Many students seem to be unaware that Southeastern Seminary holds funds which have given specifically to help students who encounter unexpected financial diffi-The funds but Mike culties. are Scarlimited: borough, Dean of Students, says that one of the chief goals of his office is that no student have to withdraw because of a lack of funds.

Funds can be issued in emergency grants or in loans. The schedule for repaying loans is negotiable, although beginning monthly payments as soon as possible is advisable. Dean Scarborough and the Student Aid Committee give the

careful consideration to any student who applies, although grants and loans are approved on the basis of greatest need.

Some students seem to be reluctant, for a variety of reasons, to ask for help. The number of jobs in the community which can be coordinated with class class schedules is being reduced by the current economic situation. This trend is expected to continue and worsen.

Dean Scarborough urges any student who knows of another student who is in need to give his information. He investigate and give whatever help is available.

MURDER IN **STACKS CONTINUES!**

Mistreatment and abuses resulting in shortened 'lives" occur constantly in our homes, offices and libraries. CHAPLAINS ON FRONT LINES BATTLE

Atlanta (BP) As Operation Desert Shield became Operation Desert Storm, chaplains moved to the front lines of conflict and comfort.

Chaplains do not carry weapons, but they are "going to be right where the fighting is," says Charles T. Clanton, Army Forces Command Staff chaplain at Georgia's Fort McPherson. Southern Baptists account

for 155 of the about 550 chaplains serving in the Middle East.

"Sometimes chaplains go into combat," says Clanton, a colonel who spent two years in Vietnam as an Army chaplain. "I went with one troop wherever it went." "When they were attacked, I was with them. What you do then is keep your head down."



Clanton, who has been an Army chaplain for 25 years, points out that military chaplains "are not Casper Milktoasts." He says chaplains have to pass the same physical tests required of their troops. During lulls in the fighting,

chaplains are involved intensely in counseling intensely counseling troops. After the battle, Clanton says chaplains Clanton says chaplains conduct memorial services and visit the wounded in hospitals. Military chaplains must be endorsed by their religious group, but they are employed and assigned by the armed forces.

The Chaplains Commission of the Southern Baptist Home Mission Board endorses about 1,100 military chaplains.

Apparently the other had discovered that her daughter had skipped school the day before and come to the Corner for ice cream. The mother held Ruth responsible for not realizing the girls should have been in school. She felt that Ruth should have

sent them back.

The woman's voice escalated as she chewed Ruth up one side and down the other. Then with a victorious expression, she grabbed her daughters arm and stomped out.

The other students and I watched with amazement as Ruth's eyes opened wide, her jaw dropped and she began to shake. She looked like Wyley Coyote after stepping off a cliff. She never got a word out. She was so mad that she laughed. We all sat around for the next half hour thinking of good comebacks though, of course, it was too late.

Probably the most significant expression of the Seminary's relationship with Ruth is when she was invited to participate in a salute to former seminary President Randall Lolley in 1988. She has a candid picture of the event hanging at the Corner and seems

quite fond of the memory. Ruth's community service extends beyond the Southeastern/Wake Forest customers at the Corner. Ruth and her husband, Lloyd, are members of Post 635 Amvet Auxiliary in Raleigh where she is the president. Paul Purvis is the current Student Body President at Furman University. He is graduating in June. Finally, he has been called into full time ministry.



ELDER ENDS TENURE AT SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

Nashville(BP) -- Southern Baptist Sunday School President Lloyd Elder and trustees have mutually agreed to end Elder's tenure at the BSSB. Elder's retirement is "a result of honest differences of opinion between employee and the board with regard to management style, philosophy and performance."

In a special called meeting of the trustees January 17 in Nashville, Elder presented his plan to retire. It will be effective on January 31, 1992, or 30 days after a successor is named.

The meeting focused on three primary accusations: financial mismanagement, taping of phone calls without second party consent and editorial bias in

a centennial history.
A statement from the trustees says that agreement "is not a result of or based upon political or theological differences between the board and employee, but rather results form the parties' honest and good faith with regard to the board's management."

The retirement agreement stipulates that Elder would serve as a consultant to the BSSB until April 1, 1993, during which time he would receive his full salary and benefits. His current salary is \$135,800. After that point he would receive in retirement income and supplement from the board up to 50% of his present salary.



RTVC Installs President and Acquires Network

Fort Worth, TX (BP) -Trustees of the Southern
Baptist Radio and Television
Commission, meeting in Fort
Worth, Jan. 14-15, heard
reports of the financial
health of the agency,
installed its fourth president
and voted to acquire a
second television network.

Under terms of a contract approved at the meeting, the RTVC would acquire FamilyNet, a television network owned by

the Old Time Gospel Hour, Inc. and Liberty Broad-casting network, Inc. both of Lynchburg, VA. Terms of the purchase were not disclosed pending completion of audits, but RTVC officials said it would involve cash and program time on ACT and FamilyNet. The cash would be from current operating funds according to RTVC President Jack Johnson.



Harry Hunter Conducts Prayer Conference

Wake Forest, NC -- Harry Hunter, a Home Mission Service Corps volunteer for the SBC, led a prayer conference last week. The conference, which met from Tuesday until Thursday, was sponsored by the Spiritual Life Council.

to pray.

Hunter stressed a need for uprightness and commitment to God among Christians. "It is necessary for the people of God to gain a freshness of the holiness of God," said Hunter. "We are to be a holy people under God because He is a holy God. We are men and women who are to live for the praise of His glory."

Richmond Seminary Elects First Permanent President

North Carolina pastor Thomas H. Graves has been elected first permanent president of the Baptist Theological Seminary at Richmond.

Trustees of the Southern Baptist Alliance-sponsored seminary announced their election of Graves at a Jan. 14 news conference in Richmond, VA.

They had elected him unanimously during a board meeting Jan. 7. He is expected to assume his new duties in mid-February.

Graves' election concludes a 7-month search to find a successor to Morris Ashcraft.

The Baptist Theological Seminary at Richmond was authorized by the SBA, an organization of Southern Baptist moderates, at the Alliance's annual meeting in March 1989. However, the Alliance does not own or govern that seminary. The school's 16-member board of trustees is self-perpetuating.

The seminary's mission statement describes it as "unmistakably Baptist" with a commitment to being" racially and gender inclusive with an ecumenical

commitment and a global perspective,"

Classes are expected to begin in the autumn of 1991 in the facilities of Northminister Baptist Church in Richmond, where the seminary is currently housed. About 60 students have expressed interest in attending the school.



PRESIDENT'S FORUM

Dr. Drummond began the Forum by addressing the Shaw House situation. Vice President of Internal Affairs Paul Fletcher said that the Shaw House would be converted into a commuter dorm beginning next fall. Some renovations would be made. Commuter students will stay in the house during the week. It will be closed on the weekend.

When asked if commuter prices would increase, Fletcher said some adjustments would be made.

Drummond asked Harry Hunter, a long time friend, to say a word concerning prayer. Hunter emphasized the necessity of a continual prayer life. In a personal testimony, he explained how God had told him that he was not His man because he was not a man of prayer.

David Mansberger had all members of the Student Council stand and introduce themselves.

Concern was raised about the May term courses. Dr. Bush addressed the question explaining that when matriculation fees were made even across the board May term course fees were raised in the Bush said that process. they are looking into getting May term fees combined with summer term fees so that there is only one price. The trustees must still vote on this.

The question was raised concerning the status of the Great Commission Center. A spring conference will be held April 15 and 16 as a launching event for the new curriculum. The main emphasis will be on church planting, church growth, evangelism, cross-cultural missions and spiritual awakenings. Classes will begin next fall.

A question was posed about a rumor that Dr. Clemmons would not be

allowed to continue his retreat called, The School of Prayer, in Florida. Drummond said he had no knowledge of that rumor.

The final question was concerning why the trees were being cut on campus. Fletcher explained that two large oaks had been hit by lightening and needed to be removed. Some were diseased; others were crowding one another. The most unhealthy trees were removed allowing others room to grow. Trees growing into the rock walls were also removed.

Fletcher continued that a long term planting and maintenance plan has been drawn up. He went on to assure that the traditional "Forest of Wake" appearance would be maintained. They plan to plant a variety of new trees


