RESOURCE

ANNOTATED BIBLIOGRAPHY: BOOKS OF SPECIAL INTEREST "PARENTING, PEACE, JUSTICE". By Nancy Feebles, United Church of Christ Southern Region Program Associates for Parent-Child Relationships; Senior, M.Div. SEBTS.

- + Delores R. Leckey, The Ordinary Way (Crossroad Publishing Co., 1982) \$7.95. The subtitle of the book--A Family Spirituality--indicates something of what this book is intended to be. It is a loving encouragement for families to deal with the ordinary steps of intimacy, equality, authority, prayer, solitude, play, study, stability and hospitality that can help lead to family spirituality. It is powerful when read by one person, but even better when shared by those in a family.
- + Jacqueline Haessly, Peacemaking: Family Activities for Justice and Peace (Paulist Press, 1980) \$2.45. This small book is packed with ideas of ways to help your family recognize the global village of which we in the family of God are a part. Some of the exercises and ideas deal specifically with safety and security of the nuclear family, others with learning to live as a witness in the wider world. A good beginning point for those who are interested in mission and ministry of the family.
- + Try This: Family Adventures Toward Shalom (Discipleship Resources, 1979). In the same vein as the book mentioned above, this book is full of exercises for families to do together to learn more about each other and the world in which they live. Many of the exercises are easily adapted to groups in church settings of all kinds. The exercises don't only produce awareness, they give specific suggestions for practical ministry of the family.
- + James McGinnis and Kathleen McGinnis, Parenting for Peace and Justice (Orbis, 1982) \$4.95. Worth buying for the bibliography alone! This couple shares some of the joys and frustrations of trying to parent in today's world following the mandates of the Gospel. You may not agree with all they are advocating, but it is certainly a thought-provoking way of looking at family life within the context of mission.
- + Kristin Anton and Barbara Kortrey, Lord, We Need... (Lutheran Church in America Division for Parish Services, 1981). If you are looking for a "packaged" program for your church to use with families in an intergenerational setting dealing with world hunger, this is excellent. It can be used several ways, and they are spelled out for you. The only work you have to do is use the materials.
- + Knight, Graham, Miksza, Juliano, and Tonnies, Teaching Children to Love Themselves (Prentice-Hall, 1982). \$5.95. The subtitle, "A Handbook for Parents and Teachers of Young Children", tells precisely what this book is it. If used in tandem with some understanding of Bible study with young children, this book can be very helpful. Some of the exercises are fun for older children (and even adults).
