



#### DEDICATION



Clyde Wyman Collins

"Preacher Collins" was born August 25, 1910 in Belton, South Carolina. He is the one of twelve children born to Etta Cox Collins and Dean Authur Collins, a textile worker.

He had little religious upbringing and did not become a Christian until age twenty-seven. By his own testimony he lived a rough life. He was visited by a Baptist minister and deacon who led him to Christ in his home.

He married Lillie Coker Collins at age nineteen and worked in textiles like his father. They have three girls; Norma Higgins, Florida; Carolyn Kinsley, Huntersville, NC; and Patrica Merril, Georgia; and one son; Bill of Merit Island, Florida.

He preached his first sermon on the street corner at Woodside, SC. Later he pastored at Rocky Hill Baptist Church at Cedar Mountain, North Carolina. He rode a Star Mail Route Truck for eighteen months to his church before he got his own transportation. He also became pastor of Kerrs Hill Baptist Church in Brevard. Both of these churches were quarter time churches.

Next he went to Glady Branch Baptist Church and pastored there for eight and a half years. From there he came to the East Sylva Baptist Church and pastored for five years. The church grew under his leadership.

Next he went to the Buff Creek Baptist church and then to the Cowee Baptist Church in Macon County. He was there for two years before accepting the call to Sand Hill Baptist Church in Buncombe County. From there received an invitation few Baptist Pastors enjoy, the call to return to the Buff Creek Baptist Church and pastor. From there he was called to the Liberty Baptist Church and then to the Mt. Hope Baptist Church in the Macon Association.

He returned to the Tuckaseigee Association to pastor the Jarrett Memorial Baptist Church before a health problem forced him to retire.


He was a member of one of the first graduating classes of Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute and participated in many continuing education classes.

He has preached in five states in revival meetings and has developed a gospel track at his own expense.

He has a reputation as a fine painter. Once he volunteered to do a small painting job and enjoyed it so much and did it so well that he became widely used as a painter in the area.

He is eighty-seven years old and still does supply preaching from time to time. His health no longer permits him to paint although he still gets requests. He lives on Spalding road and is a member of Buff Creek Baptist Church. He is filled with the love and enthusiasm of God. He has a quick wit and an easy smile.

ROY J. BAKER

Roy Baker was born and reared in Dillsboro. He was one of eight children born to Jess W. and Dovie Conner Baker. He had one sister and six brothers.

Roy joined the United States Army at age eighteen and made a career in the Army. He was widely traveled. He retired as a Sergeant Major after thirty years of distinguished service. He served in World War II and Korea.


During his retirement years, he returned to Jackson County and lived in Webster. His wife, Nellie, still lives in Webster. He has three sons: Roy of Easley, SC; Bob of Webster; and Tommy of Sylva. He also has five grandchildren.

Dillard American Legion Post 104. He worked as a Voice volunteer for a number of years after his retirement in 1974.

HENRY ARVIL GREENE

Henry Arvil Greene was born September 14, 1891 in the Conely's Creek Community of Swain County. He went home to be with the Lord on October 9, 1992.

He is the son of Frank Collins and Annie M. Greene. He married Grace Jane Parton on November 3, 1934. They were blessed with four daughters; Loreda Lewis, Lavine Callicott, Lou Britt and Linda Lloyd, and one son, Lester.


Arvil was saved, baptized and joined the Almond Baptist Church in 1938. Arvil, Jane and Family moved to the Wilmot community and joined the Wilmot Missionary Baptist Church in 1943. After returning from World War II, he help build the present church building. He served in many capacities for 49 years: Sunday School Teacher, Superintendent, Song leader, Deacon and Senior Deacon. He served many years as a messenger from the Wilmot Baptist Church to the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association.

Arvil humbly served his God, church and community. He and Jane were good neighbors in the community and were always ready to help in time of need. He served as 4-H leader and PTA President.

He and Jane became well known as people who embodied the spirit of the hard working, self-reliant, Appalachian settlers. He was an avid hunter, woodsman, folklorist, and was an expert in the construction and use of early settlers' farm and household implements.

Arvil and Jane have been featured in numerous publications: John Parris, Wilma Dykeman, Charles Kuralt, National Geographic, and National Park Service Publications as well as others. In 1980, they were honored as the recipients of the Mountain Heritage Award at Western Carolina University.

VERNON JACOB JAMISON

Vernon Jamison was born on February 27, 1928 to Rev. William Ernest Jaminson, Sr. and Altha Beasley Jamison. He was one of eight children, three boys and five girls. He was born and reared in Jackson County.

He was married to Joan Dillard Jamison on September 11, 1954. They have five children: Rev. Mike Jamison, of Raleigh; Kathy McConnell of Cullowhee; Kitty Brooks of Sylva, Ted Jamison of Rocky Mount and John Jamison of Sylva.

He worked as a wholesale grocery salesman for H.T. Hackney Company in Waynesville for more than thirty years.



JOHN JARVIS TURPIN

John Jarvis Turpin was born on May 9, 1909. He is the son of James H. and Elmeta Brown Turpin of the Dicks Creek community in Jackson County. On November 25, 1921 Jarvis accepted Christ as his Savior, joined Dicks Creek Baptist Church and was baptized on December 3, 1921. He was ordained a deacon on May 25, 1940 and remained a faithful member and active deacon for fifty-three years until his death. He attended the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association as a messenger from his church for decades.

On December 21, 1929 Jarvis married Ina Marie Greene. She was a devout Christian and served as church clerk for forty-five years. She died on August 11, 1991.

They had three children, James of Candler, Zeb of Pisgah Forest, and Jo Meta of Sylva. James and Zeb are deacons in their church and Jo is an active member and secretary of East Sylva Baptist church. Jo also serves as Assistant Treasurer of the Tuckaseigee Association.

Jarvis had two grandsons, three granddaughters, and three great grandsons.

Jarvis attended elementary school at Dicks Creek and high school at Qualla. He was a farmer and logger and lived in the Dicks Creek Community all his life until he went home to be with the Lord on June 17, 1993.

#### ONE HUNDRED SIXTY FOURTH ANNUAL SESSION THURSDAY, OCTOBER 14, 1993 FIRST SESSION

- 1. The Lovedale Baptist Church was host for the first session of the 164th annual meeting of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association. A delicious meal was served at 5:00 pm for 210 messengers and visitors representing 33 associational churches.
- 2. Rev. J. D. Grant, pastor at Lovedale, welcomed everyone.
- 3. Dennis Burrell, pastor at Little Savannah, lead in prayer.
- 4. Rev. James K. Pressley, Moderator, convened the first session at 6:00 pm.
- 5. Rev. Harry Vance, Associational Music Director, lead the congregation in singing "BRETHREN, WE HAVE MET TO WORSHIP" and "ALL HAIL THE POWER OF JESUS' NAME".
- 6. Special music was provided by the Lovedale Choir.
- 7. Scott Courtney, pastor of Webster Baptist Church, delivered the evening message. His scripture was taken from I Corinthians 9:19-23 and his message entitled "Different Ways Christians have to express themselves."
- 8. An announcement was made concerning the death of a church member in the churches. If you had not given that to the Associational Office, please give it to Kathleen Buchanan, Chairperson of the Memorial Committee, to be added to the list of Memorials.
- 9. The Moderator announced a few changes in the scheduled program. The 7:15 report from UNITED CHRISTIAN MINISTRIES would be moved after the Missions Development Council Report followed by Congregational singing. The 8:05 Congregational Singing would be after the Constitution Committee Report. On Friday night, October. 15, 1993, the Congregational Singing at 7:00 pm would be moved up to the beginning of Reports. The BOOK OF REPORTS and Order of Business were then approved.
- 10. As voted on last year, an offering would be taken for United Christian Ministries.
- 11. The Moderator recognized new pastor, visitors and Associational Agency representatives. New Pastors were: Daryl Norton, Shoal Creek; Ernest Jamison III, Zion Hill; Robert Odom, Hamburg; Mike Vanzura, Associate Pastor, Cullowhee.
- 12. Norman Parris gave the Discipleship report. He announced a study course for Deacons to be held later, also recognized students for Bible Drills.
- 13. Roy Burnette presented the Missions Development Council report. This included our New York Partnership with the Davis Association, The Ukraine Partnership, people who had helped with the Hurricane Andrew project, the flood victims of the Midwest, and Oleta Zachary's raising \$4,000.00 for a Brazilian Mission to be built.
- 14. Jane Boggs gave the United Christian Ministries report.
- 15. Joe Yelton, pastor at Cullowhee Baptist, told how Christian Ministries started and encouraged people to give generously to this worthy project.
- 16. Harry Vance lead the Congregation in "TO GOD BE THE GLORY".
- 17. The Moderator lead in prayer before the offering was taken for United Christian Ministries. A generous offering was given for this cause.
- 18. Jack Hinson, Hospital Chaplain, gave the C.J. Harris Hospital report. He thanked everyone for their support. He wanted every church to give to Hospital Chaplaincy Sunday the last Sunday in October.
- 19. John Reid gave the Director of Missions report. He thanked each church for letting him be a part of Baptist work. He gave a report on work accomplished in the past year. He recognized Lyman Fisher for working with District 10 Disaster Relief Van. One group, Single Adults, had failed because of lack of interest. A plaque from the Association was presented to

- James K. Pressley for the good job as moderator. Rev. Reid called for Raymond Deitz to help give out certificates to the ones who went to Missouri. A new project "Handyman's Service" would be established to help our elderly people in our communities.
- 20. Fred Lunsford talked on Strategy Planning. Every Church was invited to participate and talk about ways to grow.
- 21. Earl Hooper, chairman of the personnel committee, gave his report. (This is a new committee added at last years' annual meeting, and members present were asked to stand.)
- 22. Harry Vance gave a brief description of the Grievance procedures.
- 23. Ed Beddingfield gave a brief description for the Director of Missions.
- 24. Scott Courtney gave the Constitution report.
- 25. Earl Hooper asked those present to study both inserts so they could be voted on and adopted tomorrow night.
- 26. Harry Vance, Music Director, lead the congregation in "THERE IS A NAME I LOVE TO HEAR".
- 27. Ken Bishop gave the Committee on Committee report. He expressed his thanks to everyone who accepted positions in the Association. He also stated two reports had been left out of the BOOK OF REPORTS. These were the Resolution Committee and Truett Camp Committee. The Resolution Committee officers are: Barry Almand, Mike Farmer, and Ernie Jamison. The Truett Camp Committee officers are: Lewis Keener and Ken Bishop.
- 28. Jim Sherrill gave the Nominating Committee report.
- 29. Mike Moore gave the Evangelism report. He stated they were down to two members since three pastors had left. Also they were working on some things to do and requested prayer for them.
- 30. Ronnie Waldroup spoke on the three year Ukraine Partnership. He told of his experience in going for two weeks and the difference it had made in his life. John Reid gave the New York Partnership report. They have 10 churches and two missions in the Davis Association.
- 31. Ray Houston gave the Clerk's report.

## PROGRAM REPORTS

#### DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS REPORT

As I celebrate my eleventh year as Director of Missions, I want to thank the people of the churches for the prayers, support, cooperation and encouragement you have given me during these eleven years. I am grateful for the many opportunities to preach, to teach and to serve in other ways in the life of the local church.

I am particularly grateful to and commend to you the officers and committees in the association who have done their work well this past year. I have high praise for their work. The Association, like the local church, is totally dependent upon volunteers to accomplish its tasks. The volunteers have contributed many hours and all of us owe them a debt of gratitude.

My role as Director of Missions requires tasks that are many and varied. I consider myself first and foremost a servant and a friend of the local church. My goal is to lead the association to be able to be a resource for each church to realize its potential before God. Some of the ways I have served this past year are: preaching, teaching, planning, strategizing, training, equipping, leading, encouraging and consulting in the local church. I have met with several pulpit committees in helping to train them and giving them resumes.

Since Baptist churches are numerous and Baptist people are influential in the county, I am often called upon by different agencies or groups to give some input into their projects. I also serve as a volunteer chaplain at C.J. Harris Hospital.

We are in our second year of our New York-North Carolina partnership. I am pleased that Brian Stephens took a group of our youth to the Davis Baptist Association to help the Maryland Baptist Church build a porch and some other needed renovations. Brother David Hunt, Pastor of Maryland Baptist Church, and his family came to our Association and worked at the Lovedale church in Vacation Bible School.

Our Association is grateful to Mrs. Oleta Zachery who went with us to Brazil in May of 1992. Many churches and individuals helped her to meet a \$4,000 goal this year for the Terra Pretta Mission. Even though the official part of that partnership is over, God continues to bless that effort.

In July of this year I received an invitation from the First Baptist Church of Cutler Ridge to attend a Celebration Dinner "to thank God for His faithfulness and care during this year of recovery." A large group from the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association went to Florida right after Christmas and did volunteer construction for a week. Lyman Fisher, of the Ochre Hill Church, is giving great leadership to Region Ten as our Disaster Relief Coordinator.

At the end of July, a group of disaster volunteers left this association and went to Hannibal, Missouri to assist in the disaster relief effort there. That was a five day trip. We fed approximately 100 people per day and worked in the Red Cross shelter.

Betty Grant observed her second anniversary this past May. We are grateful to her for the fine work she does here in the office. She is a friend and a prayer warrior.

I am grateful for prayers and financial support of the many listeners of the radio program. Although the Tuckaseigee Baptist Half-Hour is not officially linked with the Association, I do believe it is an excellent means of Bible teaching and promotion of events in the Association. Weekly I encourage listeners to attend and to support their local church.

I am grateful to the WMU for their provision for the meal to celebrate the ministry of the pastor and his family during Pastor Appreciation Sunday. I am

coordinating that event with Associational Emphasis Week with the hope that each Church will recognize both their pastor and his importance as a key leader in the Church and the Association.

Each year there are certain meetings that I attend that have to do with our larger Baptist family. This past year I attended the State Convention Meeting in Winston-Salem, the Annual State Staff/DOM meeting at Caraway, the Southern Baptist Convention meeting in New Orleans, and board meetings for Camp Truett and for the Southwestern Area Resort Ministry (SWARM). Also I attended Key Leadership at Ridgecrest.

The Association has taken an important step in deciding to do Associational Strategy Planning and has been busy this year doing the Associational study. This is a process by which an association determines its purpose, identifies its objectives and set its course of action within our county. Stated simply, it is our plan.

It consists of seven work groups: Statement of Purpose Task group, Rev. John Reid, Chair; Publications task group, Irene Hooper, Chair; Church study task group, Rev. Roy Burnette, Chair: Associational organization study task group, Dr. Randy Sherron, Chair; Population study task group, Shirley Kool, Chair; Social systems task group, Shelia Hoyle, Chair; and Other religious groups task group, Rev. Scott Courtney, Chair. This effort is involving a lot of people from different churches and will set the direction of the association for the next five years. It will help us see who we are and what we should be doing as we move toward the end of the century. The work should be completed by the end of this year and be ready for adoption in January of 1994.

Two important aspects of Associational life are strong. Our fellowship and cooperation among our churches is good. Churches are having joint services, attendance is good at meetings, and there is a good spirit in the association. May God continue to bless us as we work together.

#### WMU ANNUAL REPORT: 1992-1993

Missions is the heartbeat of Southern Baptists. WMU acts as a catalyst for missions teaching and involvement. This year, the emphasis "Lead On!" has inspired women and children to recognize their potential for servant leadership and to find a place of Christian service in missions.

Various activities were held during the year with this emphasis in mind. Girls in Action held two Missions Activity Days at Sylva First Baptist, one on October 3, and one on May 1. hris starts college at North Carolina State this fall on a football scholarship. After leading Thomasville to a state championship in 1991, Chris also earned national honor society recognition, was active in the community counseling drug abusers... and became a Christian at Mills Home.

Kathy married a Christian young man who was a volunteer at Broyhill Home, where she lived. She continues her education at Haywood Technical College while working and becoming a young wife. She and her husband, Kris, are members at Woodland Baptist Church, where she was active in leading children's programs, even as a Broyhill resident.

Several rows of supportive staff members cried during the wedding when the minister asked, "Who gives this woman to be married?" Child care worker Jim Johnson responded, "Her mother and I do."

"Her mother," was Jim's wife, Vivian. Together, Jim and Vivian helped Kathy develop from an angry and withdrawn child, to a beautiful, confident, Christian leader.

Ashley was growing up too fast... and her parents didn't know how to handle it. They wanted to treat her like a child; she wanted adult freedoms. When their constant clashing came to blows, they knew they needed help.

Through the family clarification program at Mills Home, both Ashley and her parents learned the roles they played in the family conflict, and how to listen, forgive and adjust in the future.

"We're very grateful to Baptist Children's Homes," said Ashley's mother, Victoria. "I don't know what we would have done. I don't know what would have happened to Ashley. I've had friends say to me, 'I never knew there was a place like that."

Well, there is a place like that.

#### Thank God.

Baptist Children's Homes in 1992-93 served 1,453 children and their families through programs of intentionalized services at 13 facilities across North Carolina.

Those facilities include four residential care campuses; seven emergency care homes; two homes for behaviorally troubled girls; therapeutic camping for boys; a maternity home; a home for teen-age

mothers and their babies and a model daycare facility.

Baptist Churches, through the Thanksgiving Offering, Cooperative Program and direct gifts funded about one-third of BCH's \$10 million budget. A significant source of income continues to be from estate gifts from those who remember children in their wills.

BCH's model daycare service took a giant step June 27 when the new \$1 million, 10,000 sq. ft. Fleshman-Pratt Early Childhood Education Center was dedicated. It will accommodate 75 infants, toddlers and two-year olds.

During dedication, Robin Britt, N.C. Secretary of the NC Department of Human Resources, said BCH is "a true model of how young children can be shaped, nurtured and loved," and that "we will be looking at institutions like the Fleshman-Pratt Early Childhood Education Center as we find models to replicate."

T. Winfield Blackwell, president of the Fleshman-Pratt Foundation, whose lead gift started construction of the building, said, "Think how many children will be raised and shaped by the dedicated staff who serve here, and surely a goodly number will be developed, not only to be good citizens, but active ministers in God's service."

BCH also dedicated a counselor's lodge at Cameron Boys Camp; completed a strategic planning cycle for the next three years; celebrated the 50th anniversary of Odum Home in Pembroke; completed a three-year partnership with the Baptist Children's Homes of Sao Paulo, Brazil; and produced a new video about BCH, available Aug. 15.

Swelling with emotion at the dedication of her new building, Daycare Services Director Mary Lou Dickey promised, "we will not fail" those who trust BCH with their children.

Michael C. Blackwell, who celebrated his 10th anniversary as president of BCH July 1, echoes that promise. "Baptist Children's Homes has been a cutting-edge ministry for North Carolina Baptists since 1885. As a disintegrating society moves the edges further and further, we're honing our ministry sharper and sharper. Thank you, North Carolina Baptists, for your support."

#### NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION, INC. ANNUAL REPORT TO BAPTIST ASSOCIATIONS OF NORTH CAROLINA June, 1993

The North Carolina Baptist Foundation works diligently in service to Christ as directed by the agency's Mission Statement:

"The North Carolina Baptist Foundation is an agency of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina committed under the guidance of the Holy Spirit to serving North Carolina Baptists and others in generating an increased awareness of Christian estate stewardship principals as a means of financially undergirding churches, institutions and mission endeavors on a permanent basis.

And further, the Baptist Foundation Staff and Board of Directors are committed to being scrupulously moral, legal, efficient and accurate in carrying out the intent of each donor and trustor whose funds are placed under management of the Foundation as a means of sustaining a tangible and perpetual involvement in presenting the Gospel, meeting human needs and strengthening all bodies of Christian fellowship where Christ is the Head."

The total market value of the assets of the Foundation at the end of 1992 was \$41,880,638., an increase of almost \$5.6 million over the end of 1991. Typically, assets are either held as endowments paying interest income in perpetuity to named Baptist causes, or they are held in trust with current income being paid to individuals and future income to be paid to Baptist causes in perpetuity. Additionally, the Foundation offers fund management for Baptist causes on a revocable basis.

Earned income distributed and paid to Baptist churches, institutions & mission causes during fiscal year 1992:

\$1,182,203.

Earned income distributed and paid to individuals (with Baptist causes named as future beneficiaries) during the fiscal year 1992:

\$1,024,007.

In 1992, and continuing into 1993, the Long Range Planning Committee of the Board of Directors met extensively to lay the groundwork for the Foundation's goals and objectives for the next five years. The previous five years were quite successful with ambitious financial goals being met early on. It is anticipated that the Board's work in evaluating the past and present status and in laying a road map for the future will result in exciting times ahead.

The staff of the Foundation consists of seven full time employees and two persons who provide part-time service in accounting and legal services. The office is located in Cary next to the Baptist State Convention building. Visitors are welcome and are encouraged to stop by for professional assistance or just to say hello.

## NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL



#### BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

Founded in 1922, Baptist Hospital is a missionary enterprise of the Baptist churches of North Carolina. The essence of our purpose is to carry out a ministry of healing as taught by Jesus Christ. We remain as fully committed to this mission as were our founding fathers. In the midst of changing health-care norms, we have not, nor will we, deviate from this mission. The following paragraphs report, not only basic facts, but various results of how we have sought in the last year to remain true to our heritage while providing quality health care of affordable prices.

PROVIDERS AND RECIPIENTS OF HEALING

Our healing team now consists of 5,852 employees. The Medical Center (NCBH and BGSM) personnel total employment is fast approaching 9,000 people making us the second largest employer in Forsyth County. In our 806-bed facility, we had 23,247 inpatient admissions. Our Outpatient Department, physicians' clinics, and other related departments received 490,667 patient visits.

Our chaplaincy division joined with our health-care professionals to provide spiritual and emotional healing. With 15-40 chaplains present at various times, 52,934 ministries were provided to patients, families, staff and groups.

A new department of our Pastoral Care program named the Center for Congregational Health was given birth. Its purpose is to (1) train Intentional Interim pastors; (2) train church leaders; (3) provide a minister's assessment program; (4) establish a Minister's Help Line providing an opportunity for church leaders to receive guidance via a telephone call. The Pastoral Counseling Division opened a new counseling center in Wilmington bringing our total counseling centers to 11 across the state. The centers provided 16,205 counseling sessions.

POINTS OF EXCELLENCE

(1) The Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations ranks Baptist Hospital in the top 9% of all hospitals in the nation. (2) - We performed our first pancreas transplant and first double organ transplant (pancreas and kidney) this year. (3) We are one of only 26 comprehensive cancer care centers in the nation, treating more cancer patients than any hospital from Baltimore, Md. to Atlanta, Ga. (4) Quality infant through adolescence care in our Brenner Children's Hospital. (5) Our neonatal transport team is the largest in North Carolina and one of the 10 largest in the U.S. (6) Our Level I (highest awarded) Trauma Center has 2,100 admissions a year.

SUPERB FINANCIAL STEWARDSHIP

In the midst of escalating health-care costs, we have a proven record of excellent stewardship. (1) The latest report of the North Carolina Database Commission comparing hospital major services charges vs. Baptist Hospital reveals, for our most frequent diagnoses: Duke - 36% higher; Carolina's Medical Center (Charlotte) - 36.5% higher; UNC-Chapel Hill - 28% higher; Average statewide - 9% higher. (2) We are one of only 17 similar hospitals nationally with a "AA" bond credit rating. (3) Averaging the last two years and the projection for 1993, the Consumer Price Index will average 3.9% and the Medical CPI will average 9.7%. Baptist Hospital charge increases for the same period will average 3.3%, well under both the above mentioned indexes.

WINSTON-SALEM, NORTH CAROLINA

EXPANSION FOR MEETING THE NEEDS OF THE FUTURE

Nursing Center at Oak Summit: Opening in July, this 170-bed facility provides skilled and intermediate care. The center will be one of only a few in the state to provide care for ventilator-dependent patients.

Emergency Department/Dietary: Under construction at the present time to be completed by June 1995, this facility will total 750,000 square feet. Our current ER was designed to handle 29,000 patients annually, but is handling more than 40,000. Our new ER capacity will be 70,000 annually. This building will also house three floors of patient private rooms, our Pharmacy Department, and a 35-bed Day Hospital, new kitchen and cafeteria.

J. Paul Sticht Center on Aging and Rehabilitation: Construction on this facility begins in November of 1993 and is scheduled for completion in January 1996. It will include geriatric care, research, and education; psychiatry; and also provide comprehensive acute rehabilitation services including nutrition assessment, physical, outpatient, speech, and recreational therapy.

BAPTIST BENEVOLENT CARE FUND

Last year Baptists across our state gave \$422,000 to our annual Mother's Day Offering. All of these monies went toward relieving the financial burden of scores of former patients who have little or no healthcare insurance and no financial means to pay their hospital bills. The churches and individuals help make this ministry possible and we are grateful.

In conclusion, it is readily seen that this healing ministry we share together says to our patients and their families; "We care about your health-care needs, your spiritual and emotional needs, and your financial burdens, and we express our caring through service."

## BAPTIST RETIREMENT HOMES REPORT 1993: THE BEST OF TIMES

Did you know that:

In 1993, North Carolina reached place number ten (10) among all the states in the United States in regard to the size of its adult population over the age of sixty-five (65).

That one-half of all the people who have ever lived to be sixty-five

(65) are now living.

The fastest growing segment of North Carolina life is composed of those adults eighty-five (85) and older and that by the year 2000 that age category will double in size.

That by the year 1996 North Carolina's "Baby Boomers" will be turning

fifty-five (55) every 18 seconds.

That by the year 2010 one out of every two people living in North Carolina will be fifty (50) years of age or older.

What do figures like those above mean for North Carolina Baptists?

They point to the fact that one of the greatest needs facing our Convention as we move into the year 2000 is the provision of quality, affordable long-term care services to functionally impaired Older Adults through the expansion of existing long-term care facilities, and through the development of creative approaches to long-term care such as rural home health services, community day care programs, and respite programs for homebound care providers.

In an attempt to meet the above mentioned need, Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina, Inc. in 1993:

Opened the Rickman Nursing Care Center in Asheville, North Carolina

(a 100 bed Medicaid certified nursing care facility).

The Rickman Center is a state-of-the-art long-term care facility that has been developed to meet the needs of the poor elderly in Western North Carolina. (30% of the resident population will be recipients of benevolent funding).

Renovated the Albemarle Baptist Home in Stanly Baptist Association and renamed it the Taylor House. The Taylor House has no financial requirements for admission and is designed to provide care to the assisted living level of care resident, regardless of his/her ability to pay for the long-term care services provided.

Developed a new addition to the Brookridge Health Care Unit in Winston-Salem in order to provide an area for small group work with residents suffering from dementia. This state-of-the-art program will enable Baptist Retirement Homes' staff to improve the quality of life experienced by members of its resident community who are mentally impaired.

Baptist Retirement Homes is keenly aware of the fact that without the support of North Carolina Baptists none of the above would have been possible. As a result of the prayers and funding that the "Homes" receives through the Cooperative Program and the North Carolina Offering For Older Adults, it has been able to offer hope to many Older Adults whose future would have been uncertain without the caring involvement of North Carolina Baptists. It is because of you that our institution has been able to make life for many Older Adults in 1993...The Best of Times.

Below are some of the events/ministries offered this year: CHURCH OUTREACH/REVIVAL TEAMS: over 70 students lead worship, special music and youth activities for area churches and student's home churches.

CREATIVE MINISTRY TEAM: Around 10 students were a part of this team. They lead creative worship experiences for area churches and were involved in clowning ministry at C. J. Harris hospital and area nursing homes.

BSU CHOIR: This was a new opportunity that was offered to students this year. There were around 20 members of the choir. They worked on a musical - "Revival in the Land" and presented it to the BSU and to some of the area churches. They are planning to do a new musical this year and would love to come to other churches to do this presentation or to provide special music.

AREA MISSIONS/MINISTRIES: Students were involved in area mission opportunities such as Special Friends (a big brother/sister program for underprivileged kids at Scott's Creek Elementary school), VOICE (elderly ministry), SABA (which stands for Southern Appalachian Band-aid) - the students helped to rebuild houses, roofs, floors for the elderly people in the area, visitation to nursing homes and the hospital, leading programs for the Baptist Children's Home in Waynesville, and many other activities.

MISSION TRIPS: Around 25 students went to Apopka, Florida to work with the children of migrant workers during their Spring Break. They were involved in work projects for the head start centers and working one on one with the children.

WEEKLY WORSHIP AND OTHER MEETINGS: An average of 100 students were involved in the weekly worship meeting - PAUSE. Speakers from area churches/agencies shared with the students about various topics. A three day spiritual renewal conference was also held, lead by Rev. Buddy Freeman, from Gardner-Webb University, concluding with many students making rededications and even first time professions of faith.

STATE CONFERENCES/RETREATS: The students had the opportunity to go to the Fall BSU convention at Ridgecrest, The Spring Leadership Conference at Camp Caraway, and to have a Midwinter Retreat at Camp Truett.

\*\*As you can see, we have been involved in many activities and this does not begin to cover all of them. BSU is giving students at WCU a place to gain support in their Christian faith. # GIDEONS INTERNATIONAL Jackson County Camp

The Gideon Organization, known as The gideons International, is composed of over 122,000 Christian professional and businessmen in 157 countries. The Auxiliary is composed of over 69,000 women, (wives and widows of Gideons). With the help of the local churches here and throughout the 15% countries, The Gideons are placing an average of one million Scriptures every twelve days. Funding to purchase the Scriptures comes from three main sources: 1) Local church love offerings; 2) The Faith Fund (donations by individual Gideon members; 3) Memorial Bible contributions. All monies donated to the Gideons go to purchase Scriptures; administrative costs of the organization are paid by the individual members.

The Jackson County camp, one of 5,200 local camps, was started in 1982. The present membership numbers twenty seven with sixteen in the Auxiliary. It has been the Camp's pleasure to share a Gideon report in more than 25 churches in Jackson County this past year. A total of 3,800 Scriptures were distributed during the year and Jackson County Camp received \$13,702 from the Christians of Jackson county for the purchase of Scriptures.

Acts 1:8 says, "But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witness in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." Recently, as some of the Gideons in the former Soviet Union were helicopter-hopping from one village in the far-off villages of remote Siberia, the people would wave to them as they left and hold their New Testaments close to their hearts. As the day wore on, and they flew farther and farther north witnessing to the Word of God and handing out New Testaments, the pilot finally said, "It is time for us to go back now." The Gideons were inspired by the changed looks on the people's faces as they received God's Word, and said, "Let's go a little further until the day is over." But the pilot responded, "Dear friends, there's no more people living farther north! That's the end!"

Today, almost 2,000 years after Jesus Christ said those prophetic words of Acts 1:8, these people in the north, truly living at the ends of the earth, have god's Word in their houses! The Gideons in the former Soviet Union are distributing 400,000 Scriptures per month, BUT could place 500,000 per month, IF they were available!

## AGENCY REPORTS CHRISTIAN ACTION LEAGUE REPORT

Do you believe in miracles? They still occur, and we experienced one in the 1993 session of the N.C. General Assembly. No gambling legislation

was enacted during that legislative session.

When the legislators came to Raleigh on January 27, 1993, veteran legislature observers admitted that this was the year for a state-operated lottery bill to get out of the General Assembly. Both Governor James B. Hunt and Lt. Governor Dennis Wicker, both former lottery opponents, had endorsed the proposed lottery legislation. Furthermore, there were 42 new House members, and a large majority of them had campaigned supporting the lottery. Out of the key elected state officials, gambling opponents had only one friend, House Speaker Dan Blue, and he made no apologies about his opposition to state-sponsored gambling.

What happened? Concerned Christians began to speak up and contacted their legislators. By the time, Senate Bill 11, The State Lottery Act, had passed the Senate by a vote of 27-23, House members who had campaigned supporting lottery legislation began contacting members of the House Committee on Constitutional Amendments and Referenda to keep the bill in

committee.

In the meantime, some 20 workshops were conducted throughout the state educating and motivating the Christian community about this insidious evil under the sponsorship of the League, N.C. Baptist Men, Woman's Missionary Union, the Council on Christian Life and Public Affairs, and the N.C. Christian Coalition. Resource leaders included Dr. Norman Geisler, author, GAMBLING A BAD BET; Dr. Patrick Anderson, Professor of Criminology, Florida Southern College; Dr. Paul Jones, Executive Director, Mississippi Christian Action Commission; Bill Brooks, Executive Director, CITIZENS AGAINST THE LOTTERY; from the Baptist State Convention, Doug Cole, Executive Director, Christian Life Council; along with George Reed, Director of Christian Citizenship; and members of Gamblers Anonymous.

In the closing days of the legislative session, Rep. David Redwine, (D-Brunswick), who has introduced lottery legislation for the past 10 years, requested that the bill be held over until the 1994 session.

Of course, this will give the \$300 billion gambling industry some 10 months to re-group their supporters. Also it will give concerned Christians the time to get their message to lawmakers that gambling is bad

public policy, and such legislation ought to be defeated.

There is also a pari-mutuel gambling proposal (horse racing with offtrack betting parlors) before the General Assembly. The Senate Bill has already passed a Senate committee and is currently in the Senate Finance The House Bill has also passed a House Committee and is currently in the House Appropriations Committee. Both bills are eligible for the 1994 session.

Someone has said: "The only lesson we learn from history is that we don't learn from history." North Carolina had an experience with parimutuel gambling with dog tracks in Currituck and Carteret Counties in the early 1950's. The N.C. Supreme Court closed them down as being a public

nuisance.

Perhaps there is no industry that is "riddled" with corruption as much as the gambling industry. Last year we had legislators indicted in S.C. for accepting bribes from gambling lobbyists. Some 10 public officials have pled guilty to corruption charges in Kentucky over a gambling "scam," and 12 others are under investigation. In Arizona, We have had legislators have gone to prison due to a gambling scandal. governors from West Virginia and from Maryland to go to prison due to gambling scandals in their respective states. Wherever you have legalized gambling, undoubtedly, you will find corruption in government.

This is why it is urgent for committed Christians to contact their

legislators and urge them to oppose any gambling proposals.

DRUNK DRIVING: When you deal with politicians, tenacity is a key. For ten years, we have sought legislation that would establish -. 08breathalyzer reading as the standard for drunk driving in North Carolina. In the past, we were able to get such legislation through the house, but the Senate was the graveyard. The measure would always be referred to a hostile Senate Committee composed largely of trial lawyers, and that would be "death" to such a proposal.

With a change in Senate leadership, the .08 breathalyzer legislation will become law on October 1, 1993, which will be a useful tool in helping

to remove drunk drivers from the highways.

The League continues to assist local communities in combating our No. 1 drug problem, alcohol. Let us know if a liquor referendum is to be held in your area, and we will be ready to help.

## CHRISTIAN LIFE COUNCIL REPORT

This year has been a year of challenge and a time of learning and organizing in an effort to offer effective, active leadership in the area of Christian Life.

The Christian Life Council deals with social and government issues as they relate to Christians. We hope to bring to the Macon Baptist Association an awareness of the needs and a desire to do our part, based on biblical principles.

Our council's primary work this year has been that of education. We have tried to inform associational leaders on some of the most important issues and actions needed-through articles in the monthly newsletter.

The Christian Life Council sponsored a petition to the State Board of Education urging members to vote against mandatory contraception teaching in 7th and 8th grade. We encouraged churches to participate in "Turn Off Your TV Day" in an effort to change objectionable TV viewing. pastors to guide their members to vote and check voting records of candidates before casting their vote. We have promoted contacting elected officials concerning issues such as gays in the military and the Freedom of Choice Act (abortion on demand) which are contrary to God's law. We worked with a community committee to organize events for the National Day of Prayer. We have ordered a literature rack to hold pamphlets addressing current issues facing Christians today.

We, as Christians and Baptists <u>must</u> become more involved in the social and political arena. Why should Christians be socially and politically involved?

May God richly bless Dr. Rymer in the future.

Since I am currently a student at Fruitland, a lot of questions have been posed to me about possible problems with some policy changes that are taking place at the school. Let me reassure everyone that Fruitland is still holding true to its purpose and mission and that a committee has been formed by the Board of Directors to look into the possible problems. ### HOME MISSIONS REPORT

Home Mission Board President Larry Lewis said it best "It has been said many times that missions is the glue that holds Southern Baptist together. While there always have been, and always will be, differences among Baptists, missions is something we all can agree on and be involved in." The work of 4,868 home missionaries, who saw over 7,000 souls lead to the Lord last year, is possible because of your prayers and gifts.

Natural disasters such as hurricane Andrew last year brought out the best in relief efforts from Baptists just like you. Even the national media took notice and was impressed with the coordination and commitment of Southern Baptist. Many ongoing work projects coordinated through Home Missionaries are still meeting the needs of rebuilding homes and churches.

The Annie Armstrong Easter Offering which makes up 46% of funding for Homes Missions projects set a record this year. The excitement of our leaders and workers drown out the weakening voice of those detractors who claim we are a dying convention. In fact we are alive and well, thanks be to the Grace of God.

## STATE MISSIONS REPORT

North Carolina Baptists have never faced a greater challenge for missions than is before us today. Over 2,000,000 people in North Carolina are unchurched. More than 50,000,000 people visit our resort areas every year. The number of people with special needs, such as visually and hearing impaired and mentally handicapped, continues to grow. Our prisons are bulging with over 20,000 inmates. The multi-ethnic population of the state is growing faster than any other segment of our population. Already over 100,000 Hispanics have settled in our state. The Asian segment of our population will grow by over forty percent by the year 2000. Many of the multi-ethnics calling North Carolina home are without Christ as Lord and Savior.

Assisting churches and associations of the Baptist State Convention in reaching people for Christ and ministering to them is the task of the Mission Division. The Division organizes its work through its departments to meet the mission needs of the state.

Over 100 Southern Baptist Chaplains in the state are supported through the chaplaincy work of the division. New language missions are started in our language department and existing ones are continuously supported. We now . have 97 language-mission churches in the state. People with hearing impairments are assisted through our deaf ministries. Our special ministries work also touches the lives of visually impaired and mentally handicapped Seminary Extension courses are offered through over 100 training centers in the state. Bivocational ministers receive special assistance for Eighty-four new mission-type churches were started in Anglo their work. communities last year. Existing churches that are plateaued receive special assistance for assessing current needs. Multi-housing communities are touched through consultants who work across the state. The work of Baptist Associations is strengthened through the association development programs of the Division. Through training Mission Development Councils, Baptists all over the state are discovered in that every Christian can be a missionary. Families in military communities experience the love of Christ through our military ministries.

"The fields are white unto harvest"... and the Mission Division of the Baptist State Convention seeks to point to the fields and lead Baptists in reaping the harvest. Your continued support through the Cooperative Program and the State Mission Offering is essential to achieving the vision Christ set before us.



one year. It is suggested that any church under watch care participate in the missions program of the Association. At the end of the year the church may be voted in as a member of the Association with full privileges by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present and voting at the Annual Meeting of the Association, provided that the church submits an acceptable letter and at least one messenger be present at the meeting.

SECTION 3. Any church may withdraw from the Association at its pleasure and

should notify the Association of this action in writing. Such action will be recognized by the Association at the next annual meeting.

SECTION 4. It shall be the duty of each church to furnish the Associational clerk, before each annual session, an annual letter, the forms provided by the Associational Clerk giving the information requested as is applicable to each church situation.

SECTION 5. The Association may withdraw from any church which has become unscriptural in its doctrine or practices by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present and voting at the annual meeting. Such vote is to be taken by written ballot.

#### ARTICLE V - MEETINGS

SECTION 1. The Association shall hold its annual meeting on Thursday and Friday preceding the third Sunday in October. Special meetings of the Association may be called by the Executive Committee provided two weeks written notice is given to the member churches.

SECTION 2. Each church shall be entitled to be represented at the annual meeting by four messengers. Churches with more than 100 resident members shall be entitled to an additional messenger for each additional 50 resident members as determined by the church or fraction thereof and not to exceed 10 messengers from any one church.

SECTION 3. Churches are requested to elect their messengers and alternates in conference to attend the annual meeting.

SECTION 4. In case of internal dissension in a church and two parties coming to the association, each claiming to represent the church, neither party shall be seated until the question is decided as to which party is in union with the association. The decision is to be made by a majority of the messengers present and voting.

#### ARTICLE VI - OFFICERS

SECTION 1. General Officers of the Association shall be: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, Historian, Parliamentarian, and assistant Parliamentarian. Program Leaders shall be Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Music Director, Chairman of Evangelism Committee, Seminary Extension Director, Chairman of Mission Committee, Director of Missions, Trustees, Pastor Conference President, Youth Director, Stewardship Director, Vacation Bible School Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Deacons Chairmen, Senior Adult Director, Singles Ministry Director, and such other officers as the Association may desire to elect.

Associational representatives will be elected for the following institutions and agencies: (1) Truett Camp, (2) Baptist Children's Homes, (3) Baptist Hospital, (4) North Carolina Baptist Homes, Inc. (Homes for the Aging), (5)

Biblical Recorder, (6) Christian Education, (7) Annuity Board and other representatives as may be deemed appropriate and elected in the Association.

SECTION 2. With the exception of the Director of Missions and Trustees, the terms of office for all officers of the Association shall be for one year with the privilege of continuing re-election. The Moderator and Vice Moderator shall not be eligible for re-election but one year in succession. (1) The number of Trustees shall be three. (2) The term of service should be for three years, with the term of only one expiring each year. In the first election of Trustees the term of service for one should be three years, another two years, and the other one year. (3) Upon the expiration of term of service the Trustee may or may not be re-elected for another term of three years.

Each term of office shall begin with the close of the annual session. The Associational Financial year will run from January 1 through December 31.

SECTION 3. The Director of Missions shall be sought and recommended by the Executive Committee in a manner of its own choosing. Within ten days after locating a nominee, the Executive Committee shall present the name of the director nominee to a called meeting of the Association. If the annual meeting of the association is scheduled within 60 days, the presentation shall wait until that time.

The called shall be indefinite. The salary, allowance, vacation, etc. shall be provided by the current budget or adjustments recommended by the Executive Committee in consultation with the Finance Committee.

Concerning termination of employment, the resignation shall be in writing and presented to the Executive Committee at least 30 days before it is to take place. The executive Committee may terminate employment by giving 30 days notice in advance.

The Executive Committee shall give full supervision and guidance to the work of the Director of Missions in planning, promoting and financing his work.

#### ARTICLE VII-DUTIES OF OFFICERS

SECTION 1. The Moderator shall preside and maintain the order of all meetings of the Association and Executive Committee. He shall serve as ex officio member of all committees of the Association.

He shall appoint the Committee on Committees and all other committees pertinent to the operation of the body not named by the Committee on Committees in its regular report.

SECTION 2. The Vice Moderator shall assist the Moderator and preside in the absence of, or at the pleasure of the Moderator.

SECTION 3. The Clerk shall keep a complete and accurate record of all transactions; shall prepare a "Book of Reports" to be distributed to messengers at the beginning of each day's session of the annual meeting; and shall cause to be printed minutes concerning the records made.

The Clerk shall distribute to the clerk of each church in the Association, blanks for the preparation of the church letter as soon as they are received from the State Convention. This form is to be returned to the Clerk of the Association not later than two weeks prior to the meeting of the body.

An Assistant Clerk shall work with the clerk in preparing the "Book of Reports."

SECTION 4. The Treasurer shall receive and dispense by order of the Executive Committee of the Association while in session, the money of the treasury and make

a complete report at the Annual Meeting and a current report at each Executive Committee meeting.

An Assistant Treasurer shall be elected to assist the Treasurer by request and to serve in the event the Treasurer resigns or is ill or unable to function.

SECTION 5. The Historian shall keep the records of the Association up-to-date. SECTION 6. The Parliamentarian shall upon the request of the presiding Officer of the body, advise and assist the Association with respect to all matters involving Parliamentary Procedure.

An Assistant Parliamentarian shall be elected. The Parliamentarian and Assistant should always communicate with each other to ensure that this office is filled at each Associational Annual or Executive Committee meeting.

SECTION 7. The Program Leaders and the Institutional Agency Representatives shall perform all duties customary to their titles and shall make a written report to the annual session of the Association.

SECTION 8. The Director of Missions shall work closely with the Associational committees, officers and Churches in such a way as to facilitate the meeting of the objectives of the Association as set forth in Article II.

The Director shall serve as ex-officio member of all committees of the Association. The Director shall communicate with the State and Southern Convention such information as shall be mutually helpful and needful.

The duties of the Director of Missions shall be set forth in Article XIV. SECTION 9. Trustees have no authority except by direction of the Association, and are not personally bound by signatures but, are to be the legal signees for the Association. Trustees represent the Association in legal matters. Trustees act on behalf of the Association in acquisition and disposal of Associational property.

They sign all deeds of conveyance, execute all notes, bonds or mortgages, intervene in all suits, by authority of the Association.

All persons dealing with the trustees, as Associational officers, may rely upon any written resolution duly adopted by the Association or Executive Committee, directing and authorizing the Trustees to act in its behalf and certified by the Association Moderator and Clerk.

#### ARTICLE VIII-RULES OF ORDER

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to Robert's Parliamentary Practice or in a manner not contrary thereto.

#### ARTICLE IX-QUORUM

The quorum for the Annual Associational meeting or any special called meeting of the Association shall not be less than 25 percent of the member Churches.

#### ARTICLE X-THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

SECTION 1. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the General Officers and Program Leaders elected by the Association and the Pastor and one member from each Church in the Association. No Pastor, by virtue of his being an Associational Officer or Program Leader shall be disqualified as a member of the

Executive Committee, from representing the Church or Churches he may be serving in the Association. Twelve of these members shall constitute a quorum.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to act for the Association on matters arising when the Association is not in session and to make a report of all work to the next session of the Association. This body shall meet at a time and place designated by the Moderator on Monday following the first Sunday of each quarter except for the July quarter which shall meet on the second Monday of the month of July. Special meetings of the Executive Committee may be called by the Moderator with a one week notice to the Churches.

SECTION 3. All Vacancies occurring on committees or among elected officers shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

SECTION 4. In the event that a vacancy occurs with the Trustees, the Executive Committee should fill such vacancy for the remainder of the term.

#### ARTICLE XI-ASSOCIATIONAL STANDING COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. The Association shall have such standing committees as may be deemed necessary to promote efficiently the work of the Master in our midst. The terms of office for all committee members shall be for one year except where specifically stated otherwise.

SECTION 2. COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES. It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate at the general meeting all standing committees as set forth under Article XI.

SECTION 3. The NOMINATING COMMITTEE shall be composed of seven members. To this group the Directors of Sunday School, Discipleship Training, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood and Music Ministry will be added.

It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate the Officers, Program Leaders and Institutional Agency Representatives. These nominees shall be notified in writing not less than one month prior to presenting of their names at Annual Session.

SECTION 4. THE ORDER OF BUSINESS COMMITTEE, composed of three members, shall plan the annual program of the Association and present it to the Executive Committee at its October meeting.

SECTION 5. THE CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three pastors and two laymen. It shall examine applications of Churches seeking admission into the Association in keeping with Article IV, and make recommendations to the Association. It shall counsel with Churches that are out of harmony of fellowship with the Association.

SECTION 6. THE PLACE AND PREACHER COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members. The duties of this committee shall be to recommend the place or places for the following Annual meeting and to recommend the preacher and alternate to deliver the annual sermon for the following year.

SECTION 7. THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members. It appointed by the Moderator at the October Executive Committee meeting. It shall be the duty of this committee to present suitable resolutions at the Annual Associational Meeting.

SECTION 8. THE MEMORIAL COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members. It shall be the duty of this committee to bring a report to the Annual Meeting of those listed by the member churches as deceased since the last Annual Meeting and shall lead a Memorial Service in their memory.

SECTION 9. THE FINANCE COMMITTEE shall be composed of six members including the Treasurer of the Association. This committee shall: (a) present a Budget to the Association for the following year; (b) devise plans for raising the funds for the Associational Budget; (c) audit the Finances and Financial records of the Association annually and anytime there is a change of Treasurer or at the

direction of the Association or the Executive Committee; (d) report all audits to the Annual Association Meeting.

SECTION 10. THE CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members and shall perform all duties specified in Article XV.

SECTION 11. THE ORDINATION COMMITTEE shall be composed of five designated Pastors and all other Pastors who desire to sit with the committee.

- a. The committee serves on an advisory capacity only and serves at the request of the Church from which the member is seeking Ordination.
- b. The committee should examine such candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry and make such recommendations to the Church as they feel led.
- c. The committee should assist in arranging the proper service of Ordination when such assistance is requested.
  - d. The Executive Committee should be informed regularly of the work of the committee.
- e. Each Church desiring to ordain a candidate is urged to consult with the committee, and shall give two weeks notice in which the committee is to do its work.

SECTION 12. THE EVANGELISM COMMITTEE. The duties of the committee shall be to direct and propose a perpetual program and spirit of evangelism in the Association. It shall arrange and direct all Associational wide evangelistic activities.

SECTION 13. THE ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL shall be composed of eight(8) members, nominated by the Associational Committee on Committees; and elected by the Association at the annual meeting. The committee shall be:
Missions Development Director, Promotion Director, Survey Director, Associational WMU Mission Action Director, and Associational Brotherhood Director, Sunday School Outreach Director, Church Training Director, and Associational Deacons President. The Missions Development Director, Promotion Director, and Survey Director shall be elected for a three-year term, with one member named each year. The other five positions shall be filled by the person who is elected to fill those five Associational Offices.

The duties of the AMDC are to lead the Associational Missions Development in the five mission performance tasks: (1) call churches to be on missions; (2) train, develop, and encourage church and associational workers; (3) provide resources and services to churches and leaders; (4) provide opportunities for working together in missions, ministry and growth; (5) establish and maintain appropriate communications and relationships with the community and the denomination.

SECTION 14. THE BUILDING AND GROUNDS COMMITTEE shall be comprised of three members. The committee shall be responsible for and in charge of the upkeep and repairs of the associational building, grounds, and equipment.

#### SECTION 15. THE PERSONNEL COMMITTEE

- a. The Committee shall be composed of 7 members of which 3 are pastors.
- b. They shall recommend polices and procedures for the selection, supervision and termination of associational staff personnel. Those policies and procedures shall be approved by the association.
- c. Prepare and maintain an organizational manual relation to the association's staff personnel.
- d. Develop and recommend to the association policies and procedures for paid and volunteer staff personnel.
- e. Develop policies and procedures regarding continuing education and development for the Director of Missions and other associational staff.
- When a staff vacancy occurs, they shall serve as the search committee.

The Director of Missions shall be called by a special called meeting of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association provided the Association is not scheduled to meet within 30 days. In that event the Association shall consider the calling of a Director of Missions at its regularly scheduled Associational Meeting.

g. The initial committee shall be recommended at the January 4, 1993 Executive Committee meeting and present items b through e by the April 1993 Executive Committee and no later than the July 1993 Executive Committee meeting.

#### ARTICLE XII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL

THE ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL shall be composed of the Director of Missions, the Moderator, the Vice Moderator, the program leaders: Sunday School, Discipleship Director, Woman's Missionary Union, The Brotherhood Director, the Chairman of Deacons, the Missions Development Director, the Chairman of Evangelism, the Chairman of the Finance Committee, the Vacation Bible School Director, the Youth Director, the Director of the Singles, the Director of the Senior Adults and the Music Director. The Director of Missions is to serve as Chairman and a secretary shall be elected from the group.

The purpose of the council is to coordinate the planning of the various programs of the association, to develop an associational calendar, and to give mutual support to the various organization and program units in carrying out their assignments.

The council shall meet quarterly.

### ARTICLE XIII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL PASTORS' CONFERENCE

The Associational Pastors' Conference provides regular meetings for the Baptist ministers of the association. The purpose of the conference is for fellowship and mutual support, for doctrinal and professional discussion and for promotion of church, associational and other denominational programs. The conference is not an administrative or executive body.

#### ARTICLE XIV - DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS JOB DESCRIPTION

SECTION 1. FUNCTION OF THE DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS. He is too be the chief administrative officer of the association. He is to confirm extra employment in a manner agreed upon with the Executive Committee.

SECTION 2. RELATIONSHIP OF THE DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS.

- 1. He is employed by the Executive Committee of the association.
- 2. General supervision of the personnel and program of the association as they function through the association office.
- Work primarily with (pastors), associational general officers, committees, and organizations.
- 4. Work closely with auxiliary organizations (such as WMU, Baptist Men, etc.).
- 5. Lead in maintaining relationships with state and SBC agencies and promoting their programs.

SECTION 3. In the churches, extending the local ministries. To visit churches by invitation of the pastor or other church leaders, in the pastorless churches to provide assistance in the church program and ministry, such as (1) Pulpit supply; (2) Study courses; (3) Missionary address; (4) Deacons' meetings; (5) Assembly programs; (6) Special day addresses; (7) Ordination services; (8) VBS planning and promotion; (9) To interpret phases of associational work; (10)

Budget planning; (11) Building planning; (12) Revival meetings; (13) Stewardship emphasis; (14) Study objectives and long range planning; (15) Studying and evaluating procedures, curriculum, constitution and bylaws, etc; (16) Church-community surveys, etc; (17) Promoting a world missions concept; and (18) Publishing of a regular news medium (such as a monthly newsletter); (19) Cooperate with the news media to promote Baptist work. In the associational office: a. Personal correspondence, promotional mail, and telephoning pertinent to his work. b. Office conferences, answer to inquiries, etc. c. Assist associational officers, committees and heads of organizations to get out promotional mail pertinent to their work.

SECTION 4. Schedule of Benefits

- 1. His salary shall be
- 2. His fringe benefits shall include
- 3. His schedule shall include
  - a. One day a week, chosen at his discretion, shall be reserved for rest that excluded normal associational activities.
  - b. A maximum of four weeks each year outside of the association for special work with local churches or with state and SBC agencies.
  - c. An annual sick leave of 26 days maximum, with a maximum of 42 days to be accumulated. Sick leave may be advanced by the association for one year without Executive Committee action. Sick leave is to be recorded with the financial secretary of the association.
  - d. Two weeks annual vacation with pay.
  - e. Holidays: New Year's Day; Easter Monday; July 4; Labor Day; Thanksgiving, Thursday and Friday; Christmas December 25 and 26.
- 4. All honorarium from churches inside or outside the association and all honorarium from other religious work shall be his personal fair, and shall not be submitted to the association.
- 5. The Director of Missions is afforded the opportunity of an annual evaluation by the Moderator and Missions Committee.

#### ARTICLE XV - AMENDMENTS

The constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the association by a two-thirds majority of the messengers present and voting, provided the amendment has been presented to the Constitutional Committee at least 10 days prior to the annual meeting and presented to the association in printed form on the first day of the annual meeting to be voted on the second day.
