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# PROCEEDINGS

OF THE

**Liberty and Ducktown Association, held with the Fairview Church, Eight miles west of Murphy, Cherokee County, N. C.**

## **FIRST DAY--Thursday, Sept. 28, 1899.**

The Liberty and Ducktown Association met with th Church at Fairview, eight miles west of Murphy, N. C., in its forty-eighth annual session. Introductory sermon preached by Elder J. F. McGee, from John 10 and 11, "I am come that they might have life and that they might have it more abundantly." Followed by remarks and prayer by Elder B. M. Ledford. Then took a recess. Re-assembled, body called to order by the Moderator. The Clerk being absent, J. T. L. Hartness was appointed temporary Clerk. A. K. Dickey and W. L. Voyles were appointed Reading Clerks, and proceeded to read letters from the various churches comprising this association. On motion an invitation was then given for the reception of new Churches, Ebenezer came forward, motion to receive prevailed. Then proceeded to election of Moderator and Clerk, resulting in the election of Elder J. F. McGee, Moderator and J. T. L. Hartness, Clerk. An invitation was then given to visiting ministers, members and correspondents; received Elder A. E. Brown, assistant corresponding secretary of the State Convention, Elder J. W. Lawing, correspondent from the Western North Carolina Association, Elder R. A. Sentell, visitor, from the Haywood County Association. Elder S. C. Owen presented himself as editor of the Southern Baptist, and by motion and vote of the body, rejected. Accepted, W. H. Rymer, as visitor from the Estanala Association. The following committees were then appointed:

Adjourned to meet to-morrow morning at 9:30 o'clock. Prayer by Elder M. C. Higdon.

## SECOND DAY--Friday, Sept. 29.

Met according to adjournment. Prayer by Rev. T. Bright. Minutes of yesterday read and adopted. Paper read from the Estanala Association commending Elder M. C. Higdon as a minister of the gospel in high standing, having been Moderator of said Association.

Renewed call for visitors and correspondents. Received Rev. T. Bright as correspondent from the W. N. C. Association, also representative of the Biblical Recorder, Rev. C. M. Ledford, correspondent from the W. N. C. Association, Rev. C. F. Martin, correspondent from the W. N. C. Association. Finished appointment of Committees:

State of Ministry—L. D. McNabb, J. L. Center, J. W. Hembree and G. W. Morgan.

Foreign Missions—E. A. Deweese, R. A. Sentell, T. Bright and J. W. Lawing.

Nominations—E. D. Cole, A. Rice, W. W. Collins and M. P. Sneed.

Religious Literature—G. W. Morgan, J. R. Green, M. C. Higdon and A. K. Dickey.

Report on Temperance read. Motion for adoption discussed by W. D. Hogsed, T. Bright, A. K. Dickey and others. Then adopted. See report. The hour for preaching having arrived, the stand was occupied by Rev. R. A. Sentell, who delivered an instructive sermon. After which recess was taken for refreshments.

Re-assembled at 1 o'clock. By motion Brother's C. M. Campbell and Gay Bryant were given seats as honorary members. Report on Sunday schools read. Motion for adoption, and made special order for 9 o'clock Sunday morning. Read report on education. Discussed by A. K. Dickey and others and adopted. Then adjourned to meet tomorrow morning. Benediction by Rev. T. Bright.

## THIRD DAY--Saturday, Sept. 30.

Met according to agreement, Moderator in chair. Scripture lesson by the Moderator. Prayer by Rev. C. M. Ledford. Minutes of previous day read and adopted. By motion the name of G. F. Burger was entered as delegate from Friendship, also the name of William Johnson from Macedonia.

Report on the State of Churches read. Motion for adoption. Discussed by E. D. Cole and others and adopted. See report.

Report on State of the Ministry read. Motion for adoption. Discussed by J. W. Hembree and others and adopted. See report.

Report on Foreign Missions read. Motion for adoption. The hour for preaching having arrived, it was agreed that Rev. E. A. Deweese discuss this important subject in the sermon, which was ably done in a plain manner. After which collection was taken for Foreign Missions amounting to \$10.42. Then took a recess for half an hour.

Re-assembled, House called to order by the Moderator. Adopted the report on Foreign Missions. See report.

Report on Religious Literature read and adopted.

Report on Home and State Missions read. Motion for adoption. Discussed by Rev. A. E. Brown and others and adopted. See report.

Report on Finance read and adopted, amount \$20.39.

Report on Pastoral Support read. Discussed by L. D. McNabb and others and adopted.

Report of Missionary submitted. See report.

Report on Deceased Members read and adopted. Being incomplete on account of the required information, motion that the Chairman of the committee with the Clerk, complete said report as near as possible.

Report on Nominations read and adopted. See report.

By motion elected Rev. E. D. Cole Missionary for the coming year by acclamation. Motion that the Clerk superintend the printing of the minutes and that he have \$5 for his services.

Resolution by J. W. Lawing commending the Church and people of Fairview for their generosity and hospitality during the sessions of this Association. See resolutions.

Appointed delegates to the State Convention, viz: Revs. E. D. Cole, E. A. Deweese and J. F. McGee. Committee appointed, Resolution on Temperance, to-wit: J. W. Lawing, A. Rice and A. K. Dickey.

Committee consisting of one delegate from each church to look after the welfare of our Missionary, in his support. Then adjourned to meet Sunday morning at 9 o'clock. Prayer by Rev. J. W. Lawing.

#### FOURTH DAY--Sunday, Oct. 1st.

Met according to adjournment. Scripture reading by Moderator. Prayer by J. R. Green.

Report on Sunday schools re-read, discussed by W. L. Voyles and others and adopted. See report.

Resolution in favor of the Orphanage at Thomasville, offered. See resolutions.

Report of Committee on Resolutions on Temperance read and adopted. See resolutions.

By motion and vote of the Association Cyrus Deaver was recommended to the faculty of Mars Hill College, as a worthy young man, who is trying to prepare himself for the ministry. The hour for preaching being up, the stand was occupied by Rev. A. E. Brown, who delivered an eloquent and interesting sermon to a large and attentive congregation. Text, Matthew 25, part of 45th verse, "Inasmuch as ye did it not." Subject omission. After which took up a collection for State Missions, amount \$6.55. Then took a recess for one hour.

Re-assembled. Sermon by Rev. J. W. Lawing, Subject: "The Christ of the New Testament." Then took collection for the Missionary, Rev. E. D. Cole, amount \$9.43. After which adjourned to meet at time and place. Prayer by Rev. R. A. Sentell.

### Education.

Your Committee on Education feel that no subject is of more importance to our people than education. The cause of Christ will suffer in our hands if we do not educate. The public demand it. Denominations are giving attention to it. As Baptists we must educate our children or others will educate some of them, and proselyte many more. Therefore we recommend the building of a strong Baptist school in reach of our people, and in order to effect this we propose to accept the proposition of the Western North Carolina Association, and unite with them in locating and building a school, retaining equal rights for ourselves and granting them the same. The Western North Carolina Association having appointed a committee of twelve to meet at Bellview on Friday before the first Sabbath in November to meet in joint session with like committee of our body, your committee recommend that the following brethren be and are appointed to meet with Western North Carolina Committee as above stated, viz: P. E. Nelson, Rev. B. M. Ledford, L. D. McNabb, Dr. ——— Casteel, Harvey Berong, Rev. J. F. McGee, A. Rice, W. K. Johnson, J. T. L. Hartness, Wm. Collins, Thomas Payne and W. G. Sparks, and in joint session to locate said place and accept whatever proposition they may think best. And while in joint session, that the two committees elect a board of trustees and other officers necessary for the due management of the work. We would further recommend that each church in our bounds, meet as soon as convenient, and determine the amount they are willing to pay to the building of said school and send a statement to the above named meeting.

### State of the Ministry.

The State of the Ministry according to reports has not been very successful for the last year, for which we are sorry. We find no fault in the moral standing of the ministry. We find in part a lack of sufficient education of the ministry. We find in part also that the Ministry is not supported as it should be. It is also the opinion of the committee that the world is more steeped in sin than formerly. Therefore we recommend a greater consecration on the part of the Ministry.

### Foreign Missions.

The churches of the south have 82 missionaries in the foreign field who are under the supervision of the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Convention located at Richmond, Va. Also 128 native helpers, making a total of 210. For the support of these and others the sum of \$136,600 is required. Of this amount North Carolina was asked to raise \$9,000; to July 15, only \$202.14 had been raised. We believe the Baptists of North Carolina will give this amount this year. There has been in the field above named 845 Baptisms this year up to July 15. Number of churches 100, with a membership of 5,347.

C.; the Foreign Mission Journal, published at Richmond, Va., the Home Field, published at Atlanta, Ga., and Charity and Children, published at Thomasville, N. C., in the interest of the North Carolina Baptist Orphanage. We heartily commend all the above papers as good sound publications, loyal to all the interests of the Baptists in the south and in the state.

We also recommend that the churches require their pastors to teach on this line of duty.

### Home and State Missions.

We are co-laborers with God in evangelizing the world. The great command of our Lord to "go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature" applies to missions at home as well as abroad. The order given by our Savior in Acts i, 1-8, is to begin in Jerusalem, then in Judea, then in Samaria and unto the uttermost parts of the earth. No unbiased christian heart can review the work of our Home and State Boards for the past year and not be filled with the profoundest gratitude. Notwithstanding the paralyzing influence of war and devastating effects of yellow fever, our Home Board reports an increase in results over last year. The following is a partial summary of last year's work: We had under employ last year 653 Missionaries, who baptised 6,552 converts. Constituted 194 churches,

built 92 houses of worship besides improving 252 others, organized 512 new Sunday Schools in which were gathered 14,768 pupils. This work has been accomplished at a cost of \$65,818.81. Our work in Cuba, which had been interrupted by the war, has been resumed with almost pentecostal encouragement. There is still a cry for increase of laborers, especially Cuba, this can only be done by an increase of contributions. State Missions. We had on the different Mission fields in our state last year, 103 Missionaries, who baptized 1,466 converts, constituted 29 new churches, built 25 houses of worship and organized 73 Sunday schools. The work was planned this year on a basis of \$20,000. In order to be free from debt when our convention meets in Asheville December the 6th, we must raise \$12,000. It has been the custom in our state to contribute to this work of the Home and Foreign Boards during the first part of the year and then at the close of the year to press the collections for State Missions. This may be unwise, however, the condition confronts us, and it is a small thing for 175,000 Baptists to raise \$20,000 if they put forth only a small effort. Let the churches of this Association show by their contributions that they are interested in giving the Gospel to every inhabitant in our state. The Baptists of North Carolina have made great progress in the last years. They have grown from about 25,000 to 175,000 members. The history of this progress is largely the history of our Mission Board. Let us give the work entrusted to them our sympathies, our prayers and our contributions. B. M. LEDFORD, Chm.

One of the old pioneer preachers of Western North Carolina, in the constitution of the Liberty and Ducktown Association. Also Sister Frances E. Griffin, who lived to a ripe old age, wife of the late John C. Griffin. She was among the best of Christian mothers, whom we all miss.

Pleasant Hill, 2nd, has lost two, Brother William Olvey, died in the faith. Also Sister Susan Grant, wife of Brother Alex. Grant. She received death as the path to heaven.

Mount Pleasant has lost three, Brother G. G. Gladson, died last March in his 86th year, also Sister Hannah Gladson, wife of said G. G. Gladson, died two days before her husband. Also Nancy Hawkins, died in October last. All of whom we trust are gone to rest with Jesus.

Hopewell has lost two, Sister Nancy Newman, departed this life in her 64th year, on December 7, 1898. Brother John Bryant, died in his 83rd year on September 3, 1899. She was often singing, "Oh heaven, sweet heaven, I long for thee; oh when shall I get there," and changing the words to: "If I get there before you do, I'll look for you; wont you come too." She did love to go to church, always wanted to go on Saturday, if she could not go both days. She took great delight in her children and when she was raising them she was always telling them how to do, that they might be respected, and have a home in heaven. Her sweet counsel to her children will never be forgotten by them in life. She was patient through all her sickness, never murmuring, she said she was just waiting the Lord's will to take her and wondered why it was she had to suffer so long, and would say, "If I only knew what it was the Lord wanted me to do before I go, I would do it at once. ### Nominations.


