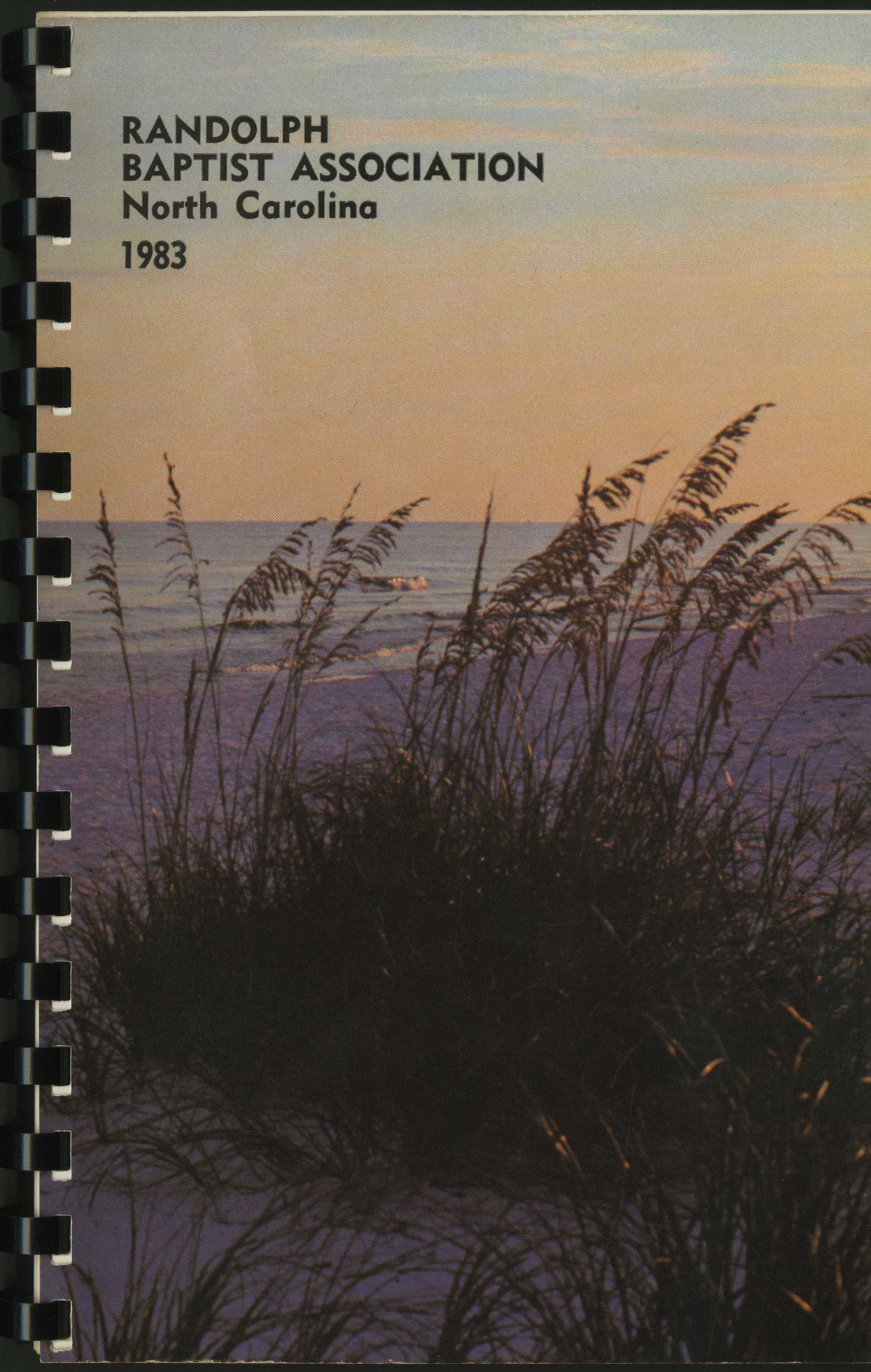
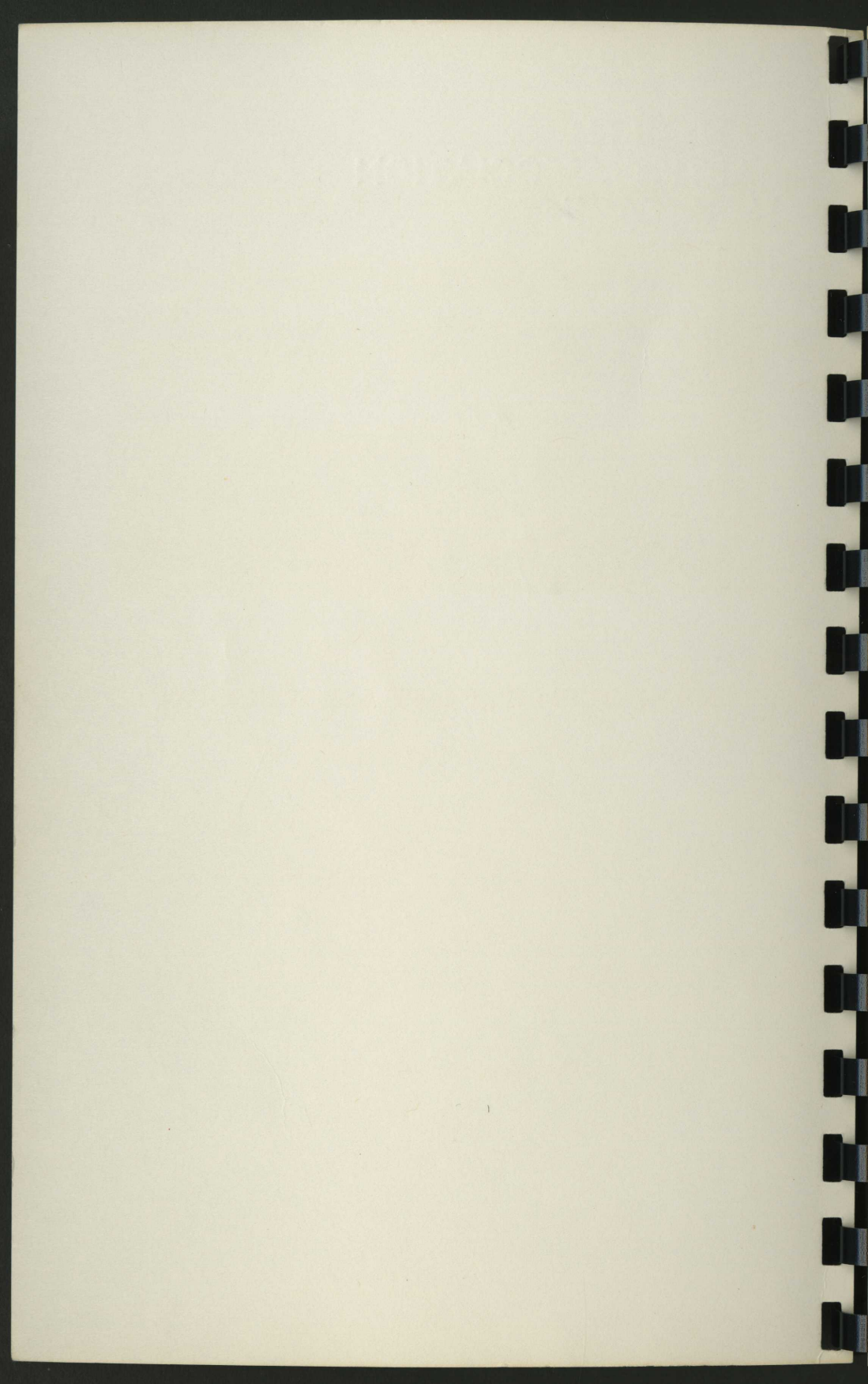

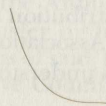

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I — NAME AND OBJECT

Section 1. The name of the organization shall be the Randolph Baptist Association.

Section 2. The purpose of this organization shall be:

- a. The promotion of harmony, fellowship and cooperation among the churches of the Association.
- b. The propagation of the Gospel within the territory of the Association and to the uttermost part of the earth.
- c. The promotion of the missionary, education and benevolent causes of Christ within the Association and in cooperation with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina and the Southern Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE II — MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. a. The membership of the Association shall consist of messengers of Baptist churches regularly affiliated with the Association. All churches desiring to affiliate with the Association shall present to the Missions Committee proper petitions, accompanied by satisfactory evidences of doctrinal regularity and general acceptability. After one year under the watchcare of the Association the said Committee will report to the Association its recommendation. Upon a favorable vote of two-thirds majority of the messengers present at the annual associational meeting the petitioning church may become regularly affiliated with the Association.

b. "Fellowship may be withdrawn by the Association at any annual meeting upon recommendation of the Executive Committee, from any church in its membership that has been found, by due investigation, to have departed from the Missionary Baptist faith and practices, or has failed to abide by the provision of this Constitution and By-Laws, or has failed to either have its pastor or lay member or both in attendance in one or more of the four regular meetings of the Executive Committee, or has failed to make a contribution to the expenses of the Association in addition to the cost of Association minutes, or has failed to properly prepare and return to the Association office a copy of the associational letter, or has failed to send one or more messengers to the annual session of the Association."

Section 2. Such a church may, upon recommendation of the Executive Committee and vote of the Association, be placed on probation until the conditions prompting such action have been corrected. Messengers from any church on probation shall not be allowed to vote in the meetings of the Association.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of each church to furnish to the Association each year a letter, on the form provided by the Clerk, giving full information and statistics provided for on the form, and to send with the letter or by messenger a contribution toward the cost of printing the minutes and other expenses of the Association.

Section 4. It is understood that each church in this Association is indepen-

dent and sovereign in its own affairs, and the Association has no authority over the churches, except of an advisory nature.

Section 5. A church may withdraw from membership in the Association by a vote of the church according to its own by-laws, regulations and procedure.

ARTICLE III — MEETINGS

Section 1. The Association shall meet annually on two days during the week following the Third Sunday in October.

Section 2. The annual meeting shall be composed of messengers chosen by the respective churches of the Association from their membership. *Each church shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for each fifty members, or fraction thereof, above one hundred it has enrolled, but not to exceed ten such messengers.* All pastors in the Association and the Director of Missions are messengers in all the Associational Meetings, each having but one vote.

Section 3. The Association may hold a Mid-Term meeting each spring at such time and place as may be determined by the Association or its Executive Committee. The purpose of the Mid-Term meeting shall be that of information and inspiration without the transaction of business, except that urgent matters of business which cannot well be delayed until a later meeting may be considered and acted upon.

Section 4. Other meetings of the Association may be held when called by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE IV — OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of this Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and three Trustees.

Section 2. These officers shall be elected on the first day of the regular annual session. The prior approval and consent to serve, if elected, shall have been secured from a prospective nominee prior to placing his name in nomination for any one of the several associational elective offices. They shall take office at the close of the Annual Session and serve through the next Annual Session. Any officer may be re-elected with the exception of the Moderator, who shall not serve more than two years in succession.

Section 3. Duties of the Officers:

- a. The Moderator shall preside over all meetings of the Association and discharge such duties as are incumbent on the presiding officer of a deliberative body.
- b. The Vice-Moderator shall perform the duties of the Moderator in the absence of or at the request of the Moderator.
- c. The Clerk shall record and preserve the proceeding of the Association, together with the reports and statistics, and have the same printed and distributed.
- d. The Treasurer shall preserve all money paid into the treasury, pay the same to the order of the Association, and make a full and complete report of all receipts and disbursements at the Annual Meeting.
- e. The duties of the Trustees shall be to transfer or hold title to any properties for the Association. All transactions of said Trustees shall be authorized by the Association or its Executive Committee.

Section 4. "The Association endorses the continued operation of organizations among the churches of the Association for the promotion of the various phases of their work involving Sunday School, Church Training, Baptist Brotherhood, and Woman's Missionary Union. The Directors of the Associational Sunday School, Associational Church Training, and Associational Baptist Brotherhood shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee of the Association, and approved and elected by the Executive Committee of the Association in the May meeting, and shall serve officially from October 1 to September 30. The Woman's Missionary Union shall be recognized as an auxiliary organization of the Association. These officers are elected in the WMU Annual Meeting in the spring."

ARTICLE V — EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The Association shall have an Executive Committee comprised of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Trustees of the Association, Associational Sunday School Director, Associational Church Training Director, Associational Baptist Brotherhood Director, Associational Woman's Missionary Union Director, the Associational Director of Missions, all pastors, all church educational directors, and one member of each church in the Association desiring representation on the Committee.

Section 2.

- a. The Executive Committee shall hold meetings once each quarter during the second month of the quarter, the date to be set by the Board itself, and at such other times as may be required at the call of the Moderator, or at the call of not less than five members of the Executive Committee.
- b. Twenty members of the Executive Committee shall be required to be present to constitute a quorum.
- c. To act for and on behalf of the Association between sessions.
- d. To carry out the orders and resolutions of the Association pertaining to it.
- e. To superintend the Associational Mission work, employ a missionary and determine the salary to be paid.
- f. To *fill* vacancies which may occur during the year in the personnel of the Associational officers or workers for the remainder of such unexpired term.
- g. To investigate any report of complaint that may be brought to its attention about irregularity of doctrine, practice, or conduct on the part of any individual or group in the Association and report its finding with such recommendations as it considers advisable, to the Association in a regular meeting.
- h. To make such recommendations as it may deem wise for the strengthening and upbuilding of the churches and the work of the Association.
- i. The Executive Committee shall not involve the Association in debt to exceed one hundred dollars for necessary operating expenses of the Association.

- j. To appoint and elect the officers for the Associational organizations of the Sunday School, Church Training, and Baptist Brotherhood.

ARTICLE VI — ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL

Section 1.

- a. The Associational Council shall be composed of the following Associational officers: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Associational Sunday School Director, Associational Church Training Director, Associational Woman's Missionary Union Director, Associational Brotherhood Director, Associational Music Director, Chairman of the Evangelism Committee, Chairman of the Budget Committee, Chairman of the Missions Committee, the Director of Missions, and others deemed necessary by the Moderator to carry on the work of the Association.
- b. The Moderator shall serve as Chairman of the Council, the Vice-Moderator as vice chairman, and the clerk as secretary.

Section 2.

- a. The Associational Council shall hold meetings once each month and at such other times as deemed necessary by the Chairman, Director of Missions or at the call of not less than 5 members of the Council.
- b. Seven members of the Council shall be present to constitute a quorum.
- c. The duties of the Associational Council shall be:
 - (1) To plan the general work of the Association.
 - (2) To assign responsibility of the implementation of proposed plans.
 - (3) To receive and help correlate into a general associational program the proposed plans of the individual organizations.
- d. The Council shall give a quarterly report to the Associational Executive Committee along with any recommendations it may have.

ARTICLE VII — COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Moderator shall appoint a Committee on Committees at the August Executive Committee Meeting, before the Annual session of the Association. This committee shall prepare its report and shall be given the opportunity to submit its report early on the program of the first day of the Annual Session.

The committee shall name the following committees to report during the Annual Sessions.

Committee on Memorials, Committee on Appreciation, and such other committees as may be requested by the Association or Moderator.

The Committee on Committees shall also name the following standing committees:

Nominating, Budget and Finance, Missions, Evangelism, Constitution and By-Laws, Ordination, Time, Place and Preacher, Order of Business, Christian Life and Public Affairs and such other committees as may be requested by the Association or Moderator.

This committee will continue to function to replace vacancies that occur during the year.

Section 2. Duties of Committees for Annual Session:

- (1) **Memorials:** This committee will be composed of two members. They will prepare a list of those members of the churches who have died during the year and present suitable memorial resolutions for adoption by the Association in the annual session.
- (2) **Appreciation:** This committee will be composed of two members. They will prepare and present appropriate resolutions of appreciation and concern to the annual session.

Section 3. Standing Committees Membership and Duties:

A. Term of Service

Each standing committee will have members who will serve on a rotating basis: three (3) years, two (2) years, and one (1) year, with the term of office being from the close of the annual session through the following Annual Session. It is suggested that each committee meet once each quarter or as often as needed.

Each committee should have a fair representation of both ministers and lay-persons with every area of the association represented.

B. Duties of Standing Committees.

a. *Nominating Committee:* The nominating committee shall be composed of six members, two serving three (3) years, two serving two (2) years and two serving one year. The nominating committee shall nominate a complete slate of officers for the next year. Their first report would be to the May Executive Committee meeting, in which the Sunday School Director, Church Training Director and Baptist Brotherhood Director would be presented and elected. These Directors would make suggestions concerning leaders in their organizations to be presented at the annual session for election and approval.

b. *Budget and Finances:* The Budget and Finance Committee shall be composed of six members, two serving three (3) years, two serving two (2) years and two serving one year. The Budget and Finance Committee shall study the association's financial needs for an adequate program, prepare and present a budget to the association for the following year, devise plans for securing the cooperation of the churches in raising funds to meet the budget, and make a written report to the quarterly Executive Committee and a final report to the Annual Session.

The Committee shall be prepared to assist any church within the association, upon request, with the stewardship program offered by the Baptist State Convention or Southern Baptist Convention. The Committee should meet once each quarter to review financial affairs of the association, or as often as is needed.

c. *Missions Committee:* The Missions Committee shall be composed of six (6) members, two serving three (3) years, two serving two (2) years, and two serving one year. Also WMU Director and Brotherhood Director shall serve as Ex-officio members. This committee shall meet at least once each quarter or as often as is needed.

Guiding Principles for the Work of the Missions Committee of the Randolph Association.

1. The Committee is to seek to discover areas where new work is needed and to lead in the sponsorship or establishment of new work to meet present need or the securing of property by a local church and/or the Association in the anticipation of future need.
 2. All new work does not necessarily need to be nor should be intended to become an organized or constituted church. New work may be started and maintained on the basis of a mission to meet particular needs (This provides for institutional missions such as jails, prisons, rest homes, etc.).
 3. The location of missions or new churches shall be determined by the need revealed in an adequate survey conducted by the Missions Committee and local interested groups or churches.
 4. Any church, committee, group or individuals considering beginning new work, acting with or without church sponsorship, should approach the Missions Committee for guidance before having any service or choosing a temporary or permanent location.
 5. The Missions Committee shall institute basic, understandable operational procedures and practices for a mission that leads in establishing and strongly urges that each church establishing a mission does the same. The guidance of missions by the Missions Committee shall continue until a co-operating church or churches can be led to accept the responsibility of sponsorship.
 6. A mission organized or assisted by the Missions Committee shall accept the recognized principles and practices of a church cooperating with the Randolph Association, the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.
 7. The Missions Committee shall plan and develop special associational projects and make the churches aware of these mission opportunities to participate.
- d. *Order of Business:* The Order of Business Committee shall be composed of six members, two serving three (3) years, two serving two (2) years, and two serving one year. The committee will prepare well in advance a suggested order of business for the annual session. The committee will notify those who are to make reports or have a part on the program. The program for the annual session of the association shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors at least thirty (30) days before the annual meeting. The Moderator, Clerk, and Music Director shall be Ex-officio members of the committee.
- This committee will be also responsible for promoting the annual session through the various news media.
- e. *Evangelism:* The Evangelism committee shall be composed of six members, two serving three (3) years, two serving two (2) years and two serving one year. The committee shall promote the work of evangelism in the churches and the association in cooperation with the State Department of Evangelism. The committee shall plan and promote annual programs or clinics for persons to be trained and motivated to witness for Christ. The committee shall meet at least

once each quarter and report its activities to the Executive Committee. The committee will give a written report to the annual session.

- f. *Ordinations:* The Ordination Committee shall be composed of three members, one serving three (3) years, one serving two (2) years, and one serving one year. Also the Director of Missions, the pastor and deacons of the home and requesting churches, shall, when requested, assist with the examination and ordination of a candidate of the Gospel ministry.

Guidelines:

- (1) The committee requires that it receive a copy of that portion of minutes, signed by the Clerk, of the church conference at which the home church voted to request examination of the candidate.
- (2) The committee requires that the candidate be called by a church for ministry before requesting examination.
- (3) The chairman shall notify the candidate of the time, place and procedure.
- (4) The committee suggests that the candidate be questioned at least two weeks prior to his ordination.
- (5) The committee shall question the candidate about his conversion, his call, his priorities, his doctrine, and his personal life. The committee may also counsel the candidate.
- (6) The candidate should feel free to seek advice from the committee regarding any area of the ministry.
- (7) In every instance, the committee shall be guided by the Scripture, especially I Timothy 3:1-7 and Titus 1:5-9. The Ordination Committee shall give written notice to the home church as to whether or not it recommends that the church proceed with the ordination.

The chairman shall report the committee's activities to the Executive Committee and provide a written report for the annual session.

- g. *Place, Time, and Preacher:* This committee shall be composed of three members, one serving three (3) years, one serving two (2) years, and one serving one year. The committee will receive invitations from the churches which desire the association to meet with them the next year. It will recommend to the association in its annual session the time and place of the annual session the following year. This committee will also recommend a preacher and an alternate for the annual sermon.
- h. *Constitution:* The Constitution Committee shall be composed of three members, one serving three (3) years, one serving two (2) years, and one serving one year. The clerk of the association shall also serve on the committee. This committee shall be available to study changes or revisions in the Constitution, and to make recommendations as needed. The committee shall meet at least twice a year, once in the winter and once in the summer.

- i. *Building and Grounds*: The Building and Grounds Committee is composed of three members, one serving three (3) years, one serving two (2) years, and one serving one year. The committee shall have general oversight over all property owned or leased by the association. It will make recommendations to the Executive Committee concerning upkeep and improvements of the property. The committee should meet at least once each quarter. It shall give a written report to the annual session of its work.
- j. *Seminary Extension*: The Seminary Extension Committee is composed of three members, one serving three (3) years, one serving two (2) years, and one serving one year. The committee shall publicize study courses and programs that are available, and shall plan, provide and promote Seminary Extension classes for pastors and lay-persons as they may be desired. The committee shall report to the Executive Committee its activities and make a written report to the annual session.
- k. *Historical*: The Historical Committee shall be composed of three members, one serving for three years, one serving for two (2) years, and one serving for one year. It shall be the duty of the committee to collect, compile, and preserve all materials of interest to the association and member churches. It shall make its report at the Annual Session.
- l. *Christian Life and Public Affairs*: This committee is composed of three members, one serving three (3) years, one serving two (2) years, and one serving one year. The committee shall recommend ways in which the association can work for the promotion of civic righteousness and social uplift. It will inform the churches of current issues of Christian response. The committee shall also commend those persons and institutions that uphold Christian virtue, and shall support the churches in the teaching of Christian personal and social righteousness. The committee shall report to the Executive Committee and Annual Session when needed.

ARTICLE VIII — ORDINATION AND CALLING OF PASTORS

Section 1. Inasmuch as the ordination of a man to the gospel ministry by any church in this Association is expected to be recognized by the denomination as a whole, the churches are counseled to be extremely careful in the matter of setting men apart for this sacred calling, ordaining only those who, by irreproachable character, piety of life, doctrinal soundness and suitable talents, give promise of honoring the name of Christ and of rendering acceptable service in the missionary Baptist ministry.

Section 2. To aid the churches in this vital matter, the Association will appoint each year a committee of five of the pastors to be called the Committee on Ordination. Any church desiring to ordain a brother to the ministry may request the Ordination Committee to act as a presbytery for the purpose of examining the brother according to the guidelines found under Duties of Ordination Committee.

Section 3. The churches are urged also to exercise the utmost care and wisdom, earnestly seeking the guidance of the Holy Spirit, in calling of their

pastors, choosing only men who give evidence by their Christian character, cooperative spirit and leadership ability, that they will serve the best interests of the churches, the denomination, and the cause of Christ.

ARTICLE IX — NEW CHURCHES

Baptist churches may be organized and established in localities within the territory of this Association when such new churches are seen to be needed. Those interested in organizing a new church may seek the Counsel of the Executive Committee and the Missions Committee of the Association.

ARTICLE X — RULES AND ORDER OF DECORUM

This Association shall be governed in its meetings by such rules and by-laws as may be adopted, amended, or set aside by a majority vote of the messengers present. *Robert's Rules of Order* will be the guide in all parliamentary matters.

ARTICLE XI — ADOPTION

The Constitution and By-Laws shall take effect immediately upon its adoption by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present and shall supersede any and all constitutions, by-laws, and amendments previously adopted.

ARTICLE XII — AMENDMENTS

The Constitution and By-Laws may be amended at any regular annual meeting by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present, provided the proposed amendment shall have been presented in written form on the first day of the Annual Meeting. The vote on any proposed amendment so presented should be deferred until the second day, unless requested by two-thirds vote of the messengers present.

MISSIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

During the year the Missions Committee has been pretty busy. We have had several meetings planning and discussing missions both locally and in West Virginia, as well as World Missions. The chairman has attended the Triad Missions meetings in Greensboro where State workers have met with us and given to us information and help in how to be better informed about the mission needs of our area. Attended Missions Conference at Ridgecrest and was exposed to some of the best information available to Southern Baptists. Two groups at least from our association went on mission trips. Rev. McDaniels led a group from First Baptist, Asheboro to West Virginia. Carl and Frances King with Lucy Garner spent two weeks in Eastern Pennsylvania. Bob Watson from the Extension Dept. of the BSC met with your committee to plan a survey for June 18 and 19 for the West Cedar Grove Community. Mr. Earl Lamm came and helped the Committee with the survey. We did not get all the work done that week-end. However, we discovered some 50 persons that indicated some interest in a Southern Baptist church in the area.

The Cedar Grove Baptist Mission was started on June 12, with 27 persons present. They have met each Sunday since with an average of 30 each Sunday, holding Sunday School and worship services. We have Nursery, Preschool, Grades 1-6, Junior and Senior High and Adults. We have had a high attendance of 90 on July 17th when the counselors from Mundo Vista came and sang for us. They brought 50 and we had 40. Mr. Odis Honeycutt is acting as Sunday School Director and Treasurer, Carl King as teacher of Adults, and Song Leader, Leland Bingham as High School teacher and Older Children, Frances King, Preschool. Rev. James Womble has been preaching. Please continue to pray for the local work and thanks to everyone who has helped. We still need many more persons to subscribe to the MAP plan so that funds may be

available to help both in West Virginia and locally. For after all, Jesus said to begin at Jerusalem and carry the gospel to the ends of the earth.

EVANGELISM COMMITTEE REPORT

The Evangelism Committee has met three times this past year and discussed a number of ways to improve evangelistic outreach and to build the enthusiasm about reaching persons for Christ. Several topics were discussed in the committee meetings: Lay-Witnessing, Lay-Renewal, Youth Evangelism, reaching young adults, seminars on *How to Witness*, Pastor's revival and evangelistic conference or rally.

These projects for the year were adopted - (1) Encouraging pastors and lay-persons to attend the State-wide Evangelistic Conference. (2) Conducting Witnessing training for Churches. (3) Conducting a Pastor's Revival Conference, and Evangelism Rally.

On September 27, twenty-one pastors gathered at First Baptist Church, Asheboro, for an Evangelism Conference. Bill Kincaid of Balfour Church and Jimmy Upton of Asbury Church were the speakers with Larry Pugh of Caraway Church giving a testimony. The Association having completed a five-year Bold Mission emphasis, the Director of Missions presented a challenge to plan for the next five years. He shared some Associational Priorities that could be the base for planning during the next year. He suggested that 1984 would be a year for projecting a five-year program for the association during 1985-1990. ASSOCIATIONAL PRIORITIES

For several months I have been studying our association and its needs. The 1980 census data and the survey of the Church Extension Department of the Baptist State Convention has helped. There are six priorities that I believe we need to consider. I feel that all of these were top priority and none second to any other. They are as follows:

1. FELLOWSHIP:

- a. To build a stronger sense of fellowship both within and between churches.
- b. To increase the feeling of interdependence of team spirit, of being in fellowship on mission.

2. COMMUNICATION:

- a. To develop an on-going public relations program with short-range and long-term goals.
- b. This program should be aimed at the general population including non-Baptists as well as internal communication aimed at our own membership.

3. STAFF LEADERSHIP:

- a. To develop a strong bond between pastors and the Association.
- b. To offer help in goal-setting and in assistance to churches, especially individual church needs.
- c. To inform every church in the association of the work and ministry of the association.

4. TRAINING AND DEVELOPMENT:

- a. To provide top quality leadership training for every church program organization as well as other areas of work such as stewardship, evangelism, deacons, and ministers.
- b. To specialize this training to meet the needs of varying size and type of churches through central, groups, and individual training events.

5. SPECIAL MINISTRIES:

- a. To expand and develop programs of ministry to areas of the population with special needs such as students, singles, senior adults, youth, socio-economic groups, apartment dwellers, etc.
- b. To assist other denominational groups in ministry to divorcees, alcoholics, youth offenders, battered women and etc.
- c. This would also include family life and social issues.

6. GROWTH:

- a. To develop a climate of healthy growth in reaching people through the churches and in the stewardship of the churches.
- b. To encourage the development of new missions and churches, both traditional as well as churches or missions for special groups such as deaf, blind, international or etc.
- c. To increase the awareness of mission involvement, both locally and other locations outside the association.

MUSIC REPORT

North Carolina Baptists have every right to be proud of themselves and their musical accomplishments. This past year, 3,573 North Carolina Baptist churches (9.46% of all SBC churches reporting music ministries) enrolled more than 161,000 people (9.8% of the total SBC music enrollment) in local church music ministry. This is quite an accomplishment and one Randolph Baptists can be proud to be a part of.

In 1982-83, Randolph Baptist churches enrolled 96 preschoolers, 148 Music Makers (grades 1-3), 137 Young Musicians (grades 4-6), 181 youth, 771 adults, 41 handbell ringers, 116 people in vocal ensembles, 56 instrumentalists and 132 general music leaders. Our total enrollment was 1,670 with an average weekly attendance of 1,145. This enrollment figure reflects an increase of 117 people over last year's number.

Statistics like these make me proud to be a North Carolina Baptist and Randolph Baptist musician. My pride is not in the statistic, but in the fact there are 1,670 PEOPLE serving God and ministering to people through music in Randolph Baptist Association churches.

BAPTIST HOMES FOR THE AGING REPORT

Through North Carolina Baptists, God continues to bless our North Carolina Baptist Homes with meaningful blessings, and we are grateful!

One of the most significant blessings that we have received during the year has been a 31% increase in the percentage used for distribution of funds through the Cooperative Program. This percentage change, along with strong Cooperative Program support during the first five months of 1983, has meant an increase of \$29,079.73 over the same period in 1982. Total Cooperative Program funds for the period totalled \$135,647.39.

For the first five months of 1983, undesignated support through the North Carolina Missions Offering provided \$74,087.47 toward the Homes' benevolent care needs. Designated gifts of \$42,274.58 brought the total NCMO support to \$116,362.05.

Through these mission gifts of \$252,009.44, we were able to provide care for over 50% of the residents in the five Homes and Nursing Care who have limited resources. Even with this mission support, benevolent care exceeded the resources by \$132,975.00 for the five-month period. This gap must be bridged, and we must continue to receive more through the Cooperative Program and the North Carolina Missions Offering if we are to meet the needs of residents in the Homes. This still leaves the many who are waiting to enter the Homes, but do not have sufficient funds to pay the cost of care.

The Baptist Homes have been and continue to be a benevolent care ministry throughout the 32 years of caring. Because of the over-extended benevolent care ministry, the Trustees have had to put a hold on admissions of persons who cannot demonstrate the resources to pay the cost of care for their life expectancy. Let us change this picture as rapidly as possible. The only way that it can be changed is through a concerted effort of increased giving through the Cooperative Program and the North Carolina Missions Offering.

Another step forward during May of this year was the approval by the Homes' Trustees of a Capital Funds Campaign of \$2,500,000 for the meeting of needs on the Hayes Home Campus, Winston-Salem. This challenge will meet some of the very vital needs of updating the Nursing Care Unit. Included in this updating will be a physical therapy room, patient dining room/activity area, and other vital needs related to food service. A second area of need includes the building of additional rooms at Hayes Home. These rooms are desperately needed to make possible additional beds in the Nursing Care Unit. This expansion will require additional money beyond the current Capital Funds Campaign. The upcoming campaign will be the first major capital funds

effort that the Baptist Homes have undertaken. We covet your prayers for a successful effort.

The needs of older persons in our nation and state become more and more acute with each passing day. It is imperative that we focus more on the needs and that we provide as wisely as we can for them in the family of our North Carolina Baptist Homes, now and for the future.

We believe that the future of the Homes' ministry is in God's hands. We shall continue to trust Him for our needs, and urge you to join Him and us as we strive to meet the needs of this vital ministry to older persons.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES REPORT

All services of the Baptist Children's Homes are available through the Thomasville Family Services Center. These services include: group living on four campuses, foster care, therapeutic camping, maternity care, emergency care, social work service, care for children in need of specialized assistance, college and technical education, a demonstrational program of preschool child care and development, counseling and professional services to families, and assistance to churches and associations in parent education and family living through the Family Resource Center.

In the Thomasville Area, we are particularly pleased with our Foster Home Program and its potential. Foster care provides "one on one" care to certain children. This program has grown and we look forward to being able to serve more children as good Christian people respond to this special ministry by becoming foster parents.

Cameron Home, located in Moore County near the community of Cameron, provides therapeutic camping for boys from all across the state. The program has shown steady growth since its beginning in December of 1980 and is now operating with three groups of 10 boys each. This is a highly specialized program of "friendship therapy" in a small group setting surrounded with nature's incentives for achievement and learning.

Larry W. Sawyer and members of the Thomasville Area Family Services staff are ready to serve those who have need of any of our services.

We are grateful for the continuing support of our fellow Baptists through the Cooperative Program, the North Carolina Missions Offering and designated gifts.

On July 1, 1983, the Baptist Children's Homes welcomed its new President, Dr. Michael C. Blackwell, a native of Gastonia. Dr. Blackwell becomes the eighth President of the Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina and follows in a noble tradition of excellence established by the seven men who preceded him in this position. In making the announcement of Dr. Blackwell's selection, Dr. William Brown, Chairman of the Board of Trustees, said that "we firmly believe that Dr. Blackwell will continue to lead this vital ministry in an exemplary manner. His unique talents, personality and commitments will assure that this ministry remains at the vanguard of excellence in child care in meeting the challenge of resolving the hurts of children and families in need."

Dr. Blackwell served churches in both North Carolina and Virginia before assuming the Presidency of the Baptist Children's Homes.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

Baptist Hospital has celebrated its sixtieth anniversary during 1983 by continuing to expand and improve its services.

During the year the hospital has installed a nuclear magnetic resonance machine in the Department of Diagnostic Radiology. With the use of radio waves, this machine produces pictures as good as or better than standard x-rays and can also provide valuable information based on the body's chemistry without posing any radiation hazard.

Baptist Hospital is also providing a new treatment aimed at finding and removing the cause of heart attacks. The procedure attempts to dissolve clots in the coronary arteries feeding blood to the heart muscle by injecting a clot-dissolving drug through a catheter.

During the past year a survey team from the North Carolina Department of Human Resources designated the hospital's Emergency Department as a Level I trauma center which indicates that the department offers all major services for serious injuries twenty-four hours a day seven days a week.

Because of these and other services provided by the hospital, a total of 23,903 patients were admitted to its approximately 700 beds during the year for a total of 213,021 days of patient care. An additional 66,039 persons visited the hospital's emergency room and outpatient clinics.

The Department of Pastoral Care provided more than 14,000 hours of pastoral service to hospital patients, their families, and the Medical Center staff besides leading at least four worship services each week in the Davis Memorial Chapel. The Pastoral Counseling division provided 14,493 hours of counseling to persons who had individual or family problems or concerns. The Clinical Pastoral Education division provided training at some level for more than 100 students. During the past year Dr. Mahan Siler, who has been with the department for ten years, resigned as its director in order to return to the pastorate.

In order to provide adequate care of its patients, Baptist Hospital employs approximately 3,500 people and has buildings and equipment valued at more than \$100,000,000. The operating budget for 1983 was \$101,000,000.

During the past year the hospital trustees have reviewed plans for another major capital expansion program to begin when construction funds are available.

Careful management with continuing emphasis on cost-containment projects has made it possible for the hospital to operate in the black with only a 4 percent room rate increase during the past year.

During the 1982 fiscal year the hospital received from the churches of the Baptist State Convention a total of \$497,019 through the Cooperative Program and \$343,665 through the North Carolina Missions Offering. Cooperative Program funds helped to underwrite the budget of the Pastoral Care

Department and the gifts received through North Carolina Missions Offering assist financially needy patients in paying their hospital bills.

The hospital administration and staff are deeply grateful to the Baptist State Convention and all its constituents whose leadership and support make it possible for the hospital to provide these ministries.

A brief history of Glenola and Mt. Lebanon Baptist Churches follows.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF GLENOLA BAPTIST CHURCH

Glenola Baptist Church is the outgrowth of a community Sunday School organized in the Glenola public school house in January, 1909. The Sunday School experienced a rapid and steady growth and in 1914 the original church sanctuary was erected by residents of the community, under the supervision of J. Eugene Spencer and Walter McGee, on land given by Mr. and Mrs. N. C. McDowell, with the majority of the building material being donated by residents of the community.

Glenola Baptist Church was organized as a Missionary Baptist Church in 1917, by Judge W. H. Eller, a retired minister of Greensboro, N.C. for the purpose of ministering to the Spiritual needs and welfare of the community and to preach the Gospel of our LORD and SAVIOUR, JESUS CHRIST.

Contributions to the Spiritual growth and welfare of the church have been made by a number of faithful and dedicated pastors whom the LORD has sent to lead, guide and direct our steps. Our first full time pastor, the Rev. Charles J. McBride, was called in 1946, and under his leadership a new parsonage was constructed and in 1952, work was started on our present sanctuary and class rooms. The work was continued under the leadership of Rev. James Bolick and the first service was held in the new building on February 5, 1956. Under the leadership of Rev. Ralph Holcomb, the original debt was retired and a new building program began, consisting of the addition of the church steeple, paving the parking lot, air conditioning the sanctuary, and the construction of our fellowship building.

Our present Pastor, the Rev. Cabot Inman, began his ministry with us in February 1974. Under his leadership the entire church, and fellowship building have been carpeted, a new well and water system for all the buildings, the pews have been upholstered, new tables and chairs purchased for the fellowship building and a new addition and other renovations made at the parsonage. The final payment was made in September, 1982, on the church debt and brother Inman led us in a service of note burning, thanksgiving and praise to GOD for his blessings and goodness to us.

We are all very proud of our church and the influence it has in the community. We realize that only with GOD'S help could so much have been accomplished. Pray with us, that GOD will continue to bless and use our church for the building of living stones, for that spiritual building, that house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF MT. LEBANON BAPTIST CHURCH

Edwards reported that all churches in Randolph County were neglected being just in the edge of Montgomery, Piedmont and Sandy Creek Association. Pastors of the 28 churches in the County were in favor of organizing a Randolph County Association. Sixteen churches joined to form the Randolph Association of which Mt. Lebanon was one.

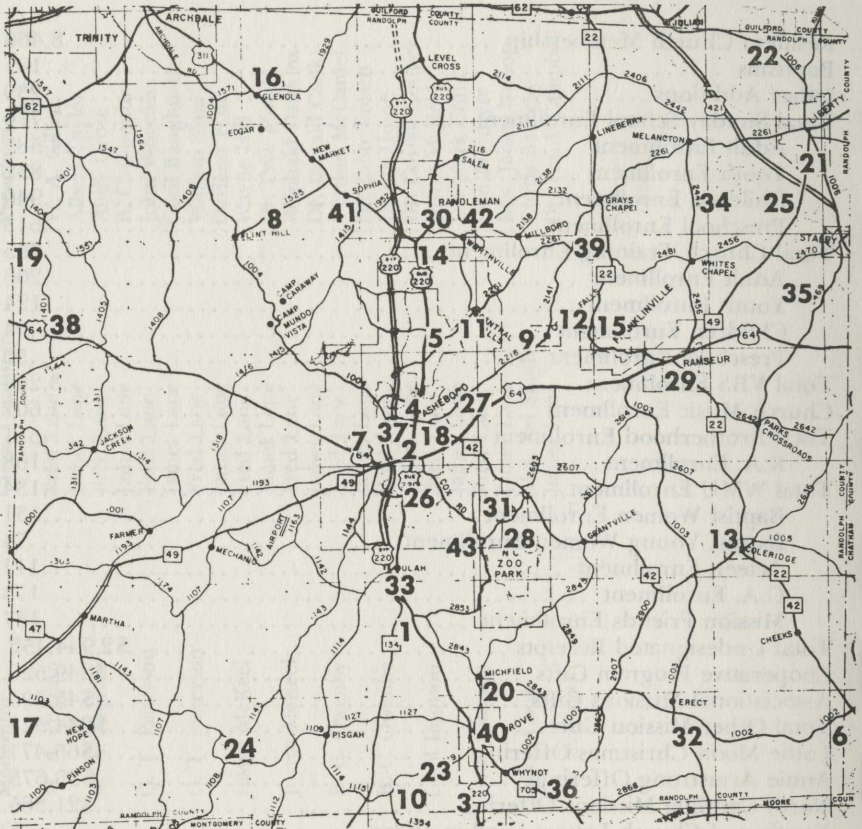

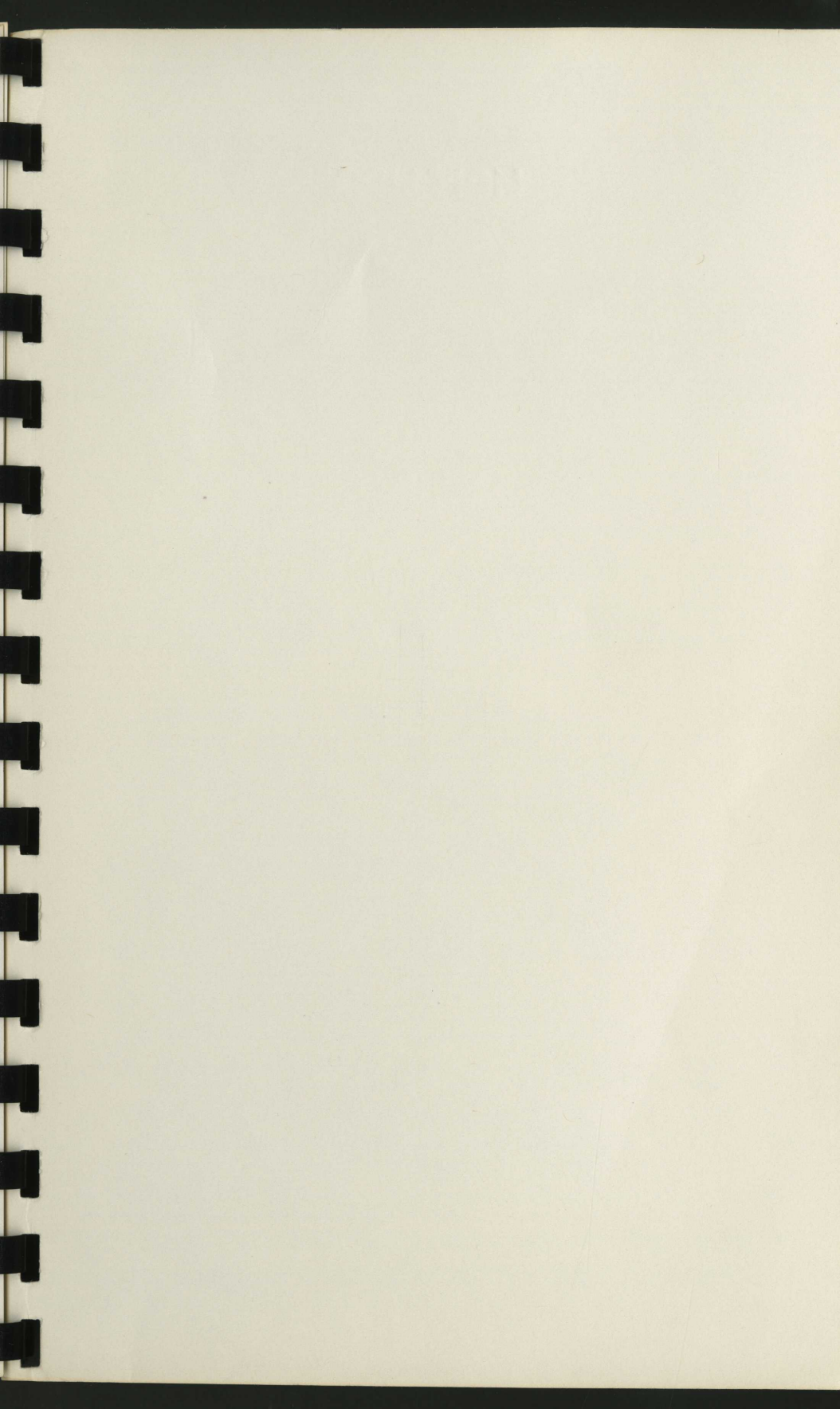

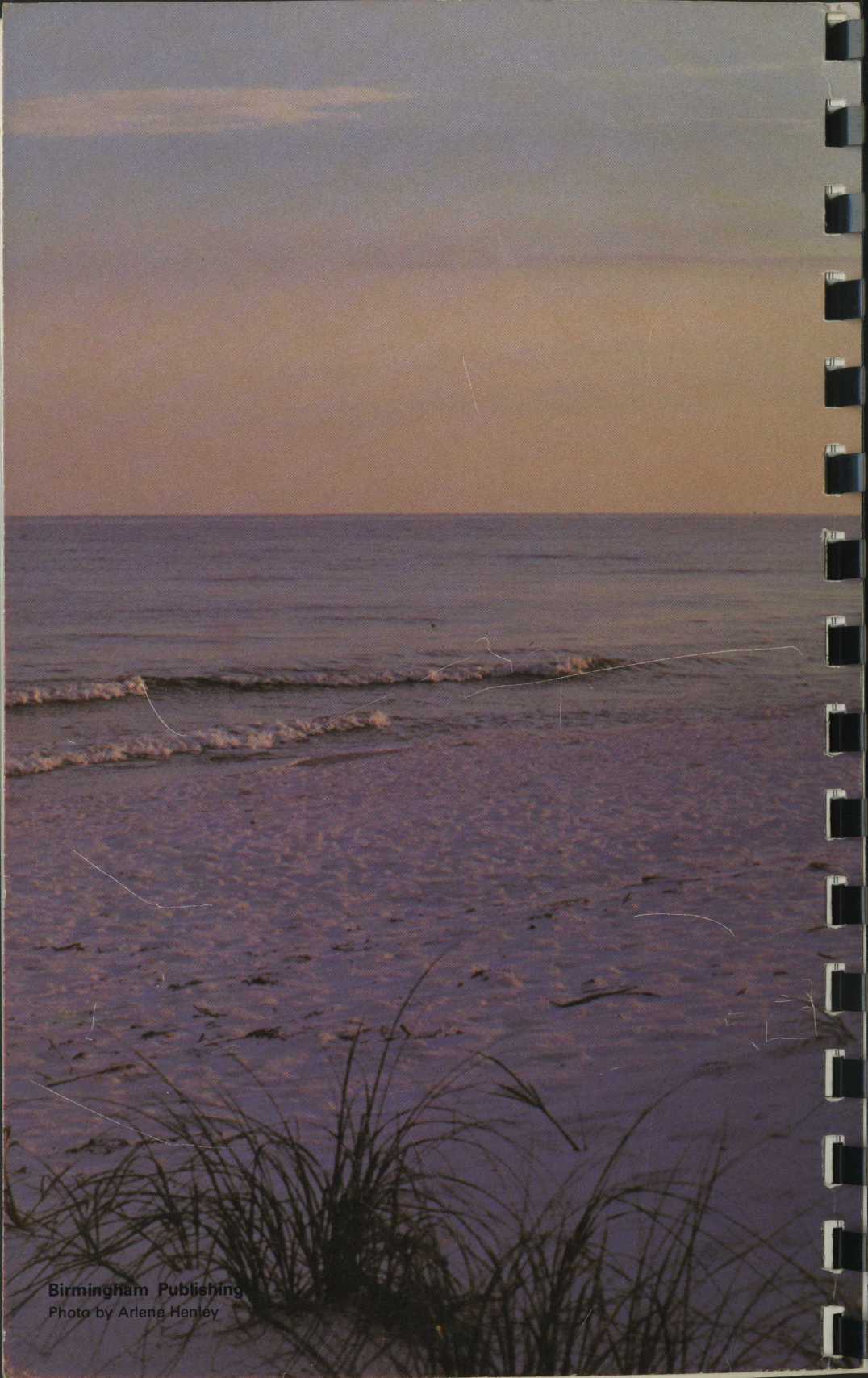
