Proceedings of the

UPPER COUNTRY LINE ASSOCIATION

Saturday Morning, August 19th, at 10 o'clock.

1st. The introductory sermon was preached by Elder J. W. Gilliam from The General Epistle of Jude, 3rd verse, and was followed by Elder J. A. Shaw, of Kehukee Association, who preached from Philippians, 2d Chapter, 9th and 10th verses.

CIRCULAR LETTER

Very Dear Brethren: As it has been the custom of our Association to appoint some-one to write a circular letter to be read, the Moderator at our last Session appointed me to this task, and I will try to discharge same, but I feel very sensibly my weakness, and I trust you will throw the mantle of charity over my imperfections.

I will try to write from a passage of Scripture which seems to be upon my mind, and may be found by reference to John 13:17. "If ye know these things, happy are ye if ye do them." The ye that is found in this scripture three times goes to show conclusively that it is addressed to a special people. Like all scriptures, it is written for the comfort and benefit of God's dear people, and for their guidance while here in this world. We enjoy the saving efficacy that is produced by obedience while we stay in this world of sorrow and tribulation if we follow the admonition given, and that which was written afore time was written for our learning that we through patience andd comfort of the scriptures might have hope as one of the writers has put it. The apostle was, no doubt, calling special attention to the ordinance of foot-washing, which shows the great love and humility that always characterized his travel while in this world. We see that great spirit of love in all that he did. There are many things that come in connection with this subject. I believe it is right for the saints to wash one another's feet, but my mind seems to lead to speak of other things. The subject presents itself with special reference

to our walk in life. I have thought a great deal on this subject, since I have had a desire to walk in a way that I would have the answer of a good conscience towards God. James says, if we be a doer of the work we shall be blessed. that takes us off the stool of do-nothing. We are taught that we should abstain from meats fit for idols. I understand that means we are to let things alone that the Lord says let alone, or leave off, or in other words we should not go into things that are condemned in the scriptures, but obey the commands given—the things we shall be happy in doing. The Bible is a thorough furnisher to every good work. We are to leave off the things that we do not have a thus saith the Lord for. We should not try to introduce new things, but rather be content with the old paths. Stand ye in the ways, and see, and ask for the old paths, where is the good way, and walk therein, and ye shall find rest for your souls. The old paths are good enough for all the house-hold of faith, and ye will be happy if ye do these things. Duty is important, and I don't like to hear it lightly spoken of, because we find it taught in God's blessed book. In doing our duty, we should admonish those who go astray, but remember that we are poor dependant creatures. Leaving off all malice, envy, and hatred, because this not well pleasing in the sight of Our Saviour. Luke saith, "Whosoever cometh to me and hearth my saying and doeth them, I will show you to whom he is like; he is like a man which built an house, and digged, and laid the foundation on a rock," etc. This doesn't mean to dive into things you know nothing about, but follow the plain paths of duty, such things as you feel our Savior has required at your hands, and ye will be happy. Obedience from a heart of love. Greater love hatn no man than that a man lay down his life for his friends, and it becomes us to lay down our lives for our brethren. If God impresses one to go and preach, he will be happy if he goes in discharge of his duty. When he impresses his little cnes to go to the church, they will be happy when they go. If it is to administer to the poor, or visit the sick, they will be happy in obedience. We are commanded to visit the fatherless and the widows in their afflictions, and to keep curselves unspotted from the world. So it would seem that God has assigned us enough to keep us busy.

Brethren, please look over my imperfections and pray for

me, and may the God of all grace keep you by his mighty power through faith unto salvation ready to be revealed in the last time.
