Accreditation

Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary is accredited by the Association of Theological Schools in the United States and Canada and is a candidate for accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

Curriculum

The curriculum consists of courses for students continuing in the M.Div./MRE program, or entering candidates for those degrees. Th.M. or D.Min. students may take advanced electives. Applications for admission to summer school are welcomed from alumni or others who want to pursue post-M.Div. studies.

The maximum course load permitted is four semester hours. Students who elect language study or one of the other three semester hour courses may take only that course.

Classes meet four days a week, Tuesday through Friday.

The seminary reserves the right to limit the size of classes in order to maintain a reasonable student-

teacher ratio.

In addition to courses offered on campus, students may earn up to eight semester hours credit for the completion during the summer of a basic unit of clinical pastoral education at an accredited training center as provided in the *Catalog*, 1978-79, p. 74. In order for credit to be received, the student must register with the Registrar prior to the beginning of the program and the supervisor must file a grade report form at the conclusion of the course (M 390s-M 391s).

Admission

Currently enrolled degree students need only to register on the designated days.

Students' applying for admission to degree programs who plan to begin studies in either term of summer school should follow the admission instructions as outlined in the Catalog 1978-79 (p. 36f.) and

register on the designated days.

Applications for admission to the summer school on any other basis should be received in the Registrar's Office at least fifteen days prior to the registration date. For additional information, write: Registrar, Southeastern Seminary, Wake Forest, North Carolina 27587.

Registration

First term: Monday, June 12, 1978. Orientation activities will be held for entering students. Enrollment in classes closes at 4:00 p.m. on Wednesday, June 14.

Second term: Monday, July 10, 1978. Orientation activities will be held for entering students. Enrollment in classes closes at 4:00 p.m. on Wednesday, July 12.

Withdrawal

Withdrawal from a course without penalty is permitted until 4:00 p.m., June 16 in the first term and until 4:00 p.m., July 14 in the second term. Students wishing to withdraw from a course or from enrollment should consult the Registrar for guidance. A student enrolled for only one course who withdraws from that course must complete the process for withdrawal from enrollment.

Costs

The matriculation fee for summer school is \$35.00 per term. This fee is not refundable after 4:00 p.m. on June 14 for the first term, or after 4:00 p.m. on July 12 for the second term. Double occupancy dormitory rental rates are \$25.00 per month for men and \$27.50 per month for women payable in advance. The cost of books and supplies varies depending on courses taken.

Facilities

Classrooms and Library are air-conditioned. Dormitory facilities are available for men and women. Married couples should write the Business Office concerning housing accommodations for the summer session.

Recreation

The town of Wake Forest operates a modern swimming pool. A nine-hole golf course within walking distance of the campus is available for a modest fee. The Seminary gymnasium will be open. Tennis courts are also available.

FIRST TERM, June 13-July 7

B 151s Elementary Greek

Mr. Cook

The elements of Koine Greek. For beginners in the Greek New Testament. Credit will be given only if both B 151 and B 152 are completed satisfactorily. 3 semester hours. 8:00-10:00, 10:50-11:50, Tuesday-Friday.

B 320s Exposition of Great Texts

Mr. Green

An intensive historical, exegetical, and expository study of some of the great chapters in the Old Testament, with some emphasis on the preaching value in the passages. 2 semester hours. 8:00-10:00, Tuesday-Friday.

B 345s The Gospel of Matthew Mr. Spencer

A critical study of the Gospel of Matthew based on the English text. 2 semester hours. 10:50-12:50, Tuesday-Friday.

H 204s History of Christian Devotion Mr. Miller

An examination of the development of Christian devotional practice in different periods of the Church's history. Both private and public expressions of devotion are considered. 2 semester hours. 10:50-12:50, Tuesday-Friday.

T 101s Systematic Theology Mr. Eddins

A comprehensive study of the major doctrines of the Christian faith from the point of view of those who are within the Christian church. The nature of theology, its methods and claims are discussed and assessed. The major Christian doctrines are examined in their mutual relationships: revelation, God, creation and providence. 3 semester hours, 8:00-10:00, 10:50-11:50, Tuesday-Friday.

T 316s Science, Philosophy, and Religion Mr. Hollon

A review of the history of the scientific movement and its implications for philosophy and religion. 2 semester hours. 1:00-3:00 p.m., Tuesday-Friday.

M 159s Music in Worship

Mr. Johnson

An historical study of music in the structure of corporate worship with implications toward creative opportunities for the present. 2 semester hours, 8:00-10:00, Tuesday-Friday.

M 181s Basic Pastoral Care

Mr. Hester

A basic introduction to pastoral care. Attention given to developmental and emergency crises and to basic pastoral care theory and skills; group supervision of pastoral work; prerequisite to all other pastoral care and psychology of religion courses. 3 semester hours, 8:00-10:00, 10:50-11:50, Tuesday-Friday.

M 234bs Organization Behavior in the Church Mr. Dale

An investigation of a theology of the visible church, the nature of volunteer organizations, organizational renewal dynamics, systems approaches to congregations, and organization development applications for religious structures. 2 semester hours. 10:50-12:50, Tuesday-Friday.

M 245s Ministry of Christian Education with the High School Student Mr. Poerschke

A study of the basic needs and problems of the high school student, with special attention to religious development. 2 semester hours. 1:00-3:00 p.m., Tuesday-Friday.

SECOND TERM, July 11-August 4

BHTM 410S Colloquium in Ministry Mr. Durham

An interdisciplinary investigation of the theological bases, symbols, and essential objectives of Christian ministry in the context of the practice of ministry. Open only to D. Min. students. 4 semester hours. 8:00-10:00, 10:50-12:50, Tuesday-Friday.

BHTM 411s Colloquium in Ministry Mr. Nations

An interdisciplinary investigation of several of the theological foundations and functions of ministry (e.g. preaching, pastoral care) with attention to the candidates' field experiences and projects in ministry. Open only to D. Min. students. 4 semester hours. 8:00-10:00, 10:50-12:50, Tuesday-Friday.

B 152s Elementary Greek

Mr. Cook

A continuation of B 151. Careful reading of I John. 3 semester hours. 8:00-10:00, 10:50-11:50, Tuesday-Friday. Prerequisite B 151.

B 325s Drama in the Old Testament and Contemporary Literature Mr. Rogers

An examination of the dramatic qualities of Old Testament religion and a comparative study of drama in the Old Testament with contemporary literature. 2 semester hours. 10:50-12:50, Tuesday-Friday.

H 203s English Reform: The Lollards to the Puritans Mr. Halbrooks

An examination of the currents of reform in England, including the interaction of social, political and religious issues. The rise of sects and Baptist beginnings are stressed. 2 semester hours. 10:50-12:50, Tuesday-Friday.

T 102s Systematic Theology Mr. Eddins

A continuation of T 101. An examination of the doctrines of man, the person and work of Christ, the church and the Christian life, and the Christian hope. 3 semester hours. Prerequisite: T 101. 8:00-10:00, 10:50-11:50, Tuesday-Friday.

T 227s The Ethics of Human Sexuality Mr. Hewitt

A study of the nature of human sexuality, atypical sexual patterns (e.g., homosexuality), the history of the Church's attitude toward human sexuality, changing patterns of sexual behavior,

and elements of a responsible Christian sex ethic. 2 semester hours. 10:50-12:50, Tuesday-Friday.

T 309s Contemporary British Theology Mr. Tull

An examination of the principal types of British theological thought of the current century. 2 semester hours. Prerequisites: T 101-102, 1:00-3:00, Tuesday-Friday.

M 105s The Pastor's Multiple Ministry

Mr. McEachern

A study of the multiple ministries of the modern pastor, including planning a preaching program, filling the pastoral role of the congregation, planning services, and activities, and relating his ministry to the community and denomination. 2 semester hours. 8:00-10:00, Tuesday-Friday.

M 240s Career Support for Ministers Mr. Wright

An investigation of sustaining relationships and resources, emotional and social isolation, stress management, the development of peer groups, family clusters, and healthy church staff relationships, physical and mental health issues, and family financial planning for ministers. 2 semester hours. 1:00-3:00, Tuesday-Friday.

M 384s Issues in Psychology and Religion: Guilt

Mr. Cumbee

Intensive study of particular issues in psychology and religion. 2 semester hours. 8:00-10:00 Tuesday-Friday. Prerequisite: M 181.
