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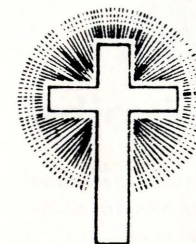

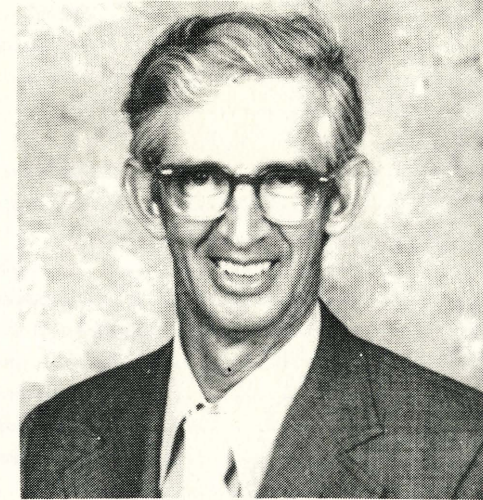

Dedication

The Tuckasegee Baptist Association dedicates the minutes of 1982 to the Reverend Wesley Hooper, a pastor for 36 years in this and adjoining associations. During these years he has been the Shepherd of several flocks in Macon, Swain and Jackson counties. A quiet but effective pastor, he thinks deeply and speaks wisely. Gentle and kind, he deals patiently with obstacles and problems that obstruct his path. He is dedicated to the work for which God called him. Once he set his foot in the path to which he felt called to follow, he never strayed into more attractive and more remunerative "by ways." He frequently felt the need to supplement his earning from his pastoring with secular jobs in which he lived a witnessing life. In fulfilling his duties in these secular jobs he "preached"; for those working with and under his direction were fully aware of his convictions and of his close contact with his God and Saviour. His fellow workers never had reason to doubt the sincerity of his calling. He walked straight in the eyes of his followers. Always sensitive to the needs of people he is ever ready to serve had been known to volunteer for services in fields when he fully realized that the very best he could do would be to "sow seeds" that might yield a rich harvest for those who would follow him. For the past 36 years he has served faithfully, earnestly, sincerely, quietly and effectively as God's man.

At the age of 23 he was ordained in the Zion Hill Baptist Church. Incidentally, Zion Hill was the last church he served as pastor before leaving the Tuckasegee Baptist Association. He is married to Gladys Davis Hooper and they have two sons and two daughters. Both sons are following in the footsteps of their father. One, Dennis, is now serving as an interim pastor and studying at Southwestern Seminary, where he is preparing for work as a foreign missionary. Davis, the younger son, is at present serving as a supply pastor in Macon County. The two daughters are married. Janie is a teacher in Haywood County and Karen a homemaker.

Proceedings

Thursday, August 12, 1982

The one hundred fifty-third annual session of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association began its annual session with a fellowship dinner at the East Fork Baptist Church. Approximately 150 messengers, visitors and pastors enjoyed the delicious food served at 5:30 p.m. by the ladies of the church.

At 6:30 the Reverend Johnny Enloe called the business session to order. The Reverend Deitz, pastor of the East Fork Church, brought a welcome and gave the devotion from I Peter, chapter 4. The devotional was followed by the congregational singing of "Wherever He Leads Me."

At this point the Reverend Ray McCall, moderator, arrived and took over the presiding officers' chair. Reverend McCall called for a standing vote in appreciation for the meal served. The following business was conducted:

1. A motion made to accept the Book of Reports was made and carried.
2. A motion made to adopt the Order of Business with the addition of a section for miscellaneous business carried.
3. The new pastors were asked to stand and to introduce themselves. The following pastors stood and gave the name of the church they were serving: Harold Hughes, Buff Creek; Robert Blanton, Deitz Memorial; Robert Christopher, Hamburg; Joe Coker, Lovedale; Melvin Snyder, Lumberton; Mike Farnner, Rockdale; S.J. Waters, Shoal Creek; Roger Stewman, Speedwell; Sherril Ammons, Tilley Creek; Steve Webb, Unity; Edwin Bryson, Yellow Mountain; Eddie Stillwell, Zion Hill; Kenneth Crawford, Interim at New Savannah; and Carl Smith, Pine Creek. Of this number only Hughes, Christopher, Coker, Snyder, Waters, Ammons, Webb and Bryson are new to the association. Others had made changes in church locations this year.

4. The director of missions, John Reid, was asked to give his report. The report is recorded in the minutes. 5. Organizational reports were given as recorded. These reports appear in the minutes unless otherwise indicated.

- a. W.M.U. This report was given by Mildred Cowan, chairperson of the associational W.M.U.s in the association. She rejoiced over the increase in the number of organizations and in the membership increase. There are good prospects for at least three more organizations within the year.
- b. Church Training. Report given by Joe Coker, director.
- c. Deacons-Pastors. Report given by Lincoln Shuler; prepared by Alice Cabe.
- d. Sunday School. Report presented by Burdette Robinson. He requested an update on all Sunday School Directors.
- e. Vacation Bible School. Report given by Linda Turrentine, director. She presented Certificates of Recognition to those V.B.S. that had turned in reports in time.
- f. Missions Committee. Presented by Kathleen Buchanan, Cahair Person.
- g. Committee on Committees. Report given by Robert Blanton in the absence of the chairman. He suggested that the name of Eddie Pittman be added as the Assistant Sunday School Director.
- h. Evangelism Committee. The chairman was absent. Dillard Moore made a motion that only preachers, ministers and pastors be permitted to serve on the Evangelism Committee. The motion did *not* pass.
- i. Finance Committee. Presented by Mike Moore, chairman of the committee. The budget for the year 1982-1983 was presented and accepted.

John Bunn called attention to the director of missions salary and pointed out the pitfall that might occur unless a cost of living expense was added.

Motion: Made by Bunn, that the salary of the director of missions be increase by seven percent. Seconded.

Amendment of Motion: That the increase be distributed in the budget as the director of missions desired.

Both the amendment and the motion *passed*.

Joe Medford's name was added to the Finance Committee.

- j. Treasurers Report. Harry Vance presented the Financial Report. It was accepted as presented. John Hyatt moved that the treasurer's report be accepted and included in the order of business.

The motion passed.

The moderator, Ray McCall, called for a standing vote of appreciation for the good work done by Harry Vance.

The moderator expressed thanks to all the churches who had contributed to the building fund.

6. Report from the General Board. The Reverend Robert Blanton had recently been appointed to the General Board. He has already attended two meetings and is looking forward to the meeting at Camp Carraway in September. His report is recorded in the report section of the minutes.

7. Constitution Committee. John Hyatt passed out copies of the proposed changes in the Constitution. He called attention to and explained each item that was being proposed for change. He encouraged the messengers to study these changes and be prepared to vote on them at the morning meeting on August 13.

8. Miscellaneous Business.

- a. The Hospital Chaplaincy report was given by John Reid in the absence of the chaplain, Frank Anderson, who was ill. The report was accepted and will be included in these minutes.
- b. John Reid presented to the association a flag which had been made by Mrs. David Blackney and Mrs. Patrick Correll. This flag is to become the flag for the association. Harry Vance moved that the flag be accepted and that a letter of thanks be sent to those who made it. Motion passed.

9. Coy Deitz led the congregation in singing "Praise Him."

10. The message of the evening was brought by the Reverend Trenton Connelly of the Cashiers Church. The title of his message was "Why Should We Stand and Gaze." The message was based on the scripture found in Acts 1.

11. The conference adjourned at 9:45 p.m. to convene on Friday, August 13 at the Deitz Memorial Church.

August 13, 1982

The second session of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association convened on Friday, August 13 at 9:15 with the Reverend Johnny Enloe, vice moderator presiding.

12. The welcome and devotional were brought by the Reverend George Tuthill. Wayne Collins read the scripture from John 3:16.

13. Harry Vance led the congregation in singing "Amazing Grace." This was followed by a solo by Harry.

14. The following reports were presented and are recorded in these minutes:

d. Baptist Hospital. Given by Calvin Knight. He announced that Henry Stokes of the Historical Foundation encouraged all churches to have their histories microfilmed.

e. Baptist Children's Homes. Reported by Luther Osment.

f. Truett Camp. Reported by Tom Lolley,

g. State Convention Representative. George Shore brought a special greeting from Cecil Ray.

h. Baptist Student Union. Report by Joe David Fore.

i. Christian Action League. No report.

j. Ordination. No report.

k. Annuity Board. Reported by Garland Hindrix.

15. Time, Place Preacher: Presented by Johnny Enloe

16. Digest of Letters. Reported by Annie Hoyle.

17. Miscellaneous Business

a. John Hyatt presented the proposed constitutional changes. He moved that the proposed changes be adopted. Motion carried.

These changes are indicated in the Constitution with an asterisk.

b. Bunn moved that if at the end of the year, there was a surplus of more than \$3,000.00 in the budget at the close of the full financial year that the director of missions be given a seven percent raise at one time. Motion carried.

c. John Reid encouraged the churches to begin giving regular monthly contributions to the building fund in order that we would get away from borrowing and pay our debt.

d. Hardin Nicholson moved, that if we do not have the money to pay for the amount due on the principle and interest in September that we take the monies from the excess in the General Fund for this payment only. Motion carried.

e. Sue Fitzgerald, from Mars Hill College, announced September 11 as R.A. and G.A. day on the campus of Mars Hill.

d. Kenneth Crawford presented the moderator of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association with a gavel made from wood from the old Truett home. The gavel was accepted by Johnny Enloe incoming moderator for the association.

e. John Reid announced that each fourth Friday in the month had been designated Day of Prayer. Everyone is invited to come by for prayer during that day. From 12:15 - 12:45 has been set aside especially for those who work to come for prayer.

f. Harry Vance requested that two lights be placed on the outside of the Baptist Building to discourage night prowlers.

g. Moderator Enloe expressed thanks to the visitors for coming and sharing information with the conference.

18. Memorial. The memorial was given by Annie Hoyle with the assistance of Jack Hinson on "The Book of Life" in memory of the 81 persons who had deceased during the year.

19. Message. The Reverend George Tuthill, pastor of Jarrett Memorial Baptist Church, brought the message concerning, "How Much of Our Life is Spent on the Church."

20. Challenging Closing Remarks were made by the moderator, Johnny Enloe urging all the churches and members to work together edifying and lifting each other up. He declared the one hundred fifty-third Tuckaseegee Baptist Association meeting closed.

21. Eddie Stillwell gave the benediction and blessing after which the members of the conference enjoyed a delicious luncheon served by the ladies of the Jarrett Memorial Baptist Church.

Baptist Children's Homes

The purpose of the Baptist Children's Homes is the care of dependent, neglected and homeless children; unwed mothers and their children; and the rendering of related services to their relatives.

The mountain tradition for children is abundantly evident in the Western Area program of our Baptist Children's Homes. Our Baptist friends in the west continue to undergird our ministry in a very fine way and in this time of inflation are increasingly dependent upon this support. Our Western units of ministry - Broyhill Baptist Children's Home at Clyde, Haywood Emergency Care Cottage at Clyde, Thermal Belt Youth Shelter at Forest City, the Maternity Home in Asheville - all continue to operate at near capacity levels.

The fastest growing phase of our ministry is that of emergency care. In these centers located at Clyde and Forest City we can take a child in at a moment's notice from a desperate circumstance and keep that child for up to nine days while a more long term placement can be arranged. The tumultuous state of our society causes these homes to operate almost constantly at capacity levels.

The Maternity Home in Asheville continues to be one of our most blessed ministries. So many girls come to us feeling that life is virtually ended for them and there through Christian love and care they find resources to begin again with new purposes and new hope.

Of course, Broyhill Baptist Children's Home remains the focal point of our work in the western part of the state. In each of our five cottages, up to 12 children are cared for. These children often come from very difficult circumstances with many needs.

The real heroes of this ministry are the houseparents who live on a day by day basis with these boys and girls. We are in the process of now completing an "off duty" cottage for these houseparents where they can stay with their own children during those days they are free from their campus responsibilities.

The John Johnson Chapel on the Broyhill campus has been completed and is being well used by the Children's home family and area church groups as well. Be assured that the welcome mat is always out for your group to visit us whenever you have the opportunity.

We are especially anxious to welcome you for our area conference, Thursday, September 9. Campus tours will begin at 4:00 p.m. with supper served at 5:30 with the outdoor chapel program to follow.

Baptist Foundation, Inc.

When it was chartered in 1920, the North Carolina Baptist Foundation was charged with the responsibility of promoting the making of gifts, receiving and managing the gifts, and distributing the income earned from the investment of those gifts to the objects and causes specified by their donors. The charter further provided that those designated causes should be any and all objects and causes of the "Missionary Baptist denomination."

Today, the purpose remains the same. Baptist Foundation is the only agency of the Baptist State Convention which receives gifts for all Baptist causes: the colleges, universities and seminaries, Baptist Homes and Children's Homes, Baptist Hospital and the school of medicine, churches and associations, Foreign and Home Mission Boards, special mission offerings, Cooperative Programs, and all other concerns of Baptists.

During 1981, new trusts were created and old trusts had additions which together totaled \$855,991.00 bringing the assets in all trusts to almost five million dollars. (Real estate is stated in the assets at the value when given, which in on the books at approximately 2.4 million dollars less than the current market value.)

Through the trusts created prior to 1981, investments earned \$418,529.70 during 1981 for distribution to beneficiaries named by the trust donors. During the years of the Foundation's existence, the sum of \$2,610,299.00 has been distributed to all beneficiaries of trusts held by the Foundation, all according to the instructions provided by the donors.

The objective and future plans of the Foundation are summarized in a brief phrase - promoting mission support through estate stewardship. Through conferences and seminars, through counseling with individuals and speaking to church groups, the Foundation will continue to support North Carolina Baptists in their effort to become better managers and stewards of their material possessions. Through its role as trustee agency, the Foundation will serve North Carolina Baptists by enabling them to enjoy Christian stewardship in its fullest sense - even after death.

Baptist Hospital

Believing that North Carolina Baptists have a right and a responsibility to know as much as possible about their institutions, we submit the following information on the Baptist Hospital in the hope that it will be of some interest and help.

With 673 beds in use, the hospital admitted 23,350 patients during the past year and provided a total of 210,000 days of patient care. There were 63,381 additional visits to the hospital's outpatient clinics and the emergency room. These patients come from other countries to receive the specialized hospital care which our institution offers.

Many of these patients received traditional types of hospital and medical care, but others benefited from new procedures: (1) a new method of delivering anti-cancer drugs by means of an "infusion pump," which is implanted in the patient somewhat like a pacemaker for heart patients. For many patients this has proven to be a more effective and more convenient form of chemotherapy. (2) A new type of x ray film.

effective and more convenient form of chemotherapy. (2) A new type of x ray called "digital radiography," used principally for examination of blood vessels, which virtually eliminates expensive and cumbersome x ray film. This method uses less radiation and requires dye than standard angiography. It also requires less time and can usually be done on an out patient basis. It is expected that this method can eventually be used in many areas of the body where x rays are required. (3) A new type of dialysis for patients with kidney disease called "continuous ambulatory peritoneal dialysis," which involves leaving a special fluid within the peritoneal cavity for several hours while impurities (normally removed by the kidney) are taken from the blood. This type of dialysis not only frees the patient from dependence on a machine but it is also less expensive than the more conventional forms of dialysis.

The Pastoral Care Department continues to provide a pastoral ministry to both inpatients and outpatients and to their families. During the past year, chaplains made a total of 48,209 visits with patients. They provided 923 "oncall ministries" and led 262 worship services in Davis Chapel. The Pastoral Counseling Division provided 8,684 hours of counseling for 855 persons. A total of 63 students were enrolled in various levels of clinical-pastoral education. The Winston-Salem center and also the satellites in Fayetteville, Raleigh, Morganton, and Charlotte all continued to experience growth both in the types of services provided as well as in the number of people served.

During the year, our hospital again received a two-year approval by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals.

Despite many economic pressures, our hospital continues to operate in the black. It has recently adopted a budget for the new fiscal year which for the first time exceeds \$1,000,000,000.00.

Gifts from churches during the past year through the Cooperative Program amounted to \$479,997.00 and through the North Carolina Missions Offering and designated gifts totalled \$345,765.00. We are grateful to the churches and their members for this continuing fine financial support.

It has not been an easy year for the *Biblical Recorder*, primarily because mailing costs increased 160 percent, from \$2,500.00 a week to \$6,500.00 a week. Another increase may come this fall. The *Recorder* has been through hard times before and will make it this time, thanks to the continuing support of North Carolina Baptists.

Please remember the new *Recorder* editor and his family. As his schedule permits, he will be speaking in churches and in associational meetings. He wants to know more about our state and these appearances will help him. Remember him in your prayers as he undertakes this difficult and demanding job.

Report of Hospital Chaplain

August 1, 1981 - July 31, 1982

Four thousand six hundred ninety-five (4,695) patients passed through the C.J. Harris Community Hospital from August 1, 1981 to July 31, 1982. This is an average of 391 patients per month. Here were 4,695 opportunities for the Christian churches of Jackson County, through their Chaplain, to minister the compassion of our loving heavenly Father.

The voluntary cooperation of 27 churches and five individuals made possible this ministry. They gave \$5,561.66. This is the highest income for the Chaplaincy Program during the past seven years. It was \$966.66 more than the preceding year, for which we are most grateful. What a privilege it is to know that we share in some measure in those words of Jesus, "Inasmuch as you have done it unto one of the least of these (the sick) my brethren you have done it unto me."

Three items of the Chaplaincy Program deserve special mention: 1. The Chaplaincy Foundation: In 1979 the Foundation was established to secure the ongoing ministry of the chaplaincy. A \$30,000.00 goal was adopted - the monies so contributed by persons, firms, corporations, or memorials are to remain in the Foundation and the interest and/or dividends earned on the monies so contributed to be used for the current Chaplaincy Program. The Hospital Board of Trustees has the responsibility of investing the funds of the Foundation. To date \$16,750.00 has been given in monies and stocks.

2. Hospital Chaplaincy Library: A grant of \$2,000.00 from the Percy B. Ferebee Foundation has made it possible to provide a library for our patients. It is in the initial stages of preparation.

3. Closed Circuit Television: July 18, 1981 we had our first devotional service for our patients. It takes place every Sunday, 9:00 a.m. The chaplain, in person or by audio tape, brings a message which is televised to each room, preceded and closed with sacred music. The television equipment was made possible by a \$4,400.00 gift from Mr. and Mrs. Paul Turbeville, Florida friends of the chaplain. Many of the patients have expressed their appreciation for this ministry.

What a challenge! What a privilege! What a stewardship for which to give an account! More time and service is needed to adequately meet the spiritual needs of our patients.

Christian Higher Education

CALLING THE ROLL

North Carolina Baptists have founded and continue to support seven colleges and universities. (This number is second only to Texas, which sponsors eight Baptist schools.) What are the names of the North Carolina Baptist colleges, and where are they located? Perhaps calling the roll will prove helpful. Imagining a map of the state and reading from left to right, the Baptist colleges are:

Mars Hill, in the mountains 18 miles north of Asheville, in the town of Mars Hill. Gardner Webb, in the town of Boiling Springs, nine miles from Shelby and not far from the South Carolina border. Wingate, 20 miles east of Charlotte, in the town of Wingate, also near the South Carolina line. Wake Forest in the centrally located city of Winston-Salem. Meredith, in the capital city of Raleigh. Campbell, 30 miles south of Raleigh in the town of Buies Creek. Chowan, in the northeast town of Murfreesboro, and not far from the Virginia state line.

LOOKING INSIDE

During the 1981-82 school year, there were 15,798 students and 1,768 faculty and staff comprising the human side of the seven schools. Foreign students numbered 234 from 57 countries and territories from Australia to Zimbabwe. North Carolina Baptist college students are preparing for a variety of vocations, for example: church-related vocations, 665; teaching, 1,314; medicine (including nursing), 1,329; law, 961; social work, 384. Approximately 9,700 of the students received financial aid. The seven colleges have practiced the ministry of Christian education for a cumulative total of 757 years. These colleges are proud of their Baptist heritage and are wanting to be effective missions partners with the churches.

SERVING THE CHURCHES

The business of Baptist colleges is the education of young people. This is the primary service provided by the colleges to the churches. The college presidents have asked that the churches -- pastors and lay people alike -- help them by pointing young people from the churches toward Baptist colleges. Often there are Baptist youth who would prefer a Baptist college, but who fail to apply out of the belief that they cannot afford the cost. It is often the case that a person can attend a Baptist school as inexpensively sometimes more inexpensively, depending upon the aid available - as he or she can attend a state institution.

GRATITUDE

For students, for generous support through the Cooperative Program and for a meaningful place in the great mission to the world, your Baptist colleges are grateful.

Director of Missions Report

I have completed six months as Director of Missions for the association. I want to take this opportunity to express my appreciation to the churches of the association for their interest and support. I have high praise for the officers and committees of this association who have done their work well during this past year. Several churches have been without pastors and I have been doing some pulpit supply for them. Historical Report

1981 - 1982

Time marches on and leaves in its wake happenings, changes and improvements, many are never recorded and are subsequently lost in the eons of time. Thus it is with church history. Individual churches have their own history and these make the

history of the association. Perhaps the biggest and most important event of the year for the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association was the completion of the Baptist Building as a home for the association. Nestled on a beautiful knoll belonging to the Lovedale Baptist Church the building is the pride and joy of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association. It is located on the spot of the old Lovedale Church. This new building was dedicated to the Glory of God and the use of man on May 17, 1982. On that day people from over Jackson County and the association came to see the structure that was to become "home" of the 48 Baptist churches in the association. They heard messages from Dr. Cecile Ray, executive secretary of the North Carolina Baptist Convention; the Reverend Tom Lolley, area missionary for this region, and our local leadership including our director of missions, John Reid. This year marked the one hundred fifty-third since the beginning of the association. The dream of a Baptist Building had been a vision of the people from the early days, then it became vision and on this day in May, 1982 it became a reality.

The program and the speeches given on that Sunday afternoon are recorded in an illustrated scrapbook kept by Conrad Burrell and presented to the association. The building was constructed for the sum of approximately \$60,000.00. Much local labor and materials were given free. The association borrowed \$28,000.00, The Reverend George Kenneth Crawford guided the construction work. Though not yet completely furnished, the building has begun to serve the 48 congregations of the association.

Not only did the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association have a "home" but it also had a new director of missions in the Reverend John Reid. John took over the leadership of the association in February, 1982. He came to the directorship from the pastorate of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Church to replace Alvin Loiry who had resigned in June, 1981.

The Balsam Baptist Church with the Reverend Hardin Nicholson as pastor celebrated on September 13, 1981, with a note burning after having paid off all debts on the property.

God's word encourages us to be in close fellowship with one another. Two churches: Buff Creek and Long Branch set the state for doing that. The Buff Creek Church purchased land and constructed a beautiful fellowship hall near the church. The Long Branch Church completed its fellowship hall. The Old Savannah Church remodeled its fellowship hall and installed new storm windows.

Remodeling jobs reported were the improvements made at the Cullowhee Baptist Church in the remodeling of a men's bathroom, the installation of a guard rail in the balcony in the sanctuary, the landscaping of the church grounds and the erection of an out-of-door chapel. The chapel is being given by the family of the late Margie Hughes in her memory.

The East Fork Baptist Church celebrated its one hundredth anniversary on June 21, 1982. A large congregation, consisting of friends, former members and pastors gathered to celebrate this memorable occasion. Speakers helped bring into focus the history of former years and the buildings that have housed this fellowship. The present building is a lovely brick structure set in a beautiful setting with well kept grounds surrounding it. The well kept physical appearance of the building and its surroundings depict the love and concern of the fellowship for its church building.

Several churches ordained or licensed men who had been called by God to enter into His service of ministry. A list of these with the churches are listed in these annual minutes.

Many churches in the association held their annual homecoming and decoration days. Usually such events mean dinner on the ground with plenty of food and wholesome fellowship.

With these reports of events the history of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association

closes the covers of its history book for the one hundred fifty-third year of the association and opens the new book finding empty pages on which to enscribe its one hundred fifty-fourth historical events.

One of the main objectives will be to lead churches and individual members to make a new commitment to reaching the lost and unchurched of our area, state, nation and world. One of the primary goals of the Southern Baptist Convention is to enroll 8.5 million persons in the study of God's Word through the Sunday School by September 30, 1985. On the state level the goal is 855,000 enrolled by this date. The emphasis this year is on "Growing - the year of Sunday School and New Units."

Through our commitment to Christ we become dedicated to *reaching people*. This can be effectively done by challenging each church in our association to develop and report Sunday School enrollment goals. Each church is encouraged to take this challenge seriously as part of carrying forth the cause of Christ in our association. Associational leaders have unofficially set a goal for Sunday School enrollment in our association at 5560 by September 30, 1983. This figure reflects a 10 percent increase over 1980 Sunday School enrollment.

Work in the area of Sunday School among the churches in our association is currently being reorganized. The current Sunday School Director was enlisted this spring and attended the state Key Leadership Conference at Ridgecrest on May 10-12, 1982.

The director is in the process of enlisting an ASSIST team (Associational Sunday School Improvement Support Team). When in place it will be available to aid any church with upbuilding of their Sunday School organization.

There will be two associational Sunday School events in September. On September 11 there will be training sessions for all preschool and children's workers. Plans are also being made for our associational Sunday School Leadership Night to be held September 14, 1982. This will be an important meeting to prepare all churches for Sunday School Preparation Week (September 26-October 3) and the new Sunday School year. Sunday High Attendance day will be October 24.

Let us commit ourselves to strong, growing and winning Sunday Schools in our association this year.

Others helping were Jeanne and Dwayne Collins and our associational missionary, John Reid.

The team decided to concentrate its efforts on one general clinic, hoping to reach more people and more churches. The reports coming into the associational office at the time of this writing indicate a large number being enrolled with souls being won to Christ.

Thanks to all those who spent so many hours working in V.B.S. in 1982. Yes, it was worth it!

Our work has only just begun. Let us labor in love to forward the cause of Christ remembering that it is He who made us not we ourselves.

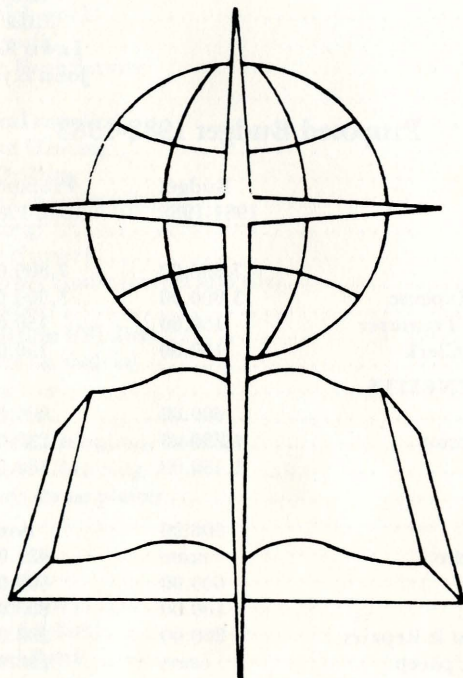

Constitution

(Revisions: August 16, 1957; August 16, 1975; August 19, 1978;
August 17, 1979; August 15, 1980; August 13, 1982.)

ARTICLE I — NAME

The name of the body shall be the Tuckasegee Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II — OBJECTIVES

The purpose of the association is to be a fellowship of churches on mission in our setting. The specific objectives of the association are as follows:

1. To promote harmony, understanding and spiritual power between the churches.
2. To afford and promote a larger fellowship of Christians in the work of Christ.
3. To provide such programs, projects and organizations as will strengthen the churches and assist them in achieving their goals and objectives.
4. To discover needs which cannot be met effectively by churches individually, and to coordinate the use of resources in meeting these needs.
5. To encourage support by every church for the mission causes of the association, the North Carolina Baptist Convention, and the Southern Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE III — AUTHORITY

SECTION 1. The association shall have the power to elect and install its officers in whatever manner the body may deem expedient.

SECTION 2. The association shall have power to recommend measures of usefulness and guidance to our churches in matters of organization, ordinations and questions of doctrines and discipline.

SECTION 3. The association shall have no power to infringe upon the right of local churches as sovereign and independent bodies.

ARTICLE IV — MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. The association shall be composed of regularly constituted Baptist churches in cooperating fellowship with the Southern Baptist Convention and following the teachings of the New Testament.

SECTION 2. The association shall be the sole judge of its membership and may receive or reject churches applying for membership therein at its pleasure. Churches applying for membership shall agree to come under the watch care of the association for one year. It is understood that during this period of watch care the church shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the association except those of voting.

Applications for membership should be presented to the Credentials Committee of the association. Upon the recommendation of the Credentials Committee the church will automatically come under the watch care of the association for one year. During that year, the church shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the association except that of voting. It is suggested that any church under watch care participate in the missions program of the association. At the end of the year the church may be voted in as a member of the association with full privileges by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present and voting at the regular meeting of the association, provided that the church submit an acceptable letter and at least one messenger be present at the meeting.

SECTION 3. The association may withdraw from any church which has become unscriptural in its doctrine or practices by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present and voting at the annual meeting. Such vote is to be taken by written ballot.

SECTION 4. Any church may withdraw from the association at its pleasure. Such action will be recognized by the association at the next annual meeting.

SECTION 5. It shall be the duty of each church to furnish the associational clerk, before each annual session, and annual letter, the forms provided by the associational clerk giving the information requested as is applicable to each church situation.

ARTICLE V — MEETINGS

SECTION 1. The association should hold its annual sessions on Thursday and Friday preceding the third Sunday in August. Special meetings of the association may be called by the Executive Board provided two weeks written notice is given to the member churches.

SECTION 2. Each church shall be entitled to be represented at the annual meeting by four messengers. Churches with more than 100 members shall be entitled to an additional messenger for each additional 50 members or fraction thereof and not to exceed 10 messengers from any one church.

SECTION 3. In case of internal dissension in a church and two parties coming to the association, each claiming to represent the church, neither party shall be seated until the question is decided as to which party is in union with the association. The decision is to be made by a majority of the messengers present and voting.

ARTICLE VI — OFFICERS

SECTION 1. General officers of the association shall be: *Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Parliamentarian*. Program leaders shall be *Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Church Music Director, Director of Deacons, Chairman of Evangelism Committee, Director of Continuing Education, Chairman of the Missions Committee, Director of Associational Missions, Trustees* and such other officers as the association may desire to elect.

Associational representatives will be elected for the following institutions and agencies: (1) Truett Camp, (2) Baptist Children's Homes, (3) Baptist Hospital, (4) Homes for the Aging, (5) Baptist Literature, (*Biblical Recorder*) (6) Cooperative Program, other representatives (such as the American Bible Society, Annuity Board, Baptist Foundation, etc.) may be added as deemed appropriate and properly elected.

*SECTION 2. With the exception of the director of associational missions and trustees, the terms of office for all officers of the association shall be for one year with the privilege of continuing re-election. The moderator and vice moderator shall not be eligible for re-election but one year in succession. (1) The number of trustees shall be three. (2) The term of service should be for three years, with the term of only one expiring each year. In the first election of trustees the term of service for one should be three years, another two years, and the other one year. (3) Upon the expiration of term of service the trustee may or may not be re-elected for another term of three years.

Each term of office shall begin with the close of the annual session with the exception of the treasurer and clerk who will serve from October 1 through September 30 (the financial year).

SECTION 3. The director of associational missions shall be sought and recommended by the Executive Committee in a manner of its own choosing. Within 10 days after locating a nominee, the Executive Committee shall present the name of the director nominee to a called meeting of the association. If the annual meeting of the association is scheduled within 60 days, the presentation shall wait until that time.

The call shall be indefinite. The salary, allowance, vacation, etc. shall be as provided by the current budget or adjustments recommended by the Executive Committee in consultation with the Finance Committee.

Concerning termination of employment, the resignation shall be in writing and presented to the Executive Committee at least 30 days before it is to take place. The Executive Committee may terminate employment by giving 30 days notice in advance.

The Executive Committee shall give full supervision and guidance to the work of the director of missions in planning, promoting and financing his work.

ARTICLE VII — DUTIES OF OFFICERS

SECTION 1. The *Moderator* shall preside and maintain the order of all meetings of the association and Executive Committee. He shall serve as ex officio member of all committees of the association.

He shall appoint the Committee on Committees and all other committees pertinent to the operation of the body not named by the Committee on Committees in its regular report.

SECTION 2. The *Vice Moderator* shall assist the moderator and shall preside in the absence of, or at the pleasure of the moderator.

SECTION 3. The *Clerk* shall keep a complete and accurate record of all transactions; shall prepare a Book of Reports to be distributed to messengers at the beginning of each day's session of the annual meeting; and shall cause to be printed minutes concerning the records made.

The clerk shall mail to the clerk of each church in the association, blanks for the preparation of the church letter as soon as they are received from the state convention. This form is to be returned to the clerk of the association not later than two weeks prior to the meeting of the body.

SECTION 4. The *Treasurer* shall receive and dispense by the order of the Executive Committee or the association while in session, the money of the treasury and make a complete report to the association at each session.

SECTION 5. The *Historian* shall keep the records of the association up-to-date.

SECTION 6. The *Parliamentarian* shall upon the request of the presiding officer of the body advise and assist the association with respect to all matters involving parliamentary procedure.

SECTION 7. The *Program Leaders and the Institutional Agency Representatives* shall perform all duties customary to their titles and shall make a written report to the annual session of the association.

SECTION 8. The *Director of Missions* shall work closely with the associational committees, officers, and churches in such a way as to facilitate the meeting of the objectives of the association as set forth in Article II.

The director shall serve as ex officio member of all committees of the association. The director shall communicate with the state and Southern Convention such information as shall be mutually helpful and needful.

The duties of the director of missions shall be set forth in Article XIV.

SECTION 9. *Trustees* have no authority except by direction of the association, and not personally bound by their signatures but, are to be the legal signees for the association.

Trustees represent the association in legal matters.

Trustees act on behalf of the association in acquisition and disposal of associational property.

They sign all deeds of conveyance, execute all notes, bonds or mortgages, intervene in all suits, by authority of the association.

All persons dealing with the trustees, as associational officers, may rely upon any written resolution duly adopted by the association or Executive Committee, directing and authorizing the trustees to act in its behalf and certified by the association moderator and clerk.

ARTICLE VIII — RULES OF ORDER

The business of the association shall be conducted according to *Robert's Parliamentary Practice* or in a manner not contrary thereto.

ARTICLE IX — QUORUM

The annual associational quorum shall be not less than 25 percent of the member churches represented.

ARTICLE X — THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

SECTION 1. The EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE shall be composed of the general officers and program leaders elected by the association and the pastor and one member from each church in the association. No pastor, by virtue of his being an associational officer or program leader shall be disqualified as a member of the Executive Committee, from representing the church or churches he may be serving in the association. Twelve of these members shall constitute a quorum.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to act for the association on matters arising when the association is not in session and to make a report of all work to the next session of the association. This body shall meet at a time and place designated by the moderator on Monday following the first Sunday of each quarter except for the July quarter which shall meet on the last Monday of the month of July. Special meetings of the Executive Committee may be called by the moderator with a one-week notice to the churches.

SECTION 3. All vacancies occurring on committees or among elected officers shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

SECTION 4. In the event that a vacancy occurs with the trustees, the Executive Committee should fill such a vacancy for the remainder of the term.

*ARTICLE XI — ASSOCIATIONAL STANDING COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. The association shall have such standing committees as may be deemed necessary to promote efficiently the work of the Master in our midst. The term of office for all committee members shall be for one year except where specifically stated otherwise.

*SECTION 2. COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES. It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate at the general meeting all standing committees as set forth under Article XI.

SECTION 3. The NOMINATING COMMITTEE shall be composed of five members. To this group the directors of Sunday School, Church Training, Women's Missionary Union, Brotherhood and Music Ministry will be added.

It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate the officers, program leaders and institutional/agency representatives. These nominees shall be notified in writing not less than one month prior to presenting of their names at the annual session.

SECTION 4. The Order of BUSINESS COMMITTEE, composed of three members, shall plan the annual program of the association and present it to the Executive Committee at its July meeting.

SECTION 5. The CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three pastors and two laymen. It shall examine applications of churches seeking admission into the association in keeping with Article IV, and make recommendations to the association.

It shall counsel with churches that are out of harmony or fellowship with the association.

SECTION 6. The PLACE AND PREACHER COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members. The duties of this committee shall be to recommend the place or places for the following annual meeting and to recommend the preacher and alternate to deliver the annual sermon for the following year.

SECTION 7. The RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members appointed by the moderator at the first session of the annual session. It shall be the duty of the committee to present suitable resolutions at the annual associational meeting.

SECTION 8. The MEMORIAL COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members. It shall be the duty of this committee to bring a report to the annual meeting of those listed by the member churches as deceased since the last annual meeting and shall lead in a memorial service in their memory.

SECTION 9. The FINANCE COMMITTEE shall be composed of six members including the treasurer of the association. This committee shall: (a) Present a budget to the association for the following year; (b) Devise plans for raising the funds for the association budget; (c) Audit the finances and financial records of the association twice annually and anytime there is a change of treasurer or at the direction of the association or the Executive Committee; (d) Report all audits to the annual associational meeting.

SECTION 10. The CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members and shall perform all duties specified in Article XIV.

SECTION 11. The ORDINATION COMMITTEE shall be composed of five designated pastors and all other pastor who desire to sit with the committee.

a. The committee serves in an advisory capacity only and serves at the request of the church from which one of the members is seeking ordination.

b. The committee should examine such candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry and make such recommendations to the church as they feel led.

c. The committee should assist in arranging the proper service of ordination when such assistance is requested.

d. The Executive Committee should be informed regularly of the work of the committee.

e. Each church desiring to ordain a candidate is urged to consult with the committee, and shall give two weeks notice in which the committee is to do its work.

SECTION 12. The EVANGELISM COMMITTEE. The duties of the committee shall be to direct and promote a perpetual program and spirit of evangelism in the association. It shall arrange and direct all associationalwide evangelistic activities.

SECTION 13. The MISSIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of six members, two named each year and each serving for a three-year term. Committee members are eligible to be re-elected for one additional term of office in succession. The associational Brotherhood director and Woman's Missionary Union director are to serve as ex officio members along with the director of missions and the moderator.

The duties of the Missions Committee shall be: to plan, conduct and evaluate the mission program of the association through: (a) Helping churches commit themselves to being ON MISSION in their setting; (b) Provide and interpret information on mission needs to the churches of the association; (c) To survey the mission needs to be found within the association; (d) Assist churches in doing mission work; (e) Conduct the kinds of mission work that individual churches cannot successfully conduct.

*SECTION 14. The BUILDING AND GROUNDS COMMITTEE shall be comprised of three members. The committee shall be responsible for and in charge of the upkeep and repairs of the associational building, grounds, and equipment.

ARTICLE XII — THE ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL

The ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL shall be composed of the director of missions, the moderator, the vice moderator, the program leaders: Sunday School, church training, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, the chairman of deacons, the chairman of the Evangelism Committee, the chairman of the Missions Committee, the chairman of the Finance Committee. The director of missions is to serve as chairman and a secretary shall be elected from the group.

The purpose of the council is to coordinate the planning of the various programs of the association, to develop an associational calendar, and to give mutual support to the various organizations and program units in carrying out their assignments.

The council shall meet quarterly.

ARTICLE XIII — THE ASSOCIATIONAL PASTORS'S CONFERENCE

The associational Pastors' Conference provides regular meetings for the Baptist Ministers of the association. The purpose of the conference is for fellowship and mutual support, for doctrinal and professional discussion and for promotion of church, associational and other denominational programs. The conference is not an administrative or executive body.

ARTICLE XIV — DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS JOB DESCRIPTION

SECTION 1. FUNCTION OF THE DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS. He is to be the chief administrative officer of the association. He is to confine extra employment in a manner agreed upon with the Executive Committee.

SECTION 2. RELATIONSHIP OF THE DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS.

1. He is employed by the Executive Committee of the association.
2. General supervision of the personnel and program of the association as they function through the association office.
3. Work primarily with (pastors), associational general officers, committees, and organizations.
4. Work closely with auxiliary organizations (such as W.M.U., Baptist Men, etc.).
5. Lead in maintaining relationships with state and S.B.C. agencies and promoting their programs.

SECTION 3. In the churches, extending the local ministries:

To visit churches by invitation of the pastor or other church leaders in the pastor-less churches to provide assistance in the church program and ministry, such as (1) Pulpit supply; (2) Study courses; (3) Missionary address; (4) Deacon's meetings; (5) Assembly programs; (6) Special day addresses; (7) Ordination services; (8) V.B.S. planning and promotion; (9) To interpret phases of associational work; (10) Budget planning; (11) Building planning; (12) Revival meetings; (13) Stewardship emphasis; (14) Study objectives and long range planning; (15) Studying and evaluating procedures, curriculum, constitution and bylaws, etc.; (16) Church-community surveys, etc.; (17) Promoting a world missions concept; and (18) publishing of a regular news medium (such as a monthly newsletter); (19) Cooperate with the news media to promote Baptist work.

In the associational office:

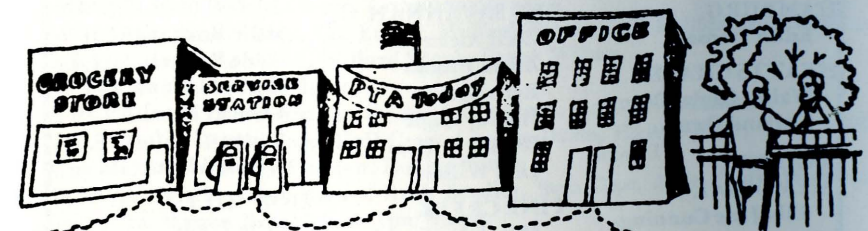
- a. Personal correspondence, promotional mail, and telephoning pertinent to his work.
- b. Office conferences, answer to inquiries, etc.
- c. Assist associational officers, committees and heads of organizations to get out promotional mail pertinent to their work.

SECTION 4. Schedule of Benefit

1. His salary shall be
2. His fringe benefits shall include
3. His schedule shall include:
 - a. One day a week, chosen at his discretion, shall be reserved for rest that excludes normal associational activities.
 - b. A maximum of four weeks each year outside of the association for special work with local churches or with state and S.B.C. agencies.
 - c. An annual sick leave of 26 days maximum, with a maximum of re days to be accumulated. Sick leave may be advanced by the association for one year, without Executive Committee action. Sick leave is to be recorded with the financial secretary of the association.
 - d. Two weeks annual vacation with pay.
 - e. Holidays: New Years' Day; Easter Monday; July 4; Labor Day; Thanksgiving, Thursday and Friday, Christmas, December 25 and 26.
4. All honoraria from churches inside or outside the association and all honoraria from other religious work shall be his personal fair, and shall not be submitted to the association.
5. The director of missions is afforded the opportunity of an annual evaluation by the moderator and Missions Committee.

ARTICLE XV — AMENDMENTS

The constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the association by a two-thirds majority of the messengers present and voting, provided the amendment has been presented to the Constitutional Committee at least 10 days prior to the annual meeting and presented to the association in printed form on the first day of the annual meeting to be voted on the second day.
