We think the time has arrived when this Association should have at least one young man educated at her expense. We have a young man whom we think is called to preach the Gospel, and he has not the means of an education. He is a grandson of that great and good man, Elder S. D. Swim, who wore out his life in the ministry. We recommend Bro. Green's school at Moravian Falls, which is doing great good here in the mountains. The Committee on Missions offered their report:

The success of the modern Missionary enterprise is not surpassed by the success even of the labors of the Apostles. In the last hundred years the Lord has accomplished wonders for the glory of his name. If we look at the success that has attended the labors of the churches at home we are filled with wonder and made to say, "What hath God wrought!" A few years ago the Baptists of America were but few; now we number at least two million. In North Carolina our members have been multiplied many fold. There are now in our State near two hundred thousand Baptists. This has been accomplished by the blessing of God upon the labors of the devoted Missionaries sent out by our Baptist brethren. In North Carolina churches have been organized in towns, and in country, all over the State. But still there are many towns without Baptist preaching, and many whole counties with not more than a single Baptist church. The State Mission Board has this year thirty-six Missionaries in the field, laboring from the seaboard to the mountains. The Lord is blessing their labors abundance. dantly. These deserve our sympathy, prayers and contributions.

Query second, from Mt. Pisgah:

What is the proper rule for constituting a church according to the Gospel? Is it on an arm, or on true baptized believers?

Answer-On true baptized believers.

The Clerk was instructed to have 600 copies of the minutes printed, and be allowed \$8.00 for his services.

The Committee on Resolutions reported:
