





Accreditation

Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary is accredited by the Association of Theological Schools in the United States and Canada and by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

Curriculum

The curriculum consists of courses for students continuing in the A.Div., M.Div./M.R.E. program, or entering candidates for those degrees. Th.M. or D.Min. students may take advanced electives. Applications for admission to summer school are welcomed from alumni or others who want to pursue post-M.Div. studies.

The maximum course load permitted is four semester hours, H 2324s, B 1040s, and M 4231s excepted. Students who elect language study may take only that course.

Classes meet four days a week, Tuesday through Friday, unless otherwise noted.

The seminary reserves the right to limit the size of classes in order to maintain a reasonable student-teacher ratio or to cancel a course if enrollment is not sufficient.

In addition to courses offered on campus, students may earn up to eight semester hours credit for the completion during the summer of a basic unit of clinical pastoral education at an accredited training center as provided in the Catalog, 1981-82, p. 79. In order for credit to be received, the sudent must register with the Registrar prior to the beginning of the program and the supervisor must file a grade report form at the conclusion of the course (M 4360s-M 4361s).

Admission

Currently enrolled degree students need only to register on the designated days.

Students applying for admission to degree programs who plan to begin studies in either term of summer school should follow the admission instructions as outlined in the Catalog, 1981-82 (p. 36f.) and register on the designated days.

Applications for admission to the summer school on any other basis should be received in the Registrar's Office at least fifteen days prior to the registration date. For additional information, write: Registrar, Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary, Wake Forest, North Carolina 27587.

Registration

First Term: Monday, June 14, 1982. Orientation activities will be held for entering students. Enrollment in classes closes at 4:00 p.m. on Wednesday, June 16.

Second Term: Monday, July 12, 1982. Orientation activities will be held for entering students. Enrollment closes at 4:00 p.m on Wednesday, July 14.

Withdrawal

Withdrawal from a course without penalty is permitted until 4:00 p.m., June 18 in the first term and until 4:00 p.m., July 16 in the second term. Students wishing to withdraw from a course or from enrollment should consult the Registrar for guidance. A student enrolled for only one course who withdraws from that course must complete the process for withdrawal from enrollment.

Costs

The matriculation fee for summer school is \$50.00 per term. This fee is not refundable after 4:00 p.m. on June 16 for the first term or after 4:00 p.m. on July 14 for the second term. Dormitory rental rates are \$40.00 for double occupancy for men and \$45.00 for women payable in advance. The cost of books and supplies varies depending on courses taken.

Housing

Inquiries concerning housing accommodations for the summer terms should be directed to the Director of Housing.

Recreation

The town of Wake Forest operates a modern swimming pool. A nine-hole golf course within walking distance of the campus is available for a modest fee. The seminary gymnasium will be open. Tennis courts are also available.

B 1040s Field Archaeology

Mr. Scoggin

Field experience in the scientific techniques of modern archaeological methods. Sites in the Middle East and contiguous areas of the Biblical World will constitute the laboratory for the field work. Summers. 8 semester hours. June 8-July 23.

H 2324 Practicum in Home Missions

Mr. Brasw

A combination of academic study and field missionary experience conducted in selected settings under approved supervision, in cooperation with the Home Mission board of the Southern Baptist Convention. Twelve weeks summer practicum or one semester, open to middlers, seniors and graduate student. Summer. 8 semester hours. June 1-Aug. 10.

H 2350s Practicum in World Religions

Ar. Braswell

A combination of academic study and field experience conducted in selected settings among centers of world religionists in the Research Triangle area and/or in Washington, D.C. May 15-22.

M 4232 Workshop on Urban Studies

Mr. Bland

A workshop designed for Baptist church, associational, and denominational leaders, treating Christian mission and ministries in urban settings, with special attention to the work of the association and mission strategy. Summer. 2 semester hours. Prerequisite: Special application required. May 22-29.

Case Method Institute

Mr. Neely, Mr. Hewitt

A two-week intensive workshop in the case method of teaching and learning. Theological understanding is explored through the study of complex contemporary problems. Open to Th.M. and D. Min. students. Applications due to Dr. Furman Hewitt by May 15, 1982. 4 semester hours. June 21-July 2.

B 1349s The Book of Hosea

Mr. Philbeck

An exegetical study of the English text of the Book of Hosea, with particular attention to the historical period of the prophet and the theological, ethical, and social emphases of the book. 2 semester hours. 10:40-12:40, Tuesday-Friday.

B 1400s Elementary Greek

Mr. Chance*

The elements of Koine Greek. For beginners in the Greek New Testament. Credit will be given only if both B 1400 and 1401 are completed satisfactorily. 3 semester hours. 8:00-10:00; 10:40-11:40, Tuesday-Friday.

B 1640s First Peter

Mr. Tolbert

A critical interpretation based on the English text. 2 semester hours. 8:00-10:00, Tuesday-Friday.

H 2125s Religious Liberty

Mr. Miller

The course traces the history of American religion from the perspective of the development of religious freedom in America. 2 semester hours. 8:00-10:00, Tuesday-Friday.

AH 2140s Baptist History I

Mr. Blackmore

A study of the Baptist people, leaders, principles, practices, and organizations. The emphasis is upon the period to 1845. 2 semester hours. 10:40-12:40, Tuesday-Friday. For Associates only.

H 2335s Current Topics in Home Missions: Interfaith Witness Principles and

Strategies

Mr. Igleheart*

An intensive study of selected current issues in missions within the United States. (May be taken more than once for credit.) 2 semester hours. 10:40-12:40, Tuesday-Friday.

T 3050s Theology of the Christian Life

Mr. Stewart

A theological examination of important aspects of the Christian life. The following topics will be included in the survey: Regeneration, Repentance, Faith, Justification, Reconciliation, Sanctification, Forgiveness, Worship, Evangelism, Fellowship, Nurture, Vocation, Stewardship and Freedom. 2 semester hours. 1:00-3:00, Tuesday-Friday.

M 4023s Preaching to the Urban Mind

Mr. Carlton

The form and content of Christian preaching within the context of the contemporary ideologies, community patterns and life styles. 2 semester hours. 10:40-12:40, Tuesday-Friday.

M 4231s Seminar on Urban Studies

Mr. Bland

A study of structures and problems of the secular city, including an evaluation of efforts toward renewal of the churches. 6 semester hours. 8:00-12:30, and afternoon sessions as announced by professor.

M 4300s Basic Pastoral Care

Mr. Cumbee*

A basic introduction to pastoral care. Attention given to developmental and emergency crises and to basic pastoral care theory and skills; group supervision of pastoral work; prerequisite to all other pastoral care and psychology of religion courses. 3-4 semester hours. 8:00-10:00; 10:40-12:40, Tuesday-Friday.

M 4855s Teaching Biblical Concepts and

Theological Principles

Mr. Rogers*

A study of the educational task of providing guidance for the person's Christian pilgrimage through the development of sound and consistent principles of biblical interpretation and theological thinking. Special attention will be given to bridging the gap between the layperson and the disciplines of biblical and theological scholarship. 2 semester hours. 1:00-3:00, Tuesday-Friday.

M 4873s Church Libraries/Media Centers

Mr. Todd*

A study of the role of church library materials, equipment, and services in Christian education, worship, ministries, and outreach with emphasis on the organization and administration of a media center in the local church. 2 semester hours. 8:00-10:00, Tuesday-Friday.

B 1224s Drama in the Old Testament and Contemporary Literature

Mr. Rogers

An examination of the dramatic qualities of Old Testament religion and a comparative study of drama in the Old Testament with contemporary literature. 2 semester hours. 1:00-3:00 Tuesday-Friday.

B 1401s Elementary Greek

Mr. Chance*

A continuation of B 1400. Careful reading of I John. 3 semester hours. Prerequisite: B 1400 or its equivalent. 8:00-10:00; 10:40-11:40, Tuesday-Friday.

B 1624s Acts and Primitive Christianity

Mr. Nation

An examination of the relationship between the Book of Acts and the life and development of primitive Christianity. 2 semester hours. 10:40-12:40, Tuesday-Friday.

H 2055s Worship, Baptism, and Communion Among Baptists

Mr. Halbrooks

A historical examination of the development of Baptist thought and practice regarding baptism and communion and of the variety of practices and forms of worship among Baptists. 2 semester hours. 8:00-10:00, Tuesday-Friday.

H 2335s Current Topics in Home Missions: The

Church & Community Missions Mr. Godwin*

An intensive study of selected current issues in missions within the United States. 2 semester hours. 1:00-3:00, Tuesday-Friday.

AH 2141s Baptist History II

Mr. Blackmore

A study of the Baptist movement since 1845 with special emphasis upon the history of Southern Baptists. 2 semester hours. 10:45-12:40, Tuesday-Friday. Associates only.

T 3062s Contemporary British Theology Mr. Tull

An examination of the principal types of British theological thought in the current century. 2 semester hours. 8:00-10:00 Tuesday-Friday.

T 3230s Science, Philosophy, and Religion Mr. Graves

A review of the history of the scientific movement and its implications for philosophy and religion. 2 semester hours. 8:00-10:00, Tuesday-Friday.

AM 4532s The New Testament Basis of Evangelism

Mr. Miles

An examination of the nature of evangelism based upon an investigation of selected New Testament documents with a view to guiding the student to formulate a personal concept of Christian evangelism. 2 semester hours. 8:00-10:00, Tuesday-Friday. Associates only.

M 4600s The Pastor's Multiple Ministry

Mr. White*

A study of the multiple ministries of the modern pastor, including planning a preaching program, filling the pastoral role of the congregation, planning services and activities, and relating his ministry to the community and denomination. 2 semester hours. 10:40-12:40.

M 4857s Mission Education in the church

Mr. Clemmons

A study of the biblical and theological basis for mission education in the church and how this is expressed through the Christian education organizations, programs, and methods of work of Woman's Missionary Union and Brotherhood. 2 semester hours. 10:40-12:40, Tuesday-Friday.

M 4935 Christian Education and Denominational Leadership

Mr. Graves*

A study of Southern Baptist denominational polity, organization, and function as related to educational and church support services. Major attention will be given to the ways in which churches can contribute to and gain support from denominational resources. 2 semester hours. 1:00-3:00, Tuesday-Friday.

BHTM 0410 Colloquium in Ministry

Mr. Steel

An interdisciplinary investigation of the theological bases, symbols, and essential objectives of Christian ministry in the context of the practice of ministry. Open only to D.Min. students. 4 semester hours. 8:00-10:00; 10:40-12:40, Tuesday-Friday.

BHITM 0411 Colloquium in Ministry

Mr. Smith

An interdisciplinary investigation of several of the theological foundations and functions of ministry (e.g. preaching, pastoral care) with attention to the candidates' field experiences and projects in ministry. Open only to D.Min. students. 4 semester hours. 8:00-10:00; 10:40-12:40, Tuesday-Friday.


