



REPORT ON ORPHANAGE.

What class among us needs our care so much? How many young lives are wrecked because of no one to guide them? There are now eight orphanages in the state, caring for 884 children. One of these belongs to the Baptists and cares for 213 children. This institution is situated at Thomasville and consists of six buildings, with another in process of erection, the value of which is \$40,000. The managers are striving to make this institution self-supporting, but their needs are still very great, and we note with pleasure the increase of contributions for them. REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

What have State Missions done? This is a question which very often arises in many hearts. All over North Carolina there are earnest pastors who wish to present facts to their churches regarding the great work of State Missions. So the question comes not only from our laymen but from our pastors as well. Brethren, we can not tell you what State Missions have done for North Carolina. That is a question which will be answered in the great beyond, and not before, We can only tell you some of the visible results. Every county in the state has felt the tread and heard the voice of some missionary sent out by the State Board. In 1831 the state was divided into four sections and one man placed in each section and asked to cover his fourth of the state within one year. The great work accomplished within the year was encouraging, but the inability of the missionaries to cover their territory was apparent. The next year the scheme was strengthened by dividing the state into twenty sections instead of four, and placing twenty men on the field to do the work which four men had been asked to do the year before. What have been the results, do you ask? Over one-third of the Baptist churches in North Carolina are the direct or indirect results of the labors of our State Missionaries. In over four thousand destitute fields in North Carolina our State Board has helped to strengthen the work. Nearly every town and city Baptist church in North Carolina has at some time been helped by our State Board. In 1770 there were but two Baptist churches in North Carolina with perhaps fifty members each. Today

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

What have State Missions done? This is a question which very often arises in many hearts. All over North Carolina there are earnest pastors who wish to present facts to their churches regarding the great work of State Missions. So the question comes not only from our laymen but from our pastors as well. Brethren, we can not tell you what State Missions have done for North Carolina. That is a question which will be answered in the great beyond, and not before. We can only tell you some of the visible results. Every county in the state has felt the tread and heard the voice of some missionary sent out by the State Board. In 1831 the state was divided into four sections and one man placed in each section and asked to cover his fourth of the state within one year. The great work accomplished within the year was encouraging, but the inability of the missionaries to cover their territory was apparent. The next year the scheme was strengthened by dividing the state into twenty sections instead of four, and placing twenty men on the field to do the work which four men had been asked to do the year before. What have been the results, do you ask? Over one-third of the Baptist churches in North Carolina are the direct or indirect results of the labors of our State Missionaries. In over four thousand destitute fields in North Carolina our State Board has helped to strengthen the work. Nearly every town and city Baptist church in North Carolina has at some time been helped by our State Board. In 1770 there were but two Baptist churches in North Carolina with perhaps fifty members each. Today

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

"God hath made of one blood all nations of men to dwell on all the face of the earth." (Acts 17:26.) Paul, as he stood on Mars Hill, amid the blaze of Athenian culture, gave utterance to this declaration of the universal brotherhood of men. The Master himself laid the foundation for this great brotherhood in his command to his disciples after his resurrection. The spirit of missions is one, but for convenience the work is divided into Foreign Missions, Home Missions and State Missions. The field of the Home Mission Board consists of the Southern states and Cuba.

The Home Mission Board never before had such a wide open door of usefulness as it has today, and never was its work more important. We find a great lack of spirituality in all of our churches. While there have been more baptisms reported this year than last, yet this lack is apparent. We also observe in our churches a spirit of isolation on the part of both preachers and people. There is a need of spiritual unity in our bounds. To meet this need we recommend the appointment of a general missionary and colporteur to work in the bounds of this Association; to distribute religious books and tracts, preach on missions and education, and to assist pastors in revival meetings and to look after weak and destitute churches. FRUITLAND INSTITUTE.

We are glad to report a successful school last year. One hundred and fourteen pupils were enrolled, not including public school pupils. The total enrollment, including public school students, was two hundred and thirty. There have been some changes made in the faculty. Prof. W. F. Powell resigned as principal, and Prof. D. W. Sorrell, of Durham, N. C., has been elected as his successor. Miss Martha Sulenger, of Missouri, has been elected as lady principal and teacher of the primary department. We feel sure that we have a strong and competent faculty. The prospect for the school for the coming session is very promising.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT.

During the past year about \$300 have been expended on the buildings. The buildings are still unfinished. We are in pressing need of \$500 with which to complete the buildings. We have an outstanding indebtedness of \$1,000 on the institution.


