CONSTITUTION

(Revisions: August 16, 1957, August 16, 1975, August 18, 1978)

ARTICLE I Name

The name of the body shall be the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II Objectives

The purpose of the Association is to be a fellowship of churches on mission in our setting. The specific objectives of the Association are as follows:

1. To promote harmony, understanding and spiritual power between the churches.
2. To afford and promote a larger fellowship of Christians in the work of Christ.
3. To provide such programs, projects and organizations as will strengthen the churches and assist them in achieving their goals and objectives.
4. To discover needs which cannot be met effectively by churches individually, and to coordinate the use of resources in meeting these needs.
5. To encourage support by every church for the mission causes of the Association, the North Carolina Baptist Convention, and the Southern Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE III Authority

Section 1. The Association shall have the power to elect and install its officers in whatever manner the body may deem expedient.

Section 2. The Association shall have power to recommend measures of usefulness and guidance to our churches in matters of organizations, ordinations and questions of doctrines and discipline.

Section 3. The Association shall have no power to infringe upon the right of the local churches as sovereign and independent bodies.

ARTICLE IV Membership

Section 1. The Association shall be composed of regularly constituted Baptist churches in cooperating fellowship with the Southern Baptist Convention and following the teachings of the New Testament.

Section 2. The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership and may receive or reject churches applying for membership therein at its pleasure. Churches applying for membership shall agree to come under the watch care of the Association for one year. It is understood that during this period of watch care the church shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the Association.

Applications for membership should be presented to the Credential Committee of the Association. It is suggested that any church under watch care participate in the missions program of the Association. At the end of the year the church may be voted in as a member of the Association with full privileges

by a 2/3 vote of the messengers present and voting at the regular meeting of the Association, provided that the church submit an acceptable letter and at least one messenger be present at the meeting.

Section 3. The Association may withdraw from any church which has become unscriptural in its doctrine or practices by a 2/3 majority vote of the messengers present and voting at the annual meeting.

Such vote is to be taken by written ballot.

Section 4. Any church may withdraw from the Association at its pleasure. Such action will be recognized by the Association at the next annual meeting.

Section 5. It shall be the duty of each church to furnish the Associational clerk, before each annual session, an annual letter, the forms provided by the Associational clerk, giving the information requested as is applicable to each church situation.

ARTICLE V Meetings

Section 1. The Association should hold its annual sessions on Thursday and Friday preceding the third Sunday in August. Special meetings may be called by the Executive Board provided two weeks written notice is given to the member churches.

Section 2. Each church shall be entitled to be represented at the annual meeting by four messengers. Churches with more than 100 members shall be entitled to an additional messenger for each additional 50 members or fraction thereof and not to exceed ten messengers from any one church.

Section 3. In case of internal dissension in a church and two parties coming to the Association, each claiming to represent the church; neither party shall be seated until the question is decided as to which party is in union with the Association. The decision is to be made by a majority of the messengers present and voting.

ARTICLE VI Officers

Section 1. General Officers of the Association shall be: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Parliamentarian. Program leaders shall be: Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Director of Deacons, Director of Evangelism, Director of Continuing Education, Chairman of the Missions Committee, Director of Associational Missions and such other officers as the Association may desire to elect.

Association representatives will be elected for the following institutions and agencies: Truett Camp (2), Baptist Children's Homes, Baptist Hospital, Homes for the Aging, Baptist Literature (Biblical Recorder), Cooperative Program, Other Representatives (such as the American Bible Society, Annuity Board, Baptist Foundation, etc.) may be added as deemed appropriate and properly elected.

Section 2. With the exception of the Director of Associational Missions the term of office for all officers of the Association shall be for one year with the privilege of continuing reelection. The Moderator and Vice-Moderator shall not be eligible for reelection but one year in succession.

Each term of office shall begin with the close of the Annual session with the exception of the treasurer who will serve from October 1 through September 31 (the financial year).

Section 3. Director of Associational Missions shall be sought and recommended by the Executive Committee in a manner of its own choosing. Within 30 days after locating a nominee, the Executive Committee shall present the name of the Director nominee to a called meeting of the Association. If the Annual Meeting of the Association is scheduled within sixty days, the presentation shall wait until that time.

The call shall be indefinite. The salary, allowance, vacation, etc., shall be as provided by the current budget or adjustments recommended by the Executive Committee in consultation with the Finance Committee.

Concerning termination of employment, the resignation shall be in writing and presented to the Executive Committee at least thirty days before it is to take place. The Executive Committee may terminate employment by giving thirty days notice in advance.

The Executive Committee shall give full supervision and guidance to the work of the Director of Missions in planning, promoting and financing his work.

ARTICLE VII Duties of Officers

Section 1. The MODERATOR shall preside and maintain the order of business of all meetings of the Association and Executive Committee. He shall serve as ex-officio member of all committees of the Association.

He shall appoint the Committee on Committees and all other committees pertinent to the operation of the body not named by the Committee on Committees in its regular report.

Section 2. The VICE MODERATOR shall assist the Moderator and shall preside in the absence of, or at the pleasure of the Moderator.

Section 3. The CLERK shall keep a complete and accurate record of all transactions; shall prepare a book of reports to be distributed to messengers at the beginning of each day's session of the annual meeting; and shall cause to be printed minutes concerning the records made.

The clerk shall mail to the clerk of each church in the Association, blanks for the preparation of the church letter as soon as they are received from the State Convention office. This form is to be returned to the clerk of the Association not later than two weeks prior to the meeting of the body.

Section 4. The TREASURER shall receive and disperse by the order of the Executive Committee or the Association while in session, the money of the treasury and make a complete report to the Association at each session.

Section 5. The HISTORIAN shall keep the records of the Association up to date.

Section 6. The PARLIAMENTARIAN shall upon the request of the presiding officer or the body advise and assist the Association with respect to all matters involving parliamentary procedure.

Section 7. The PROGRAM LEADERS AND THE INSTITUTIONAL/AGENCY REPRESENTATIVES shall perform all duties customary to their titles and shall make a written report to the annual session of the Association.

Section 8. The DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS shall work closely with the Associational committees, officers, and churches in such a way as to facilitate the meeting of the objectives of the Association as set forth in Article II.

The Director shall serve as ex-officio member of all committees of the Association. The Director shall communicate with the State and Southern Conventions such information as shall be mutually helpful and needful.

ARTICLE VIII Rules of Order

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to Roberts Parliamentary Practice or in a manner not contrary thereto.

ARTICLE IX Quorum

The Annual Associational quorum shall be not less than 25 of the member churches represented.

ARTICLE X The Executive Committee Association

Section 1. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the general officers and program leaders elected by the Association and the pastors and one member from each church in the Association. No pastor, by virtue of his being an Associational officer or program leader shall be disqualified as a member of the Executive Committee, from representing the church or churches he may be serving in the Association. Twelve of these members shall constitute a quorum.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to act for the Association on matters arising when the Association is not in session and to make a report of all work to the next session of the Association. This body shall meet at a time and place designated by the moderator on Monday following the first Sunday of each quarter.

Section 3. All vacancies occurring on committees or among elected officers shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE XI Associational Committees

Section 1. The Association shall have such standing committees as may be deemed necessary to promote efficiently the work of the Master in our midst. The term of office for all committee members shall be for one year except where specifically stated otherwise.

Section 2. The COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES shall be appointed by the Moderator at the first Executive Board Meeting of the Associational year. There shall be three members.

It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate at the annual meeting the following committees: Nominating, Credentials, Place and Preacher, Memorials, Finance, Constitution, Ordination, Evangelism, Missions.

Section 3. The NOMINATING COMMITTEE shall be composed of five members. To this group the Directors of Sunday School, Church Training, Women's Missionary Union, Brotherhood and Music Ministry will be added.

It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate the officers, Program Leaders and Institutional/Agency Representatives. These nominees shall be notified in writing not less than one month prior to presenting of their names at the Annual session.

Section 4. The ORDER OF BUSINESS COMMITTEE, composed of three members, shall plan the annual program of the Association and present it to the Executive Committee at its July meeting.

Section 5. The CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three Pastors and two laymen. It shall examine applications of churches seeking admission into the Association in keeping with Article IV, and make recommendations to the Association.

It shall counsel with churches that are out of harmony or fellowship with the Association.

Section 6. The PLACE AND PREACHER COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members. The duties of this committee shall be to recommend the place or places for the following annual meeting and to recommend the preacher and alternate to deliver the annual sermon for the following year.

Section 7. The RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members. It shall be the duty of this committee to bring a report to the Annual Meeting of those listed by the member churches as deceased since the last Annual meeting and shall lead in a memorial service in their memory.

Section 9. The FINANCE COMMITTEE shall be composed of six members including the Treasurer of the Association. This committee shall:

- a. Present a budget to the Association for the following year.
- b. Devise plans for raising the funds for the Association budget.
- c. Audit the finances and financial records of the Association twice annually and anytime there is a change of Treasurer or at the direction of the Association or the Executive Committee.
- d. Report all audits to the Annual Association Meeting.

Section 10. The CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members and shall perform all duties specified in Article XIV.

Section 11. The ORDINATION COMMITTEE shall be composed of five designated pastors and all other pastors who desire to sit with the committee.

- a. The committee serves in an advisory capacity only and serves at the request of the church from which one of the members is seeking ordination.
- b. The committee should examine such candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the Gospel Ministry and make such recommendations to the church as they feel led.
- c. The committee should assist in arranging the proper service of ordination when such assistance is requested.
- d. The Executive Committee should be informed regularly of the work of the Committee.

e. Each church desiring to ordain a candidate is urged to consult with the Committee, and shall give two weeks notice in which the Committee is to do its work.

Section 12. The EVANGELISM COMMITTEE

The duties of the committee shall be to direct and promote a perpetual program and spirit of evangelism in the Association. It shall arrange and direct all Association wide evangelistic activities.

Section 13. The MISSIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of six members, two named each year and serving for a three year term. Committee members are eligible to be re-elected for one additional term of office in succession. The Associational Brotherhood Director and Woman's Missionary Union Director are to serve as ex-officio members along with the Director of Missions and Moderator.

The duties of the Missions Committee shall be: To plan, conduct and evaluate the mission program of the Association through:

- a. Helping churches commit themselves to being on mission in their setting.

- b. Provide and interpret information on mission needs to the churches of the Association.
- c. To survey the mission needs to be found within the Association.
- d. Assist churches in doing mission work.
- e. Conduct the kinds of mission work that individual churches cannot successfully conduct.

ARTICLE XII The Associational Council

The Associational Council shall be composed of the Director of Missions, the Moderator, the Vice Moderator, the Program Leaders (Sunday School, Church Training, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, the Chairmen of Deacons) the chairman of the Evangelism Committee, the Chairman of Missions Committee, the Chairman of the Finance Committee. The Director of Missions is to serve as Chairman and a secretary shall be elected from the group.

The purpose of the Council is to co-ordinate the planning of the various programs of the Association, to develop an Associational calendar, and to give mutual support to the various organizations and program units in carrying out their assignments.

The Council shall meet quarterly.

ARTICLE XIII The Associational Pastor's Conference

The Associational Pastor's Conference provides regular meetings for the Baptist ministers of the Association. The purpose of the conference is for fellowship and mutual support, for doctrinal and professional discussion and for promotion of church, associational and other denominational programs. The conference is not an administrative or executive body.

ARTICLE XIV Amendments

The Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the Association by a two-thirds majority of the messengers present and voting, provided the amendment has been presented to the Constitutional Committee at least 30 days prior to the annual meeting and presented to the Association in printed form on the first day of the annual meeting to be voted on the second day.

Thursday, August 17, 1978

Buff Creek Baptist Church

The one hundred forty-ninth annual session of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association convened in the Buff Creek Baptist Church at 6:30 pm Thursday, August 17, 1978. The Moderator, Wesley Hooper, called the meeting to order and presided throughout the session. The congregation sang a hymn, directed by Mary Bennett, Director of Music for the Association. The Reverend Max Smith, Pastor of the Buff Creek Baptist Church, gave the devotional. Wesley Hooper welcomed the 137 messengers, 20 pastors and 3 visitors to the meeting. There were 31 of the 48 churches in the Association represented.

Special thanks were expressed to the Buff Creek members for the meal preceding the meeting.

The following business was transacted:

1. A motion was made that the BOOK OF REPORTS be adopted. The motion passed.

The Moderator expressed appreciation for the BOOK OF REPORTS. The Reverend Robert Blanton moved that an honorarium be given the Association Clerk as an expression of appreciation for the work done on the BOOK OF REPORTS. The motion passed.

2. The new pastors to the Association attending this session were recognized as follows: Kenneth Fugate, Pastor of Hamburg Church; J. C. Robinson, Pastor at the Lovedale Church; Ray Houston, Pastor at Hyatts Chapel; and Dillard Moore, Rockdale.

3. Pastors having relocated in the Association this year recognized, were: Eddie Stillwell moved to Old Savannah; Hardin Nicholson to Balsam, and Paul Carden to Jarrett Memorial.

Other changes have been made but these pastors were not present at the meeting.

4. The Reverend Jay Gilbert, a General Missionary to the Cherokees, and a representative of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina brought greetings and told something of his work among the Indians.

5. Calvin Knight spoke for the Baptist Hospital. He related testimonies from people who had received treatment at the Hospital and have spoken of its wonderful physical and spiritual healing powers. He urged the churches to continue their monetary and prayer support to this institution of healing.

6. Organizational reports of the departments in the Association were spoken to. These reports are included in these minutes. The reports given were:

W M U by Annie Hoyle

Training Union by Ray McCall

Sunday School and Vacation Bible School by Max Smith

Deacons Organization by Conrad Burrell in the absence of Lee Ensley. The Deacons organization was referred to as the most active organization in the Association with its excellent programs and well attended meetings.

7. J. D. Grant, chairman of the Constitution Committee, handed out copies of the revised Constitution. He called special attention to the changes made in the

Missions Committee and the addition of the Associational Council. He recognized the Constitution Committee members.

He urged the messengers to study the Constitution revision before it has to be voted on.

8. Alvin A. Loiry, Jr., called attention to September 17 as a special State Missions Day for the ingathering of funds. He urged all interpreters to contact the churches assigned to them.

9. Mary Bennett sang a special number - "Speak to My Heart." She was accompanied on the piano by Mildred Cowan.

10. The Reverend Harry Vance brought an informative and inspiring message using as his topic "Strengthening the Arms of the Church So It Can Reach Out." The scripture was taken from Revelations 1:10-11 and Revelations 20:1-7.

The first session adjourned following the message.

August 18, 1978

Yellow Mountain Baptist Church

11. Yellow Mountain Baptist Church hosted the second session of the Annual Association Meeting. The Reverend Wesley Hooper, Moderator, called the meeting into session at 9:30. The Reverend Billy Rogers, pastor of the church, brought a devotional using Matthew 9:36 as the text. Eddie Stillwell prayed the prayer.

12. Woodrow Hill, representative for the Biblical Recorder, spoke for the Recorder. He stated that Thomas Meredith started this publication to help keep the people informed about Baptist work in the state. Today over 20,000 Baptist are still being informed of Baptist happenings through its pages. He believes that those people who are best informed are the ones most involved in Baptist life.

13. Tom Clayton brought the report for the Baptist Children's Homes in North Carolina. This is the last year that a special Thanksgiving offering for the homes will be received. A goal of a million dollars has been set for this year's Thanksgiving Offering in order that there will be sufficient funds to carry the Homes over until the Cooperative Program plan takes over.

Giving through Wills was encouraged.

14. Carson Floyd told of the desperate need for Emergency Care Centers in this area of the state. At present Forest City has the only Emergency Care Center near us. There are only 7 Foster Care Homes available for 17 counties. The Broyhill Home can care for only 60 children. This home does not take any child under six years of age. There is an urgent need for both types of child care.

The Area Conference is scheduled for September 7 at the Broyhill Home. This is an opportunity to visit the home and see exactly how the children are cared for.

15. Ralph Cannon spoke for the Homes for the Aging. There are now six in North Carolina.

16. The Christian Action League reported that there was an urgent need for money to use in fighting cause against alcohol. Churches are urged to include in their budget money for this cause.

17. Joe Medford brought greetings from the Baptist Schools of Higher Education. At present there are 160 ministerial students enrolled at Garner Webb College. A large percentage of our Foreign Missionaries come directly out of our Baptist schools.

He explained how any church could secure a singing group or an evangelistic team to work in your church. If you desire these services, just call Mr. Freeman and tell him your needs.

18. J. D. Grant presented the revised Constitution, copies of which had been distributed at the first session of the Annual meeting. He explained that the revised Constitution represented an improvement rather than a great change. With the correction of two minor sentence structure changes the Constitution was adopted as presented. J. D. Grant made the motion that the revised Constitution with the suggested changes be accepted. The motion was seconded by Harry Vance. The motion passed and the revised Constitution adopted.

19. The Reverend Cecil Saunders of the Mount Pleasant Baptist Church brought the morning message using as his text, scripture from Acts.

20. The Reverend John Bunn of the Sylva First Baptist Church gave the Benediction and Grace for the luncheon.

21. The afternoon part of the second session was opened with the singing of "We Will Work Til Jesus Comes." The Reverend Kenneth Fugate, Pastor of the Hamburg Church, gave the Devotional using scripture from Jonah 3:1-5.

22. Eddie Stillwell, pastor of the Old Savannah Baptist Church and Chairman of the Credentials Committee, gave the report for that committee.

23. Harry Vance, Treasurer, gave the treasurer's report. He requested that the Treasurer's Books be audited twice each year. Vance moved that the Director of Missions salary be raised an additional 10. This motion was seconded by J. D. Grant. The motion passed. The question as to the effective date of the salary increase was referred to the Executive Committee.

24. Annie Hoyle, Association Clerk, gave a report on the Church Letters and read a list of the Church Clerks who had qualified for the CHURCH CLERKS HONOR PAGE. These names and the churches they represent are listed in this book of minutes.

25. Moderator, Wesley Hooper reported the wishes of the Oak Ridge Church to withdraw from the Association. Harry Vance moved that the request of the Oak Ridge Church for withdrawal from the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association be recognized. The motion was seconded by Eddie Stillwell. The motion passed.

26. Hardin Nicholson proposed that a full page ad protesting the sale of liquor by the drink be run in the Sylva Herald. This was made into the form of a motion, seconded and passed.

27. Conrad Burrell suggested that churches might want to send some financial aid to the Charlotte churches to assist them in their fight against the alcoholic issue.

28. Director of Missions, Alvin A. Loiry, Jr., reminded the messenger of the important day - September 17 as the day set aside for the State Mission ingathering day. He again urged the interpreters to make contact with their assigned churches. Director Loiry will remain in his office on that afternoon to receive calls on the amount given by each church for this cause.

29. The Time, Place and Preacher report stated that the Association would be in Annual session on Thursday, August 16, 1979 at the Balsam Grove Baptist Church with the Reverend Billy Rogers bringing the message. On Friday,

August 17, 1979, the meeting will be held at the Pine Creek Baptist Church with the Reverend Raymond Shuler as preacher.

30. Conrad Burrell presented the Nominating Committee report and asked for nominations from the floor. None were given. He moved that the slate of officers as presented be adopted. This motion was seconded by J. C. Robinson. The motion passed.

31. The Moderator reported 55 messengers, 9 visitors, and 15 pastors present, representing 22 of the 48 churches in the Association.

32. The one hundred forty-ninth session was brought to a close with a memorial for our deceased members led by Annie Hoyle and assisted by Mildred Cowan, Kathleen Buchanan and Julia Sherman.

ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

YEAR OF CONTRASTS

The year 1977 was one of contrasts for the Annuity Board.

While the Board grew markedly in new retirement and insurance account, investment earnings, suffered due to poor stock market performance.

The year also represented a period of strong demands which resulted from servicing needs of new accounts.

Key statistics in 1977 included:

1. A permanent 8.33 per cent increase in most annuitants checks.
 2. A total of \$19,085,316 paid in retirement and protection benefits.
 3. The enrollment of 545 new churches in the basic retirement plan.
- Plan A members increased from 27,598 in 1976 to 29,142 in 1977. Enrollment in Plan B rose from 25,412 to 33,062, but Plan C's membership dipped from 5,987 to 4,885.

In North Carolina as of March 31, 1978, 3,387 staff members of 2,257 churches and associations are participating in the Southern Baptist Retirement Program.

In the Tuckaseegee Association 18 churches and 22 staff members are participating in the retirement program. The Association is also participating for their Director.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES FOR THE AGING

Stop! Look! and Listen! This warning sign at our railroad crossings is a life-saver and should be observed strictly by all who drive, walk, or run. It is good for us to "stop, look and listen", as we get a clearer picture of the various ministries and work of the institutions and agencies of our Baptist State Convention.

North Carolina Baptists have Homes for the Aging at:

1. RESTHAVEN, located in Winston-Salem, with space for 16.
2. THE HAYES HOME and the NURSING CARE UNIT, in Winston-Salem with space for 46 residents, and 79 patients. The Nursing Care Unit serves all five of our Homes.

There is also a duplex apartment complex at the site of the Hayes Home with space for 120 people.

3. THE ALBERMARLE HOME, in Albermarle has space for 30.
4. THE HAMILTON HOME, in Hamilton, has space for 28.
5. THE YANCEYVILLE HOME, in Yanceyville, has space for 31.
6. THE WESTERN NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOME in Asheville, has space for 50 residents. This Home is now under construction.

This means that there will be accommodations for 300 people in all our six Baptist Homes, the apartment complex, and the Nursing Care Unit, when the Western North Carolina Baptist Home, in Asheville is completed.

Our Baptist Homes for the Aging have received vital support from our more than 300 Baptist churches through two vital sources:

1. The Cooperative Program, which supplies about 8 of our total budget.

2. The Special Offering which supplies 16 of our total budget.

These gifts are used to supplement the care of the majority of the residents in our Baptist Homes and are a life-line, therefore, to residents who could not possibly pay the cost of care, if it were not for these gifts.

The February, 1978 offering for the Baptist Homes was the last Special Offering, we are greatly concerned that our churches and our people continue, in an ever increasing manner, their loyal support for the Homes.

Also, of great concern is the fact that we are scheduled to open the Western North Carolina Baptist Home around February 15, 1979, to accommodate 50 additional people, prior to the September, 1979 State Missions Offering and no additional per cent of the Cooperative Program dollar. It is estimated that we will need an additional \$100,000. to operate the Western North Carolina Baptist Home. From whence shall this come? We believe that it will come from our Baptist people. If we trust in the Lord for our needs, and pull together, in meeting the 1979 State Missions goal of \$2,000,000, that we will give more through the Cooperative Program for all of our Baptist work and causes.

The growing edge of our national and state population is in the area of the aging. Let us join in prayer for those aging persons.

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES OF NORTH CAROLINA REPORT

The programs, services and facilities of the Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina are being utilized well for the care of children and in providing assistance to families that need our help. North Carolina Baptists and friends continue to support this ministry through personal involvement, prayer and financial support. It is the purpose of the Homes to provide quality care and to be worthy of the faith and confidence of our many friends and supporters.

Requests are coming to the Homes from various sections of the state for additional community-based services (such as, emergency care and group homes). This is a wholesome trend in child care. Children can best be served and families strengthened when care can best be provided reasonably close to a child's home. Our homes have been moving in that direction for several years. We will respond to additional requests for programs and services as financial resources permit.

North Carolina Baptists have reason to be pleased with work that is currently in progress in Western North Carolina. Broyhill Home, foster home services, emergency care at Forest City, Maternity care in Asheville, programs of crisis intervention, counseling and family education fill a particular need in this area of our State.

We are in constant need of well qualified staff. This is particularly true of cottage parents and foster home parents. Join us in prayer that God will impress upon sufficient numbers of prospective workers that child care is a Christian vocation and that it affords wonderful opportunities for service.

We are deeply grateful for support of the Children's Homes which comes from our churches through the Cooperative Program, special gifts and the traditional Thanksgiving offering.

The forthcoming Thanksgiving offering is extremely important. This will be the last time that our people will have the challenge of making an over-and-above love offering to the Children's Homes at Thanksgiving time. As a part of the Bold Missions thrust, the Thanksgiving offering for the Children's Homes in 1979 will become a part of the North Carolina Baptist State Missions offering to be received each September thereafter.

To bridge the transitional gap next year, our trustees have set a goal of \$1,000,000 (one million dollars) through the 1978 Thanksgiving offering. We are dependent upon our friends for financial support sufficient to carry on this ministry.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

Baptist Hospital continues to find ways of enlarging and of improving its care for patients.

During the past year, the Department of Family Medicine moved into new quarters. It is anticipated that with the larger area, the Family Practice Center will provide primary health care for more than 5,000 families by 1980. Also, the teaching program for resident Physicians in Family Medicine will increase to 8 positions by 1980. Many of these physicians are expected to enter family practice in North Carolina.

Other improvements in patient care include the installation of a whole-body scanner and the opening of new and larger facilities for the Intensive Care and Intermediate Nurseries. The body scanner is particularly useful in locating and defining problems such as tumors in the chest, abdomen and pelvic areas; in determining the spread of disease from one organ to another; and visualizing aneurysms in the abdomen. The new nurseries have already played a significant role in reducing the infant death rate and in improving the chances of premature babies growing up without lasting effects from earlier medical problems.

Creation of a new Department of Patient Relation and the employment of a full-time director has also helped to improve the quality of patient care. The primary function of this department is to respond to specific concerns patients have regarding their hospital care and act in behalf of patients and their families in resolving problems and meeting needs.

A closed-circuit television system will soon be carrying services from the hospital chapel, other devotional programs and educational programs. The equipment was purchased with funds from the estate of Miss Olivia Hall who worked for Baptist Hospital for nearly a half century.

The Department of Pastoral Care continues to make a significant contribution to patient care as well as in clinical pastoral education, counseling and enrichment events. During recent months the department has begun another

satellite center; this fourth satellite is in Charlotte and is operated in cooperation with the Mecklenburg Baptist Association. In April of this year, the Counseling Center received accreditation by the American Association of Pastoral Counselors.

In recent months, the Medical Center Challenge Program completed a successful fund campaign, over-subscribing its \$18 million goal. The final project in this program will be the replacement of the original hospital building, opened in 1923, with a new Focus Building which is scheduled for completion in 1980.

It warms our hearts and fills us with a stronger feeling of security to learn that our Baptist Hospital is so concerned with care for people. This care as you can see is not limited to the physical area but includes the spiritual, social and emotional which are so basic to the physical well being. We are indeed grateful for the men and women who are so dedicated and so spirit filled over the needs of people that they are continually seeking and searching for ways to improve services.

Many of our Tuckasegee Association people have sought care in our Baptist Hospital during the past year. All praise the services and care they received. The following list indicates how our Association helped this year:

Does the RECORDER pay? A few weeks ago the leading 50 churches in the state in Cooperative Program giving were listed in the BIBLICAL RECORDER. Everyone of them has a RECORDER club, many of them with the RECORDER in the budget.

Then there was a list of the churches with the best per capita giving to the Cooperative Program. Again, 49 out of 50 of these churches have a good RECORDER club. In fact, the 50th church had a club up until recently and you can be sure the folks at the RECORDER will be working hard to see that the church has another club soon.

All of this is strong testimony as to what the RECORDER can do for a church. When people are informed, they give. When people are informed, they support their association and state convention work. Everyone wins when the RECORDER goes into every home.

As of this date, the price of the RECORDER is remaining reasonable, especially when compared to the cost of a daily paper. A church can still send the RECORDER into every home for only 6 cents a week. This is amazing in view of the continued rise in the cost of postage and paper, both of which went up sharply this year. If your church has plans to put the RECORDER in the budget, it should do so this year and thus save considerable money.

With the dripping wet news media in North Carolina, our Baptist people must depend on the RECORDER for information about such matters as liquor by the drink. Even though it passed the legislature back in June, local option elections must be held before any city or county can vote in this third dimension in drinking.

Woodrow W. Hill, assistant editor and field representative for the past seven years, reached retirement age this past year but has agreed to continue to help the RECORDER in associations and churches. He is loved by people all over the state and we are glad that he will continue to be identified with the RECORDER when needed for special assignments.

EVANGELISM REPORT

A significant goal in Bold Missions is to encourage every church to double baptisms by 1982 or sooner. Christians need to lead unsaved persons to make genuine commitments to Christ and to guide them in their spiritual develop-

ment. Pastors and church leaders can use the notebook - BOLD EVANGELISM THROUGH THE LOCAL CHURCH to plan and develop an ongoing program of evangelism.

"The Evangelistic Church on Bold Mission" was the theme of the 32nd Statewide Evangelism Conference at the War Memorial Auditorium, Greensboro, during February 6-7, 1978. Evangelistic speakers challenged about 2,400 pastors and lay persons to involve church members in bold evangelism.

Over 900 youth and adults attended the largest Youth Ministry Week during July 3-8 at the North Carolina Baptist Assembly. All persons participated in specific witness training sessions.

About 12,500 youth, pastors, and adult leaders were expected for the 8th Statewide Youth Evangelism Night - August 18 - at Greensboro Coliseum.

Churches are encouraged to become more involved in Renewal Evangelism.

Youth Evangelism Strategy can help Associations and churches train their youth in witnessing to the unsaved and in personal discipleship. Also, "YES" equips adults to work with youth in evangelism.

The 33rd Statewide Evangelism Conference will be held at Cumberland County Memorial Auditorium, Fayetteville, on February 5-6, 1979.

A few churches in our association take their youth to the Statewide Youth Evangelism Night each year. Other churches are encouraged to pick up on this.

Many THANKS go to our pastors and our churches for the fine cooperation in the Association Wide Revival with Brother Bill Chapman and Brother Pat Roper.

**REPORT OF THE HOSPITAL CHAPLAIN
C. J. HARRIS COMMUNITY HOSPITAL**

The voluntary cooperation of thirty-two churches, one institution and six persons made possible the ministry of your hospital chaplain during the year July 1, 1977 - June 30, 1978. The Jackson County Minister's Association supervises the Chaplaincy Program through the following Committee: Jack Hinson, Chairman, Mrs. John Parris, Dan Ward, Bob Reese, James Kelly, and Don Morgan. The Chaplaincy Committee meets monthly with the Chaplain present.

Two items of the Chaplaincy Program deserve special mention:

(1) Devotional services twice a week in the Prayer Room for the Hospital staff, employees, visitors and patients. All are not free to come at any given time. The attendance has been very gratifying.

(2) The establishment of a "Chaplaincy Foundation for the purpose of receiving donations or contributions from any person, firm, corporation or association, the monies so contributed to remain in said foundation and the interest and/or dividends earned on the monies contributed to said foundation to be used by said ministerial association for the purpose of operating and maintaining the Chaplaincy Program" at the C. J. Harris Community Hospital of Sylva.

4311 patients passed through the hospital from July 1977 to June 30, 1978. This is an average of 359 patients a month. Do we wonder that Jesus said, "In as much as you have done it unto one of the least of these (the sick) my brethren, you have done it unto me"? What a challenge! What a stewardship to give an account for!

In the light of a Christ commanded ministry, do we need to be urged to give through our church budgets each month, by special offerings or a gift to the C. J. Harris Community Hospital of Sylva, North Carolina, Incorporated, Chaplaincy Foundation?

MISSIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

The Missions Committee under the chairmanship of the Reverend Douglas McFadin met on a regular quarterly basis in an effort to plan and promote Associational activities. The meetings were generally well attended.

In December 1977 a recommendation to postpone the School of Missions was presented to the Executive Committee. Plans for the School of Missions were cancelled for the present.

An appeal for office equipment for the Association office resulted in an electric typewriter being donated by the young people's Sunday School class of the Hyatts Chapel Baptist Church. Six new folding chairs were purchased.

High Attendance Sunday for Sunday Schools was set for October 30, 1977.

The Committee recommended participation in the Associational Leadership Conference at Ridgecrest with a follow through conference in the Association on June 5, 1978. Most of the leaders of the Association departments attended the Ridgecrest conference and then conducted these conferences in the Association on June 5th. The Association conference was held in the Sylva First Church. Two of the leaders assisted the Macon Association with their conference.

Plans and a recommendation for the organization of an Associational Council with a reduction in the membership of the Missions Committee was presented to the Executive Committee. Such a plan will necessitate a change in the Constitution. This change will be voted on in the annual meeting in August 1978. If such a change is made the Missions Committee will be charged with the responsibility of looking after missions in the association while the Council would assume the business matters that were formerly part of the responsibility of the Missions Committee.

The Missions Committee recommended the acceptance of the transfer of the Annuity Board SBC insurance for the Director of Missions from the Home Mission Board to the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association. This was an additional cost of \$50.00 per month for the Association.

The County Wide Evangelistic Crusade was supported through the Missions Committee. The Reverend C. H. Green was the Chairman of the Evangelistic Committee.

Reverend McFadin moved from the Association in July 1978.

STATE MISSIONS REPORT

The Baptist State Convention of North Carolina is composed of 3,452 autonomous Baptist churches coming together to promote missions, evangelism, church growth, education and social services. The Convention was founded for missions. It is held together because of missions. Its future depends on a continuing commitment to missions.

A major program of the State Convention is direct missions ministries. These programs lengthen the churches' ministry across the state, representing you in areas where your church cannot serve. Missions ministries include Deaf Ministries, Resort Missions, Student Missions, Chaplaincy and Language Missions, Christian Social Ministries, Inter-racial Ministries and others. In all there are some fifty types of mission ministries carried on through the State Convention.

State Missions is supported by the Cooperative Program and the annual State Missions Offering, September 17. This special offering is similar to the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for Foreign Missions.

The 1977 State Mission offering was Phase 1. It literally "opened the door" to Bold Missions by raising almost one million dollars. Although this was short of our goal, it was a 25 increase over the 1976 offering. We raised enough money to pay several debts as well as support ongoing ministries, saving an estimated \$218,000 in interest alone.

The 1978 State Missions Offering is Phase 11 in our debt retirement program. Last year we began the job. This year we must finish it. Of the \$1,200,000 goal, \$930,500 is to complete our debt retirement.

This is indeed a Bold step, but we can do it. Tuckaseegee Baptist Association will have a vital part in reaching this goal. In the very near future a representative will be visiting each church in the association to explain the program and to offer assistance in helping to inform the people. Let us join our fellow North Carolina Baptists in "Entering the Door for Bold Service." Joshua 24:15,...we will serve the Lord."

VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL REPORT

The following persons served on the VBS faculty for the Association this past year: Max Smith, Director; Alvin A. Loiry, Jr., Adult; John Reid, Youth; Christine Loiry, Older Children; Mary Bennett, Middle Children; Annie Hoyle, Younger Children; Louella Brown, Older Pre-school; Joyce Alexander, Middle Pre-school; and Douglas McFadin, Mission VBS and Backyard Bible Club.

We had almost 100 of the faculty present at the State VBS Clinic at Ridgecrest on March 9 & 10. Although the weather was cold and foggy, the clinic was warm and inspiring.

The Association held a VBS Mini-Clinic at the Lovedale Baptist Church on April 17th. There were 27 persons attending this clinic which was mainly for directors, associate directors, and pastors. The main clinic for VBS was held at the Lovedale Baptist Church on May 8th with 83 persons present. The

following churches were represented with the number enrolled from each: Balsam 6; Buff Creek 11; Cullowhee 5; East Fork 3; Hamburg 12; Jarrett Memorial 2; Little Savannah 6; Lovedale 6; Mt. Pleasant 1; New Hope 1; Ochre Hill 3; Old Savannah 4; Scotts Creek 3; Shoal Creek 3; Speedwell 6; Webster 3; Zion Hill 5; Rockdale 3. There were 18 churches represented and this enrollment included 8 pastors. At the writing of this report many churches in our Association had had VBS and some were in session.

A summary report for VBS in North Carolina for 1977 indicates that there were 2,911 church schools, 122 mission schools (almost 60 increase over 1976), and 140 Backyard Bible Clubs. There was a total enrollment of 277,973. There were 2,902 professions of faith. There was a total offering for missions of \$97,061. From these schools there were 37,472 prospects discovered for our churches.

VBS is a great means of reaching boys and girls with the gospel of Jesus Christ and of conserving and enriching their lives for His service.

THE PROPOSED BUDGET 1978-1979

The Apostle Paul in writing to the Corinthians in 1 Corinthians 9 emphasized the importance of God's people supporting the ministry. From the terms and examples he used, it appears that that support is not to be skimpy but rather lavish.

He said, "Who goeth a warfare anytime at his own charges? Who planteth a vineyard, and eateth not of the fruit thereof? Or who feedeth a flock, and eateth not of the milk of the flock?" Again he reminded his readers that Moses commanded that the oxen that threshed the wheat not be muzzled. Jesus said, "The laborer is worthy of his hire."

Your finance committee feels that the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association would rather be noted as a group of churches that is willing to do their best toward those whom they employ rather than to be noted as an Association of Baptist Churches that pay as little as they can get by with.

With these things in mind, we propose the 1978-1979 Associational Budget. This budget reflects some changes. There is a little less than a six percent raise proposed for the Director of Missions. This is shown in the housing allowance to give him the best possible tax break.

The Deacons, Baptist Men and W M U have been taken from the budget because they have their own treasurers. The Bible Conference budget has been

removed because that area has been largely a failure for the last couple of years. We have added a music department item in hopes of encouraging the development of music in the Association.

Actually we have a reduced budget from the 1977-1978 one. This is not a signal for our churches to slow up giving to our work; for we need to look forward to the day when we can have our own house and offices. We need to look forward to the day when we can offer assistance in training church leadership. After all Jesus said to begin our mission effort at Jerusalem, the home base of Christian Missions.
