Snowy Beginning to New Year

Coming to work gave many people the opportunity to get a great workout shoveling out their driveways, and it gave them a great appreciation for all the shoveling the physical plant workers had to do in order to remove the snow from campus steps and sidewalks. When it was all finished, I measured eleven inches in my back yard, and as you can see by the picture above, snow drifts accumulated to over one foot. Snow like this seldom occurs in North Carolina but when it does, I think it brings out the best in people. Families spending the day together, parents playing with their children, friends riding sleds, and men waging war with an endless supply of snowball ammunition.



Greek proof readers wanted. Free book to Volunteer Workers.

If you have had one year or more of Greek, you qualify to carry out a simple proofreading task. In the process you will help prepare a new edition of the Byzantine Greek Text scheduled for publication this summer.

Your reward for this task will be a beautiful hardbound copy of the printed edition of this Greek New Testament, a chance to actually

own and hold a copy of the autographs (or something close to that, since Dr. Robinson will autograph the copy if desired).

We need 100 volunteers, each of whom will commit to proofreading *10* pages of Greek New Testament typeset copy, comparing all accents, breathings, and punctuation against what

appears in another printed Greek text. The actual words of the text do not have to be proofed.

Further, you do not have to know D. A. Carson's 77 Rules of Accentuation nor the 101 Ferengi Rules of Acquisition in order to perform this task. You do need to know the difference between a rough and smooth breathing, and the acute, grave, and circumflex accents, and must be able to recognize your own face when looking in a mirror.





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
IEWISH EVANGELISM CONFERENCE HELD

Romans 1:16 says, "For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ, for it is the power of God to salvation for everyone who believes, for the Jew first and also for the Greek." Often this verse is quoted without thoughtful consideration of the emphasis placed on "Jew." Salvation is to the Jew first and to the Greek second. February 20-22, 2002 Southeastern Seminary hosted a conference stressing the need for the evangelization of the Jewish nation. Dr. Jim Sibley, a former missionary to Israel, conducted the opening conference on Wednesday at 2:00 pm. During his presentation Dr. Sibley quoted an un-cited source who said. "How odd of God to choose the Jews, but odder still for those who choose the Jewish God to reject the Jews." Although Dr. Sibley supports the work of Southern Baptists, he said, "In the New Testament, there are only two kinds of missions-not home missions and foreign missions, but Jewish missions and Gentile missions." Dr. Sibley encouraged missionaries and pastors to establish priority in proclamation to the Jewish nation and priority in prayer for the Jewish nation. Dr. Paige Patterson concluded the conference by speaking on Friday night. 

SEBTS STOPS TO REMEMBER



SOUTHEASTERN STUDENT REMEMBERED AS "VERY WELL-SPOKEN, BRIGHT, AND KIND."

Victoria Fenwick, 35, of Raleigh, N.C., collapsed in the student center on the campus of Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary on March 12, and later died at Raleigh Community Hospital for reasons unknown.

Fenwick, a first year student at Southeastern, had no prior medical condition and was described by her fellow classmates as "very well-spoken, bright, and kind."

When Fenwick collapsed in the student center, several students with medical training quickly responded.

Ted Webster, seminary student and local fireman, was standing near Fenwick when she fell and quickly began administering CPR.

Within seconds, students Kelly Sexton and Carman O'Kelly, both registered nurses, joined Webster in his effort to revive Fenwick.

The trio continued CPR even as Fenwick was being lifted into an ambulance.


O'Kelly, who had never even met Fenwick before, followed the ambulance to Raleigh Community Hospital and was praying in the waiting room when the doctors brought her the news that Fenwick passed away.

"My first thought was 'God, you are Sovereign," O'Kelly said. "Then, my heart broke because I did not know how to contact her family."

Unaware that Fenwick passed away, Webster and Sexton returned to their next class and asked their classmates to pray. But Webster and Sexton said it was difficult to concentrate because Fenwick should have been in class with them. Seeing Fenwick's empty chair made it difficult for the two to focus, knowing that their classmate's life was in jeopardy.

"We kept looking at each other during class," they said. "Eternity is certainly put into perspective. One minute you are thinking about a test and a paper and the next minute you are thinking about the fact that someone may have just died in front of you."

Fenwick was an active member of Elevation Baptist Church in Raleigh.

SOUTHEASTERN'S EMPLOYMENT OFFICE, BUILDING RESUMES AND THE KINGDOM



Each year hundreds of students move to Wake Forest in order to start school at Southeastern. Unfortunately, many of them move without any prospect of employment. They trust God to provide the means for attendance at Southeastern and the finances to finish their degrees while maintaining families and ministries at home and church. Thankfully, Southeastern has a unique ministry to help new and current students find employment. All one needs to do is to visit Skip Midkiff and Barbara Price in the Employment Office, located in the Ledford Center.

"Our main purpose is to help students and families who need jobs and to give them opportunities for employment," said Midkiff. "We are a conduit between students and families who need jobs and the employers who want to hire them." Midkiff also views his job as a ministry because he is sending Christian students into the secular workplace where they are hopefully witness-


ing and "seeding the community."

Even though job placement is directly tied to the economy, Midkiff is optimistic about the turn in employment he has seen in the last few months. December was the worst month for placement, but since then, the rate of employment has steadily increased. The employment office calculates its "hiring velocity" by comparing the number of active resumes with the number of jobs secured. The hiring velocity for March was thirty-five percent, but in the last twelve months, it has been as high as sixty-five percent.

The most common jobs for students are workers for United Parcel Service and night watchmen for security companies. The most interesting placement was an office worker for a company dealing in animal furs and skins. Even though most of the jobs are in the Wake Forest and North Raleigh area, Midkiff said that the only limitation is how far the student is willing to travel for a good job.

In addition to job placement, the Employment Office also provides other services. These services include financial counseling, resume advice, and interviewing skills. Midkiff also visits new businesses in the area informing them of the employment potential of the students at Southeastern.

If you are looking for a new job, a better paying job, or an opportunity to minister to people in the secular workforce, take a few minutes and visit the Employment Office in the Ledford Center. There is no better way to reach out to the lost of this world than by working side-by-side with them and living out your faith for the world to see.




EAMF is one of the newest student groups to organize at Southeastern. In just its first semester, the leaders of EAMF (who will remain nameless due to security issues involving future ministry) have seen the small spark of passion in their hearts grow into a blazing desire to see the people groups of East Asia come to know Jesus Christ. Their mission is to share and heighten the desire God has placed on the hearts of students to serve in and pray for East Asia.

The group meets once a month in order to pray for the people of East Asia, to plan a trip to the region, and to teach mobilization strategies to students. Past meetings have included a presentation from a strategy coordinator of the International Mission Board, meeting with a missionary serving in a leadership position overseas, and a fellowship and information session describing other ministry opportunities.

Even though many of these students are counting down the days until they can pack all of their personal belongings and plant their lives in East Asia, they are not waiting for that day to minister to people. EAMF is seeking ministry opportunities to mentor Asian students who are attending nearby colleges and universities. CHURCH PLANTING INTERNS



Our first requirement for service is a clear calling from the Lord to this type of cross-cultural ministry. Secondly, experience working with internationals and/or Muslims would be very helpful. This will be a challenging assignment but for the right persons it is a very strategic opportunity to be a part of reaching out to the nations that God is bringing to our nation.

Clarkston, GA, is a refugee community where thousands of refugee families have been resettled after suffering through war, famine and persecution in their homeland. We have been called to reach out to the people of this refugee community with over thirty language groups who represent the world sent to Atlanta (Bosnia, Serbia, Kosovo, Albania, Iraq, Iran, Laos Afghanistan, Pakistan, Thailand, Jordan, Egypt, Somalia, Sudan, Congo, Uganda, Ethiopia, Togo, and more).

This is probably the most culturally diverse community in the United States. In addition there are two Islamic mosques in Clarkston. The ministry will be multicultural; with Muslim evangelism as the center of God's work among these precious people.

The ministry will focus primarily on apartment communities within a two square mile radius in Clarkson and will be Multi-housing cell-church in concept. We will build relationships through humanitarian help as well as programs such as ESL, Learning Labs for Children, sports programs and other activities to meet needs. We will share the Gospel through Vacation Bible School, in home bible studies with specific ministries focused toward men and women. As God leads, and we disciple parents and children, we will begin home fellowships and teach others to share their faith with family and friends.

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



Every year, scores of students from Southeastern respond to the call of God to spread the Gospel to the far reaches of the globe. The mission for which they volunteer is not for the faint of heart nor the timid in Spirit. In fact, the students who volunteer are often sent to some of the most difficult-to-reach people groups in the world.

They leave behind many of their earthly possessions and start new lives in places that are often hostile to the Gospel. For these reasons, the 2+2 students from Southeastern Seminary are among the bravest and most dedicated missionaries to travel the world.

Southeastern has the oldest and largest 2+2 International Church Planting program among all Southern Baptist seminaries. The program was first approved by the Board of Trustees in 1994, and the first deployment of students took place in August 1995. Currently, Southeastern has 101 missionary units either on the field or in the classroom preparing for deployment in the next two years. Each unit consists of either a family or a single student. On Saturday, May 11, 2002, the next group of students awaiting deployment were commissioned in a special service. The 2002 deployment of twenty-three units is focusing on Central Asia where there is a strong Muslim influence.

The 2+2 program is a unique opportunity for students to complete essential classroom studies and gain vital hands-on experience in less time than it would normally take someone pursuing a traditional M.Div. The program begins with two years, or sixty-seven hours, of class work on the Wake Forest campus. Then the students are deployed to the field site to begin actual church planting work. During the two years on the field, professors from Southeastern travel to the region where the students are serving to conduct modular seminars, guided readings, and supervised practica in order to complete the final twenty-nine hours of the degree program. The student successfully completing the Master of Divinity with International Church Planting degree is an equipped and experienced church planter that may apply for career status.

The two main aspects of the program that make it desirable for those who feel called by God to missions are the structure for mentored learning and the opportunity to be on the field a year earlier. This structure allows the students to learn "on the job," and at the end of the program, students have completed the two year field experience requirement for career appointment by the International Mission Board. 
On Wednesday, May 15, Dr. Patterson presented the picture of the prettiest student body president to Perdue so that he could have it framed and hang it on his wall.



SOUTHEASTERN WELCOMES NEW CLASS



On August 20, Southeastern began her 52nd year of classes, welcoming one of the largest classes to ever attend the campus in Wake Forest. With new students abounding, fresh excitement and enthusiasm permeates every corner of the campus. The evidence of this was seen as lines of students streamed onto the steps of Binkley to get inside the doors for the first days of chapel last week.

The size of the new class is not only evident in chapel services, but it is also evident in the Office of the Registrar. Sheldon Alexander, Registrar, said, "We expect to have right at two thousand students enrolled in classes

STUDENTS RETURN TO A NEW LANDSCAPE AT SOUTHEASTERN

Upon returning to classes this Fall, many Southeastern students were surprised to see familiar buildings missing from the landscape of the campus. Over the summer, the Ruby Reid childcare building and the old cafeteria were razed to make way for one of the most exciting building projects in Southeastern history. The empty lot, which stretches from the corner of North Wingate Street and West Avenue to the President's residence at Magnolia Hill, will become the home to Southeastern's new Campus Center.

According to Ryan Hutchinson, Vice President for Administration, the \$5.5-6.0 million project will be the largest building project under the Patterson administration. The Campus Center will be a 50,000




square-foot facility housing classrooms, offices, the bookstore, gathering areas, computer labs, the copy center, the mailroom, food services, and a coffee shop. The funds from this project will come as a part of the ten-year, \$50 million capital campaign recently started by the administration. During the first twelve to fourteen months of the campaign, Southeastern hopes to raise \$16.5 million, more than enough to cover the expense of the Campus Center. With a groundbreaking ceremony scheduled for early spring 2003, the predicted opening of the Center will be mid-2004. After the construction of the Campus Center, the Ledford Center will continue to function as a health and fitness center.

In addition to the Campus Center, a new library is scheduled for construction behind the Ledford Center on the site of the Rankin Court duplexes. The new 75,000 square-foot, \$14-16 million library is scheduled for completion in the next four to five years. At that time, North Wingate Street will be closed, creating a walking mall from Stealey Hall to the Library, between the Campus Center and the Ledford Center.

Dr. Paige Patterson, President, said, "The Campus Center will serve as a central location to discuss the great areas of theology such as determining the fallacies of both Calvinism and Arminianism, the correctness of the President's views on the pre-tribulation rapture, solving the great debate of Matthean or Markan priority, and confirming the Lukan authorship of Hebrews. These topics and many more will fill the building from the bookstore, to the classrooms, to the student service offices and the coffee shop of which will all be located in this great facility."





Everyone was transfixed by the surreal video from New York City and Washington, D.C., as live feeds displayed the horror that no one ever believed could touch the United States. Symbols of American freedom and protection, the World Trade Center and the Pentagon, were engulfed in flames.

As students filed into the student center.

September 11, 2001, will forever remain a day to remember for Southeastern students. As students filed into chapel a little before ten o'clock that morning, rumors were flying that the

country had been attacked. The whispers then turned to sobs as Dr. Patterson reported to the student body that the World Trade Center had been hit by two passenger airliners. After chapel, many students followed their normal routine to go to the Ledford Center to grab a bite to eat before class. As they entered the building, many were astounded by the first pictures they had seen from New York City. One's imagination was not enough to recreate the disaster — only the real video footage could accurately depict such a catastrophe.

One year later, American flags still fly in front of homes and offices. Bumper stickers and window decals proclaim the pride citizens feel for this great nation. However, all is not patriotic. In the last year, a lawsuit has been filed on behalf of a child claiming that the Pledge of Allegiance is unconstitutional, discriminating against those who claim not to believe in God. Two federal judges in California supported the idea that the pledge was discriminatory, and the case is still pending in higher courts.

September 11, 2002, brought a new sense of patriotism as numerous memorial services were held throughout the nation. Along with churches, schools, and businesses across the country, the bells of Binkley Chapel rang at 10:29 am to remember the falling of the second tower of the World Trade Center. The chapel service was marked by prayer and an admonition by Dr. John Avant that we seek God with clean hands and pure hearts in order to reach those in low and lonely places.

While the nation questions what patriotism really means, the mission of Christians remains the same. It does not matter who is in government or what is deemed as patriotic; instead, our allegiance is to God first. On this anniversary of September 11, one should remember America but only after acknowledging allegiance to God.






Holding to that tradition, the administration of Southeastern desires to offer a strong evangelistic emphasis during the annual revival services.

Theological Thoughts Openness to new spiritual insights from God: Reflection on John 3:1-8

"Now there was a man of the Pharisees named Nicodemus, a member of the Jewish ruling council. He came to Jesus at night and said, 'Rabbi, we know



you are a teacher who has come from God. For no one could perform the miraculous signs you are doing if God were not with him.'

"In reply Jesus declared, 'I tell you the truth, no one can see the kingdom of God unless he is born again.

" 'How can a man be born again when he is old?' Nicodemus asked. 'Surely he cannot enter a second time into his mother's womb to be born!'

"Jesus answered, 'I tell you the

truth, no one can enter the kingdom of God unless he is born of water and the Spirit. Flesh gives birth to flesh, but the Spirit gives birth to spirit. You should not be surprised at my saying, "You must be born again." The wind blows wherever it pleases. You hear its sound, but you cannot tell where it comes from or where it is going. So it is with everyone born of the Spirit' " (John 3:1-8).

The notion of a new beginning and a decisive inner transformation of a person's life is also found in certain Old Testament prophetic passages (e.g., Jer. 31:33-34; Ezek. 11:19-20; 36:25-27). This concept of a new spiritual birth is similar to that of a "new creation" (cf. 2 Cor. 5:17; Gal. 6:15). The term anothen, translated "again" in the NIV, can mean either "from above or "from the beginning." This potential ambiguity opens up the possibility of misunderstanding.

The fact that "born of water

and the Spirit" further develops "born again" in 3:3 suggests that one birth is in view rather than two. The closest Old Testament parallel is Ezekiel 36:25-27 which ship—but ultimately the entire predicts God's cleansing of human hearts with water and their inner transformation by his Spirit. The terminology may also be

reminiscent of first-century proselyte baptism, where the Gentile convert to Judaism was compared to a newborn child.

You must be born again (3:7). "You" in the plural, which shows that this requirement does not extend solely to Nicodemus but to the entire group he represents (cf.

"anyone" in 3:3, 5; "we" in 3:2, 11). This includes the Pharisees and the Sanhedrin-and thus the entire Jewish religious leadernation.

We must consciously cultivate an openness to new spiritual insights from God, even if this involves a radical change of life. Nicodemus, the revered "teacher of Israel," was confronted with his need to be "born from above." Would he be open to acknowledge his spiritual need and humble himself before God? Would he be receptive to that new revelation? The older we get, the harder it may be to retain such openness, but without it we will either suffer spiritual death altogether (if we are unbelievers) or cease to grow as a Christian.

One needs only to step into the North American prayer room adjoining the balcony of Binkley to be reminded of the Seminary's commitment to church planting in North America. On one wall hangs a map of the United States and Canada. On another wall is a map of New Hampshire, one of the states with which the seminary has a partnership. On the tables lay cards and notebooks full of prayer requests from throughout the continent.

With so many areas of North America struggling from the lack of a consistent evangelical witness, Southeastern graduates are in demand to plant churches.

Phil Mercer, a trustee for the Seminary, recently sponsored a dinner and information session for anyone interested in planting churches in Maryland and Delaware. Assisting Mercer in this effort were David Jackson, Church Planting Consultant/Specialist for the Baptist Convention of Maryland/Delaware, Bill Crowe, Director of Missions for the Mid-Maryland Baptist Association, and Brian Sunderly, Pastor of Heartland Church in Ellicott City, Maryland.

With 27 church plants in the last year, Southern Baptists are well on their way to establishing a solid presence in the Maryland and Delaware region. However, according to Crowe, Southern Baptists account for less than 2% of the total population in a region with 3-4 million unchurched people.

Sunderly, a graduate of Southeastern, said, "I had never heard of church planting." However, in 1997, he moved to Maryland in order to plant a church that is now thriving.

The need for someone to reach out to the unchurched population of Maryland and Delaware is great. Sunderly said, "Eighty to eightyfive percent of my church members come from an unchurched background."

According to Dr. Bill Brown, director of Southeastern's Nehemiah Project, approximately 66 students are preparing to be

Theological Thoughts The foolishness of God: An insight into 1 Corinthians 1:18

"For the word of the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God" (1 Cor. 1:18).

It may be observed that when Paul spoke of the logos of the cross, he was speaking not only of a divine wisdom but also of a divine communication. The cross was at once both God's wisdom for the salvation of the race and the communication of such diverse attributes as His just holiness in reaction to sin and His love for the sinner. It is worth noting with R. St. John Parry that only Paul used the word "cross" to summarize the whole aspect of suffering in the life and work of Christ. As Parry writes, "It describes the death of Christ in its most profound humiliation and its most direct contradiction of

men's ordinary thoughts." Therefore, when Paul wrote of the word of the cross, he intended the reader to understand the full doctrine of the atoning death of Jesus.

However, this word of the cross is to those who are perishing foolishness. Two issues must be addressed here. First, "those who are perishing" is a present participle indicating continual action. In other words, the act of perishing has already begun and will continue unbroken unless there is repentance toward God and faith in Jesus Christ. The second thing to note is the word "perishing" itself. It is the Greek verb apollumi, which derives in turn from the verb luo, "to loose," and the preposition apo, which means "from" or "away from." Careful study of the word reveals no concept of annihilation. The fact that the process is already pictured as having begun should be ample indication that annihilation is not the idea of this word. Rather, the best insight to its meaning is simply to understand the most basic meanings already

literally "to loose from something." Those who are lost are being continually loosed from any relationship to God—even from temporal and physical blessings. Only as men are properly related to God does life have meaning and significance. Otherwise, it soon degenerates to

mere existence—frustrating and meaningless existence at that. The process of perishing has already begun and will continue infinitely into the future, ultimately culminating in eternal punishment.

To those who are perishing, the word of the cross is foolishness. The word "foolishness" ($m\bar{o}ria$) gives us our word "moron." It is a strong Greek term which, strictly speaking, means "absurdity." In other words, those who are in the process of perishing are so far removed from godly wisdom that the *logos* of the cross seems to be an absurdity. It is the antithesis of everything men are taught to believe. In this world men rise to position and prominence either by strength or cunning or both. That anything significant should be accomplished through the ignominious death of a carpenter of Nazareth was sheer absurdity to the Greek mind.

However, for those who "are being saved" (another present participle) the word of the cross is the dynamic of God. "Being saved" is a present passive participle, indicating once again the inability of those who are being saved to accomplish that end in their own strength. It is God who is acting to save them through His own power (dunamis).

deployed or are already in their two-year deployment through the Nehemiah Project.

Students who choose to plant churches through the Nehemiah Project are required to take two academic classes and one field experience as a part of their M.Div. curriculum in addition to passing the interview and approval process with the North American Mission Board. In return, for two years students receive funds from NAMB in addition to the funds provided by the state convention, local associations, and sponsoring churches. NAMB also provides a benefit package for Nehemiah Project church planters. The two-year field experience can be fulfilled through the 2+2 program or after graduating with an M.Div.

Brown said, "I encourage students to go on one of the North American trips we offer and get among the unchurched to see the need."

The Nehemiah Project is a program focused on training students to plant churches throughout the United States and Canada. The Nehemiah Project began in the fall of 1998 and boasts 41 church planters on the field as of this year.



Theological Thoughts The personal quality of God: Two faiths compared

God loves you! This is the brash claim of Christianity. The key, in fact, to winning people to a saving faith in Jesus Christ as Savior is based upon this claim.





Yet in the Our'an, no such statement is to be found. Whereas the Bible teaches that God hates sin and is angry with sinners (e.g., Prov. 6:16-19; Jer. 4:4; Rom. 1:18; James 4:4), Islamic scripture affirms that Allah hates sinners: "For Allah loves not transgressors" (surah 2:190).

The greatest difference between the two faiths is the personal quality of God.

Allah sent prophets and messengers to proclaim the truth. In Christianity, God the Father sent His Son to be the truth, to die for sin, and to reconcile men and women to Him. In Islam, it is hoped that salvation is earned through one's good works (surah 3:31). One must love Allah in order for Allah to love that person in return. In Christianity, God loved people first in order to secure their salvation.

There is no security for the believer of Islam. One is left wanting and waiting for the will of Allah to be accomplished. Good works can only give one hope for heaven, but never the guarantee of such. Since God is removed from the equation, the question of whether one is admitted to heaven is left unanswered until the Day of Judgment. For the Christian, judgment came on the cross, an event rejected by Muhammad and Islam.

The ultimate question in any religion addresses an eternal life

after death: "What must I do to go outcome. to heaven?" In Islam, the answer to this question remains as mysterious and complex as the founder of its religion, Muhammad. As seen here, the Qur'an hints that the believer in Allah can be confident of his or her eternal destiny, but there is no guarantee, even for the most righteous. So Muslims

strive mightily to get to paradise, but they continually fear that Allah will judge their arrogance and send them to hell. Islamic tradition argues that the guarantee of heaven is as impossible to find as a chaste virgin and pure speech. Consequently, the devout Muslim makes every effort to please Allah and thereby obtain heaven. But fate (kismet) in the hands of the all-powerful Allah will decide the

Salvation in Islam is ultimately based upon the creed, "Ilaha illa Allah. Muhammad rasul Allah," which is translated, "There is no god but Allah. Muhammad is the messenger of Allah."

This, then, is the only necessary step in becoming a Muslim. Personal, heart-felt conversions are replaced with an intellectual assent of the facts. But one needs also adhere to the six major doctrines of Islam: monotheism, angels, revelation, prophets, judgment, and heaven and hell.

Ergun and Emir Caner were raised by their father to be devout Muslims. By 1982, they had both become Christians and were disowned by their father. Now they both serve the Lord as professors spreading the Good News of Jesus Christ and unveiling the mystery of Islam.

Southern Baptist chaplains serving on full-time active duty help bridge the gap by providing ministry in places where pastors cannot go and where no Southern Baptist churches exist; therefore, chaplains become extensions of the church.

The ministry of a military chaplain is similar to that of the pastor. In addition to being a preacher, teacher, counselor, and administrator, the chaplain serves on the commander's staff as chief advisor on religion, morals, morale, and ethical

issues within the command. According to Rich Lee, Chaplain Fellowship president, the SEBTS Chaplain Fellowship was established to glorify God through chaplain ministry in the United States Armed Forces through personal witness, spiritual and physical accountability, and mobilization of other SEBTS students whom God is calling into the military ministry. 

In Romans 1:16, Paul wrote, "For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ, for it is the power of people. This is a group for every-God to salvation for everyone who believes, for the Jew first and also for the Greek."

Southeastern's newest student organization, the Messianic Student Fellowship, is prepared to spread the gospel to both the Jew and the Greek.

In their first official event as a student organization the Messianic Student Fellowship held a Sabbath worship service on a Friday evening in November. The service consisted of traditional Jewish prayers and practices as well as

sianic Jewish students.

"This is not a group for Jewish one, a group for believers," said Gary Goldstein, president of the student group. His goal was to reach out to Jewish and Gentile students alike.

The focus of the Sabbath worship service was to enlighten the campus to the presence of Messianic students at Southeastern, to urge everyone to take part in Jewish evangelism, and to help people understand the Jewish roots of the Christian faith.

Speaking of the need to share the gospel with the Jewish people, testimonies of salvation from Mes- Seth Postell, a Messianic student

who spent nine years in Israel, said, "Taking the gospel back to its source means a greater love for all people." As a result, a passion for the Jews leads to a passion for all people to hear the gospel.

David Hecht, who grew up in a Reformed Jewish family told of his salvation experience after struggling with the fact that there is no longer a lamb sacrifice as prescribed in Leviticus.

Throughout the evening, those who spoke during the Sabbath service reminded everyone of Paul's words concerning the Jews in Romans 9-11. Postell noted that those three chapters show the awesome love of God because the people of Israel still exist, thus vindicating the character of God.

Several Southeastern Seminary professors attended this year's annual meeting of the Evangelical Theological Society in Toronto during the week of November 18. On the agenda for this

year's meeting, was a vote concerning the membership of open theists in the Society. The question was whether or not open theism denies the inerrancy of Scripture, the foundational

doctrine of the Society.


Dr. John Hammett, Associate Professor of Systematic Theology, reported that a vote was taken concerning a resolution to dismiss Clark Pinnock and John Sand-

ers, leading proponents of open theism. The resolution passed by a slim margin, approximately 56 to 44% concerning Pinnock and 53 to 47% concerning Sanders.


Patristics club

Theological Thoughts What makes a preacher an expositor?

Many pastors consider themselves to be expository preachers, and numerous churchgoers desire to hear expository preaching. Both preachers and laypersons, however, may have vague ideas of what constitutes expository preaching. I would suggest that a preacher must make at least two major commitments to be an expositor.

First, an expository preacher will have a commitment to the expository sermon. In an exposi-



tory sermon, the subject and structure of the preacher's message reflects the subject and structure of a passage of Scripture. Exposition means putting something out in public view, uncovering it, opening it up, and placing it on display. The word "expose," comes from the compound Latin verb *exponere*. The root word *ponere* means "to put." The prefix *ex* means "out." An expository sermon is one that puts out the meaning of a passage, opening up a portion of Scripture to the listener and allowing him to see its substance.

Nehemiah 8:8 provides an example of expository preaching, as Ezra and those who assisted him proclaimed the Word of God to the children of Israel: "So they read distinctly from the book, in the Law of God; and they gave the sense, and helped them to understand the reading." Three elements of expository preaching are evident in this verse. First, "they read distinctly from the book." The Hebrew term translated "distinctly" carries the notion of making something clear. Second, "they gave the sense." To give the sense is to explain insights and principles from the text. Third, they "helped them to understand the reading." They helped the listener to realize the meaning and application of the passage.

Luke 24:27 offers another de-

scription of biblical exposition: "And beginning at Moses and all the Prophets, He [Jesus] expounded to them in all the Scriptures the things concerning Himself." The Greek word translated "expounded" means to unfold the message of something, or to explain it. On the road to Emmaus, Jesus opened up the meaning of

Old Testament passages concerning the Messiah. An expository preacher opens up the Bible, unfolds its meaning, gives its sense, and makes application of it, just as Ezra did to Israel and just as Jesus did on the Emmaus road.

Second, an expository preacher will have a commitment to the expository series. The expository series is a plan by which the preacher systematically preaches through a Bible book or a section of a Bible book.

In his farewell address to the Ephesian elders, Paul said, "I testify to you this day that I am innocent of the blood of all men. For I have not shunned to declare to you the whole counsel of God" (Acts 20:26-27). Preaching expository series through books is among the greatest approaches a pastor can use to teach his congregation the whole counsel of the Word of God. In the expository series, the biblical text itself determines which subjects will be addressed in the pulpit and how each subject will be treated.

If you intend to be a biblical expositor, two things should be present in your preaching plan: (1) you will plan to preach expository sermons, and (2) you will plan to preach expository series.

Goldstein also commented on Romans 9-11, stating that 11:11 was the Gentile commission to the Jews.

In light of the recent conflicts and tension in the Middle East, Postell clearly stated where they stood in relation to the current events. He said, "To be pro-Israel and pro-Jewish is not to be anti-Arab." In contrast, being pro-Israel and pro-Jewish should lead one to share the gospel with Arabs as well as Jews. Even though the Messianic Student Fellowship is still in its formative stages, they already have great plans for next semester. They are planning a Passover celebration, monthly services, and having a Holocaust survivor come to speak.

Goldstein said, "We're trying to worship God the same way Yeshua [Jesus] did 2000 years ago. We're praying the same prayers He prayed and singing the same songs He sang. We want to be a reminder to all believers of the original roots of the faith by embracing our Jewish heritage." ETS

The resolution originally included Gregory Boyd for consideration; however, he was removed because he did not pay his dues to ETS and is no longer considered an active member.

The resolution will now be taken to the executive committee, which includes Southeastern's Dr. Andreas Köstenberger, for a vote. If two-thirds of the executive committee recommends to dismiss Pinnock and/or Sanders, the resolution will return to the full body of members for a vote at the 2003 meeting in Atlanta. At that point, it will require a two-thirds majority to dismiss Pinnock and/ or Sanders.

One hour was allotted for discussion concerning the resolution with a two-minute limit per person.

Many of those in opposition to the resolution said that such action would inhibit the free discussion of ideas within the ETS in the future.

In contrast, Hammett said, "This action will not affect the discussion of ideas. Open theism is outside the bounds of our beliefs, and it is important to make a decision about it."

The June 2002 issue of the Journal of the Evangelical Theological Society is devoted to open theism and includes articles from Pinnock and Sanders as well as articles from noted theologians Bruce Ware and Stanley Grenz.

Dr. Gary Galeotti, Senior Professor of Old Testament said, "The matter of great concern was the closeness of the vote on the openness issue. In our own rank and file, there is a definite shift to the left. This matter is to be understood in regard to inerrancy. Either God's Word is trustworthy, or it is not."
