

TRUSTEES GRANT TENURE AND SABBATICALS

Our Board of Trustees in annual meeting last week, voted Thursday to grant tenure to Drs. Robert E. Poerschke, professor of Christian Education, and Donald D. Moore, associate professor of Pastoral Care. The election of Dr. John W. Carlton as Professor of Preaching was confirmed and invitations to Drs. Theodore F. Adams and I. N. Patterson to serve next year as visiting professors were approved.

The Board also approved sabbatical leave for Dr. E. Luther Comeland, professor of Missions, and Dr. John I. Durham, associate professor of Old Testament Interpretation. Next year Dr. Copeland plans to study at the University of Chicago, and Dr. Durham hopes to spend the year in Heidelberg and Oxford.

In further action, the Board confirmed the affiliation of the Seminary with the American Academic Institutions in the Consortium of Schools at the Hebrew Union College Biblical and Archaeological School in Jerusalem.

The establishment of the Emery B. Denny Endowment Fund and the Larry Love Memorial Scholarship Endowment Fund were authorized. by the Board which also voted to name our Library for Emery B. Denny, former Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of North Carolina and present member of our Board of Trustees, and to name the Chapel for President Olin T. Binkley.

7--A look at the "Landmakk sellout" in Chapel, where we now have a pastor of a local church to administer Communion. Even Dr. Adams can't administer Communion. --Bob Clyde

FACING THE WORST AND BELIEVING THE BEST

The three speakers in last week's Missions Conference could hardly be called harbingers of unrestrained enthusiasm for the possibilities of the Christian Church to be a vital force in the future of man's messed-up world. Indeed, a common theme running through the thoughts of all three was the desperateness of our situation in which the Church continues to grow more unfaithful to its mission while the society at large continues to misunderstand the terrific problems with which a relentlessly modern world confronts it. Each of these men, George Webber, Brother Frank, and Walker Knight, was courageous and uncompromising in pointing out the monstrous failings of the Church as it grows ever more hypocritical and indulgent of the inauthentic lives of its members. And each of the men was cold-eyed and perceptive in pointing out the massive failures of society to deal with the burgeoning problems of dehumanization and apathetic self-centeredness.

But for the the unrelenting realism of these men in demonstrating every reason for despire about the future of the Church and the world, they were wonderfully unwilling to take final refuge in despire. Each man in a unique way demonstrated also the one reason he has for believing that the future is bright rather than dark, and that reason is that Jesus Christ has already conquered the limitless problems presented by the world of men. These three Christian gentlemen take ultimate refuge in the assurance taat God will take care of the larger course of history in his own way; and that they can but do their own part, however small, to make God's love a continuing reality to some of the men in this world. They recognize that by realistic standards of human judgement it is absurd to hope for a better future in this world, but they also have grasped a vision of the significance of the single Christian life which can be lived as an unshakably certain mission and ministry to whatever part of the world it is in.

The Christian pauses before each of the scenes of Christ's suffering on the road to Calvary and on the Cross and offers a prayer of his own or one like the following by St. Francis of Assisi:

O innocent Jesus, I have sinned and I am guilty of eternal death; but that I may live, Thou dost gladly accept the unjust sentence of death. For whom then shall I henceforth live if not for Thee, my Lord? If I desire to please men, I can not be Thy servant. Let me, therefore, rather displease the whole world than not please Thee, O Jesus!
