THREE FORK CHURCH,
ALEXANDER COUNTY, N. C, August 21st, 1884.

TEMPERANCE.

Temperance is of heavenly birth, connected with and stands pre-eminent with all the other Christian graces. And notwithstanding

she had a rough road and all the way up hill she has steadily advanced.

Thirty-four or five years ago a Baptist in this vicinity durst not be a "Son of Temperance," "Free Mason," "Odd Fellow," or "Knight of Honor." Now all these are looked upon as hand-maidens in the great reformation, in wresting heart-broken widows and beggard orphans of the drunkard from poverty and distress, making the widow's heart rejoice, and preparing the orphan for usefulness in society. And we are glad to say that nearly all the religious denominations in this land are working as one man to drive the destroyer out of our land, and though much has been done, there is yet more to do. Our legislators should be instructed to fight the monster in his strong-hold where he gets his license to destroy our race. The watchman on the walls should "cry aloud and spare not," and tell the people that "no drunkard has any inheritance in the kingdom of our God." The lay members of the churches should say that no drunkard nor drunkard-maker shall have a name or a place in the church of the living God. And the rising generation should be taught what Gen. Horry said more than a century ago:

"Brandy! brandy! bane of life,
Spring of tumult, source of strife,
Could I but half thy curses tell,
The wise would wish thee safe in hell."

Teach them that "wine is a mocker," that "strong drink is raging," and that "whosoever is deceived thereby is not wise." Let us as servants of God use our utmost endeavor until the destroyer is put out of the reach of the youth of our land. God speed the day!

EDUCATION.

As facilities for intermingling in society and communicating thought increase, the necessities for educating our people only becomes more apparent in every department of life. All good citizens should feel a deep interest in general education. Every Baptist in all the land should take a deep interest in ministerial education, and to this

end we earnestly ask all our churches to take regular collections to aid the Board of Education at Wake Forest College in this great work which had 39 young men under its care last year.

We recommend Moravian Falls Academy, under the able management of our own Bro. G. W. Greene, as a good place to educate our boys and girls. For the better preparing of our young men for usefulness, and especially young men called of God to preach the gospel, we recommend our own Wake Forest. For the better preparing of our daughters to perform those high duties to which their station calls them, we recommend Thomasville Female College, Shelby Female College, Oxford Female College and Murfreesboro Female College.

STATE MISSIONS.

For preaching the gospel in destitute sections of North Carolina, there are all the motives urged in behalf of other Missions, and the

additional motive of patriotism. Love of country, love of our neighbor and love of our families unite in demanding that this work should be prosecuted with vigor. In respect to some doctrines the Baptists stand alone against the world. These are important doctrines, and impose upon us grave responsibilities. If, as we maintain, we hold important doctrines, denied by all others, we are under obligations to send Missionaries wherever our principles are not known. This work we are attempting in State Missions. From the sea-shore to the mountains the Missionaries of our Convention are preaching salvation by grace, believers' baptism and a converted church membership, large benevolence and pastoral support, and a faithful adherence in all things to the word of God. The Lord is wonderfully blessing these labors; churches are organized; houses of worship are built; hundreds are converted and put on Christ in baptism. Three of these labor in our own bounds: Bro. Marsh at Taylorsville, Bro. Pool at Lenoir, and Bro. Bumgarner between the Brushy Mountains and Catawba River. There is great need of another along the foot of the Blue Ridge.

We set out to raise \$100 by the last meeting of the Convention, and we raised more than \$130. By the approaching Convention in November, our delegates promised that we would try for \$150. But little of this has yet been raised. This is only half of what the Board expends in our bounds. Let us not be satisfied with what we have already done, but, for this and all other objects, strive for an increase each year, until the masses of our people are informed of their duty, and, when they know their duty we feel sure they will do it.

HOME MISSIONS.

The work of the Home Mission Board is to supply the destitution within the limits of the Southern Baptist Convention. There are many destitute sections in the Southern States that cannot be supplied by the Baptists of their respective States. The Board is endeavoring to supply as far as possible these destitute sections; and now has under its employ 144 Missionaries laboring at 338 different places, 59 of which are in Texas, 19 in the Indian Territory, 4 among the Chinese in California, and various other places. The Lord has signally blessed the labors of these Missionaries, by adding to the church through their labors upwards of 4,000 members in the past year. Therefore, brethren, we ask you to aid in this great work of advancing the Redeemer's kingdom.

ELDER ROBERT L. STEELE.—During the past year the Master has called from his earthly work one of our oldest ministers, Elder Robert L. Steele. He was a brother beloved of all. Truly a father in Israel hath fallen. He was pure in his life, modest in his deportment almost to a fault, always disposed to prefer others to himself. He had been a member of a Baptist church for forty-five years, for thirty-six of which he was an ordained minister.

His educational advantages were limited; but by hard study of the English Scriptures he became a workman approved of God whose works follow him. He had been laid aside from active service in the ministry for several years by bodily infirmity, and often spoke of his release as near, and of himself as waiting for the summons. Enjoying the love and confidence of the churches, he waited the call of the Master from the trials of life into the joy of the Lord. That call was sudden. He died alone in the field, September 19th, 1883, and yet we believe not alone, for the Lord was with him.
