Pickup (Flag) Football games on the old football field near Rankin court have so far produced only a few casualties. Please read especially the Appleby bulletin

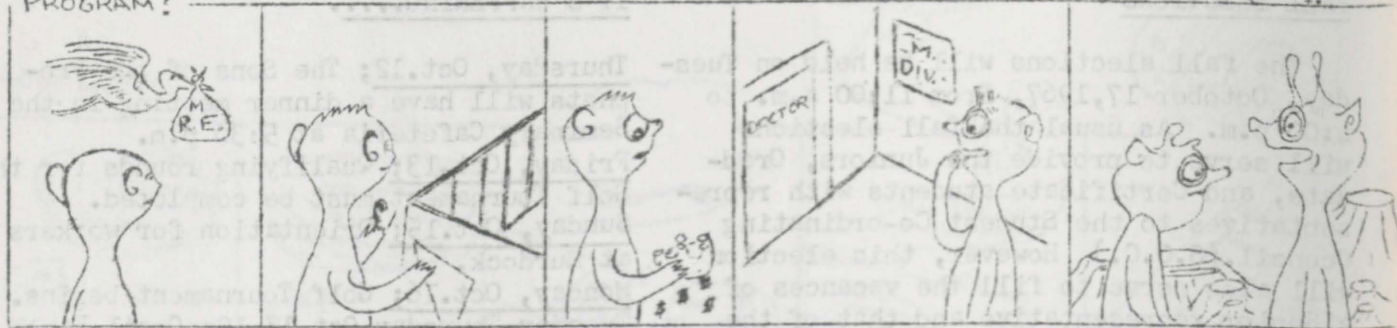

 relation to this campus, the S.C.C. is one

 concerns and channeling our energies and
 opportunities for ministry toward mean-
 ingful fulfillment. The S.C.C. finds its pur-
 pose in serving in an advisory capacity in
 promoting the general welfare of all stu-
 dents and in stimulating participation in
 those campus and off-campus activities
 which are vital for the spiritual, social,
 mental, and physical well-being of every
 student.

Most of us are honestly too busy to
 reach such goals by ourselves, so for our
 mutual benefit we choose a fellow citizen
 who is willing to serve on our S.C.C.
 Regretfully, the voter turnout in past
 elections on this campus has been inexcus-
 able. Those elected have been done so by
 a minority of the enrolled students. Like

 majority. Both affirmative and negative

votes for the Honor Code Amendment last
