TUCKASEIGEE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Report on Minister's Relief and Retirement was read by B. S. Hensley as follows:

The relief and annuity board has entered upon its twenty-fifth year. At the beginning there was \$100,000 to operate with and now there is \$1,147,678.84. 7,500 persons are to receive benefits in the years ahead. There are already approximately 8,000 preachers cooperating.

Preachers should write their State Secretary for any information they need, for literature for their churches, and for application blanks.

When these blanks are properly filled out and signed they should be sent with the first month's dues of the preacher and the first month's contribution from the church or churches to the State Secretary, and thus, membership will begin in the greatest of all plans ever known among Southern Baptists for the care of aged and disabled ministers.

The Report on State Missions was not read but was accepted for the minutes.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS

For long years after the Baptist State Convention was organized more than one hundred years ago, the primary purpose of what is called State Missions was to promote evangelism, to establish churches and support the churches thus established by giving aid to the pastors of the churches until such time as they could become self-supporting. In later years, however, many other agencies and activities have been added as Baptists have increased in numbers and as their vision has enlarged.

It is obvious from the following quotation from the present Constitution of the Baptist State Convention that the object of the Convention is fivefold. "The object of the Convention shall be to promote missions, Education, Social Service, the distribution and study of the Bible and sound religious literature; and to cooperate with the Southern Baptist Convention in its work." The State Mission Board is ever growing and becoming a more important part of the Baptist State Convention.

Let it be understood that the support of our hospital and our orphanage is not now considered as State Mission work but rather as the social service work of the Convention.

Report on Temperance as read by T. F. Deitz is given below, in part.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE

No argument need be given here as to the evils of intemperance. These evils are understood and openly admitted by the citizens of Jackson County. The county commissioners and the Aldermen of Sylva have banned the sale of wine and beer on Sunday. We heartily endorse this action.

We recommend: (1) That the preachers preach more against intemperance and for more temperate living; that the church reform the unsincere and lawless members and stand for pure christian living as was intended by its founder. (2) That we do all we can to get a state wide referendum on the liquor question, when the legislature convenes, and do all in our power to again make North Carolina a dry state.

REPORT OF STATE CHURCHES

An honest study of what information we could gather on the condition of the churches reveals the following facts: 35 churches were represented by letter. There were eight churches which did not make any report. 9 churches gave \$782.97 to the cooperative program, 34 churches gave nothing. 19 churches gave 80.26 to the Orphanage, 24 gave nothing to this worthy cause. 16 churches reported the giving of \$59.78 to the Hospital; 27 churches gave nothing.

Total number of baptisms reported 207, a gain of 122 over last year.

We feel very sorry to report that quite a number of our churches are divided and confused over the election of Pastors. These conditions should not exist.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

The reports of the Sunday Schools that have been well represented at the conventions, held on the second Sunday afternoon in each month, show a steady gain in enrollment and in average attendance. In checking the reports to the convention by those of last year we find that nineteen of the twenty-eight Sunday Schools reporting show an increase in enrollment and average attendance, six reporting a loss and three reporting about the same as last year.

Ten churches report a Daily Vacation Bible School held this summer. Only one Sunday School reports a training course for officers and teachers.

There are many and great opportunities to be realized in the Sunday School work here in our Association. If only our Associational organization with all its officers would function properly and every Sunday School officer and teacher would realize their responsibility in winning every one in their community into Sunday School to teach them the Bible in the way the Lord would have it taught on Sunday morning!

W. M. U. REPORT

It is with peculiar joy and gratitude that the report of the year's work of W. M. U. of North Carolina is submitted. It has

been a good year of interest and increase along many lines. Organizations have now reached a total of 4,075 with a membership of 83,521. This is an increase over 1940 report. There was an increase in the state denominational paper, and the goal was reached for World Comrades. The goal set for Royal Service (W. M. U. magazine) was exceeded, but the window for the Y. W. A. fell below the goal. 224 more organizations observed the week of prayer and an increase of 762 tithers. Therefore there is a substantial financial gain. We did not reach the goal set for the Hundred Thousand Club but there was an increase of more than \$21,000. We give credit to our consecrated leadership for this. Last fall we held a two day workers conference, bringing to Raleigh the divisional and Associational leaders together. This meeting proved to be most helpful. We hope that it will become a permanent part of our work.

REPORT FOR OUR ASSOCIATION

In our own Association we have forty-three churches, but only seven W. M. Societies. All of these seven have some organized young peoples work, but there is a host of young people in the Tuckaseigee Association who are getting no missionary training. Who's responsibility are they? Mine and yours.

The women and young people raised, since our last association for our co-operative program and our Hundred Thousand Club, \$473.98 besides our contributions to our special offerings.

May God lead us very definitely and may we be willing to be thus lead.

THE BAPTIST HOSPITAL

The last three years have been eventful in the expansion of the hospital. Three years ago the hospital had a bed capacity of 100 and by overcrowding, we were caring for 4,000 patients per year.

Today, we have a modernly constructed and equipped hospital with a bed capacity of almost 10,000 patients annually, and now caring for about 650 patients per month. Owing to a shortage of nurses caused by war conditions, the hospital has been able to open a few rooms.

We shall have this year not less than 2,500 service or free patients. This will represent, including hospital and medical service, about \$250,000 in free service for this year.

The hospital has a staff of 26 internes and about 100 doctors practicing in the hospital. In addition, it has the free service of the entire staff of the Medical School whenever desired for consultation and diagnosis. Every department is thoroughly organized to give the most efficient service possible.

The equipment, as well as the building, is entirely modern. The hospital recently added \$20,000 worth of new instruments to the operating rooms and \$44,000 worth of new X-Ray equipment the operating rooms and \$44,000 worth of new X-Ray equipment.

The hospital, in conjunction with the Medical School, has a floor space of four acres and represents a value to the denomination of \$2,000,000 with only a very small amount of indebtedness.

The purpose of the hospital shall remain as ever—to give hospital treatment to those who are unable to pay for same, educate nurses with Christian Ideals, and at the same time, maintain a standard of scientific efficiency “second to none in the country.” It is the abiding purpose of the management that it shall be definitely a Christian Institution with all that it implies.

This greatly expanded service which is growing more and more into every section of the state, of course, requires an increased support. This, we are glad to report, is growing year by year. In addition to the Mother’s Day offering by the churches and Sunday Schools, which has increased in the last few years from \$11,500 to about \$38,000 this year, the hospital linens contributed by the W. M. U.’s and other church agencies has increased year by year.

ORPHANAGE REPORT

I am sometimes led to believe that the Baptists of North

Carolina do not realize the importance of providing for the orphans within our midst.

In utter disregard of the Biblical command that “we provide for the widows and orphans” there are churches in the Tuckaseegee Association that have not in years given anything toward the support of the orphanage. How can we hope to make strong, able and intelligent men and women out of these boys and girls if we are unwilling to provide them with the necessities of life and a reasonable education? They are not to blame because they are left to plod the pathway of life without the guiding hand of a father or mother. They are not to blame because they have no home or no relative to whom they may go for food and shelter, but if this food and shelter is not provided, you and I are to blame, you and I who call ourselves Christians—you and I who have pledged one with another that we would provide for them—The question I raise with you today is this—are we providing for them as we agreed—are we carrying out the command of Jesus—do our hearts tell us that we have met the challenge and fulfilled our obligation—does the record of your church indicate that you and the other members of your church have through the year had the children of our orphanage on your minds and hearts? What have you given personally toward their food, shelter and education? What has your church given? I long for the day when every church in this Association will provide a monthly offering for these boys and girls who have been left in the world homeless, penniless and in many instances friendless, except for the church.

We talk about National Defense. We read about National Defense, but the only way to have a perfect National Defense is to have our boys and girls trained in the way of the Lord. Only those who love the Lord can provide this training. If you and I will provide the money our leaders can give many of the underprivileged boys and girls this training they so much need. Last year this Association provided \$225.88 in cash and \$625.00 worth of provisions to this worthy object. For the next year we ought to double this amount, both in cash and provisions. It can be done if the Baptists of this Association will only awake to their opportunity and responsibility.

Last year, we cared for 739 children, in addition to making adjustments for a large number of others, with relatives and friends. 59 were cared for in their own homes, and 28 in boarding homes, making a total of 826.

564 applications were received and every application has been investigated.

This year, up to June 1, 43 churches have paid \$157.25. Only 12 churches in our association have paid anything, leaving 31 churches that have not paid anything.
