




Dedicated in Memory of William David Monteith

The 2009 Annual Minutes are dedicated in memory of William David Monteith, of Sylva. David was born on April 20, 1928, to Jim and Maggie Gates Monteith. He went home to be with his heavenly father on Wednesday, January 14th, 2009, at the age of 80. David was a native and lifelong resident of Jackson County. He was saved as a teenager and joined Scotts Creek Baptist Church which he attended.

David was a veteran of the Korean War, having served from 1950-1952 as a member of the United States Army Military Police in Germany. When he completed his years in service, he returned to Sylva, where he met his wife-to-be, Lois Buchanan, and they were married on May 30, 1953. They have two daughters, Debbie Hooper (James) and Dianne Cauley (Marty), and three grandchildren, Jamie Hooper Hilton (Casey), Jeremy Cauley, and Jonathan Cauley.

David spent the next 18 years working as a plumber for E.L. Ervin Plumbing Company. In 1971, he went to work at Western Carolina University in the Maintenance Department. He worked there until his retirement in April of 1990.

In 1970, David was ordained as a deacon at Scotts Creek Baptist Church. He was very dedicated to his church and was very active in the reconstruction of the church after it burned in 1962. He served on numerous committees throughout the years at Scott Creek. He traveled to West Virginia with a mission team to help build a church. He was always willing and ready to help those in need.

In 1993, David moved his membership from Scotts Creek Baptist to Lovedale Baptist Church. After joining Lovedale, he served as a deacon, chairman of deacons, assistant Sunday School teacher, and on numerous other committees in the church. After moving to Lovedale, he served on several associational committees. He always looked forward to attending associational meetings and the blessing he received from them.

In 1992, David became a Board Member of the Western North Carolina Prison Ministries at Haywood Correctional Facility. He enjoyed attending monthly planning meetings, as well as opportunities to visit and witness to the inmates on outings and church speaking engagements. He served for 15 years until his health inhibited him from being able to continue with the ministry. He deeply missed the fellowship, witnessing and testimonies, but continued to correspond through prayer, cards, letters, and phone calls. He truly received a blessing from working with others to share the love of Christ.

David was a quiet man, but a faithful man to his family, his church, friends and most of all to God. He faithfully fulfilled his duties in all that he did. He served Jesus faithfully by living and telling others about God. In the words of the late Vernon Cope, "David was a good student, a good man, and he loved his God." David's dedication to the work of God will continue to inspire others as they live their lives.

PROCEEDINGS 180th ANNUAL MEETING FIRST SESSION, THURSDAY, OCTOBER 15, 2009

- 1. Scotts Creek Baptist Church hosted the first session of the 180th Annual Meeting of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association. A delicious meal was served at 4:30 p.m. A total of 136 present: 82 Messengers and 54 visitors representing 22 churches.
- 2. Rev. Avery Brown, Moderator, welcomed everyone.
- 3. Rev. Emery Brooks led the congregation in singing "Revive Us Again".
- 4. Homer Royals and Tim Hawkins welcomed everyone to Scotts Creek Baptist Church. Lance Newman sang "Closer Walk With Thee" and "Amazing Grace" accompanied by Janice Burnette.
- 5. Rev. Josh Hyde, pastor of Lighthouse Baptist Church, brought scripture and sermon from Ephesians 6. At the end of his sermon he had everyone gather around the pastors in prayer.
- 6. The 180th Annual Meeting was called to order by Moderator Avery Brown.
- 7. Rev. Avery Brown asked for changes to the Agenda. It was approved as presented with just a few substitutions of presenters.
- 8. Rev. Avery Brown recognized new pastors at the Associational Meeting. Rev. Mike Gunter from Moses Creek, Rev. Mark Tice from Long Branch, and Rev. Kris Estep the associate pastor at Lighthouse.
- 9. The Moderator announced appointment of Committee on Committees and Resolutions Committee on page 13. Same people agreed to serve on these committees again.
- 10. Rev. Emory Brooks led the congregation in singing, "I Am Thine, O Lord".

REPORTS

- 11. <u>Director of Missions</u> Rev. Virgil Holloway gave his report as Director of Missions. It was located on page 4. It has been a joy to serve in the association.
- 12. <u>Music</u> Rev. Emery Brooks gave the Music report listed on page 6. He said 23 churches were represented at the association's annual singing. It is a time to worship the Lord and fellowship together.
- 13. <u>VBS</u> Jessi Stewart was unable to be present. Her report was on page 7. Avery spoke about how good their VBS was this year. They started a children's program on Sunday nights at 5:00 to continue the fun learning about God.
- 14. <u>WMU</u> Gail McMahan presented their report on page 8. She encouraged everyone to give to their collection of socks for the Red Box Prison Ministry. Approximately 200 more socks were needed.
- 15. <u>S.W.A.R.M.</u> Janice Burnette presented the SWARM report through a slide presentation. The South Wester Area Resort Ministries has been in operation for 20 years and includes working in festivals, campgrounds, nursing homes, Job Corps, Santa's Land and conducting family evening programs in the campgrounds. She encouraged churches to get involved in this ministry opportunity. It just took availability and flexibility.

COMMITTEES

- 16. <u>Stewardship</u> Rev. Mike Moore presented the proposed 2009-2010 budget to be voted on during the second session. The budget is on page 10.
- 17. <u>Committee on Committees</u> David Dalton presented their report on page 13 to be approved. He said that Alice Cabe needed to come off the Memorials Committee and that they

needed another preacher on the Personnel Committee. Rev. Josh Hyde nominated Rev. Kris Estep for the Personnel Committee and he accepted. No further nominations were made and it was approved.

- 18. Nominating Committee Douglas Denny presented their report on page 14 to be accepted for 2009-2010. Gracella spoke and said that Rev. Mike Moore had said he could not be the moderator as presented in the report. Rev. Josh Hyde spoke up and said that he had been asked to be the moderator. He said he would. That left the Vice Moderator position open. Also Rev. Matt Ledbetter's name needed to be taken off because he is no longer in the association. No further nominations were made and the motion carried.
- 19. <u>Place and Preacher Committee</u> Steve Lillard presented their report on page 3. It was approved with no opposition. Next year's annual meetings will be at Buff Creek Baptist and Ochre Hill Baptist. Rev. Jason Buchanan and Rev. Kent Lowdermilk will be preaching.
- 20. <u>Memorials Committee</u> June Hawkins and Alice Cabe read the names of members from each church that had passed away during the past year. Page 15. The minutes will be dedicated this year in memory of David Monteith of Lovedale Baptist Church. Rev. Mike Farmer lead in prayer.
- 21. <u>Miscellaneous Business</u> Gracella said that 79 members and 56 visitors were there from 21 churches.

Gracella also moved that Associational Mission funds be used to ship the used literature collected at the Baptist Center from the churches in the association to a ministry in KY or AL that ships it worldwide. It was approved.

22. J.D. Grant announced that he had put Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute information on the front table. They have 40 new students this quarter. Things are going well and they have a new president.

MISSIONS

- 23. Ochre Hill Baptist Rev. Sean Joplin said that 16 folks from their church went to Fort Caswell, NC. About half adults and the other half youth. They worked on teams: construction, public works, sports camps, and beach evangelism. They also had a worship service each night that included 800-1000 teens excited about Jesus Christ. He said "what an absolute blessing to serve." "God forgive us for acting like it's a burden to serve. It is a privilege to go in the name of Jesus Christ."
- 24. Janice Burnette & Karen Burnette's trip to West Senegal, Africa Janice presented a slide presentation about this also. They were working with International Missionaries and not churches. The very first day they went into one of the schools to the English Club. They did a lot of walking, talking, playing soccer and prayer walking. In each village they went to the most prominent building was the Mosque. She said almost all the people they encountered had no concept of God's love. They are empty without Christ.
- 25. Avery said that the next day that Rev. Virgil would be filling in as Moderator until Rev. Mike Moore could get there. Avery had to work.
- 26. Roy Dalton of Long Branch Baptist Church led in the Benediction.

SECOND SESSION, FRIDAY, OCTOBER 16, 2009

- 1. Cashiers Baptist Church hosted the second session of the 180th Annual Meeting of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association. A delicious meal was served at 4:30 p.m. A total of 88 present: 60 Messengers and 28 visitors representing 15 churches.
- 2. Rev. Virgil Holloway, Director of Missions, welcomed everyone and called the meeting to order. Rev. Mike Moore was unable to get there because his son had surgery that day and he was still with

him in Asheville. Rev. Avery Brown had to work and also could not be there.

- 3. Rev. Scotty Patrick welcomed everyone to Cashiers Baptist Church and read Ephesians 4:7-16. The Cashiers Baptist Church Choir sang "Won't it Be Wonderful There" and "Amazing Grace".
- 4. Emery Brooks led the congregation in singing, "There is Power in the Blood".

REPORTS

- 5. <u>United Christian Ministries</u> Kathy Cross reported they continue to assist with food, heating oil and gas, utilities, transportation, overnight lodging, past due rent, and medical/prescriptions. UCM also makes referrals to other agencies and hospitals. They continue to need volunteers and financial support. She reported that they were able to get \$10,000 for the first time in a roundabout way for heating assistance to their clients. Their funding comes directly from Churches and Good Samaritans. Her report was on page 24. When she first started working at UCM they served about 250 clients a month. It is now about 700 clients a month. Thank you for your continued support fo UCM.
- 6. <u>Truett Baptist Camp</u> Tim Roberson, director, presented his report on page 25. He encouraged everyone to take brochures to share with their churches.
- 7. <u>Jackson County Bible Club</u> Rev. Steve Alexander encouraged churches to pray and get involved by helping to teach, be a helper or do refreshments. His report was on page 26.
- 8. <u>Baptist Children's Homes</u> Rev. Lewis Smith presented the Thanksgiving Offering Video. He also told about his biking fundraising efforts. He now covers 23 counties and 26 associations.
- 9. <u>NC Baptist Men</u> -Eddie Williams said that they meet a physical need that gives them an opportunity to meet their spiritual need. They are the hands and feet of Jesus Christ. Many partnerships are available for missions to show love on our neighbor. The Baptist Men provide meals, laundry and shower trailers, and daycare during times of crisis such as wind and ice storms, and tornadoes. They have recently purchased a Nascar 2 deck trailer for tools.
- 10. Rev. Emery Brooks led the congregation in singing "Nothing But the Blood".
- 11. Gracella Morris reported that there were 87 present. (This is a little different after Gracella got back to the office and compared all the attendance sheets.
- 12. <u>Cashiers Baptist Church</u> Merritt Newman reported that their church went to KY to help after an ice storm They cut brush, gave them Bibles, and prayed with each family. One person from their own team got saved during the trip. Then Benny Rice spoke about their trips to Aguilera, Veracruz, Mexico. 3 pastors have helped build a church and a baptism pool. Their last mission trip included building a house for an elderly man who is very sick. They also painted the church. They have plans to install windows and doors.
- 13. Virgil presented Scotty Patrick with a certificate for Cashiers Baptist Church for the International Mission Offerings.
- 14. <u>Executive Committee</u> The Director of Missions pointed to the executive committee report beginning on page 16. It is a summary of the executive meetings held throughout the year.
- 15. <u>Stewardship</u> Rev. Mike Farmer moved that the 2008-2010 budget presented the previous session be approved. Page 10. No discussion followed and it passed.
- 16. <u>Regional Hispanic Ministry</u> Rev. Robert Fernandez presented information about El Centro Del Senor and Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute. Rev. Felix Villarreal presented a report about their church's mission efforts in Aguilera, Veracruz.
- 17. Resolutions Committee Charlie Jones presented the following resolution.

Whereas Scotts Creek and Cashiers Baptist Churches have hosted meetings, provided abundant meals, and extraordinary hospitality to messengers of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association, and Whereas Rev. Josh Hyde presented (and we believe also Rev. Scotty Patrick will present)

motivating, encouraging, and uplifting messages, and

Whereas associational and convention-wide representatives have given informative and challenging reports, and

Whereas Rev. Avery Brown and Rev. Mike Moore have so capably presided over these sessions and other meetings, and

Whereas our Director of Missions, Dr. Virgil Holloway, has brought wise leadership that strongly promotes missions and unity, and

Whereas, our faithful and resourceful associational clerk, Gracella Morris, serves beyond her call of duty, and Whereas, our committee officers and members have given of time and energy to serve the association well. Be it therefore resolved that we extend sincere appreciation to all who have served to honor our wonderful Savior Jesus Christ. Bro. Moderator, I move that this well deserved resolution of appreciation be approved. It was approved.

- 18. Chuck Norris and Day Break brought the special music.
- 19. Rev. Scotty Patrick, pastor from Cashiers Baptist, gave the Scripture and sermon. He spoke from Ephesians.
- 20. Rev. Felix Villarreal closed the meeting with the Benediction.

Meeting The Challenge

The <u>Nantahala Counseling Center</u> is in its fourteenth year of service to western North Carolina. Professionally integrating spirituality and psychotherapy, <u>NCC</u> offers counseling and referral resources to individuals and couples who may be experiencing personal or relational problems that diminish the quality of life.

I have been with <u>NCC</u> from the beginning and served as its only director and counselor. Before my work with NCC, I served churches in Alabama, Virginia, and Georgia. I then did five years of residencies that led to my becoming a member of the American Association of Pastoral Counselors and a Licensed Professional Counselor.

The Nantahala Counseling Center, which was established through the cooperation of area churches and the Pastoral Care Department of Wake Forest Baptist Hospital, became independent of the hospital ten years ago, but the NCC board of directors has continued to maintain the Center's funding and provide client assistant funds to help cover the cost of counseling for those persons who otherwise would not be able to afford it. In return, I have offered a sliding scale to those without insurance and to those whose income qualifies them for assistance.

In addition to the <u>client assistance fund</u>, the board of directors pays a secretary 2 to 4 hours a week to perform office duties and file insurance. Kay Kleschka has been faithfully doing this work for nine years.

As the <u>Nantahala Counseling Center</u> closes out its present fiscal year and looks to the next, we are aware we are faced with several challenges and need the help of the Church. The first challenge is to make the community aware of the <u>Nantahala Counseling Center</u> and its ministry. <u>NCC</u> does not have an advertising budget and relies primarily upon word of mouth and a listing in the phone book. Amazingly, this has sufficed over the years. However, most people do not know of this ministry. We ask the churches to remind its members of the help that is available through the <u>Nantahala Counseling Center</u>.

The second challenge is financial. The downturn in the economy has affected giving to NCC. All money given to the Center goes to three things. The majority, by far, goes to the Client Assistance Fund. A portion goes to pay the 2 to 4 hour a week secretary, and a small amount goes to office supplies such as paper and stamps.

In my years as a counselor, I have never had as many people call to say they need counseling but do not have a job or insurance. I do not want to turn anyone away for financial reasons, but we are truly without a client assistance fund at this time. The Church has supported this ministry for almost fourteen years. As you and your church prioritize your ministries and giving for the coming year, I ask that you consider the need to assist people who need but cannot afford counseling.

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES OF NORTH CAROLINA

(July 2008-July 2009)

Paulina... Eighteen-year-old Paulina has lived at Baptist Children's Homes' oldest campus Mills Home in Thomasville for three years. BCH has been the refuge Paulina needed as the storms of her family's life swirled around her uncontrollably. The arguments between her parents were becoming more frequent.

Paulina's mother and father knew their problems were disruptive. After a recommendation from a friend, they called BCH. Here she found caring staff members who would listen. She found a place where she felt safe.

Paulina credits BCH child care workers Sonya and Bobby Dalke for helping her make the best of her new life. It was through the Dalkes' guidance that Paulina accepted Christ as her personal Savior.

After accepting Christ, Paulina stepped up for the other girls in her cottage. "I began to understand more," she says. "I was determined to be a role model."

Last year, Paulina was one of the first girls admitted into BCH's new transitional living service at Huffman Cottage. Transitional living allows a resident the opportunity to focus on the skills he or she needs to live independently.

Paulina has been accepted to a couple of colleges but plans to stay close to Thomasville and attend the community college. She is hoping to earn an associate degree in physical therapy and then transfer to a four-year college to receive her bachelor's degree.

"I am grateful to have had a place to retreat and feel good about me," Paulina says.

Girls Wilderness Camp Moving Forward... The long-held dream of opening Camp Duncan, a wilderness camp for at-risk girls, is unfolding through the commitment of North Carolina Baptists. North Carolina Baptist Men and Baptist Men on-site project coordinator David Seymour are leading church groups and other volunteer efforts to develop and renovate the 576-acre property and its facilities. On June 13, churches, dignitaries and supporters joined BCH staff members and residents for a picnic and groundbreaking ceremony at the property. BCH is in the process of raising much-needed funds to open Camp Duncan. The Gay T. and Haskell A. Foundation, for which the camp is named, gave a \$250,000.00 grant. The foundation has issued a challenge gift that will provide an additional \$250,000.00 grant once BCH raises \$500,000.00. The cost to complete Camp Duncan is estimated at \$1 million.

BCH Undertakes New Aging Ministry... Baptist Children's Homes has been tapped to oversee the North Carolina Baptist Aging Ministry (NCBAM), a dynamic Christian resource for the aging and their families. The non-residential ministry is operated by BCH and totally funded by the Baptist State Convention. The ministry focuses on providing information and referrals, on connecting the aging and their families with resources to meet needs, and on coordinating practical ministries. NCBAM is designed to help North Carolina Baptist churches and associations in developing services that benefit the aging. The ministry is Christ-centered and seeks to treat the aging with dignity and respect enabling individuals to maintain independence and a quality life.

NCBAM awarded its first grant to Brookwood Baptist Church in Jacksonville in May. The church, which has a vital senior adult ministry, will use the funds to access and expand its outreach to aging adults in the Onslow County area.

In June, NCBAM announced its first pilot program in partnership with the Liberty Baptist Association in Thomasville. The association and its area churches will work with NCBAM to implement "Pilot One," a three-month program to test the concept and goals of the ministry before expanding services across the state.

Churches Meet Offering Goal... North Carolina Baptists rallied once more to meet last year's BCH Offering goal. The \$1,410,000.00 amount for 2008 is BCH's largest offering challenge to date. BCH staff members spoke in a record number of 1,043 churches last year. Despite the economic climate, North Carolina Baptists showed their love, compassion and commitment to putting the needs of hurting children first through their tremendous generosity and sacrifices.

Children Accept Christ... In 2008, 85 children in care at BCH facilities across the state accepted Christ as personal Savior. BCH remains committed to being Christ-centered through all its programs to children and families. Residents attend church, participate in daily devotions led by their child care workers, and North Carolina Baptists frequently visit BCH's residential locations helping encourage and minister to boys and girls.

Churches Renovate Cottage... North Carolina Baptist groups volunteered their time, resources and skills to transform Mills Home's Bright-Brown Cottage in Thomasville. Church groups were from Bay Leaf Baptist in Raleigh, Pleasant Garden Baptist in Pleasant Garden, and Scotts Hill Baptist in Wilmington. The cottage was revitalized so older boys could participate in BCH's new transitional living service. Transitional living teaches older residents the skills to be responsible, independent adults after leaving BCH's care. Renovating Bright-Brown Cottage would not have been financially possible without church volunteer efforts. The cottage is now full and serving five older boys.

BCH Approaches Historic Anniversary... This November, Baptist Children's Homes will begin counting down to its 125th anniversary. Originally known as the Baptist Orphanage, BCH opened its doors on November 11, 1885 and today operates care facilities in 14 North Carolina communities. A year-long celebration will culminate at the annual meeting of the Baptist State Convention in November, 2010.



THE NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION, INC. 2008 ANNUAL REPORT

The mission of the North Carolina Baptist Foundation since its inception in 1920 has been to assist the Convention and its institutions and agencies in increasing an awareness among North Carolina Baptists of Christian estate stewardship principles as a means of financially undergirding churches, institutions and mission endeavors on a permanent basis. The uniqueness of the ministries and services provided by the institutions and General Board staff merits increased financial support. The Foundation accomplishes these objectives by offering assistance in estate planning counsel, Will preparation, planned giving, charitable remainder trusts, endowment funds and church fund management.

This mission is all about helping North Carolina Baptists encounter God as we stress the importance of stewardship and Christian estate planning principles in an effort to undergird ministry on a permanent basis. At the same time, the very ministry we seek to undergird is the ministry of engaging our culture and all cultures with the Good News of God's love and grace in Christ. When we do our part in helping to accomplish this mission then we will know the peace that is experienced by faithful disciples.

So how did we do in our efforts to accomplish this mission in 2008? At least in part, the numbers tell the story. Even in a very difficult investment climate, individuals were assisted in establishing 26 endowment funds and 11 charitable remainder trusts totaling \$1 million, and we received \$3.4 million in contributions to existing endowments, all of which will ultimately benefit countless Baptist causes on a permanent basis. Programs were provided for churches and associations during the year to promote Make Your Will Month, Christian estate stewardship and church fund management. Approximately \$3 million from churches and institutions came under management to enhance numerous ministries including scholarships, building funds, cemetery funds, benevolence funds, general operating funds and other various mission causes. Overall, the Foundation received just over \$7.4 million in contributions during 2008 for Christian causes.


During 2008, our distributions totaled \$9.3 million, with charity receiving \$7.1 million and individuals, through trusts, receiving \$2.2 million. During the 87-year history of The North Carolina Baptist Foundation, Inc., \$36.1 million has been distributed to individuals and \$77.9 million to Baptist churches, institutions and mission causes for a grand historical total of \$114 million.

We invest Kingdom money in such a way as to grow the assets while at the same time protecting the principal. To this end, the Foundation employs professional money managers to invest these funds according to an investment policy adopted by its Board. Four investment pools are offered: a growth fund, a balanced fund, an income fund and a fixed income fund. The Foundation uses the services of Graystone Consulting, a business of Morgan Stanley Smith Barney, to help select top money managers and evaluate performance. As of December 31, 2008, the Foundation held \$115.4 million under management.

Report from the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina For period July 1, 2008 to June 30, 2009

The Baptist State Convention exists to help local churches and associations minister effectively and bring glory to God. The Baptist State Convention of North Carolina staff, under the leadership of Executive Director-Treasurer Milton A. Hollifield, Jr., is committed to helping Baptist churches maximize their ministry outreach for the purpose of building the Lord's Kingdom.

In 2008, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina restructured to create a new ministry group - the Church Planting and Missions Development Group (CPMD). At its creation the new group incorporated the ministries of Church Planting, Associational Partnerships, Missions Development (Cooperative Program, Stewardship and NCMO) and the new women's ministry, Embrace. This year, the ministries and responsibilities of the CPMD Group were enlarged and enhanced with the addition of the Partnership Missions Team and the affiliation of the BSCNC auxiliary, North Carolina Baptist Men.

Chuck Register began serving as Executive Leader for the Church Planting and Missions Development Group in January 2009.

Ashley Allen was named the inaugural Director of Embrace Women's Ministries and Missions. In March Embrace hosted the event "Legacy: A Mother/ Daughter Retreat" at Caswell. Throughout the year Embrace Leadership Network events provided an excellent avenue for equipping and resourcing women's ministry leaders. Embrace seeks to train women in leadership and to come alongside them as they serve women through the local church and association.

Associational Partnerships

The Convention enjoys partnering in ministry with associational leaders and our staff is grateful for their servant hearts and faithfulness to making a difference in their communities. The Convention serves churches along with 80 associations across the state.

Each year Associational Partnerships hosts an associational missionary summer conference. This year's conference theme was "Developing Consultant Skills to Assist Churches." The guest speaker was John

Ewart, Director of D.Min. Studies and Distance Learning, Associate Professor of Missions, Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary. The theme for our ladies conference this year was "The Many Hats We Wear." The guest speaker was Sandra Harrison, South Yadkin Association, and guest vocalist was Lana Chambers Smith, Statesville.

Bivocational Ministries also hosts an annual summer conference. "Church Relationships: Stretching our Faith While Surviving the Stress" was the focus this year, with special emphasis on Matthew 11:28-30. Conference participants at Caraway Conference Center heard from Lloyd Elder, President, Baptist Sunday School Board (ret.) and Bob Foy, BSCNC. Phyllis Foy shared time with the wives. The BSCNC has about 1,400 churches with bivocational staff.

sponsored annually Also the Associational Staff/Convention Staff Dialogue. Each January, leaders dialogue about common ministry points associations across North Carolina, Leaders learn from the ideas of others and encourage one another in their evangelism opportunities. This year's emphasis was "The Path Forward," Proverbs 4:26.

The retired directors of missions banquet in December invites leaders and their spouses to Caraway to fellowship and share how the Lord continues to work in their lives. Associational Partnerships helps associations fill ministry positions and provides training for search committees. Through Ministry **Partnership Aareements** the associations partner with this office in outreach such as church planting, resort ministry and ethnic and language ministry.

Another resource offered by this office is demographic services for associations and churches. Understanding the demographics of an associational area can help leaders be more effective in their planning and outreach. Convention churches can access this information through the Percept organization at the Web site www.link2lead.co. This year Percept added advanced features to allow leaders to view demographic data not only in their association, but within a certain mile radius of the association. Leaders can also view the demographics of other associations.

Chuck Register, Executive Leader, Church Planting and Missions Development Group;

Lester Evans, Senior Consultant, Associational Partnerships Team, Western Region; and Betsy Roland, Associational Partnerships Ministry Assistant, continue to serve associational staff as we search for a new Team Leader.

Associational Partnerships foster cooperation among North Carolina Baptist churches, associations and the Convention as we serve together and minister in the name of Jesus Christ.

Conference Centers

This year the North Carolina Baptist Assembly Caswell celebrated its 60th Fort anniversary. Nearly 7,000 students attended youth weeks at Caswell. Hollifield Leadership Center offered training events to help transform, encourage and equip congregations through teaching, leading and coaching. Truett Camp hosted the Western Happiness Retreat, Junior Music Camp and Youth Music Week. Caraway Conference Center and Camp's creationbased environmental education program, "ACORNS," experienced tremendous growth. This unique opportunity allows Caraway staff to share about the wonders of God's creation with public school children.

Church Planting

The Lord blessed the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina with a total of 108 new church plants last year. This consisted of 27 Anglo, 26 Hispanic, 10 Asian and eight multi-ethnic churches. Others were African-American, cowboy, biker, Montagnard, Hmong and African churches. These new church plants made 209,600 evangelistic and cultivative contacts.

For the reporting year, North Carolina Baptist churches baptized 22,139 people.

One of the primary components of the church planting process in North Carolina is Basic Training for Church Planters, a weeklong training event. This year we trained 121 people at this event.

The Church Planting Team continues to fulfill the Great Commission by thinking globally. Frank White, Senior Consultant for Anglo and African-American Church Planting, journeyed to Newfoundland to assist in planting a new church. Ralph Garay trained 150 pastors in the Philippines. Consultant Amaury Santos traveled to Spain to equip pastors and leaders.

Missions Development

The theme for the 2009 North Carolina Missions Offering and Week of Prayer was Your "Love Neighbor" (www.ncmissionsoffering.org). This offering is the visible expression of North Carolina Baptists who desire to impact eternity. The offering supports the work of NC Baptist Men, church planting and evangelism, missions education and promotion, associational projects and mission camps. By supporting this offering and week of prayer, North Carolina Baptists work to impact God's world for eternal change to God's eternal glory.

Another way North Carolina Baptists make missions a priority is by giving through the Cooperative Program. "10 or more" became the new Cooperative Program theme, urging churches to commit 10 or more percent of their undesignated receipts through the Cooperative Program.

During 2009 awards were presented to the 20 churches leading North Carolina Baptists in percentage (of their undesignated receipts) giving during 2008 through the Cooperative Program. Dudley Shoals Baptist Church in Granite Falls led churches with more than 400 resident members and Riverview Baptist Church in Washington led churches with fewer than 400 resident members.

Disciple-making Culture

Congregational Services seeks to lead North Carolina Baptist churches in creating a disciple-making culture in which lives are changed by the power of God.

Congregational Services assists churches in Sunday School, church administration, church building and planning, music and worship, children's ministry, preschool ministry and family ministry.

This year a North Carolina Bible driller took home the top prize at the national tournament in Louisiana.

About 250 pastors, staff and lay leaders attended the Comeback Church Conference featuring Ed Stetzer and J.D. Greear. Congregational Services also sponsored marriage enrichment weekends to help couples encounter God and surrender to His original design for marriage. The Pastors' Discipleship Network offered teleclasses and webinars throughout the year to encourage pastors as they journey with Christ and disciple others.

Scholarships

This year more than \$980,000 was awarded, with more than 660 students receiving scholarships through the North Carolina Scholarship Program. Students **Baptist** applying for the Baptist Scholarship were required to answer two essay questions: "Give your personal testimony" and "How is the Cooperative Program relevant to today's generation?" Returning applicants answered the essay question, "How has your testimony been affected by attending a Baptist school?" Repeatedly, the response is the student's faith has been strengthened through the friendship of Christian friends, professors and administrators. For some, their experiences led them to surrender to a call to preach, teach or be on the mission field. They want to be on mission with God wherever He leads.

Hunger

Through a partnership with more than 80 churches, associations and the North American Mission Board, the Hunger Office distributed more than \$150,000 to feed hungry men, women and children in North Carolina. Ministries include backpack buddies, kids café, food pantries, crisis centers and lunch buddies. Each of these ministries is unique, yet they all have one thing in common – feeding people and sharing the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Proclaiming the Gospel

The Intentionally Evangelistic Church Strategy (IECS) remains the primary strategy for winning North Carolina to Christ. The IECS strategy seminars are moving from exclusively state meetings to more seminars on the associational level.

The annual Revive Us Again statewide prayer conference was held at Biltmore Baptist Church in Arden. Regional prayer conferences were also held at locations across the state. More than 80 churches in North Carolina experienced Church Renewal Weekends involving more than 8,094 volunteers and church members. These weekends recorded at least 385 rededications and 53 professions of faith.

A "Great Commission Resurgence" conference was held February 16 at Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary and February 23-24 at Ridgecrest Conference Center. Speakers included Bruce Ashford, Robert Smith, Ed Stetzer, Chuck Lawless, Sammy Gilbreath, Stephen Rummage, Danny Akin and David Platt.

The youth team from the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina offered North Carolina Baptist churches training in youth Sunday School, missions, discipleship, worship, transitions after graduation and youth ministry planning. Nine youth training events were held this year.

The Convention and the College at Southeastern partnered to sponsor a youth evangelism conference February 15 at Southeastern Seminary. More than 1,200 youth attended, and decisions included 25 first time professions of faith, 18 rededications and 11 called to full-time Christian ministry.

Retirements/Appointments

Dan Ridley, music and worship team leader, retired after 11 years of serving North Carolina Baptist churches. Wayne Oakes, senior consultant in pastoral ministries, retired after 13 years of service. Jeanie Whitehead, Bible Drill Ministries consultant, also retired. David Horton was named president of Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute.

Report on the Cooperative Program for Baptist Associations by Mike Creswell, Senior Consultant Baptist State Convention of North Carolina

About 4,200 congregations are now affiliated with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, a number that has risen steadily in recent years.

North Carolina Baptists start a new church every three days on average and support some of the most effective ministries in our state, such as the Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina, a summer youth program for some 7,000 young people, a scholarship program which last year provided more than \$1 million in scholarship aid to Baptist students, and many other ministries.

Beyond that we support some 11,000 North American and international missionaries across the U.S. and Canada and in more than 180 countries around the world. Our six seminaries, including Southeastern here in our state, are attended by some 13,000 students, one of the biggest programs of its kind in the country.

Our North Carolina Baptist churches and our programs are increasingly multi-cultural; we speak more than three dozen languages in our churches as we sing, preach and pray on Sunday. This extensive program of missions and ministry is funded by churches by their contributions through the Cooperative Program. It is a simple approach.

Each November people from the churches meet in an annual session and adopt a budget, which determines the ministries they want to support. During the year the churches send the Cooperative Program funds to the Baptist State Convention office in Cary and there the accountants send the money on to Kingdom work far and wide, according to the budget.

That simple plan has helped Baptists work together effectively since 1925. Pastors and lay people, men and women from the churches, serve on the boards and committees which oversee they work they support. The Cooperative Program is the heart of our work together. The Cooperative Program office works to keep this vital missions support system before North Carolina Baptists. Here are some highlights on our work.

"10 or more" became the new office theme, urging churches to commit 10 percent of their undesignated receipts or more through the Cooperative Program. Although generally church income has generally increased rapidly in the past 30 years, church giving through the Cooperative Program has actually declined as churches have given a declining percentage of their receipts.

In fact, 1989 was a sad year for the convention. It was the first year Southern Baptists decreased their Cooperative Program by more than \$100 million, compared to what they would have given had their continued giving an average of 10 percent.

Certain Proof: Early in 2008 we printed and mailed more than 500,000 copies of an eight-page piece called "Certain Proof" to all convention churches, a copy for most households in the churches. A Spanish language edition went to the approximately 140 Hispanic churches now affiliated with the Baptist State Convention. Certain Proof DVD: We also sent to each church and association a DVD with 10 short video clips about Cooperative Program ministries, intended to be used during services, as during offering times. Other materials: The office also produced posters, bookmarks and a new mini-brochure to promote the Cooperative Program.

Association report: We sent each association a report on the Cooperative Program giving for the churches that belong. Ads: Ads in the Biblical Recorder newspaper, NC Baptist Phonebook and other outlets highlighted churches which have led in Cooperative Program giving.

Recognition: During 2009 awards were presented to the 20 churches leading North Carolina Baptists in percentage (of their undesignated receipts) giving during 2008 through the Cooperative Program, including the top 10 churches with more than 400 members and the top 10 with fewer than 400 members.

Dudley Shoals Baptist Church in Granite Falls led churches with more than 400 members by contributing 24 percent of its undesignated receipts through the Cooperative Program. Riverview Baptist Church in Washington led churches with fewer than 400 members by contributing 23 percent of its undesignated receipts through the Cooperative Program. Triad Cowboy Church, Archdale, was second in percentage giving by churches with fewer than 400 members, sending 20 percent of its undesignated receipts through the Cooperative Program. This cowboy church, which holds some of its services in a barn with a dirt floor, is only a few years old and was started with support from the Cooperative Program.

New churches: These get Cooperative Program information early, senior consultant Mike Creswell taught Cooperative Program giving to church planting missionaries during three week-long training sessions, plus other training events for Asian and Hispanic church planters. Similarly, he introduces the Cooperative Program to ministers new to North Carolina who attend several get-acquainted sessions at the Baptist Building each year.

New affiliates: During 2008 Creswell visited and introduced the Cooperative Program to more than two dozen churches which requested affiliation with the Baptist State Convention. North Asheville Baptist Church in Asheville moved to affiliate with the convention in July 2008; it is a 1,600 member church which had previously been an independent church.

Creswell also spoke on the Cooperative Program and missions to many churches, either individually or through On Mission Celebrations held through associations. He also spoke to graduates of Southeaster Baptist Theological Seminary in Wake Forest, NC, ahead of spring and winter commencement services.

Writing about and photographing Baptist work is another way Creswell promotes the Cooperative Program.

Another assignment of the CP office is to coordinate promotion of the North Carolina Missions Offering (NCMO) and Week of Prayer in September. The good news on this promotion using the theme, "Eternal Impact," was that the \$2 million goal was met. Along with coordinating the creation and distribution of promotional materials, Creswell also wrote articles and made photos of work funded through NCMO. The months-long campaign was recognized by an award from the Baptist Public Relations Association.

Mrs. Amy Torcasso, ministry assistant, continues to play a key role in the work of the office.

The office continued to work with Crown Financial Ministries to hold seminars to instruct participants in the Bible's teaching on Christian stewardship and planning began on five Crown seminars held in North Carolina during early 2009, in cooperation with Crown and the Executive Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention.

The two biggest challenges the CP office faces:

-- getting churches to increase the percentage they contribute through the Cooperative Program; and

-- educating the many people joining NC Baptist churches these days who have no understanding of missions, missions support or Baptist polity.

Stewardship Report for Associations by Mike Creswell, senior consultant Baptist State Convention of North Carolina

Clearly, God wants us to understand stewardship.

That's why more than 2,300 verses in the Bible teach about money and possessions -- more than four times the number of verses on faith.

The Bible teaches that God created all things and He continues to own all things. He asks us to care for the world while we're here, but we're really just looking after things for Him. That's the concept of stewardship. We are stewards -- caretakers -- for Him. A steward's outlook is a major part of Christian discipleship. Jesus taught about stewardship through His parables.

In Matthew 23, Jesus affirmed the Old Testament's teaching that God's people should return a tenth of their income to Him. Christians should give to their church week by week, in keeping with their income, Paul teaches in 1 Corinthians 16.

But Christian giving is not about meeting minimums! Paul teaches about abundant giving in 2 Corinthians 8 and 9. God gave His only Son for us and that sets a high standard for our giving! Paul teaches in 1 Corinthians 4 that Christians are also entrusted with Christian teachings as well; here, too, faithful response is called for.

Matthew 28, Acts 1 and Romans 10 teach that faithful response includes sending missionaries across the county, across the state, across the nation AND to the ends of the earth. Clearly, a church whose members are not stewards cannot support missions as it should.

Sadly, many Baptists have not come to understand stewardship nor integrated it into their lives. Studies have shown the typical Baptist gives only about 2 percent of his income through the church. Thus, if all members tithed, the typical Baptist church would increase its income five times.

Your Baptist State Convention is responding to stewardship needs in two main ways.

First, the convention is partnering with Crown Financial Ministries so that convention churches can use Crown's excellent Bible study materials for small group study. Pastors whose churches have used Crown materials say the effect on their congregations has been impressively positive.

Crown teaches both money management skills and Bible-based stewardship concepts. Studies have shown that, three years after completing a Crown small group Bible study:

- -- members had reduced debt by an average of 38 percent;
- -- a third of the members had no debt;
- -- savings had increased by 58 percent;
- -- giving to the church had increased by 70 percent;
- -- prayer increased for 46 percent of the members;
- -- Bible reading had increased for 64 percent of the members;
- -- marriage relationships were strengthened for 78 percent of the married couples.

North Carolina Baptists can get reduced prices for Crown's teaching materials. Crown also offers free budget coaching to people who are struggling with bills and debt.

A second way the convention can help churches with stewardship is through the free loan of materials. Through the convention website, pastors and members can borrow books, DVDs, teaching programs and other resources that will help them understand and teach stewardship.

Report for 2009 Book of Reports

Office of the GuideStone Team of the Baptist State Convention of NC, Inc.

The GuideStone Team of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina with Team Leader, Johnny Ross, and Administrative Assistant, Betty Pleasant, take seriously the mandate to serve the churches affiliated with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, Inc. in the following areas of ministry for church employees: insurance coverage, planning for retirement, staff compensation with a focus on the appropriate structure and administration of pay for church employees, and the complex topic of ministerial tax issues. By conducting regional/associational/local church training conferences, and individual consultation, both onsite and via the phone and internet, many church employees and key lay leaders have been trained and brought up-to-date with new legislation and court decisions. In particular a concerted effort was made during this past year to interpret the new IRS 403(b) Regulations which became effective January 1, 2009. Thirty regional and associational conferences were conducted across the state reaching over 700 persons from more than 500 churches. This remains an ongoing emphasis since the IRS extended a one year grace period for churches to be in compliance with written documents in place effective January 1, 2010. In addition, we work closely with GuideStone Financial Resources in Dallas to provide financial assistance to those elderly ministers and widows of ministers who live under financial duress and need ongoing and/or one time assistance through Mission: Dignity. Over 200 persons from North Carolina received financial assistance through this ministry last year!

This past year has been a very difficult year economically with a dramatic downturn in productivity globally. Retirement plans, including those of many church employees in the church retirement plan, have been hit especially hard in the past 18 months. Yet, GuideStone Financial Resources of the Southern Baptist Convention remains in a strong position financially. Since its beginning in 1918 and continuing until today, GuideStone has not missed making a benefit payment to those who have entrusted their retirement monies to this agency of the Southern Baptist Convention. The Church Retirement Plan, jointly administered by GuideStone Financial Resources and the Baptist State Convention of NC. remains the very best retirement plan on the market today for employees of our churches. With the two protection benefits (survivor and disability) and the matching dollar incentive no other plan comes close to providing protection for today and security for tomorrow for our church employees. To validate this point please note that during the calendar year 2008 in North Carolina 120 church employees on disability received \$639,917.02 and 36 deaths resulted in payments totaling \$258,382.28 to their beneficiaries. Without the faithful giving of our churches through the Cooperative Program Missions Budget these financial payments could not have been paid. Repeatedly, I am very pleased to inform our employees of these great benefits!

COUNCIL ON CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION

The Council on Christian Higher Education correlates the work of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina with the educational institutions affiliated with the Convention. The Council promotes Baptist College Day and the Baptist State Convention's North Carolina Baptist Scholarship Program.

At the request of the presidents of Campbell University, Chowan University, Gardner-Webb University, Mars Hill College and Wingate University, the Baptist State Convention officially established a new relationship with these colleges and universities during its annual session in November 2008. This new relationship now affirms these five schools as "affiliated educational institutions" and grants them the freedom to select their own trustees as they see fit. Reciprocally, unrestricted Cooperative Program (CP) funds forwarded to the affiliated educational institutions will decrease annually, and by 2012 the schools will no longer receive unrestricted CP funds.

In the establishment of this new, mutually amenable relationship, the following commitments were made. One, the affiliated educational institutions will elect a significant number of trustees who are members of churches in friendly cooperation with the Convention. Two, the Convention will provide scholarships to students attending the affiliated educational institutions as funds are available. Three, the affiliated educational institutions will continue to report to the Convention and have one vote each on the Council on Christian Higher Education. Four, the deans of the divinity schools at the affiliated educational institutions will be members of the Council on Christian Higher Education.

In 2008, the new North Carolina Baptist Scholarship Program awarded 732 scholarships to North Carolina Baptist students: 316 attend Campbell, 41 attend Chowan, 203 attend Gardner-Webb, 66 attend Mars Hill and 106 attend Wingate. This year, the scholarship program approved 663 scholarships: 206 to Campbell students, 37 to Chowan students, 217 to Gardner-Webb students, 74 to Mars Hill students and 129 to Wingate students.

Churches can find further details concerning the new North Carolina Baptist Scholarship Program by requesting a video entitled "The Case of the Missing Scholarship File." Please contact the Council on Christian Higher Education office at the Baptist Building in Cary to request this video. Please help us promote the new scholarship program within your church.

The Council has received many inquiries concerning the possible expansion of the scholarship program to include additional schools. While the Council will consider this in the future, the current downturn in CP giving prevents the Convention from being able to fund an expansion in the number of scholarships at this time. The priority in this difficult economy is to fulfill our existing scholarship commitments.

The Council on Christian Higher Education requests your prayerful support as we work together to find ways to promote, support and encourage both Christian higher education and theological education for North Carolina Baptists. Our aim is simple, but immense: we seek to fill communities in our state, our nation and around the world with men and women who possess both a quality Christian education and a Christian worldview of which the churches of this Convention can be proud.

Biblical Recorder Not Immune to Challenges

As too often is reflected in national polls Baptist habits and conduct differ little from the population as a whole. That holds true in reading habits and economy, as the past year has shown.

The Biblical Recorder, news journal of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, is in the midst of adjusting to a drop in advertising, and a change in habits resulting in a slow decline in subscriptions as younger readers shift to the internet for their news (www.biblicalrecorder.org), older readers pass on and some churches no longer provide the *Recorder* to large groups of their members.

While it is short sighted to kill club memberships in your church, it is sometimes understandable as churches adjust budgets to meet local needs. It is short sighted because members who take the *Biblical Recorder* are stronger contributors in many ways. They are better informed about needs and issues and find inspiration in the *Recorder* pages to encourage them in Kingdom work.

You will find in every issue of the *Biblical Recorder* stories about fellow Baptists who encounter God and engage the culture to change lives. Our great and constant prayer is that these stories inspire you to "go and do likewise."

The Southern Baptist Convention annual meeting in June may well have set a course for the national Convention for the next generation. The Great Commission Resurgence Task Force that SBC President Johnny Hunt named will be trying to discern ways Southern Baptists can do our work more efficiently and effectively. That discernment process will involve interaction with state conventions, including North Carolina.

How are you going to keep up with the significant work of this committee and of the changes likely to come from it at state and national levels if you do not subscribe to the *Biblical Recorder*? The only way to stay abreast of change is knowledge and the information you need to navigate life in the North Carolina Baptist family comes only from the *Recorder*. We pray that the economic difficulties in our nation do not last past 2009. If they do, of course there will be many effects. They could include increased subscription cost; or charge for online content. You can do the math: if everyone takes their news online there is no income to fund content production. Or, the Recorder might have to opt to post information online only after to print edition subscribers have received their news. That drastic move would diminish our increasingly popular web presence and nullify our "know, now" theme of the website.

Biblical Recorder readers are an interactive community. Writers submit letters and guest columns; staff covers news and plans features and welcomes story ideas from others. There are Sunday school lessons and church news and other information that keep North Carolina Baptists informed about each other. Effectiveness can be measured in relationships and the Recorder promotes relationships. We want to publish photos of your mission trips and special events in our online photo albums. Send us 8-12 photos with identification of the event and we'll put them up for the world to see. Your Kingdom efforts, whether next door or in another nation, deserve a wide audience to help readers of the Recorder be inspired, informed and immediate.

Those of you so inclined can start your own blog, hosted at the *Recorder* site, where you will have some built in audience and traffic. The *Recorder* is a great place to advertise your church staff searches, and to peruse while you look for the right person to join your own staff.

The *Recorder* was founded in 1833. It was privately owned and operated for most of its history, then in 1939 became a convention agency. As it has from its founding, the *Recorder* serves as the official news publication of the BSC, and serves the full spectrum of its churches.

IMB Annual Report

Southern Baptist churches and their IMB (International Mission Board) seized the opportunity in 2008 to more boldly impact lostness. During their September meeting, IMB trustees approved a reorganization to shift from a regional focus to "affinity groups," drawing together larger people groups related by language, history and culture. Focusing strategy through affinity groups rather than regions gives missionaries a more complete picture of the people they are working to reach and the freedom to pursue the lost regardless of their location.

Last year IMB missionaries reported that they shared the Gospel among 1,190 people groups, including 100 groups who heard the Gospel for the first time. However, thousands of unreached people groups still are not engaged by IMB or its partners. For them to have the opportunity to hear the Gospel, IMB leaders have challenged Southern Baptists to add more missionaries to the current total of 5,629.

To achieve evangelistic advance worldwide, IMB missionaries and their overseas Baptist partners reported nearly 27,000 new churches and nearly 566,000 baptisms. Affiliated church membership exceeded 10.3 million believers.

Due in large part to the dwindling U.S. economy, Southern Baptist giving to international missions struggled to keep pace with the numbers of church members coming forward for overseas service. Southern Baptists gave \$141.3 million to the 2008 Lottie Moon Christmas Offering \mathbb{R} – \$9 million less than offering receipts from each of the past two years. Still, the number of field personnel appointed in 2008 was 958 — 114 more individuals than were appointed the previous year. Of that 958 total, the number of long-term workers appointed was 388. At the end of 2008, the total number of missionaries serving through IMB was 5,495.

IMB continues to expand personalized relationships between U.S. churches, evangelical partners, overseas personnel and affinity groups. Also, IMB is providing U.S. churches with coaching and resources that support them as they become strategically involved.

Southern Baptists responded to hunger and relief needs through 508 projects. Giving in the amount of \$600,000 supplied food, water filters and purification systems, building materials, sanitation systems and health care to Myanmar after a deadly cyclone in early May last year and to China's Sichuan province rocked by an earthquake days later. Other countries receiving assistance included Zimbabwe, to which 3,900 packages of food were shipped in the wake of its collapsing economy, and Mali, which received 250 tons of grain with the help of a volunteer team from South Carolina. World Hunger and General Relief fund receipts in 2008 totaled \$5.4 million.

BY-LAWS OF THE TUCKASEIGEE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION, INC.

ARTICLE 1. NAME

The name of the body shall be the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association, Incorporated.

ARTICLE II. OBJECTIVES

The purpose of the Association is to be a fellowship of churches on mission in our setting. The specific objectives of the Association are as follows:

- 1. To promote harmony, understanding and spiritual power between the churches.
- 2. To afford and promote a larger fellowship of Christians in the work of Christ.
- 3. To provide such programs, projects and organizations as will strengthen the churches and assist them in achieving their goals and objectives.
- 4. To discover needs which cannot be met effectively by churches individually and to coordinate the use of resources in meeting these needs.
- 5. To encourage support by every church for the mission causes of the Association, the North Carolina Baptist Convention, and the Southern Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE III. AUTHORITY

SECTION 1. The Association shall have the power to elect and install its officers in whatever manner the body may deem expedient.

SECTION 2. The Association shall have power to recommend measures of usefulness and guidance to our churches in matters of organization, ordinations and questions of doctrines and discipline,

SECTION 3. The Association shall have no power to infringe upon the right of local churches as sovereign and independent bodies.

ARTICLE IV. MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. The Association shall be composed of regularly constituted Baptist churches in cooperating fellowship with the Southern Baptist Convention and following the teachings of the New Testament.

SECTION 2. The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership and may receive or reject churches applying for membership therein at its pleasure. Churches applying for membership shall agree to come under the watchcare of the Association for one year. It is understood that during this period of watchcare the church shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the Association except those of voting.

Applications for membership shall be presented to the Credentials Committee of the Association. The applications will consist of a letter from a constituted church stating their desire to affiliate with the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association. The Credentials Committee as a part of the review process may invite the requesting church to a conference to discuss its history, its mission strategy, and any other information that may be pertinent to the application. The Credentials Committee may then approve the application and recommend them to the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee may by a simple majority vote accept the requesting church to come under the watchcare of the Association for one year. It is suggested that any church under watchcare participate in the missions program of the Association. At the end of the year, the church may be voted in as a member of the Association with full privileges by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present and voting at the annual meeting of the Association, provided that the church submits an acceptable letter and at least one messenger be present at the meeting.

SECTION 3. Any church may withdraw from the Association at its pleasure and should notify the Association of this action in writing. Such action will be recognized by the Association at the next annual meeting.

SECTION 4. It shall be the duty of each church to furnish the Associational Clerk, before each annual session, an annual letter, the forms provided by the Associational Clerk, giving the information requested as is applicable to each church situation.

SECTION 5. The Association may withdraw from any church which has become unscriptural in its doctrine or practices by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present and voting at the annual meeting. Such vote is to be taken by written ballot.

ARTICLE V. MEETINGS

SECTION 1. The Association shall hold its annual meeting on Thursday and Friday preceding the third Sunday in October. Special meetings of the Association may be called by the Executive Committee provided two weeks written notice is given to the member churches.

SECTION 2. Each church shall be entitled to be represented at the annual meeting by the pastor and one additional

messenger. Churches which give to the association more than .5% of their undesignated receipts shall be entitled to an additional 2 messengers for every .5% of giving up to a total of 10 messengers for churches which give 2% of their undesignated giving."

SECTION 3. Churches are requested to elect their messengers and alternatives in conference to attend the annual meeting.

SECTION 4. In case of internal dissension in a church and two parties coming to the Association, each claiming to represent the church, neither party shall be seated until the question is decided as to which party is in union with the Association. The decision is to be made by a majority of the messengers present and voting.

ARTICLE VI. OFFICERS

SECTION 1. General officers of the Association shall be: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, Historian, Parliamentarian, and Assistant Parliamentarian. Program leaders shall be Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Music Director, Chairman of Evangelism Committee, Seminary Extension Director, Chairman of Mission Committee, Director of Missions, Trustees, Pastor Conference President, Youth Director, Stewardship Director, Vacation Bible School Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Deacons Chairmen, Senior Adult Director, Singles Ministry Director, and such other officers as the Association may desire to elect.

Associational representatives will be elected for the following institutions and agencies: (1) Truett Camp, (2) Baptist Children's Homes, (3) Baptist Hospital, (4) North Carolina Baptist Homes, Inc. (Homes for the Aging), (5) Biblical Recorder, (6) Christian Education, (7) Annuity Board and other representatives as may be deemed appropriate and elected in the Association.

SECTION 2. With the exception of the Director of Missions and Trustees, the terms of office for all officers of the Association shall be for one year with the privilege of continuing re-election. The Moderator and Vice Moderator shall not be eligible for re-election but one year in succession. (1) The number of Trustees shall be three. (2) The term of service should be for three years, with the term of only one expiring each year. In the first election of Trustees, the term of service for one should be three years, another two years, and the other one year. (3) Upon the expiration of term of service, the Trustee may or may not be re-elected for another term of three years.

Each term of office shall begin with the close of the annual session. The Associational financial year will run from January 1 through December 31.

ARTICLE VII. DUTIES OF OFFICERS

SECTION 1. The **Moderator** shall preside and maintain the order of all meetings of the Association and Executive Committee. He shall serve as ex officio member of all committees of the Association.

He shall appoint the Committee on Committees and all other committees pertinent to the operation of the body not named by the Committee on Committees in its regular report.

SECTION 2. The **Vice Moderator** shall assist the Moderator and preside in the absence of, or at the pleasure of the Moderator.

SECTION 3. The **Clerk** shall keep a complete and accurate record of all transactions; shall prepare a "Book of Reports" to be distributed to messengers at the beginning of each day's session of the annual meeting; and shall cause to be printed minutes concerning the records made.

The Clerk shall distribute to the clerk of each church in the Association blanks for the preparation of the church letter as soon as they are received from the State Convention. This form is to be returned to the Clerk of the Association not later than four weeks prior to the meeting of the body or by the deadline set by the Clerk and Director of Missions. All program reports should be returned by the same date.

An Assistant Clerk shall work with the Clerk in preparing the "Book of Reports," the annual minutes and the registration of messengers at the annual meeting.

SECTION 4. The **Treasurer** shall receive and dispense by order of the Executive Committee of the Association while in session, the money of the treasury and make a complete report at the Annual meeting and a current report at each Executive Committee meeting.

An **Assistant Treasurer** shall be elected to assist the Treasurer by request and to serve in the event the Treasurer resigns or is ill or unable to function.

SECTION 5. The Historian shall keep the records of the Association up-to-date.

SECTION 6. The **Parliamentarian** shall upon the request of the presiding officer of the body, advise and assist the Association with respect to all matters involving Parliamentary Procedure.

An Assistant Parliamentarian shall be elected. The Parliamentarian and Assistant should always communicate with each other to ensure that this office is filled at each Associational Annual or Executive Committee meeting.

SECTION 7. The Program Leaders and the Institutional Agency Representatives shall perform all duties customary to

their titles and shall make a written report to the annual session of the Association.

SECTION 8. Trustees have no authority except by direction of the Association and are not personally bound by signatures but are to be the legal signees for the Association. Trustees represent the Association in legal matters. Trustees act on behalf of the Association in acquisition and disposal of Associational property.

They sign all deeds of conveyance, execute all notes, bonds or mortgages, intervene in all suits, by authority of the Association.

All persons dealing with the Trustees, as Associational officers, may rely upon any written resolution duly adopted by the Association or Executive Committee, directing and authorizing the Trustees to act in its behalf and certified by the Association Moderator and Clerk.

ARTICLE VIII. RULES OF ORDER

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to Robert's Parliamentary Practice or in a manner not contrary thereto.

ARTICLE IX. QUORUM

The quorum for the Annual Associational meeting or any special called meeting of the Association shall not be less than 25 percent of the member churches.

ARTICLE X. THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

SECTION 1. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the General Officers and Program Leaders elected by the Association and the Pastor and one member from each church in the Association. No Pastor, by virtue of his being an Associational Officer or Program Leader shall be disqualified as a member of the Executive Committee, from representing the church or churches he may be serving in the Association. Twelve of these members shall constitute a quorum.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to act for the Association on matters arising when the Association is not in session and to make a report of all work to the next session of the Association. This body shall meet at a time and place designated by the Moderator on Monday following the first Sunday of each quarter except for the July quarter which shall meet on the second Monday of the month of July. Special meetings of the Executive Committee may be called by the Moderator with a one week notice to the churches.

SECTION 3. All vacancies occurring on committees or among elected officers shall be filled by the Executive Committee. SECTION 4. In the event that a vacancy occurs with the Trustees, the Executive Committee should fill such vacancy for the remainder of the term.

ARTICLE XI. ASSOCIATIONAL STANDING COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. The Association shall have such standing committees as may be deemed necessary to promote efficiently the work of the Master in our midst. The terms of office for all committee members shall be for one year except where specifically stated otherwise.

SECTION 2. COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES. It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate at the general meeting all standing committees as set forth under Article XI.

SECTION 3. THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE shall be composed of seven members. To this group the Directors of Sunday School, Discipleship Training, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood and Music Ministry will be added.

It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate the Officers, Program Leaders and Institutional Agency Representatives. These nominees shall be notified in writing not less than one month prior to presenting of their names at annual session.

SECTION 4. THE ORDER OF BUSINESS COMMITTEE, composed of three members, shall plan the annual program of the Association and present it to the Executive Committee at its October meeting.

SECTION 5. THE CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three pastors and two laymen. It shall examine applications of churches seeking admission into the Association in keeping with Article IV and make recommendation to the Association. It shall counsel with churches that are out of harmony of fellowship with the Association. It shall be responsible for registering messengers at the Annual Meetings."

SECTION 6. THE PLACE AND PREACHER COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members. The duties of this committee shall be to recommend the place or places for the following annual meeting and to recommend the preacher and alternate to deliver the annual sermon for the following year.

SECTION 7. THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members. It is appointed by the Moderator at the October Executive Committee meeting. It shall be the duty of this committee to present suitable resolutions at the annual Associational meeting.

SECTION 8. THE MEMORIAL COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members. It shall be the duty of this committee to bring a report to the annual meeting of those listed by the member churches as deceased since the last annual

ARTICLE XIII. THE ASSOCIATIONAL PASTORS' CONFERENCE

The Associational Pastors' Conference provides regular meetings for the Baptist ministers of the Association. The purpose of the conference is for fellowship and mutual support, for doctrinal and professional discussion and for promotion of church, Associational and other denominational programs. The conference is not an administrative or executive body.

ARTICLE XIV. JOB DESCRIPTION, DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS

SECTION 1. Title and Functions.

- A. Position Title. This position shall be known as the Director of Missions for the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association.
- B. Basic Functions. The Director of Missions shall serve as minister to the churches and church leaders of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association, as mission strategist for the Association, as chief administrative officer for the Association, and as a general leader of the Association.

SECTION 2. Responsibilities.

- A. Minister to Churches and Church Leaders.
- 1. The Director of Missions shall serve as pastor to the pastors of the Association. Upon request, the Director of Missions shall provide counseling and consultation for pastors regarding spiritual, vocational, congregational, personal or family concerns. The Director of Missions shall be available to assist pastors considering a move, shall orient new pastors to the Association, shall develop systems of pastoral support and fellowship, and shall provide growth opportunities for pastors.
- 2. Upon request, the Director of Missions shall assist and counsel pastors and church leaders regarding ministries, programs and procedures within the churches, including but not limited to building planning, budget procedures, long range or strategy planning, curriculum evaluation or review, issues of church policy and organization, church-community surveys, outreach, and spiritual growth.
- 3. Upon request, the Director of Missions shall assist and counsel churches regarding the calling of pastors or church staff, conflicts between a pastor and church, or conflicts within a church's fellowship. The Director of Missions shall assist churches without a pastor in their ministries and programs at their request and shall provide advice for persons considering a Christian vocation.
- 4. The Director of Missions shall be available upon request to preach or teach in and for churches on such occasions as revivals, pulpit supply, study courses, stewardship or missions emphasis, promotion or recognition assemblies and services, special day addresses, Vacation Bible School, and similar events.
- 5. The Director of Missions shall take the initiative to regularly visit churches for worship and fellowship, taking care to treat all churches as equal partners in the Association.
- 6. The Director of Missions shall develop opportunities to foster fellowship and mutual commitment between and among the churches.
 - B. Mission Strategist.
- 1. The Director of Missions shall encourage churches to develop and maintain a missions perspective and to extend their ministries and outreach beyond the local church field and community through broader involvement and cooperation with other churches in missions activities.
- 2. The Director of Missions shall interpret to the churches the needs of persons and groups within the Association's area and shall lead the Association to start new churches or ministry activities appropriate to the needs.
- 3. The Director of Missions shall encourage and lead volunteer involvement in mission activities beyond the Association's boundaries, such as home and foreign missions partnerships and disaster relief.
- 4. The Director of Missions shall interpret to the Association the mission work of the churches and conventions of the denomination at the state and national levels and shall encourage churches to support such work with their prayers, finances and personal commitment.
 - C. Chief Administrative Officer.
- 1. The Director of Missions shall administer all policies and instructions committed to that office by the Association in annual session or by the Executive Committee.
- 2. The Director of Missions shall work with the Executive Committee to plan, organize, coordinate, communicate and evaluate the total work of the Association.
- 3. The Director of Missions shall work with and assist Associational officers, committees and program leaders to implement the specific objectives of the Association and to communicate these activities to the churches and encourage their involvement.
- 4. The Director of Missions shall serve as an <u>ex officio</u> member of all committees and program departments of the Association.
- 5. The Director of Missions shall publish a regular Associational news medium to promote the work and fellowship of the Association among the churches and shall otherwise communicate with the churches as required.

Director of Missions according to the following procedure:

- a. The Personnel Committee shall recommend a candidate, negotiate terms of employment, and present the recommendations to the Executive Committee for approval. Such election may take place at the same time and in the same manner as election of the search committee, or at any other appropriate time.
- b. The Personnel Committee shall supervise the work of the Interim Director of Missions. Authority to extend, terminate, or otherwise change the terms of employment of the Interim Director of Missions shall be retained by the Executive Committee.
 - C. Accountability.
 - 1. The Director of Missions shall be supervised by the Personnel Committee acting on behalf of the Association.
 - 2. The Personnel Committee shall arrange for an annual evaluation of the Director of Missions.
- 3. The Personnel Committee shall establish a grievance policy to provide an orderly and appropriate process to hear grievances and complaints against the Director of Missions by members or churches of the Association.
 - D. Pay and Benefits.
- 1. Salary, retirement, insurance and other financial benefits for the Director of Missions shall be proposed by the Budget and Finance Committee and established by the Association in the annual budget. The Budget and Finance Committee shall solicit recommendations concerning pay and benefits for the Director of Missions from the Personnel Committee, but shall not be bound to accept those recommendations.
- 2. Travel allowance for the Director of Missions shall be deemed by the Association to be a business expense and not a personal benefit for the Director of Missions.
- 3. The Director of Missions shall receive two weeks paid vacation annually. The period of two weeks shall incorporate ten working days, including two Sundays. Unused vacation shall not accrue to the following year.
- 4. The Director of Missions shall receive sick leave at the rate of one day per month, accruing on the first day of the month, not to exceed 120 working days. Additional sick leave may be credited against future months. If the Director of Missions is involuntarily terminated by the Association, any unused sick leave accrued shall be financially reimbursed to the Director of Missions in addition to the 60 days' pay and benefits required by the act of termination.
 - 5. The Director of Missions shall be granted one day off each week in addition to Saturday.
- 6. The following holidays shall be observed: New Year's Day, Easter Monday, Memorial Day, July 4, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Thursday and Friday, and December 25 and 26 at Christmas.
- 7. The Association acknowledges the flexibility of schedule required by the Director of Missions. The Director of Missions' time shall be organized in a professional manner, with the work schedule devoted to activities that will benefit the work of the Association, whether in the office or on the field and whether during the normal work day or at night. The Director of Missions shall establish office hours for the office secretary and shall be available, either through personal office hours or some other established procedure, to any in the Association needing assistance.
- 8. The Director of Missions may attend denominational conventions and meetings, continuing education and professional development events, and other assemblies and conferences pertaining to the work of the office. The Association through its annual budget may reimburse the Director of Missions for expenses incurred while attending such meetings.
- 9. The Director of Missions may use up to three weeks of paid leave annually to lead or participate in revivals, world missions conferences, and similar meetings outside the Association, which result in an honorarium or other reimbursement above and beyond expenses. The Director of Missions may lead revivals and conferences within the Association as schedule permits, such activities being included in the job responsibility of minister to the churches of the Association.
- 10. The Director of Missions may serve as interim pastor of a church or churches in the Association. Such activity may not exceed three months in a given calendar year without prior approval of the Personnel Committee. The Director of Missions may engage in pulpit supply and similar activities as schedule permits, such activities being included in the job responsibility of minister to the churches of the Association.
- 11. The Director of Missions may lead or participate in mission trips, mission partnerships, disaster relief, and other direct mission opportunities outside the Association, such activities being included in the job responsibility of mission strategist for the Association. Such activities may not exceed three weeks in a given calendar year without prior approval of the Personnel Committee.
- 12. The Director of Missions shall keep a record of leave and time spent off the Associational field, including vacation, sick leave, conventions and conferences, continuing education events, revivals and similar meetings, and mission trips. The record shall be submitted to and maintained by the Treasurer of the Association.
- 13. The Director of Missions shall be free to use off duty time to engage in personal activities and pursuits. Such activities shall not interfere with the professional responsibilities or activities and meetings that require the presence of the Director of Missions. The Director of Missions shall be aware that all personal activities reflect on the office and the job

responsibility of general leader of the Association.

14. No honorarium shall be expected or required for any service performed by the Director of Missions in conjunction with official duties. However, any individual, group or church is free to present an honorarium if they so desire, and such may be retained by the Director of Missions and not submitted to the Association.

SECTION 4. Adoption.

- A. This job description supersedes, repeals and takes the place of any conflicting articles or statements in this Constitution or other documents of the Association.
- B. The Personnel Committee shall be responsible to maintain, update and revise this job description as required, making recommendations to the Association for approval as they are needed.

ARTICLE XV. AMENDMENTS

The constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the Association by a two-thirds majority of the messengers present and voting, provided the amendment has been presented to the Constitutional Committee at least 10 days prior to the annual meeting and presented to the Association in printed form on the first day of the annual meeting to be voted on the second day.

ARTICLE XVI. NON-PROFIT STATUS

The Tuckaseigee Baptist Association, Inc. is organized exclusively for charitable, religious, and educational purposes, including, for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986.

No part of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association, Inc. shall inure to the benefit of its' members, directs, officers, or other persons except that the organization shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the exempt purposes of the organization.

In the event of dissolution, the residual assets of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association, Inc. will be turned over to one or more organizations with similar purposes which are exempt as organizations described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986.

DIGEST OF CHURCH PROFILES
