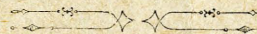

August 19th, 1886.

The Committee of Arrangements reported an order of business and answers to queries, as follows:

First—Query from Mt. Carmel Church: Is it right to withdraw fellowship from members who are brought up as witnesses against members that have an allegation, when there is a contradiction between the accused and the witnesses?

ANSWER: We advise Churches not to withdraw fellowship from their members, except upon evidence beyond a reasonable doubt of the disorderly walk or specific crime of the accused. A mere contradiction between parties at variance, without further evidence, cannot justify such action.

Second—Query from Zion Hill Church: Is it right for a Baptist Church

to receive members by application immediately after their exclusion from another Baptist Church not more than four miles distant?

ANSWER: We advise the Churches to receive members by application only with extreme caution, and after a full and complete investigation of the surrounding circumstances.

PERIODICALS.

No human agency in our time is, probably, doing more to stimulate thought and mould the character both of individuals and nations and to decide their destinies, than the printing press. When this power is wielded by Christian hands, and consecrated to man's spiritual good, it becomes one of the most effective agencies known for evangelizing the world,—ranking next to the pulpit in its moral and spiritual influence; but perverted to immoral and vicious ends it is widely destructive in its effect. Unfortunately, a vast portion of its influence is prostituted to the interests of error, infidelity and vice. The great counteracting force to this pernicious agency is the religious press.

In view of this it is encouraging to know that we have in the *Biblical Recorder* a religious journal ably edited, a bold and faithful exponent of the truth as taught in God's Word and held by Baptists; a journal that if read by all the members of our Churches would greatly increase their efficiency. We also have an excellent paper (the *Western North Carolina Baptist*) published at Asheville. And for the Sunday Schools, *Kind Words* and the excellent periodicals of the American Baptist Publication Society.

We regret that so few copies of the *Recorder* are taken in the bounds of this Association compared with the number that should be taken and

we recommend the pastors to put forth earnest exertions to put it and the *Foreign Mission Journal* in every family.

BAPTIST ORPHANAGE.

Your Committee rejoices that they can come to you at the close of the past associational year with such cheering prospects from this enterprise of Christian work for the new year upon which we are to enter.

The Orphanage Association was organized about eighteen months ago, and that veteran worker and devoted Christian gentleman, J. H. Mills, was placed at its head. There are already four buildings erected and furnished, capable of accommodating forty-eight orphans, and it is more than probable that that number is now there. And, then, on the 28th day of July last, the corner stones of five other buildings were laid.

The land, also, upon which the buildings stand has been paid for. So that the institution starts off on a career of usefulness unprecedented in the annals of our history.

We mention Wake Forest College, our own College, for our young men; Thomasville Female College, and other similar institutions under Baptist control, for our girls; Moravian Falls and Cedar Run Academies, institutions in our own bounds, for the education of both sexes and the preparation of our boys and girls for our Colleges.

STATE MISSIONS.

By State Missions we mean supplying destitute sections in our own State with the Gospel. There are several whole counties in North Carolina with but one or two Baptist Churches in them, and when the statistics for last year were gathered Hyde county was without any. Hence the necessity for this work.

The State Board of Missions has this work in charge. Last year it did a work the result of which eternity alone will reveal. There were about 70 Missionaries employed for all or part of the time, and the Board collected and expended directly in this work about \$6,500. These Missionaries preached 3,872 sermons, attended 171 protracted meetings, witnessed 1,841 professions of faith, baptised 1,211 persons into the Church. This field seems to be ever widening, and God is evidently blessing the work. This year the Board is trying to do more. There are more men in the field, and they are needing our sympathy and co-operation in prayer and contributions.

We advise the closest possible connection between the Churches and the Board in this great work. The motto of both should be: The State of North Carolina for Jesus.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

It is very evident that Churches that have manifested no interest in this glorious work are either *standing still* or *retrograding* in the grand work of spiritual improvement; and your committee advise the Churches to use every effort in their power to organize schools which shall be kept open as long as practicable. The Sunday School is the great auxiliary of the Church, and a mighty instrument in the hands of God in leading the young (and frequently the middle aged and old) to the Lamb of God that taketh away the sin of the world.

HOME MISSIONS.

This department of our Master's work and its demands are constantly growing. The field includes nineteen of the forty-nine States and Territories of the Union, and in it are 20,000,000 of the 55,000,000 of the population of the United States. The field now stretches beyond the States and takes in Mexico, Central America and the Antilles, with a population of 34,500,000, many of them ignorant and enslaved by popery. Among this vast population are thousands of the red men of the forest, from whom we took this beautiful land; now our wealth. Shall we not give them a knowledge of the way to that better land where they shall abide forever?

The demand for workers far exceeds the means to send them. Last year the Board employed 255 Missionaries, who occupied 426 stations, preached 17,039 sermons, added to the Church 4,664 members, constituted 53 new Churches, and yet this is only a tithe of what should have been done, and would have been done, if the Board had had the means to have employed more men. FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The last and great command of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ is being now obeyed as at no time since the Apostles' day. The field, which is the world, has never been so accessible and inviting, and we rejoice that there is now a deeper and more general mission spirit than ever before. We believe that the spirit of missions is the spirit of the Gospel.

We recommend that our preachers cultivate and develop that spirit, and that the pastors preach to the people on the subject, and that all pray and strive for it. We further recommend that as the harvest is great and the laborers few, that all pray the Lord of the harvest to raise up more laborers and send them forth into His harvest. And that as we pray we work and give.

We further recommend that as God has called from our own State four of our Brethren and Sisters—Brothers Haring and Byam and their wives—to reinforce our veteran Brother, the devoted Yates, in the foreign field; and as the number of laborers must necessarily continually increase so that the Gospel may be preached to every creature, so we should continually increase our contributions to this cause of our Redeemer.
