REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Your Committee on Foreign Missions submit the following for your

By an unusual combination of circumstances, the cause of Foreign Missions has received a considerable impetus, in its forward course, during the past year. This has resulted partly from the fact that quite during the past year. This has resulted partly from the fact that quite a number of godly men and women have gone to the foreign field since our last annual meeting; also in part from the fact that greater interest has been excited among our churches in the Foreign Mission work by the heroic death at the post of duty, of some of the faithful men and women sent to the foreign field—notably the veteran M. T. Yates. The Lord seems to be laying peculiar honor on North Carolina, in calling so many of her sons and daughters for the performance of this great work. There is, consequently, no State within the bounds of our Convention that has greater cause to cultivate a deep and abiding interest in this work of sending the gospel to the heathen. This interest will be best

shown by our sympathy, our prayers, and by our contributions.

Rev. R. T. Bryan, one of our younger missionaries at Chinkiang, China, in a recent letter published in the Recorder, earnestly recommends the plan of churches and Associations, assuming the support of missionaries. This is mentioned for your thoughtful consideration. The time may not have come for this body to assume such support; some may doubt the wisdom of the plan, but certainly no harm can result from a courteous discussion of plans suggested by our missionaries on the field, and a study of our available means, that we may know the better what we can or ought to do in the Master's service.

The fields occupied by our Board are as follows: Northern, Central and Southern China, Africa, Italy, Brazil and Mexico. That our people may be better informed as to the work on these fields, we earnestly recommend that they subscribe for and read the Foreign Mission Journal, published at Richmond, Va.

SECOND DAY-MORNING SESSION.

WEDNESDAY, October 31st, 1888.

The Association was called to order at $9\frac{1}{2}$ o'clock and Rev. J. S. Dill

The hour for the special order having arrived, Rev. J. S. Dill read the report on Home Missions, and after being discussed by Bro. Dill, Rev. H. W. Battle and Bro. J. M. Wooten, was adopted as follows:

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

The Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention is, during the present year, prosecuting its work with increasing zeal and success. Its important missions in the west, especially in Arkansas, Louisiana and Texas, have been wonderfully blessed of the Lord. An increased number of consecrated men are working under this board in all of our weaker States and territories. Good work is also being done in

The work in Cuba under Bro. Diaz, which has been committed to this Board, is one of the great wonders of modern missions. Now, in only its third year, the church in Havana numbers 1.000 members and great multitudes flock continually to hear the pure gospel. A prominent and highly educated priest of the Catholic church has joined the Baptist faith and is rendering valuable aid. A large tent has been provided for temporary use to accommodate the people, and an effort is being made to build a suitable church house in Havana. Aid for this work is especially needed at this critical period in the development of the pure

The Home Board has recently begun the publication of a paper called the Home Field, which is doing good service in giving information of the home work, and we earnestly commend it to the patronage of the

The Kind Words series is gaining in favor and the Board is gratified by its reception among the majority of our Sunday Schools

In view of the increased labors and efficiency of this Board, your committee would press it upon the notice of our churches and urge that every church in the Association give to it at least one collection during the year. The Home Board is located in Atlanta, Ga., with Dr. I. T. Tichenor as Secretary, but all contributions had better pass through the hands of our Association or State Convention Treasurer.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

At 2 o'clock the Moderator called the Association to order, and prayer was offered by Rev. J. T. Albritton.

The report of the Committee on Education being the special order for this hour, the report was called for and read by Rev. H. W. Battle, and after an interesting discussion by Dr. Mitchell, Rev. C. A. Woodson, J. E. Peterson, J. C. Whitty, Rev. H. W. Battle, F. W. Hancock and Rev. A. J. Hires, was adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

The cultivation of the mind is both a privilege and a duty. A privilege, because of the enjoyment realized from well disciplined faculties on the part of the individual; a duty-blended with privilege-because of vastly increased capacity for usefulness, thus attained in any legitimate sphere of life. But, like other mighty agencies for good, education perverted becomes a medium for the propagation of evil, an enemy to truth, and a curse to the race. It is, therefore, a matter well calculated to inspire gratitude to God, and confidence in our future as a denomination, that we have institutions of learning where all the lore of the schools is sanctified by the salutary influences of genuine and profound piety. Conspicuously prominent are Wake Forest College, and the female colleges located at Murfreesboro, Oxford and Thomasville. Too great emphasis cannot be given to that most important work, in which Wake Forest College is so nobly and successfully engaged—the education of young men who have been chosen to become the heralds of the Cross. There are now at Wake Forest about 40 ministerial students, 32 of whom are receiving aid from the Educational Board.

This Association is represented at the college by two young brethren who are being educated and supported preparatory to their life-work in the ministry, and we deem it of the greatest importance that there be generous and systematic contributions from the churches, that these brethren may be sustained and the good work carried on.

Rev. F. R. Howell, a colored brother, representing the American Baptist Home Mission Society of New York, was allowed to make a statement in regard to the work in Newberne, and permitted a collection for

Dr. R. H. Lewis gave notice of a proposed amendment to the Constitution to be acted upon at the next session of the Association, as follows:

The Association shall appoint annually an Education Board of five members, and to this Board shall be referred all applications for aid in

ministerial education.

The report on Temperance was read and adopted, as follows:

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

The time was when not only the moderate use of intoxicating liquors. but also their manufacture and sale, were considered by many as no violation of God's law, and no barrier to Christian or church fellowship. But the fearful and growing evils of intemperance which have troubled us so much, both in and out of the church, have induced our people to give a more thorough and conscientious study to those parts of God's Word that bear on the temperance question. Hence, the sentiment of a large portion of our people in and out of the church, is that Bible temperance means the moderate use of what is lawful, and total abstinence from what is hurtful. The Bible teaches plainly that "wine is a mocker, strong drink is raging, and whosoever is deceived thereby is not wise. It produces woe, sorrow, contentions, babblings, wounds without cause, redness of eyes, and if persisted in will bring eternal ruin upon both soul and body.

Considering the destructive power and fearful influence of the liquor traffic, and the awful results of intemperance, we recommend and urge upon the Christians to abandon its use as a beverage, and stand squarely

upon the Bible platform of temperance. Respectfully submitted,

REPORT ON PERIODICALS.

One of the most potent factors in the education and progressiveness of the present age is its periodical literature. He who fails to recognize the potency of this factor must necessarily lag behind his wiser competitors, whatever may be the calling which engages the energies of his life. If a man should take a periodical devoted to his business, surely he should take a periodical devoted to his religion, for the simple reason that religion is of far greater importance than business. The Baptists of North Carolina should take first of all the *Biblical Recorder*, because it is the organ of the denomination in the State, the faithful exponent and defender of our distinctive principles, the medium of communicaand defender of our distinctive principles, the median of communica-tion by which we become acquainted with one another and provoke one another to good works, and lastly, because of its earnest advocacy of the many enterprises which claim our attention and enlist our sympathy

We also commend to our brethren the Gospel Herald, published by the State Mission Board, at fifty cents a copy, one dollar for four copies, and fifteen dollars for one hundred copies; also Charity and Children, published at Thomasville, in the interest of the Baptist Orphanage at \$1.00 per year: also the Foreign Mission Journal, of Richmond, Va., the Home Field, of Atlanta, Ga., and the Baptist Sunday School papers and Lesson Helps, published at Atlanta and Philadelphia.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

On examination of the church letters, we find that there are fourteen churches maintaining regular Sunday schools, and eight without schools. We consider this encouraging, but would impress upon the churches without Sunday schools, the great importance of at once organizing them. It is next to impossible for a church to have vitality and continuous growth without this important aid to the training and development of the children.

Especially would we commend to churches not enjoying regular preaching every Sunday, that the Sunday school presents an excellent opportunity for bringing together the members of the church on every Lord's day for the study of God's Word.

REPORT ON ORPHANAGE.

Our Orphanage at Thomasville, N. C., is an institution of which every Baptist should feel proud, and feel a deep interest in the welfare of the little ones there. There are about 93 orphans sheltered and fed at that home. It requires much food and clothing for those that are to be cared for. When we remember that the children there gathered are our family, the children of the great Baptist Brotherhood of North Carolina, it brings them very near our hearts.

Now, we want something solid and substantial for the orphanage. While we feel thankful that the church letters show that the orphana have been remembered, yet the half has not been done that can and should be done. We would, therefore, recommend to all our churches to try to get each member to take Charity and Children. The paper is now 12 pages, and has increased from 500 to over 2,000 copies weekly, and costs only one dollar. Aside from the charity in the case, the paper is richly worth the money.

We would further recommend to all churches that do not have a regular system for the collection of funds, that they take up regular collections for the support of the orphans. We farther recommend that each Sabbath school in the Association set apart the first Sunday in each month as a day to take a collection for the orphans.

Brethren, we commend this work to you, feeling that it is our work as Baptists. Let us all pray God for His blessing on the work and He Respectfully submitted,

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD.

Then, however, the Board had appropriated as largely as they dared, and have not been willing since to increase their obligations. The result has been that Bro. Leary's ministry has been greatly hindered by the necessity of finding support for himself and family.

In view of the great destitution occasioned as above stated, your Board have desired, and made some effort to obtain a general missionary or evangelist, who would also do colportage work, but unavailingly.

Under existing circumstances, we see nothing that would better meet present necessity and save our weak churches from depletion, than to put the right kind of a laborer for this general work in the field, but where that kind of a man is to be obtained, we know not. That something should be done without delay to "strengthen the things that remain—that are ready to die," is distressingly evident.
