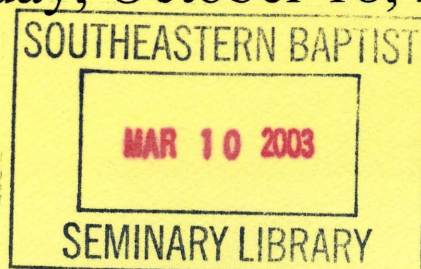

Dedicated to the Memory of Reverend Carl Smith



Carl was born October 27, 1939 in Jackson County, North Carolina to the late Lewis and Florence Bumgarner Smith.

He was ordained to preach the gospel ministry by Scotts Creek Baptist Church June 28, 1970.

His first pastorate was Lumberton Church. Other churches were Wilkesdale, Johns Creek, Pine Creek, Big Ridge, Zion Hill and Promise Land.

He was married to the former Sue Owen. They have one son William and wife Deborah and one granddaughter Amanda in Sylva, NC.

Carl went to be with the Lord August 8, 2002.

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Dedicated to the Memory of Reverend Billy Ray Stiles



Billy Ray Stiles was born in Waynesville, NC on August 22, 1946. He was the son of Lovon Gunter Stiles and the late George Clifford Stiles.

Billy was a bi-vocational minister and was employed with Dayco, Waynesville for 28 years and Lea Industries for 3 ½ years while also serving as pastor to five churches, four of which were in Jackson County and one in Haywood County.

He was licensed at the Green Valley Baptist Church in Waynesville on June 19, 1974 and was ordained by the Balsam Baptist Church on February 8, 1981.

Billy began his first pastorate at the Dicks Creek Baptist Church in May 1981 where he continued until January 1984. In June of 1984 he was called to the Fairview Baptist Church until 1986 when he returned to Jackson County. He was pastor at the Long Branch Baptist Church from June 1986 to May 1992. He then accepted the call to Wilkesdale Baptist church in July 1992 where he remained until May 1997. In July 1997 the Speedwell Baptist Church called him as pastor where he served until May 2002. During his service at Speedwell, the church purchased property adjoining the church for future growth and expansion.

While a member of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association, Billy served on committees, preached at rest homes and nursing homes and held revivals.

Billy met his wife of 35 years, Brenda, at the Fairview Baptist Church in 1964. They were married there on May 6, 1967 while Billy was on leave from the Army serving in Augsburg, Germany during the Vietnam Conflict. Brenda is employed at Mountain Projects, Inc. in the Section 8 Rental Assistance Program. Their son, Keith lives in Waynesville and is employed at Western Carolina University as a Planning and Institutional Research Analyst. Their daughter Pam and her husband Marshall live in Etowah, NC. Pam is employed by the Transylvania County School System as a Computer/Network Specialist and Marshall is employed with the North Carolina Wildlife Commission.

On February 12, 2002 Billy was diagnosed with lung cancer as the result of exposure to Asbestos at Dayco.

After many years of dedicated service to the Lord and the churches and wonderful people, a devoted husband and father, Billy Ray Stiles, went to be with the Lord on May 10, 2002. He is sadly missed and fondly remembered by all who loved him.

PROCEEDINGS
173RD ANNUAL MEETING
FIRST SESSION, THURSDAY, OCTOBER 17, 2002

1. Hamburg Baptist Church hosted the first session of the 173rd Annual Meeting of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association. A delicious meal was served at 4:30 p.m. A total of 129 present: 94 Messengers and 35 visitors representing 25 churches (includes hostess committee members who prepared and served the meal).
2. Rev. Clemmey Queen, Moderator, welcomed everyone.
3. Emory Brooks led the congregation in singing "When We All Get to Heaven".
4. Rev. Matt Ledbetter welcomed everyone to Hamburg Baptist Church and read scripture from John 14. The Hamburg Baptist Choir sang special music.
5. Rev. Brian Bishop, pastor of East Fork Baptist Church, brought scripture and sermon from Jeremiah 6:16. He said that we need to stand firm in the Word of God and get back to "the old paths".
6. The 173rd Annual Meeting was called to order by Moderator Clemmey Queen.
7. Ray Buchanan, Order of Business Committee Chairman, asked for changes to the Agenda: Changes to the By-Laws would be brought up during Miscellaneous Business. Motion was made and approved to adopt Order of Business with this Change.
8. Interim Director of Missions, Rev. Claude Conard, recognized new pastors and Interim Pastors in the Association listed on page 18 with one change. Rev. Johnny Norris had officially been called as pastor of Ochre Hill. He also read that Cullowhee, Black Mountain, Dietz Memorial, East Sylva, Sylva First and Tuckaseegee Baptist Churches had withdrawn from the Association.
9. The Moderator announced appointment of Committee on Committees and also announced the names of the Resolution Committee listed on page 4.
10. Emory Brooks led the congregation in singing, "Trust and Obey".

REPORTS

11. **Senior Adult** - Eloise Shuler gave the Senior Adult report listed on page 10. She also announced that they had been invited to sing at the Greens Creek Revival.
12. **WMU** - Nelda Reid gave the WMU Report and reported the new theme of "God's Plan...My Part" in local, state and missions further out. She highlighted activities of WMU on page 12.
13. **Pastor, Deacon, Spouse Fellowship** - Art Keener was not present, but his report was on page 5. He also had announced that the next fellowship meeting would be on October 25th at Webster Baptist Church.
14. **VBS** - Betty Greene gave the Vacation Bible School Report on page 11. Summer 2003 theme is THE GREAT KINGDOM CAPER. She encouraged everyone to start working on VBS now. Check out the material that is available and start building relationships with children and youth now. It is important that the youth know that Jesus loves them.
15. **Director of Missions** - Rev. Claude Conard recognized visitors at this time. Then he read his report (that came from his heart) on page 13.
16. **Nantahala Counseling Center** - Charles L. Wyatt said it gave him great joy that when someone comes to see him and they say that the church can't help with their problems, that he can say his center is a ministry of the church. His counseling center is an arm of ministry to help people in conflict. The written report is on page 19.

COMMITTEES

17. **Finance** - Rev. Mike Moore presented the proposed 2003 budget to be voted on during the second session. The budget is on page 15. Many are going to have to step up. Our Lord will provide a good work.
18. **Committee on Committees** - Rev. Matt Ledbetter presented the motion that the list on page 4 be approved with just one person still needed for the nominating committee. No further nominations were made and the motion carried. Matt emphasized that everyone needs to be praying about what position God wants you to be filling in the next year.

19. **Nominating Committee** - Arnold Buchanan presented the motion that the list on page 3 be accepted for 2002-2003. No further nominations were made and the motion carried.
20. **Credentials Committee** - Cecil Frady stated that six churches had withdrawn from the association. They had met three times this year. They had hoped to counsel with the pastor and chairman of deacons of Cullowhee Baptist Church and Sylva First Baptist Church. However each church refused in writing to meet in closed session with the committee at the Baptist Center.
21. **Memorials** - Hazel Monteith and Janice Burnette gave the report. As each church's deceased members' names were read, their members present stood in reverent honor of their memory. The 2002 Annual will be dedicated in memory of Rev. Carl Smith and Rev. Billy Ray Stiles.
22. **Miscellaneous** - Rev. Clemmey Queen, moderator, presented on page 39 the proposed changes to By-Laws effective October 1, 2002. It was to be voted on during the second session.
23. **Miscellaneous** - Rev. Clemmey Queen also announced that during the Executive Meeting on July 8, 2002 they had voted to affirm the 2000 Baptist Faith and Message. Multiple copies were made available for the churches to take.

MISSIONS

24. **Scotts Creek Baptist** - Rev. Rich Peoples said approximately 16 people went to Philadelphia to rehabilitate facilities and do outreach for the church's Vacation Bible School. They also had a couple go to China.
25. **Hamburg Baptist** - Cal Owens reported that their men's ministry went to West Virginia and put on 3200 square feet of shingles on a church. It was later reported that around 50 people stopped and asked who and why they did the work they were doing. Outreach is wonderful and it is unknown just how many people will be reached when you do it. They have made it their goal to help those in their community and go outside the area at least once a year.
26. **Webster** - No one from the trip was there, but a messenger reported that they had gone to New York and had a very successful trip.
27. **Little Savannah** - Rev. Kent Lowdermilk reported that he went on a trip that involved three wonderful days of VBS and Revival. Gary Broom then spoke about 6 trips to West Virginia. 14 people were saved and 11 went immediately to the river wanting to be baptized. He asked for prayers for strength and guidance for future plans.
28. **Zion Hill** - Rev. Keith Ashe spoke about their trip to West Virginia. They took a 25 foot load of supplies. It had set them on fire. They also went in partnership with New Hope to Kentucky. They installed new windows and siding.
29. **Cashiers** - Rev. Art Fowler reported about an eight-day puppet ministry in Savannah, Georgia. They made two presentations everyday and many youth made the decision to receive Jesus as Lord.
30. The Senior Adult Choir sang Special Music.
31. Rev. George Holley of the Craggy Correctional Center brought the message. His testimony was very touching of how the Lord can take a person and change his direction. His report was also on page 20.
32. Rev. Art Fowler led in the Benediction.

SECOND SESSION, FRIDAY, OCTOBER 18, 2002

1. Greens Creek Baptist Church hosted the second session of the 173rd Annual Meeting of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association. A delicious meal was served at 4:30 p.m. A total of 123 present: 97 Messengers and 26 visitors representing 26 churches (includes hostess committee members who prepared and served the meal).
2. Rev. Clemmey Queen, Moderator, welcomed everyone and called the meeting to order.
3. The Greens Creek Baptist choir sang and Rev. Harry Vance had scripture and prayer.
4. Rev. Harry Vance led in singing, "Amazing Grace".

REPORTS

5. **Baptist Hospitals** - Paul Mullen gave the report on page 23. He said there were mission-minded people in NC Baptist Churches paying expenses in the name of Jesus Christ. He thanked everyone for the role they play when they give financially to the Baptist Hospitals. He read letters and told stories of people who had gratefully received help.
 6. Rev. Matt Ledbetter and Rev. Art Fowler presented checks to the chaplaincy programs: \$1,000 to Alan Hetzel of the Highlands-Cashiers Chaplaincy Program and \$4,000 to Ron Allen for the WestCare Chaplaincy Program.
 7. **Harris Regional Chaplaincy** - Ron Allen gave his report on page 21. He also said that WestCare is expanding and they need more volunteers who are spirit led to help.
 8. **Truett Baptist Camp** - Richard Robinson reported that they had built a new dorm this year that has about 40 beds. Year 2003 is already booked and Year 2004 is filling up rapidly. Annual report on page 22.
 9. **United Christian Ministries** - Rev. Claude Conard presented a check to Kathy Cross to help people. Her report is on page 25. She reported that more people seemed to come in lately needing their services: help with prescriptions, rent, utilities, clothes, etc. They help people get started and fill in gaps. Volunteers are needed.
 10. **Baptist Children's Homes** - Rev. Lloyd Fish gave the report on page 26. He announced that four churches from the association had been listed as 4 of the top 200 churches in NC who had given directly to the Baptist Children's Homes. Moses Creek was #12, Cashiers was #37, Scotts Creek was #129 and New Hope #180. He invited everyone to take part in the Chain of Prayer that will be constructed from the written prayers of thousands of NC Baptists touched by this vital and necessary ministry. The completed chain will be exhibited at this year's Baptist State Convention. The theme this year is "I'm Real".
 11. **Mission Report** - Rev. Clemmey Queen recognized Karen Burnett of Jarrett Memorial. She has been on mission trips to French Guiana. In January she will going to Richmond for orientation.
 12. Betty Greene, Jean Keener and Mike Moore reported that a designation of \$6,000 had been set to be used for mission partnerships. It also had been voted to provide \$2,000 to assist a family in Jackson County living in a substandard home. It was announced that Rev. Matt Ledbetter, Rev. Mike Moore and Rev. Claude Conard had presented \$5,000 from the association to REACH for battered women and needy families. Matt also announced that he and Claude had presented a check to The Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute's Library Fund on Alumni Day in honor of Rev. Claude Conard. In the future they will be presenting a check to the Western Carolina University's Baptist Student Union for scholarships to Southern Baptist Seminaries.
 13. Clemmey said that the change on page 37 pointed out to the messengers on the previous night would be presented by Rev. Rich Peoples. Rev. Peoples apologized and said that he was not presenting it as parliamentarian, but as a messenger. He moved that a change to By-Laws Article V. Meetings, Section 2 be deleted and the following change be added for Section 2: **"ARTICLE V MEETINGS SECTION 2. Each church shall be entitled to be represented at the annual meeting by the pastor and one additional messenger. Churches which give to the association more than .5% of their undesignated receipts shall be entitled to an additional 2 messengers for every .5% of giving up to a total of 10 messengers for churches which give 2% of their undesignated giving."** It was seconded.
- Rich then spoke why he felt that the association needs to move forward and churches need to be committed to sharing Jesus. Now larger churches can have more messengers because it is based on membership numbers. It is not based on the dollar amount given to the association. He feels that a financial commitment is needed by each church. Percentage applies equally to each church.
- Rev. Harry Vance then went up and asked first whether or not it came from the Constitution Committee. Clemmey told him that it comes from the By-Laws committee. Claude assured him that proper procedure had been followed. Harry then protested that it had not been read aloud the previous night. He stated that it has always been a freewill offering.
- Rev. Harry Vance then moved to table the motion until next year. It was seconded.
- Discussion followed concerning the tabling of the motion. Clemmey spoke out of order at this time.
- Rev. Mike Moore said that nobody is forced to give money. It is the opportunity for the smallest church to

have as many messengers as the bigger churches.

Rev. Rich Peoples (as parliamentarian) stated that the proper procedures had been followed. It had been given to the committee more than 10 days in written form prior to the annual meeting. It had also been presented in written form to the messengers on the first session of the annual meeting.

Rev. Art Fowler said that even if we won't give a thing you can still have two messengers. But if you give you can have up to 10 like larger churches. He is against tabling the motion.

No more discussion was made.

Clemmey then said that all in favor of tabling the original motion to next year raise their hand. There were 4 in favor of tabling it and 62 were opposed. The motion failed.

Then discussion about the original motion followed:

Rev. Matt Ledbetter of Hamburg said he was for this motion, because it gives all churches equal voice.

Ray Buchanan said all churches should have equal number of messengers regardless of what they give.

Rev. Harry Vance questioned the statement that even churches that don't give anything will get messengers. He said the change on page 37 didn't say that.

Karen Burnette said that money should not be the deciding factor on who gets to come to the annual meeting and vote. Money should be given from the heart. She also disagreed with the pastor automatically being one of the two messengers that every church gets. Each church is autonomous and should be able to send lay people.

Rev. Gerald Morris then called for Question. 58 voted yes to end discussion and none were opposed. It passed.

All those in favor of the amendment raised their hands. 61 yes. 10 raised their hands in opposition. That was 2/3 in favor of the amendment and it carried.

14. Rev. Rich Peoples then moved that the next two proposed changes on page 37 be approved. He also stated that correct process was followed in presenting these two proposed changes also. He proposed that **Article XI. Associational Standing Committees - Add the following to Section 5. THE CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE - It shall be responsible for registering messengers at the Annual Meetings.**

Article XI. Associational Standing Committees - Section 9. Change the word "Finance" to read "Stewardship." It was seconded. No discussion followed and the motion carried.

15. **Personnel Committee** - Rev. Art Fowler presented Gracella Morris as replacement secretary for Amanda Bialy. Everyone welcomed her.

16. **Place & Preacher Committee** - Rev. Claude Conard announced that next year's annual meeting would be held at Balsam Baptist Church with Rev. Art Fowler speaking the first night. The second night's meeting would be at Rockdale Baptist Church with Rev. Johnny Swanger speaking.

17. **Evangelism Committee** - Rev. Rich Peoples said that the JESUS video project was underway to be able to send a video to every home in Jackson County. Rev. Matt Ledbetter said he had a Vision video and JESUS video for every church to review. It is estimated that it will take \$75,000 to get it in every home.

18. **Resolutions Committee** - Rev. Rich Peoples moved that a resolution of appreciation be adopted. Whereas Hamburg Baptist Church and Greens Creek Baptist Church have hosted sessions of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association and have provided wonderful meals and gracious hospitality to the messengers of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association, and

Whereas Rev. Brian Bishop, Rev. George Holley have brought and we trust in a few moments, Rev. Steve Gunter will bring, helpful and insightful messages, and

DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS REPORT

As I write out my report for October 2001 to September 30, 2002 I have mixed feelings. I don't want to sound negative, but there is no way that I can avoid it completely. Let me share with you what I mean—I want to be honest and the Lord knows my heart, I would not for anything, do or say something which could hinder or hurt our work in our Association.

Let me go back to our Associational Meeting last October. We had a good meeting and some dynamic messages from Eugene Ridley and Charles Dean. Both messages touched our hearts and we left on Friday evening after Charles Dean had spoken we left on a high note.

My work through December, 2001 continued on a usual basis. I continued my visits with churches in the association making no distinctions among them.

Then came Sunday, January 1, 2002. Mrs. Irene Hooper called me and asked me if I would come and be with them on Sunday morning and introduce their new pastor and his family. This I agreed to do not knowing the full story of what had occurred. But when I woke up Sunday morning there was two inches of snow on the ground and it was still snowing. I had told the Personnel Committee that in adverse weather I would not try to cross Balsam Mountain with snow on the ground. So I called Mrs. Hooper and told her that I could not come because of the snow. She understood, but gave me her pastor's cell phone number and I was able to call him and welcome him and his family to Jackson County and the Association.

Some of the pastors had seen the news in the Sylva Herald and began to call me about Cullowhee Baptist Church calling a woman pastor. There was a called meeting of pastors on January 22 along with some of their deacons and they were advised by our Moderator to write a letter to the Credentials Committee to counsel with them about the situation. After that meeting, which was supposed to be a closed meeting, began the bad publicity about our Credentials Meeting. After the April meeting of the Executive Committee when the Sylva First Baptist Church presented a resolution at the very end of the meeting, backing Cullowhee and stating some doctrinal things, which really upset out pastors in the association, things went from bad to worse. At the July Executive Committee meeting there was more reaction to what was happening and more adverse publicity in the Biblical Recorder and the Sylva Herald newspaper occurred. Six of our churches have withdrawn from the Association.

If we follow the leadership of the Lord and pray for one another, including all the Baptist churches in Jackson County, He will see us through this crisis and many great things can and will occur in the Tuckasegee Baptist Association. Let us be positive and let us work together as Moses said to the children of Israel in Exodus 14:13-14: "Fear ye not, **STAND STILL**, and see the salvation of the Lord, which he will show to you today. And the Lord said unto Moses, Wherefore criest thou unto me? Speak unto the children of Israel, that they **GO FORWARD**." Let's move on for the Lord and we will see what the Lord will do in the Tuckasegee Baptist Association.

October 8, 2001 – The Association met at the Baptist Center for the regular quarterly meeting. 25 members and 3 visitors were present representing 19 churches. Vice-moderator Clemmey Queen presided. Roy Burnette led in singing of hymns. Rev. Terry Wehunt of Ochre Hill Baptist Church gave the devotion. The following reports were given: Treasurer, Clerk, JESUS Video Project, Nominating Committee, Director of Missions, Senior Adults, and WMU. The Credentials Committee recommended that Trinity Baptist Church come under the watchcare of the Association for one year to be voted on as members at the end of that year. The motion was passed. Clemmey Queen read the names of the Resolutions Committee: Steve Jamison (Chair), Steve Bialy & Dawn Shropshire. A letter from Hamburg Baptist Church pledging full support to the Association was read. It was voted that \$500 be given to the Jackson Co. Bible Clubs after a presentation by Clemmey Queen and Steve Alexander. Claude Conard also mentioned the importance of the church being incorporated and said he would help any church be incorporated. After announcements and prayer the meeting was adjourned.

January 7, 2002 - The Association met at the Baptist Center for the regular quarterly meeting. 22 members and 5 visitors were present representing 16 churches. Moderator Mike Dellinger presided. Harry Vance led in singing of hymns. Rev. Art Fowler of Cashiers Baptist Church gave the devotion. The following reports were given: Clerk; Treasurer; Director of Missions; Music; Pastors, Deacons & Spouses; VBS; and Water Testing. The Finance Committee received approval to increase postage, install an extra phone line for internet and fax use, and purchase a TV and VCR for the Baptist Center. The additional funds would come from the Annie Hoyle Endowment Fund. It was also approved to request the Cooperative Agreement from the BSC that requests \$3,000. After announcements and prayer the meeting was adjourned.

April 8, 2002 - The Association met at the Baptist Center for the regular quarterly meeting. 50 members and 16 visitors were present representing 20 churches. Moderator Mike Dellinger presided. Harry Vance led in singing of hymns. Randy Hyatt, pastor of Rockdale Baptist Church gave the devotion. The following reports were given: Clerk; Treasurer; Director of Missions; Music; Pastors, Deacons & Spouses; VBS; and Senior Adult. The Finance Committee discussed the resignation of Jesse Flake and the increase in the secretary's salary due to increased work load in order to keep the financial records at the Associational Office. The motion carried. Art Keener gave the Committee on Committees report. Steve Bialy was recommended to replace Bruce Stiles on the Credentials Committee. Larry Perry was recommended to replace Terry Wehunt on the Evangelism Committee. The motion carried. The Nominating Committee recommended Steve Bryson to replace Jesse Flake as Treasurer, Harry Vance to replace Jo Medford as Assistant Treasurer and Robert Sutton to replace Jim Haskett as Truett Camp Representative. It was approved. Mike Moore recommended the first session of the Annual Meeting this year be held at Hamburg Baptist Church. It was approved. Shirley Kool recommended taking \$185 out of the mission fund for a family needing money to pay their rent. It was approved. Jack Hinson, interim Pastor of Sylva First Baptist, read a Resolution adopted by their church at its April 7th business meeting. The Resolution stated that Sylva First resolutely stands behind Cullowhee Baptist in their calling a woman pastor. It also stated their unshakable stance that Jesus Christ, rather than the Bible, is the final authority on all matters of faith and practice. The Resolution asked for equal treatment of all churches in the Association. After announcements and prayer the meeting was adjourned.

July 8, 2002 - The Association met at the Baptist Center for the regular quarterly meeting. 63 members and 10 visitors were present representing 33 churches. Moderator Mike Dellinger presided. Harry Vance led in singing of hymns. Rev. Frank Brooks, pastor of Mt. Pleasant Baptist Church gave the devotion. Rev. Steve Bialy made the motion to go to Executive Session. It was seconded and the motion carried. All non-members and a few members left the room. The meeting continued in closed session.

Pastor, Deacon, and Spouse Fellowship

The Pastor, Deacon, and Spouse Fellowship of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association met four times from October 2001 through July 2002.

The first meeting was held at Scotts Creek Baptist Church, Friday, October 26, 2001. The host church served a delicious meal prior to the meeting. Art Keener, Chairman, welcomed the attendees. Bud Plemmons led in prayer. Art also gave the devotion. Reading from Psalms 91, he stated that this was one of his favorite scriptures during his time in the service. He also commented on the love and harmony exhibited during the recent associational meetings. Harry Vance led the congregation in the opening hymn, "At the Cross."

Elaine Haskett read the minutes of the July meeting in the absence of the secretary. They were approved with the exception that the minutes stated that Gary Cessna was a new deacon at East Fork. A motion was made and approved to accept the Treasurer's Report. Gary Cessna led the prayer for the offering after which Harry Vance led in singing, "Trust and Obey." The offering received was \$45.

During Old Business, the nominating committee recommended Frank Crawford as Time and Place person. The recommendation was approved. There was no new business.

Art Keener commended the youth in the recent youth festival for the good work they had done. Ten youth were saved and 13 rededicated their lives.

The Interim Director of Missions, Claude Conard, gave the message. He read from 1 Thessalonians. He talked about the need to be thankful, respectful, and watchful to live a life that people can see Christ in us. With the present War on Terrorism and the troubles the nation is facing, there is a great need of prayer. He also shared his salvation experiences with us. Al Cauley led in the closing prayer.

The second meeting was held January 25, 2002 at Shoal Creek Baptist Church. Following a delicious meal, the Reverend Claude Conard, Interim Director of Missions, representing the Chairman, Art Keener, opened and presided over the meeting. The minutes of October 26, 2001 were presented by Irene Hooper and approved. The treasurer, Roy Haskett, was not present so no financial report was given. There were 50 persons in attendance, representing nine churches.

The Pastor of Shoal Creek Baptist, Reverend Steve Jamison, warmly welcomed the attendees and provided the opening prayer and the devotion. His text was from Luke. He noted that we are to work in humility as we work together to promote God's kingdom.

Harry Vance led the congregation in two songs, "Mine Eyes Have Seen the Glory" and "Worship, Work, and Witness."

His inspiring talk discussed the various services that North Carolina Baptist Retirement Homes provide for the older residents. Campbell Soup labels enabled Home Missionary, Debbie Wohler of CA, to get two free vans to use in after school programs. Last count 15 children had been saved. Jack Taylor (home missionary of Charleston, SC) received enough labels for a van. We are saving for a van for the Oneida Baptist Institute in Kentucky. (This is an on-going mission project.)

Also, 3,000 old offering envelopes were collected for the Ghana Center. They use these to dispense 5,000 pills per week to patients.

Forty-seven were saved this past school year and two were saved at Scotts Creek and one at Fairview this year. Please pray for the children, teachers, and workers in this ministry. Pray God will keep the doors open to teach our children about God in "After School Bible Clubs." Thanks to Nora Peters who traveled to Raleigh to get permission to start these clubs.

GA's and Children in Action: Attended Camp Truett; many made decisions for Christ. Lisa Dean and her daughter, Mandy, attended "Mother-Daughter" camp at Mundo Vista; Lisa is our Associational G.A. Director.

Other ministries our women, men and children have been involved in: Radio Ministry, Home delivered meals, prayer walks, homeless shelters, repairing homes from Asheville, NC to Anchorage, AK.

We continue to support AWAKE and REACH as they work with abused children and battered wives and children.

Operation Christmas Child: Some of our people worked in Charlotte packing the shoe boxes for children around the world. Others worked at the collection site in Waynesville. We delivered three van loads last year. Let's support Franklin Graham through "Samaritan's Purse" in filling more shoe boxes this year to reach more children with God's love.

Our Fall WMU meeting was held at the Baptist Center September 9. God opened yet another door for ministry. Sheila Johnson, member of Locust Field Baptist Church, works with the NC Women's Prison Ministry. We learned we can have a part in ministering to the needs of these women in supplying for their personal needs and spiritual needs.

September 2002 we promoted the North Carolina Missions Offering and Week of Prayer. WMU receives all funding through this offering.

THE NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION, INC. 2001 ANNUAL REPORT

The mission of the North Carolina Baptist Foundation since its inception in 1920 has been to assist the Convention and its institutions and agencies in increasing an awareness among North Carolina Baptists of Christian estate stewardship principles as a means of financially undergirding churches, institutions and mission endeavors on a permanent basis. The uniqueness of the ministries and services provided by the institutions and General Board staff merits increased financial support. The Foundation accomplishes these objectives by offering assistance in estate planning counsel, Will preparation, planned giving, charitable remainder trusts, endowment funds and church fund management.

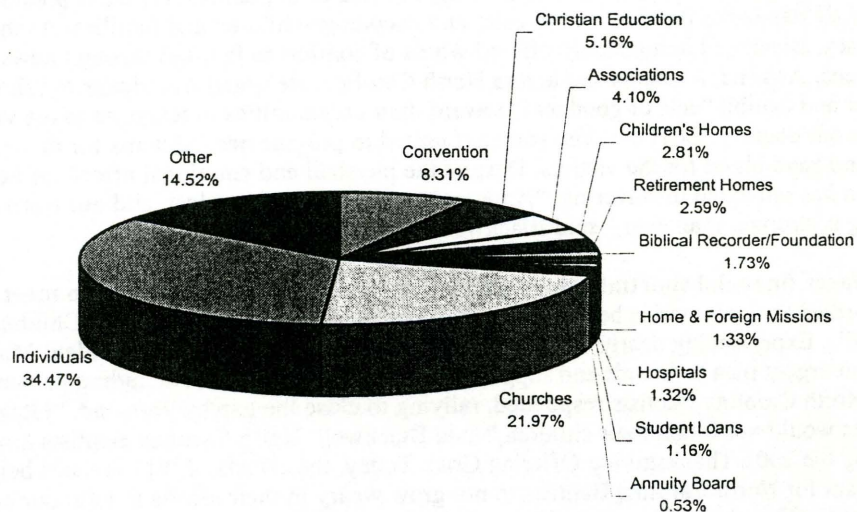
During 2001, the Foundation assisted individuals in establishing 33 endowment funds and 8 charitable remainder trusts totaling \$4.8 million and received \$9.4 million in contributions to existing endowments all of which will ultimately benefit countless Baptist causes on a permanent basis. Programs were provided for 162 churches and associations during the year to promote Make Your Will Month, Christian estate stewardship, and church fund management. Over \$2.3 million from churches and institutions came under management to enhance numerous ministries including scholarships, building funds, cemetery funds, benevolence funds, general operating funds and other various mission causes. With a total of \$16.5 million in contributions, it was the best year ever eclipsing the previous high of \$10.1 million recorded in 2000.

The Foundation employs professional money managers to invest these funds according to an investment policy adopted by its Board. Four investment pools are offered: a growth fund, a balanced fund, an income fund and a fixed income fund. The Foundation uses the services of Salomon Smith Barney to help select top money managers and evaluate performance. As of December 31, 2001, the Foundation held \$106.8 million under management. This is an increase of more than \$9.4 million over 2000.

During 2001, our distributions totaled \$6.7 million, with charity receiving \$4.4 million and individuals, through trusts, receiving \$2.3 million. During the 82-year history of The North Carolina Baptist Foundation, Inc., \$20.8 million has been distributed to individuals and \$36.8 million to Baptist churches, institutions and mission causes for a grand historical total of \$57.6 million.

Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina

Jason and Lacey know real hope after facing hopeless times. Jason and Lacey lived with their mother in Hilo, Hawaii. It sounds wonderful, but for the brother and sister it was far from paradise. Their mother's lifestyle constantly placed the two children in danger. Jason was given the blame by his mother for many of the things that had gone wrong in her life.

"She didn't care about anything," Jason recalls now. "I was just there. She didn't care for me."

Jason drew violent pictures. He had difficulty relating to people and was diagnosed with attention deficit disorder. Soon his secrets were exposed. He had suffered severe physical and emotional abuse by his mother. Drugs had been a pervasive part of his life. He had begun using drugs when he was six years old.

Once Jason's grandparents discovered the truth about Jason's life, they sought immediate help for their grandson and found the help they desperately needed from Baptist Children's Homes. In August 1996, he began his new life at Broyhill Home in Clyde.

Lacey still lived with her mother. The two moved to Arizona. Lacey spent her days in the cab of her mother's boyfriend's semi-truck. She was not attending school. After Jason left, Lacey became the focus of her mother's abuse.

Again, the siblings' grandparents intervened. The couple began to think about bringing Lacey to live at Broyhill Home. In 1997, 14 months after Jason, she was safe. Lacey and Jason's grandparents credit Baptist Children's Homes for giving their grandchildren real hope.

Lacey says she plans to be a lawyer. She likes fighting for the underdog. Jason has plans for a career in broadcast journalism. Since coming to Broyhill Home, both children have accepted Christ as their Savior.

"Things began to turn around for me when I became a Christian. I began to read my Bible," Jason says. "I learned a lot of the answers to my questions. I felt like I could be more open."

"Jason might be in an institution, in prison or dead. We try not to even think of what Lacey's life would be like today," the grandparents say. "They've been saved!"

Jason and Lacey are two of the 1,855 children cared for by BCH last year.

Baptist Children's Homes grieves with Nation after September 11th attack – BCH president calls for acts of kindness. In the wake of the tragic events of September 11, BCH president Dr. Michael C. Blackwell stepped to the forefront to calm and encourage children and families. As the nation reeled from the attack, Blackwell immediately offered words of comfort to families through news media from Louisiana, Arizona, Alabama and across North Carolina. He urged Americans to "show kindness" to one another and exhibit "acts of goodness" toward their communities in response to the violence exhibited against our country. BCH children and staff united to provide needed items for those serving at Ground Zero and gave blood for the victims. Despite the physical and emotional effects of September 11, BCH's mission has remained unwavering. "America's spirit has not been lost, and our spirit of helping and healing is stronger than ever," said Blackwell.

BCH faces financial shortfalls due to 9/11, North Carolina Baptists rise to meet financial challenges. As charities across America began to feel the financial effects of 9/11, Baptist Children's Homes also faced shortfalls. Experiencing nearly a 60 percent drop in annual fund giving, President Michael C. Blackwell made an urgent plea to friends and supporters. After an intense effort including personal letters and phone calls, North Carolina Baptists responded, rallying to close the gap by year-end. "I knew North Carolina Baptists would not forget their children," said Blackwell. North Carolina Baptists also stepped forward by meeting the 2001 Thanksgiving Offering Goal. Today, the effects of 9/11 are still being felt. "It is important for North Carolina Baptists to not grow weary in their efforts to help our boys and girls," said Blackwell. "Our churches are our lifeline. It is because of them we are able to touch the lives of so many."

New BCH strategic plan unveiled. *Quest: A Journey of Excellence* is the title of the new strategic plan that will guide Baptist Children's Homes through 2004. The major goals of the new plan include recruiting and retaining competent qualified staff; training staff; and maintaining and enhancing BCH facilities.

BCH Trustees approve allocation for Information Technology. Trustees made way for sweeping technological improvements throughout BCH. A new Information Technology Center was created and work began to connect all ministry sites digitally. "Every step we take is designed to enable us to better serve children and families... today and in the future," said Dr. Michael C. Blackwell.

Gastonia couple honored at Nolen Building dedication. William "Red" and Mabel Nolen were recognized for their contribution at the dedication of the newly renovated and renamed Nolen Administration building at Mills Home on January 22, 2002. A gift from the Gastonia couple, who have long-time ties to BCH, made the necessary renovations possible.

BCH's Developmental Disabilities Ministry dedicates two new group homes. More than 200 Baptist leaders, Baptist Children's Homes administrators, staff, and guests were in attendance for the historic dedication of BCH's first, new group homes for developmentally disabled adults on March 26, 2002. The two homes, Davis House and Hinkle House, joined Baptist House at Bethabara located in Winston-Salem. Plans to break ground on the next DDM group home to be located in Sanford are scheduled for 2003. Baptist State Convention President Dr. Jerry Pereira, who spoke at the dedication, predicted "the Lord is going to do great and mighty things" through this ministry.

***A Place for Miracles* published.** In March 2002, BCH president Michael C. Blackwell introduced his second book. More than three years in the making, *A Place for Miracles* is a mixture of history, autobiography, inspiration, and vision. The book received the 2002 Baptist Communicators Association Design Award for Best Book Design.

***New Millennium Families: A Study Guide* introduced to North Carolina Baptists.** In September 2001, the study guide to BCH president Michael C. Blackwell's book *New Millennium Families* was introduced at the first of two statewide Deacon-Spouse Training Events in Bryson City. A total of more than 200 deacons and their spouses attended the two conferences. Blackwell and study guide creator Gaylin Huff led group sessions regarding the changing make-up of families as discussed in the book and its effects on the church in North Carolina. *A Study Guide*, to be used with *New Millennium Families*, helps teachers prepare for and guide groups of adults using four different formats: 7 Week Study, Youth Parent Study, Single Parent Study, and Family Ministry Study.

Baptists called to join "Chain of Prayer" for North Carolina's children and families. BCH president Michael C. Blackwell has asked for all North Carolina Baptists to participate in the "Chain of Prayer." Begun in February 2002 at the annual Baptist Men's conference in Charlotte, this physical chain is made up of thin strips of paper containing the handwritten prayers of NC Baptist men, women and children. Throughout the year, these strips are being gathered by BCH representatives and formed together into a chain that will be displayed at this year's Baptist State Convention in November. With children and families facing many different sources of crisis in today's world, Dr. Blackwell believes this statewide unification of prayers for children and families in our state will yield great results.

The support of North Carolina Baptists through the Thanksgiving Offering, Cooperative Program, church and individual gifts, memorials, honors, and estate gifts enables us to fulfill our mission statement – "helping hurting children...healing broken families" – through 14 locations throughout the state. **Thank you, North Carolina Baptists, for your continued prayers and support.**

BAPTIST HOSPITAL AND NORTH CAROLINA BAPTISTS: PARTNERS IN MISSIONS

The Baptist Hospital mission began in 1921 when our North Carolina Baptist founders stated, "We desire to build a hospital to bring the healing art more definitely under the dominion of the Great Healer." Gold crosses that adorn the exterior of the hospital symbolize our historic and daily commitment to bring medical excellence and Christian compassion to those we are privileged to serve. This report will highlight our partnership with North Carolina Baptists in continuing the mission of healing.

SCHOOL OF PASTORAL CARE

Our mission at the School of Pastoral Care is "to provide ministries of growth, hope, and healing in the Spirit of Christ." This defines the spiritual essence of who we are and the meaning of what we do in caring for hurting people. We are very thankful to North Carolina Baptists for their gifts to the School through the Cooperative Missions Program. You are making a tremendous difference as our partner in life-changing ministries.

CareNet, Inc., our Department of Pastoral Counseling, is the largest faith-based counseling system in the nation. We continue to expand our services across North Carolina. The scope of this ministry is astounding: 27,000 hours of counseling per year at 21 locations. These include 4 regional centers (Winston-Salem, Greenville, Fayetteville, and Wilmington) and 17 strategically located satellites. The individual stories of emotional and spiritual healing, of broken families being restored, are even more telling.

The Center for Congregational Health celebrates its 10th Anniversary in 2002. Dr. David Odom has been the Center's visionary leader from its beginning. The initial mission continues to guide this ministry of helping churches become healthier communities of faith. The Center is providing consultation to approximately 25 churches per month, and training to over 600 church leaders per year. The financial support of N.C. Baptists allows Baptist churches to receive initial consultation at no cost, and provides subsidies for churches and ministers needing financial assistance. Please call the Center for more information (336-716-0459).

The Department of Chaplaincy and Pastoral Education provided ministry through more than 61,000 pastoral contacts in the past year. Every day chaplains can be found comforting bereaved families, praying for seriously ill patients, reading Scriptures to those who are afraid, offering comfort and extending hope in the name of Jesus Christ. Fifty-three students received supervision and training in 2001.

The Department of Church and Community Relations continues to serve its mission as a liaison between the Hospital and North Carolina Baptist churches. We welcome you to call Rev. Paul Mullen if you need assistance (336-716-3027). Many pastors call on behalf of church members who need a referral to the Medical Center or have concerns about medical bills because of financial need. Speakers can be requested to provide an overview of the Hospital and its ministries to church groups.

BAPTIST BENEVOLENT CARE FUND

It is a difficult burden to be physically sick and worried about how to pay for needed medical care. North Carolina Baptists extend the compassionate reach of missions to patients in financial need at Baptist Hospital through their gifts to the Mother's Day Offering. Those you have helped are deeply thankful for this gracious witness to the love of Jesus Christ, and they are drawn closer to Him. All of the funds are used for this purpose. **Thank you, North Carolina Baptists, for giving \$568,808 to this ministry in 2001!**

ADDITIONAL HIGHLIGHTS AT NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL

Number 1 in Patient Satisfaction - Baptist Hospital was ranked #1 in the nation in patient satisfaction, according to Press Ganey patient satisfaction scores for the spring quarter of 2002. Press Ganey, the health care industry's top satisfaction measurement firm, ranked Baptist Hospital first among its peers.

New Brenner Children's Hospital Opens - The 11-story addition to the Hospital opened in April 2002. Six of the floors provide private rooms for all pediatric patients, state-of-the-art technology, family resource centers, a prayer room, and an enclosed playground on the roof. The tower also includes additional operating rooms and a spacious surgical family waiting room.

New Substance Abuse Treatment Center for Older Adults - Wake Forest University Baptist Behavioral Health, a subsidiary of Baptist Hospital and WFU Health Sciences, has opened the first residential program in the region devoted exclusively to treating chemical dependency problems among adults 55 and older. The comprehensive treatment program focuses on treating the whole person, encompassing physical, emotional, social, and spiritual health.

Ranked Among the Nation's Best - The North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Inc. ranks among "America's Best Hospitals" according to the July 2002 issue of *U.S. News and World Report*.



Gardner-Webb University - 2001- 2002 Academic Year Summary

As Gardner-Webb officially enters into a countdown to its centennial in 2005, the institution is experiencing success in all phases of campus life. Despite a progressive move into the 21st century, however, the University's mission remains the same as it has been since its founding in 1905 -- to provide learning of distinction within a caring Christian environment.

The 2001-2002 year at Gardner-Webb will be noted in the annals of the University's history as one of extreme significance. Programs and facilities, affiliations, personnel and student body all were enhanced further to continue the institution's rise to regional and national prominence.

Programs such as the M. Christopher White School of Divinity have continued to offer new and dynamic courses of study under the leadership of highly respected faculty members. In Fall 2001 Gardner-Webb began offering its first-ever doctoral program, the Doctor of Ministry (D.Min.) degree, with the maximum number of students enrolled.

The School of Divinity is prepared to enter this new realm with strong administrative and faculty leadership, and challenging curriculum and auxiliary offerings as well. A hallmark of the GWU divinity experience continues to be the annual Holy Land and Paul's Missionary Journeys Study Tours. The trips, now underwritten by GWU for divinity students, is led by GWU President Dr. Chris White, a noted authority in biblical studies, and Dr. Wayne Stacy, Dean of the School of Divinity.

The School of Divinity also welcomed the addition of two newly established endowed chairs in 2001-2002. The Bob D. Shepherd Chair of New Testament Interpretation was the first endowed chair to ever be formed at GWU, and Dr. Todd D. Still was named at opening divinity convocation to occupy the esteemed position. In the spring, the Randall Lolley Chair of Pastoral Studies was completed in honor of Dr. Lolley's tremendous impact on Baptist life.

The Center for Congregational Enrichment, a function of the School of Divinity, this past year was the beneficiary of GWU's largest-ever grant, a \$1.25 million gift from the Lilly Foundation to begin a program for youth that nurtures the call to Christian ministry. Hired this year to direct the Center and the new Lilly program was Dr. Danny West, a noted Baptist leader who will administrate the innovative new Lilly venture while continuing the Center's work to provide seminars and workshops to laypersons and church leaders on timely topics that range from teaching Sunday School to effective church administration.

The same sense of excitement and progress that has marked the past year in the School of Divinity has permeated the entire institution as well. Other areas of the University that were lauded this past year include the GWU School of Education, which had its teacher education program ranked for the third year in a row among the top programs of its kind in a recent study produced by the State Board of Education. The School of Education is recognized for quality in all its departments with accreditation from the National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE), the most prestigious status that can be achieved in teacher education.

Further indication of Gardner-Webb's commitment to the highest level quality of instruction is Dr. Gail Price, winner of the 2001-2002 Fleming-White Excellence in Teaching Award that honors the University's most outstanding faculty member. Price, professor of English and past chair of the GWU Department of English Language and Literature, has brought her Christian influence and integrity to the classroom for more than a decade, and her honor was voted upon by not only students, but fellow faculty and staff as well. Dr. Price is a widely respected authority in her field and regularly participates in innovative efforts locally, regionally and nationally to continually raise the standard of excellence in English and writing instruction.

Furthering its mission to provide world-class education in a Christian setting, Gardner-Webb has refined and expanded many of its 17 off-campus locations this year as well, including the new "Gardner-Webb University at Statesville" operation. Providing the only four-year opportunity to that region of North Carolina, GWU at Statesville is settling into a new, state-of-the-art facility in Iredell County that spans over 11,000 square feet. In April, a new facility was unveiled in Mecklenburg County as well, officially named "Gardner-Webb University at Charlotte." The institution's evening school offerings for working adults are offered at the site along with multiple graduate level programs for the citizens of that area also.

The quality of the student body continued in 2001-2002 to set new standards of excellence at GWU. The average GPA for incoming students was over 3.4 and the average SAT was 1100. A newly completed strategic plan for the University identifies this quality of student as being key to the growth and progress of GWU's next decade. In addition, the strategic plan and accompanying master plan have set forth ambitious and exciting goals for the university in the next decade, including expansion of the physical campus and academic programs, among others.

The new 2001-2002 year also meant the completion of GWU's transition phase to NCAA Division I status. Fall 2002 marks the beginning of a new era in athletics, as well as academics and recognition, as Gardner-Webb has begun competing in the Atlantic Sun Conference (formerly the TAAC). This move to Division I and conference affiliation opens new doors institutionally for Gardner-Webb as new markets and opportunities for exposure are tapped in member cities such as Miami/Ft.Lauderdale, Orlando, Jacksonville, Birmingham, Nashville and Atlanta.

Students at Gardner-Webb also enjoyed another eventful year full of opportunities to grow in all areas of their well-being. Notably, many students again participated in Ministerial Education (M.E.) Days, which allow undergraduate and graduate ministerial students the chance to preach in Baptist churches in area associations through a cooperative arrangement with the GWU Office of Campus Ministries. That office continues also to offer the weekly DIMENSIONS program to students, which features prominent speakers and performers who bring positive messages of their Christian faith each Tuesday throughout the academic year.

As a leader in the Baptist community, Gardner-Webb takes seriously its responsibility as a beacon of quality Christian higher education to the state, region and the nation. The decisions made by the Board of Trustees and the administration will continue to reflect that philosophy as the University charts a course for the 21st century.

Staying true to its affiliation with the Christian faith, Gardner-Webb remains appreciative for the generous support it receives from the Cooperative Program and feels that the school is more effective as a result of offerings that are enhanced with these funds.

As a fellow Baptist, it has been my privilege to serve as the Clinical I Chaplain at Craggy Correctional Center for nearly seven years. During this time we have seen hundreds of men saved. Also, our beautiful Religious Center/Chapel was completed in 1997. Correctional chaplaincy for me has been very rewarding. However, due to the budget cut proposals now before the N.C. General Assembly 18 to 23 Department of Correction Chaplain positions will be eliminated. My position is one of those that will be cut. On July 8th my 30-day termination letter was received which means that when the budget is passed within the next week, I will be let go without delay. When this position is lost, it will seriously cripple the religious services and programs that are now offered at Craggy where between 125 -150 men accept Jesus as their savior each year.

If the high level of gospel ministry is to be continued at Craggy, my position must immediately become church/community funded. The *Craggy Correctional Center Chapel Fund, Inc.*, was formed in 1991 as a non-profit 501 (c)(3) organization to raise money for the construction of a Religious Center. The Craggy Chapel Fund is still active and will now facilitate funding Christian chaplains for Craggy. Therefore, your help is urgently needed if this ministry is to continue and grow.

Churches, individuals and business all over Western North Carolina are being asked to join together to fund one full-time chaplain (my position) and half the salary of one additional chaplain at Craggy. Enclosed with this letter is an excellent video about Craggy and this ministry. We ask that you and your church view the video and if God leads, help us financially. We are asking churches to consider giving at least a dollar-a-day (\$365 per year). Some can and are giving more. But regardless of the donation size, with everyone's help, this ministry can and will continue. One company has already pledged \$10,000 if others will give a total of \$30,000. Can we count on your help?

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UNITED CHRISTIAN MINISTRIES OF JACKSON COUNTY, 2001

The year of 2001 was a big year for United Christian Ministries. The agency had a ten percent increase in the services provided from the previous year. Since 1996 to 2001 The number of Thanksgiving and Christmas boxes has greatly increased. In '96 we gave out 33 Thanksgiving boxes and 44 Christmas boxes. In 2001 we gave out 112 and 101 respectively. Nineteen percent of the clients requesting services were referred to other agencies. Thirty five percent of the client base received assistance with groceries. Thirty seven percent of UCM's base was comprised of children under the age or seventeen. Four percent of UCM's clients were sixty-five or older. UCM assisted in payment of 27 utility deposits in addition to 82 past due utilities. Heating/oil assistance was provided for 31 of our clients. Forty clients received past due rental assistance; and 41 clients received assistance with medical/dental needs. We provided many household/personal items and furniture as well. UCM also gave diapers to those who were in need. We provided lodging 16 nights for the transients/homeless and provided transportation for three to get back to their homes.



NONPROFIT CORPORATION

BY-LAWS OF THE TUCKASEIGEE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION, INC.

(Revisions: October 18, 2002 indicated by *.)

ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of the body shall be the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association, Incorporated.

ARTICLE II. OBJECTIVES

The purpose of the Association is to be a fellowship of churches on mission in our setting. The specific objectives of the Association are as follows:

1. To promote harmony, understanding and spiritual power between the churches.
2. To afford and promote a larger fellowship of Christians in the work of Christ.
3. To provide such programs, projects and organizations as will strengthen the churches and assist them in achieving their goals and objectives.
4. To discover needs which cannot be met effectively by churches individually and to coordinate the use of resources in meeting these needs.
5. To encourage support by every church for the mission causes of the Association, the North Carolina Baptist Convention, and the Southern Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE III. AUTHORITY

SECTION 1. The Association shall have the power to elect and install its officers in whatever manner the body may deem expedient.

SECTION 2. The Association shall have power to recommend measures of usefulness and guidance to our churches in matters of organization, ordinations and questions of doctrines and discipline,

SECTION 3. The Association shall have no power to infringe upon the right of local churches as sovereign and independent bodies.

ARTICLE IV. MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. The Association shall be composed of regularly constituted Baptist churches in cooperating fellowship with the Southern Baptist Convention and following the teachings of the New Testament.

SECTION 2. The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership and may receive or reject churches applying for membership therein at its pleasure. Churches applying for membership shall agree to come under the watchcare of the Association for one year. It is understood that during this period of watchcare the church shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the Association except those of voting.

Applications for membership shall be presented to the Credentials Committee of the Association. The applications will consist of a letter from a constituted church stating their desire to affiliate with the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association. The Credentials Committee as a part of the review process may invite the requesting church to a conference to discuss its history, its mission strategy, and any other information that may be pertinent to the application. The Credentials Committee may then approve the application and recommend them to the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee may by a simple majority vote accept the requesting church to come under the watchcare of the Association for one year. It is suggested that any church under watchcare participate in the missions program of the Association. At the end of the year, the church may be voted in as a member of the Association with full privileges by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present and voting at the annual meeting of the Association, provided that the church submits an acceptable letter and at least one messenger be present at the meeting.

SECTION 3. Any church may withdraw from the Association at its pleasure and should notify the Association of this action in writing. Such action will be recognized by the Association at the next annual meeting.

SECTION 4. It shall be the duty of each church to furnish the Associational Clerk, before each annual session, an annual letter, the forms provided by the Associational Clerk, giving the information requested as is applicable to each church situation.

SECTION 5. The Association may withdraw from any church which has become unscriptural in its doctrine or practices by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present and voting at the annual meeting. Such vote is to be taken by written ballot.

ARTICLE V. MEETINGS

SECTION 1. The Association shall hold its annual meeting on Thursday and Friday preceding the third Sunday in October. Special meetings of the Association may be called by the Executive Committee provided two weeks written notice is given to the member churches.

SECTION 2. ***Each church shall be entitled to be represented at the annual meeting by the pastor and one additional messenger. Churches which give to the association more than .5% of their undesignated receipts shall be entitled to an additional 2 messengers for every .5% of giving up to a total of 10 messengers for churches which give 2% of their undesignated giving.***"

SECTION 3. Churches are requested to elect their messengers and alternatives in conference to attend the annual meeting.

SECTION 4. In case of internal dissension in a church and two parties coming to the Association, each claiming to represent the church, neither party shall be seated until the question is decided as to which party is in union with the Association. The decision is to be made by a majority of the messengers present and voting.

ARTICLE VI. OFFICERS

SECTION 1. General officers of the Association shall be: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, Historian, Parliamentarian, and Assistant Parliamentarian. Program leaders shall be Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Music Director, Chairman of Evangelism Committee, Seminary Extension Director, Chairman of Mission Committee, Director of Missions, Trustees, Pastor Conference President, Youth Director, Stewardship Director, Vacation Bible School Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Deacons Chairmen, Senior Adult Director, Singles Ministry Director, and such other officers as the Association may desire to elect.

Associational representatives will be elected for the following institutions and agencies: (1) Truett Camp, (2) Baptist Children's Homes, (3) Baptist Hospital, (4) North Carolina Baptist Homes, Inc. (Homes for the Aging), (5) Biblical Recorder, (6) Christian Education, (7) Annuity Board and other representatives as may be deemed appropriate and elected in the Association.

SECTION 2. With the exception of the Director of Missions and Trustees, the terms of office for all officers of the Association shall be for one year with the privilege of continuing re-election. The Moderator and Vice Moderator shall not be eligible for re-election but one year in succession. (1) The number of Trustees shall be three. (2) The term of service should be for three years, with the term of only one expiring each year. In the first election of Trustees, the term of service for one should be three years, another two years, and the other one year. (3) Upon the expiration of term of service, the Trustee may or may not be re-elected for another term of three years.

Each term of office shall begin with the close of the annual session. The Associational financial year will run from January 1 through December 31.

ARTICLE VII. DUTIES OF OFFICERS

SECTION 1. The **Moderator** shall preside and maintain the order of all meetings of the Association and Executive Committee. He shall serve as ex officio member of all committees of the Association.

He shall appoint the Committee on Committees and all other committees pertinent to the operation of the body not named by the Committee on Committees in its regular report.

SECTION 2. The **Vice Moderator** shall assist the Moderator and preside in the absence of, or at the pleasure of the Moderator.

SECTION 3. The **Clerk** shall keep a complete and accurate record of all transactions; shall prepare a "Book of Reports" to be distributed to messengers at the beginning of each day's session of the annual meeting; and shall cause to be printed minutes concerning the records made.

The Clerk shall distribute to the clerk of each church in the Association blanks for the preparation of the church letter as soon as they are received from the State Convention. This form is to be returned to the Clerk of the Association not later than four weeks prior to the meeting of the body or by the deadline set by the Clerk and Director of Missions. All program reports should be returned by the same date.

An **Assistant Clerk** shall work with the Clerk in preparing the "Book of Reports," the annual minutes and the registration of messengers at the annual meeting.

SECTION 4. The **Treasurer** shall receive and dispense by order of the Executive Committee of the Association while in session, the money of the treasury and make a complete report at the Annual meeting and a current report at each Executive Committee meeting.

An **Assistant Treasurer** shall be elected to assist the Treasurer by request and to serve in the event the Treasurer resigns or is ill or unable to function.

SECTION 5. The **Historian** shall keep the records of the Association up-to-date.

SECTION 6. The **Parliamentarian** shall upon the request of the presiding officer of the body, advise and assist the Association with respect to all matters involving Parliamentary Procedure.

An **Assistant Parliamentarian** shall be elected. The Parliamentarian and Assistant should always communicate with each other to ensure that this office is filled at each Associational Annual or Executive Committee meeting.

SECTION 7. The **Program Leaders** and the **Institutional Agency Representatives** shall perform all duties customary to their titles and shall make a written report to the annual session of the Association.

SECTION 8. **Trustees** have no authority except by direction of the Association and are not personally bound by signatures but are to be the legal signees for the Association. Trustees represent the Association in legal matters. Trustees act on behalf of the Association in acquisition and disposal of Associational property.

They sign all deeds of conveyance, execute all notes, bonds or mortgages, intervene in all suits, by authority of the Association.

All persons dealing with the Trustees, as Associational officers, may rely upon any written resolution duly adopted by the Association or Executive Committee, directing and authorizing the Trustees to act in its behalf and certified by the Association Moderator and Clerk.

ARTICLE VIII. RULES OF ORDER

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to Robert's Parliamentary Practice or in a manner not contrary thereto.

ARTICLE IX. QUORUM

The quorum for the Annual Associational meeting or any special called meeting of the Association shall not be less than 25 percent of the member churches.

ARTICLE X. THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

SECTION 1. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the General Officers and Program Leaders elected by the Association and the Pastor and one member from each church in the Association. No Pastor, by virtue of his being an Associational Officer or Program Leader shall be disqualified as a member of the Executive Committee, from representing the church or churches he may be serving in the Association. Twelve of these members shall constitute a quorum.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to act for the Association on matters arising when the Association is not in session and to make a report of all work to the next session of the Association. This body shall meet at a time and place designated by the Moderator on Monday following the first Sunday of each quarter except for the July quarter which shall meet on the second Monday of the month of July. Special meetings of the Executive Committee may be called by the Moderator with a one week notice to the churches.

SECTION 3. All vacancies occurring on committees or among elected officers shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

SECTION 4. In the event that a vacancy occurs with the Trustees, the Executive Committee should fill such vacancy for the remainder of the term.

ARTICLE XI. ASSOCIATIONAL STANDING COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. The Association shall have such standing committees as may be deemed necessary to promote efficiently the work of the Master in our midst. The terms of office for all committee members shall be for one year except where specifically stated otherwise.

SECTION 2. COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES. It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate at the general meeting all standing committees as set forth under Article XI.

SECTION 3. THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE shall be composed of seven members. To this group the Directors of Sunday School, Discipleship Training, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood and Music Ministry will be added.

It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate the Officers, Program Leaders and Institutional Agency Representatives. These nominees shall be notified in writing not less than one month prior to presenting of their names at annual session.

SECTION 4. THE ORDER OF BUSINESS COMMITTEE, composed of three members, shall plan the annual program of the Association and present it to the Executive Committee at its October meeting.

SECTION 5. THE CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three pastors and two laymen. It shall examine applications of churches seeking admission into the Association in keeping with Article IV and make recommendation to the Association. It shall counsel with churches that are out of harmony of fellowship with the Association. ***It shall be responsible for registering messengers at the Annual Meetings.***

SECTION 6. THE PLACE AND PREACHER COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members. The duties of this committee shall be to recommend the place or places for the following annual meeting and to recommend the preacher and alternate to deliver the annual sermon for the following year.

SECTION 7. THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members. It is appointed by the Moderator at the October Executive Committee meeting. It shall be the duty of this committee to present suitable resolutions at the annual Associational meeting.

SECTION 8. THE MEMORIAL COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members. It shall be the duty of this committee to bring a report to the annual meeting of those listed by the member churches as deceased since the last annual meeting and shall lead a memorial service in their memory.

SECTION 9. THE ***Stewardship** COMMITTEE shall be composed of six members including the Treasurer of the Association. This committee shall: (a) present a Budget to the Association for the following year; (b) devise plans for raising the funds for the Associational Budget; (c) audit the finances and financial records of the Association annually and anytime there is a change of Treasurer or at the direction of the Association or the Executive Committee; (d) report all audits to the Annual Association Meeting.

SECTION 10. THE CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members and shall perform all duties specified in Article XV.

SECTION 11. THE ORDINATION COMMITTEE shall be composed of five designated Pastors and all other Pastors who desire to sit with the committee.

A. The committee serves on an advisory capacity only and serves at the request of the church from which the member is seeking ordination.

B. The committee should examine such candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry and make such recommendations to the church as they feel led.

C. The committee should assist in arranging the proper service of ordination when such assistance is requested.

D. The Executive Committee should be informed regularly of the work of the committee.

E. Each church desiring to ordain a candidate is urged to consult with the committee, and shall give two weeks notice in which the committee is to do its work.

SECTION 12. THE EVANGELISM COMMITTEE. The duties of the committee shall be to direct and propose a perpetual program and spirit of evangelism in the Association. It shall arrange and direct all Associational-wide evangelistic activities.

SECTION 13. THE ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL shall be composed of eight (8) members, nominated by the Associational Committee on Committees and elected by the Association at the annual meeting. The committee shall be: Missions Development Director, Promotion Director, Survey Director, Associational WMU Mission Action Director, Associational Brotherhood Director, Sunday School Outreach Director, Church Training Director, and Associational Deacons President. The Missions Development Director, Promotion Director, and Survey Director shall be elected for a three-year term, with one member named each year. The other five positions shall be filled by the person who is elected to fill those five Associational offices.

The duties of the AMDC are to lead the associational missions development in the five mission performance tasks: (1) call churches to be on missions; (2) train, develop, and encourage church and Associational workers; (3) provide resources and services to churches and leaders; (4) provide opportunities for working together in missions, ministry and growth; (5) establish and maintain appropriate communications and relationships with the community and the denomination.

SECTION 14. THE BUILDING AND GROUNDS COMMITTEE shall be comprised of three members. The committee shall be responsible for and in charge of the upkeep and repairs of the Associational building, grounds, and equipment.

SECTION 15. THE PERSONNEL COMMITTEE

A. The Committee shall be composed of 7 members of which 3 are pastors.

B. They shall recommend policies and procedures for the selection, supervision and termination of Associational staff personnel. Those policies and procedures shall be approved by the Association.

C. Prepare and maintain an organizational manual relation to the Association's staff personnel.

D. Develop and recommend to the association policies and procedures for paid and volunteer staff personnel.

E. Develop policies and procedures regarding continuing education and development for the Director of Missions and other Associational staff.

F. When a staff vacancy occurs, other than the DOM, they shall serve as the search committee. When a DOM vacancy occurs, they shall nominate a search committee and present it to the Executive Committee.

G. The Personnel Committee shall handle grievances as outlined in the grievance policy.

ARTICLE XII. THE ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL

The ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL shall be composed of the Director of Missions, the Moderator, the Vice Moderator, the Program Leaders: Sunday School, Discipleship Director, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood Director, Chairman of Deacons, Missions Development Director, Chairman of Evangelism, Chairman of the Finance Committee, Vacation Bible School Director, Youth Director, Director of the Singles, Director of the Senior Adults, and Music Director. The Director of Missions is to serve as Chairman and a secretary shall be elected from the group.

The purpose of the council is to coordinate the planning of the various programs of the Association, to develop an Associational calendar, and to give mutual support to the various organization and program units in carrying out their assignments.

The council shall meet quarterly.

ARTICLE XIII. THE ASSOCIATIONAL PASTORS' CONFERENCE

The Associational Pastors' Conference provides regular meetings for the Baptist ministers of the Association. The purpose of the conference is for fellowship and mutual support, for doctrinal and professional discussion and for promotion of church, Associational and other denominational programs. The conference is not an administrative or executive body.

ARTICLE XIV. JOB DESCRIPTION, DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS

SECTION 1. Title and Functions.

A. Position Title. This position shall be known as the Director of Missions for the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association.

B. Basic Functions. The Director of Missions shall serve as minister to the churches and church leaders of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association, as mission strategist for the Association, as chief administrative officer for the Association, and as a general leader of the Association.

SECTION 2. Responsibilities.

A. Minister to Churches and Church Leaders.

1. The Director of Missions shall serve as pastor to the pastors of the Association. Upon request, the Director of Missions shall provide counseling and consultation for pastors regarding spiritual, vocational, congregational, personal or family concerns. The Director of Missions shall be available to assist pastors considering a move, shall orient new pastors to the Association, shall develop systems of pastoral support and fellowship, and shall provide growth opportunities for pastors.

2. Upon request, the Director of Missions shall assist and counsel pastors and church leaders regarding ministries, programs and procedures within the churches, including but not limited to building planning, budget procedures, long range or strategy planning, curriculum evaluation or review, issues of church policy and organization, church-community surveys, outreach, and spiritual growth.

3. Upon request, the Director of Missions shall assist and counsel churches regarding the calling of pastors or church staff, conflicts between a pastor and church, or conflicts within a church's fellowship. The Director of Missions shall assist churches without a pastor in their ministries and programs at their request and shall provide advice for persons considering a Christian vocation.

4. The Director of Missions shall be available upon request to preach or teach in and for churches on such occasions as revivals, pulpit supply, study courses, stewardship or missions emphasis, promotion or recognition assemblies and services, special day addresses, Vacation Bible School, and similar events.

5. The Director of Missions shall take the initiative to regularly visit churches for worship and fellowship, taking care to treat all churches as equal partners in the Association.

6. The Director of Missions shall develop opportunities to foster fellowship and mutual commitment between and among the churches.

B. Mission Strategist.

1. The Director of Missions shall encourage churches to develop and maintain a missions perspective and to extend their ministries and outreach beyond the local church field and community through broader involvement and cooperation with other churches in missions activities.

2. The Director of Missions shall interpret to the churches the needs of persons and groups within the Association's area and shall lead the Association to start new churches or ministry activities appropriate to the needs.

3. The Director of Missions shall encourage and lead volunteer involvement in mission activities beyond the Association's boundaries, such as home and foreign missions partnerships and disaster relief.

4. The Director of Missions shall interpret to the Association the mission work of the churches and conventions of the denomination at the state and national levels and shall encourage churches to support such work with their prayers, finances and personal commitment.

C. Chief Administrative Officer.

1. The Director of Missions shall administer all policies and instructions committed to that office by the Association in annual session or by the Executive Committee.

2. The Director of Missions shall work with the Executive Committee to plan, organize, coordinate, communicate and evaluate the total work of the Association.

3. The Director of Missions shall work with and assist Associational officers, committees and program leaders to implement the specific objectives of the Association and to communicate these activities to the churches and encourage their involvement.

4. The Director of Missions shall serve as an ex officio member of all committees and program departments of the Association.

5. The Director of Missions shall publish a regular Associational news medium to promote the work and fellowship of the Association among the churches and shall otherwise communicate with the churches as required.

6. The Director of Missions shall supervise the Associational office staff and any volunteers or other paid employees, full or part time, who are directly involved in ministries or activities sponsored by the Association.

7. The Director of Missions shall act as office and property manager and purchasing agent for the Association in all matters not assigned to the Trustees of the Association.

D. General Leader of the Association.

1. The Director of Missions shall interpret the work of the Association in the churches.

2. The Director of Missions shall maintain relationships with pertinent Baptist conventions and bodies, and especially with those denominational offices charged with Associational development and support, informing those bodies of the needs and potentialities in the Association and interpreting the overall work of the denomination to the churches.

3. The Director of Missions shall relate to other Christian and service organizations, such as local relief and assistance groups, hospital chaplaincy programs, groups that minister to the homebound or terminally ill, ministerial conferences or support groups, and similar organizations, as appropriate.

4. The Director of Missions shall relate to and represent the work of the Association to various business, social, educational, governmental and civic groups.

5. The Director of Missions shall act as chief public relations and information officer for the Association, promoting its work to the general public through the various communications media and responding to inquiries and requests for information as required.

SECTION 3. Terms of Employment.

A. Employment. The Director of Missions is employed by the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association.

B. Call, Termination and Interim.

1. A person shall be called to the office of Director of Missions according to the following procedures:

a. When a vacancy occurs in the office of Director of Missions, the Personnel Committee shall nominate a search committee to be elected by the Executive Committee. Election of the search committee shall take place within 30 days of the occurrence of the vacancy. If a regular meeting of the Executive Committee is not scheduled within 30 days, a special meeting shall be called by the Moderator. Executive Committee members shall be given two weeks' written notice of the names of the nominees to serve on the search committee and the date, time and place of the meeting.

b. Once elected, the search committee shall solicit and screen candidates according to qualifications and procedures which the committee shall determine. The search committee shall recommend and present one candidate for election by the Association.

c. Election of the candidate by the Association shall take place within 30 days of the search committee's decision to recommend. If the annual session of the Association is not scheduled within 30 days, a special session of the Association shall be called by the Moderator. The Association shall be given two weeks' written notice of the name of the candidate and the date, time, and place of the meeting.

d. Election of the candidate shall be by majority vote. If the candidate fails to receive a majority vote, the search committee shall be immediately dissolved and the Personnel Committee shall begin the process over again.

2. The term of service of the Director of Missions shall be indefinite. Employment of the Director of Missions may be terminated according to the following procedures:

a. The Director of Missions may resign by giving written notice 60 days in advance. The resignation may be accepted on behalf of the Association by the Executive Committee in regular or called session. By mutual agreement of the Director of Missions and the Executive Committee, the period of 60 days' notice may be waived.

b. The Director of Missions may be involuntarily terminated by the Association in annual or called session.

(1) No final action to terminate the Director of Missions shall occur unless both the Director of Missions and the Association have endeavored to resolve any existing conflict by lesser means. In addition, no final action to terminate the Director of Missions shall occur without prior investigation by the Personnel Committee according to established grievance procedures. The Personnel Committee shall then make a report of its findings to the Association. The Association shall consider, but shall not be bound by or required to follow, the recommendations of the Personnel Committee. If such an investigation and report has not occurred, any action to terminate the Director of Missions shall be referred to the Personnel Committee for investigation before final action is taken.

(2) Action by the Association to terminate the Director of Missions, whether in annual or called session, shall require 30 days' written notice to the Association following completion of the Personnel Committee's investigation. Action to terminate shall be by majority vote.

(3) If the Association in session votes to terminate, the Director of Missions shall receive full pay and benefits for a period of 60 days following the effective date of the termination.

3. When a vacancy occurs in the office of Director of Missions, the Executive Committee may elect an Interim Director of Missions according to the following procedure:

a. The Personnel Committee shall recommend a candidate, negotiate terms of employment, and present the recommendations to the Executive Committee for approval. Such election may take place at the same time and in the same manner as election of the search committee, or at any other appropriate time.

b. The Personnel Committee shall supervise the work of the Interim Director of Missions. Authority to extend, terminate, or otherwise change the terms of employment of the Interim Director of Missions shall be retained by the Executive Committee.

C. Accountability.

1. The Director of Missions shall be supervised by the Personnel Committee acting on behalf of the Association.

2. The Personnel Committee shall arrange for an annual evaluation of the Director of Missions.

3. The Personnel Committee shall establish a grievance policy to provide an orderly and appropriate process to hear grievances and complaints against the Director of Missions by members or churches of the Association.

D. Pay and Benefits.

1. Salary, retirement, insurance and other financial benefits for the Director of Missions shall be proposed by the Budget and Finance Committee and established by the Association in the annual budget. The Budget and Finance Committee shall solicit recommendations concerning pay and benefits for the Director of Missions from the Personnel Committee, but shall not be bound to accept those recommendations.

2. Travel allowance for the Director of Missions shall be deemed by the Association to be a business expense and not a personal benefit for the Director of Missions.

3. The Director of Missions shall receive two weeks paid vacation annually. The period of two weeks shall incorporate ten working days, including two Sundays. Unused vacation shall not accrue to the following year.

4. The Director of Missions shall receive sick leave at the rate of one day per month, accruing on the first day of the month, not to exceed 120 working days. Additional sick leave may be credited against future months. If the Director of Missions is involuntarily terminated by the Association, any unused sick leave accrued shall be financially reimbursed to the Director of Missions in addition to the 60 days' pay and benefits required by the act of termination.

5. The Director of Missions shall be granted one day off each week in addition to Saturday.

6. The following holidays shall be observed: New Year's Day, Easter Monday, Memorial Day, July 4, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Thursday and Friday, and December 25 and 26 at Christmas.

7. The Association acknowledges the flexibility of schedule required by the Director of Missions. The Director of Missions' time shall be organized in a professional manner, with the work schedule devoted to activities that will benefit the work of the Association, whether in the office or on the field and whether during the normal work day or at night. The Director of Missions shall establish office hours for the office secretary and shall be available, either through personal office hours or some other established procedure, to any in the Association needing assistance.

8. The Director of Missions may attend denominational conventions and meetings, continuing education and professional development events, and other assemblies and conferences pertaining to the work of the office. The Association through its annual budget may reimburse the Director of Missions for expenses incurred while attending such meetings.

9. The Director of Missions may use up to three weeks of paid leave annually to lead or participate in revivals, world missions conferences, and similar meetings outside the Association, which result in an honorarium or other reimbursement above and beyond expenses. The Director of Missions may lead revivals and conferences within the Association as schedule permits, such activities being included in the job responsibility of minister to the churches of the Association.

10. The Director of Missions may serve as interim pastor of a church or churches in the Association. Such activity may not exceed three months in a given calendar year without prior approval of the Personnel Committee. The Director of Missions may engage in pulpit supply and similar activities as schedule permits, such activities being included in the job responsibility of minister to the churches of the Association.

11. The Director of Missions may lead or participate in mission trips, mission partnerships, disaster relief, and other direct mission opportunities outside the Association, such activities being included in the job responsibility of mission strategist for the Association. Such activities may not exceed three weeks in a given calendar year without prior approval of the Personnel Committee.

12. The Director of Missions shall keep a record of leave and time spent off the Associational field, including vacation, sick leave, conventions and conferences, continuing education events, revivals and similar meetings, and mission trips. The record shall be submitted to and maintained by the Treasurer of the Association.

13. The Director of Missions shall be free to use off duty time to engage in personal activities and pursuits. Such activities shall not interfere with the professional responsibilities or activities and meetings that require the presence of the Director of Missions. The Director of Missions shall be aware that all personal activities reflect on the office and the job responsibility of general leader of the Association.

14. No honorarium shall be expected or required for any service performed by the Director of Missions in conjunction with official duties. However, any individual, group or church is free to present an honorarium if they so desire, and such may be retained by the Director of Missions and not submitted to the Association.

SECTION 4. Adoption.

A. This job description supersedes, repeals and takes the place of any conflicting articles or statements in this Constitution or other documents of the Association.

B. The Personnel Committee shall be responsible to maintain, update and revise this job description as required, making recommendations to the Association for approval as they are needed.

ARTICLE XV. AMENDMENTS

The constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the Association by a two-thirds majority of the messengers present and voting, provided the amendment has been presented to the Constitutional Committee at least 10 days prior to the annual meeting and presented to the Association in printed form on the first day of the annual meeting to be voted on the second day.

ARTICLE XVI. NON-PROFIT STATUS

The Tuckaseegee Baptist Association, Inc. is organized exclusively for charitable, religious, and educational purposes, including, for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986.

No part of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association, Inc. shall inure to the benefit of its' members, directors, officers, or other persons except that the organization shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the exempt purposes of the organization.

In the event of dissolution, the residual assets of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association, Inc. will be turned over to one or more organizations with similar purposes which are exempt as organizations described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986.
