SATURDAY, August 15th, 1891.

DEAR BRETHREN, SISTERS AND FRIENDS IN WHOSE HANDS THESE LINES MAY FALL:-I feel insufficient of myself to write under the above heading a letter subject to the judgment of the church of Christ and its friends, and the criticisms of its foes; but hope the Lord, the head of the church, may dictate and direct to his name's glory, and to the comfort of his people. We need his Spirit to guide us all the way through this life, for we acknowledge that we are carnally minded. The subject that appears to my mind with some degree of weight is the language of Paul to the church at Corinth, first Epistle, first chapter, and first three words of 13th verse, "Is Christ divided?" The same apostle tells us in Hebrews, 13:8th. "Jesus Christ the same yesterday and to-day and forever;" and Jesus said, "I and my Father are one:" John 10:30 and 17:11. Paul to the church at Ephesus, 4:4-5. One Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all, and through all and in you all. The above with all other Scriptures connected in the same subject prove to our minds that Jesus is the same and without a shadow of a turn from one eternal way of righteousness, the source from which comes all good and perfect gifts to the children of men according to his foreknowledge and unchangeable purpose. Though man sinned and became an enemy to God by wick-ed works, Jesus was not changed nor divided. The first Adam is changeable, and often divides upon the subject of religion, as the first two sons did. Therein we see the work of man's hands and faith in Christ brought to view, the first working for justification, the other looking unto Jesus the justifier from dead works. When all sacrifices for sin failed under the Law to save God's people without Christ, he came a holy sacrifice as prepared by the Father to show his eternal and undivided love that he had for his people in that holy obedience to the Law, which he fulfilled to a jot and tittle, and all the church of Christ which is his body is justified in the sight of the Father by the obedienc of his son and clothed with his righteousness, not having spot or wrinkle or any such thing in a spiritual sense; and it is in him, and by him we live and have our being. We find no division in him, yet as far back as the date 59 so soon after Christ ascended from earth to heaven we read of division in the Church, some for one and some another. Paul said to the Galatians, who hath bewitched you that you should not obey the truth? While there are some for one minister, and some for another, some for one practice, and some for another, are we not bewitched, that is deceived? We do not know any worse state of deception than to be deceived in ourselves. While we are in this condition the only remedy is to forgive as the Savior does, who is not divided, but remains the same in love, purpose and power, and end us of the danger of the house being divided. In this he shows his love to his people by being faithful to them, and as he forgave his servants so he requires his servants to forgive their fellow servants. Now all that profess his name should also walk as he walked, as much as in them is, looking diligently lest any root of bitterness spring up and thereby many be defiled. Before the Church's eye the above light has been made manifest, Christ not being divided, what excuse can his professed body render for dividing on anything, when he is not the author of confusion, but of peace as in all the churches of the saints. Then we conclude that all the peace of the church comes from him who is not divided, and all divisions must come of Old Man and his deeds. Oh that the Church could put him off as the apostle commands, so that she would show no division. If she feels the need of a blessing ask him who giveth freely and upbraideth not. If a pastor is needed consult together in love and come together if possible before the call is made that the house may not show any division. Let all yield their condition for love and for Christ's sake who is not divided. So in practices in the church, let each member commit his brother to their Lord who will judge him righteously. Let the spirit of an undivided Savior be made manifest, meekness, temperance, patience, godliness, brotherly kindness, charity, for if these things be in you and abound they make you that ye shall neither be barren nor unfruitful in the knowledge of an undivided Savior. May the Lord sanctify his people to his name's glory. Amen. JAMES A. BURCH.
