expect this school to be opened for work September, 1894.

Your Committee most heartily recommend that our people shall exert their influence and patronize our denominational institutions. COMMITTEE.

#### MINISTERS' RELIEF.

The Baptists being unwilling to allow the aged servants of God to go unprovided have organized a board, which is located at Durham, N. C., to receive and disburse funds for the relief of disabled Baptist ministers in our State.

This Board has several beneficiarles whom they are looking after, and as these must be supported by individual and church contributions, we recommend that both do all they can for this object.

2. That pledges be taken from members and churches.

3. We would further recommend that pastors and deacons keep constantly this object before the churches; that funds be raised and and forwarded to the Board for distribution

We fear that our good brethren have not been truly awakened to a keen sense of their duty in this respect. And would earnestly impress the importance of getting the Biblical Recorder, N. C. Baptist, Foreign Mission Journal, Charity and Children and other religious periodicals into every family upon the minds of our pastors and deacons. As the literature to be used in our Sunday-school, we suggest that they select Kind Word Series or the American Baptist Publishing Society.

#### HOME MISSIONS.

Your Committee on Home Missions submit the following report: This important work is under the direction of the Home Mission

Great things have been accomplished in this department of the Lord's work, whereof we are glad; and greater things are to be accomplished, for which we hope. The field covered by this work is extensive, embracing all the Southern and many of the Western States, in which there are still many parts destitute It includes the work among the Indians, to which poor, abused race we owe a pecu-1 ar debt. They are attempting to d) so nething for the colore 1 people who live among us. It also includes the work on the neighboring isle of Cuba. The work on these fields has been so much blessed as to call for profound gratitude to God, who gave the blessing. The work in Cuba has been simply marvelous, begun so lately, the churches there already have a membership of 2 261.

The Missionaries this Board supported and helped to support last year were 368. The number added to the churches under their care last year was 9,604 Total receipts for this work last year were \$106. 898; of this North Carolina gave \$4,689; and of this amount, this Association gave, according to the Minutes, \$71.22. What is this for 6.202 Baptists to do? Little better than nothing.

As a means of disseminating information, the Home Board is publishing, for 25 cents a year, subscription price, a sprightly paper called "The flome Field." Pastors would do well to get this circulated in their churches. The South cannot remain what it is, the wave of emigration is going to roll over the Southern States too, and it must be met with the Gospel, and the Gospel as we preached it. To meet the demand, we must not only sustain the work now going on, but we must enlarge it; this calls for a more liberal support from the Baptists generally, and us in particular.

We recommend that the pastors bring the Word to bear on their churches, giving them the needful information, and take up collections at regular intervals for Home Missions.

# CONSTITUTION.

Article 1. This Association shall be denominated and known Art. 2. The object of this Association shall be the promotion of as the Eastern Association. Christ's Kingdom among men; and the means of accomplishing this

shall be in strict conformity to the New Testament. Art. 3. This Association shall be composed of all ordianed min-

isters who are members or pastors of churches of this body, and three del gates from each church chosen from her membership assembled in

Art. 4. The delegates from each church shall bear a letter cer-

tifying their appointment, communicating information relative to the state of the church; Provided however, that when any church has prepared a kter, and through inadvertance the letter fails to be pre-

sented, her aelegates may be received without its presentatation. Ait. 5. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be chosen annually from among its

members, by ballot, by a majority of the members voting, and con-

tinue in office until their successors are elected. Art. 6. It shall be the business of the Moderator to enforce an

observance of the Constitution, preserve order, appoint committees decide all questions of order, give his opinion on any question unde discussion after others have spoken, and give the casting vote in east

Art. 7. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to record the proceed ings of each annual session, and superintend their printing and dis

Art. 8. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all fund tribution among the churches.

sent up by the churches, or collected during the session of this body. and disburse the same, as ordered by the Association. He shall also make to the Association an annual report of the condition of the reasury.

Art. 9. The Association shall appoint an executive committee of nine members, three from each of the Union meetings, who shall cooperate with the State Board, so far as practicable in the mission work within our bounds, and during the interval, be ween the sessions of this body, take such steps as they may deem advisable for the advancement of the same, making annual reports of their work to the association, which report, together with that on State Missions, shall be the first business of the second day of the session. Further, that our missionaries shall report their work quarterly to the Executive Committee, in order that said Committee shall be prepared to make full report of their work to this body.

Art. 10. The Association shall not maintain fellowship with any of the churches which neglect to preserve Gospel Order.

Art. 11. The Association may invite visiting and corresponding brethren to seats, and extend to them the privileges of the body, except that of voting.

Art. 12. The annual session of this Association shall commence on Thursday atter the first Lord's day in October, at such place as may by chosen.

Art. 13. By appontment of the Association there shall be an Introductory sermon of a denominational character, and a Missionary Sermon.

Art. 14. This Constitution may be amended at any annual session by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

#### CHURCH COVENANT.

Having been lead as we believe, by the Spirit of God, to receive the Lord Jesus Christ as our Saviour, and on the profession of our faith having been baptizied in the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holv Ghost, we do now, in the presence of God, angels, and this assembly, most solemnly and joyfully enter into covenant with one another, as one body in Christ.

We engage, therefore, by the ail of the Holy Ghost, to walk together in Christian love, to strive for the advancement of this church in knowledge, holiness and comfort; to promote its prosperify and spiritu lity; to sustain its worship, ordinances, discipline and doctrines; to contribute cheerfully and regularly to the support of the ministry; the expenses of the church; the relief of the poor; and the spread of the Gospel through all nations.

We also engage to maintain family and secret devotion; to religiously educate our children; to seek the salvation of our kindred and acqu intances; to work circucumspectly in the world; to be just in our dealings; faithful in our engagements, and exemplary in our deportment; to avoid all tattling, backbiting and excessive anger; to abstain from the use of intoxicating drinks as a beverage; and to be zealous in our offorts to advance the King lom of our Saviour.

We further engage to watch over one another in brotherly love: to remember each other in prayer; to aid each other in sickness and distress; t) cul ivate Christian sympathy in feeling, and courtesy in speech; to be slow to take offences, but always ready for reconciliation, mindful of these rules of our Saviour, to secure it without delay.

We moreover engage, that when we remove from this place, we will, as soon as possible, unite with some other church, where we can carry out the spirit of this covenent, and principles of God's word.

#### RULES OF OKDER.

1. On the meeting of the Association, the Mcderator of the preceding session shall preside until his successor is known. In case of absence a chairman pro tem. shall be elected.

2. Each session of the Association shall be opened with religious exercises, to be opened by whomsoever the presiding officer may name.

3. At each daily session, and previous to proceeding to business, the names of the delegates shall be called, and the proceedings of the previous daily session read.

4. The members shall observe toward the officers and each other that courtesy which becomes Christians.

5. Any member wishing to speak shall rise and address the presiding officer. He shall confine himself strictly to the question under consideration, and avoid personalities.

6. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without permission.

7. All motions seconded shall be definitely stated by the presiding officer before discussion.

8. No motion shall be withdrawn after discussion.

9. When a question is under discussion, no motion or proposition shall be received, except to adjourn, to amend, to commit, to postpone to a definite time, which several motions shall have preference in the order in which they are stated.

10. After a motion has been decided, any member having voted in the majority may move a reconsideration.

11. No member shall absent himself during the session of the Association without permission of the presiding officer, and no one shall take final leave of absence without the permission of the Association and if any shall do so, their absence shall be noted in the Minutes.

12. All questions, except such as relate to the Constitution, shall be decided by a majority of votes.

13. The Association shall have the right to decide what subjects shall be admitted to consideration.

14. The Rules of Order may be altered or amended at any session of the Association by a majority vote.

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
