ACCREDITATION

Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary is fully accredited by the American Association of Theological Schools.

REGISTRATION

FIRST TERM—Monday, June 11, 1962. Classes will meet four days each week, Tuesday through Friday, beginning Tuesday, June 12. Two courses may be taken. Four semester hours credit may be earned in four weeks. Matriculation and schedule changing closes June 13, 4:30 p.m.

SECOND TERM—Monday, July 9, 1962. Classes will meet four days each week, Tuesday through Friday, beginning Tuesday, July 10. Two courses may be taken. Four semester hours credit may be earned in four weeks. Matriculation and schedule changing closes July 11, 4:30 p.m.

COSTS

Fees \$20.00 per term. Room \$15.00 per term. Meals, approximately \$2.20 per day, may be secured in the cafeteria. The cost of books and supplies varies, depending upon the courses taken.

FACILITIES

A completely renovated campus. A new air-conditioned library. Modern dormitory facilities recently equipped with new furniture. Rooms available for single men and single women. Married couples should write the Business Office concerning housing accommodations for the summer session.

RECREATION

Golf, Tennis, Swimming, Gymnasium. The town of Wake Forest operates a modern swimming pool. A private nine-hole golf course within walking distance of the campus will be available for a modest fee. The Seminary gymnasium will be open. Excellent tennis courts are also available.

CURRICULUM

FIRST TERM, JUNE 11-JULY 6:

A course in elementary Greek, designed for beginners in the Greek New Testament, will meet three hours each day throughout the two terms and will enable the student to earn six semester hours in Greek. The student who does not take the course in Greek may enroll in two courses and earn four semester hours each term.

In order to maintain a reasonable student-teacher ratio, the Seminary reserves the right to control the size of elective classes offered in the summer session.

IB 231s *The Teachings of Jesus* Mr. McDowell A study of the teachings of Jesus in the Synoptic Gospels. The meaning of the Kingdom of God. Appraisal of Source and Form Criticism. The English text is used.

A study of the early development of some of the central Christian doctrines.

LT 223s Christian Ethics and Alcohol Education Mr. Bland A study of the nature, causes, extent and proposed ameliorations of problems related to the use of alcohol in the perspective of Christian principles and scientific studies with attention to the responsibilities of pastors and churches in contemporary American society. 2 semester hours 7:30-9:30, Tuesday through Friday

LT 115s Introduction to Christian Thought Mr. Newman* 2 semester hours 7:30-9:30, Tuesday through Friday

IB 151s Elementary Greek Mr. Briggs The elements of Koine Greek. For beginners in the Greek New Testament.

3 semester hours 7:30-9:30, 10:30-11:30, Tuesday through Friday

LT 205s *The Christian Doctrine of Revelation* Mr. Eddins A biblical and historical study of the Christian concept of revelation. Careful consideration will be given to the definition of revelation, its media, authority, uniqueness and communication. The study will be concluded by relating the Christian claim to other contemporary claims to truth.

SECOND TERM, JULY 9-AUGUST 3:

IB 311s The Book of Isaiah

Mr. Green

An intensive study of chapters 1-39 of the book of Isaiah. 2 semester hours 7:30-9:30, Tuesday through Friday

- CW 162s *The Rural Church* A study of the role of the church in the community with attention to an adequate program for the church in the small community. 2 semester hours 7:30-9:30, Tuesday through Friday
- IC 305s The Reformation Mr. Duncan A historical and critical study of selected aspects of the Protestant Reformation. 7:20.0:20 Treader through Erider
- 2 semester hours 7:30-9:30, Tuesday through Friday IB 152s Elementary Greek Mr. Briggs

A continuation of IB 151s. Careful reading of I John. Prerequisite: IB 151s.

3 semester hours 7:30-9:30, 10:30-11:30, Tuesday through Friday IB 243s The Exposition of Great Texts in the New Testament

Mr. Strickland Several of the great passages will be examined lexically, syntatically, historically, and contextually.

2 semester hours 10:30-12:30, Tuesday through Friday LT 208s Religious Thought in 19th Century American Literature

This course is designed to acquaint the student with the religious thought of the principal American writers of the Nineteenth Century. An evaluation of each author's thought will be made by a study of the original sources.

2 semester hours 10:30-12:30, Tuesday through Friday IB 233s *The Jewish Background of Christianity* Mr. Oliver A study of Jewish history, thought and literature from the rise of Judaism to the Barcochba Revolt, with special emphasis upon the origin of Christianity.

B.S.U. LEADERSHIP TRAINING SCHOOL

In co-operation with the Department of Student Work of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, a program of study is provided for B.S.U. presidents and other qualified students June 11-July 6, 1962. This program offers an opportunity for students to gain a deeper knowledge of the Christian faith and its relevance to the educational enterprise in which they are engaged.

Participants in this program will register through the Seminary's regular registration procedure as Special Students and not as candidates for a degree.

*Participants in this program will enroll for LT 115s, Introduction to Christian Thought. Enrollment in LT 115s is limited to this group.

In addition to enrolling in LT 115s, the students may enroll in LT 205s, The Christian Doctrine of Revelation, or CW 143s, Understanding the Nursery Child, or IC 105s-IC 106s, Christian Classics.

Each Monday definite study in the field of student leadership will be provided.

APPLICATIONS

A student entering Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary for the first time must file application for admission at least *fifteen days* prior to the opening of the term.
