PRESIDENT BINKLEY, OTHER SOUTHEASTERN FACULTY INSTRUMENTAL IN COMMITTEE

APPROVAL OF INCREASE IN SEMINARY OPERATING BUDGETS...

ACTION IS SUBJECT TO APPROVAL BY THE SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION

ACCORDING TO A press release from the Baptist Press in Nashville, Tenn., The Southern Baptist Convention Executive Committee voted here to recommend a \$30.2 million budget goal for 1971, with major increases going to six Southern Baptist Theological seminaries.

THE RECOMMENDED BUDGET, which must be approved by the Southern Baptist Convention in Denver, June 1-4, would include \$29.1 million in Cooperative Program (unified budget) operating funds, and \$1.1 million in capital needs.

THE OPERATING BUDGET WOULD be an increase of \$1,988,764 (or 7.3 percent) over the 1970 operating budget of \$27.1 million.

BIGGEST AMOUNT OF the almost \$2 million increase would go to the six SBC seminaries. Their recommended 1971 allocation would be \$5,988,500, an increase of \$783,440.

PRESIDENT OLIN T. BINKLEY of South-eastern Seminary was Chairman of the Inter-Seminary Council which made the request for an increase in allotment to the Seminaries. This Council is composed of the Presidents, Deans, Registrars, Public Relations men, and Business Managers of the six Southern Baptist seminaries.

EARLIER, THE PRESIDENTS of the six seminaries with Olin T. Binkley of South-

eastern Seminary as their spokesman, told the Executive Committee that Baptists have failed to keep pace with advancing costs of the theological education. He said \$5.9 million was the minimum workable amount for distribution to the six seminaries on a formula recommended by consultants.

THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE approved all but \$500 of the amount requested by the seminaries.


PASTOR'S SEMINAR HERE ON MARCH 3-6

DR. LUMPKIN IS SPEAKER FOR CARVER-BARNES LECTURES

The speaker for the Carver-Barnes Memorial Lectures, March 3-6, will be Dr. William Latane Lumpkin. Presently Dr. Lumpkin is serving as Minister of the Freemason Street Baptist Chruch in Norfolk, Virginia.

Since assuming his current pastorate, Dr. Lumpkin has been President of the Birginia Baptist Pastors Conference (1964-65), President of the Virginia Baptist Ministers' Association(1967), Clerk of the Virginia Baptist General Board (1968), and President of the Norfolk Clergy Association (1968).

Dr. Lumpkin has held pastorates in Richmond and Lexington prior to his present position.

He is a graduate (B.A.) of the University of Richmond (1937) and Southern Baptist Seminary (Th. M. in 1940). He received the Ph. D. from the University of Edinburgh in 1948.

In 1948-49, Dr. Lumpkin served as Director of Religious Activities and Associate Professor of Religion at Richmond. He was Associate Professor of Chruch History at Southern from 1954 to 1959.

He has had six books published by the Judson, Convention, Broadman, Phaup, and Abingdon Presses.
