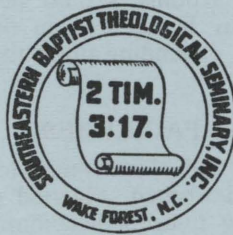

REGISTRATION

FIRST TERM—Monday, June 11, 1973. Classes will meet four days each week, Tuesday through Friday, beginning Tuesday, June 12. Two courses may be taken. Four semester hours credit may be earned in four weeks. Matriculation and schedule changing close June 13, 4:30 p.m.

SECOND TERM—Monday, July 9, 1973. Classes will meet four days each week, Tuesday through Friday, beginning Tuesday, July 10. Two courses may be taken. Four semester hours credit may be earned in four weeks. Matriculation and schedule changing close July 11, 4:30 p.m.

COSTS

Fees \$20.00 per term. Rooms \$20.00 per term. Meals, approximately \$2.50 per day, may be secured in the cafeteria. The cost of books and supplies varies, depending upon the course taken.

FACILITIES

Air-conditioned library and classroom. Modern dormitory facilities are available for men and women. Married couples should write the Business Office concerning housing accommodations for the summer session.

RECREATION

Golf, Tennis, Swimming, Gymnasium. The town of Wake Forest operates a modern swimming pool. A nine-hole golf course within walking distance of the campus is available for a modest fee. The Seminary gymnasium will be open. Tennis courts are also available.

CURRICULUM

FIRST TERM, June 11-July 6, 1973

A course in elementary Hebrew, designed for beginners in the Hebrew Old Testament, will meet three hours each day throughout the two terms and will enable the student to earn six semester hours in Hebrew.

The student who does not take the course in Hebrew may enroll in two courses and earn four semester hours each term.

The student who elects to take M 366s the second term may earn five semester hours. Classes for this course will begin on July 9.

B 115s BIBLICAL HEBREW

Mr. Durham

An introduction to the fundamentals of classical Hebrew with primary emphasis on the strong verb and basic vocabulary.

(In the summer of 1973 the course will feature principles and methods of "church extension" as an implementation of the Christian mission in the city. Staff personnel of the Church Extension Department of the Home Mission Board, Southern Baptist Convention, will serve as resource persons.)
