Constitution

(Revised August 16, 1957)

ARTICLE I

The Name of this body shall be the Tuckasegee Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II

The purpose of the Association shall be the extension of Christ's kingdom on earth, creation and promotion of harmony, intelligence and spiritual power of the churches.

ARTICLE III

(1) The Association shall have the power to elect and install its officers in whatever manner the body may deem expedient. (2) It shall have power to recommend measures of usefulness and guidance to our churches in matters of organizations, ordinations and questions of doctrines and discipline. (3) The Association shall have no power to infringe upon the right to the local churches as sovereign and independent bodies.

ARTICLE IV

(1) The Association shall be composed of ministers and messengers selected by missionary Baptist churches which have been previously received into the association. (2) The pastor and four members from each one hundred members or fraction thereof shall compose the representation of each church. (3) The association shall be the sole judge of its members. (4) Any church applying to the association for membership by letter and messenger shall come under the watchcare of the association for one year for observation. At the expiration of that time, if it is still the will of the church, it may be voted in by majority vote of the association, provided they have an acceptable letter and at least one messenger present at the time.

ARTICLE V

(1) The association shall hold its regular session on Thursday and Friday preceding the 3rd Sunday in August. (2) The association year begins on July 1 and continues through June 30 of the proceeding year. The associational reports and church letters will be within this period. (3) The Moderator may call a mid-year session at his pleasure. (4) The Association Budget approved in each Annual Meeting will begin October the first of that year and expire September thirty of the following year.

ARTICLE VI

(a) The officers of the association shall be a Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Sunday School Superintendent, Training Union Director, Woman's Missionary Union Superintendent, Superintendent of Evangelism, President of Deacon's organization, Brotherhood President, Superintendent of Education, and a Parliamentarian, and such other officers as the association may desire to elect.

(b) The term of office for the general officers of the Association shall not exceed two years in succession, with the exception of the Clerk and Treasurer of the association, who may be re-elected to succeed themselves in office at the pleasure of the Association. The term of office for all members of committees of the Association shall be for not more than two years. No committee member may succeed himself until at least one year has elapsed after his official term has expired. No member of the Association may be permitted to hold membership in more than one committee during one year, except in the case of the members of the Executive Committee.

(c) The term general officers shall apply to the Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk and Treasurer.

ARTICLE VII

(a) The moderator shall preside and maintain the order of business of all meetings unless he otherwise provides for the Vice Moderator. He shall serve as ex officio member of all committees of the Association. (b) He shall appoint the committee on committees and all other committees pertinent to the operation of the body not named by the committee on committees in its regular report. (c) The Vice Moderator shall assist the Moderator and in case of absence or incapacitation of the Moderator, he shall act in his stead until another Moderator is elected. (d) The Clerk shall keep a complete and accurate record of all transactions; he shall prepare a book of reports to be distributed to messengers and pastors at the beginning of each day's session of the annual meeting; and he shall cause to be printed a minute concerning the records made. (e) The Clerk shall mail to the Clerk of each church in the association, blanks for the preparation of the church letter as soon as they are received from the state convention office. (f) The Treasurer shall receive and disburse by the order of the Executive Committee or the association while in session, the money of the treasury and make a complete report to the association at each session. (g) It shall be the duty of the Historian to keep the records of the association up to date. (h) The Associational Missionary shall be sought and recommended by the Executive Committee in a manner of its own choosing.

Within 30 days after locating such a person the Executive Committee shall present the name of the missionary nominee to a called meeting of the Association. If the Annual meeting of the Association is scheduled within 60 days, the presentation shall wait until that time.

His call shall be indefinite. His salary, allowances, etc., shall be as provided by the current budget or adjustments recommended in consultation with the Finance Committee.

Two-week vacation may be taken at his discretion.

Concerning termination of employment, his resignations shall be in writing and presented to the Executive Committee at least thirty days before it is to take effect. The Executive Committee may terminate employment by giving thirty days notice in advance.

The Missions Committee shall give full supervision and guidance to the Missionary in planning, promoting and financing his work.

The Missionary shall work closely with the associational committees and associational officers in such a way as to help each group determine its opportunities, and objectives based on the need in the churches and procedures, and means of fulfilling these.

Therefore, he shall serve as ex-officio member of all committees of the Association. It shall be his duty to administer the policies and instructions of the Executive Committee. He shall communicate with the State and Southern Convention such information as shall be mutually helpful and needful.

ARTICLE VIII

All officers shall be elected annually at the discretion of the body. all officers and committee members will hold office until the next annual association meeting.

ARTICLE IX

The business of the association shall be conducted according to Roberts Parliamentary Practice or in a manner not contrary thereto.

ARTICLE X

The Executive Committee shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Sunday School Superintendent, Superintendent of Evangelism, President of the Deacon's Organization, President of the Brotherhood, Superintendent of Education, Associational Missionary, Parliamentarian and the pastor and one member from each church in the association. No pastor, by virtue of his being an Associational officer, shall be disqualified as a member of the Executive Committee, from representing the church or churches he may be serving in the association. Twelve of these members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE XI

It shall be the duty of the executive committee to act for the association on matters arising when the association is not in session and to make a report of all work to the next session of the association.

ARTICLE XII

The associational quorum shall be the number present if the number satisfies the will of the Moderator.

ARTICLE XIII

The association shall have the right to withdraw by a majority vote fellowship from any church which becomes unorthodox in doctrine, or disorderly in practice, or that fails to present itself either by messenger or letter for two consecutive sessions without sufficient reason, or that ceases to be missionary in practice. The support of the causes fostered by the denomination at large and of this association in particular shall be the test of each church as a missionary body. Any church, at its pleasure, may withdraw from the association.

ARTICLE XIV

The association shall have such standing committees as may be considered necessary to promote efficiently the work of the Master in our midst, the members of these committees are to be nominated annually by the committee on committees unless otherwise determined by the association.

ARTICLE XV

This constitution shall be amended by a majority vote, providing the amendment was read on the previous day of the association. Otherwise two-thirds majority of the votes must be in favor of the amendment.

By-Laws

1. All vacancies occurring among the elective officers and in the Executive Committee shall be filled by the Executive Committee.
2. The Executive Committee shall meet at a time and place designated by the Moderator on Monday following the first Sunday of each quarter. The Executive Committee shall elect its own chairman.
3. Each church Clerk shall mail to the Clerk of the association a letter properly filled out on the blank furnished him at least two weeks prior to the meeting of the body.
4. No church shall be received into the association who does not present a certificate of examination properly endorsed by the committee on organization and reception of new churches.
5. Duties of the committees of the association.
 - A. Order of Business Committee: This committee shall plan the annual program for the association and present it to the Executive Committee at its July meeting.
 - B. Committee on Committees: The duty of this committee is to bring to the annual associational meeting a nomination of the personnel of the standing committees.
 - C. Finance Committee: This committee shall devise plans for raising the funds for the association budget and prepare for recommendations to the annual session of the association the budget for the disbursement of funds for the coming year. It shall also be the duty of this committee to audit the finances and financial records of this Association twice Annually and anytime that there is a change of Treasurer or Financial Secretary, or at the direction of this body or the Executive Committee, and to report all audits to the Annual Association Meeting.
 - D. Resolutions Committee: This committee is to report suitable resolutions at the annual associational meeting.
 - E. Credentials Committee: This committee serves in an advisory capacity only. This committee should examine such candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the Gospel Ministry and make recommendations as they feel led to the church of which one is a member about his being ordained and help plan and arrange the proper services of ordination when such assistance is needed. The Executive Committee should be informed regularly of the work of the committee. Each church desiring to ordain a candidate is urged to consult with the committee.
 - F. Nominating Committee: It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate the officers of the Association and have this report ready for the annual associational meeting.
 - G. Missions Committee: (1) This committee shall be composed of the following Association officers: Sunday School Superintendent, Training Union Director, Woman's Missionary Union President, Brotherhood President, Chairman of Evangelism, Chairman of Associational Deacons, Treasurer, Moderator, and Chairman of Executive Committee, and four members at large from member churches to be elected by the association at its annual meeting for 1, 2, 3, and 4 years respectively on a rotating system. After the election one new member shall be elected each year to serve for a period of four years. (2) The Missions Committee shall advise and work with the Associational Missionary in promoting the work in the Association, and also lead and assist in organizing new churches, and also shall be responsible for encouraging and guiding the churches in the association to faithfully cooperate with the association program and emphases. (3) The committee shall meet once a quarter to receive a written report from the Associational Missionary and make helpful suggestions to him concerning his work. (4) If such advice is sought, it shall advise any group seeking to organize a new church, or seek to help any member church desiring assistance in its problems. (5) The Missions Committee shall perform the duties prescribed in the By-Laws on New Churches, and the By-Laws prescribing the job Description on the Associational Missionary.

JOB DESCRIPTION

ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONARY TUCKASEEGEE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

This Job Description is prepared for the information of the Associational Missionary, with the objective of presenting the Missionary Committees' viewpoints on the major needs of the Association. The Job Description also stipulates the responsibilities of the Association to the Missionary.

- I. Function of the Associational Missionary. He is to be the chief administrative officer of the Association. He is to confine extra employment in a manner agreed upon with the Executive Committee.
- II. Relationship of the Missionary:
 1. He is employed by the Executive Committee of the Association: "Concerning termination of employment, his resignation shall be in writing and be presented to the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior to its effectiveness. The Executive Committee may terminate employment by giving thirty days notice in advance". (Tuckaseegee Association Constitution. Article VII, Paragraph 4)
 2. General supervision of the personnel and program of the Association as they function through the Associational Office.
 3. Work primarily with associational General Officers, Committees, and Organizations.
 4. Work closely with auxiliary organizations.
 5. Lead in maintaining relationships with State and SBC Agencies.
- III. Duties of the Missionary:
 1. Administrative
 - a. Administer policies and instructions committed to him by the Association, its Executive Committee or Board.
 - b. Work closely with the Associational Officers, Committees, and Organizations to help each group determine (1) its opportunities and objectives based on needs in the churches, and (2) its procedures and programs for achieving these objectives.
 - c. Help the Association to develop annual and long-range objectives; set goals, and make plans for their attainment.
 - d. Correlate the work of all organizations and Committees in the Association, and publish a Calendar of Activities.
 - e. All staff to be responsible to the Missionary selection and supervision under his responsibilities until informed otherwise by the Executive Committee.
 - f. Serve as ex officio member of all committees.
 - g. Have general oversight of purchasing equipment and supplies within the approved budget.
 - h. Inform State and Southern Convention agencies of needs, problems, and potentialities within the Association.
 - i. Interpret to the churches the program resources and other assistance available from the State and Southern Baptist agencies.
 2. As Counselor-Shepherd
To counsel with church leaders as requested with reference to (1) Programs and procedures in their churches; (2) Calling a pastor or other staff member; (3) Actual or threatened breach of fellowship; (4) Church objectives; (5) Church policies; (6) Assist pastorless churches; (7) Assist pastors and others in counseling those who are called into church-related vocations.
 3. In the Churches, extending the local ministries:
 - a. To visit churches by invitation of the pastor or other church leaders in the pastorless churches to provide assistance in the church program and ministry, such as: (1) Pulpit supply; (2) Study course; (3) Missionary address; (4) Deacons' Meetings; (5) Assembly programs; (6) Special day addresses; (7) Ordination services; (8) V.B.S. Planning and Promotion; (9) To interpret phases of Associational work; (10) Budget planning; (11) Building planning; (12) Revival meetings; (13) Stewardship

emphasis; (14) Study objectives and long-range planning; (15) Studying and evaluating procedures, curriculum, Constitution and By-Laws, etc.; (16) Church-Community Surveys, etc.; (17) Promoting a world missions concept; and (18) publishing of a regular news medium.

4. In the Associational Office:

- a. Personal correspondence, promotional mail, and telephoning pertinent to his work.
- b. Office conferences, answer to inquiries, etc.
- c. Assist Associational Officers, Committees, and heads of Organizations to get out promotional mail pertinent to their work.

IV. The Schedule of Benefits provided by the Association for the Missionary.

1. His salary shall be _____.
2. His fringe benefits shall include: _____.
3. His schedule shall include:
 - a. One day each week, chosen at his discretion, shall be reserved for rest that excludes normal Associational activities.
 - b. A maximum of six weeks each year outside of the Association for special work with local churches or with State and SBC agencies.
 - c. An annual sick leave of 14 days maximum, with a maximum of 42 days to be accumulated. Sick leave may be advanced by the Association for one year, without Executive Committee action. Sick leave is to be recorded with the Financial Secretary of the Association.
4. All honoraria from churches inside or outside the Association and all honoraria from other religious work shall be his personal fair, and shall not be submitted to the Association.
5. New Churches in the Association: (1) Any church seeking admission to the membership of the Association shall petition in writing the Executive Committee at least three months before the annual meeting of the Association, which petition shall be referred to the Missions Committee for its study on the petitioning church's covenant, articles of faith, history, practices, cooperative spirit, its relations to other churches of the association and its willingness to abide by the Constitution and By-Laws of the Association. The Missions Committee shall then report to the Associational Meeting with a copy thereof submitted to the Associational Executive Committee at least thirty days prior to the Annual Meeting of the Association. The Missions Committee shall then report to the Associational Meeting with a copy thereof submitted to the Associational Executive Committee at least thirty days prior to the Annual Meeting of the Association, its findings and recommendations for Associational action at the next annual meeting. (2) Each church applying for membership in the Association, upon approval, shall be received under the watchcare of the Association for a period of one year. Each church shall give a written report to the missions committee and the Executive Committee each quarter of their work and giving toward associational program and state and southwide participation.
6. The Clerk shall prepare a Book of Reports for distribution at the annual sessions containing the reports of those on the Committee on Reports. The Clerk shall notify each person to give a report, and these reports should be in the hands of the Clerk no later than two weeks before the Association meets.

Proceedings

Thursday, August 15, 1974
Locust Field Baptist Church

Following a delicious buffet dinner served by the Ladies of the Locust Field Church, the one hundred forty-fifth annual session of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association was called to order by the Moderator, John Hyatt, at 7 P.M. Rev. Joe Ginn led the group in the singing of hymns. Charles Carnes, Pastor of the Church, extended a welcome to the messengers and visitors and read a scripture passage from Philippians. J. D. Grant led in prayer. Moderator Hyatt called on Rev. C. H. Green who made some pertinent remarks concerning

his boyhood conversion. This is Rev. Green's boyhood community.

Clegg moved that the order of business as printed in the BOOK OF REPORTS be accepted. The motion was seconded by J. E. Brown. The motion carried.

Moderator Hyatt explained that the reports contained in the Book of Reports—pages 1-25 had been, with the exception of the report of the Committee on Committees, adopted at the Executive meeting on July 29th. The chairman of the Committee on Committees committee, Lester Sutton, explained that the report had been reworked and that each person asked to serve on a committee had been contacted and had accepted his assignment.

J. E. Brown moved that the revised report of the Committee on Committees be accepted and included in the Book of Reports with the reports on pages 26-32. Green, seconded the motion. Clegg amended the motion requesting that the financial report on page 32 be excluded until some of the items could be broken down into smaller categories. Both the amendment and the motion carried.

The Clerk, Annie Hoyle, gave the report on the work of the Executive Committee. The minutes of these meetings are recorded in the Clerk's Book of Minutes for the Association.

Marse Grant, representing THE BIBLICAL RECORDER, complimented both the Superintendent of Missions and the Moderator on the fine work they were doing in the Association. He spoke on the four states of condition. First, the state of the Nation; second, the state of the State; third, the state of the Convention; and fourth, the state of THE BIBLICAL RECORDER. The state of all these states are good, especially the state of THE BIBLICAL RECORDER, which has the third largest circulation in the State of North Carolina. In spite of a 61 percent increase in the cost of paper—the Recorder uses one half million pounds of paper per year—we are going to make it, he said. He urged messengers and churches to subscribe to and read the Recorder in order to be informed of what is happening in the Baptist world. He expressed his thanks for the support now being given the paper.

Hyatt recognized Grant, Privett and Clegg for the outstanding work they did in the defeat of the Liquor by the Drink bill. He said that Marse Grant was the best editor in North Carolina.

The Superintendent of Missions, Walter Middleton, gave a report on the work in the Association. He spoke of his pride in the people and in the churches. He called attention to his report on page 4 in the BOOK OF REPORTS and to the following ministries that were being carried on in the Association: (1) camp ground, under the sponsorship of First Church, Sylva (2) Seminary Extension, (3) Vacation Bible School—all previous records for number of Bible Schools held were surpassed this summer with 37 having already been reported; (4) the March Bible Conference at Webster; (5) work being done in the three Homes for the Aging in the Association; (6) the Sunday School clinics; (7) the Mission Fair; (8) the defeat of the Liquor by the Drink bill; (9) the young people entering Christian work—3 young men from the association attending seminaries; four or five studying in Fruitland Bible Institute with 2 or more students attending Baptist colleges on scholarships.

Some of the goals for the near future are: (1) the harnessing of the Deacon manpower; (2) organizing and utilizing the Senior Citizens of Jackson County; (3) activation of the youth groups; (4) Brush Arbor night with all the churches coming together for a worship service; (5) improved church training programs and chaplaincy programs and (6) a wider use of Truett Camp.

Rev. Middleton introduced pastors new in the Association this year. They were as follows: Alvin Loiry, Shoal Creek; J. D. Grant, Ochre Hill; J. D. Wyatt, Greens Creek; Cecil Davis, Tuckaseegee; James Hinson, Cullowhee; Dillard Moore, Fall Cliff and Paul Carden, Big Ridge.

Rev. Clegg gave the Financial reports. He asked for time to break down some of the items given in the financial statement. This will be presented at the session Friday. He presented the budget for 1974-75 calling attention to the fact that the Baptist State Convention supplement would not be over \$200 per month for the coming year. He stressed the necessity for meeting the minimum monthly allowances of the budget. Clegg moved, seconded by Brown, that the budget for 1974-75 be accepted. Motion carried.

Rev. Willie Newman, Superintendent of Missions for the Tennessee River Association, gave an informative and challenging report on the importance and function of associational work.

Rev. Green presented the following motion: that the incoming moderator appoint a committee of five to study the Associational Constitution and to make recommendation at the next annual meeting concerning any needed revision and that this committee give special at-

tention to the requirement of scriptural Baptism as a prerequisite to membership in the Association. Motion seconded by Reeves. Motion carried.

Moderator Hyatt, recognized the work of Hoyle, Ginn and Beck. He reported that 130 messengers and 2 visitors registered for the session. These represented 30 churches in the Association. There were approximately 25 pastors in attendance.

Following a prayer by Rev. Hooper an offering was taken. Rev. Lawrence Jackson brought the message. He spoke on the Lordship of Christ, the Lordship of Fellowship and the Lordship of Relationship. The greatest need in our churches today, he said, is that need of love.

The first session of the annual meeting of the Association was closed with a prayer led by Rev. Cecil Davis.

August 16, 1974
Greens Creek Baptist Church

The morning session of the Annual meeting was opened with songs directed by Mr. Beck accompanied at the piano by Mrs. Beck.

Rev. J. D. Wyatt, pastor of Greens Creek Church, extended a welcome and led in a devotional based on scripture from the eighth Psalm.

Rev. Luther Osment, area missionary, gave a report on State Missions emphasizing the work being done in Western North Carolina. Some of the ministries to which he called attention were the service personnel in the armed forces, 100,000 of whom are located in North Carolina. Many people today are making a career of this work and have their families living in the area with them. There are five different language ministries in the State: namely, Spanish in Charlotte, Japanese in the coastal region, English, Cherokee and the sign language. There are some 7,000 deaf people in North Carolina. The Bible Institute at Fruitland is providing quality training for those men, who for various reasons cannot go away to the seminaries to study. The campus ministries are to be found on the campuses of the University of North Carolina in Asheville and in Cullowhee. Mars Hill College is the oldest of the Baptist colleges. The majority of the students at this institution come from low income families. The Pearson estate which will hopefully, eventually become a retirement home, the home for unwed mothers in Asheville, the Broyhill home for children and the child care center in Cherokee are among the ministries in progress in Western North Carolina.

The work at Truett Camp is growing and expanding under the directorship of the George Crawfords. Osment read a letter testifying to the good work being done there. He called attention to the Preachers Camp Meeting scheduled for September 16-17 at Truett Camp.

Calvin Knight, representative for the Baptist Hospital, gave several testimonies from former patients and friends expressing appreciation and gratitude for the high quality of care both physically and spiritually rendered by the hospital.

He stated that at the present the Tuckaseegee Association was a little ahead in its gifts to the hospital over last year.

Mrs. W. C. Reed spoke on the work of the Children's Homes. She pointed up growth not only in facilities but in the care of the children. Today churches send gifts of money whereas at one time this association sent gifts of potatoes. There is a blessing in serving a child she concluded.

Rev. Willie Newman gave a report on the Cooperative Program. He said that the program had produced people rather than money. Next year—1975—will mark the 50th anniversary of the Cooperative Program. He stated that 20 of the 49 churches in this Association had contributed. He said that Southern Baptist have robbed the Lord of two billion dollars because they have not given according to their income. The Biblical basis for the Cooperative Program is indicated by Paul when he collected a little money to carry along with him to help the churches having needs.

Rev. Cecil Fox explained the importance of the Annuity Program and what it could mean to the pastors. He said that "Plan A" would make a good mission project for some Sunday School class or other organization to provide the pastor with annuity protection. He told of the several benefits which a pastor could derive from the Annuity program.

Royster, Superintendent of Missions for the Haywood Association, gave the report on the

proposed plans for a retirement home to be constructed on the Pearson place in Buncombe County.

Following a prayer led by Rev. Tommy Owen, an offering was taken. After a song by the congregation, Rev. Harold Anderson brought the message of the morning. He preached a doctrinal sermon.

A blessing by Rev. J. E. Brown was followed by a delicious luncheon served by the ladies of the Greens Creek Church.

Rev. Alvin Loiry opened the afternoon session with a devotional based on Joshua first chapter.

Robert Blanton reported for the Credentials Committee.

Opportunity was given for question or comments concerning the Time, Place and Preacher report and the Committee on Committees report.

James Ridgeway presented the Nominating Committee report. Ted Reeves was nominated from the floor by J. D. Grant to serve as Vacation Bible School Director. Ridgeway moved, Brown seconded, that Ted Reeves name be added to the nominating committee report and that the Nominating Committees' report be adopted. Motion carried.

Hyatt stressed the importance of the Calendar of Activities calling attention to items that should receive special attention.

Hoyle announced the Association Week of Prayer for August 18-24.

A deacons meeting for August 26 at the Scotts Creek Church was announced by Walter Middleton.

Rev. Middleton conducted the Memorial services by reading a list of the deceased. The reading was followed by a period of silent prayer for those who have passed on.

Under miscellaneous business. Moderator Hyatt explained in the absence of Rev. Clegg, the need for some action on the financial report held over from the first session of the annual meeting.

Brown moved that the corrected and revised report of the Financial Committee be referred to a called meeting of the Executive Committee of the Association for its adoption at that time. Motion seconded by J. D. Grant. Motion Carried.

Ted Reeves on inquiring about date for Vacation Bible School clinic was told that he, as director, would select his own date after consulting the Calendar of Activities for the Association.

Outgoing Moderator Hyatt, expressed his appreciation for the honor and opportunity to serve as moderator and to all those who had worked with him so effectively.

Sutton moved, Owens seconded, that the meeting adjourn. Motion carried.

Rev. Sutton led in prayer, then John Hyatt, Moderator, declared the one hundred forty-fifth Annual Session of the Tuckasee Baptist Association closed.

ANNUITY REPORT

The Annuity Department is a cooperative work between the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention Annuity Board. Its purpose is to enroll all staff personnel of the churches in its program and to offer service to those who are enrolled. The program offers a retirement plan based on \$4,000 of which the church pays ten percent and the Convention pays five percent, this is plan A. Plan B is an interest program; Plan C, is an annuity stock investment. Over 16 million dollars was paid out last year in retirement checks to over 9,000 ministers and other personnel workers and widows. Over 38,000 pastors and workers are in the Annuity program at this time. There is over 300 million dollars in the Annuity program at this time,—June 1974.

The staff of our Convention is meeting throughout the State with local Associations to help get all pastors and workers from the churches enrolled. Information on the Annuity Board may be secured by writing 511 North Akard Building, Dallas, Texas 75201, or to the Annuity Board representative of the Baptist State Convention. In the Tuckaseegee Association there are 13 pastors and the Association Missionary covered by the retirement plan as of June 1, 1974.

ANNUITY BOARD OF THE SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION 1974

The Southern Baptist Convention Annuity Board paid out a record nearly \$16 million in retirement and protection benefits during 1973. This means that in the Board's history, it has now paid out over \$100 million in retirement and protection benefits.

More than 9,000 retired pastors and other church-related vocational workers or their widows receive the benefits.

In addition, the Annuity Board set another record. This one was for funds held in trust for those participating in retirement and protection plans while still in active service. About 38,000 pastors, other church staff and denominational agency employes are included.

Funds held in trust exceeded \$350 million for the first time, President Harold H. Morgan reported.

The Board issued another 13th Check, or extra benefit, for annuitants shortly before

Christmas 1973. It amounted to two extra months' worth of benefits and totaled \$1,187,379. The 13th Check helps annuitants, whose benefits are fixed, to meet the rising cost of living. Payment of the 13th Check is over and above the 12 contracted monthly benefits and depends from year to year on investment income.

Board officials and national market experts expected the investment picture to brighten in 1974 after a poor performance in the general stock market in 1973 resulted in a deep cut in income from investments. Investment income declined to \$10 million in 1973 after hitting a record of more than \$22 million the year before.

The Board's decline in equity, or stock, investments paralleled the decline in the market generally, which affected all other types of investors as well. The major market indicators—Dow-Jones, Standard and Poor, and Value Line—all were down during the year.

By comparison, the Board's investments in mortgage loans and real estate leasebacks proved to be profit-making for the year. In an effort to continue earning from real estate investments, the Board announced a new type of Plan C investment called land equity loans. Plan C is the Board's variable benefit plan, which supplements the basic retirement program, called Plan A, for ministers.

REPORT OF THE AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

1974

Supplying the millions of men, women and children who become new readers each year with Scriptures they can understand, is seen by the American Bible Society as one of the most pressing of the many challenges facing it today.

To bring the Word of God to every person in the world has, of course, always been the sole purpose of the Society. To do so it has engaged in hundreds of programs of Scripture translation, publication and distribution by cooperating with churches and agencies that need Scriptures. But even with all these programs, the Bible Society is aware that a large part of the world's people are not being reached, those whose reading ability is new or marginal.

Now there is GOOD NEWS FOR NEW READERS, a unique and extensive program that will provide special Scripture Literacy Selections on five graded levels, in 200 languages. It will enable millions of people to read the Word of God for themselves, as well as other reading

material, for the first time, thus providing a basis for a more abundant life.

The American Bible Society, working through the United Bible Societies, continues to be the primary source of Scriptures for the Missionary enterprise and remains constantly ready to supply the Southern Baptists' Scriptural needs in the United States and abroad.

In behalf of the Southern Baptist Convention and several of its state and local organizations, the American Bible Society has produced 16 special Scripture editions totaling over 3 million copies in 1973.

More than 249 million Scriptures—Bibles, New Testaments, Portions and Selections—were distributed during 1973 by the members of the United Bible Societies. The world total is up by 14.1 per cent over 1972, largely due to phenomenal Scripture distribution efforts in Bangladesh, Colombia, Costa Rica, Indonesia, Nicaragua, Nigeria, the Philippines, Sri Lanka, Thailand, Tanzania, and Venezuela.

In the United States, the total Scripture distribution was over 117 million—a bit less than the 1972 all-time record.

The number of languages in which at least one book of the Bible has been published by Bible Societies and other Christian organizations increased by 26 in 1973 to 1,526. The Bible Societies continue to place a high priority on contemporary language translations such as "Good News for Modern Man." To date, common-language Scriptures have been published in 36 languages.

The world's best selling paperback book, "Good News for Modern Man," the American Bible Society's New Testament in Today's English Version reached a total circulation of more than 43 million copies by the end of 1973. TEV translation work on the Old Testament continues in preparation for the publication of the complete Bible in 1976. This translation continues to be a model for common-language work in other tongues.

The American Bible Society continues to bring new color and formats to the Scriptures produced. Distribution continues in the work for the blind with Scriptures in Braille, tape, and records. Work with Armed Forces Chaplains continues as well as work with Blacks, American Indians, Spanish, and other minority groups. The Volunteer Activities Department of the American Bible Society is growing rapidly.

In missionary fields abroad, the American Bible Society is proving its effectiveness in areas of particular interest to the Southern Baptist Convention. Bible Society work is undergirding the activity of churches in Brazil, Nigeria, Japan, Indonesia, and other countries where the Southern Baptist Convention has active missions. Scripture Literacy Selections are being used effectively to involve more and more of the population in the Word of God. Translation and production work of common-language Scriptures continues to increase as Bible Society work rapidly expands in many countries.

The American Bible Society asks Southern Baptist churches to continue their active support and to make special efforts to support the GOOD NEWS FOR NEW READERS program.

REPORT—ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONARY

1974

"The future of the Baptist Association is bright and promising." This is according to the consensus of the 1200 participants who attended the National Convocation of Missionaries at Ridgecrest this summer.

The goal of the Association, as I see it, is to relate churches to each other in such a way that they can have a broader and more meaningful ministry. Our major concerns help identify the role of the association. Evangelism, missions, fellowship, doctrinal soundness, providing channels for training and information are, I believe major concerns here in the Tuckaseegee Association.

In the coming year we intend to foster a stronger fellowship of encouragement, love and inspiration among the churches.

We also intend to provide better organizational helps which will strengthen the church leadership in all areas of service where Baptist participate and cooperate.

In a rapidly changing world, new ministries must be developed to meet new needs even as

those needs arise. So, we must be sensitive enough to hear the cry of our people and flexible enough to respond in any direction.

Better communications is probably the key to better understanding. Better understanding is of course the key to better cooperation among the churches. The Associational Office will be acting under this assumption and trying to keep you well informed.

In every area of associational missions and ministries we have set amazing new records this past year. No other year in our association's history comes close to what God has just done.

Can't we set new records in this coming year? TOGETHER?

BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT 1974

In spite of the growth in size and complexity at your Baptist Hospital, the emphasis is still upon "ministering with skill and understanding." Evidence of this is a typical patient's remark recently: "From the head surgeon to the aide who handed me a glass of water, with all the doctors, nurses, people in the business offices and chaplains in between, I was cheerfully given every personal consideration."

Changes and additions continue to be made for the purpose of providing better hospital care. Renovation of the Progressive Care Unit has been completed, and the South and West Wings of the hospital building are now being renovated. Construction of the Ambulatory Care Unit is well under way and is scheduled for completion in the spring or early summer of 1975.

New discoveries continue to make possible better medical care. For example, a new EMI-Scanner is to be installed and is expected to be in use before the end of this year. This device, which combines the use of x-rays and computers, will make it possible to detect brain tumors, blood clots, and strokes more accurately and more quickly. Scans can be completed in about 30 minutes and the results can be available in another five minutes. There is no risk or discomfort involved, and the patient does not have to be admitted to the hospital.

New approaches are also being made in the hospital's ministry to the emotional and spiritual needs of people. The Division of Human Enrichment and Development, in the Department of Pastoral Care, is conducting retreats, seminars, and workshops designed to help appropriate the resources of the Christian faith to the various areas and experiences of life. The Pastoral Care Department has also opened its first satellite center, in Fayetteville, to offer counseling and training to people in that area. Your Cooperative Program gifts help to support these ministries.

The School of Nursing graduated its last class in May. The school has been in the process of phasing out for the past three years, as the result of a trustee decision made in 1971.

In January the hospital had its only room rate increase in the past three and one half years. Nevertheless, the hospital continues to operate "in the black." The 1973 Mother's Day gifts are running ahead of the same time last year. These gifts are used to assist patients with the most urgent financial needs. A special committee of five Baptists from the Winston-Salem area assists personnel from the hospital Business Office and the Department of Denominational Relations in administering these funds.

Your hospital staff, and the people they serve, are grateful for your interest, your prayers and your financial support.

With this fine and encouraging report from the Baptist Hospital let us review briefly the part our Tuckaseegee Association contributed. A list of the churches in our Association and their contributions to this cause for the past three years is attached to this report. While the report tells its own story let's summarize briefly some of the items.

Of the 49 churches in the Association 33 made contributions to the Baptist Hospital above their Cooperative Program giving. Nine of these churches increased their giving over 1973 giving. The increase ranged from \$5.00 to \$175.26. The church making the largest increase over

the past year was Rockdale with an increase of 21+ percent. Three churches made contributions in 1974 for which there were no recorded gifts in 1973. There was a decline in the number of churches making special contributions to the Baptist hospital in 1974. In 1973 thirty-seven churches contributed. The record shows a decline from 40 in 1972 to 33 in 1974 with a total dollar and cent giving declining \$484.14 in the three year period.

In spite of the decline in total giving and in the number of churches giving, Mr. W. C. Hennessee—who proposed to give dollar for dollar to all churches in the Association above the last year's gifts—will "up" our total Association giving as he meets the challenge of the churches making the increases. We are most grateful to Mr. Hennessee and to the churches meeting his challenge.

Christian Literature is summed up in a statement made by Eliphaz when he told his friend Job (Job 4:4) "Your words have kept men on their feet." We can not emphasize too much at this present time the importance of Christian literature and its effect on the younger generation. The Devil has so much non-Christian literature available to young people today which has a deteriorating influence on too many of our young people. Our churches and pastors in the Tuckaseegee Association are doing a marvelous job of getting this information to the people where it will do the most good. Let us pray that all Christians will realize the importance of keeping the people informed through our Christian Literature.

STEWARDSHIP-COOPERATIVE PROGRAM REPORT 1974

More than 5,000 missionaries at home and abroad depend on gifts through the Cooperative Program for a salary each month. Over 3,000 of these have a basic ministry of evangelism, with all of the others using their skills as nurses, teachers, doctors, etc. to meet human needs in order to bring these to Christ. Through the Cooperative Program you are helping the widow,

homeless child, the homeless aged, the sick, plus the ministries of preaching and teaching. Increasing the percentage given through the Cooperative Program is an excellent follow-through for the special offerings your church receives.

Failure to have a good follow-through, in anything would be frustrating at the least and tragic at the most. Failure to have a good follow-through when you are fishing would cause all of your fish to get away and this would be frustrating. It would be tragic not to have a good follow-through in a baptismal service.

A good follow-through is the lifeline between good planning and good results. You will get excellent results if you plan well your special offerings and let your major emphasis be on the lifeline: YOUR COOPERATIVE PROGRAM!

Would your church give more if you received more money? If so, you need to have a thorough stewardship program in your church.

Last year 1,236 churches increased Cooperative Program giving by 10 percent or more over what they gave the previous year. Two of the associations in North Carolina had 100 percent of their churches giving through the Cooperative Program in 1973. These two associations were: Flat River and the Tar River.

Will you do four things?

1. Will you lead the church where you serve to increase Cooperative Program and associational mission giving by 10 percent or more?
2. Will you have a special prayer for your missionaries and other Cooperative Program causes during each service in your church during the October Cooperative Program prayer month?
3. Will you send your check for Cooperative Program EACH MONTH to Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, P. O. Box 26508, Raleigh, North Carolina 27611?
4. Will you help us have a good stewardship workshop in your association next spring or summer, so we can: (1) Study recommendations for pastor and staff salary increases; (2) Get an overview of available program helps for each church in stewardship; and (3) Receive a report on where you are in your goals for associational and Cooperative Program giving?

CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION REPORT

While churches and colleges are not identical in their purposes, Baptist churches and Baptist colleges in North Carolina do their work in an atmosphere of mutual appreciation. This active partnership includes Baptist Youth Corps, student-led worship and revival services, visits to the campuses by pastors and other leaders, participation of faculty and staff in associational and local church programs, and special projects of promotion on behalf of the Cooperative Program.

Your seven Baptist colleges are grateful for the continuing financial support which they receive through the Cooperative Program. During 1974, approximately \$2,350,000 will undergird the work of North Carolina Baptist colleges. At a very crucial and difficult time, those funds make a tremendous difference in the quality of programs offered by our schools.

The colleges make a special effort to recruit North Carolina Baptist students through pastors and superintendents of missions. No qualified student will be turned away simply because of inability to pay. Baptist colleges are anxious to enroll the young people from our churches.

After 20 years of effective leadership, Mr. Budd E. Smith resigned the presidency of Wingate College. On June 1, Dr. Thomas E. Corts of Georgetown, Kentucky assumed the presidency of the seventy-eight year old institution. Dr. Corts, the eleventh president of Wingate College, came to this position with excellent preparation and experience.

Our colleges—Campbell, Chowan, Gardner-Webb, Mars Hill, Meredith, Wake Forest and Wingate—work together and with the Baptist State Convention through the Council on Christian Higher Education. The Council office is eager to assist both the churches and the colleges in the promotion of understanding and cooperation as together they deal creatively with persons in the name of our Lord.

SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD REPORT

1974

The purpose of the Sunday School Board is to support the Southern Baptist Convention in its task of bringing men to God through Jesus Christ by making available Bibles, lesson courses and materials, books, films and filmstrips, music and recordings, and church supplies and by fostering education and service programs which will help the churches to establish, conduct, enlarge, and improve their ministries of Bible teaching and Christian training.

The Sunday School Board recognizes that churches vary a great deal in their wants and needs. Some of these variances are related to size, location, state of Christian development, community environment, and educational level. These differences require variations in basic programs and materials. The Board has sought to understand and meet the needs of the churches rather than to try to impose on churches programs and materials developed in an "ivory tower" setting. In meeting the varying needs of churches, the Board seeks to make all its materials biblically sound, physically attractive, and of acceptable quality. The aim is that every item be of superior quality.

All Sunday School Board activities are designed (1) to discover the programs which churches may use effectively in finding, reaching, teaching, training, and developing people, (2) to promote such programs for use in the churches, and (3) to provide acceptable materials to support these programs.

Church growth plans, which include People to People and CHURCH: The Sunday Night Place, have already helped many churches in re-establishing a positive spirit and have turned their membership and enrolment patterns from decline to growth. These plans, along with many others in the various departments of the Board, forecast a bright future for church growth. The acceptance of these plans by association and state convention leadership has increased appreciably.

The actions that have been taken for the simplification of programs and materials have resulted in greater acceptance from our constituents. The teaching procedures in our leader periodicals have been simplified, and the response to them has been very positive. The field servicing of our programs is receiving excellent response in the churches, associations, and state conventions.

Net sales for the year of \$47,844,000 exceeded the preceding year by 8.6 percent. Earnings available for working capital, fixed assets, and capital reserves were \$2,032,000, a decrease of 8 percent below budget in and 15.5 percent below last year. The decrease below last year was by design in order to provide more funds for operating programs. The decrease below budget was related to change in plans to conform to government price and profit guidelines. The Board provided funds to assist state conventions in the promotion of Sunday School, Church Training, Church Music, Student, Church Administration, Church Architecture, Church Library, and Church Recreation work in the amount of \$958,878. Additionally, transfer of \$321,467 was made to the Southern Baptist Convention for operating expense.

The Board has enjoyed a happy relationship with its constituents. News stories were used 1,176 times for a total of 9,673 column inches; 4,526 visitors toured the Board; and letters of criticism were received from only 154 persons as compared to 961 for the preceding year.

During the past year W. M. U. has been actively involved in several aspects of missions.

EVANGELISM REPORT 1974

The continuing response of youth and adults to Lay Evangelism Schools has been significant. In the past thirty months 11,032 youth and adults have shared in this lay witness training from 855 churches and 44 associations. Also, 1078 pastors from nine other associations have participated in Pastor's Retreats dealing with Lay Evangelism Schools.

"SHARING HIS LOVE AND SPIRIT" was the theme of the 28th Statewide Evangelism Conference at War Memorial Auditorium, Greensboro—February 4-6, 1974. Over 2,400 pastors and lay persons heard excellent speakers emphasize various phases of evangelism.

God is greatly blessing the evangelistic ministry of our three summer youth evangelism teams. Nine college students are leading in music, preaching in youth revivals, and directing youth witness training sessions among 27 churches from Pisgah Forest to Edenton.

Youth Ministries Week was held at the North Carolina Baptist Assembly during June 10-14 for about 700 youth and adults with the emphasis on evangelism, vocational guidance and recreation.

About 15,000 youth, pastors, and adult leaders will attend the 4th Statewide Youth Evangelism Night—August 16—at the Greensboro Coliseum. Richard Hogue, evangelist, Houston, Texas, is the guest preacher, and Darcy and Sharon Hodges are the guest soloists. Christian youth continue to share a strong witness for Jesus Christ across our state.

Let us rejoice in the leadership of the Holy Spirit in wonderful revival meetings, city-wide crusades, and evangelism clinics during the past year.

The 29th Statewide Evangelism Conference will be at War Memorial Auditorium, Greensboro, during February 3-5, 1975.

Remember to pray daily for the work of evangelism in all the churches of our state, nation, and world.

BAPTIST HOMES FOR THE AGING 1974

As a Baptist, among the many vital ministries that you support are your North Carolina Baptist Homes for the Aging. For over 23 years now, you have had a part in serving hundreds of older people and making life much happier and secure for them. You have done so through two very helpful means of incomes: (1) The Special Offering for the Homes, received on the 3rd Sunday of February each year; (2) The Cooperative Program. Gifts through these two sources have increased from year to year, and offerings for 1974 will perhaps exceed \$350,000, providing more than 30% of the budget needed to operate five resident Homes and the Nursing Care Unit.

God, through you, has blessed this ministry of our Baptist Homes in a remarkable way, leading you to establish two Homes in Winston-Salem, Resthaven, and the Hayes Home, and the Nursing Care Unit, and three other Homes at Albermarle, Hamilton, and Yanceyville. In these Homes, 4 out of every 5 residents depend upon your love gifts and simply could not be cared for without your help.

Of greatest significance during the past year, has been the decision by the Trustees of the Homes to establish a 6th Home in Western North Carolina, to be located in the city of Asheville on the Pearson Estate, a magnificently beautiful twenty-one acre site, overlooking the city, and with the gorgeous Blue Ridge Mountains in the background. A dedicated group of people in the Western Carolina area have organized the first initial phase of what will become, it is hoped, a major State-Wide fund-raising effort to obtain the necessary money to

build this proposed Home, after approval by the General Board, and the Baptist State Convention. Church groups are encouraged to visit the beautiful site on which the proposed Home will be built, and will be served lunch, if an appointment is made in advance.

With the addition of a 6th Home for the Aging, with the spiraling cost of living, and the great and ever increasing needs of older people, it is most urgent that our Baptist people be more generous than ever before in support for the Homes through the regular channels of the 3rd Sunday of February Offering, the Cooperative Program, and an over and above gift for the Western North Carolina Home.

Ministry to an older person is a direct ministry as unto Christ Himself and is most pleasing to Him, we are sure!

HOSPITAL CHAPLAINCY 1974

Dear Friends:

In St. Matthew 25 we read: "I was sick and ye visited me" . . . and the king shall answer, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me!"

In James 5:15-16 we read, "The prayer of faith shall save the sick, and the Lord shall raise him up; and if he have committed sins, they shall be forgiven him. Confess your faults—one to another, and pray one for another that ye may be healed. The effectual fervent prayer of a righteous man availeth much."

On June 1st I began the fifth year as Chaplain of C. J. Harris Community Hospital. During the past four years I have seen many persons greatly blessed and healed in answer to your prayers and with the faithful service of our doctors and nurses.

During this time the daily average number of persons who were patients has increased from 45 in 1970 to 60 in 1974. In addition to these patients the hospital is employing 194 persons. We have Practical Nurses from Southwestern Technical Institute and R.N. students from Western Carolina University who come to our Hospital for practical experience. We have Candy-Strippers, high school students who work here as volunteers—as well as volunteer Red Cross workers.

Then we have scores of visitors. Many time parents bring their children and leave them in the waiting room while they visit the sick. Just recently a little girl about five years old said, "Do you remember me?" As we walked down the hall together we soon reached the Chapel. By that time her sister joined her, and soon her brother. We visited and they witnessed for Christ. We prayed together and soon they were on their way home with their father.

God bless the precious children. The Bible says, "A little child shall lead them."

Please continue to pray for me. I shall look forward to visiting your church, when your pastor may call me.

You, in the associations, have helped us retain warm fellowship and supporting relationships by your visits to Broyhill Home; by allowing us to visit in your churches and homes; by close and frequent contacts with pastors; and by keeping up with our many activities through the pages of CHARITY AND CHILDREN. A part of our strength comes from our knowledge of your prayers and concern in a variety of ways.

It has been our privilege during the past year to be related in a variety of ways to people in the Tuckasegee Association. Your children in our care have responded well to the opportunities afforded them. For your generous assistance in many ways we are deeply grateful.

This year has seen the completion of the Broyhill Recreation Building and the Wagoner Administration Building on the Broyhill Home campus. We will need you to join us there on October 27 for a program of dedication for the Haywood and Wall cottages, the recreation and administration buildings, and the campus itself.

Since its inception in 1971, the Maternity Home in Asheville has offered a helping hand to more than 120 girls who struggled with one of the serious crisis of life. This program continues to find acceptance throughout the state and to realize success in sharing the Christian adventure with the girls who come there.

At the present time, a cooperative adventure is under study with the Green River, Sandy Run, and Polk Associations for the establishment of an emergency care shelter. This, again, will be a helping hand for boys and girls caught in the crisis of present day society.

The continuing good will and generous support of our friends throughout the State make possible a vigorous and progressive ministry of child care. During this year, North Carolina Baptists gave more than a million dollars to Christian child care in the Baptist Children's Homes through the Cooperative Program, the Thanksgiving offering, and designated gifts and offerings. We continue to depend on your prayers and loving support as we face the pressures of an uncertain economy, rapidly spiraling costs, and the need to serve children whose personal problems are most intense.

BIBLICAL RECORDER REPORT 1974

The BIBLICAL RECORDER is grateful for another good year, although these are difficult days for religious publications. Some have had to go out of business while others are squeezed by rising costs. The RECORDER has not escaped the pressures of inflation. For example, paper has risen 61 per cent already this year—and the end is not in sight.

Even so, the RECORDER has been in business for 141 years and expects to continue. A few changes have to be made, however, to keep the paper strong. As staff members have resigned or retired, they have not been replaced. Some weeks the number of pages has to be reduced to save money, but readers have been very understanding.

Despite some problems, the RECORDER is enjoying its highest circulation in history—more than 111,000—thanks to the continuing support of the vast majority of Baptist Churches in the state. These churches and their members remember the part the RECORDER played in the overwhelming defeat of liquor by the drink last November. This is probably the most significant story that the RECORDER has reported since the associations met last year. You will remember that approximately 70 per cent of the voters in the state voted against liquor by the drink and it was defeated in 97 of 100 counties. This should take care of this issue for awhile.

The RECORDER will continue its emphasis on local church coverage, seeking to deal with problems that every church has. Naturally, we are prejudiced, but we do not believe any publication can take the place of the BIBLICAL RECORDER. If your church does not send it to every family, may we ask a simple question: Why? At a cost of only a nickel a week for each family, this is the best investment a Baptist church can make. Put the RECORDER in the budget before it has to increase the rate because of inflation.

It is with profound gratitude to God and deep appreciation to Southern Baptist that the report of your mission work abroad is presented. May God bless all the people who study this report to the end that what may be done in the future will greatly exceed anything that has yet been attempted.

HOME MISSIONS REPORT

1974

Call them walls, roadblocks, barricades or barriers—by any name they are still obstacles to the sharing of the good news of Jesus Christ. They are the results of geography, language, faith in non-Christian religions and limited Baptist resources. Their categories include cultural, religious, racial, social and economic differences.

Southern Baptist leaders realized at the very beginning of the denomination they would confront barriers difficult, perhaps impossible, for a single Christian or church or even state convention to cross alone. Knowing this, the Convention created the Home Mission Board and charged it with responsibility for developing and promoting a single uniform missions program to assist churches, associations and state conventions in crossing barriers to make disciples for Christ in the homeland.

The Home Mission Board is active in all fifty states, Panama and Puerto Rico.

Home missions presently employs about TWENTY-TWO HUNDRED full-time missionaries, staff and office personnel. In addition, the agency assists nearly SIX THOUSAND special workers like youth groups and choirs, student summer missionaries and Campers on Mission. The Board also endorses more than NINE HUNDRED chaplains not counted in the missionary force.

Approximately ONE THOUSAND missionaries are involved in language missions, and TWO HUNDRED FIFTY are associated with Christian social ministries. Some SIXTY US'ers serve on home mission fields. Between THREE HUNDRED FIFTY and FOUR HUNDRED pastors receive church pastoral aid.

One half of home missions financial support is provided through the Cooperative Program, and the other half comes from the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering.

The home missions budget annually exceeds \$16 million. Approximately \$1,900 is required to operate home missions for one hour and the cost for one minute is nearly \$32.
