

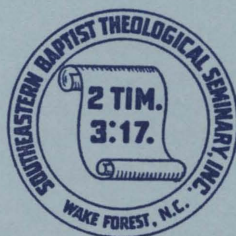

### ACCREDITATION

Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary is fully accredited by the American Association of Theological Schools.

### REGISTRATION

**FIRST TERM**—Monday, June 12, 1967. Classes will meet four days each week, Tuesday through Friday, beginning Tuesday, June 13. Two courses may be taken. Four semester hours credit may be earned in four weeks. Matriculation and schedule changing closes June 14, 4:00 p.m.

**SECOND TERM**—Monday, July 10, 1967. Classes will meet four days each week, Tuesday through Friday, beginning Tuesday, July 11. Two courses may be taken. Four semester hours credit may be earned in four weeks. Matriculation and schedule changing closes July 12, 4:00 p.m.

### COSTS

Fees \$20.00 per term. Rooms \$17.50 per term. Meals, approximately \$2.20 per day, may be secured in the cafeteria. The cost of books and supplies varies, depending upon the courses taken.

### FACILITIES

A completely renovated campus. A new air-conditioned library. Modern dormitory facilities recently equipped with new furniture. Rooms available for single men and single women. Married couples should write the Business Office concerning housing accommodations for the summer session.

### RECREATION

Golf, Tennis, Swimming, Gymnasium. The town of Wake Forest operates a modern swimming pool. A nine-hole golf course within walking distance of the campus will be available for a modest fee. The Seminary gymnasium will be open. Excellent tennis courts are also available.

### CURRICULUM

**FIRST TERM, June 12-July 7, 1967**

A course in elementary Hebrew, designed for beginners in the Hebrew Scriptures, will meet three hours each day throughout the two terms and will enable the student to earn six semester hours in Hebrew.

The student who does not take the course in Hebrew may enroll in two courses and earn four semester hours each term.

In order to maintain a reasonable student-teacher ratio, the Seminary reserves the right to control the size of classes offered in the summer session.

**IB 115s ELEMENTARY HEBREW**

Mr. Durham

A study of the elements of Hebrew grammar and syntax to prepare the student for reading the Hebrew scriptures.

**IB 306s ARCHAEOLOGY AND THE RELIGION OF ISRAEL**

Mr. Lovelace

A study of Israel's faith in its relationship to other Ancient Near Eastern religions, based upon tangible remains recovered by archaeological excavation.

**IC 209s GNOSTICISM AND PRIMITIVE CHRISTIANITY**

Mr. Steely

A study of Gnosticism in its relation to and its impact upon the early Christian community.

2 semester hours 7:30-9:30, Tuesday through Friday

**IB 241s THE BOOK OF REVELATION**

Mr. Cook

A study of the meaning and message of the Book of Revelation in its historical context, and its relevance for our own time. The English text is used.

2 semester hours 10:30-12:30, Tuesday through Friday

**CW 241s PRINCIPLES OF TEACHING**

Mr. Poerschke

A study of the basic principles and procedures in the teaching-learning process with special attention to the work of the teacher, the psychological bases of learning, methodology, and classroom procedure.

**IB 116s ELEMENTARY HEBREW**

Mr. Durham

A continuation of IB 115s

3 semester hours 7:30-9:30, 10:30-11:30, Tuesday through Friday

Prerequisite: 1B 115s.

**CW 305s PREACHING TO HUMAN NEEDS**

Mr. Trotter

A study of the ways in which the Bible speaks to the human situation and the basic needs to which it addresses itself, with an evaluation of the problem-solving approach to preaching.

**LT 206s THE DOCTRINE OF THE HOLY SPIRIT**

Mr. Eddins

A survey of the Biblical teaching and doctrinal development of the Spirit of God. Attention will be given to fundamental theological problems of the doctrine of the Spirit.

**IC 206s RELIGIOUS SECTS AND CULTS IN AMERICA**

Mr. Shriver

An examination of the history, leadership, worship, and teachings of a select number of religious sects and cults in America.

IB 240s THE EPISTLE TO THE PHILIPPIANS

Mr. Brown

An exposition of the epistle. The English text is used.

2 semester hours 10:30-12:30, Tuesday through Friday

### POST-B.D. STUDIES

In the curriculum of the 1967 Summer Session, attention has been given to requests of alumni and other post-B.D. students for advanced courses of study closely related to their vocational interests and needs.

### APPLICATIONS
