FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Whereas, the work of Foreign Missions is the great enterprise committed to the church by her risen Lord, and in view of the fact that God's special blessing has rested upon this work in response to the earnest self sacrifice

of his people and acknowledging with deepest gratitude the wonderful success already attained, we most earnestly recommend that in the inauguration of the new Centennary we expect "still greater things of God and attempt greater things for God." We recommend that individuals and churches become better informed and more consecrated to this great work, that we take special offerings for the Centennary fund recommended by our Southern Baptist Convention, and that in the near future our Association take up and support at least one Foreign Missionary. Committee.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

In the Southern States there are said to be 12,000 churches without Sunday schools, over 4,000 of these are in our own State. There are more than 1,000 schools already organized that must be stimulated into more efficiency or the rank and file of the denomination will still remain ciphers in the work they are expected to do. The first need is the more thorough organization of the Sunday school forces. By means of a well organized Sunday school association, new schools can be organized and the old ones improved. But organization without something definite to do is worse than no organization at all. Let this organization take upon itself the work of supplying the people with good literature. The Sunday school and Colportage work will then be closely connected and this body will have a definite aim and end in view. Here is a vast field for good that lies, so far, almost untouched. The day hos come for us to use this engine of power. Committee.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

The Lord of the harvest seems to have regarded the efforts of your committee and missionaries during the past year with peculiar favor. The reports from all of our fields and mission stations are such as should cause thanksgiving and inspire renewed courage in the hearts of all the Lord's people. But while these results show the divine approval of our labors they seem to bid us to put forth yet greater efforts for the spread of the Master's Kingdom in the destitution within our bounds. The missionaries employed by us are as follows. Rev. R. E. Peele in Wilmington at Brooklyn. S. D. Swaim at Burgaw. J. H. Hildreth at Willard and Teachey. A. T. Howell on the Onslow field, and W. L. Bilbro at Sharon and Hallsville. Our policy has been so far as practicable to group our mission points into fields with a view to developing them into self sustaining pastorates and locating pastors on them. There have been added to the membership of our mission points more than 150 members, and at the other churches occupied by our missionaries at least 150 more and the interest at all our missions increasing. Bro. Howell served only nine months on the Onslow field when he was compelled to leave on account of failure of his health, his beloved wife having died on the field. This leaves that field now vacant and we are trying to secure a suitable man to fill the place. For the last two months brother M. C. Walton has rendered very efficient service as Colporter and preaching wherever the way opened up to him. The good hand of the Lord seems to have been with him. We cordially recommend this brother and his work to the churches and Sunday schools of the Association. We respectfully recommend that the money raised by the churches for State or Associational missions be paid over to the Treasurer of the Executive Committee so as to enable the committee to better advance their work. We recommend that our churches try to raise \$1,250.00 during the coming year to be used in supplying the vast destition within our bounds. J. T. BLAND for Committee.

OBITUARIES.

We have to chronicle the death of several of our brethren since the last session of this body. W. H. Best, member of Johnston's church, died Sept. 27th, 1891, at an advanced age. His pastor speaks of him as a "man of splendid christian character.'

Daniel Williams, of Hallsville church, died Nov. 30, '90, in his 83rd year. His christian life having extended over a period of more than 50

W. P. Dobson, of Dobson's Chapel, died Aug. 31st, '91. He was born Feb. 14th, 1849, made a profession of religion about 1863 and during the last few days of his life developed rapidly in spirituality and usefulness. He contributed liberally towards the erection of the new house of worship iu which this body holds its present session, and was the efficient Superintendent of his church Sunday school at the time of his death.

Kedar Bryan, of Kenansville church, died August 19th, 1891. He was

born April 28th, 1851, and was baptized in his 16th year by Rev. J. N. Stallings. He was the great-grand-son of Rev. Francis Oliver, and brother to Rev. R. T. Bryan, missionary to China. Mrs. Kate Bryan, his stepmother, under whose pious training he grew up from early childhood to man's estate, says of him: "He was a true christian, and as a child, a boy, and a man, none knew him but to love him, he was so kind and loving to all. He died of consumption, suffering long and greatly, with more patience and resignation than any one I ever saw. In dying he pointed upwards exclaiming, Jesus! We feel like our boy is with his Savior.

Alfred Hollingsworth, of the Magnolia church, died January 14, 1891. at the advanced age of 70 years, 10 months and three days. His death was a great loss to the church of which he was a highly esteemed member. James K. Williams, of Corinth church, died Oct. 23, 1890, in his 81st year. He had, for more than 50 years, been a consistent, useful member

of the church. He was for many years before his death, confined to his home by afflictions, yet, notwithstanding, he felt a deep interest in the prosperity of Zion to the end of his life.

It is cause of profound gratitude, that we do not have to record the death of any of our ministerial brethren. Respectfully submitted, Committee.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON PERIODICALS.

It is impossible to overestimate the value of the Religious Press. It is an affective means of educating the people, mentally, morally and spiritually, it seems to unite the churches in doctrine and feeling, it imparts information as to the progress of the Master's Kingdom in all parts of the world and it not only tells what has been done, but how it has been done, and thus stimulates those who read to new and more active and earnest efforts to promote the cause of piety. All these good ends have been subserved by the Biblical Recorder, which has been an incalculable blessing to the Baptists of North Carolina for more than fifty years. It has been the means of preserving our people from hurtful heresies; it has been the best collecting agency we have ever had in the field for the support of all our enterprises of benevolence and it is earnestly commended to the confidence and support of the Baptists of the State as worthy of their patronage. If the Recorder had five times as many subscribers as it now has your committee are persuaded that it would be an easy matter to raise five times as much money for all causes as we do now. It is hence to the highest interest of the pastors and churches to put forth constant and bountiful efforts to increase the circulation of this the Baptist State organ.

Your committee would also recommend our people to take Charity and Children, the organ of our Orphanage, and Kind Words-series of Sunday School helps, the Home Field, the organ of the Home Mission Board. Atlanta, Georgia, and the Foreign Mission Journal, the organ of our Board at Richmond, Va. We are approaching the centennial year of missions, and it is eminently desirable that our people should become acquainted with the marvelous and inspiring facts of this great enterprise.

REPORT ON MINISTER'S RELIEF SOCIETY.

Two years ago the Baptist State Convention appointed a Board to receive and disburse funds for the relief of aged and disabled Baptist ministers in the State, and located at Wilmington, N. C. At the last session of the Convention this Board was transferred to Durham because it is a more central location, and Rev. C. A. Woodsen was made Corresponding Secretary. Strange to say, while this Board represents a most worthy cause and one which especially concerns the pastors, but few of them have brought the matter before their churches or manifested any interest in the enterprise. If this has not been done, your committee would respectfully insist that the clerk be required to have new blanks printed which shall include this Board.

CHURCH COVENANT

Having been led, as we believe, by the Spirit of God, to receive the Lord Jesus Christ as our Saviour, and on the profession of our faith having been baptized in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, we do now, in the presence of God, angels, and this assembly, most solemnly and joyfully enter into covenant with one another, as one body in Christ.

We engage, therefore, by the aid of the Holy Ghost, to walk together in Christian love, to strive for the advancement of this church in knowledge, holiness and comfort; to promote its prosperity and spirituality; to sustain its worship, ordinances, discipline and doctrines; to contribute cheerfully and regularly to the support of the ministry; the expenses of the church, the relief of the poor, and the spread of the Gospel through all nations.

We also engage to maintain family and secret devotion; to religiously educate our children; to seek the salvation of our kindred and acquaint-ances, to walk circumspectly in the world; to be just in our dealings; faithful in our engagements, and exemplary in our deportment; to avoid all tattling, backbiting and excessive anger; to abstain from the sale and use of intoxicating drinks as a beverage; and to be zealous in our efforts to advance the Kingdom of our Saviour.

We further engage to watch over one another in brotherly love; to remember each other in prayer; to aid each other in sickness and distress; to cultivate Christian sympathy in feeling, and courtesy in speech; to be slow to take offense, but always ready for reconciliation, and mindful of these rules of our Saviour, to secure it without delay.

We moreover engage, that when we remove from this place, we will, as soon as possible, unite with some other church, where we can carry out the spirit of this covenant, and principles of God's Word.

RULES OF ORDER.

- 1. On the meeting of the Association, the Moderator of the preceeding session shall preside until his successor is known. In case of his absence a chairman *pro tem*. shall be elected.
- 2. Each session of the Association shall be opened with religious exercises, to be opened by whomsoever the presiding officer may name.
- 3. At each daily session, and previous to proceeding to business, the names of the delegates shall be called, and the proceedings of the previous daily session read.
- 4. The members shall observe towards the officers and each other that courtesy which becomes Christians.
- 5. Any member wishing to speak shall rise and address the presiding officer. He shall confine himself strictly to the question under consideration, and avoid personalities.
- 6. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without permission.
- 7. All motions seconded shall be definitely stated by the presiding officer before discussion.
- 8. No motion shall be withdrawn after discussion.
- 9. When a question is under discussion, no motion or proposition shall be received, except to adjourn, to amend, to commit, to postpone to a definite time, which several motions shall have preference in the order in which they are stated.
- 10. After a motion has been decided, any member having voted in the majority may move a reconsideration.
- 11. No member shall absent himself during the session of the Association without permission of the presiding officer, and no one shall take final leave of absence without the permission of the Association; and if any shall do so, their absence shall be noted in the Minutes.
- 12. All questions, except such as relate to the Constitution, shall be decided by a majority of votes.
- 13. The Association shall have the right to decide what subjects shall be admitted to consideration.
- 14. The Rules of Order may be altered or amended at any session of the Association by a majority vote.

CONSTITUTION OF THE EASTERN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

ARTICLE 1. This Association shall be denominated and known as the Eastern Association.

ART. 2. The object of this Association shall be the promotion of Christ's Kingdom among men; and the means of accomplishing this shall be in strict conformity to the New Testament.

ART. 3. This Association shall be composed of all ordained ministers who are members or pastors of churches of this body, and three delegates from each church chosen from her membership assembled in conference.

ART. 4. The delegates from each church shall bear a letter certifying their appointment, communicating information relative to the state of the church: *Provided*, *however*, That when any church has prepared a letter, and through inadvertance the letter fails to be presented, her delegates may be received without its presentation.

ART. 5. The officers of this Association shall be, a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be chosen annually from among its members, by ballot, by a majority of the members voting, and continue in office until their successors are elected.

ART. 6. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to enforce an observance of the Constitution, preserve order, appoint committees, decide all questions of order, give his opinion on any question under discussion, after others have spoken, and give the casting vote in case of a tie.

ART. 7. It shail be the duty of the Clerk to record the proceedings of each annual session, and superintend their printing and distribution among the churches.

ART. 8. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all funds sent up by the churches, or collected during the session of the body, and disburse the same, as ordered by the Association. He shall also make to the Association an annual report of the condition of the treasury.

ART. 9. The Association shall appoint an executive committee of nine members, three from each of the Union Meetings, who shall co-operate with the State Board, so far as is practicable in the mission work within our bounds, and, during the intervals between the sessions of this body, take such steps as they may deem advisable for the advancement of the same, making annual reports of their work to the Association, which report, together with that on State Missions, shall be the first business of the second day of the session. Further, that our missionaries shall report their work quarterly to the Executive Committee, in order that said committee shall be prepared to make full report of their work to this body.

ART. 10. The Association shall not maintain fellowship with any of the churches which neglect to preserve Gospel Order.

- ART. 11. The Association may invite visiting and corresponding brethren to seats, and extend to them the privileges of the body, except that of voting.
- ART. 12. The annual session of this Association shall commence on Tuesday after the first Lord's Day in October, at such place as may be chosen.
- ART. 13. By appointment of the Association there shall be an Introductory Sermon of a denominational character, and a Missionary Sermon.

ART. 14. This Constitution may be amended at any annual session by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.
